REPORT.

Following the practice of former years the Vestry beg, in the Meetings. first place, to give a comparative statement of the number of meetings of Committees and of the Vestry, and of the number of members attending the same during the past year and the previous three years. It as follows:—

It will be observed that the number of meetings of the Standing Committees has increased. This is owing to the Horse Hire Committee having been made a Standing Committee under the style of the "Dusting and Cleansing Committee." The return of meetings does not include the weekly meetings of the rota Committee of the Dusting, &c., Committee.

The Vestry have with regret to record the deaths of several Deaths. persons who were well known in the Hamlet, and who had taken considerable interest in the Parochial work, viz.: Messrs. Head, W. F. Jackson, Ellis, Iron and Jutsum.

Mr. Carter, the Foreman of Laborers, also died at the advanced age of 87 years, having been in the uninterrupted employ of the Vestry and their predecessors in office since the year 1815.

Representative at of Works.

Mr. Moore's term of office as Representative of the Vestry at Metropoli. the Metropolitan Board of Works having expired by effluxion of tan Board time, and he having found that the time required to discharge the duties efficiently caused him great inconvenience, he did not seek re-election, and Mr. Robert Jones having, since his resignation, made other arrangements whereby his time was more at his own disposal, he was again elected as the Representative of the Vestry at the Metropolitan Board of Works.

Parliamentary Work.

During the year the Parliamentary Committee considered many Bills brought before Parliament, and also other subjects upon which Parliamentary action is likely to be taken. The following are the most important of the matters considered and the resolutions taken with regard to them:-

Great Eastern Railway Bill.

With regard to the Bill No. 2, the Vestry opposed two of its proposed provisions, viz.: [1] That which empowered the Company to continue the line at Loughton through the Forest. [2] That which enabled them to widen the existing line in the Hamlet without providing for the alteration of the Bridge at The Company, in the face of the opposition Morpeth Street. which was exhibited to provision No. 1, withdrew it altogether; and with regard to provision No. 2, they agreed to adopt the principle which had been approved by the Committee of the House of Commons in the case of the Grove Road Bridge, that is to say-

- "That upon the Vestry contributing toward the extra cost "of the alteration, not exceeding in any event £1000, the
- "Company should make the alterations in the way desired by "the Vestry."

After the decision of the Committee of the House of Commons, in the case of the Grove Road Bridge, it seemed useless to fight the present one as the circumstances were almost identical.

In the last Report of the Vestry it was stated that the Vestry Grove-rd. of Bethnal Green and this Vestry had memorialized the Metropolitan Board of Works to contribute half the cost of the improvement to the Grove Road Bridge.

The Vestry are pleased to be able to state that the Metropolitan Board of Works agreed to and have contributed half the cost, so that this undoubted improvement has cost the Parish directly less than £400, including the expenses before the Parliamentary Committee.

The works having been completed by the Company, it became evident that the roadway and footway must be properly made up, and an estimate of the cost of the work has accordingly been prepared and amounts to about £650 altogether, including the part within the Parish of Bethnal Green.

The work is one which ought to be done as a whole, and negociations with that view have been opened with the Vestry of Bethnal Green.

The Vestry have every reason to believe that this work continues Dusting to be done in a more satisfactory manner to the parishioners, as Slopping. the complaints received are less numerous.

During the year Maidman Street and parts of Bow Common streets and Lane and Bridge Street have been made up at the expense of the at expense owners or occupiers of property therein.

Paving of owners,

The names Diamond Row, Redman's Row, Pleasant Row, Re-nam-Saville Buildings and Cecilia Place have been abolished, and the Re-numhouses re-numbered and all incorporated under the name Red-bering streets. mans Road.

As anticipated in the last Report, the Vestry have found it Paving necessary to take in hand some of the paving works included in ing up roads, &c. the first class therein mentioned.

These were Commercial Road, New Road, Stepney High Street, Stepney Green and Bridge Street.

In order to meet the expense of the said paving works, the Loan. Vestry determined to borrow the amount required, viz.: £4000.

The Vestry applied to the Metropolitan Board for liberty to do so and also requested that Board itself to advance the amount.

The license was granted and the Board offered to advance the money at 41 per cent. This rate of interest the Vestry thought very high, but were unable to get the amount at any less rate from any well-known source, and ultimately therefore accepted the offer of the Metropolitan Board, and the mortgage has been duly effected.

Loans generally.

A list of the loans outstanding will be found at the foot of the General Purposes Account at pages 48 and 49.

Openings and repair of roads by Public Companies.

During the year considerable annoyance and cost have been experienced by the proceedings of the Gas and Water Companies.

Several of the streets which had only recently been put into thorough repair were opened and not reinstated in a way which met with the approval of the Vestry or their Surveyor.

The Gas Light and Coke Company were by far the worst offenders, and they declined to employ a steam roller in reinstating roads where the steam roller had been employed when the road was made up by the Vestry.

Summons against Company.

The Vestry determined to try the question and summoned the Gas Light Company named before the Police Magistrate. At the hearing and Coke the Company produced a great number of witnesses to say that it would be dangerous to the pipes to use the steam roller and the Magistrate dismissed the summons.

> Subsequently the Company agreed that a horse roller might be used and this was accordingly done.

Four-mile radiusand Street Refuge.

During the year two suggestions were received by the Vestry which, in the opinion of the Vestry, would greatly conduce to the convenience of the public if carried out.

One was from the Home Secretary as to placing a Street Refuge in Mile End Road, near Sydney Street; the other was from the Commissioners of Police as to placing lamps at the four-mile radius, with a notice to that effect upon them.

The Vestry accordingly acceded to both suggestions and they are in the course of being carried out.

Gas to Public Lamps.

The Vestry have much pleasure in recording that the price of gas for the public lamps has been reduced from £4 6s. 3d. to £4 3s. od. per lamp per annum.

The Overseers, during the year, placed the Vestry Hall in rating Rating of for the first time. Hall.

The Vestry considered that the principle was wrong, and appealed to the Assessment Committee, but they confirmed the principle as to the propriety of the rating, but reduced the amount to £150 gross £125 rateable value.

At the request of the Parish Officers, the Vestry have taken Allowinto consideration what amount should be allowed to owners who ances to Owners contract under the Poor Rate Assessment and Collection Act, compound-1869, and resolved that the allowance should be 20 per cent. on Rates. all hereditaments, the rateable value of which should not be above £15.

The Vestry have been called upon to put the Artizans and Artizans Laborers' Dwellings Act, 1868, in force, in the cases of I to 6, Laborers' Regent Place, and 54 and 56, Maplin Street, but they are pleased Act, 1868 to be able to report that the owner has intimated his intention of pulling down the premises and thus abating the evil.

The Vestry have given full consideration to the sanitary require- Sewer ments of the Hamlet, and have executed many small but useful works. The principal work has been the reconstruction of the sewer at the back of Albert Road.

The sewer was on the boundary between the Hamlet and the Parish of Bethnal Green, and formed a continuation of the sewer in Cambridge Road which had already been re-constructed at the joint costs of Bethnal Green and the Hamlet.

This Vestry accordingly applied to the Bethnal Green Vestry to join in the costs of re-construction. For a long time the latter declined to do so, but at length consented.

The Vestry have to report with regret the outbreak of another Small-pox small-pox epidemic, which necessitated the making of temporary epidemic. provision in the Hamlet for the accommodation of persons suffering from the disease, as the Asylum Board Hospitals were unable to take in all the cases.

In the previous Report the Vestry noticed that negociations were in progress to join with the Poplar Board of Works in the ownership and use of the Hospital built by the latter Board at Plaistow.

The Sanitary Committee of this Vestry visited the Hospital on more than one occasion, and went minutely into the cost to this Hamlet which a joint ownership and occupation would entail,

having regard to the facts and figures presented by the Poplar Board, and came to the opinion that it would be at least £800 a year.

The Vestry resolved that it would not be advisable to join with the Poplar Board as proposed.

The fresh outbreak of small-pox pointed to the desirability of having some place immediately available for such a contingency, but the Vestry feel that it would be more economical to provide accommodation as necessity requires rather than embark in such a certain annual outlay.

Ambulance.

In consequence of the small-pox outbreak it became necessary to provide an extra ambulance, and the Vestry accordingly purchased a second-hand carriage and converted it to the purpose required.

Floodings.

In July, 1880, a violent storm took place, which again caused serious floodings in the houses in many parts of the Hamlet. The Vestry have made and will continue to make urgent representations to the Metropolitan Board of Works, to take steps to prevent the recurrence of these floods, and that Board will no doubt do so so soon as Parliamentary powers for the purpose have been obtained.

Vestry Hall.

The Vestry, during the vacation, caused the Hall to be repaired, and the contract for so doing was £178, but there is a large claim for extras which has not yet been settled.

Refreshments to Com-Survey.

For some long time objections have frequently been taken to the amount expended by Committees when out on survey, and in mittees on order to prevent the recurrence of these the Vestry resolved that a sum not exceeding five shillings per head should be allowed in such cases.

> The Vestry think that no Ratepayer will object to such a sum being allowed to gentlemen who give several hours work in the best part of the day for the benefit of the Parish.

Trafalgarsquare.

In the last Report of the Vestry it was stated that the Vestry had lodged an Appeal against the decision of the Vice Chancellor Malins, and that the Appeal awaited hearing.

Upon the Appeal coming on before the Lords Justices, they stated that having looked at the papers they thought the case clearly one for a compromise, and adjourned it for the purpose.

The Vestry did all in their power to effect the wishes of the

Lords Justices, and even went far beyond what they were advised but all to no purpose.

The Plaintiffs insisted on just such terms as they would get if they wholly succeeded, and accordingly after months of fruitless negociation the case had to be set down again for hearing.

It was finally heard on the 28th January, 1881, when the Appeal was allowed and the Plaintiffs' Bill dismissed with costs.

This result alone would fully justify the Vestry in the course they took, but the Lords Justices evidently considered the Vestry had not insisted on their legal rights only but were equitably entitled to the judgment.

The judgments given are, in the Vestry's opinion, so important that they beg to append copies thereof to this Report.

In the last Report (page 9), the Vestry gave an extract from the judgment of Vice Chancellor Malins, the concluding words of which were—"If the Plaintiffs had intended to put buildings "there I do not wonder at the Vestry objecting—it was their duty "to object—but the precise way in which they proceeded to "object does surprise me, because I am clearly of opinion that "that was wrong."

The Vestry would beg a comparison of those words with the judgments of the Lords Justices generally, but with those of James and Brett, L. JJ., in particular.

The Plaintiffs have given Notice of Appeal to the House of Lords, but up to the present time have taken no further steps towards prosecuting the Appeal. On the contrary, one of the Plaintiffs is personally trying to arrange terms, but the Vestry can only deal with solicitors who, so long as they are in the case, must be taken to represent both the Plaintiffs and through them the parties beneficially interested.

Having regard to the way in which they have been hitherto met, the Vestry will insist upon the Order of the Lords Justices being complied with before entering into further negociations.

The Vestry have, during the year, taken into consideration the Salary of salary of Mr. Baxter, and have increased it from £150 to £175 tendent of per annum.

Financial The Vestry now come to that part of their Report which, in the eyes of many, is the most important; namely, the financial.

They are sorry that they cannot report a decrease in the aggregate amount of all the rates, but they have pleasure in being able to state that the Vestry's own expenditure shows a decrease.

PoorRate. During the year the Poor Rate has been equal to 2s. 4d. in the £, as against 2s. 3d. in the £ in the two preceding years.

This increase is in the main due to the increased Call for the Asylum Board precept, over which the Parish have no direct control.

The precept does not claim for the whole year, as the School Board desire to avail themselves of the new Valuation List which came into force in April and so get the benefit of the increased assessments.

The Vestry hope that some means will be found to stop this continued increase, as, in the opinion of the Vestry, such enormous expenditure was never contemplated by the legislature.

The amount collected for the School Board for the year ending March, 1881, represents a sum equal to a rate of 7d. in the £.

As before frequently pointed out the sum required by the School Board has to be collected in the General Rate, and therefore if the 7d. in the \pounds for that purpose be deducted from the total of 1s. 1od. in the \pounds collected for the General Rate, it would leave 1s. 3d. in the \pounds as the amount required by the Vestry for its own purposes.

The Vestry's own expenditure would therefore be equal to is. 8d. in the \mathcal{L} only, which is a decrease of a id. in the \mathcal{L} over that of last year.

The following statement gives the Vestry's expenditure for its own purposes of the past seven years:—

With this sum the Vestry have met every claim on them for repayment of loans as well as current expenses, and the Vestry feel assured that the Ratepayers will admit that their attempts to reduce their expenditure have been to some extent successful.

The Vestry have again to report a small increase in the precept Consolifrom the Metropolitan Board of Works, as will be seen by the Rate. accompanying statement which, for convenience of reference, give the precepts of that Board since 1876:—

Whilst such largely increased Calls are made by such Boards as Expendithe School Board, the Metropolitan Board and the Asylums Board, ture generally, and other bodies outside the Hamlet, the Vestry cannot hold out any hopes to the Ratepayers of any diminution in the rates.

The Vestry and the Parochial Officers have for some time felt Equalizathat if they could not reduce the amount of the rates, they might Rates. perhaps, give the Ratepayers some relief by making the rates of a more equal nature; and, with a view of doing this, the Vestry

have determined, as an experiment, to make a half-yearly Call for the amounts they require, instead of a quarterly one as formerly. The Vestry have every belief that this will greatly assist the Parochial Officers in equalizing the rates, as they thereby get cognizance of all that will be required during the six months, and can make arrangements accordingly.

Officers' Reports.

The Vestry beg to refer to the separate Reports of their Officers presented herewith for more detailed statements of many of the subjects hereinbefore adverted to.

Printing

The Vestry had, from time to time, been informed that the Accounts. Abstract of Accounts prepared by the Auditors, and published with the Annual Report, did not contain such information as would enable any one to find out for himself the cost of any particular work. The Vestry accordingly resolved that the Accounts should be published in extenso, and the Report for the year 1879-80 not having been printed when such resolution was passed, the plan was adopted in publishing such Report.

The Vestry hope that it has been found advantageous.

The Accounts of the Vestry have been duly audited and allowed Accounts. by the Auditors, and are printed and published with the Report.

LORD JUSTICE JAMES.—(To Counsel of Appellants). I suppose you do not mean to pull down the rails if you get a decision in your favour that it is a highway.

Mr. Pearson.—No, my Lord, not if the Garden is kept in a proper

state.

LORD JUSTICE JAMES .- As long as it is kept a Garden?

Mr. Pearson.—All the Vestrymen said at the trial—and I am sure I may say as their mouthpiece here—that they desire the thing to be left, and we desire the thing to be left, and it is only because we are

bound to assert our right to protect the place.

LORD JUSTICE JAMES.—I have done all I posssibly can to induce the parties to come to some reasonable arrangement. Counsel have done the same. All those efforts having failed I think that we are obliged now to determine the matter according to the strict legal rights of the parties and upon that question of the strict legal rights of the parties I am bound to say that I am utterly unable to concur with the Judgment of the Vice-Chancellor. It appears to me that the suit was altogether occasioned by a most wrongful and unjustifiable intention on the part of the Plaintiffs to deal with the public highway inconsistently with the rights of the public, because I agree with the Vice-Chancellor -and really it has not been contended before us to the contrary-that, with the exception of the comparatively small space that was enclosed by the circle, the whole of the space between the houses and the circle was in fact a public place, a public highway, dedicated to the public, and over which the public had rights, which it is not competent for any authority to give away or to destroy. Well, that being so-that there was the public highway—the right to the public highway has never been lost, and in assertion of that right of a highway, the proper representatives of the public in the district, the Local Board who have now got the control of the ways, proposed, but not until they were challenged to it by an act on the part of the Plaintiffs, to assert the right of the public by taking down so much of the railings as would be necessary for it was not intended to do more than that—so much of the railings as would be sufficient to vindicate and to assert their right, giving the Plaintiffs notice of their intention in order that they might, if they liked, come into Court for the purpose of trying the right, for that is what I

consider that letter to be notice of. Immediately before the bringing of the action they said, "Well, if you think you are right and we are wrong, we give you notice. File your Bill for an injunction"-never meaning as I can make out, to do anything really except to have the right decided. And the right claimed by the Plaintiffs in that case was the right which was set up in answer to the Interrogatories. The right which they were setting up when they sent in plans of their buildings to the Metropolitan Board of Works was the right to have the thing treated as private property without respect to the rights of the public. In my opinion it was not private property. It was property subject to the public right. That was the right that was to be tried and intended to be tried from the first as between the Parish and the Plaintiffs. That right was decided against the Plaintiff. That right that was decided by the first part of the Judgment of the Vice-Chancellor it seems to me was decided against the Plaintiff. We are obliged to decide it the same way. But was there anything that precluded the Vestry, as a Vestry, from restoring the highway? It is said that they are bound by some act. They have acquiesced in or done something which made it inequitable in them to remove the railings. Now, what-ever was done, was done absolutely in disregard of notice. It was this, when the plans were submitted to the Vestry, the Vestry said, " No, we cannot allow it; because it is an encroachment on the highway, we cannot allow it." Possibly it may have been thought that if it was done by a man at his own risk and at his own expense, taking the risk of having to be dealt with as a nuisance by anybody else, and if it was seen that it was a great benefit to the persons that they represented, the Vestry would not interfere with it. And they did not. They never would have interfered with it if the matter had been left to be an enclosed garden of an ornamental character very much to the benefit and advantage of the houses of which the Plaintiffs are proprietors, which are, as I understand the houses in the Square itself surrounding this enclosed space—very much for the benefit of everybody.

I really cannot find, with all deference to what the Vice-Chancellor has said, anything wrong on the part of the Vestry from first to the last. I am bound to say that they have made very liberal offers here on behalf of the public, if the thing could be secured, and I think myself the result is that the Action must be dismissed and dismissed with costs, and the costs of the Appeal. That being the result, I should trust and hope that the Vestry would not think it their duty—and I do not think that they ought to consider it their duty—to restore it to a highway, which it was before, and as long as they have got the determination of their right which would probably prevent any future scheme of building, and as long as it is kept as an ornamental piece of ground—as it is an enclosed square—they will not proceed to act upon the right which I have declared to be theirs—that is to say that it is a highway, and that they were legally justified in removing the obstruction on the highway for

the assertion of the right.

LORD JUSTICE BRETT.—It seems to me that the Court and all the Counsel on both sides have done everything that they could do to save the Plaintiffs. The Plaintiffs will not be saved. There was a proposition that the matter should be left in the hands of the Counsel, and that they should refer to one member of this Court to say what was right to be done between the parties. That seems to me to have been the only proper and reasonable way of dealing with this matter; but it is declined. That is to say that Mr. Glasse was authorized—and he could go no further than his authority—to seem as if he acceded to that

but to put a condition in it which really made it a simulated submission to the Court, a submission which would only have postponed this law suit to a future occasion. Therefore we are driven to decide this matter according to law. That being so, there cannot be a question that the whole of this space, except the small round part in the centre, was dedicated to the public as a highway and accepted by the public as a highway. The proof of the acceptance of the public was that the public have used it, and that the surveyors of the highway have taken it into their hands and acted for the public. It was taken and accepted. From that moment it became a highway, and there was nobody who had any authority in any way legally to prevent it from continuing as a highway. It was a highway, and it is a highway now, according to law.

But then the owners of the property did encroach upon that highway by making the present square. I think that it is made out that although they were warned that they were doing it, yet, practically, as long as they would stand by the stipulations which they themselves had proposed, namely, that if they were not interrupted in encroaching on the highway they would make a square and keep it as a square without building upon it. The Vestry practically acceded to that. That is my view of it. The Vestry had no right to accede to that, so as to bind

the public, but, nevertheless, they did.

Then it is said that the Vestry have broken away from that arrangement. It seems to me as clear as possible that the Vestry have never broken away from that arrangement. It was the Plaintiffs who broke away from it. The Plaintiffs did publish an intention not to build themselves, but that is a mere equivocation, but to grant a lease to people who should build across this square and across that which had been and was still the highway. They took steps towards carrying out that intention. It seems to me that they really and practically have

never withdrawn from that intention.

Then what was the Vestry to do? The Vestry must oppose them in some way on behalf of the public. As I understand the Vice-Chancellor's judgment, he seems to say that the only way in which they ought to have done it was by applying for an injunction. It seems to me that there might have been considerable difficulties in that course. But they had another legal and proper mode of raising the question, and that was to abate the nuisance. That was their legal right. There is no equity against their doing it that I can see; and, therefore, when it is said that, when they exercised their legal right, provoked by the Plaintiffs proposing to do that which on their side was utterly illegal, and because the other side are proposing to do that which, under the circumstances, is legal and right for them to do, they should be enjoined against exercising their legal right. I can see no law which can support such a judgment; and therefore I agree with my lord that, as we are forced to give a jndgment, all we can do is to say that there ought to be no injunction against the Defendants.

LORD JUSTICE COTTON.—Certainly in this case, as, probably, in many others, it would have been much better for the parties to settle their differences without calling upon the Court to decide their rights; but, as all attempts at such settlement have been ineffectual, what the Court has to do, and the only thing it can do, is to declare the legal

rights of the parties.

Now the question is, "Can the Plaintiff here maintain a decree for restraining the Defendant from doing what they have asserted their right to do, that is to say, to take down certain railings in Trafalgar Square? The Vice-Chancellor's judgment—and I quite agree with it—

is, that down to the year 1865, the portion of the Square where these railings are was a part of the highway; that is to say, that the putting up of the railings there was a wrong which the public and the Vestry, as representing the inhabitants, would have a right to prevent. But the Vice-Chancellor decided—and it has been contended—that the

right of the Vestry has been lost by what has since taken place.

Now I do not here think it necessary to go into the question as to how far the Vestry could by acquiescence have bound themselves not to act as they are acting, or how far they might have prejudiced themselves, if what they acquiesced in had been continued; but if there was any acquiescence—(I can hardly see that there was)—it was an acquiescence in a proposal and plan of those whom the Plaintiffs now represent—if they were not the same persons—to put these iron railings up for the purpose of making within it an ornamental garden. And so long as that state or things continued, and was not proposed to be interferred with, the Defendants did no act inconsistent with what is

called their acquiescence.

But now, shortly before this action was commenced, the Plaintiffs proposed to give a building lease to a Gentleman who was proposing to build on part of this which was public highway down to the year 1865. The state of things was altered. If they had acquiesced they acquiesced in a state of things entirely different from that which the Plaintiffs were asserting their right to introduce; and, that being so, acquiescence was gone, and their right at the time of the commencement of this action must be as it was in the year 1865. They say this is part of the public highway, as in the opinion of the Vice-Chancellor (and in our opinion) it was. This is an obstruction, and they claim a right to remove that obstruction, and in my opinion, as the Vestry are right in that as it is an obstruction to the highway-the Plaintiffs, the owners of the property, can not call upon this Court to interfere and restrain the Vestry from exercising their legal right. Whether the Vestry, who, of course, have only the good of the parish in view, will, when their rights are declared, proceed in execution of those rights, to pull down the railings, is an entirely different question, but one on which this Court can now give no direction whatever. The Vestry in what they do, having ascertained their legal rights, must, as I have no doubt they will, be guided by what they think is for the benefit of the public and of the parish in which they are placed.

Mr. Pearson.—In the costs will be included the costs of the Motion for an injunction which there was and which were included in the costs.

Mr. Glasse.—They are costs in the cause, as a matter of course.

Lord Justice James.—We never include anything. We never give any special direction as to that. You will have your costs below and here.

Mr. Pearson.—I am not quite sure. It depends upon whether the motion was reserved for the hearing. I mean that your Lordship means to give them if necessary. We were ordered to pay them in the Court below. That is the reason that I ask for them here.

LORD JUSTICE JAMES .- You will have your costs. They will, of

course, include any costs of the injunction.

Mr. Pearson.—Then, my Lord, I do not know whether your Lordship will give me the costs of the shorthands writer's notes.

LORD JUSTICE JAMES .- That we never do; it requires a very

strong case.

Mr. Glasse.—A very strong case.

REPORT.

GENTLEMEN.

I have much pleasure in again submitting to you a statement of the works carried out in my department.

CARRIAGEWAY PAVING.

It has been necessary to replace the portion of the paving on the north side of Commercial Road, between a point short of the "George Public House" and the western boundary, part of the road repaired by the Vestry. The New Road has, by the ordinary wear, required repaving.

The portion of the Commercial Road above referred to was paved by the Tramway Company and represented the compensation to the St. George's Vestry, which they were entitled to under the Tramway Act, and which this Vestry had the benefit of when they arranged to keep this part of the road in repair for the St. George's Vestry they, taking in exchange, an equal area at the western end of the road.

This paving, which was 4-in. by 7-in. Rowley rag stone, was laid in 187.

The New Road was laid in 1852.

The work has been carried out under contract by Mr. Rutty in a satisfactory manner. The old stone arising from these works has been laid in Steel's Lane, Cadiz Street, Friendly Place, now Ely Terrace, and the crossings of the streets lying between the New Road and Philpot Street, Lady Lakes Grove and Assembly Passage.

The quantities laid were as follows:-

The cost of these works was £2,749 16s. od.

The paving laid by the Vestry in the Mile End and Commercial Roads has not yet required any repairs, except where openings have been made. These works, executed in the year 1873, will therefore pay a good interest upon the outlay as compared with the cost of macadamising them.

A contract is now in course of execution for paving the roadway of Stepney High Street and the footway of Stepney Green and Commercial Road.

I would strongly advise that a certain portion of the footways of the main thoroughfares should be replaced with new stone every year. By this means large outlays in one year will become unnecessary, and the present ratepayers will be bearing their proper proportion of the maintenance of the roads of the Hamlet. It must be remembered that money cannot be readily obtained for paving roads which are already paved, or for which money has once been borrowed.

Unless a proper proportion of the footways are repaved every year it must necessarily follow that occasionally large sums have to be expended for paving works; the money raised by loan, the largest portion of the interest of which has to be paid by the ratepayers who live in the Hamlet at that time.

The necessity of paving some of the most important streets in the Hamlet has been recently under your consideration, and I cannot too strongly urge upon you the advisability of paving Stepney Green and Devonshire Street at the earliest opportunity you think financial arrangements will permit.

In the present days when steam rolling has become quite a necessity in any civilized district, the advisability of paving the channels is a question of great importance, and this matter has been very fully considered by your Highway Committee, who have arranged the various streets into three classes, preference being given to those of the largest traffic.

The material laid in the channels of Bancroft Road a year ago does not show the slightest sign of wear—indeed there is practically no wear in a channel—and it is the cheapest and most regularly formed material for the purpose with which I am acquainted. It is the annealed slag from the iron furnaces in the Cleveland districts, and is a hard silicate of lime.

A few hundred pounds per annum spent in paving channels would soon repay the outlay, and would improve the appearance and sanitary condition of the roads.

ASPHALTE.

The footways laid with this material have been kept in repair by the Val de Travers and Sociétie Français des Asphalte Companies under their contract. The last length which gave way in the Mile End Road was replaced with York paving.

SCAVENGING ROADS.

It will be seen from the following tabular statement that a considerale saving has been effected in the drivers and fillers for slop carts. This is owing to the more favourable winter season of the present year. This has also led to a saving in the cost of horses for this purpose.

The Vestry now having the full number of horses for which their premises are constructed, the cost per day per horse is therefore reduced to 6s. 6d. as compared with 6s. 114d. for the year ending March, 188o.

The Vestry's horses worked 8756 days for one-horse and cost £2853 16s. 3d.—of this sum £433 4s. od. represented depreciation and interest on capital, and £2420 12s. 3d. keep of horses and establishment charges.

THE REMOVAL OF DUST.

The cost of removing dust from the Hamlet has increased nearly £160 upon the cost of last year. This is caused by the increase in the quantity of dust to be collected and the small amount received for sale of dust as compared with last year, and I anticipate that the current year will shew a still greater difference. This is owing to the variation in the market price of dust and ashes.

DISPOSAL OF STREET REFUSE.

The Vestry having been deprived of their shoot at Wick Lane which last year contributed so materially to reduce this item of expenditure, they, however, entered into an arrangement with the Great Eastern Railway Company, which has been very beneficial, and it will be seen that the cost during the past year does not amount to as much as it did in 1879, when the Vestry had to pay a large sum for the use of a shoot.

Sixteen new gullies have been constructed and connected with the sewers during the year.

Eighty-three houses have been connected with the sewers during the year.

The cost of cleansing the principal sewers and gullies of the Hamlet was £700 19s. 1d.

Three-hundred and seventy-five cubic yards of soil have been removed from the sewers and 453 yards from the gullies.



FOR THE YEAR 1880-81.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present the Twenty-fifth Annual Report upon the Public Health and Sanitary Condition of the Hamlet, for the year ending March, 1881.

BIRTHS.

The births registered during the 52 weeks were 4117, compared with 4298 and 4242 in the two previous years. They were most numerous during the fourth, and least during the first quarter of the year.

The natural increase of population or excess of births over deaths was 1841, showing a birth-rate of 37.42; the rate for the whole metropolis being somewhat lower, viz.: 36.2.

The relative number of males and females born and the births during each quarter are shown in Table I.

DEATHS.

The total deaths, 2276, show a decrease of 250, compared with those registered during the previous year. The annual rate of mortality per 1000 population living in the Hamlet was 20.69, compared with 22.96 for the previous year, and 22.2 for the whole metropolis.

Of the 2276 deaths, 387 occurred in the north, 567 in the east, 293 in the west, 528 in the centre, and 251 in the south wards; the remaining 250 occurred in the Workhouse. (See Table V.)

Of the 4117 children born in the Hamlet, 649 died during the first year of life, being 15.58 per cent. of the registered births, and nearly 29 per cent. of the total deaths.

The number of deaths of children under 5 years of age was 1089; this represents about 47 per cent. of the entire mortality.

The deaths were registered of 280 persons over 70 years of age; the greatest age attained being 97. Reference to Table IV will show the mortality at other ages.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

From the eight principal zymotic diseases, 368 deaths occurred, compared with 413 for the previous year; the death-rate being 3.34 as is shown in Table III. Whilst the above figures represent all the deaths which actually occurred in the Hamlet from these diseases, they do not include the deaths from small-pox and fever which occurred to patients who had been removed to the various hospitals from this Hamlet—of these deaths I have no record. Reference to the Sanitary Inspector's Report will give some idea of the measures taken to prevent the spread of this class of diseases. Thus the number of houses disinfected was 136 and the number of articles of bedding and clothing disinfected was 720.

SMALL POX.

The deaths from small-pox in London for the last four years have been as follow:—

During the first three months of the year 1880, the number of cases of small-pox was inconsiderable, but steadily increased during the months of April, May, June and July. During the next three months the disease rapidly declined until, in October, the number of cases only slightly exceeded those during the first three months of the year. In November, the disease again increased and quickly spreading, had, by the end of the year, assumed the proportions of an epidemic; which, at the time I write, is still raging, not only in Mile End but the whole metropolis. I have caused every means at my disposal to be used to limit the epidemic in this Hamlet; every case was enquired into by competent persons; the occupiers of the infected houses provided with printed instructions as to isolation and other sanitary precautions; all cases of non-vaccinated children coming to my knowledge were at

once reported to Mr. Matthews, the Vaccination Officer; the adults in infected houses urged, in a great many instances successfully, to avail themselves of the protection afforded by re-vaccination; and the Board and other school officials informed of those houses in which infectious disease existed in the vicinity of the several schools. From the result of the enquiries I found that a very large proportion of the cases in the early stages of this epidemic originated in houses occupied by customhouse officials, dock labourers, and persons engaged in cleansing and making up imported articles, such as feathers, etc. It would appear from this that the epidemic may have been sustained or even originated through these channels. This is a subject which merits further consideration and investigation, although it would of course be attended by great difficulties.

Until January, 1881, the cases were for the most part sent to hospital at the expense of the Vestry, but latterly the Guardians have undertaken the removal of all patients who are unable to pay the fees for the private hospital. In March, 1881, all the small-pox hospitals were full, and much difficulty was experienced in getting the patients removed. Sometimes a case had to be kept at home in a house occupied by several families for many days until a vacancy occurred in one of the hospitals. In many instances where this was the case, the disease spread not only to other occupants of the infected house but to several houses in the same streets. This should surely teach us the value of small-pox hospitals. When a case is treated at home the house becomes a centre of infection, for it is impossible to efficiently isolate patients in small crowded houses; and when we consider that washing, mangling, tailoring and many similar businesses are frequently carried on in the same house, sometimes even in the same room which a small-pox patient is occupying, perhaps for several days before the case is reported to the Medical Officer, it becomes apparent how very serious the danger of extension must be. It may be urged that a small-pox hospital is also a centre of infection; that it is so to a certain extent may be correct—that it ought not to be I assert without hesitation; and should these hospitals ever be closed the consequences must be most serious, unless, indeed, the public could be taught to understand that, rigid sanitation, aided by efficient vaccination and re-vaccination, are an absolute protection from, and prevention against, the disease; and even then the un-vaccinated population (viz.: newly-born infants), must always be very considerable. In March, the Guardians came to our assistance by opening the infectious wards of the Workhouse Infirmary for the reception of these cases. Thirty-two cases were treated there, and of these two died. Considering the difficulties experienced by the authorities in providing nurses and attendants at so short a notice, the sanitary and other arrangements were carried out in a most satisfactory manner under the able superintendence of the Medical Officer in charge, Dr. Atkins, Jun., to whom I was indebted for daily reports at this period. When the last patient was discharged the wards were disinfected and cleansed. Not a single case in private dwelling-houses in the immediate neighbourhood of the Infirmary was reported to me, thus showing what can be done to prevent the spread of the disease in the vicinity of small-pox hospitals when the proper sanitary measures are adopted.

During the twelve months ending March 31st, 1881, sixty-four patients were removed to hospital from this Hamlet, and 13 deaths occurred

from this disease in Mile End, including 2 in the Infirmary and 11 in private dwelling-houses.

N.B.—The street nomenclature has been considerably altered since the epidemic of 1877—8, but to facilitate comparison the old names are here used in many instances.

MEASLES AND SCARLET FEVER.

The mortality from these diseases shows a marked decrease compared with the mortality occasioned by them during the previous year; thus 65 persons died of measles, compared with 97 for the previous year, and scarlet fever caused 94 deaths only, compared with 134 for the previous year.

WHOOPING COUGH AND DIARRHŒA.

The deaths from whooping cough and diarrhoa were slightly in excess of those which occurred in the previous year, but on the whole the mortality statistics must certainly be regarded with satisfaction, and may fairly be attributed to a great extent to efficient sanitary work.

Diseases of the organs of respiration caused 420 deaths, and of these 155 occurred during the last quarter of the year, during the very inclement weather which we experienced at that period.

ARTIZANS' AND LABOURERS' DWELLINGS ACT, 1868.

I have reported under the provisions of this Act once during the year, viz., six houses in Regent's Place, Maplin Street. I considered these houses to be in a condition dangerous to health and unfit for human habitation, and recommended the usual proceedings to be taken under the Act, and the necessary work was completed under the advice and supervision of your Surveyor.

NEW BUILDINGS, DWELLINGS, &c.

The following dwelling houses and public buildings have been erected in the Hamlet during the year ending March, 1881. For this return I am indebted to Mr. Charles A. Legg, the District Surveyor to the Metropolitan Board.

WATER SUPPLY.

Samples of the water delivered in Mile End by the East London Company have been frequently analysed by Drs. Tidy and Frankland, and have been found of good quality.

During the year I received many notices from the Company of the removal of the supples to private houses for the non-payment of rates due to the Company. The want of a proper water supply constitutes a nuisance dangerous to health, and in every case I recommended that notice be served to re-instate the supply.

In continuation of my remarks upon the water supply, I may observe with reference to the views and recommendations of Colonel Bolton, in a recent monthly report, I have repeatedly called attention in my reports to the danger and injury to health arising from uncovered and dilapidated water-butts and cisterns; however, they are happily becoming obsolete in this district through the extension of the constant water suppply sytem. I do not, however, consider the present flushingbox arrangement under the constant supply system as sufficiently perfect to ensure safety from contamination of the water by sewer gases, although the apparatus, valves, &c., may appear practically to secure immunity from water contamination; they are not sufficiently so, they often get out of order, the box may get full of gas which may be absorbed directly into the supply pipe, and in fact the water in the mains-an improvement would be to have a separate cistern outside the closet in addition to that inside, and no connexion with the house supply.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT.

Cases of foot and mouth disease occurred in several cowsheds in this Hamlet, but having received early information from the Metropolitan Board of Works, and visited the premises, I cautioned the owners to use every precaution that none of the milk from the infected animals should be in any way used for human consumption in accordance with section 8 of the above Act. I believe my instructions were followed in every case, and the disease soon disappeared. I may here add that the milk supplied to Mile End appears to be of good quality. I have certainly failed to trace any case of infectious disease to this source, or of adulteration in any of the samples submitted to me for analysis.

In conclusion, I shall not attempt to unduly extend my report by extracts from those of Government officials, but simply congratulate the Vestry and Public of the Hamlet upon the continued maintenance of the prestige of Mile End Old Town for the low death-rate it has so long enjoyed.

I beg to tender my thanks to the Vestry, Sanitary Committee, and Officers for their support and assistance in carrying out the responsible and arduous duties I have been called upon to perform during the successive and variedly continuous small pox epidemics which have existed for the past 10 or 12 years.
