The Members of this Board who retired by effluxion of time in 1890 were Rev. F. H. Fisher, Rev. W. E. Batty, and Mr. E. G. Easton, of whom Rev. F. H. Fisher and Rev. W. E. Batty were re-elected, and Mr. J. Long was elected in the room of Mr. E. G. Easton.

Adulterations were detected in five cases of milk (the proportion of added water being from 10 to 20 per cent.) the Vendors of which were fined by the magistrates; whilst in two cases the milk, though not adulterated, was so poor that the vendors had to be cautioned.

CLERKSHIP TO THE VESTRY.

At the meeting of the Law and Parliamentary Committee held on the 9th September, 1889, Mr. C. J. Foakes tendered his resignation of the post of Clerk to the Vestry, when it was resolved to recommend the Vestry that the resignation be accepted, and that it be a reference to the Law and Parliamentary Committee to arrange for the transfer of books, records, stationery, &c., from Mr. Foakes to Mr. Denselow, who is hereby authorised to officiate as "Acting Clerk to the Vestry," pending further instructions. The above recommendation was unanimously adopted at a special meeting of the Vestry held on the 12th September, 1889, and on the 18th September, the Vestry, on the recommendation of the Law and Parliamentary Committee, resolved that the Treasurer be authorised to honour all cheques countersigned by Mr. W. J. H. Denselow, in lieu of Mr. C. J. Foakes. On the same date it was resolved that a guarantee bond be provided for Mr. Denselow, for the sum of £200, in the Employers' Liability Assurance Corporation, Limited, at the expense of the Vestry. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 30th October, 1889, the Acting Clerk produced his guarantee Bond for £200, duly executed, and the Chairman read letter from the Acting Clerk applying for the appointment of Clerk to the Vestry, which application was referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee. On the 11th November, 1889, the Committee resolved to recommend the Vestry that Mr. W. J. H. Denselow be appointed Clerk to the Vestry, during the pleasure of the Vestry, at a salary of £210 per annum, such increase of salary to commence from the date when he was appointed Acting Clerk (9th September, 1889), and at the meeting of the Vestry on the 13th November, 1889, the Committee's recommendation was carried unanimously, and Mr. Denselow thanked the Vestry for having appointed him.

LAMMAS RIGHTS.

At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 3rd April, 1889, a letter was read from Messrs. Birkett and Horne, stating that the Steward of the Manor of Fulham had written requesting the return of some papers he had lent them, and asking,—before returning the papers,—whether the Vestry desired any further investigation to be made. Resolved, that Messrs. Birkett and Horne be informed that they can return the documents. On the 24th April, 1889, the Clerk read to the Vestry a letter from the London County Council asking for a copy of the report on Lammas Rights, when the letter was referred to the Lammas Rights Committee, who,—on the 13th May, 1889,—Resolved to recommend the Vestry to instruct the Clerk to forward a copy of Mr. Birkett's report to the Parks and Open Spaces Committee of the London County Council, at the same time requesting to be furnished with the views of the Committee on the report, and whether they intended taking any action thereon; which recommendation was carried by the Vestry on the 15th May, 1889. On the 6th June, 1889, the

Lammas Rights Committee appointed Mr. Francis Toovey, Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. Peter Lawson, Vice-Chairman of the Committee; they also instructed the Clerk-(1). To apply to the Hackney Vestry for any papers and information with reference to the Hackney Lammas Lands. (2). To have 500 copies of map, showing the supposed Lammas Lands, lithographed. (3). To make application to the London County Council to receive a deputation from this Vestry with reference to Lammas Rights, and (4). To send to the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association several copies of Mr. Birkett's report, pointing out the doubt as to how far the Vestry have any power to expend money in the matter, and asking whether,-if they think the case a good one, -- they would be prepared to make a grant to assist in the commencement of the necessary litigation; all of which instructions were confirmed by the Vestry on the 12th June, 1889. On the 5th July, 1889, the deputation appointed by the Vestry waited on the London County Council, and presented the memorial from the Vestry praying the Council to take the necessary steps to carry out and assert the Lammas Rights. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 7th August. 1889, the Clerk was instructed to write the Ecclesiastical Commissioners asking them to give facilities to the Vestry to obtain a list of the copyholders of this parish, and the Surveyor was instructed to inform the Tenant of the Laundry, by Miss Sulivan's, that the strip of land in front of the Laundry adjoining the footpath belongs to the Vestry, and that he (the Surveyor) call upon such Tenant to pay 1s. per year as a quit rent, he to hold the land during the pleasure of the Vestry. At the same meeting the Clerk was instructed to write to the Metropolitan Asylums Board asking if they would kindly inform the Committee if the Board bought the land at the West Wharf, Town Mead Road, subject to Lammas Rights; and a motion "that the Vestry's horses parade on Lammas day, and be taken over the "the Lammas Lands," was put, and lost, on a division, 9 voting for, and 25 against. The Lammas Rights Committee reported, on the 2nd October, 1889, that they had instructed the Acting Clerk to write to the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association, thanking them for their offer of a grant of £200 towards the cost of trying the Lammas Rights, provided the Vestry took the matter up within one year from the date of their letter, and, in reply, to inform them that the Vestry have petitioned the London County Council on the matter; also to write to the Solicitor to the Metropolitan Asylums Board forwarding copy of the letter from Messrs. Robinson and Hilder, dated 7th December, 1875, to Mr. R. H. Lukin, late Vestry Clerk, re Lammas Rights; and that affidavits had been filed in the High Court of Justice, between Messrs. Tod Heatley, Lowenfeld, and others, Plaintiffs, and Messrs. Richard Bull, William Russell, John Coxall, and others (copies of which have been seen by the Committee), by which both parties have been restrained from further action until after trial of case, and that the Committee highly commend the conduct of the Defendants for their valuable and important service to the Parish.

The Chairman of the Law and Parliamentary Committee, reported at the Vestry on the 13th November, 1889, that the Committee had brought under their notice some building plans of a Brewery proposed to be erected on Lammas Land, and that they had referred same to the Works Committee and the Lammas Rights Committee with an intimation to each Committee that if they intended to recommend the Vestry to vindicate Lammas Rights they must do so at once. On the 11th December, 1889, the Lammas Rights Committee informed the Vestry that they (the Committee) had disapproved the plans for the drainage of the proposed Brewery in Town Mead Road, and that they had instructed the Clerk to inform the London County Council, that the Vestry had before them plans of a large Brewery proposed to be erected on land believed to be subject to Lammas Rights, and that it was desirable that the Council's opinion should be given as early as possible to assist the Vestry. The London County Council wrote on the 5th February, 1890, stating that the Parks and Open Spaces Committee were considering what steps can be taken to secure the Town Meads for the public use. On the 19th February, 1890, the Vestry resolved that a Memorial be prepared and delivered to the London County Council, praying that the Council will take up the question of securing and maintaining the Lammas Lands of Fulham, as an open space for the people, and that so soon as the Memorial be signed and ready for delivery, a letter be written to each of the members of the London County Council, desiring their support to the claim of the people to their just rights, and enclosing a copy of Mr. Birkett's report together with a plan; and further, that the Law and Parliamentary and Lammas Rights Committees, be requested to enquire into the various Rights of the Copyholders of the Manor of Fulham, and report to the Vestry whether any compensation could be claimed by them, in the event of the Town Meadows being secured as an open space, and on the 5th March, 1890, the Law and Parliamentary Committee reported to the Vestry that they were of opinion that if the Copyholders of the Manor, established their claim to the Lammas Rights, they would have a claim for compensation in event of the land being subsequently converted into an open space, and the Vestry sealed the Memorial to the London County Council ordered on the 5th February.

BISHOP'S MEADOW.

On the 29th May, 1889, the Works Committee reported to the Vestry that they had instructed the Surveyor to apply to the London County Council, to carry out works in connection with the laying out of the Bishops Meadow, and the Meadow adjoining as an open space, and the Surveyor stated he had attended at the London County Council thereon, and that a Committee of the Council would view. The Vestry on the 26th June, 1889, instructed the Clerk to write to the London County Council requesting them to receive a deputation as to their taking over and maintaining the Bishops Meadow, &c., as an open space, and on the 5th July, 1889, the

deputation waited on the London County Council and presented a Memorial praying the Council to take over the Bishop's Meadow and the West Meadow, and to cause the same to be made up as a Public Recreation Ground, as soon as possible. On the 10th July, 1889, the Surveyor informed the Vestry he had received a letter from Messrs. Clutton with reference to the acquisition by the Vestry, of the lodge and strip of land and trees in Bishop's Avenue bounding on the West Meadow, and the letter was referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee, who, on the 22nd July, 1889, ordered the matter to stand over, pending result of application to the London County Council re Bishop's and West Meadows. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 24th July, 1889, the following report of the Works &c., Committee was received and adopted, viz:—

That having considered the letter from Messrs. Clutton stating that they would recommend their clients to surrender the lodge at the end of the Bishop's Avenue, and also the strip of land marked pink on plan, between the avenue and the West Meadow, if the Vestry were willing to pay the sum of £500 for the purpose of building a new lodge inside the Bishop's Grounds, they have instructed the Clerk to inform Messrs. Clutton, that the Vestry prefer not to take any action in the matter until their application to the London County Council for a contribution towards the making and laying out of the Bishop's and West Meadows has been dealt with.

Carried.

VESTRY HALL AND OFFICES.

Messrs. Tippett and Son having written, claiming £300 in respect of ancient lights, the Vestry on the 3rd April, 1889, resolved to adhere to their previous resolution. On the the 15th May, 1889, the Vestry drew a cheque for £200 the amount to be paid into Court in the case of Jackson vthe Vestry re ancient lights, as per draft defence settled by Mr. Macaskie; and also authorised the Architect, in accordance with the terms of specification, to instruct Mr. Wall to carry out the work in connection with the lighting and heating, at the respective sums of £117, and £813, and Messrs. Shand, Mason and Co., to provide the fire hydrants at a cost of £195, provision for which is made in Mr. Wall's Contract. The Law and Parliamentary Committee, reported to the Vestry on the 10th July, 1889, that they had received a report from the Solicitor, stating, that in the case of Jackson v. the Vestry, the plaintiffs have accepted the sums of £150, and £50 paid into Court in satisfaction of their claim, and that he (the Solicitor), had accordingly made application to the Court, that the Vestry be allowed the costs as between party and party. On the 7th August, 1889, the Town Hall Committee reported to the Vestry, (1) that they had ordered the letters from Mr. Tucker, re alleged damage to the walls of Mr. Roper's hair-cutting

saloon, to lie on the table; (2) that they had adjourned the question of the telephone for the present; and (3) that they repudiate all liability in the matter of ancient lights, re 10 and 12, Cedar Road; which report was adopted by the Vestry. On the 2nd October, 1889, the Vestry authorised the acting Clerk to invite tenders from various firms for supplying a clock for the Town Hall, and sealed the agreements, with the Chelsea Water Works Company, for the general water supply (by meter) at the Town Hall, and for the supply of the eleven fire hydrants at £1 1s. each per annum, and they empowered the Architect to have the columns and pilasters of the large hall rendered with scagliola (imitation marble), instead of Keene's cement. The Vestry, also, on the 16th October, 1889, instructed the Architect to prepare a sketch of the tablet to be erected in the large hall, in accordance with the resolution of the Vestry, of the 14th November, 1888, and on the same day they instructed the Solicitor, to prepare a Memorial for presentation to the Local Government Board, giving the history of the whole matter in connection with the Town Hall, and asking the Board to lend the Vestry the sum of £10,000, in respect of the Vestry room and Overseers' offices. A motion to rescind the resolution of the Vestry of the 14th November, 1888, re the tablet, was, at a special meeting of the Vestry, held on the 30th October, 1889, lost, only 7 members voting for it, and at another special meeting held on the 13th November, 1889, a motion to rescind the resolution of the Vestry of the 14th November, 1888, so far as it referred to the names to be placed on the Tablet, and to substitute in lieu thereof, "that the names on the tablet to be placed in the Vestry Hall, be restricted to the names and official designations of the Chairman of the Vestry, the Chairman of the Town Hall Committee, and the Architect and Builder," was lost, only 6 members voting for it. On the recommendation of the Town Hall Committee, the Vestry, on the 13th November, 1889, instructed the Solicitor to prepare a Memorial to the London County Council, setting forth fully the position of the Vestry with reference to the Town Hall, and asking them to sanction the borrowing, by, and to lend, the Vestry the sum of £10,000; and also referred the notice of action by Mr. Chas. Tough, in respect to Nos. 10 and 12, Cedar Road, with reference to light and air, to the Town Hall and Law and Parliamentary Committees. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 11th December, 1889, the following report was received from the Law and Parliamentary Committee,

That having considered the following report from the Solicitor, viz. :-

JACKSON AND OTHERS v. FULHAM VESTRY AND WALL.

Upon the hearing of the Summons issued on behalf of the defendants that the plaintiffs might be ordered to pay the costs of this action, the plaintiffs, by their Counsel, stated that they did not understand the ninth paragraph of defendant's statement of defence, and thereupon

applied to withdraw the notice of acceptance of the £200 paid into Court which they had given. Mr. Justice Chitty accordingly made no order on the Summons except that the costs of the Summons be reserved to be dealt with on the trial of the action, unless the action was discontinued, in which case the costs are to be the cost in the cause,

they have instructed the Solicitor to report at the next Meeting.

and, at the same meeting, the memorial to the London County Council, prepared by the Solicitor, applying for a further loan of £15,000 in respect of the Town Hall, was approved by the Vestry, and the Town Hall Committee was instructed to advertise for a striking clock for the Town Hall. The Law and Parliamentary Committee reported to the Vestry, on the 8th January, 1890, as follows:—

Jackson and others v. Fulham Vestry and others.

I have to report that Messrs. Tippett & Son have given me notice that it is their intention to issue a summons asking for an order that the Vestry's costs may be taxed as between party and party, and thereupon the same may be paid out of the money which has been paid into Court, and that the balance (if any) may be paid to the plaintiffs in satisfaction of their claim against the Vestry, and that all further proceedings against the Vestry and Mr. Wall may be stayed.

That, upon the recommendation of the Solicitor, they have instructed the Surveyor to put a post in the pavement adjoining the flank to No. 555, Fulham Road.

and on the same day the Town Hall Committee reported that they had passed a certificate for £2000 in favor of Mr. C. Wall, and had referred same to the Finance Committee for payment. The resolution of the Vestry of the 11th December, 1889, authorising the advertising for tenders for a striking clock, was rescinded at a special meeting of the Vestry held on the 22nd January, 1890, and, at the same meeting, the petition to the London County Council, as drawn by the Solicitor, and approved by the Vestry on the 11th December, 1889, was sealed. On the 5th February, 1890, the Clerk produced a writ, which had been served upon him with reference to action taken with regard to ancient lights, 10 and 12, Cedar Road, and the same was referred to the Solicitor to attend to. A certificate for £2000, in favor of Mr. Wall, was passed, and a cheque drawn for same on the 19th February, 1890; and, on the 5th March, 1890, a further certificate for £2000, in favor of Mr. Wall, was passed, and a cheque drawn

for the amount. At the last-mentioned meeting, the offer of Mr. S. W. Seaton to repair the party wall to the satisfaction of the District Surveyor, upon the Vestry paying £4 towards the cost, was accepted, subject to the work being carried out to the satisfaction of the Surveyor. A cheque for £300 further, on account of his commission, was drawn in favor of the Architect, on the 19th March, 1890, and on the same day the rooms for the various departments in the Town Hall were allocated as marked on the plan. The Vestry agreed to take up the loan of £2800 offered by the London County Council, for 30 years, at 31 per cent. interest, and they directed application to be made to the London County Council for their sanction to this Vestry borrowing the balance required for the Town Hall-viz., £10,307-in order to prevent the serious injustice to ratepayers which would be caused by the Vestry being compelled to make a rate for the amount required. Later on in the meeting, Mr. Germaine attended, and explained what had taken place with reference to the Vestry's application for a loan of £13,107, and stated that Lord Lingen, the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Council, had promised to use his influence in support of the Vestry if an application were made for permission to borrow the sum required, and a resolution was unanimously carried thanking Messrs. Germaine and Beal for the action they had taken in reference to this matter.

MORTUARY.

At the meeting of the Vestry, held on the 3rd April, 1889, the seal of the Vestry was affixed to the deed of conveyance and memorial re the Mortuary, and the matter was referred to the Works Committee to carry out. On the 24th April, 1889, the Vestry, on the recommendation of the Works Committee, authorised the Surveyor to place some piers in the walls of Mortuary, as required by Mr. Moseley, at a cost not exceeding £10; and on the 8th May, 1889, the Vestry resolved that application be made to the London County Council for a loan of £1020 on account of the Mortuary, to be spread over 30 years. A cheque for £100 in favor of Mr. Cox, re the building the Mortuary, was drawn on 29th May, 1889, and on the 7th August, 1889, the Finance Committee reported that a policy for £1000 on the Mortuary building had been taken out by the contractor. The Vestry, on the 16th October, 1889, authorised the Acting Clerk to sign the contract with the Gas Light and Coke Company for the supply of gas to the Mortuary, subject to the builder agreeing to pay for any gas he may use; and on the 13th November, 1889, the Vestry resolved to obtain the co-operation of the Vestries and District Boards in the Metropolis in petitioning the Local Government Board to procure parliamentary powers to apply the Public Health Act, 1875, so far as it relates to mortuaries, to the Metropolis, and the Solicitor was instructed to draw up the Vestry's

petition; and the Vestry also instructed the Surveyor to obtain an estimate for supplying the furniture, &c., proposed to be provided for the Mortuary. The petition to the Local Government Board alluded to above was sealed by the Vestry on the 27th November, 1889. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 11th December, 1889, the Works Committee presented a report stating they had considered various tenders for the furniture, &c., required at the Mortuary, and the same was ordered to be referred back for tenders to be invited from local furniture dealers; and the Clerk was directed to write to the Burial Board asking if they had any objection to the Vestry employing Mr. Neal as Caretaker at the Mortuary, at 5s. per week. On the 8th January, 1890, the Works Committee recommended certain tenders, for the supply of furniture, &c., to Mortuary, for acceptance by the Vestry, and the same were agreed to by the Vestry; and at the same meeting the Clerk having reported that the Burial Board had declined to allow any of their servants to act as Caretaker for the Mortuary, the Vestry, as a temporary arrangement, resolved that the Police be asked to take care of a duplicate key at the North Fulham Police Station. On the recommendation of the Works Committee, the Surveyor was, on the 19th March, 1890, instructed to obtain certain articles required for use at the Mortuary.

FOOTPATH, TOWN MEAD ROAD.

On the 10th July, 1889, the Vestry resolved that a letter be written to Mr. Cole calling upon him to carry out, within one month, the resolution of the Vestry requiring him to restore the footpath in Town Mead Road to its original position; and, so soon as Mr. Cole has done the work, the Surveyor do restore the boundary stones to their former places. The Surveyor, on the 18th September, 1889, having reported to the Vestry that Mr. Cole had restored the footpath in Town Mead Road, and that the boundary stones had been put down, the question of erecting an efficient fence, at a cost not exceeding £5, to protect the Vestry's rights by preventing horses and carts drawing over the footpath, was ordered to be referred to the Lammas Rights Committee to view, which was done on the 9th October, 1889, when they resolved to recommend the Vestry to call upon Mr. Cole to remove at once the earth, stones, &c., which he had deposited in and upon the old watercourse, abutting upon the Vestry's footpath leading from Town Mead Road, and to restore the watercourse to its original state, which recommendation was adopted by the Vestry on the 16th October, 1889. The Law and Parliamentary Committee having had the matter brought under their notice, ordered Counsel's opinion to be taken on the question, at a cost not exceeding £3 5s. 6d., which action was sanctioned by the Vestry on the 27th November, 1889, and on the 8th January, 1890, the report of the Solicitor re the above was received at the Vestry, and ordered to be referred to the Lammas Rights Committee.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the year, the Vestry had under consideration the question of the Water Supply in the Parish, and the Clerk was directed to communicate with the Water Companies, and ascertain, if possible, what streets were supplied with a constant supply and what with an intermittent supply, and the following information is the result of his enquiries, viz.:—

SPECIAL ENQUIRY RE RATES DEPARTMENT.

At the meeting of the Vestry, held on the 24th April, 1889; Mr. Cornwall, as Chairman of the Special Committee, presented and read the Petition proposed to be presented to the Local Government Board hereon, and,

after a long discussion, and the Petition being slightly amended, it was resolved that the Petition do stand for sealing at the next ordinary meeting of the Vestry, which was done on the 8th May, 1889. On the 24th July, 1889, the Chairman read a letter which he had received from the Local Government Board, forwarding the Vestry Clerk's replies to the enquiries re the Petition, and the same was referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee (with the addition of Messrs. Goodwin and Dyer) for consideration. On the 12th September, 1889, the following report was presented to the Vestry by the Special Committee, and was adopted:—

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER LETTER FROM THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD, WITH VESTRY CLERK'S REPLIES TO QUERIES.

Stating-

1st.—That the following Petition, with appended documents marked A and B, was sent to the Local Government Board on the 11th May, 1889:—

UNTO THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR ENGLAND AND WALES.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THE VESTRY OF THE PARISH OF FULHAM, IN THE COUNTY OF LONDON, UNDER THEIR COMMON SEAL.

Sheweth,

1. That the Statements made in the Vestry assembled (a copy of which is hereto appended marked A) that the Shillings received for summonses issued was appropriated in the following manner, about one-third for expenses, one-third to the Collector in whose district the amount was collected, and one-third to the Vestry Clerk, have not, we are informed, any foundation in fact, one Collector states that he has not shared for seven years, another that he has not shared for three years, another that he has not shared for two years, and two Collectors state that they have not shared in the Shillings.

The Vestry have been unable to obtain any account from the Vestry Clerk as to the disbursement of these amounts prior to 1887. In February, 1887, the Overseers instructed the Vestry Clerk to pay all surplus moneys from the Shillings into the Overseers' account at the Bank, and in accordance therewith the sum of £55 was so paid in, but we find that a Rate Collector 2 years ago paid over a cheque, value £50, to the Vestry Clerk, which cheque was not presented, and no further money was paid into the Overseers' account at Bank until March in the present year, when by a resolution of this Vestry a Committee was appointed to draw up this Petition to your Honorable Board.

- 2. That clerical assistance which should have been provided by the Assistant Overseer, at his own expense, according to the terms of his appointment, and which has cost at least £200 a year, has been paid out of the Overseers' Petty Cash, and charged solely to the Local Rates, whilst a great portion of such clerical assistance is given to matters relative to the Poors Rate. We further find that although under the terms of his appointment it is clearly defined he should give his whole time to the duties of this office, he has accepted other appointments of profit, which clash. Consequently, he is unable to properly attend to the duties devolving upon him as Assistant Overseer and Vestry Clerk.
- 3. That the Supplemental Lists last year were not sent to the Assessment Committee within the time specified by the Valuation (Metropolis) Act, and that the correspondence between the Assessment Committee and the Overseers (hereto appended marked B) respecting the delay was withheld from them by the Vestry Clerk, and consequently placed the Parish in a very serious position.
- 4. That the Assessment of a late Churchwarden was raised last year in the Rate Book and Provisional List, in order to qualify him for a Vestryman, and the increase afterwards omitted from the Supplemental List contrary to the Valuation (Metropolis) Act, 32 & 33 Vict., cap. 67, section 46, sub-section 1.
- 5. That the Vestry Clerk absented himself from his duties two days assisting at the County Council Election in a neighbouring Parish, and denied the same when questioned by the Vestry in Vestry assembled.
- 6. That the Vestry Clerk, while he is a highly paid official, has broken the terms of his appointment for some years past, and your Petitioners are unable to obtain satisfactory information as to the other offices held by him, and his emoluments and perquisites attached thereto. The Vestry Clerk was appointed by the Vestry on November 14th, 1877, to perform all the duties enumerated in the Vestry Clerk's Act, 13 and 14 Vic., Cap. 57, and in an Order of the Poor Law Board, dated the 11th of June 1870; on February 19th, 1878, he was appointed Assistant Overseer under the provisions of the Poor Law Amendment Act, 59 George III., Cap. 12, section 7; the terms of these appointments being that he should devote his whole time to perform all the duties of the offices, except the collection of Rates, and not accept any other appointment, and to obtain such assistance as he may require at his own cost, subject to the approval of the Vestry.

Your Petitioners humbly pray that your Board will institute an inquiry into the alleged irregularities in the Rates Department of this Vestry, and the neglect of duties of the Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer.

EXTRACTS FROM MINUTES ON SUBJECT OF DELAY IN SENDING PROVISIONAL AND SUPPLEMENTAL LISTS BY PARISH OFFICERS OF PARISH.

DATE OF MEETING.

24 Sept., 1888. Read letters from the Vestry Clerk of the Parish of Fulham, stating that in consequence of pressure of work he has not been able to furnish the Supplemental List for that Parish, but expressing the hope that the same will be ready by the end of the present week.

Resolved unanimously-

That the attention of the Overseers of Fulham be called to the importance of their delivering the Supplemental Valuation List to the Committee with the least possible delay, and to the serious responsibility which devolves upon the Parish in the event of insufficient time being left to the Committee for the giving of the legal notices and the hearing of objections to the List before the 31st proximo.

Fulham, stating that in consequence of pressure of business he is unable to attend the Meeting of the Committee this morning, and that he hopes to complete the Supplemental Valuation List this week.

Resolved unanimously-

That this Meeting at its rising be adjourned to Thursday, 25th instant, at 12 o'clock (noon), and that a special request be addressed to the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Parish of Fulham to meet and confer with the Committee on the subject of liability of advertising on Hoardings to parochial rating, and the position in which the Parish is placed by reason of the non-deposit of the Supplemental Valuation List for the current year.

Churchwarden, Goodacre, Howland, and Baxter, Overseers, C. J. Foakes, Vestry Clerk, and J. G. Hall, Assessing Surveyor of the Parish of Fulham, and discussed with them the question of the Valuation of the several Advertising Hoardings inserted by the Overseers in the 15th Provisional List for Fulham Parish, and also the question of the non-delivering to the Committee of the Supplemental Valuation List for that Parish.

With regard to the delay in the sending in of the Supplemental Valuation List for the Parish of Fulham, a long discussion took place between the Committee and the Parish Officers, who expressed their regret that the List had not been delivered to the Committee within the stipulated time, and promised that this year's List should be sent in at once, and that in future there should be no cause for similar complaint.

30 Oct. 1888. Read letter from the Vestry Clerk of the Parish of Fulham, forwarding a Supplemental Valuation List for that Parish, in duplicate, dated the 11th instant.

The Clerk submitted the said List, received from the Overseers on the 29th instant.

Resolved unanimously-

That the Supplemental List for the Parish of Fulham be considered, and objections (if any) thereto heard at a Meeting of this Committee to be held on Tuesday, the 13th proximo, at 12 o'clock (noon).

ember, 1888. Letter read from the Local Government Board, dated 7th November, 1888, stating that the Board learn from Mr. Jebb, Clerk to the Managers of the Metropolitan Asylum District, that the Assessment Committee of this Union have failed to furnish him with the Supplemental Valuation List as required by the Valuation (Metropolis) Act, 1869, and requesting that the List in question may be transmitted without further delay, or that the Board may be informed why it cannot be sent.

Resolved unanimously—

That it be referred to a Sub-Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Dell, Mr. Schofield, and Captain Berkeley, to prepare a reply to the Local Government Board's letter, and to submit the same to this Committee at their Meeting to be held on Thursday next.

Meeting, the Clerk submitted their draft reply to the communication received from the Local Government Board, on the subject of the non-transmission of the Supplemental Valuation List for the Parish Fulham to the Clerk to the Managers of the Metropolitan Asylum District.

That the proposed reply be adopted by this Committee and transmitted to the Local Government Board.

7 Februry, 1889. The Clerk having reported the receipt of a large number of requisitions for re-valuation, from Ratepayers of the Parish of Fulham, since the last Provisional List was sent in on the 7th December, 1888,

That the attention of the Overseers of Fulham be called to the matter, and that they be requested to transmit a Provisional List to the Committee on as early a day as possible.

Parish of Fulham, Walham Green, S.W.

My Lords and Gentlemen, 8th July, 1889.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th May, 1889, enclosing copy of a petition from the Vestry of Fulham, for an inquiry respecting my proceedings as Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer, and requesting my observations thereon.

In reply thereto I beg to make the following statements on the various allegations contained in such petition:-

No. 1 .-- As regards the Shillings received for Summonses.

Up to and including the rates made April, 1882, the amounts received, after deducting expenses for printing, &c., were divided between the Collectors and myself, in accordance with the minutes of the Overseers' meeting.

From the rates, April, 1882, to February, 1887, the Collectors paid me various sums which they had received on account of summonses, and I paid thereout expenses of service, printing, &c.; but they have never rendered me an account of the total that they received during that time, and they now inform me that they cannot; and I have made search for the vouchers of moneys that I paid, but cannot find them, so that no account can be rendered for that period.

Since February, 1887, a sum of £219 9s. 11d. has been paid into the London and Provincial Bank, to the account of the Overseers, on account of moneys received from summonses (including a cheque of £55 3s. 2d. from one of the Collectors—not £50 as stated in the petition), out of which sum I have received nothing.

No. 2. - Clerical Assistance.

On the 19th February, 1878, the Vestry passed the following resolution:-

"That Mr. Charles James Foakes be appointed Assistant Overseer

"Geo. III., c. 12, s. 7, at a salary of £150 per annum, to discharge all

"the duties of the Overseers of the Poor, or appertaining to the office

"of Overseer of the Poor, under the Act 18 and 19 Victoria, cap. 120

"-except the collection of rates-and that he be empowered to

"obtain such assistance as he may require at his own cost, subject to

"the approval of the Vestry."

At that time the rateable value of the parish was £133,955, and the number of houses 4,925; at the present time the rateable value is £386,151, and the number of houses 12,428.

On the 17th February, 1881, the Overseers, in consequence of the additional number of houses, appointed a clerk at a salary not exceeding

35s. a week, to be paid out of the local rates.

Additional assistance was also furnished as the work increased; but I personally paid out of my salary the salary of the Junior Clerk up to December, 1883.

I have made a request to the Law and Parliamentary Committee of the Vestry to alter the terms of my appointment as Assistant Overseer in

consequence of the great increase in the Parish.

The increase of work in the parish applies equally to poor as to local rates, and there has also been an increase of work in consequence of a Library Rate having been made for the last 18 months.

For the increased responsibility and duties I have received in eleven years an increase of £50 per annum, granted by the Local Government Board by letter, dated 14th August, 1882 (77,309), from March, 1881.

The only other public appointment that I hold is Returning Officer for the Borough of Fulham and Clerk to the Vestry—an adjunct to the Vestry

clerkship.

No. 3.—Supplemental Valuation Lists, 1888-9.

A delay occurred in the delivery thereof, which was reported to the Local Government Board by the Metropolitan Asylums Board. No injury whatever was experienced by the Parish, as it was really a copy of previous Provisional Lists.

No. 4.—As to the Assessment of a late Churchwarden.

A late Churchwarden expressed a wish to have the assessment on his house increased at April, 1888, from gross value £25, rateable value £28, to gross value £31, rateable value £25, and although there had been no structural alterations in the property this was done, and he has paid 2 half-year's rates thereon. It was omitted from the subsequent supplemental list, as the increase could not have been substantiated if appealed against.

No. 5.—Absence of Myself on Two Days.

On the days of polling and counting of votes at the recent County Council Election, as I had not been appointed Deputy Returning Officer for the Borough—although the Returning Officer for the Parliamentary Borough—I assisted the Returning Officer of the Borough of Kensington; but on the day of polling I had my letters brought to me, and left instructions where I could be found if wanted; and on the second day I attended at the office before it was opened to open all letters and give instructions thereon; and one of my clerks came to me in the after part of the day, so that I consider that I was not absent for two days.

No. 6.—I have not taken any other appointment outside the parish except the two days above mentioned, but have given my whole time to the services thereto, and have at all times endeavoured to perform my duties faithfully and as efficiently as I could in the interests of it.

I have held the offices for over eleven years, and I respectfully trust that your Honourable Board will take into your favourable consideration the observations which I have made on the charges made against me.

Recommending-

That the following observations, with appended documents marked "C," be sent to the Local Government Board, in reply to their letter of the 23rd July, 1889:—

We have the honour to reply to your Honourable Board's communication of 23rd July, 1889 (62,081), forwarding Mr. C. J. Foakes, the Vestry Clerk's reply to the allegations of the Vestry, dated 11th May, 1889.

We note that three letters, viz.:—27th May, 18th June, and 3rd July, were addressed by your Honourable Board to him, calling for his observations on the subject of the petition, before his letter of the 8th July was received by your Board. We now reply ad-seriatim to the Vestry Clerk's observations. The allegation of the Vestry was that they could not obtain satisfactory information from the Vestry Clerk regarding the shillings received for summonses, and we submit that his observations to your Honourable Board, although more complete than we were able to obtain from him, in no way give a satisfactory solution of the question raised.

*The minute of the overseers' meeting referred to by him, only shews that they sanctioned his participation in one distribution, and not the whole amount prior to 1882 as might be inferred from his statement. We, however, submit that the Overseers had no power to distribute these amounts in this manner, and that it was the duty of the Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer to have so informed them.

The Vestry Clerk's observation regarding the amounts received from 1882 to 1887 particularly calls for investigation, as he admitted having received various sums and paid certain expenses therefrom, yet he does not state what has become of the large balance which accrued in his hands during this long period, and even now fails to produce vouchers for the amounts received and paid, which shows great neglect of duty in a matter which has agitated the minds of the Vestry and the Ratepayers. For many years, moreover, the Rate Collectors have stated before our Committee that they have always paid the whole of these shillings to the Vestry Clerk, and have rendered a balance sheet about two years ago, covering the period between 1882 and 1887, and which was accepted by the Overseers.

In response to the assertion that since February, 1887, £219 9s. 11d. had been paid into the Bank, we draw your attention to the second paragraph of our petition, which sets forth that in 1887, £55 only was paid into the Bank. The Vestry Clerk now states that a sum of £219 9s. 11d. has been paid into Bank since that date, which really means that the difference, viz., £164 9s. 11d. was in the Vestry Clerk's possession until March in the present year, and was only paid in after the Vestry had appointed a Committee to draw up the petition already before your Honorable Board.

Summonsing Money Accounts.

The Vestry Clerk submitted these Accounts for the Rates made April, 1881; November, 1881; and April, 1882; and reported that after payment of expenses and a gratuity of £5 on each Rate to the late Beadle, Charles Griffin, senior, the balances were:—

April, 1881 £22 19 6

November, 1881 33 14 10

April, 1882 31 17 3

It was proposed by Mr. Glen, seconded by Dr. Egan, that the Vestry Clerk have one half thereof, and the remainder divided pro rata according to the sums paid in by them to the Collectors.

In reply to the Vestry Clerk's observation No. 2, we would again invite your attention to the express terms of his appointment, by which any clerical assistance obtained was to be paid for by him out of his income, the persons to be employed having moreover to be approved by the Vestry. His statement that he made application to the Law and Parliamentary Committee for an alteration in the terms of his appointment might be imagined to mean that he did this at the time when he began to employ clerical assistants at the Public expense, whereas as a matter of fact he only made the said application as recently as 8th July, 1889. About £200 a year had meanwhile been paid for clerical assistance, out of what is known in the Parish books as "Petty Cash," in contravention of the terms of his appointment and without an express resolution of the Vestry. Further, no explanation of the terms of his appointment and of the Acts controlling the same was made to the Auditors under the Metropolis Local Management Acts, which we hold to have been his duty to represent to them. In response to his statement that there has been a large increase of duties without increase of salary, we may state the Vestry never received any application for such increase.

His statement that he was appointed on the 19th February, 1878, Assistant Overseer at £150 per annum, and that he received in 1882 an increase of £50 per annum, might convey the impression that after 1882 £200 was his annual income, whereas the fact is that in addition to the £200 as Assistant Overseer, he has received from Christmas 1877, an annual salary of £250, which was increased on 10th September, 1887, to £380 as Vestry Clerk, making a total for these two offices of £580 per annum. We therefore submit to your Honourable Board that according to the terms of his appointment, he should have devoted the whole of his time to these offices and performed all the duties appertaining to them, except the collection of rates. Instead of which others have been engaged in the work of this department at the public expense, while he has undertaken the duties of Borough Returning Officer, School Board Deputy Returning Officer, and other offices, with emoluments and perquisites attached thereto, a full return of which we have been unable to obtain, and which his reply to your Honourable Board fails to afford; he is besides Clerk to the Vestry. We must entirely repudiate the implication raised by his observation No. 6, viz., that the terms of his appointment admitted of his taking up other offices, provided that these were not "outside the Parish."

In response to his statement No. 3, we specially pray that this should be enquired into by your Honourable Board, the rather as a similar direliction of duty has again occurred this year; the Provisional and Supplemental Lists are not being sent to the Fulham Union Assessment Committee, within the time prescribed by the Valuation (Metropolis) Act. In order to obviate the serious results that might arise in consequence of this neglect of duty, the Guardians have this year appointed another person to furnish them with the Provisional and Supplemental Lists, and have notified their intention to charge the Fulham Parish with the cost thereof.

A further allegation in our petition is that the correspondence from the Assessment Committee to the Overseers respecting the delay which occurred last year, was withheld from the Overseers by the Vestry Clerk. It will be noticed that even now he has offered no explanation to your Honourable Board as to that neglect of duty; but in the face of these charges, he has again withheld from the Overseers the correspondence relative to this year's delay. We would point out to your Honourable Board the serious nature of this matter, and we append herewith, marked C, copy of correspondence and resolutions of Overseers and Guardians concerning the preparation of the Provisional and Supplemental Lists for 1889.

With regard to his observation No. 4, we would point out to your Honourable Board that it is simply a confession of the truth of the charge made by us of a breach of the Valuation (Metropolis) Act in order to qualify a certain Ratepayer to stand as a candidate for the Vestry, and we submit that it was a colourable transaction deserving the penal exercise of your

powers.

In regard to observation No. 5, we submit that considering the terms of his appointment, he has given no satisfactory explanation why he accepted duties not attached to his official position, or why he should have informed the Vestry that he was not absent from his duties on those occasions.

In reply to observation No. 6, we state that he has accepted other duties beyond those defined in his appointment as Assistant Overseer and Vestry Clerk, without the sanction of the Vestry. Your petitioners again humbly pray that your Honourable Board will institute an inquiry into these alleged irregularities in the Rates Department of this Vestry, and the neglect of duties of the Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer.

At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 16th October, 1889, the Acting Clerk produced letters from the Local Government Board with reference to the enquiry, when it was Resolved—

I. That the letters be referred to the Special Committee, with power to employ legal assistance, at an expense not exceeding 50 guineas without further instructions, and to engage the services of a shorthand writer.

II. That the Local Government Board be asked to postpone the Enquiry for a fortnight, and also to appoint another place for holding the Enquiry, pointing out the inadequacy of the Vestry Offices, even for Vestrymen, and suggesting the Hall under the Congregational Chapel, Dawes Road, as a suitable place.

The Special Committee reported to the Vestry on the 13th November, 1889, that Mr. T. Blanco White, Solicitor, Mr. Asquith and Mr. C. S. Macaskie, Counsel, had been retained on behalf of the Vestry, conjointly with the Churchwardens and Overseers, and they asked that the sanction of the Vestry be given to the expenditure of a further sum of 100 guineas on account of the expenses attendant on the Local Government Enquiry now proceeding, which expenditure was, on a division, sanctioned by 30 votes to 6. The enquiry commenced on Monday, 11th November, 1889, and terminated on Saturday, the 16th November, 1889, Messrs. Hedley and Taylor being the Inspectors appointed by the Local Government Board to conduct the same.

At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 13th January, 1890, the Clerk read the following letter from the Local Government Board, enclosing Order removing Mr. C. J. Foakes from the offices of Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer.

VESTRY CLERKSHIP.

At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 13th January, 1890, the clerk read letter from the Churchwardens and Overseers, stating that they had appointed Mr. Arthur Robinson, as Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer pro tem., and the Chairman produced application from Mr. Robinson for the appointment.

It was moved by Mr. Cornwall, seconded by Mr. Weatherley,

That the question as to who is the authority to elect the Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer pro tem., or otherwise be referred to the Law and Parliamentary Committee.

Carried.

On the 22nd January, 1890, the Law and Parliamentary Committee recommended that a communication be sent to the Sheriffs of Middlesex informing them of the order of the Local Government Board dismissing Mr. Foakes, and stating that, as the Local Government Board deemed him unfit for the offices of Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer, the Vestry trust he will no longer be appointed Borough Returning Officer. At the meeting of the Vestry held on the 5th February, 1890, the Law and Parliamentary Committee reported—

That they have received the following letter from the Local Government Board:—

I am directed by the Local Government Board to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 16th instant respecting the question of the appointment of a Vestry Clerk for the Parish of Fulham in the room of Mr. C. J. Foakes.

The Board direct me to state that they are informed that the person whom the Overseers desire to act *temporarily* in the above-mentioned capacity has undertaken to retire when another appointment is to be made.

As regards the enquiry with which your letter concludes, I am directed to refer you to section 6 of the statute of the 13 and 14 Vic., cap. 57.

Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer.

In my opinion the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor have no power vested in them by which they could appoint a person to perform the duties of Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer for the time that the office may be vacant.

On the 5th March, 1890, Mr. Lawrence asked why the Overseers had allowed the returns under the Valuation Act to be issued with the name of Arthur Robinson, Vestry Clerk and Assistant Overseer (pro tem.), printed thereon, contrary to the opinion of the Solicitor to the Vestry—reported by the Law and Parliamentary Committee on February 5th, 1890—that the Overseers had no power to make such an appointment, and the question was referred to the Overseers for a reply; and, on the 19th March, 1890, the Clerk read a letter from the Churchwardens and Overseers stating that they were acting under the instructions of the Local Government Board in this matter, and had no official knowledge of the Solicitor's report on the matter; whereupon, it was referred to the Finance and Law and Parliamentary Committees to take the necessary action.

NEW STREETS DEPARTMENT, CREATION OF.

At a Special meeting of the Vestry held on the 12th September, 1889, it was resolved:—

a. That the Vestry temporarily set apart Mr. W. Sykes as New Streets Surveyor, and appoint two other officials at £2 a week each (solely for New Streets work), who shall be capable of doing indoor work as Junior Assistants to the Surveyor, and out-door work as Clerks of the Works, as required; further, if necessary, one of the present three Assistant Clerks of the Works may, by the Vestry's Resolution, be transferred temporarily to this the New Streets Department, which department to be under the immediate and independent supervision of the New Streets Surveyor, who, with the New Streets Clerk, shall be under the control of the New Streets Committee; also, that such Committee be empowered to advertise and engage two such officials.

And b. That until otherwise determined by the Vestry, it be an instruction to the New Streets Committee to advertise for tenders for making up New Streets, as soon as 75 per cent. of the amount of the Surveyor's estimate of a particular street has been obtained.

Advertisements for the two Assistants to the New Streets Surveyor were ordered by the Vestry on the 2nd October 1889, to be inserted in the "Builder," and on the 30th October, 1889, the New Streets Committee reported to the Vestry that they had appointed Mr. S. N. Glass, (at £2 per week), and Mr. A. W. Cleghorn, (at 30s. per week for first six months, with an increase afterwards), as the two assistants to the New Streets Surveyor.

CONCLUSION.

Appended to this report will be found the Balance Sheets &c., of the various Charities of the parish, of the Churchwardens and Overseers as regards Precepts, the Churchwardens and Overseers as regards the Summons and Warrant account, and the third Annual report of the Library Commissioners for Fulham, all of which have been ordered by the Vestry to be printed with this report.

I cannot however close this report without tendering my thanks to the members of the Vestry for having promoted me, on the retirement of Mr. Foakes, to the position of Clerk to the Vestry, and also to the whole of the officers in my Department for the able assistance they have rendered me during the period I have held such position.

I beg to present to you my Fourth Annual Report of the various matters connected, and dealt with, in my department, relative to the finances of the Parish, for the period above stated, together with the abstracts of the Accounts for the financial year, 1889-90, duly audited in accordance with section 196, cap. 120, of 18 and 19 Victoria, 1855; annexed also is a statement of the Contracts entered into by the Vestry from the 26th March, 1889, to 25th March, 1890. Appendix I. shows the rates levied in Fulham from 1876-7 to 1889-90, and Appendix II. the amounts paid to all outside bodies during the same period, over which the Vestry have no direct control.

In conclusion, I have to thank the Members and Officials of the Vestry for the assistance rendered to me in the carrying out my duties during the past year.

ASSESSMENTS, &c.

The Parish of Fulham comprises an area of 1,716 statute acres, with a rateable value on the 6th April, 1890, of £385,407; the following statements, showing the number of houses, population, &c., since 1856, the first year of the Metropolis Management Act (1855), will give the Parishioners some idea of the rapid growth of the Parish.

TREASURER, BANKERS, &c.

In conformity with the Metropolis Management Acts, the Vestry have appointed a Treasurer, who is Mr. M. H. Wilde, the Manager of the Walham Green Branch of the London and Provincial Bank, Limited, where for facilitating the Vestry's financial business, five distinct banking accounts are kept, which are worked as follows:—

No. 1.—GENERAL ACCOUNT.

For the receipt and payment of Rates and general business of the Vestry.

No. 2.-NEW STREETS ACCOUNT.

For the receipts and payments in relation to new streets.

No. 3 .- LOANS AND PERMANENT WORKS ACCOUNT.

For the receipts and payments in connection with Loans, &c., for Permanent Works.

No. 4.—WAGES ACCOUNT.

For payment of weekly wages.

No. 5 .- PRIVATE WORKS ACCOUNT.

For receipts and payments relating to deposits for connection of house drains, licenses for hoardings, &c.

In addition to which, temporary Deposit Accounts are opened, when there are very large balances on the Current Accounts, or occasion requires.

LOANS.

The total amount due on Mortgages, as per Register, at 25th March, 1889, was £55,068 Os. Od., while at 25th March, 1890, it stands at

£56,521 9s. 4d. (about fourteen per centage of the rateable value). The following statement will shew the operations during the past year:—

The net increase on the Loan accounts for 1889-90 amounts to £1,453 9s. 4d.

Note.—On 26th March, 1886, the Vestry took over Loans to the amount of £44,014 12s., from the late Fulham District Board of Works, so that the increase on the four years only amounts to £12,506 17s. 4d., as against the amount shewn above.

PROPERTY ACCOUNT.

During the past year the Vestry obtained a Loan of £5,100 from the London County Council, for the erection of the freehold stables in Munster Road.

In September of 1888, the Vestry accepted the tender of Messrs. A. R. Flew and Co., for the erection of stables at the sum of £5,158, this work has been completed and the stables occupied; the total cost, including drainage, amounting to £5,631 6s. 2d.

In November, 1888, the Vestry accepted the tender of Mr. R. Cox, for the erection of a Public Mortuary and Coroner's Court, at the sum of £975, at date the sum of £900 has been paid on account of work executed.

In September, 1889, I made a statement to the Finance Committee, respecting the Property Account, and the means of providing funds for the building of the Town Hall, and was instructed by them to report same to the Vestry, the following is a copy of such report:—

Vestry of the Parish of Fulham, Vestry Hall, S.W. Accountant's Department, September 28th, 1889.

To the Chairman and Members of the Fulham Vestry. Gentlemen.

Re Statement of Property, &c., Accounts.

In accordance with the instructions received at the last Vestry Meeting, I beg to hand you a revised copy of the statements made to the Finance Committee, being my suggestions as to provision of the necessary balance to complete the new Town Hall, which really amount to, using the £8000 received from the late District Board, together with that to be received from the sale of Trafalgar House (say £1000), and the sum held re Imperial Road (about £1,100),—making a total of (say £10,100).

It will be remembered that some time since the London County Council stated, in reply to an application from this Vestry for a Loan for the Mortuary, that by the end of the past Session, they would have obtained Parliamentary powers in their money bill to enable them to lend sums for the erection of Public Mortuaries, and I would therefore suggest that an application be made to the Council for a Loan for the total cost of the erection of the Fulham Mortuary.

In addition to this I would also point out that the Vestry could obtain a Loan for £3000, to be repaid in 50 years, on the freehold site of the Town Hall.

These suggested Loans if obtained would recoup the sums spent out of the amount received from the late Board's Estate, leaving the whole £8000 available, which together with the proceeds of the sale of Trafalgar House, (say £1000), and the 2¾ per cent. Annuities held by the Vicar and others (£1100) mentioned above, would make about £10,100, the sum required.

If the Vestry decide to, and do raise a further Loan of £10,000 to complete the building and furnishing of the new Hall, they will be unnecessarily burdening the Ratepayers with a Loan to the extent of upwards of £6000, being the balance of the Property Account, after crediting the 2¾ per cent. Annuities and proceeds of sale of Trafalgar House, before referred to, for which the Vestry will have no legitimate use.

VESTRY HALL FUND.

During the year 1889-90 the interest on the £1055 2s. 11d., 2¾ per cent. Annuities, mentioned in last year's Report, has been invested in the purchase of additional stock, amounting to £29 6s. 11d., increasing the total amount of stock held by the Trustees (the Vicar of Fulham and Messrs. Lammin and King) to £1084 9s. 10d., as per the Balance Sheet.

The Vestry obtained a Loan of £13,400 from the Metropolitan Board of Works in 1888-9, towards the cost of erecting the new Vestry Hall and Offices in the Fulham Road, this amount has all been spent in payments to the Builder and Architect, viz.:—£18,800, leaving at date a deficit of about £5400.

IMPROVEMENT ACCOUNT.

As stated in a previous Report, this Account was opened with a view of providing for small items of a permanent nature, instead of carrying them to a Loan Schedule Account to be charged to future Rates. It will be seen by the Abstract of the Account, that the Receipts have been small, but the Payments nil during the past year, leaving a small balance to carry forward.

At the 25th March, 1890, the London County Council had granted, and the Vestry had taken up a Loan of £2700 on account of works carried out under a previous Loan Schedule.

HAMMERSMITH VESTRY.

During the year 1889-90 the total sum of £562 6s. 10d. has been paid to the above Vestry, being for the year's superannuations to retired officials of the late Fulham District Board of Works, for part maintenance of Hammersmith Road, and for sundry works, &c.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

A sum of £1575 has been received under this heading during the past year:—

The London County Council as successors of the late Metropolitan Board of Works agreed to pay one half of the net cost of Waterford Road Improvement (not exceeding £1575, see page 55 of last year's report), and in accordance with such promise, forwarded the above amount.

LOCAL TAXATION RETURNS.

Under 23 and 24 Victoria, c. 51, and 40 and 41 Victoria, c. 67, it is enacted that every Vestry, District Board, &c., shall make a return annually of the sums levied or received by or in interest of rates, taxes, &c., and of the expenditure thereof, to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Under the above Acts the Statistical Department of the Local Government Board issue, during the month of July or August in each year, a form embracing the various heads of receipts and expenditure and of loans, &c., employed by local authorities. In the beginning of July, 1889, forms (in duplicate) for the Local Taxation Returns were received by this Vestry, and referred to me to fill up. This was duly done on 9th July, 1889. On my presenting same to the Finance Committee, they instructed the Clerk to return the form to the Local Government Board.

The Local Government and Taxation Committee of the London County Council also sent out forms on the same matter during the month of August, 1889; they were filled up and returned to them in due course.

PRECEPTS OF CORPORATE BODIES.

The Central Boards issuing precepts on the Vestry are the Metropolitan Board of Works and the School Board for London. The precept for the first quarter of the year 1889-90 of the former for the Parish of Fulham amounts to £3788 3s. 1d., equal to a rate of 27 in the £.* The following statement will show the amounts paid by the Fulham Parish through the late District Board, the Fulham Vestry, &c., to the Metropolitan Board, over which they have no direct control.

^{*} The precept of the London County Council, the successors of the late Metropolitan Board of Works, is made on the Guardians of Fulham Union, and so becomes chargeable on the Poors Rate instead of the Local Rates, as was formerly the case with the Consolidated Rate.

The School Board precept for the year 1889-90 amounts to £13,606 2s. 9d., or together with that of the Returning Officer for the School Board Election the sum of £13,713 7s. 9d.; this is chargeable on the General Rate and is equal to a rate of 9d. in the £, the amount being an increase of £2,025 19s. 7d. on the previous year's precept, and allowing for an increase in the rateable value, of £12,255, as against the increase last year of £16,782, the Vestry are enabled—in the face of the enormous increase in the amount of the precept—to only increase the rate by $\frac{7}{8}$ d. in the £ on that of 1888-9.

NEW STREETS.

With reference to the New Streets' Accounts, during the past year, there has been received the sum of £9,778 10s. 0d., on account of Apportionments made. The amounts still due by contributors, are, on Old Roads, transferred to this Vestry by the late District Board of Works, the sum of £240 5s. 9d., and on the Streets taken to by this Vestry during the past three years the sum of £25,478 14s. 3d., making the total due on New Streets to be £25,719 0s. 0d. On pages Nos. 100—103 will be found statements of New Streets' Account in detail.

LABOUR, &c .- WAGES ACCOUNT.

The parishioners will form some idea of the rapid development of the Parish by the comparative statement of the labour wages accounts for 1886 and that of 1890.

[§] Of this amount, about fifteen-sixteenths of a 1d. is part of the Metropolitan Consolidated Rate, being for Bridge Expenses, and chargeable on the General Rate by Act of Parliament.

The increase of 2d. in the £ on the General Rate is brought about by the many Works and Improvements effected by the Vestry during the past year, necessitating the maintenance of a somewhat larger staff of workmen, greater cartage expenses, &c., in addition to the liabilities of the previous year, which had to be provided for out of this Rate, as well as the large increase in the School Board Rate of over £2000, and thereby causing the issuing of precepts for a larger amount than in 1888-9.

The Lighting Rate shows an increase in the amount called for, and an extra 1d. in the £ on the Rates. This is due to the fact that upwards of 50 new lamps were erected during the year, and that the Vestry purchased 998 small lamps from the Gas Light and Coke Co., at £2 each, to be paid in four equal annual instalments of £499 each, with interest at the rate of 5 per cent. on the outstanding amount. The Overseers were unable, with the balance they had in hand, to keep the Rate at the same amount in the £ as in the previous year.

The Local Sewers Rate is 1½ in the £ more than the previous year, and brought about by the increase in the Vestry's Precept, which is caused by extra sewer works, wages, and by the deficit on the last collected Rate.

The decrease of 54d in the £ on the Metropolitan Board's Rate is due to the fact that their Precept was only for one quarter, their successors (the London County Council) issuing their Precept on the Guardians, and charging same on the Poors Rate.

We have also examined the Loan Account of the Vestry, and we find that the Loans, including £7,800 borrowed during the past year, amount to £56,521 9 4

We note that the Auditors for the previous year called attention to the unsatisfactory condition of the New Streets Accounts, then showing a sum of £3158 19s. 11d. outstanding, and suggesting that the Vestry should devise some means to prevent these arrears from accumulating, this we find has not been acted upon; the said arrears have been increased by the sum of £475 13s. 3d., making the total amount owing on streets completed at 25th March, 1890, to be £3634 13s. 2d., and that these amounts do not appear by the Banker's pass books to be outstanding, is through the collection on streets freshly apportioned and not yet paved. Also, we are of opinion that the whole blame of the outstanding amounts through bad collection does not rest on the shoulders of the New Streets Clerk, the new work appears to be so voluminous that it must be impossible for one man to keep pace with it. We also personally know that a great many of the debtors are in a position to pay, and we do not think it would be very difficult to recover their amounts with the powers the Vestry have at their control.

We find that the sum of £311 17s. 5d. has been expended in disinfecting goods, bedding, &c., during the past year, and, taking into consideration that the Sanitary Committee recommended the Vestry to build a Disinfector at a cost of £300, we think a great saving would have been effected by the carrying out of such recommendation.

We also find that since 1st November, 1889, the sum of £57 5s. has been expended in the emptying of cesspools in Horder Road, and we do not find any precedent for such payment it having always been done previously at the expense of the owners, also that the Rates received from the property are only a snall moiety of the amount expended.

We also note that the sum of £123 3s. 4d. has been expended in repairs to a steam roller, this we believe to be about one third of its cost and is in our opinion very excessive.

We also find that during the past year £2,305 14s. 3d. has been expended on horse hire, we think it is a very heavy item, and that a considerable saving would have been effected if the Vestry had purchased their own horses seeing that they were paying rent for stable accommodation.

We are of opinion that the Vestry should have their Solicitor's bills of costs taxed as in one particular case we note the Vestry succeeded in an action but the difference between the original account and the taxed

account was charged to the Vestry.

We find that the accounts have been previously audited and signed by a firm of Chartered Accountants, on the appointment of whom we protested; but the Vestry appointed them as Assistant Accountants, and after having examined your Accountant (Mr. R. H. Meyer), under the powers vested in us as Auditors, we find that they have rendered him no assistance whatever; therefore we must call the attention of the in-coming Auditors to the fee paid to them for such audit as being an illegal payment, and being contrary to the provisions of the Metropolis Management Acts.

We wish to place on record that we find the books have been kept in a very creditable manner, and that great credit is due to the Accountant.

The question of having the accounts of the Vestry audited by duly qualified Auditors having been raised and discussed at various meetings of the Vestry and Finance Committee, it was finally resolved, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, at a Vestry Meeting held on the 7th August, 1889,

I again beg to suggest that the Vestry should order some granite broken to pass through a ring 2-in. in diameter, so that it might be used for patching the roads; also, that if the order for the granite required during the year was given in one large order during the summer months, the Contractors would—owing to the cheaper freights—very likely supply it as much as 2s. a yard cheaper, which on 3000 yards would equal a saving of £300.

I desire to call attention to the reduced estimate for Granite, although the number of roads repaired with that material has very much increased.

In the Lillie Road a strip of Jarrah wood, 6-ft. 6-in. wide, has been laid. Jarrah wood has recently, for various reasons, risen to such a price as to be far too dear to use for wood paving purposes in this Country.

18,000 deal blocks have been used for repairing wood paving (chiefly the Broadway) during the year.

In February, the plan for wood paving the Fulham Road, from the "George," Walham Green, to Putney Bridge, was proceeded with, and in March, 1890, the following report was prepared and submitted to the Vestry.

REPORT ON WOOD PAVING.

FULHAM ROAD, NORTH END ROAD, MELMOTH PLACE, AND MAIN ROUTE FROM WALHAM GREEN TO HAMMERSMITH.

26th March, 1890.

To the Chairman and Members of the Vestry of Fulham.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the following report and tabulated estimates in reference to the relative cost of paving the Fulham Road, North End Road, Melmoth Place, and the main thoroughfare from Walham Green to Hammersmith, being Jerdan Place, Dawes Road, Crown Road, and part of Fulham Palace Road, with the various kinds of wood suggested.

For convenience, I have taken the approximate areas. The prices will be subject to correction on receipt of tenders, as the present market fluctuations are numerous and considerable.

The figures given of the cost of the maintenance of the present macadam roads are obtained from the particulars of the expenditure during the last 4 years, and the estimates of the cost of the scavenging the proposed new wood pavements are based on the actual costs of cleansing the wood pavement in Walham Green.

The present wood paving in the Fulham Road is wearing away to such an extent that I cannot any longer recommend the Vestry to use plain deal blocks.

Deal that is not creosoted is too varying in quality and durability, the consequence being that deep holes are soon formed around the softer pieces, in which water lodges, and the rate of decay rapidly increases.

Beech is also too slippery and liable to rot.

The foregoing statements, re New Streets, show that from March, 1889, to October, 1889, three roads were apportioned; also contracts for 13 new streets were carried out at a cost of £6218 3s. 4d., or an average of £478 6s. 4\frac{3}{4}d. a road; and the average cost of the roads per foot frontage was just inside 10s. a foot—being 9s. 10\frac{3}{4}d. The average amount of the apportionment per foot was 13s. 1\frac{1}{2}d

There was also a number of sewer apportionments made during the same period, which appear under the heading of Sewers.

The rather large proportion of extras on the Portland Place Contract arose from the Committee deciding to put iron gratings around the trees in that road.

Since March, 1886, I have prepared 73 apportionments for 12,443 yards, or 7 miles 0 furlongs 123 yards of new streets, and 6 additional apportionments, also 63 contracts for 63 streets—total cost, £27,530 18s. 9d.—have been completed.

SEWERS.

There are 3 miles, 7 furlongs, 26 yards, of main sewers in this parish, which are vested in the London County Council.

The sewers belonging to the Vestry are 4 miles of bricks, and 28 miles 1,254 yards, of pipe sewers.

The subject of the ventilation of sewers has continued to receive the attention of the Vestry, and a great number of additional ventilators have been fixed to the existing sewers during the year. The new sewers receive the most careful attention in every respect, and during the year the Vestry have adopted a most carefully drawn up specification and set of notices, in respect to their construction.

A firm of builder's was fined £30 an costs, on the 21st of August, 1889, for laying and covering in a sewer in this district without giving notice, in order that the work might be supervised. When inspected, the levels of the sewer were found to differ from those given on the approved plan.

Sewers laid in 1889-90, under the supervision of the Vestry.

To cover the cost of the 589 connections to the buildings set forth above, one hundred and six different sums, amounting to £884 8s. 6d., have been passed over to the Accountant through this Department.

For unstopping drains, &c., fifteen different sums, amounting to £66, have been passed over to the Accountant.

During the year, the Vestry have adopted an entirely new set of notices and forms for use in connection with the drainage of houses.

Each of my Annual Reports have called the attention of the Vestry to the importance of appointing special inspectors to superintend the drainage of private houses.

The Vestry, therefore, decided in June to utilize one of the Clerk of the Works for that purpose, but the general work in the Department was so great that it was difficult to give such entire supervision as the work demanded. An enquiry was made into the subject by the Law and Parliamentary Committee, who, on the 8th January, 1890, recommended that an additional Clerk of the Works should be obtained to superintend this work, and Mr. J. A. Webb was appointed on the 5th of March, 1890.

Every set of drains, after being laid, should be tested, and the Vestry might adopt the plan of giving certificates, but, in that case, a reasonable fee, to go to the relief of the rates, should be charged for the certificate. If the Vestry undertake this work, and the present rate of building continues, additional Inspectors will be required.

On the 4th of October, 1889, a Builder was fined £10 for carrying out drainage of his house in a different manner to that shewn on the approved plan.

In February, 1890, proceedings were ordered to be taken against a Builder erecting houses in Dawson Street for not conforming to the regulations.

The Dust is still disposed of by tipping into shoots in the District, for which the Vestry pay the owners of the ground an average of 1s. 7d. per load. This is, in my opinion, a wasteful method of disposing of it, as a considerable quantity of the material thrown away is of value. My last year's report suggested to the Vestry the desirability of buying seven or eight acres of land near the river that could be afterwards made available for wharves.

I estimated that the Vestry could, by the sale of sand and ballast from the site, and by the saving of the 1s. 7d. per yard charged for filling in, make a profit of about £2,200 per acre; and, as one year's dust would about fill one acre, the saving would amount to that sum per annum, or a rate of nearly $1\frac{1}{2}d$. in the £.

STREET CLEANSING.

The Vestry have purchased during the year one sanding machine, at a cost of £35; two road scrapers, at a cost of £28; one dust cart, £18; and one slop cart, £19: making the total number in stock, 3 sanding machines, 4 rotary brooms, 2 road scrapers, 11 dust carts, 20 slop carts, 10 tip carts, and 19 water vans.

The sanding machines, rotary brooms, and road scrapers are very valuable and useful implements, and it would be an economy for the Vestry to purchase double the present number. The road scrapers are especially useful in clearing away snow.

HOARDINGS.

Under 18 and 19 Vic., c. 120 of the Metropolitan Management Acts, the Vestry have power to compel builders to take out a license before erecting a Hoarding in any street in the Parish, including those not repairable by the Vestry, and on the 7th August, 1889, the Vestry passed the following resolution :-

"That the Surveyor be instructed to make builders take out a license for Hoardings, in all streets, and in all cases of streets not

repairable by the Vestry, a fee of 5s. is to be charged."

As a result of the attendance of a deputation of builders at the Vestry, these instructions were countermanded, and are not now carried out.

The Acts of Parliament are very clear on the subject, and I beg to suggest that the Vestry ought to repeat their instructions, as at the present time building materials are thrown indiscriminately over many of these streets, to the great danger of the traffic and foot passengers.

On the 12th August, 1889, the Advertising Stations Rating Act, 52 and 53 Vic., came into force, which enables the Vestry to prohibit advertisements on Hoardings, and on the 27th day of November, 1889, the Vestry adopted a new form of Hoarding License, and arranged that a prohibitory charge of 1d. per foot super, per month, should be charged for Hoardings used for advertisements in this district.

On the 6th of March, 1890, two builders were fined 20s. and costs for not complying with the requirements of the Vestry in respect of Hoardings.

MISCELLANEOUS.

For paving works and removing lamps, &c, nine different sums, amounting to £17, have been received by this department during the year.

LAYING STRAW IN ROADS.

For permission to lay straw in roads, five different sums, amounting to £5 4s., have been received during the year.

HORSES AND FODDER.

During the year, the Vestry have cleared out seven horses which had become unfitted for the work, through old age or other causes, as follows:

WHARF .- TOLL HOUSE SITE.

Plans have been prepared for the construction of river wall, projecting about 40 feet into the river, enclosing an area of nearly 600 square yards.

The Conservators also require that a causeway and steps down to the river bed should be constructed for the use of the public in lieu of the steps removed.

Tenders were received for the work on the 24th July, 1889; and that of Messrs. Mayo, amounting to £2200, was accepted.

BISHOP'S MEADOW.

By the additional grant made in March, 1889, by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, of $5\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land known as the West Meadow, the total area of this proposed park is raised to about 12 acres.

During the year I have prepared fresh plans for erecting a river wall, and

laying out the entire area as a park.

The Conservators have defined the frontage line for this West Meadow in continuation of the line already defined for Bishop's Meadow; and the Vestry paid, on the 7th August, 1889, the Conservators £5 5s. fine, and £2 2s. fee.

The Vestry, on the 25th day of May, 1889, made an application to the London County Council to bear all or part of the expense of building the wall, and the application was supported by a memorial and a deputation

of members of the Vestry.

The matter is still under the consideration of the Council. The time arranged for the construction of the wall has long elapsed, and I believe that it would be better for the Vestry to adhere to their original proposition, viz., to carry out the work themselves—obtaining a loan from the Council—as in that case the Vestry will have more control over the expenditure, and the work will afford a good opportunity for the employment of Fulham labour.

ELECTRIC LIGHT.

The Vestry having received notices of intention to apply for provisional orders for power to light the Fulham district or parts of it with electric light on behalf of several companies, I prepared the following report on the schemes, which have since been withdrawn.

The report will, perhaps, assist the Vestry dealing with any similar

scheme which may be proceeded with in future years.

Fulham and Hammersmith Electric Light.

To the Chairman and Members of the Fulham Vestry.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to report that I have examined the draft Provisional Orders of the House-to-House Electric Light Supply Company's, and the Brush Electrical Engineering Company's, schemes for supplying this light in the Fulham district.

Before proceeding to deal with the schemes before the Vestry, it may be well to glance at the action of other local authorities, and to give some consideration to the general question of Electric Lighting.

KENSINGTON.

Kensington has had applications for Provisional Orders from six different companies, to all of which the Vestry have arranged to grant separate areas in their district for them to supply, with provisions that

in the future the areas may be extended.

As the Electric Lighting Act, 1888, will, notwithstanding a Provisional Order being granted to any company, allow another company or the local authority to supply electricity within the same area, the Kensington Vestry, by their division of the parish, secure the competition and, to some extent, the good conduct of each company, in order to prevent any other company being allowed to enter their particular area.

ST. PANCRAS.

The St. Pancras Vestry has acted upon an entirely different principle, as it has taken for itself powers to supply the light, and kept all Companies from obtaining Provisional Orders.

There is one special reason in this case which made this course the best for the Vestry to adopt. Their parish is full of large Establishments, such as Schoolbred's, Maple's, &c., to whom the Electric Light has become a necessity in their business, and who will in all probability be large customers. The Vestry have, therefore, taken advantage of their position, and there is an income and probably an immediate profit assured on their outlay.

COMPARATIVE COST OF GAS AND ELECTRIC LIGHT.

Professor Robinson, C.E., has been advising the St. Pancras Vestry on the matter, and I quote below some of his figures. He estimates the

to private house with 30 lights (at 2/2 per 1000 feet), £8 18s. 1d.

Cost of Gas Supply per annum | Cost of Electric Light to private house with 30 lights at 41d per Board of Trade unite of 1000 voltamperes per hour £14 15s. 8d.

The 41d. per unit represents the cost which he thinks the Vestry can supply the light, but the maximum charge asked for by the Companies will be 8d. per unit.

The fittings for Electric Light cost 25 per cent. more than gas.

STREET LIGHTING.

He further calculates that an Arc Lamp of 1000 candle power is the best form for this purpose, and will cost at 41d. per unit, £44 10s. 4d. per annum, superseding five ordinary gas lamps costing £14 per annum.

In this case the cost of Electricity is 3.18 times larger than Gas, but the

light is fourteen times greater.

At an important corner, two Arc Lamps of 750 candle power might be placed at a cost of £74 per annum, replacing Gas Lamps costing £56 per annum; the Electric Light being 31 times greater than Gas.

COST OF INSTALLATIONS.

Professor Robinson estimates that an installation of 10,000 lights will cost £50,000, and annual cost £9,400, providing six miles of main. This scheme would require one central and five sub-stations, and in addition to supplying the houses would supply 40 Arc Lamps, costing £1542 per annum, in place of 200 Gas Lamps costing £560 per annum.

A scheme for 5000 lights, with one central and two sub-stations, he

estimates the cost £25,000, and £5450 per annum.

THE BRIGHTON CORPORATION has just agreed to spend £30,000 for an installation of 10,000 16-candle power lamps, exclusive of the cost of land. No mention is made in the scheme of street lighting.

ACTION OF THIS VESTRY.

It will be seen by the above figures that if this Vestry seek powers to supply the light, it pledges itself to a considerable undertaking, and one which in this district might result in a heavy loss.

The Vestry cannot obtain powers solely for the purpose of keeping Companies out of the district, as the Board of Trade are strongly opposed to what has been referred to as the policy of "the dog in the manger," and although the Local Authority or other Company may obtain powers to enter a district, notwithstanding another Company having powers, yet the Board of Trade may be relied on to protect to a considerable extent a Company already working satisfactorily. The Vestry must, therefore, decide what action it will take with reference to the two schemes, particulars of which follow.

PARTICULARS OF THE TWO SCHEMES.

The proposed Capital of the Brush Electrical Engineering Company is £750,000; that of the House to House Electric Light Supply Company is £350,000.

Both Companies seek powers to supply the whole of Hammersmith and Fulham.

Both Companies undertake to keep separate accounts of their undertakings: but Fulham is not kept distinct from Hammersmith.

The Companies would undertake to provide security within six months of date of order.

The propose orders provide that no overhead wires should be laid without the express sanction of the London County Council.

Both Companies propose to charge 8d. a unit, with a minimum charge of 13s. 4d. for any quantity.

The Local Authority after every seven years may make a representation to the Board of Trade that prices should be altered, and the Board of Trade may order alterations.

The "House to House" agrees to lay mains in the following roads within two years, Edith Road, Gliddon Road, Matheson Road, Mornington Avenue, "North End."

The "Brush Company" seeks power to be able to transfer the whole or part of their scheme, and may make preferential charges to Local Authority.

These Bills are drafted on the lines laid down by the model order supplied by the Board of Trade, after the exhaustive enquiry held by Major Marinden last year; consequently they are not open to any great objections, unless the Vestry desires to do the work itself, or to oppose the Bills in order to gain time to further consider the question.

The last course seems to be reasonable, as there is not at present, in my opinion, sufficient demand for the light to justify the expenditure of capital, and the disturbance of the streets which would result from the approval of any scheme.

OBJECTIONS TO THE SCHEMES.

According to the notice at the end of the draft order, objections to the Bills must be lodged with the Board of Trade on or before the 1st day of February, 1890.

1st.—Although the two Companies appear to be satisfactory with reference to responsibility and pecuniary status, they both include the same area, and considerable unnecessary disturbance would result if they each obtained the powers they sought.

2nd.—There is not sufficient demand in the district to at present justify the granting Provisional Orders.

This is practically admitted by the Companies, only one of which has scheduled five streets in this district, in which it undertakes to lay mains within the 2 years.

When a demand arises the Vestry would much prefer to carry out a scheme of their own to meet it.

3rd.—That the power to purchase by the Local Authorities should be at the end of 21 years, and each subsequent 7 years instead of 42 and 10 years.

4th.—That the proposed maximum price of 8d. per unit is too high; also that a fixed sliding scale of price and dividend, as inserted in the House to House Kensington Provisional Order, should be adopted.

5th.—The Vestry should have a voice in the prohibition of overhead wires.

6th.—If the Board of Trade should sanction one or both of the applications, separate accounts should be kept for the Fulham District.

7th.—The Vestry should also have power to audit accounts of Companies as well as Board of Trade.

8th.—The Companies should state the form of meter it is proposed to adopt.

9th.—Whether the engines are to be condensing or non-condensing, and worked at low or high speed.

10th.—The intended positions of works and complete drawings and particulars of the proposed schemes.

I regret the length of the report, which I have endeavoured to condense as much as possible.

On the 19th February, 1890, in reply to certain questions put to me, I further recommended that "the present Companies should, if possible, be delayed until the Vestry can arrange to do the work with a reasonable prospect of a return for the great outlay that will be required," and that "if the Vestry cannot succeed in deferring the whole question, they themselves should endeavour to obtain a Provisional Order. If they succeeded in obtaining an Order and did not feel justified afterwards in carrying out the work, the Vestry could even then arrange terms with a Company to do the work, or to take over their powers either temporarily or permanently."

ELECTRIC LIGHTING TOWN HALL.

The Vestry have also had under consideration the question of lighting the new Town Hall with the Electric Light.

I prepared a specification for the work, and various offers were received, but the Vestry finally decided to defer action in the matter.

LAMMAS LANDS.

This important matter has received a great deal of attention, and I have prepared a plan of the 77 acres of lands over which Lammas Rights are said to exist, and 500 copies have been lithographed for circulation.

On the 10th July, a memorial was sent to the London County Council, and a deputation attended before the Open Spaces Committee. The Society for the preservation of open spaces has also promised the Vestry assistance in the matter.

CROMWELL ROAD BRIDGE.

This very necessary improvement has fallen through for a time, owing to the London County Council having abandoned the proposed Act of Parliament intending to deal with this and other schemes.

The Engineer to the London County Council has recommended that the Bridge should be 60 feet wide instead of 40 feet, as suggested in the original scheme, which shews how necessary and important he considers the Bridge to be. Only one of the other Bridges leading into the district is more than 40 feet wide, namely, the Fulham and Putney Bridge, which is 44 feet. I cannot myself see the necessity for the extreme width proposed by the Engineer, especially as the alteration must nearly double the expense, and lead to very considerable delay in carrying out the improvement, whereas the whole of the arrangements, except the consent of the London County Council, had been completed for the erection of a Bridge 40 feet wide.

CHURCH STREET IMPROVEMENT.

This improvement is being carried out by the London County Council, under Parliamentary powers.

On the 28th May, 1889, the Vestry presented a memorial to the London County Council, asking them to contribute a larger amount towards the expenses of the improvement, and a deputation attended and supported the memorial. The Council however decided not to increase their contribution to the cost.

ROAD BETWEEN PERHAM ROAD AND MAY STREET.

A continuation of the Vereker Road has existed for some time between Perham Road and May Street. The Vestry on the 21st January, 1890, having decided to repair it, on commencing the work orders were given by the Solicitors, claiming ownership, to fence in the land. The Vestry proceeded against the persons erecting the barricade, for obstructing the thoroughfare, but on the case being tried before Mr. Plowden, on the 12th day of March, 1890, the decision was given against the Vestry.

TRAFALGAR HOUSE, FULHAM ROAD.

This property formerly occupied as the Vestry's yard is now for sale. On the 16th November, 1889, I prepared a plan of it, and forwarded the same to the agent acting for the Vestry. Up to the present time it has not yet found a purchaser, although the property is capitally situated, and the premises convenient and well built.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

The urinal in Walham Green opposite the "George Hotel," was removed on the 2nd November, 1889, the Vestry having under consideration the erection of an underground one in the Broadway, in the place of it.

The London County Council have also been asked to construct accommodation of this character on Eelbrook Common, but up to the present time no definite result has been obtained.

INSANITARY AREAS AND ARTIZANS DWELLINGS.

The London County Council having asked for a report and returns as to any insanitary areas in this District, I have visited a great number of properties and reported on their condition. Only three of them were in my opinion entitled to be classed as insanitary areas, and my report, together with plans of the properties were forwarded to the London County Council. The London County Council or the Vestry have not as yet taken any definite action on the reports.

Acting on the instructions of the Vestry, letters have been written to the trustees of Guiness's fund, calling their attention to the facilities existing in this district, for the erection of properties suitable for the occupation of the working classes.

PUBLIC FOOTPATHS.

Boundary Stones have been placed at the sides of all public footpaths, to prevent any encroachments.

MAP OF PARISH.

I am glad to be able to state that the Vestry have instructed the firm of Messrs. Wyld and Co. to prepare a new and complete plan of the District. at a cost of £260.

NAME PLATES.

A number of enamelled Name-plates have been fixed during the year, at a cost of £7 5s. 3d. for plates; also a number of small glass Name-plates on lamps.

LONDON SUBWAYS AND OVERHEAD WIRES BILL.

This Bill was intended to empower the London County Council to make Subways under streets, and to provide for the use of such Subways; also to control and regulate Overhead Wires.

The summary of my report of the 20th January, 1890, is as follows:-

The powers sought would enable the Council to make complete and satisfactory arrangements for removing the inconveniences arising from the present want of system.

There is, however, one point to which I wish to call especial attention.

The powers are sought by the Council to the entire exclusion of the Vestries, whereas such powers should also belong to the various Vestries and District Boards of London.

A Vestry could not, therefore, carry out work of a similar character.

I beg to suggest that Vestries should have, with the sanction of the Council (the same as in the case of sewers) the same powers and right to construct subways as the Council seek, and that this power should be given in the Bill.

It would, perhaps, be sufficient if one clause was inserted in the Bill to the effect that the Council might delegate the powers conferred by the Act to any Vestry or District Board.

With this exception, the Bill, in my opinion, is one which the Vestry might very properly support, by petition or otherwise.

Proceedings were taken against the builder for erecting the building at the corner of Crown and Adeney Roads, and on the 5th day of November, 1889, Mr. Plowden ordered all the buildings to be set back, except the corner shop, in accordance with the line defined by the Superintending Architect. CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report, I desire to call the special attention of the members of the Vestry to the following matters already referred to.

- 1. The rapid increase of the Parish, which is shewn more especially by the number of estates that are being laid out, the length of new sewers laid, and the unusual quantity of new buildings.
- 2. The great economy to be effected with respect to the collection and disposal of dust. This matter is more fully reported on in my report for 1888-9.
- 3. The advantage to be gained by the Vestry purchasing as many horses as the new stables will accommodate, instead of continually hiring.

- 4. The importance of laying out the 12 acres, known as the Bishop's Meadow and West Meadow as a Park, without further delay. The land having been allowed to remain in its present discreditable condition, with the area being decreased by the action of the River, since the original grant in 1884.
- 5. The necessity for taking early steps to secure the Rights of Lammas, over the 77 acres known as Lammas Lands, or of arranging suitable compensation for them.
- 6. The advisability of pressing on the construction of the Cromwell Road Bridge, which has been fully reported on in my report for 1886-7.

I have again the pleasure of expressing my entire satisfaction with various Officials in my department, viz., Mr. William P. Jones, the Superintendent of Roads; Mr. F. W. J. Palmer, the Assistant Surveyor; Mr. Charles Botterill, Chief Outdoor Assistant, Mr. J. A. Webb, Clerk of Works, and Mr. D. S. Matthews, Junior Assistant, and I desire to thank them for their able assistance.

I also beg to repeat my thanks to many of the Officials and Members of the Vestry, for their co-operation, assistance, and courtesy during the year.

REPORT OF THE NEW STREETS SURVEYOR, FROM SEPTEMBER, 1889, TO MARCH, 1890.

NEW STREETS SURVEYOR'S DEPARTMENT,

TOWN HALL, WALHAM GREEN, S.W.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with the 198th section of the Metropolis Local Management Act, 18 and 19 Vic., cap. 120, I beg to present my first

Annual Report.

Having regard to the number of Streets laid out and not yet taken to under compulsory powers, the Vestry considered it advisable to form a separate Department to deal with New Streets. On the 12th September, 1889, I was appointed as Surveyor, and, on the 30th October, Messrs. Cleghorn and Glass, as Assistants, and, on February 19th, Mr. Baker as Clerk of Works.

At the time of my appointment there were 23 streets on the old list ordered to be taken to. On the 2nd October, a View Committee recommended the Vestry to take to 78, and since then, on application, the Vestry have ordered 10, making a total of 111. There are still about 50 roads in the Parish not yet ordered to be taken to.

During the latter six months of the year, thirty-three plans and apportionments were made and sealed by the Vestry, and contracts for

four roads were entered into.

A great many of the roads ordered to be taken to are old roads, or roads that have been formed for a great many years, and by setting back on either side to a width of 40 feet, and the erection of houses, the character of these roads has been so changed as to constitute them New Streets, within the meaning of the Act. The form of a great many of these roads has been so materially altered as to make them almost of the same character as a street formed across garden ground.

It has been the custom of the Vestry in the past not to apportion the owners for the carriageways of these old roads, and the expense of making

them up to the new levels has been borne by the Parish.

There is a case in point—East End Road—where the Vestry have only apportioned a strip of land that was thrown into the roadway to make it

40 feet wide, leaving the other portion untouched.

In setting out the levels for the new work, and giving the road the proper contour, the new portion of the road was ten inches higher than the old, necessitating the reconstruction of the old road, at a cost of £139 10s., which will have to be borne by the Ratepayers, instead of the Owners of Property abutting thereon.

I contend that where an old road, formerly 20 feet wide, is made 40 feet (in accordance with the statute), and houses erected, that road has become a New Street, in the same sense as a New Street formed on

garden ground. I am of opinion that the language of the 98 sec., 25 and 26 Vic., and 112 sec., 25 and 26 Vic., deals with the finding of a New Street. When an old highway has come within all the conditions of these sections, and is found to be a New Street, then it can be dealt with under sec. 105, 18 and

19 Vic.—i.e., the carriageway can be apportioned.

It is in consequence of there being so many old roads (and the saving that would be effected to the ratepayers) that are about to be paved, that I have directed my attention to the point as to whether the Vestry are within their legal right in charging for the carriageway in old roads, and, on the 27th March, 1890, I asked the opinion of the Law and Parliamentary Committee upon this point, and Mr. Blanco-White replied: "That, in his opinion, where an old highway became a New Street, it could be dealt with and paved in the same way as other New Streets."

Although the carriageway of these old roads in the future will be apportioned, they will be dealt with on their merits—i.e., where a road has stood the traffic of a main road and is well constructed, it would only be necessary to apportion for a coating of granite to make good to the new levels, but, in the case of a country lane, or what may be known as a "grown road," or where the carriageway has been badly constructed,

such carriageway would require reconstruction.

POLICE COURT CASES.

I have attended the Police Court to give evidence in support of the summonses that have been issued, the following of which have been contested.

WHITTINGSTALL ROAD.—VESTRY v GOWER.

In this case a point was raised as to whether the Vestry could charge for the relaying of a crossing which the defendant contended was in the Fulham Road. It was held that the Vestry had power to charge under the Statute, and orders were made.

KING'S ROAD, SECTION II.

On the 7th of March, I attended in respect of King's Road, Section II, when it was argued that it was not a New Street. Evidence was given as to the former condition of the road, and that it had been widened to the width of 40 feet, and houses recently erected, and that by reason of such alteration it had become a New Street, whereupon orders were made.

WANDSWORTH BRIDGE ROAD, SEC. II.—VESTRY v. WHITAKER.

The defendants, in this case, argued that the Vestry, as successors to the late Fulham District Board of Works, were liable for the making up of this road, pursuant to the clauses contained in the Wandsworth Bridge Act, 1864, and (2) That the road was not a New Street within the meaning of the Act. The first point was decided in favour of the Vestry, but upon the second point it was held that although it was a highway, the character of the road had not been so altered by the erection of houses as to make it a New Street.

Owing to the alteration of the total sum to be collected on each road, before the same is contracted for, being made 75 per cent instead of 50 per cent. as formerly, the work of making up the streets has for a time been in abeyance. It was not until January of this year that the first road was contracted for, and I have now every reason to believe from the way the money is being collected, that quite 40 streets will be paved during the ensuing year.

INCREASE IN PRICES.

I regret to say that owing to the recent strikes the prices of materials have very considerably increased, thereby necessitating additional apportionments to be made on a great many streets, the estimates for which were based upon the old prices.

SPECIFICATION.

On 27th February, 1890, I reported to the New Streets Committee the advisability of altering the specification as follows:—

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to draw the attention of the Committee to the fact, that in the past a \(\frac{3}{4}\)-in. mesh sieve has been used in screening the existing hardcore in the roads, and I find the residue so dirty that when relaid as hardcore, it seems very little better for being screened. I would suggest that in future a 1-in. mesh sieve be used.

I would also suggest that the kerb be laid on 6-in. of Portland Cement concrete. It is impossible to keep this kerb in position when laid on soil, which in most cases is newly made ground.

And further, that in lieu of paving setts for channel, I would suggest 12-ft. by 6-ft. Norway Granite be used, laid on 6-in. Portland Cement Concrete.

The granite setts being small always have a tendency to sink under great pressure and cause pools of water to stand in the channels, whereas the 12-ft. by 6-ft. granite channel being in long lengths and having a greater bearing would not sink. The surface water would also drain away more quickly, and having a smoother surface no pools would ever be found standing in the channel.

This alteration would I think increase the cost by about 10d. per foot run.

I shall be glad if the Committee will consider these suggestions so that I may alter the future specifications accordingly.

ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

The above recommendations were adopted by the Vestry, with the exception that Blue Lias Lime Concrete be laid under the kerb instead of Portland Cement Concrete.

IMPORTANT AMENDMENTS TO THE METROPOLIS MANAGEMENT ACTS have been passed during the last session of Parliament. 53 and 54 Victoria, Ch. 66, provides that any Vestry or District Board may repair any carriageway within their Parish or District, which shall have been used not less than six months for public traffic, and shall not by undertaking such repair, prejudice the powers of the Vestry to recover the amount of the apportioned expenses of making up and paving, together with the cost of repairing such road.

The 78th Section 25 and 26 Victoria, has always appeared to me to be an important Section, which provides that where any footway laid out at the passing of the Act of 18 and 19 Vic. Ch. 120, which has been repaired by the Vestry or any public body, but shall not have been flagged, and the Vestry deem that the same should be flagged, either throughout the whole breadth thereof, or any portion of such breadth, it shall be lawful for the Vestry to levy such cost upon the occupiers of houses abutting on the street.

I know of no Parish in London where this section would better apply than in Fulham, for we have such a number of roads where it is not possible to take to them throughout the whole length or breadth but only portions of same, there can be no doubt that this section was almost useless, owing to the liability of such paving being cast upon the occupiers, which in most cases would operate with great hardship, especially upon a yearly tenant and the poorer class of people, and it may be owing to this fact that the section is seldom used.

The above section has now been repealed and amended, so that the liability for the flagging is cast upon the owner, instead of the occupier.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present my Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1889, as Medical Officer of Health for the Parish of Fulham.

The estimated population is 86,545, and is calculated on the number of inhabited houses—11,725.

The area of the Parish is in statute acres 1,716, giving a ratio of 50.4 inhabitants per acre.

During the year, 3,089 Births—viz.: 1,522 Males, and 1,567 Females—were registered in the Parish, being at the annual rate of 37:08 per 1000 persons living. The Births registered during the third quarter were highest—viz.: 813—and during the fourth quarter lowest—viz.: 729.

There were 1,694 Deaths registered during the year—viz.: 800 Males, and 894 Females—of these 251 were non-parishioners. 813 Deaths were registered of children under five years of age, and 344 were of persons of 60 years and upwards. The Deaths, deducting the non-parishioners, were at the rate of 16.77 per 1000.

The above statement shows the number of cases in this class which were reported (before death) during the year.

Every case of Scarlet Fever or Enteric Fever which was reported during the year, and in which the consent of the parents or friends was obtained, was removed to Hospital without delay.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Water Supply to the Parish from the Chelsea and West Middlesex Water Works was on the whole very satisfactory.

BAKEHOUSES.

All these have been personally inspected by me, and periodically by the Inspectors. There is a marked improvement in the condition of the greater number of Bakehouses in the Parish.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES.

These were all inspected by me, and periodically by the Sanitary Inspectors. On every occasion their reports have been satisfactory.

COW SHEDS.

These have received attention from me and the Inspectors, and, on the whole, I believe the Cow Sheds in Fulham would bear comparison with any in the Metropolis.

NUISANCES.

The Gipsies have, as usual, been a source of great trouble, especially at Adeney Road and the end of Wandsworth Bridge Road.

RE BAD SMELLS IN FULHAM PALACE ROAD.

Many complaints have been made concerning constant smells arising from the Distillery and Saccharine Works in Fulham Palace Road. These have received my special attention. The Distillery Company are constructing a new system of drainage; the Saccharine Company are building improved furnaces for the charcoal. I expect that these works, when carried out, will remove any cause of complaint in the future.

RE EVERINGTON STREET BOARD SCHOOLS.

These Schools were closed, by my instructions, for six weeks, Scarlet Fever having been very prevalent in the district. The whole of the drains have been opened, cleansed and re-trapped.

RE WEST LONDON (LATE HAMMERSMITH) POLICE COURT.

This Police Court having been for several years in a most unhealthy and dirty condition, I tried, without effect, to have an alteration made and get it properly cleansed. No notice having been taken of my request, I finally served an official notice on the Hon. Mr. Plunket to have the work done. This has now been carried out in a most satisfactory manner.
