



PADDINGTON.

The Parish of Paddington, in the County of Middlesex, extends Northward from the Marble Arch to Kilburn Gate; and Westward from the Marble Arch to Kensington Palace Gardens; it is bounded on the North by Willesden; on the South by St. George's, Hanover Square, and St. Margaret, Westminster; on the East by Marylebone; and on the West by Kensington and St. Luke, Chelsea; its length from North to South being nearly Two Miles, and its superficial extent about 1,280 acres. The Parish is within the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Board of Works, to which Board it returns One Member; and its management is vested in Seventy-Two Elected Vestrymen, who meet at the Vestry Hall, Harrow Road, on the first and third Tuesdays in each month (August excepted) for the transaction of their ordinary business. For parochial purposes the Parish is divided into Four Wards, the boundaries of which are as follow; viz.:—

WARD ONE. ALL that portion of the Parish which lies within a line drawn along the centre of Harrow Road from the point at which the same intersects the boundary of the said Parish, and thence along the centre of such Road to a point directly opposite the centre of the Road on Westbourne Terrace Bridge, and thence along the centre of such Road and of Westbourne Terrace, to the centre of Bishop's Road, and thence Westward along the centre of Bishop's Road and Westbourne Grove to the West boundary of the said Parish at the point where the same intersects the centre of Westbourne Grove, and thence Northward continuously along the said boundary to the point mentioned at the commencement of the foregoing description.

WARD

ALL that portion of the said Parish which lies North of Ward No. 1 and a line drawn from the boundary of such Ward Southward along the centre of Westbourne Terrace to a point directly opposite the West end of the centre of Craven Road, and thence along the centre of Craven Road and Praed Street, and thence in a direct line to the boundary of the said Parish.

WARD THREE. ALL that portion of the said Parish which lies South of Ward No. 1 and a line drawn from the boundary of such Ward Southward along the centre of Westbourne Terrace, Sussex Gardens, and Westbourne Street, and thence in a direct line to the boundary of the said Parish.

WARD FOUR. ALL that portion of the said Parish which is not comprised within the foregoing descriptions of the other Wards.

Under the Reform Bill of 1832, Paddington was united with the adjoining Parishes of St. Marylebone and St. Pancras, such incorporation being called the Boro' of Marylebone, and returning Two Members to Parliament.

In the year 1870, upon the passing of the Elementary Education Act, the Parish, together with St. Marylebone, St. Pancras, and St. John, Hampstead, were united into a District called the District of Marylebone, for the purposes of the School Board for London, such District returning Seven Members to the Board.

The Parochial Workhouse is situated in the Harrow Road, near the Lock Hospital premises, its management being in the hands of Eighteen Guardians, elected annually, together with the resident Justices of the Peace. The Schools for the Workhouse children are at Ashford, near Staines; Paddington having been united by the Poor Law Board with St. George, Hanover Square, and Fulham, to form a District called the West London School District.

The Cemetery for the Parish is at Willesden, and is managed by a Board consisting of Nine Members appointed by the Vestry, such Board meeting at the Vestry Hall on the first Friday in each month.

For Registration purposes, Paddington has been divided by the Registrar General into the St. Mary's District and the St. John's District. The divisional line of the two districts traverses the centre of the road in Praed Street, from Edgware Road to the Canal Basin, continues thence along the centre of the Canal Basin as far as the Bishop's Road, and passes Westward from thence along the centre of the Bishop's Road and Westbourne Grove to the Western boundary of the Parish; the St. Mary's District lying on the North, and the St. John's District on the South of such divisional line.

For the purpose of providing the Parish with Public Baths and Wash-houses, Commissioners have been appointed by the Vestry, and Baths in the Queen's Road were opened in May, 1874, on the site of premises formerly numbered 143 and 145.

The Gas consumed in Paddington is supplied by The Gas Light and Coke Company, and the Water by two Companies, viz.:-the Grand Junction Waterworks Company and the West Middlesex Waterworks Company.



GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit this, my Annual Report, in reference to the chief works executed, and the various business transactions in this Department, during the year ended Lady-day, 1878.

Highways.

The removal of a house, and shortening the fore-courts in front of several adjoining houses on the South side of Moscow Road, near the Queen's Road, at the cost of the Vestry and the Metropolitan Board of Works, have been the means of widening the Carriage-way and Foot-paths there.

At the western end of South Wharf Road, the macadamized roadway has been removed, and new granite cube paving substituted; thereby reducing the quantity of mud and dirt, and effecting a sanitary improvement there.

The Carriage-way in Uxbridge Road, at Porchester Gate, has been improved by the removal of the macadamized road, and substitution of Henson's Wood Paving.

In the entrances of several Mews, the complaints respecting the loose condition of the gravel and granite surface of the roadways, were removed by substituting wooden block paving, and the joints thereof grouted with hydraulic lime.

The channels and crossings in various streets were paved with new granite cubes. The existing carriageway paving in many places have been relaid and repaired where necessary.

In many parts of the parish, the footway pavements were taken up, relaid and repaired with new flags, to meet the requirements of increasing traffic in the principal thoroughfares.

On the south side of Uxbridge Road fronting No. 1 to No. 6, Kensington Palace Gardens, the foot-way hitherto repaired with gravel, has been flagged and thereby much improved.

The diversion of Vehicular traffic during the repair of roadways, subject to the consent of the Metropolitan Board, greatly facilitated the works, and with the aid of our Steam Road Roller, the road metalling has been rapidly consolidated.

The completion of certain new streets has increased the extent of the parish roadways to 43 miles, 4 furlongs, 81 yards.

The repeated opening of the roads and foot-ways by Gas and Water Companies and others, is still a source of much inconvenience to the public, and requiring a vast amount of supervision by the Vestry's Officers in restoring the streets. The number of places opened and reinstated during the year, is 2,376.

Buildings, Sewers, and Drains.

Forty-four Notices from various persons were received by the Vestry for the erection of 170 Buildings, namely:—1 Greek Church, 1 Synagogue, 165 Houses, and 3 Stables, in accordance with the 76th Section of the Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855. Orders of Vestry for the drainage of these Buildings have been served upon the parties concerned, and copies of such Orders attached to the Notices, are filed at the Vestry Hall for future reference.

Three miles and one hundred and sixty-one yards of stoneware drain pipes, have been laid down to 157 of the above mentioned Buildings, at an approximate cost to the owners of the property of £1459 16s. 0d.

Eighty-six drains have been re-constructed under the public roads and footways from Houses and other Buildings on the application of the Owners or Occupiers thereof, and such works were executed by the Vestry's Contractor at their expense. Brick Sewers of the capacity of 3'9" × 2'6" together with side entrances and air openings as were required have been constructed by, and at the cost of private persons, in the undermentioned Streets, viz:—

LANHILL ROAD, WARLOCK ROAD, and PINDOCK MEWS.

The Sewer in the Mews has been constructed in lieu of unauthorized 9" pipe drainage.

Ninety-two feet of 15" pipe Sewer has been laid in Elms Lane, Uxbridge Road, at a lower level than the 12" pipe Sewer which previously existed there, for the purpose of improving the surface and other drainage; and also to obtain more efficient drainage for the Mansion at the south east corner of the Lane. These Works were carried out at the joint expense of the Vestry and the Owner of the House in question.

To improve the drainage from the small brick Sewer in the rear of Houses in Maida Vale, between No. 103 and Clifton Road, the outlet of the Sewer has been diverted by means of 12" pipes laid along passage way between Nos. 101 and 103, at a lower level, and connected with the large brick Sewer in Maida Vale, opposite No. 105 at the expense of the Vestry.

In order to improve the ventilation of the Sewers on the east and west sides of the Church at Lancaster Gate, which terminated with head walls, a connection has been made by constructing a length of Sewer at the north end thereof, with a side entrance, at the Vestry's cost.

Three hundred and seventy-three distinct Works, relative to the repair of sewers and gulleys, laying pipe drains and fixing traps, were executed at a cost of £1,947 18s. 8d. This sum includes £692 11s. 8d. received from owners or occupiers of houses, for laying drain pipes under the public foot-ways and road-ways, in connection with house drains, constructing gulleys in new streets, and fixing traps at outlets of drains.

One hundred and ninety-seven subjects of complaints have been received, with reference to the condition of house and gulley drains, and other matters, which were promptly attended to.

In addition to the before mentioned works, one hundred and twenty examinations were made from sewers, as to alleged stoppages in house drains; also as to their general condition and construction under roadways and footways, and whether trapped at sewers. The results were made known to the applicants who paid the expenses incurred for such examinations.

The sewers which required flushing with water to maintain them in a good sanitary condition, have been attended to as often as considered necessary, and with beneficial effects.

A certain number of workmen in the employ of the Vestry, are constantly engaged in the operations of cleansing the sewers, gulley drains, and catch pits; and have during the year removed heavy deposits from the brick sewers, amounting to 180 loads, which impeded the flow of sewage. These deposits were raised to the surface of the roads and carted away. There has also been removals of deposits from 29,396 catch pits and street gulleys, being at the rate of about 94 gulleys per day.

The seven public Urinals, which have a dribbling water apparatus attached to them, are kept in an efficient and cleanly condition by the Vestry's Workmen.

Improvements in the sewers and street gulleys have been continued, and the following works carried out, viz.:—



I beg to submit my Fourth Annual Report, ending Lady-day, 1878, relative to the working of this Department.

The Average Meter System, which has now been in force nearly five years, still continues to work satisfactorily.

During the year only 80 Notices were served on the Gas Company for the rectification of defective supplies and stoppages in their service pipes, being a decrease of 53 as compared with the previous year; showing that the services are now maintained more efficiently than was formerly the case.

The accompanying tables will shew the number of defects &c., that have been reported during the past year:—

GENTLEMEN,

In furnishing a Report on the working of the Dusting Department, perhaps it may not be considered out of place to refer to the practice formerly adopted by the Contractors in collecting the dust and ashes of It appears the dustmen were permitted to the Parish. choose their own districts, consequently only particular portions of the Parish were attended to, sometimes twice a week, and in cases where the men knew they would obtain a gratuity, oftener. Other localities were neglected for one or two months together, or until such times as complaints were made, or the Contractors urgently required the dust for manufacturing purposes, then a number of carts would be sent into the work and the bins cleared. It was deemed necessary to divide the Parish into districts, and the districts into parts, so as to admit of each cart passing through every

street in the Parish, once weekly. By this arrangement, householders were enabled to have the dust removed on the regular day, especially if they placed the D card in their windows. Altering the men's system of doing their work, as might be expected, was at first resisted by them, they objecting to any alteration. Consequently a partial strike was the result, but this difficulty having been overcome, and the new arrangement of working insisted upon, it is now found by experience to answer with advantage, although occasional complaints are made, which upon investigation, are often found to be very trivial.

For a time, instructions were given to the men to call at all houses on their rounds. This arrangement however, had in a great measure to be discontinued as in some cases it was appreciated, but the majority considered it a great nuisance, remarking that when they required their dust removing, they would call the men.

Referring to the working expenses of this Department for the second year, ending Lady-day 1878, advantageous results have been obtained in consequence of the Dust shoot being within the Parish. It will be seen by the accompanying statement that the work has been executed for £1,709 14s. 11d. less than the first year when the dust was taken to Wood Lane; not-withstanding, 62 more loads have been collected, and this amount would have been increased by £375 7s. 0d. more if it had been possible at March 1877 to have

made the same terms with Messrs. Tildesley and Minter as was subsequently done after the delivery of 6,000 loads of dust. Had such been the case, the entire dusting would only have cost £2,807 7s. 6d. being £272 12s. 6d less than the last contract price tendered for doing the dusting of the Parish.

The before mentioned saving, has in a great measure been obtained by utilizing the spare horses in carting road materials for the Highway Department, removal of trade refuse, sale of stable manure and rough dust.







FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Vestry of the Parish of Paddington.

GENTLEMEN,

The rate of mortality in the Parish of Paddington, in London, and generally throughout England and Wales, during the year 1878, has been higher than that which obtained during the previous year, the latter having been an exceptionally healthy one. Too much importance, however, ought not to be attached to fluctuations in the death-rate from year to year. A hot summer, which gradually raises the temperature of rivers, some of which have been correctly designated open sewers, to 65° Fahr., or thereabouts, is sure to occasion numerous deaths from diarrhœa, and probably hastens the fatal termination of other exhaustive diseases, such as phthisis, cancer, &c. A prolonged winter, with its increment of fogs, and damp, and great variations of temperature, favours the occurrence of diseases of the respiratory organs, and necessarily augments the number of deaths from those diseases,

particularly in the case of the very young and of the very aged. Such an increase of mortality is obviously due to meteorological conditions; and although these are now-a-days foretold with increasing accuracy, against them precautions only can be adopted, as over them no immediate and direct control can be exerted. Assuming the existence of the ordinary conditions of life, the healthiness of a district or of a population can best be judged, and is at the same time more fairly indicated, by the decennial rate, and that more especially in connexion with zymotic diseases.

During the 52 weeks of the registration year, ending Saturday, 28th December, 1878, 2,871 births, and 1,927 deaths were registered in Paddington. Deducting 166 deaths of non-parishioners in the two Hospitals in the parish from the total deaths (1,927), the natural increase of population from the excess of births over deaths is seen to be 1,110. To this increase must be added the further number contributed by immigration. The number of inhabitants of the parish in the middle of last year may be estimated at 111,527, allowing 72,525 to St. Mary's Sub-district, and 39,002 to St. John's.

Of the 2,871 births, which were 50 fewer than in the previous year, 2,144 were registered in the Subdistrict of St. Mary's, and 727 in that of St. John's; the number of male children being 1,539, and of female 1,332. The proportion of the sexes was 100 males to 87 females, whereas in the Metropolis it was 100 males to 96 females.

In St. Mary's the proportion was 100 males to 89 females, and in St. John's 100 males to 80 females. The births were most numerous during the first, and least so in the second quarter of the year. The ratio of births to the entire population of the parish was 1 birth to 39 inhabitants, or a birth-rate of 25.7 per 1,000 of the population. The birth-rate for London was 36.2

In St. Mary's District the ratio of births to the population was 1 to 34 persons living, or a birth-rate of 29.6 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In St. John's the ratio of births to the population was 1 to 54 persons *living*, or a birth-rate of 18.6 per 1,000.

Most of the preceding particulars are shown in the subjoined table:—

The birth-rate for 1878 was lower than that of any one of the ten previous years. The decennial birth-rate in Paddington 1868—77 was 28.4 per 1,000.

Of the 1,927 deaths registered in the parish, 3 occurred in the Lock Hospital, and 230 in St. Mary's

Hospital. As 2 of those who died in the Lock Hospital, and 164 of those who died in St. Mary's Hospital, were non-parishioners, the corrected number of deaths of parishioners in Paddington during the year is 1,761.

Of these 1,761 deaths, 1,250 occurred in St. Mary's Sub-district, and 511 in St. John's. The 1,250 deaths in St. Mary's, include the 1 death in the Lock Hospital, and 153 deaths—79 males and 74 females—in the Workhouse. The 511 deaths in St. John's include the 66 deaths of parishioners, which happened in St. Mary's Hospital.

The deaths were most numerous during the first, and least so in the third quarter of the year.

The subjoined table shows the ratio of deaths to the population, and the death-rate per 1,000 in the whole parish, and in its two sub-districts:—

The deaths of parishioners in Hospitals and other places outside the parish not being known to me, no allowance is made for such in calculating the death-rate. Were such deaths taken into consideration, it would be necessary as a set-off to ascertain, if possible, the number of deaths in the parish in other places than its public institutions, of persons who are not parishioners.

Many persons come to town at all seasons of the year for business or pleasure, or it may be to obtain medical treatment; others pass through London on their way to different parts of the country. Of these, not a few reside for some days or weeks in the parish, and it has often happened that they have died of diseases contracted elsewhere, and thus, though merely sojourners in Paddington, their deaths have been included amongst those of parishioners.

DEATHS AND DEATH-RATES.

As already stated, the low death-rates of 1877 have not been maintained in 1878, either in the Metropolis, or in the larger English towns. In Paddington, as is shown in Table II., the percentages of the deaths of infants under one year, and of children under five years of age, are respectively higher than in 1877. This is to be regretted, seeing that such percentages, as has been stated in former reports, are a primary and palmary test, both of the sanitary condition of the homes of a community, and to some extent of the comfortable surroundings of those homes.

Table III. shows that from various causes 432 infants, or 15 per cent of the children born in the Parish, died during their first year of life; and that 697 children, being 39 per cent., or two-fifths of the total deaths, died under five years of age. In London 21,176 deaths, constituting more than one-fourth of the total deaths (83,695) were those of children under one year of age. The death rate also from the seven principal Zymotic diseases alone was, in London, 4·1 per 1,000 living at all ages; whereas in Paddington, as shewn in Table IV., it was 2·2 per 1,000 of the population.

SMALL-POX.

The epidemic of this disease, which began in the autumn of 1876 and ceased in 1879, occasioned in London, in 1878, 1,416 deaths, of which 897 took place in small-pox hospitals. In the 19 largest provincial towns, only 17 deaths occurred. In Paddington, during the year under review, there were but three fatal cases;

two registered in St. Mary's sub-district, and one in St. John's. 68 patients, 48 from St. Mary's, and 20 from St. John's, were conveyed to the hospitals; 26 to the Small-Pox and Vaccination Hospital at Highgate, and 42 to the Hospitals of the Metropolitan Asylum Board at Fulham and Hampstead. A table in my last report gives some further particulars respecting 62 of these 68 cases. The subjoined table disposes of the remaining six cases brought under the notice of the Sanitary Authority in 1878, also of 25 cases in 1879; and thus far completes the statistics which I am able to give of the recent epidemic of small-pox in Paddington:—

How many of those treated in the Hospitals died, or what proportion those therein treated bore to those attended at their own homes, I am unable to say.

MEASLES.

Measles was less fatal than in the previous year, causing 27 deaths, which was at the rate of 15.3 per 1,000 deaths from all causes, whilst in London during the same period it occasioned 18 in every 1,000 deaths.

SCARLET FEVER.

Scarlet Fever caused 42 deaths, being at the rate of 23.8 per 1,000 deaths, as compared with 21.4 from the same disease in the Metropolis.

DIPHTHERIA.

Diphtheria caused 11 deaths, being at the rate of 9.1 per 1,000 deaths, whereas in the Metropolis the proportion was 6.6 per 1,000 of the total deaths.

WHOOPING COUGH.

Whooping Cough was more than usually fatal in the Metropolis. In Paddington 74 deaths resulted from it, which is at the rate of 42 per 1,000 of the total deaths. In London the proportion from the same disease was 53.1 in every 1,000 deaths. The greater number of these deaths may be fairly attributed to improper exposure to cold.

FEVER.

Fever in its three forms of typhus, typhoid, and simple continued fever caused 26 deaths. From

enquiries which I made at the time, I satisfied myself that the death registered as one of typhus fever could not properly be so regarded. Of the typhoid fever cases some without doubt were imported into the parish, others were incorrectly described, and in some of the remaining cases an investigation into the condition of the houses wherein the deaths occurred failed to discover the cause of the disease.

DIARRHŒA.

Forty-six of the 52 fatal cases were childen under two years of age, and therefore may be considered as cases of infantile diarrhoea. The proportion of deaths in Paddington was 29.5 per 1,000 deaths; in London it was 45 per 1,000 of the total deaths in the year.

VACCINATION.

In Table VII., supplied by the Vaccination Officer, Mr. Dudman, will be found the vaccination statistics of the year. As confirmatory of the correctness of the opinion expressed by me in former Reports, of the efficacy, as a prophylactic measure, of vaccination, followed in due course by re-vaccination, I append a copy of a letter addressed to the Sanitary Authority by the Metropolitan Asylum Board:—

SMALL-POX.

SIR,—The severe nature of the Small-Pox epidemic which visited London during the autumn of 1876, and prevailed with more or less intensity during the whole of 1877 and 1878 and part of 1879, induced

the Managers of the Metropolitan Asylum District-upon whom, in their official capacity, devolved the treatment of a large proportion of the infected-to collect certain statistical facts, which illustrate the advantages of efficient vaccination and re-vaccination, as evidenced by the experiences of the medical superintendents of the several Small-Pox Hospitals under the control of the Board. The observations of these gentlemen confirm former opinions on the subject, and establish beyond doubt the mitigating influences in Small-Pox cases of successful primary vaccination, and the preventive powers of efficient re-vaccination. The total number of Small-Pox patients treated in the various Hospitals of the Managers. from the outbreak of the epidemic in 1876 until the commencement of the present month, has been 15,171, of whom 11,412 were vaccinated, and 3,759 unvaccinated, and it is believed that for each case treated in the Board's Hospitals another was privately attended-hence some idea may be formed of the magnitude of the epidemic. The total number of deaths which occurred in the Hospitals during the period under consideration was 2,677. Of these 1,008 were vaccinated, and 1,669 were unvaccinated cases. The per-centage mortality upon the whole of the admissions was, therefore, 17.6, being at the rate of 8.8 per cent. of the vaccinated, and no less than 44.4 per cent. of the unvaccinated.

It may be observed that among the 11,412 vaccinated patients admitted are included the majority of those who stated that they had been vaccinated, but upon whom no traces of vaccination were discernible. No case of small-pox has come within the cognisance of either of the medical superintendents of any person who had been efficiently vaccinated and successfully re-vaccinated. The nurses and servants employed from time to time at the various hospitals during the epidemic have enjoyed almost absolute immunity from infection, and the few-some half-dozen amongst nearly 1,000-who contracted the disease whilst discharging their duties had, from some cause or other, escaped re-vaccination before entering the wards. Experience has therefore irrefutably proved that were vaccination efficiently performed in infancy, within the period prescribed by the Vaccination Act, and re-vaccination successfully accomplished at puberty, small-pox, instead of being, as it is at present, a common and extremely fatal disease, would be a comparatively rare one, and so little fatal, that few, if any, deaths would result from it.

SANITARY WORK.

The ability of the Sanitary Inspectors is very generally recognised by the parishioners. Accordingly, besides inspecting houses and premises, investigating complaints, removing infectious cases, and disinfecting apartments, &c., much of their time is occupied in discovering the cause of nuisances, particularly in connexion with house drains, and in subsequently directing and supervising their improvement—duties which some might think (as stated in my first Report) properly belonged to a surveyor. Some of the items of their work are shown in Table VI.

WATER.

The Grand Junction and the West Middlesex Companies supply Paddington with water obtained from the Thames. Three other Companies—the Chelsea, the Southwark, and the Lambeth - take their supplies from the same source. The New River and East London Companies deliver water from the Lea. The Kent Company draws its water from deep wells, as do the Colne Valley Company, and the Tottenham Local Board of Health. Of the Thames waters, the Chelsea Company delivered the best, and the Grand Junction Company the worst. For the first time in ten years, the water sent out by the West Middlesex Company was on one occasion slightly turbid. During the year, the Thames and the Lea were much more polluted by organic matters than they were in the year 1877, and in the months of January, May, June, July, September, November and December, the former was so much

polluted as to be unfit for dietetic purposes. The Thames was often in high flood even in summer, and much filthy matter, ordinarily retained in sewers and cesspools during the summer months, was swept into the river.

In June and December the Lea water was also unsuitable for dietetic purposes.

The deep well water, supplied by the Kent and Colne Valley Companies, and by the Tottenham Local Board, is unaffected by animal or vegetable life; and as it is exhaustively filtered and purified by percolation through great thicknesses of porous strata, artificial filtration is unnecessary. Throughout the year it was uniformly clear, transparent and wholesome, and of most excellent quality for dietetic purposes.

For the preceding observations, as well as for the information conveyed in the annexed Tables, shewing the condition of the London waters, I am indebted to Dr. Frankland's Annual Report to the Registrar General.

The demand for a pure, cheap, and constant supply of water is increasing; but public opinion has not yet matured as to how that supply can best be obtained.



METROPOLIS LOCAL MANAGEMENT ACT.

REPORT OF THE VESTRY,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 25TH MARCH,

1879.

PADDINGTON.

The Parish of Paddington, in the County of Middlesex, extends Northward from the Marble Arch to Kilburn Gate; and Westward from the Marble Arch to Kensington Palace Gardens; it is bounded on the North by Willesden; on the South by St. George's, Hanover Square, and St. Margaret, Westminster; on the East by Marylebone; and on the West by Kensington and St. Luke, Chelsea; its length from North to South being nearly Two Miles, and its superficial extent about 1,280 acres. The Parish is within the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Board of Works, to which Board it returns One Member; and its management is vested in Seventy-Two Elected Vestrymen, who meet at the Vestry Hall, Harrow Road, on the first and third Tuesdays in each month (August excepted) for the transaction of their ordinary business. For parochial purposes the Parish is divided into Four Wards, the boundaries of which are as follow; viz.:—

WARD ONE. ALL that portion of the Parish which lies within a line drawn along the centre of Harrow Road from the point at which the same intersects the boundary of the said Parish, and thence along the centre of such Road to a point directly opposite the centre of the Road on Westbourne Terrace Bridge, and thence along the centre of such Road and of Westbourne Terrace, to the centre of Bishop's Road, and thence Westward along the centre of Bishop's Road and Westbourne Grove to the West boundary of the said Parish at the point where the same intersects the centre of Westbourne Grove, and thence Northward continuously along the said boundary to the point mentioned at the commencement of the foregoing description.

WARD TWO ALL that portion of the said Parish which lies North of Ward No. 1 and a line drawn from the boundary of such Ward Southward along the centre of Westbourne Terrace to a point directly opposite the West end of the centre of Craven Road, and thence along the centre of Craven Road and Praed Street, and thence in a direct line to the boundary of the said Parish.

WARD THREE. All that portion of the said Parish which lies South of Ward No. 1 and a line drawn from the boundary of such Ward Southward along the centre of Westbourne Terrace, Sussex Gardens, and Westbourne Street, and thence in a direct line to the boundary of the said Parish.

WARD FOUR. ALL that portion of the said Parish which is not comprised within the foregoing descriptions of the other Wards.

Under the Reform Bill of 1832, Paddington was united with the adjoining Parishes of St. Marylebone and St. Pancras, such incorporation being called the Boro' of Marylebone, and returning Two Members to Parliament.

In the year 1870, upon the passing of the Elementary Education Act, the Parish, together with St. Marylebone, St. Pancras, and St. John, Hampstead, were united into a District called the District of Marylebone, for the purposes of the School Board for London, such District returning Seven Members to the Board.

The Parochial Workhouse is situated in the Harrow Road, near the Lock Hospital premises, its management being in the hands of Eighteen Guardians, elected annually, together with the resident Justices of the Peace. The Schools for the Workhouse children are at Ashford, near Staines; Paddington having been united by the Poor Law Board with St. George, Hanover Square, and Fulham, to form a District called the West London School District.

The Cemetery for the Parish is at Willesden, and is managed by a Board consisting of Nine Members appointed by the Vestry, such Board meeting at the Vestry Hall on the first Friday in each month.

For Registration purposes, Paddington has been divided by the Registrar General into the St. Mary's District and the St. John's District. The divisional line of the two districts traverses the centre of the road in Praed Street, from Edgware Road to the Canal Basin, continues thence along the centre of the Canal Basin as far as the Bishop's Road, and passes Westward from thence along the centre of the Bishop's Road and Westbourne Grove to the Western boundary of the Parish; the St. Mary's District lying on the North, and the St. John's District on the South of such divisional line.

For the purpose of providing the Parish with Public Baths and Wash-houses, Commissioners have been appointed by the Vestry, and Baths in the Queen's Road were opened in May, 1874, on the site of premises formerly numbered 143 and 145.

The Gas consumed in Paddington is supplied by The Gas Light and Coke Company, and the Water by two Companies, viz.:—the Grand Junction Waterworks Company and the West Middlesex Waterworks Company.



GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Annual Report of the chief works executed, and the various business transactions in this Department, during the year ended Lady-day, 1879, namely:—

Highways.

The removal of the macadamized Roadways and substitution by wood blocks on a concrete foundation in Westbourne Grove and a portion of Southwick Street, have produced a marked improvement in the cleanliness of those thoroughfares by the absence of pulverized Granite and consequent reduction of mud and dirt.

The cost of the concrete and wood pavement in Westbourne Grove is £2,581 17s. 5d., and in Southwick Street £478 12s. 10d.

The cost of maintenance of these Works under Contract is, for Westbourne Grove, the sum of 11d. per square yard per annum for 8 years after the first two years from the time of completion; and for Southwick Street, 1s. per square yard per annum for 13 years after the first two years from the time of completion.

Various Channels, Crossings, and Intersections of Streets have been paved with Granite cubes or blocks, and the existing carriageway pavements in many Streets were relaid and repaired as required.

The Footway paving in many parts of the Parish was taken up, relaid, and repaired with new flag-stones as the nature of the traffic required.

The repairs of the Roadways were greatly facilitated during the usual diversion of Vehicular traffic, and with the aid of our Steam Road Roller the metalling of the surface in each Street was rapidly consolidated.

The additional Wharf premises, lately provided for the storage of Materials, have been the means of expediting the various Works connected with the Highways, and must continue to operate beneficially in the interests of the Parish. The requisite increase of space for Office work has resulted in an improvement to health.

Additional New Streets have been made, in compliance with the printed regulations of the Vestry

for the formation of Roads and Footways, and the extent of the Parish Roadways is increased thereby to 44 miles 2 furlongs 45 yards.

The repeated openings made in the roads and footways by Gas and Water Companies and others continue to be a source of much inconvenience to the public. The number of places reinstated by the Vestry's workmen, at the cost of Companies and Persons, during the year, is 2,745, and the extent of surface so disturbed having increased over a large area of the Parish a greater amount of supervision was needed.

Buildings, Sewers, and Drains.

In compliance with the 76th Section of the Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855, Orders of the Vestry have been served on various persons, who gave notices for the erection and drainage of New Buildings, comprising 207 Houses and 1 block of Stabling. Copies of the Orders are attached to the notices and deposited at the Vestry Hall for future reference.

Three thousand three hundred and fifty-seven feet run of 9" Brick Sewers of the capacity of 3'.9" × 2'.6", together with side entrances and air openings thereto, have been constructed by and at the cost of private individuals in the under-mentioned New Streets, viz.:—

FERNHEAD ROAD,
WARLOCK ROAD, the remainder thereof,
SHIRLAND MEWS.

In Harrow Road, opposite St. James' Terrace, a length of 86 feet of 15" pipe Sewer has been laid to admit the drainage from Jewish Schools recently erected there.

In accordance with plans shewn on Building Notices, 9" & 6" Stoneware pipes have been laid down for the drainage of the 208 New Buildings beforementioned, and in every case the outlets of such drains have been trapped at Sewers with Block traps, at the owners' expense.

The Vestry's Contractor has re-constructed and repaired Eighty-four drains of various capacities, under the Public Roads and footways, from Houses and other Buildings, at the expense of the Applicants.

In addition to the above, Three hundred and eighty distinct works have been carried out, consisting of repairs to Sewers, constructing Gulley drains, side entrances and air openings, re-constructing Gulleys and fixing traps, at a cost amounting to £2,077 17s. 6d., which sum includes £632 3s. 2d., received from Builders and others, for laying drains, fixing traps, and constructing Gulleys in New Streets.

One hundred and seventy-three subjects of complaint have been received, chiefly as to stoppages in Houses and Gulley drains, the cause of offensive effluvia from drains, and other matters connected therewith, which received prompt attention.

One hundred and eleven examinations were made from Sewers with reference to the general condition of House drains under the Roadways, also as to alleged stoppages therein, and whether trapped at Sewers.

Where stoppages existed in the drains they were almost invariably removed by the use of drain rods, and the results of the examinations of drains as to their condition, made known to the parties requesting such information, and who paid for such examinations.

To maintain certain Sewers in good sanitary condition it has been necessary, periodically, to flush them with water, which has had the desired effect.

The cleansing of the sewers, gulley drains, and catch pits is effected by the Vestry's Workmen, who have, during the year, removed 243 loads of heavy deposits from the Brick Sewers which interfered with the free flow of the Sewage. There has also been removals of deposits from 28,181 catch pits and street gulleys, being at the rate of about 86 gulleys per day, thereby allowing the rainfall to flow freely away from the Roadways into Sewers.

The seven Public Urinals are maintained in an efficient condition by Workmen specially employed for that purpose.

Works of Improvement to Sewers and Street Gulleys have been further continued, viz.:—

The construction of 5 side entrances for more ready access to the Sewers for the purposes of cleansing, examining and unstopping drains, and fixing traps to outlets of drains.

The construction of 4 air openings from Sewers to Roadways for ventilation.

The construction and re-construction of 74 Street Gulleys, and the repair of 31 others.

A Tabular Statement of the principal Works executed is herewith annexed.



GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit the Fifth Annual Report, ending Lady-day, 1879, as to the working of this Department.

The Meter System continues to work satisfactorily.

In accordance with the order of the 18th February, 1879, the alteration of taking the average by one meter in twenty lamps throughout the Parish, instead of one in twelve as formerly, commenced on the 1st January last. The disused meters and boxes are now being taken up, cleaned, repaired, and repainted, and taken into store.

The services throughout the Parish are now in a much better state than formerly. 163 Notices have been served on the Gas Company for the rectification of stoppages in service pipes.

The reported number of defects in the Metered and Scale Lamps will be seen in the accompanying table.

WORKS DEPARTMENT;

June, 1879.

GENTLEMEN,

During the years 1876 and 1877, the work of Dusting could not be carried out so economically, owing to the want of proper shoots. In November, 1877, Messrs. Mead and Co., offered for sale their premises on the Paddington Basin. By acquiring such a dêpot, the entire work of sifting the dust, watering, slopping, and carting materials, could be carried out with more efficiency and economy than heretofore.

The Vestry agreeing to the recommendation of the General Purposes Committee of November 29, 1877, the necessary steps were adopted for carrying out the above-mentioned works, and at the conclusion of the Contracts entered into in March, 1877, the Vestry acquired additional stock as follows:—

They purchased from Messrs. Mead, 45 horses, at an average cost of £61 2s. 5d. each; 35 slop carts, 9 material carts, 10 water carts, and 1 chaise cart, at an average cost of £15 11s. 1d. each; 45 sets of harness, at an average cost of £3 1s. 1d. per set; 4 boats, at

an average cost of £80 each; besides stable buildings, machinery, &c., and sundry details, which will be found in Table B.

Horses.—The horses generally are all in excellent health and condition. The actual loss during the year has been three only, viz.:—

At the termination of the watering season in November last, nine horses were sold, it being deemed more advantageous to weed out the old stock than to keep all the horses until the spring.

Fodder.—Advertisements have been issued three times during the year for the supply of Fodder, and the average cost per horse for keep and bedding has been about 19s. 9.59d. per week.

Carts.—All necessary repairs are now done on the Wharf by the Vestry's own staff, and new carts are built as and when required, the cart gear being thus maintained at an efficient standard.

Harness.—All the repairs and new harness, with the exception of collars and housings, are executed on the works.

Dusting.—A dust cart when loaded will contain three-fourths of a chaldron of ashes, and one-fourth of a chaldron of breeze. The average cost during the year per load for collecting, sifting, haulage, canal dues, and all expenses, has been 1s. 6.69d. During the year 3,561.25 horses were at work, being an average of 11.37 per day, and the average number of loads per horse per day equals 4.72 loads. 16,830 loads of dust were collected, being an average of 53.76 loads per day. From this quantity there has been obtained 12,497 chaldrons of ashes, and 8,914 chaldrons of breeze, the same having been sent away in 657 boats, the maximum price obtained per chaldron being 7s. 6d., and the minimum price 2s. 10d. 1,650 tons of soft core have been obtained out of the dust collected, and 75½ boats have been employed in the removal thereof.

The before-mentioned quantity of rough dust would equal 1,175,000 cubic feet, and would make a heap 500 feet long by 235 feet wide, and at 10 feet in

height would occupy an area of about $2\frac{3}{4}$ acres. The Ashes and Breeze obtained would equal 961,335 cubic feet, and would make a heap 450 feet long by 200 feet wide, and at 10 feet 9 inches in height would take 2 acres for stowage.

Slopping.—During the year 5,678 horses were at work, being an average of 18 per day. The average number of loads per horse per day was 4.64. 26,383 loads of road sweepings, slop and water were collected, being an average of 87.65 loads per day.

The large quantity of 14,580\frac{1}{4} tons of slop, &c., has been sent away by Canal in 368\frac{1}{2} boats. The average cost per cart-load collecting, loading boats, haulage, Canal dues, and all expenses, amounting to 4s. 10.13d.

Watering.—The total number of days the vans and carts have been out throughout the season has been 129; this amounts to an average of 26.76 per day. This description of work can never be accomplished with economy and satisfaction until men be specially selected for each area of work; the constant changing of the men seriously interferes with their becoming familiar with the streets they should regularly water.

Carting Materials.—The total number of horses engaged on this work during the year has been 2,308½; this would average about 8.15 per day.
