STREET OBSTRUCTIONS.

During the year 23 cases of street obstructions occurred in the Northern District of the Parish, and, under the direction of the Clerk to the Vestry, Inspector Croucher took out the necessary Summonses, which were heard at the Kensington Petty Sessions, with the following results :—

- In two cases the Defendants were fined 6d. each.
- In six cases the Defendants were fined 1s. and 1s. costs each.
- In ten cases the Defendants were fined 5s. and 1s. costs each.
- In one case the Defendant was fined 10s. and 1s. costs.
- In two cases the Defendants were fined £1 and 1s. costs each.
- In one case the Defendant was fined £2 and 1s. costs, and in default of payment a Distress Warrant to issue; and
- In one case the Defendant was fined £3 and 1s. costs.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1875.

One hundred and twenty-one Samples were analysed during the year ended the 24th June, 1888, under the provisions of the above and amending Acts, viz. :—

Adulterations were detected in Milk, six cases (the proportion of added water being from 16 to 30 per cent.); Butter, three cases (the proportion of foreign fat being from 15 to 20 per cent.); and in Coffee, one case (the proportion of chicory being 40 per cent.)

DIVERSION OF CHURCH PATH.

At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 1st June, 1887, a letter was read from Messrs. Dalton and Jessett, for Mr. Tunley, agreeing to pay £150 towards the expense of diverting the Church Path from Delaford Street to Lillie Road, and asking whether the Vestry would accept £40 towards the expenses of diverting the path from Mendora Road to Delaford Street, when it was resolved to sanction the diversion from Mendora Road to Delaford Street on payment of the sum of £40. On the 8th June the Works Committee instructed the Surveyor to obtain twelve boundary stones, and in conjunction with Mr. Dyer and the Churchwardens, to define the Church Path from Lillie Road to Greyhound Road. On the 5th October, 1887, the Vestry resolved that the highway called Church Path leading from Delaford Street into Lillie Road, also from Mendora Road to Delaford Street, and from Lillie Road to Greyhound Road be entirely stopped up as unnecessary, and that this Parish do apply to two Justices of the Peace in and for the County of Middlesex, to view the aforesaid highway so resolved to be entirely stopped up as unnecessary. The attention of the Law and Parliamentary Committee having been called to the fact that Mr. Whitehead was excavating a large quantity of sand from this land, on the 17th November, 1887, it was resolved that the attention of the Freeholder be called thereto, and that he be informed that unless the same is desisted in the Vestry will be compelled to oppose the application to stop up and divert Church Path. At the meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 4th January, 1888, the Solicitor produced the clauses to be put upon the Vestry Agenda, the form of Resolution to be passed at the Vestry Meeting, and the forms of consent and notices to Justices in this matter, which were approved and referred to the Vestry for sealing. The Solicitor stated that with regard to Diversion No. 3, a representative from the United Land Company was in waiting with cheques value £220, which he, the Solicitor, advised the Committee to accept, and it was resolved that the cheques be received in full satisfaction of this Vestry's claim for closing Church Path No. 3, and that the Clerk do give receipt for same. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 11th January, 1888, the above resolutions, as far as concerned Diversions Nos. 2 and 3, were passed, and the documents relating thereto sealed,

but Diversion No. 1 was referred back to the Law and Parliamentary and Works Committees. On the 17th January, 1888, the Law and Parliamentary Committee proceeded to consider the reference from the Vestry of this subject, when the matter was referred to the Works Committee to view. The Works Committee viewed this path on the 18th January, 1888, and resolved that Mr. Tower's offer of £40 be accepted. At the Vestry Meeting held on the 25th January, 1888, the notices and consents of Justices, in Diversions Nos. 2 and 3, were sealed by order of the Vestry. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 13th March, 1888, the Solicitor reported the receipt of a letter from Mr. Tower offering the Vestry £75, instead of £40, *re* the Diversion of Church Path No. 1, when it was resolved that the Solicitor be empowered to proceed with and complete the matter on Mr. Tower agreeing to pay £100 and the Vestry's costs in the matter. On the 10th April, 1888, the Solicitor stated that the consents and notices to Justices *re* Diversion No. 1 would be ready for sealing at the next Meeting of the Vestry; it was resolved that the Vestry be recommended to affix their seal to the consents and notices to Justices accordingly. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 18th April, 1888, the consents and notices to Justices were sealed accordingly. On the 24th April, 1888, the Solicitor informed the Law and Parliamentary Committee that the Magistrates would view on Tuesday, 1st May, 1888, and that it was necessary that the documents *re* Diversion No. 1 should be sealed by the Vestry on the following evening, when it was resolved that the Committee, at its rising, to adjourn till Wednesday, 2nd May, at 6.50 P.M., to consider the documents. The Magistrates viewed on May 1st, and at the adjourned Meeting of the Committee held on the 2nd May, the documents *re* Diversion No. 1 were approved and referred to the Vestry for sealing, and were subsequently sealed at the Vestry Meeting the same evening. On the 8th May the Law and Parliamentary Committee considered the Solicitor's bill of costs *re* Diversion No. 1, amounting to £98 13s. 11d., when the same was passed and referred to the Finance Committee for payment.

BISHOP'S MEADOW.

On the 27th July, 1887, the Clerk produced to the Vestry a letter from the Coroner as to the dangerous state of the river bank at the Bishop's Meadow, and at the Works Committee held on the 2nd August, 1887, a letter was read from the Solicitors to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners stating that they had applied to the Thames Conservators for extension of the line of boundary of the Meadow, but that that body had

declined to allow any alteration to the plan submitted by them, and asking for a plan of works in accordance with the decision of the Conservators, which were ordered to be supplied. On the 12th October, 1887, the Surveyor asked the Works Committee if he was to provide for river approaches in the plan of laying out the Bishop's Meadow, and was instructed not to do so. At the Works Committee on the 9th November, 1887, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that an application be immediately made to the Metropolitan Board of Works for a moiety of the cost of carrying out the improvement at the Bishop's Meadow, and for a loan for the other moiety for as long a period as possible; and at the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 16th November, 1887, the above resolution was by consent withdrawn. On the 23rd November, 1887, the Works Committee instructed the Surveyor to prepare an alternative scheme showing some steps leading from the Meadow to the river, with the additional cost of same, which he presented to the Committee at their Meeting on the 7th December, 1887, when the same was adopted, and on the 3rd January, 1888, he was instructed to complete the plan and bring up same at the next Meeting of the Committee, together with the cost of the River Wall. On the 11th January, 1888, the Surveyor produced the plan and estimate of cost of laying out the Bishop's Meadow, which, having been considered, it was resolved that the level of the Meadow be raised 2 feet 6 inches higher than the line shown on the Surveyor's plan, but that the wall be retained at the height suggested by the Surveyor and a railing placed on such wall. At the Meeting of the Works and General Purposes Committee held on the 18th January, 1888, the Surveyor produced amended plan and estimate of laying out the Bishop's Meadow, which was ordered to be sent to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and the Conservators of the River Thames. On the 28th March, 1888, the Surveyor produced a letter from Messrs. Clutton setting out certain conditions for the laying out of the Bishop's Meadow, when it was resolved that the conditions be acceded to, and the Surveyor was directed to prepare an estimate of the total cost, in detail, for carrying out the whole of the works in accordance with the requirements of the Thames Conservators, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and the Vestry, and on the 4th April following the action of the Committee was approved by the Vestry. The Surveyor produced his report, as to laying out the meadow, to the Works Committee at their Meeting, held the 11th April, 1888, when the same was considered, and it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that advertisements be issued in the usual papers for carrying out the works, the Surveyor to produce detailed plans, &c., that day month; and at the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 18th

April, the above recommendation of the Committee was adopted. At the Meeting of the Works Committee held on the 25th April, 1888, a letter was read from the Secretary of the Thames Conservators asking for cheque for £23 3s., being £3 3s. fee to Assessor and £20 fine payable to Conservators, and the same was referred to the Finance Committee for payment; and on the 2nd May, 1888, a cheque was drawn by the Vestry for the amount. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 6th June, 1888, the Clerk read a letter from the Thames Conservators enclosing Deed of License in duplicate for embanking and keeping embanked the Bishop's Meadow, when the same were sealed with the seal of the Vestry, and ordered to be stamped.

LAMMAS RIGHTS.

On the 30th day of June, 1887, the Lammas Rights Committee held their first Meeting, after their election on 1st June, when Dr. J. Edwin Cooney was elected Chairman of the Committee for the year ensuing, and the Clerk was instructed to get a copy of the Court Rolls of 1727, and the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845. The Chairman was also requested to draw up a report on the subject of Lammas Rights, and the action taken by Battersea and Chelsea on the matter. At the Meeting of the Lammas Rights Committee held on the 23rd September, 1887, the Clerk read the resignation of Dr. Cooney, as Chairman of this Committee, when the same was accepted, and Mr. John Dyer was elected in his stead. The Clerk also read correspondence he had had with Messrs. Lee, Bolton and Lee as to a copy of the Court Rolls, in which they stated they had the Court Rolls, but could not disclose any information contained therein without the consent of all persons concerned; and the Committee having fully considered the question of Lammas Rights generally it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to authorise the Lammas Rights Committee to enter into friendly negotiations with the Gas Company, as to the extinction of Lammas Rights as far as the Gas Company was concerned, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry on the 5th October, 1887. On the 19th October, 1887, the Committee decided to view the land over which Lammas Rights are claimed by the inhabitants, which view took place on the 25th October, 1887, and on the 2nd November, 1887, the Clerk was instructed to write to the Chairman and Governors of the Gas Light and Coke Company, asking if they would receive a deputation from the Fulham Vestry, *re* Lammas Rights and Imperial Road, the Clerk to call a Meeting of the Committee on receipt of the reply from the Gas Company. At the Meeting of the Committee held on the 14th

November, 1887, Messrs. Goodacre, Elkins, Walden, G. P. Smith, Walter, Hunt, Easton, Hamer, Dyer, Attenborough, and Lawrence, were appointed the Deputation to wait upon the Directors of the Gas Company at Horseferry Road, Westminster, on the 18th November, 1887, and on the latter day the Deputation met at the Vestry offices, considered the points to be discussed at their interview with the Directors of the Gas Company, and proceeded to Horseferry Road, Westminster. At the Meeting of the Lammas Rights Committee held on the 2nd December, 1887, Messrs. Walden and Hamer reported the result of the interview of the Deputation with the Gas Company, when it was resolved that the Surveyor prepare a plan showing an Approach Road from King's Road to three acres of land in western boundary of the Gas Company's land, by way of Hugon Road, Stephendale Road, and Town Mead Road, at a width of not less than 40 feet in any part. On the 12th December, 1887, the Surveyor submitted plan showing Approach Road as above, which having been considered by the Committee and fully discussed, it was resolved that the Surveyor bring up at the next Meeting of the Committee a report of the separate values of the properties affected, and that the Vestry be recommended to co-operate with the Gas Company for the extinction of Lammas Rights, in any way they (the Company) may suggest, for the sum of £5,000. The Surveyor submitted the report *re* the separate values of the properties affected to the Committee at their Meeting on the 19th January, 1888, and the same having been considered he was instructed to prepare another report for submission to the Committee at an adjourned Meeting to be held on the 31st day of January, 1888. On the 2nd February, 1888, the Surveyor produced his report hereon as directed, and the Committee having considered and revised same, it was resolved that the report as revised be adopted and sent to the Vestry for approval, and the said report was adopted by the Vestry on the 8th February, 1888.

Re IMPERIAL ROAD AND THE GAS COMPANY.

To the Chairman and Members of the Lammas Rights Committee.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

At a Meeting of this Committee, held on the 18th instant, I was directed to submit a full Report, setting forth the various matters and interests involved in the question between the Vestry and the Gas Company.

The question arises out of the action of the Gas Company in fencing in certain lands in this Parish, abutting on the River Thames,

over which a common right to graze cattle exists, during the Autumn and Spring seasons of the year.

There is no doubt that Lammas rights exist over this and a quantity of other land described on the ordnance maps as the "Town Meadows," but as this part of Fulham is no longer used for purposes of agriculture, these rights have ceased to be of great use or importance to the inhabitants, and until they are settled, the land must be unproductive and idle. Much of the land, lying as it does beside the river, is suitable for wharves, and the remainder would, no doubt, make valuable building land. It is, therefore, to the interests of the Ratepayers to make an arrangement so that this land can be utilised.

Previous to suggesting the lines of an equitable arrangement between the Vestry (as the representatives of the Ratepayers) and the Gas Company, it will be necessary to give particulars of other matters relating to this question.

In the year 1879, the Gas Company, with the support of the Vestry, obtained an order to close Sand's End Lane, the Vestry receiving in consideration of their support the sum of £1,000, the Gas Company also laying out and making the Imperial Road. This amount was paid and invested in Consols in the name of the Vicar and Messrs. F. C. King and W. H. Lammin.

The area of the land in question held by the Gas Company, over which Lammas Rights exist, is (exclusive of three acres afterwards referred to) $24\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and I estimate the increase in the value of the land by the extinction of the rights, to be at least £500 an acre, or £12,250.

The Imperial Road (area about three acres) represents a value of say, £3,600, made in accordance with the previously mentioned valuation.

It is, therefore, suggested that in consideration of the Vestry surrendering Imperial Road to the Gas Company, and assisting the Company to acquire absolute ownership of the $24\frac{1}{2}$ acres named above, and further, to co-operate with the Company in such way as may to them seem best for the extinction of the aforesaid Rights, the Gas Company shall pay to the Vestry the sum of £5,000, and convey the plot before referred to of three acres of land as shown on plan.

It is also further proposed that the Company should widen Bagley's Lane to 40 feet wherever their property abuts upon it, that the Company should acquire and give a right of road from the three acres named above to the Town Mead Road, and further, that all expenses of carrying out this arrangement shall be borne by the Gas Company.

It is not necessary for me to enter into any description of the

advantages that will accrue from an arrangement, based on the lines suggested in this Report, at the same time I beg to point out that where the negotiations include so many issues, there is not much chance of a satisfactory termination unless both parties are prepared to enter into them upon a broad give-and-take principle, with a strong determination to bring them to a satisfactory conclusion.

At the Meeting of the Committee held on the 16th February, 1888, it was resolved that a printed copy of the Surveyor's report be sent to the Gas Company, with a letter from the Clerk stating that the Vestry had adopted same in the hope that an amicable arrangement might be arrived at, which resolution was confirmed by the Vestry on the 22nd day of February, 1888. On the 21st February, 1888, the Clerk wrote to the Secretary of the Gas Company forwarding copy of the Surveyor's report, and a tracing showing the position of the three acres of land referred to in the report, as the land to be conveyed to the Vestry; and at the Meeting of the Committee held on the 26th April, 1888, the Clerk read a letter from the Secretary to the Gas Company stating that the Directors had referred the Clerk's letter to a Committee of the Directors who would go into the questions raised, with the assistance of their Engineer on the spot. At the same Meeting letters were read from the Commons Preservation Society, and the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association, *re* Lammas Rights over the Town Meadows, and asking for copies of the documents relating thereto in the possession of the Vestry, to which it was resolved that they be informed that upon their making an appointment with the Clerk to the Vestry the whole of the documents in the possession of the Vestry will be shown their officers, as the Vestry have nothing whatever to conceal in the matter. A letter was also read from the Secretary of the Political Council of the Fulham Liberal Club forwarding copy of resolution passed by such Council on the question of Lammas Rights, when it was resolved that no action be taken thereon. The Committee then proceeded to consider the reference from the Vestry of the nine questions submitted to the Vestry on the 21st March last on behalf of the Fulham Liberal Association.

At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 2nd May, 1888, the recommendations of the Committee were adopted. On the 11th May, 1888, the Clerk read a letter from the Gas Company declining to accede to the proposals contained in the Surveyor's report, as submitted with the Clerk's letter of 21st February last, and the Rev. F. H. Fisher having

stated the result of an interview he had on the same day with Mr. Birkett, Solicitor to the Commons Preservation Society, and the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association, hereon, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to grant permission for the expenditure of the sum of £50, to enable this Committee to engage the services of Mr. Percival Birkett to investigate the Vestry's position in the matter of Lammas Rights, the amount to be paid out of the Improvement Fund Account, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry on the 23rd May, 1888. At the Meeting of the Committee held on the 14th June, 1888, Mr. Dyer was re-elected Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. S. Knight was elected Vice-Chairman of the Committee for the ensuing year; and the Clerk was instructed to write Mr. Birkett to ask him what his probable charge would be for an opinion as to the rights over the Fulham Lammas Lands, and that if the same does not exceed the sum of £50 the Clerk do ask him to attend the next Meeting of the Committee, and at the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 20th June, 1888, the action of the Committee was endorsed.

VESTRY HALL AND OFFICES.

At the Meeting of the Committee held on the 21st July, 1887, the Clerk reported that the Requisition, &c., relative to the proposed sale of this land, signed by the Churchwardens and Overseers, had been sent to the Guardians of the Fulham Union, who had sealed and forwarded same to Local Government Board, first altering the form of consent; that the forms had been returned by the Local Government Board to him (the Clerk) stating the Form of Consent should not have been altered, as the Sale will be effected by the Fulham Board of Guardians, under Sect. 3 of 5 and 6 Will. IV., c. 69, and not by the Churchwardens and Overseers, and requesting that the same might be altered back so as to stand as printed, and be resealed by the Guardians and returned to that Board through the Clerk to the Guardians; that he (the Clerk) had forwarded the forms, with the letter from the Local Government Board to the Clerk to the Guardians, and had this day been informed by a Guardian that the Form had been re-sealed as requested. Also that the Local Government Board stated that on receipt of the two Forms amended, the necessary proceedings would be taken to issue an Order for obtaining the consent of the Owners and Ratepayers of the Parish to the Transfer, but that that Board had nothing to do with the preparation of the Deed of Transfer. At the same Meeting the Clerk was instructed to write to the Metropolitan Board of Works requesting them to return the plans of the Town Hall and Offices, deposited in December, 1886. At an adjourned Meeting of

the Committee held on the 27th July, 1887, the architect attended and produced the plans, which having been fully considered, it was resolved that the plans as now presented by the Architect be sent up to the Vestry for approval and sealing, and the plans were accordingly submitted to the Vestry on the said 27th July, 1887, and approved, and the same were sealed with the seal of the Vestry. At a Meeting of the Committee held on the 8th December, 1887, the Clerk read a letter from the Metropolitan Board of Works stating it was contrary to the practice of the Board to return plans which had been submitted for approval, and also produced the Order from the Local Government Board as to the Transfer of the Site of Elton Villa, when the matter was referred to the Solicitor, and the Clerk directed to write the Guardians with reference to the terms under which they would transfer the land, should he be so advised by the Solicitor. At the same Meeting the Clerk produced a Petition from the Inhabitants in the neighbourhood of Elton Villa 'Site as to the advisability of having the hoarding set back, to which he was directed to reply that the same should have consideration; and a letter was read from Mr. Seaman requesting permission to have three of his plans in order that he might be able to have same lithographed with others he had got, when it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to allow Mr. Seaman to have the three plans on condition of his depositing a sum of £5 5s., to be returned to him on his returning the plans. It was also resolved to recommend the Vestry to increase the Committee by the addition of the Churchwardens and Overseers for the time being; which recommendations were carried at the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 14th day of December, 1887. At a Meeting of the Committee held on the 19th January, 1888, the Solicitor reported that the Draft Deed had been sent to the Guardians for approval, but as they would have no meeting for another fortnight, and, therefore, could not approve same until that date, he suggested that, in the meantime, the Churchwardens and Overseers should meet and approve same. The Committee proceeded to consider the amount of consideration money to be paid to the Guardians, when it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to offer the Guardians the sum of £2,869 for the Transfer of the Site of Elton Villa, the Vestry to pay the Solicitor's costs. It was also resolved that the Solicitor to the Vestry negotiate with the Solicitor to the Guardians that the Guardians' costs shall not exceed twenty guineas, and that, subject to the business being ready, the Vestry be recommended to draw cheques for the above amounts. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 25th January, 1888, the above recommendations were adopted. At

the Meeting of the Committee held on the 7th February, 1888, the Solicitor reported that the Guardians and Churchwardens and Overseers had approved the Deed of Transfer, but that a difficulty had arisen with the Metropolitan Board of Works, and he stated the result of the interview of the Clerk and himself with the Solicitor and Accountant to the Metropolitan Board of Works on the subject. At the Meeting of the Committee held on the 12th April, 1888, the Clerk reported everything settled between the Churchwardens and Overseers and the Local Government Board hereon, and that he had received cheque for £2,444 from the Guardians of the Fulham Union, which would be paid to the Metropolitan Board of Works the next day. At the same meeting a letter was read from Messrs. Widnell and Trollope, asking for payment of £200 on account of their charges for taking out quantities; the consideration of which was ordered to stand over, and the Architect was instructed to prepare amended plans for the Solicitor to make application to the Metropolitan Board of Works for the loan of £20,000. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 23rd May, 1888, it was resolved that the Seal of the Vestry be affixed to the Memorial to the Metropolitan Board of Works *re* the Vestry Hall, and that the Chairman of the Vestry and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Vestry Hall Committee be asked to form a Deputation to present same, if required, and the Memorial was sealed accordingly. On the 6th June, 1888, the Metropolitan Member (Mr. Perry) reported to the Vestry that the Memorial *re* the Vestry Hall had been presented to the Metropolitan Board of Works, who had referred same to their Finance Committee and Officers to report on. At the Meeting of the Committee on the 14th June, 1888, the Clerk produced a letter from the Accountant to the Metropolitan Board of Works enclosing form to be filled up, and returned, showing indebtedness of Vestry, and asking upon what date or dates the Vestry would be prepared to take up the Loan, if granted by that Board; when it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that application be made to the Metropolitan Board of Works for a Loan of £20,000 for 30 years or longer, the first instalment (£5,000) to be received at once, and the remainder in three equal instalments at intervals of three months each. At the same Meeting a letter was read from the Superintending Architect to the Metropolitan Board of Works forwarding form to be filled up showing the nature of expenditure for which the loan is to be raised, &c., and for what purpose the proposed buildings are to be used, and the form was referred to the Chairman of the Committee, the Solicitor, and Architect, together with the Clerk, to fill up and return to the Superintending Architect.

Re PURCHASE OF OLD TOLL HOUSE, PUTNEY BRIDGE.

On the 27th June, 1887, the Clerk produced to the Law and Parliamentary Committee a letter from the Metropolitan Board of Works hereon, and the Committee having heard the opinion of the Solicitor thereon, it was resolved that the Metropolitan Member be requested to ask the Metropolitan Board of Works to let the matter stand over for a time, that the Clerk to the Vestry and Surveyor do obtain as much information as possible *re* the land coloured green, and consult the Solicitor thereon, and, if he considered it necessary, to also see the Solicitor to the Metropolitan Board of Works thereon. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 29th June, 1887, the Metropolitan Member reported that with reference to his application to the Metropolitan Board of Works for the adjournment of the matter of the Old Toll House at Putney Bridge, the Solicitor had given his consent thereto, but that all necessary information in respect to the matter must be obtained without further delay. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 14th July, 1887, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that the Metropolitan Member be authorised to offer the Metropolitan Board of Works £1,000 for the land coloured red, yellow and green on plan, he to point out the claim the Vestry have in the land, which recommendation was duly confirmed by the Vestry. At the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 27th July, 1887, the Clerk—on behalf of the Metropolitan Member—reported that this matter had been referred to the Officers of that Board to report on; and at the Meeting of the Vestry held on the 21st September, 1887, the Metropolitan Member reported that the valuation of the Officers of that Board was £2,400, but that the Committee of the Board considered it such a difference between the amount offered by this Vestry (£1,000) and the valuation of their Officers that they had referred the matter to the Officers of the Board and the Vestry to negotiate. On the 28th September, 1888, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that the Officers of the Vestry have an interview with the Officers of the Metropolitan Board of Works, and report the result at the next Meeting of the Committee, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry at their Meeting held on the 5th October, 1887. At the Works Committee Meeting on the 12th October, 1887, the Clerk read report as to the result of the interview with the Officers of the Metropolitan Board of Works, and the question having been fully discussed, it was resolved that the Clerk be instructed to write to the Metropolitan Board of Works and offer £1,500 for the site of the Old Toll House, which resolution was duly reported to the Vestry on the 19th October, 1887,

and adopted. On the 16th November, 1887, the Metropolitan Member reported that the question of the Toll House Site has been referred to the Solicitor to report on the points raised by the Architect's report, and discussion of the Vestry's increased offer; and at the Works Committee Meeting on the 23rd November, 1887, the Metropolitan Member having asked, whether, in the event of the Metropolitan Board not accepting the £1,500 offered by this Vestry, the Committee would instruct him to take any further action in the matter, it was resolved that no further action be taken in the matter should the Vestry's offer be refused. At the Vestry Meeting held on the 30th November, 1887, the Metropolitan Member reported that the Metropolitan Board of Works had agreed to accept the terms offered by the Vestry for the Old Toll House Site. On the 14th December, 1887, a letter was read at the Vestry Meeting from the Metropolitan Member stating his inability to attend the Meeting, and suggesting that as the Metropolitan Board had accepted the offer of this Vestry of £1,500 for the Site of the Old Toll House, Approach Road and Land adjoining, as shewn on the Vestry's plan, the matter be referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee to carry on the purchase, and to the Works Committee to prepare a scheme for utilising it. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 20th December, 1887, the Solicitor reported that he had written the Solicitor to the Metropolitan Board of Works hereon but had not yet received a reply, when it was resolved that the Solicitor do proceed with the matter and get the agreement as early as possible. On the 21st December, 1887, the subject of the preparation of a scheme for the use of the Old Toll House Site was ordered to stand over for one month. At the Law and Parliamentary Committee Meeting on the 17th January, 1888, the Solicitor produced the Draft Agreement herein, and the Committee having considered same, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to accept the terms of the Agreement, and that the Solicitor and Metropolitan Member, in the meantime, do consult Mr. Jackson, the Assistant Solicitor to the Metropolitan Board of Works, on the question of the production of title deeds, which recommendation was adopted and the Agreement sealed by the Vestry on the 25th January, 1888. On the 31st January, 1888, the Solicitor reported to the Law and Parliamentary Committee the result of his interview with the Solicitor to the Metropolitan Board of Works hereon, and the Clerk having stated the Agreement was sealed by the Vestry at their last Meeting, no action was taken thereon. At the Law and Parliamentary Committee on the 14th February, 1888, it was resolved that the Finance Committee be

recommended to draw cheque for the purchase-money of the Old Toll House Site, viz., £1,500, and the Solicitor informed thereof. On the 15th February, 1888, the Works Committee having considered the subject of the preparation of a scheme for the use of the Old Toll House, it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that the Surveyor be instructed to prepare a plan and take such steps as may be necessary to obtain the sanction of the Thames Conservators to the new line of frontage, and that the Clerk be empowered to sign the application to the Thames Conservators with reference to the Old Toll House, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry on the 22nd February, 1888. A letter was read at the Law and Parliamentary Committee from the Solicitor enclosing Conveyance and Memorial, *re* Old Toll House Site, for sealing by the Vestry, and the same were adopted and sealed by the Vestry on the 7th March, 1888. At the Works Committee on the 14th March, 1888, the Surveyor read letter from the Thames Conservators stating that the river frontage had already been fixed by the Thames Conservators, and it was resolved that he be instructed to proceed with the matter, and on the 28th March, 1888, the Works Committee further instructed him to bring up complete plans and report as to the necessary works to be carried out. On the 9th May, 1888, the Surveyor produced plan and read his report as to the steps to be taken to prepare the Site of the Old Toll House for use as a Wharf; and the same having been discussed, it was resolved that the Land be enclosed from "A" to "B" on plan; that the question of the absorption of the Ferry be referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee for the Solicitor's opinion; and that the Surveyor be instructed to make application to the Thames Conservators for permission to make the side of the Wharf abutting on the Public Free Dock square with the front of the Wharf; also that the Surveyor prepare a detailed estimate of the cost of a small crane for loading and unloading, and submit same to the Committee. The Clerk read, at the Vestry Meeting on the 6th June, 1888, a letter from the Thames Conservators *re* the line of Embankment by the Old Toll House Site, enclosing a plan showing the line which the Conservators would sanction, and the same was ordered to be referred to the Works Committee. The Law and Parliamentary Committee, on the 18th June, 1888, resolved that the question of the absorption of the Ferry by the Old Toll House be referred to the Surveyor and Solicitor to carry out the instructions of the Works Committee of the 9th May, 1888, and report to this Committee, which resolution was confirmed by the Vestry at their Meeting on the 20th June, 1888.

FOOTPATH, TOWN MEAD ROAD.

On the 8th June, 1887, the Surveyor was instructed by the Works Committee to produce a plan of Town Mead Road showing the old path, and on the 22nd June, 1887, Mr. Baxter having offered to accompany the Surveyor and point out where the old path originally was, it was resolved that Mr. Baxter's offer be accepted, and that he and the Surveyor do report the result at a future Meeting of the Works Committee. At the Works Committee on the 20th July, 1887, it was resolved that Boundary Stones be placed in this road to mark the boundary of the old path, which resolution was adopted by the Vestry on the 27th July, 1887. On the 10th November, 1887, the Clerk produced at the Law and Parliamentary Committee an application from Mr. Last for the diversion of the old path in Town Mead Road, and the Committee having examined the plan accompanying same it was resolved that the Members present do form a Sub-Committee to view same on Saturday, the 12th November, 1887, at 3 P.M. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 17th of November, 1887, the Committee further considered the application with plan from Mr. Last, when it was resolved that the Clerk do write Mr. Last stating that until he has reinstated the foot path in its original position the Vestry cannot discuss his plan and application for the stopping up of the said path; and the Surveyor was instructed to place boundary posts on the whole of the path from Grove House to Miss Sullivan's, the posts to be placed so as to prevent carts from being driven through same and over the path. On the 30th November, 1887, the Vestry endorsed the action of the Law and Parliamentary Committee. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 20th of December, 1887, a letter was read from Messrs. Last and Sons, *re* the diversion of the path in Town Mead Road, when it was resolved that the letter and all particulars in the Clerk's possession be given to the Solicitor, and that the Surveyor give the Solicitor such other particulars and assistance in the matter as he may require. On the 4th January, 1888, the Solicitor produced his report hereon to the Law and Parliamentary Committee, when the same having been considered, it was resolved that the Surveyor, in addition to placing posts, have the path reinstated in order to show a beaten path and to maintain the Vestry's rights. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 17th January, 1888, a letter was read from Mr. Last, in which he stated that he was surprised to find that the Vestry had dotted the estate with stones, and were now making up the footpath; that they (the Vestry) must be aware that this

was quite outside their right, and it was moreover an absurd farce if they had any idea of giving his application to divert the path fair and impartial consideration, when the matter was ordered to stand over till the next Meeting; and at the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 31st January it was resolved to recommend the Vestry to adhere to their previous resolution, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry on the 7th February, 1888. On the 9th May, 1888, the Works and General Purposes Committee viewed the path but took no action in the matter. At the Meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 15th May, 1888, it was resolved that a summons be applied for against Mr. Cole for obstructing the path under the Highway Act, and that the question of the encroachment by Messrs Laist and Sons do stand over, and that the Surveyor be instructed to prepare a plan showing the actual position of the path, and bring up a report stating from where he obtained his information. On the 23rd May, 1888, the Vestry confirmed the recommendation of the Law and Parliamentary Committee as to the summons against Mr. Cole for obstructing the path in Town Mead Road. At the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 12th June a letter was read from Mr. Taylor, Mr Cole's Solicitor, requesting that proceedings might be stayed, and asking to be heard before the Committee, when it was resolved that the matter do stand over till Monday, 1st July, the Solicitor to delay proceedings pending the consideration of the letter by the Committee. On the 18th June the Surveyor produced plan and report hereon, and the Solicitor having stated that Mr. Cole's Solicitor had waited on him that day and acknowledged Mr. Cole's error, and stated that they were willing to pay any compensation the Vestry asked, provided the Vestry would apply to the Justices for the diversion of the footpath, it was resolved that the matter stand over for the Committee to view, which was accordingly done on the 22nd June, when it was resolved that the consideration of the subject be adjourned, the Surveyor to get, in writing, evidence as to the path on the top of the bank being a public footpath.

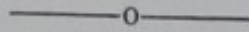

LOANS.

The total amount due on mortgages, as per the register at 25th March, 1887, was £39,418 1s. 4d.; during the past year the sum of £4,395 10s. 8d. on account of principal has been repaid, and as no new loans have been taken up to 25th March, 1888, the amount of indebtedness of the Vestry on loans has been reduced to £35,022 10s. 8d., being equal to the small per centage of 9·218 of the rateable value, viz., £360,354.

PROPERTY ACCOUNT.

On page No. 66 of my last year's Report will be found an Account showing the amount due to this Vestry from the Trustees of the Estate of the late Fulham District Board of Works. During the past twelve months the amount has been received, viz., The Trustees have paid £774 15s., and the Vestry of the Parish of Hammersmith the sum of £7,241 3s. 1d.; this includes the sum of £203 3s. for interest. Out of these amounts several freehold properties have been purchased.

VESTRY HALL FUND.

During the year 1887-8 the interest on the £994 4s. 2d., 3 per cent. Annuities, mentioned in last year's Report, has been invested in the purchase of additional stock amounting to £28 4s. 11d., increasing the total amount of stock held by the Trustees (the Vicar of Fulham and Messrs. Lammin and King) to £1,022 9s. 1d., as per the Balance Sheet.

IMPROVEMENT ACCOUNT.

At my suggestion the Vestry decided to open an Improvement Account, to the credit of which is carried all sums received for permission to close or divert roads, paths, &c., and such sums as are allowed for under the heading of Improvements in the annual estimates. Out of this Fund all small items for improvements are to be paid, instead of being placed on a Loan Schedule and made a charge on future rates.

LOAN SCHEDULE ITEMS.

On page No. 61 will be found a long list of small payments for new crossings, paving works, purchase of frontages, &c., amounting to £1,598 5s. 4d.; these, together with many other works ordered by the Vestry but not yet carried out, will form the first Loan Schedule for sundry improvements. The Loan, when obtained, will recoup the Vestry's general rate the amounts borrowed from it.

HAMMERSMITH ROAD.

During 1887-8 the Metropolitan Board of Works made an order directing that "That portion of the Hammersmith Road situated in the Fulham Parish should be placed under the control of the Hammersmith Vestry for maintaining, lighting, sewerage, &c., and that the Fulham Vestry shall pay the sum of £525 5s. 6d. per annum for such maintenance." Accordingly the Hammersmith Vestry in June, 1887, sent in an account for £587 18s. 11d., being a charge at the above-mentioned rate for one year and forty-two days. The Finance Committee not feeling satisfied with the account as rendered, instructed me to examine and report on it. On September 30th, 1887, I presented to them the following Report:—

In accordance with your instructions, *re* above, I beg to report I have looked over the late District Board's agreement and specification for the wood paving works in the Hammersmith Road, also the Report of the Clerk of Works asked for by the Hammersmith Vestry as to the completion of same, and I am of opinion that the amount, viz., £43 9s. 11d., arrived at by the Hammersmith Vestry's Accountant, is a fair sum to take off for the period during which the road was closed. But a further sum of £42 9s. 10d. should be allowed for the time, viz., three months, the contractor had to maintain the road, this being the usual custom.

HAMMERSMITH VESTRY.

The total sums paid to the above Vestry during 1887-8, including 1886-7 liabilities for Rent of Wharf, Mortuary, &c., Removing and Disinfecting Bedding, Clothing, &c., for Superannuations paid to Officials of the late District Board, and for Maintenance of Hammersmith Road, amounts to £1,403 2s. 1d.

PRECEPTS ON CORPORATE BODIES.

The Central Boards issuing Precepts on the Vestry are the Metropolitan Board of Works and the School Board for London, the Precept for the year 1887-8 of the former for the Parish of Fulham amounts to £10,516 2s. 8d., equal to the rate of $7\frac{1}{2}$ d. in the £, this is an increase of £890 1s. 4d. on that of the previous year, resulting in a rate of $\cdot 401$ of a 1d. in the £ more than 1886-7. The following statement will show the amounts paid by the Fulham Parish through the late District Board, the Fulham Vestry, &c., to the Metropolitan Board over which they have no direct control.

The School Board Precept for the same period is £11,817 0s. 8d.; this is chargeable on the General Rate, and is equal to a rate of 8½d. in the £, the amount being a decrease of £585 10s. 6d. on the previous year's precept, and but for the small increase in the rateable value, viz., £6,898, as against an increase last year of £44,247, the rate this year would have shown a considerable decrease; as it is, the rate is reduced by .375 of a 1d. in £ on that of 1886-7. The decrease on the General Rate must be attributed to the fact that the Overseers had a very large balance in hand at the commencement of the year, and that the Vestry's Precept was not a large excess on the previous year.

* Of this amount about thirteen-sixteenths of a 1d. is for part of the Metropolitan Consolidated Rate, being for Bridge Expenses, and chargeable on the General Rate by Act of Parliament.

The Lighting Rate shows a slight saving in the amount called for, notwithstanding the fact that upwards of 50 new lamps were erected during the year, the saving being on the Gas Company's reduction in the price of gas of 3d. per 1,000 feet.

The Local Sewers' Rate is less by 1d. in £ than the previous year, and brought about by the substantial balance the Vestry had in hand when issuing the Precept.

The increase of a 1d. in £ on the Metropolitan Board's Rate is due to the large excess on their last year's Precept.

NEW STREETS.

With reference to the New Streets' Accounts, during the past year, there has been received the sum of £12,149 7s. 7d., on account of Apportionments made. The amounts still due by contributors, are on Old Roads transferred to this Vestry by the late District Board of Works the sum of £370 3s. 6d., and on the Streets taken to by this Vestry during the past two years the sum of £11,419 0s. 7d., making the total due on New Streets to be £11,789 4s. 1d. On page No. 58 will be found a statement of New Streets' Account in detail.

ROADS.

The Roads have received careful attention during the year. Owing to some pressure being exerted to reduce expenditure under the item of granite, it will be seen by the comparison of expenditure that considerably less has been used in 1887, than in 1886, and in my opinion the roads have much deteriorated in condition.

LILLIE ROAD.

I have made special efforts to keep this road in good condition, but the traffic is far too heavy for macadam and it ought to be paved with wood as soon as possible.

In 1886-7 the expenditure was 4,825 cube yards costing £2,374 1s. 7d., the estimate being £2,400; and in 1887-8, 3,080 cube yards at 11s. 4d. and 10s. 8d. a yard, costing £1,694 18s. 2d., or £705 1s. 10d. less than the estimate. In making the estimate for the year 1888-9, the sum of £1,000 only was allowed, at which figure, if continued yearly, it will not be possible to maintain the roads in proper condition.

BROKEN GRANITE.

This has been supplied in accordance with the specification by Messrs. Nowell & Robson. I should be glad if the Vestry would order some broken to pass through a 2in. ring, as it is a better size to use for patching roads.

FLINTS.

During the year 1,335 yards of flints were supplied to the Vestry by Messrs. Wills and Packham, at 3s. 7d. and 3s. 6d. a yard, costing £236 14s. 11d.

HOGGIN, BALLAST AND SAND.

This has cost £494 6s. 0d., and has been obtained from local pits.

WOOD PAVEMENT.

The wood pavement at Walham Green continues to wear well, and has at all times been maintained in good condition.

WOOD PAVING KING'S ROAD.

During the year plans were made for this work, and on the 8th of February, 1887, the Vestry accepted the tender of the Improved Wood Paving Company for paving a portion of this road between Stanley Bridge and Waterford Road.

The area was 4,735 square yards, and the amount of the accepted tender was £1,794, or an average price of nearly 7s. 7d. a yard super.

On the 12th of March I attended with the foreman of the Company and selected about forty of the unemployed of Fulham for the work; others were taken on during the progress of it.

The work was carried out with plain deal blocks laid on 6in. of concrete, and during the progress many improvements were effected in the levels of the pavement and the gradients of the road and the approach to the Bridge.

SIDE WALKS.

During the year constant discussions have arisen in Committees and the Vestry concerning the paving of side walks. I have reported on the subject and have, at my office, a mass of information concerning the different materials at the disposal of members of the Vestry. My last year's report contained a comparative table of prices to which they can refer.

ASPHALTE.

Wheatsheaf Alley was paved with Asphalte in July, 1887. Area, 170 square yards.

TAR-PAVING.

The Vestry having ordered the footpaths on the King's Road adjoining the Eelbrook Common and Parson's Green to be tar-paved, I obtained the necessary apparatus and materials, and carried out the work. It appears satisfactory, and forms a dry and agreeable pavement where there is only a light foot traffic.

Altogether during the two years' existence of this Vestry, fifty apportionments for 8,727 yards, or say five miles of streets, have been sealed, and thirty-three contracts for over three miles of streets have been entered into with contractors. There still remain streets of which a list is given later on in a condition which I characterized

in my last year's report as discreditable and dangerous to the health of the inhabitants, and I again call attention to my remarks on the subject contained in my last year's report.

It will be seen by the above tables that contracts to the amount of £7,642 have been let for making up New Streets and Apportionments made to the extent of £17,800. As the Vestry charge 5 per cent. on the work done, and at least 3 per cent. may be considered to be earned when the street is apportioned, it will be seen that this department has, during the year, earned the sum of £382 2s. and £399 13s. 10d., or a total of £781 13s. 10d.

The Vestry may be congratulated on making a profit out of the work done in the Department of the Surveyor.

APPORTIONMENTS.

A great deal of cry has been raised by a few individuals because of the differences between some of my apportionments and the actual cost of the work.

I beg to state here that the apportionments have all been based on prices actually paid by this Vestry for work done. The discrepancies have been in the prices paid to the contractors; for instance, a street 770 ft. long cost £956 18s. A similar street, 1,190 ft. long, parallel to the first, and made up in a precisely similar manner proportionately should have cost £1,498; it actually cost £949 19s. 1d., or a difference of 55 per cent.

Two precisely similar streets on the Poole Park Estate differ 30 per cent. in price.

The reduction in the later prices paid for work is to a great extent due to my own action after the apportionments were made. I find myself blamed because the apportionment was high, but I do not find myself thanked because the *cost of the work* has been reduced.

The statement that hardship is often caused to contributors by a larger amount than the cost of the work being demanded from them can be met by the Vestry demanding the amount of the apportionment in instalments of 50 per cent and 25 per cent., and the balance, if required, after the completion of the work.

Re ALLOWANCES FOR FLANKS.

On September 21st, 1887, the Vestry decided that—

“In cases where there be no door or way out, one half, and where
“there be a way out, two thirds; the difference to be apportioned on the
“other houses in the same street; and if the end be a shop, then the full
“amount to be charged.”

SEWERS.

The length of main sewers in the parish, that is sewers belonging to the Metropolitan Board, is $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The length of sewers belonging to the Vestry is 4 miles of bricks, and 25 miles, 1,240 yards, of pipe sewers.

In my last year's report I printed on page 103 a full report on the sewers of Fulham, to which I beg to refer those interested, and I especially desire to call attention to Nos. 5, 6, 7, and 8 recommendations in reference to the ventilation of sewers. In all cases, where possible, I have fixed new ventilating manhole covers (weight 5 cwt. 2 qrs. 13lbs) in place of the non-ventilating covers formerly used.

The new Bye-laws for regulating the drainage of houses were adopted by the Vestry on the 11th of May, 1887, and have been extensively circulated during the year; I regret that unless a special inspector is appointed, it is not possible for my department to exercise what I consider the requisite amount of supervision over the drainage of private property.

In December, a builder was fined £5 and costs for making the drains to some houses in the Lillie Road contrary to the Bye-laws of the Vestry.

STREET CLEANSING.

The gang of sweepers in the employ of the Vestry during the year numbered 37.

The Vestry now possesses two sanding machines, one purchased in 1886 and one in October, 1887, and three street sweepers; now that the length of the roads and the wood paving is extending so rapidly the Vestry would find it economical to possess six sweepers and at least two scraping machines. Four new slop carts were ordered in September last.

DUST.

In July, 1886, under the superintendence of the Cartage Committee, I took up the matter of dust collecting, and divided the Parish into twelve districts.

In the following year the control of this matter was entirely removed from the Cartage Committee to the Sanitary Committee, and passed entirely out of my hands.

During the past year the expense of getting rid of the dust has become a serious item. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners stopped the Vestry tipping at the Bishop's Meadow or on the Ranelagh Estate and the Vestry were therefore compelled to barge it away at a cost of 2s. 9d. per load; since then numerous shoots have been utilised at prices varying from 1s. 6d. to 2s. 6d. per load.

Tipping into shoots near houses or near where houses will be built is very objectionable, but I should think it would not be difficult to find some place intended to be retained permanently as a Park or Garden, and in that case I do not think any injury would arise.

I have presented numerous reports on the disposal of the dust during the year, and I reproduce a few extracts concerning the chief schemes.

"The method of dealing with the dust adopted by Mr. Lucas seems to me sanitary and preventive of waste, and is but a development of processes already existing at Paddington, for instance, and elsewhere.

"My impression is that the most economical and final method of dealing with the dust in London will be by a combination of a Sorting Machine for the valuable products (similar to Paddington) and a Destructor for the useless and unsanitary products.

"The process will have to be carried out at a Wharf to allow the different products to be separately barged away.

"Before the Committee decide on any system, I should like to have an opportunity of accompanying them to the Paddington Vestry Wharf, and to Lett's Wharf belonging to the City of London, where the sorting processes are already adopted."

SNOW.

Snow fell on the 19th of February, and the 20th March, 1888, and the following extra men were employed from amongst the "unemployed of Fulham," for clearing snow and keeping the streets clean during the winter months.

The Public Lighting Sub-Committee has continued its sittings during the year, and the Vestry decided to become the owners of the Lamps in the Parish.

Tenders were invited, and in consequence New Lamps were supplied by Messrs. Stevens and Co. at the following prices :—Columns, weighing 2 cwt. 0 qr. 15 lbs., at £1 1s. ; 14in. Lanterns, 9s., and Basket Heads at 2s. 7d. ; total, £1 12s. 7d. a lamp.

It was further decided to offer the Gas Light and Coke Company the sum of £2 each for the 998 Lamps complete belonging to them in the Parish, and on the 8th day of February the offer was accepted; the money to be paid in four instalments, together with 5 per cent. interest on the amount remaining due.

The Gas Light and Coke Company reduced the price of gas to 2s. per 1,000 feet on the 1st January, 1888.

STEAM ROLLER.

On September 5th, 1887, as the Steam Roller was travelling along the Dawes Road it broke through the crown of the road and fell into a cavity about 14 feet long, 10 feet wide by 7 feet deep. It was raised by means of ordinary screw jacks and towed into the yard by another steam roller before 6 p.m. the following day.

The cavity had been caused by the breaking of a connection from a gulley to the main sewer. The repairs necessitated by the accident cost £8 12s. 6d.

STABLES.

During the year I have prepared numerous plans and schemes for stables to be erected on the site in Munster Lane, purchased in June last from the District Railway by the Vestry.

On the 3rd March, 1888, I submitted a complete set of plans of stabling for 44 horses, six loose boxes, &c., and a report shewing that the cost would be £6,000. The last paragraph of my Report was as follows :—

“I shall be glad if the Vestry will come to a decision, as appearances indicate a large rise in prices during the year, and I believe I have already made enough plans and sketches for the Vestry to equal in value a charge of 10 per cent.”

These plans were again sent back for a considerable portion of the loft accommodation and 4 loose boxes to be removed and other minor reductions.

In September I received instructions to commence the drainage of the site in Munster Road. The work cost £184 13s. 9d., and the value of the ballast and sand excavated from the cutting amounted to £197 6s. 4d.

MORTUARY.

During the year various sites were suggested as suitable for a mortuary for this Parish. The Burial Board however settled the question of the site by offering to the Vestry a portion of the cemetery ground fronting the Munster Road.

This site was accepted, and I was directed to prepare plans of a mortuary and various other accompanying rooms, together with a Coroner's Court and residence for caretaker.

These plans, in accordance with these instructions, together with a full report, dated February 18th, 1888, were submitted to the Vestry, and I was further instructed to prepare fresh plans for a building one storey high, omitting the caretaker's residence and mortuary for infectious cases.

FULHAM AND PUTNEY BRIDGE.

On the 8th February, 1888, the approach roads on the Fulham side to this bridge were handed over by the Metropolitan Board to the care of this Vestry.

WHARF.

In my last report I told the members of the Vestry that they could not purchase too large a wharf. The sooner two or three acres are purchased on the riverside the better for economical reasons, as the price of land in the district is steadily rising.

During the year the Vestry purchased the Old Toll House site from the Metropolitan Board in March, 1888, for £1,500.

The present area is 940 square yards, and I have since made the necessary plans and successful application to the Thames Conservators to erect a boundary wall about 40 ft. further out in the river, thereby increasing the area of the wharf to over 1,500 square yards.

The cost of building the river wall, erecting boundary walls and gates, and paving the whole of the wharf with granite cubes will amount to £1,700; of this amount the paving would cost quite £700.

WATERFORD ROAD IMPROVEMENT.

By this scheme it is intended to purchase three houses and stable at the corner of the Waterford Road and the Broxholme Road, to improve the approach from the King's Road to the Broxholme Road by rounding the corner, and throwing 97 square yards at the angle into the road and pathway.

On the 7th May, 1887, I presented a report to the Works Committee estimating the total cost of making the improvement exclusive of compensation to tenants (as I had no particulars of the value of their businesses), after deducting the recoupment to be obtained from the sale of the houses and 317 square yards surplus land to be £3,100.

Negotiations for the completion of this improvement are still in progress.

GUERRIER'S STONE.

This obstruction in the Greyhound Road was purchased and removed, see "Improvements" in April, 1888.

BISHOP'S MEADOW.

This piece of land situate between the Bishop's Palace and the River Thames has an area of 5a. 2r. 9p. 6yds. The frontage to the river and length is 1,475ft. and the average width of the land is 175ft.

Until April, 1887, when the Ecclesiastical Commissioners forbade its further use for the purpose, the Vestry had been using it as a shoot in order to raise the levels.

In May, I made the necessary plans and application and obtained the consent of the Thames Conservancy to an extended line of frontage for the proposed river wall. I have further completed the plans of a river wall and the scheme for laying out the land, and have submitted the plans to and corresponded with the Ecclesiastical Commissioners in order to obtain their sanction to the scheme. On March 8th I received from them a letter stating their final requirements, which were not important, and at once acceded to by the Vestry.

It will now be necessary to submit the plans to the Metropolitan Board and obtain their sanction to the scheme, in order to borrow the amount necessary, about £7,000, to complete the work.

PLAN OF THE DISTRICT.

I have again to call attention to the necessity of possessing a complete and corrected plan of the district, shewing all new streets, buildings, sewers, drains, &c. At present the best plans are the ordnance sheets, twenty years old.

The Hammersmith Vestry retain, under the order of the Secretary of State, the plans of many of the Sewers of the District. Tracings of these could be obtained if the Vestry would arrange with some one for the work. The want of a proper plan of the District, and especially of the Sewers, is the cause of endless trouble and inconvenience.

CHURCH STREET IMPROVEMENT.

The Metropolitan Board have applied to Parliament for powers to carry out this improvement, and I have had to attend at Committees of the House of Commons to give evidence in support of the scheme.

CROMWELL ROAD BRIDGE.

During the year application was made to the Metropolitan Board to carry out this scheme as a local improvement. Owing to some technical difficulty the Board were advised by their Solicitors to refuse the application: it is, however, the intention of the Board to apply to Parliament for fresh powers in order to be able to carry out the improvement.

LURGAN AVENUE.

A plan and report concerning this Avenue has been made with a view to obtaining the sanction of the Metropolitan Board to apportion it as a new street.

MARGRAVINE GARDENS.

I wish to remind the Vestry that this Road is in two Parishes, and that as soon as it is made up arrangements should be made for its maintenance similar to those entered into with the Vestry of Hammersmith for the maintenance of the Hammersmith Road.

LAMMAS RIGHTS COMMITTEE.

On the 8th day of February, 1888, the following report was presented to and unanimously adopted by the Vestry:—

Re IMPERIAL ROAD AND THE GAS COMPANY.

To the Chairman and Members of the Lammas Rights Committee.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

“ At a Meeting of this Committee, held on the 18th instant, I
“ was directed to submit a full Report, setting forth the various matters
“ and interests involved in the question between the Vestry and the Gas
“ Company.

“ The question arises out of the action of the Gas Company in fencing
“ in certain lands in this Parish, abutting on the River Thames, over
“ which a common right to graze cattle exists, during the Autumn and
“ Spring Seasons of the year.

“ There is no doubt that Lammas rights exist over this and a quantity
“ of other land described on the ordnance maps as the ‘Town Meadows,’
“ but as this part of Fulham is no longer used for purposes of agriculture,
“ these rights have ceased to be of great use or importance to the inhabi-
“ tants, and until they are settled, the land must be unproductive and
“ idle. Much of the land lying as it does beside the river is suitable for
“ wharves, and the remainder would no doubt make valuable building
“ land. It is therefore to the interests of the Ratepayers to make an
“ arrangement so that this land can be utilised.

“ Previous to suggesting the lines of an equitable arrangement
“ between the Vestry (as the representatives of the Ratepayers) and
“ the Gas Company, it will be necessary to give particulars of other
“ matters relating to this question.

“ In the year 1879 the Gas Company, with the support of the Vestry,
“ obtained an order to close Sand’s End Lane, the Vestry receiving in
“ consideration of their support the sum of £1,000, the Gas Company also
“ laying out and making the Imperial Road. This amount was paid and
“ invested in Consols in the name of the Vicar and Messrs. F. C. King
“ and W. H. Lammin.

“ The area of the land in question held by the Gas Company over
 “ which Lammas Rights exist is (exclusive of three acres afterwards
 “ referred to) $24\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and I estimate the increase in the value of the
 “ land by the extinction of the rights, to be at least £500 an acre or
 “ £12,250.

“ The Imperial Road (area about three acres) represents a value of say
 “ £3,600, made in accordance with the previously mentioned valuation.

“ It is therefore suggested that in consideration of the Vestry sur-
 “ rendering Imperial Road to the Gas Company, and assisting the
 “ Company to acquire absolute ownership of the $24\frac{1}{2}$ acres named above,
 “ and further, to co-operate with the Company in such way as may to them
 “ seem best for the extinction of the aforesaid Rights, the Gas Company
 “ shall pay to the Vestry the sum of £5,000, and convey to the Vestry
 “ the plot before referred to of three acres of land as shown on plan.

“ It is also further proposed that the Company should widen Bagley's
 “ Lane to 40 feet wherever their property abuts upon it, that the Company
 “ should acquire and give a right of road from the three acres named
 “ above to the Town Mead Road, and further, that all expenses of carry-
 “ ing out this arrangement shall be borne by the Gas Company.

“ It is not necessary for me to enter into any description of the
 “ advantages that will accrue from an arrangement based on the lines
 “ suggested in this Report, at the same time I beg to point out that where
 “ the negotiations include so many issues, there is not much chance of a
 “ satisfactory termination unless both parties are prepared to enter into
 “ them upon a broad give-and-take principle, with a strong determination
 “ to bring them to a satisfactory conclusion.”

Arising out of this Report a libel on myself was inserted in a London evening paper. The paper afterwards inserted apologies on the 9th and 10th of April, and on the 10th and 11th of July; I received, in addition, all the costs of the action I commenced against the editor.

PUBLIC FOOTPATHS IN FULHAM.

Continual efforts to preserve these paths, a full description of which will be found in my last year's report, have been successfully made.

A portion of Church Path between Rylston Road and Lillie Road has, however, been closed; the Vestry having assisted the owners of the adjoining lands to obtain the consent of the Magistrates to this proceeding.

IMPROVEMENTS NORTH END ROAD.

I have made plans and reports concerning a number of suggested improvements in the North End Road.

It would be unadvisable to publish any particulars here. The Vestry has only succeeded in completing arrangements for an improvement at the Corner of North End and Haldane Roads, where Mr. Parker has consented to give up 186 square feet of land to the public footway.

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honour to present you with my Second Annual Report for the Parish of Fulham.

The vital statistics are for the registration year ended 31st December, 1887, and the sanitary statistics for the parochial year ended March 25th, 1888.

The estimated population for the year calculated on the increase in the number of inhabited houses amounts to 78,000.

The sanitary statistics which deal with the parochial year are, as in my former report, considered in two separate districts, the Northern and the Southern.

The area of the parish in statute acres is 1,716 giving a rate of 45·45 inhabitants per acre.

During the year 2,870 births were registered in the parish, viz. :—Males 1,412, and females, 1,458, as against 2,680 in last year, being at the annual rate of 36·79 per 1,000 inhabitants. The annual birth rate throughout the Metropolis was 31·7.

The births registered during the third quarter of the year were the highest, viz., 757, and during the second quarter the lowest, viz., 661.

There were 1,545 deaths registered during the year, viz., males 788, and females 757, as against 1,355 in the previous year. Of these, 220 were of non-parishioners, and 104 deaths of parishioners occurred in public institutions out of the parish. Deducting the deaths of non-parishioners, and adding those of parishioners dying out of the parish, the deaths were equivalent to 18·32 per 1,000. The death rate through-

out the metropolis was 19·6 per 1,000. Of the deaths, 456 were of children under one year, and 300 were of persons of 60 years and upwards.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

Three hundred and sixty deaths were attributed to diseases of this class, being at the rate of 23·3 per cent. of the total number of deaths as against 18·82 per cent. last year. The increase is due to the recent epidemic of scarlet fever, viz. :—

I shall refer to these diseases more fully further on.

One hundred and seven inquests were held during the year ; 43 were certified as from violence. I append a list of inquests marked "C." Three-hundred and fifty-four deaths occurred in public institutions, and eight were registered as uncertified. Of the deaths in public institutions 219 occurred in the Fulham Workhouse, and 135 in the Western Hospital.

The birth rate throughout the metropolis was equal to 31·7 per 1,000, and the death rate 19·6 per 1000. In the three preceding years the death rate was 20·4, 19·8 and 19·9 respectively.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Water Supply of the parish is drawn from the Chelsea Water Works Company and the West Middlesex Water Works Company ; and, according to the report of Dr. Frankland, the Public Analyst for the water supply of the metropolis, it is most satisfactory.

WORK DONE BY SANITARY INSPECTORS.

The accompanying table marked "A" shows the work done by the Sanitary Inspectors in their respective districts, and the distribution of infectious diseases in each district.

During the year an epidemic of scarlet fever occurred in the parish, about which a Special Report was made to the Vestry by me. The epidemic was chiefly confined to the Northern District of the parish, and was considerably increased by the non-notification and want of isolation of cases. I should again strongly recommend the Vestry to support any movement for the compulsory notification of infectious diseases.

In dealing with this question I should call the attention of the Vestry to the valuable services given by Inspector Croucher in the execution of his duties during this epidemic, and strongly recommend him for some recognition of his services.

The following table shows the death rate of the parish for the four quarters of the year ended 31st December, 1887, and of the Metropolitan district for the same periods :—

The above shows that Fulham can favourably compare with the Metropolis at large.

SLAUGHTER-HOUSES, BAKE-HOUSES, AND COW-SHEDS.

Slaughter-Houses—These, nine in number, were personally inspected by me and periodically by the Sanitary Inspectors. On no occasion of my visiting them have I found anything of importance to find fault with, and they have been favourably reported on by your Inspectors.

Bake-Houses—These, 73 in number, have been all personally inspected by me and periodically by your Sanitary Inspectors. They were found satisfactory, and any slight defects were remedied on being cautioned.

Cow-Sheds—These, 15 in number, have all been personally inspected on more than one occasion, and periodically by your Inspectors.

I can only repeat what I said in my former report, that I consider the Cow-sheds in Fulham would bear comparison with any in the Metropolis.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

The following table shows the number of cases of this class reported to your Sanitary Authority from March 26th, 1887, to March 25th, 1888.

SMALLPOX.

Three cases of smallpox occurred in the parish during the year. Two cases were removed to the Hospital, the third case being treated at home.

MEASLES.

One hundred and seventy-four cases were reported during the year, but none were known to your Sanitary Authorities until a death occurred, being another instance of the desirability of Compulsory Notification of Infectious Diseases.

SCARLET FEVER.

A special report has already been made by me and printed on the epidemic of Scarlet Fever, bearing out again the necessity for the Compulsory Notification of Infectious Diseases.

Of the 262 cases of Scarlet Fever reported, 165 were removed to hospital, 12 were not reported until after death, and the others were treated at their own homes.

DIPHTHERIA.

Seventeen deaths occurred from this disease. In two cases the infection was contracted in the country, one in Plymouth, and the other in Hampshire.

The difficulty in dealing with this disease is that there is no hospital to which cases can be removed to; nor is there any ambulance to remove them in to a hospital which will receive such patients. I should strongly support any motion of your Vestry to obtain from the Metropolitan Asylums Board the reception of such cases, and the provision of ambulances.

WHOOPIING COUGH.

Only two cases of this disease were reported before death occurred.

ENTERIC FEVER.

Of the 10 cases of this disease 2 were not reported until after death. Of the remaining eight, seven were removed to hospital.

DIARRHŒA.

All the cases of this disease were of children, and were not reported until after death.

CHOLERA.

Two cases were certified as dying from cholera, more probably choleraic diarrhœa.

PUERPERAL PERITONITIS.

Only one case of death from this cause was reported during the year.

GIPSIES.

The gipsies have given very little trouble during the past year.

SCHOOLS.

The various Public Schools in the parish were inspected during the year, and found satisfactory with one exception, viz., the Harwood Road Board School, where the closets were not in a proper condition. They were, however, remedied.

SUMMONSES.

I append a statement marked "B," shewing all the summonses taken out during the year, with the results.

In conclusion I would beg to call the attention of the Vestry to the able manner in which the Inspectors have discharged their duties in the past year, especially Mr. Croucher during the epidemic of scarlet fever; and would ask the Vestry to take into consideration the question of the appointment of an additional inspector, as, owing to the large increase of inhabited houses, extra duties have been thrown upon them.
