(For the Year ending 25th March, 1894.)

I. Introduction.

THE PARISH OF PADDINGTON, in the County of London, extends Northward from the Marble Arch to Kilburn Gate; and Westward from the Marble Arch to Kensington Palace Gardens; it is bounded on the North by Willesden; on the South by St. George's, Hanover Square, and St. Margaret, Westminster; on the East by Marylebone; and on the West by Kensington and the detached portion of St. Luke, Chelsea; its length from North to South being nearly Two Miles, and its superficial extent about 1,280 acres.

II. Parliamentary Electoral Divisions.

In 1885 Paddington was constituted a separate Parliamentary Borough by the Redistribution of Seats Act (48 and 49 Victoria, cap. 23). The Borough returns Two Members to Parliament, and for the purposes of election it is divided into Two Divisions, under the names of North Paddington and South Paddington. North Paddington consists of Church Ward (2B), Harrow Road Ward (2A West), and Maida Vale Ward (2A East); and South Paddington of Westbourne Ward (1), Lancaster Gate Ward (3), and Hyde Park Ward (4).

III. Registration Districts.

The Registrar-General has divided Paddington into two Districts for the Registration of Births and Deaths, called respectively the St. Mary's District and the St. John's District. The divisional line of the two districts traverses the centre of the road in Praed Street, from Edgware Road to the Canal Basin, continues thence along the centre of the Canal Basin as far as the Bishop's Road, and passes Westward from thence along the centre of the Bishop's Road and Westbourne Grove to the Western boundary of the Parish; the St. Mary's District lying on the North and the St. John's District on the South of such divisional line.

IV. Poor-Law Administration.

The Paddington Workhouse and Infirmary are situate in the Harrow Road; the management is at present in the hands of a Board of Guardians, Eighteen of whom are Elected Guardians (elected by the Ratepayers). The resident Justices of the Peace are *ex-officio* Members of the Board. Paddington is united with St. George, Hanover Square, and Fulham, to form a District called the West London School District, the Schools being at Ashford, near Staines.

The next election of Guardians will be based upon a recent order of the London County Council, by which the Members on the Board will be increased from 18 to 24, representing six Wards, as follow, viz. :—(For Ward Boundaries see page 13).

V. The School Board.

In 1870, Paddington and the parishes of St. Marylebone, St. Pancras, and St. John, Hampstead, were formed into one of the Metropolitan Districts for the purposes of the Elementary Education Act (33 and 34 Victoria, cap. 75), under the name of the Marylebone Division of the School Board for London, which Division returns Seven Members to the School Board.

VII. The County Council.

By the Local Government Act of 1888, the Metropolitan Board of Works was superseded by the London County Council, and the area which had hitherto been under the control of the Metropolitan Board, was formed into the Administrative County of London, each Parliamentary Electoral Division returning double the number of Members to the Council to that returned to Parliament, so that Paddington has Four Members on the Council.

VIII. Gas, Electricity, and Water Supply.

The Gas consumed in Paddington is supplied by The Gas Light and Coke Company.

The Electricity is supplied by the Metropolitan Electric Supply Company, Limited.

The Water is supplied by two Companies, viz.:—the Grand Junction Waterworks Company and the West Middlesex Waterworks Company. Ratepayers residing on the Bishop of London's Estate are entitled to a deduction of 15 per cent. A plan of the Estate may be seen at the Vestry Hall.

XI. The Vestry.

In 1855 the Vestry of Paddington was reconstituted as the Local Authority of the Parish by the Metropolis Local Management Act (18 and 19 Victoria, cap. 120). The Vestry is the Board of Works for Paddington, and consists of Seventy-two Elected Members and the Vicar of Paddington, who is *ex-officio* Chairman of the Vestry. The ordinary meetings of the Vestry are held at the Vestry Hall, Harrow Road, Paddington Green, on the first and third Tuesdays in each month, the third Tuesday in August and the first Tuesday in September excepted.

In 1852 the Vestry resolved to erect a new building for the Municipal purposes of the Parish, and in 1853 the Vestry Hall in the Harrow Road was opened.

XII. The Burial Board.

In 1854 the Paddington Cemetery, which is situated in the parish of Willesden, was purchased by the Parish. It is managed by a Burial Board, consisting of Nine Members appointed by the Vestry. The ordinary meetings of the Burial Board are held at the Vestry Hall on the first Friday in each month.

XIII. The Baths and Wash-houses.

In 1871 Paddington adopted the Baths and Wash-houses Act (9 and 10 Victoria, cap. 74), and the Baths and Wash-houses erected in the Queen's Road, on the site of premises formerly numbered 143 and 145 were opened to the public in 1874. The Baths and Wash-houses are under the management of Seven Commissioners appointed by the Vestry.

XIV. The Parochial Charities.

There are certain charities under the control of the Vestry, managed by Trustees appointed by the Vestry and the Charity Commissioners. These Charities have an annual income of over Two Thousand Pounds, which is yearly distributed to the Poor in Coals and Blankets, in Grants to the Parochial National Schools in apprenticing sons and daughters of poor parishioners, and in Annuities to aged persons resident in the Parish, &c.

XXII.—Coroner's Court and Mortuary.

Plans and notices have been deposited by the London County Council for acquiring the property known as Bell's Laundry, Manor Place, and the Vestry being favourable to the acquisition of same, there is every prospect that the site will be utilised in the course of next year for the purposes named.

XXIII.—Assessment Appeal.

The appeal of Charles Montague Fox, 225 and 227, Harrow Road, to the Justices in Special Sessions, has been decided by a reduction of £56 in the rateable value.

XXIV.—Canals.

In accordance with the recommendations of the Conference of Delegates from the Parishes of St. Marylebone, St. Pancras, and Paddington, the Grand Junction Canal Company have caused a further portion of their Basin to be concreted, and a suggestion to erect ventilating shafts for sewer-ventilating purposes on Nos. 2, 4, 7, and 16 Wharves, South side, and 1A, Irongate Wharf Road, is now occupying attention.

XXV.—Paddington Charities.

An inquiry by Mr. Walter Wigram, Barrister-at-Law, Assistant Charity Commissioner, into the administration of the above has been held at the instance of the London County Council, the Trustees present being Sir George D. Harris, L.C.C., Col. H. R. Mead, R.E., Rev. Walter Abbott, M.A., Vicar, Rev. A. Scott, M.A., Messrs. C. Braid, J.P., J. Farmer, J.P., W. Urquhart, L.C.C., R. F. Whur, J. Williams, E. Parker-Young, A. G. Bicker-Caarten, F. Plimley, and Dr. A. Prince.

The Commissioner remarked that he had gone through the books and accounts relating to the various Charities, which appeared to him to have been admirably kept. At the conclusion of the lengthened inquiry the Commissioner intimated that a printed report would be furnished as to the history and management of the Charities.

XXVI.—Paddington Recreation Ground.

The above-mentioned Ground, covering an area of nearly 24 acres, including $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres to be purchased by the London County Council, is now being devoted to the purposes of healthful recreation under the provisions of the Paddington Recreation Ground Act, 1893, which received the Royal assent on the 9th June last.

and miscellaneous donations have been made to the amount of £14,300, making a total of £47,300, the London County Council having undertaken to defray the cost of the $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres above referred to.

Subject to the provisions of the Act the Vestry will maintain and preserve in perpetuity the land acquired, and cause the same to be open free of charge, portions thereof being set apart for cricket, football, lawn tennis, cycling, and other games, for the use of which the Vestry is empowered to make reasonable charges, and to place all moneys received towards the maintenance of the Recreation Ground, it being stipulated that at least 4 acres of the land,

exclusive of roads and paths, are to be reserved, and not appropriated for games. The management of the Recreation Ground is vested in a Committee consisting of 15 members, as under:—

The Committee of Management, the members of which retire from office at the end of three years, exercise control over the Ground so far as relates to the letting thereof, and for securing to the contributing Parishes a fair consideration of their rights of user; but the management of the Ground, as well as the control of the finances, receipts, and expenditure, is subject exclusively to the direction of the Vestry of Paddington, and is solely vested in them.

Any vacancy on the Committee occasioned by death or resignation may be filled up by the Vestry or Local Board affected thereby, and the person appointed to fill such vacancy will hold office so long as the person he succeeds would have done. The provisions of Section 6 of the Metropolitan Open Spaces Act, 1881, as to Bye-laws, extend to and apply to the Recreation Ground, and such Bye-laws may be made and enforced by the Local Authority.

The above-mentioned open space, situate as it is in a densely-populated neighbourhood, provides healthful recreation for a hard-worked section of the

community, and as large numbers of children are swept into Board Schools under the compulsory clauses of the Elementary Education Act, the Paddington Recreation Ground affords an additional breathing lung, especially as regards those children residing in Kilburn Park Road, Carlton Vale, and Shirland Road.

XXVII.—Fire Station.

The London County Council having determined to establish a Fire Station in Edgware Road, St. Marylebone, and to abandon the one in Hermitage Street, Paddington will no longer possess a fire establishment within the Parish. Strong efforts were made by the Vestry to induce the Council to enlarge and improve the Hermitage Street Station, but as the Council were unable to secure a suitable site in the Parish, Ratepayers will have to content themselves with a Station beyond the boundary.

XXVIII.—Gates & Bars.

The London County Council having obtained powers for the abolition of street obstructions in the Metropolis, the undermentioned Gates and Bars have been removed :—

Kensington Gardens Square and Princes Square.
Norfolk Square by Cambridge Place.
Sussex Square.

Devonport Street by Sussex Place.

Hyde Park Gardens by Sussex Square.

Craven Hill Gardens by Leinster Terrace.

Kensington Palace Gardens.

The gates formerly in Hyde Park Gardens will be stationed at one of the entrances of the newly-acquired Recreation Ground.

XXIX.—Hall, Regulations for Letting.

The Vestry having referred the Regulations and Scale of Charges in connexion with the letting of the Vestry Hall to a Committee, the same were reconsidered, and a revised list of Regulations and Fees adopted as follows:—

1st.—All applications for the use of the Hall must be made in writing to the Vestry Clerk, on forms to be obtained at the Hall, stating the nature of the purpose for which it is required.

2nd.—It will not be considered that the Hall is engaged until the charges are paid and the application is granted, and no public announcement is to be made until the Hall is so engaged. None but official receipts will be considered as valid.

3rd.—The person in whose name the Hall is engaged, and whose name is on the application and receipt, shall be held responsible for any damage.

4th.—Except by special permission of the Vestry, or one of its Standing Committees, the Hall will not be let for any Meeting, Lecture, Concert, &c., at

which the doors will be required to be opened before Seven o'clock in the Evening.

Scale of Charges, payable in advance :—

In every case a fee of One Guinea must be paid at the time of application, to cover incidental expenses.

XXX. Hospital Accommodation.

Notice having been received from the Metropolitan Asylums Board as to the urgent need of additional Hospital Accommodation for Infectious cases, and the probability that the accommodation for fever patients at the Manager's disposal would shortly become exhausted, the Sanitary Committee was empowered, in case of emergency, to make temporary arrangements for providing accommodation for fever patients in the Parish should the Asylums Board not be able to do so.

The Sanitary Committee, after viewing the Freehold land belonging to the Parish at Alperton, expressed an opinion that the same would be suitable for the erection thereon of a temporary hospital for scarlet fever cases, but difficulties having arisen as to the prompt utilisation of the site, and a marked diminution of the epidemic having shown itself, the Committee deemed it unnecessary to proceed further in the matter; but a resolution was passed empowering the Medical Officer, in conjunction with the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, to secure one or more houses for the purpose of giving effect to Section 60 of the Public Health (London) Act 1891. A temporary Assistant Medical Officer of Health was ultimately appointed, and the Committee were fortunately able to deal with the epidemic without spending any of the money (£1,500) passed by the Vestry for temporary hospital accommodation.

XXXI. Public Lavatory Accommodation.

An additional public lavatory has been constructed in Clarendon Street, at a cost of £1,147 3s. 6d.

This Lavatory, which was opened in July last, provides the following accommodation for men :—

XXXII. London Overhead Wires Act, 1891.

Mr. Albert Weston was appointed Inspector under the above-mentioned Act, to perform the following duties :—

To search out and ascertain the owners of all overhead wires in the Parish.

Periodically examine all poles, attachments, brackets, slings, blocks, wires, &c., and other accessories in situ.

To pass or condemn, as the case may be, any defective or other work not in accordance with the By-laws; these specify the length of span, height of same from ground, materials to be used for the supports and the mode of protecting same, also various other regulations with regard to information to be supplied; maintenance of the wires, &c., as regards

disused wires, and the amount of penalties to be imposed for non-compliance.

To see that all wires are altered or repaired to agree with the above regulations, and that the same are efficiently maintained.

To mark all the positions of the wires, belonging to the various owners, on tracings from the ordnance sheets.

To keep all books and conduct all correspondence relative to the matter, and generally carry out all the provisions of the By-laws and the Act.

XXXIII. Rates—Quarterly Collection.

The working of the above-mentioned system having been attended with satisfactory results, the Vestry, on the 18th of July, unanimously resolved to continue the same.

XXXV. Local Government Act, 1894.

The above-mentioned Act, commonly called the Parish Councils Act, is one of the most important extensions of Local Government of modern times, and will cause a complete change in the electorate, the qualification of members, and the mode of election. The following is an abstract of the Act:—

The Vicar and Churchwardens will continue to be *ex-officio* members, but the former will not occupy the chair by virtue of office, as heretofore.

The persons entitled to vote at Future Elections of Vestrymen and Auditors will be the Parochial Electors, that is to say, persons registered in either the Local Government Register or the Parliamentary Register.

The new Local Government Franchise will extend to Lodgers and Service Voters, as well as to married and unmarried women; provided that husband and wife shall not both be qualified in respect of the same property.

The number of persons entitled to vote at the last Vestry Election was about 10,000; the number who will probably be able to vote at the November Election, including the "Ownership portion" of the Electors for the County of Middlesex (according to the present Register), will be 15,490, thus it will be in the power of persons who do not feel the fluctuations of rates to increase Local burdens at the expense of actual ratepayers.

A person to be qualified as a Member of the new Vestry must be a Parochial Elector or have resided in the Parish for twelve months preceding the election: the representative may be male or female, married or unmarried; the Board is to be elected by the Electors.

The new rules to be made by the Local Government Board will provide for the appointment of a Returning Officer for the Vestry Election.

The term of office of Members is to be three years, one-third retiring annually. No rating qualification will be necessary. Absence for six consecutive months, except in case of illness or for some approved reason, will disqualify for membership.

The Chairman, who is to be elected at the first meeting, will be a Justice of the Peace for the entire County of London.

The Board will have power to hold its Meetings at such time as it may direct.

At every election the poll is to be taken by ballot, under the Ballot Act, 1872, and the Municipal Elections (Corrupt and Illegal Practices) Act, 1884.

The following are disqualified from being Members :—

Infants and aliens.

Those who have been in receipt of parochial relief within 12 months of date of election.

Persons convicted of crime.

Bankrupts and persons having made composition with creditors.

Those concerned in any contract or work entered into by the Board.

The first election will be held on the 8th November, 1894, or such later day as the Local Government Board may direct.

XXXVI. Sanitary Department—Re-organization of.

The Vestry having passed a resolution, of which the under-mentioned is a copy—

“That the Sanitary Committee be requested to consider the advisability of re-organizing the Sanitary Department of the Vestry, and to report to the Vestry, at as early a date as practicable, any steps they may consider should be taken to make that Department more efficient and convenient to the Rate-payers, more especially with regard to providing proper office accommodation for the Medical Officer, and regulating his and the Sanitary Inspectors' hours of attendance at the Vestry Hall, &c.”

A Report was prepared and the following recommendations adopted, viz. :—

“That one Medical Officer be appointed as at present, and that such officer have complete executive control over the Sanitary staff.

“That in view of the enormous increase in clerical work in the Department, and of the fact that full and complete registers of complaints and nuisances should be kept in the office, a separate clerk should be appointed to do all scriptory work.

“That it is desirable that the Sanitary Inspectors should be in classes, with salaries rising in each class from a minimum to a maximum, and that the staff should comprise the following officers :—

One First-Class Inspector.

Two Second-Class Inspectors.

Two Third do. do.

One Assistant Inspector and Disinfecter.

The works, Sanitary and otherwise, carried out during the year, appear in the Reports of the respective Officers, hereunto annexed, together with the Reports of the Burial Board and Commissioners of Baths and Washhouses, and such Reports are followed by the documents required by the 198th Section of the Metropolis Local Management Act.

SUNDRY PAYMENTS MADE TO OR BY THE VESTRY AND
CHURCHWARDENS UNDER VARIOUS ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

1. A sum of £12 is paid annually under 26 Geo. 2, cap. 43, to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners by the Churchwardens out of moneys supplied by the Vestry as rent for land granted by a former Bishop of London for the enlargement of the Churchyard. The Vestry is recouped a portion of this £12 by an annual payment of £3 under the same Act to the Churchwardens by the Vicar of Paddington, and of £3 by the Parish Clerk (if any).
2. A sum of £15 is paid annually under the private Act 35 Geo. 3, cap. 83, to the Churchwardens by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners as compensation for the enclosure of waste lands by a former Bishop of London, and is paid by the Churchwardens to the credit of the Vestry General Account.
3. A sum of £2 is paid annually under 3 Geo. 3, cap. 50, to the Vestry by the Churchwardens of St. George's, Hanover Square, in lieu of parochial rates for the burial ground in Uxbridge Road, and is placed to the credit of the Vestry General Account.

4. HARVIST'S ESTATE.

A proportion of the rents of this Estate (amounting in the year ending Lady-day, 1894, to £92 0s. 9d.) is paid annually under 10 Geo. 4, cap. 59, and private Act 18 and 19 Vic., cap. 11, to the Vestry by the Hendon Union Rural Sanitary Authority, and is applied towards the repair of the Highway of the Edgware Road.

5. LYON'S ESTATE.

A proportion of the rents of this Estate (amounting in the year ending Lady-day, 1894, to £479 10s. 10d.) is paid annually to the Vestry under the same Acts and by the same Authority as in Harvist's Estate, and is applied towards the repair of the Highway of the Harrow Road.

London Streets (Removal of Gates and Bars, &c.).

The above Act, introduced by the London County Council, provides for the removal of obstructions in certain streets of London, and received the Royal Assent on the 9th June, 1893. The following obstructions in Paddington were scheduled for removal:—

Kensington Gardens Square—Gates and Posts across entrance from Princes Square.

Devonport Street—Gates and Posts across entrance to Sussex Place.

Hyde Park Gardens by Sussex Square—Gates and Posts across entrance to Stanhope Street.

Craven Hill Gardens—Gates and Posts across entrance from Leinster Terrace.

These obstructions were removed by the London County Council in November 1893, and declared open for public traffic.

SEWERS.

The length of sewers under the jurisdiction of the Vestry have not been increased since last year, and therefore remain the same, viz., 54 miles, 7 furlongs, 175 yards.

Additional Works to existing Sewers.

New manhole and side entrances have been constructed to sewers in Senior Street, Connaught Square, and at the East end of Hyde Park Square, at a cost of £198 1s. These works were carried out to enable the sewer flushers to enter the sewers in a more expeditious manner, instead of travelling considerable distances, for the purpose of cleansing and bringing the heavy deposits to the surface for carting away.

At the North end of the sewer in Green Street, which is not connected with the sewer in Harrow Road, a brick Flushing Tank, with automatic syphon, has been constructed to discharge 520 gallons of water as often as considered necessary, for flushing the sewers at Green Street, North Wharf Road, and Church Place, a length of 892 feet.

A similar description of tank has been constructed at the West end of Hampden Street, to discharge about 330 gallons of water periodically through the sewer, in order to keep it in a sanitary condition. This work has been carried out in consequence of the

Gas Light and Coke Company refusing to continue the supply of gas to the Sewer Gas Destructor Lamp, erected by the Vestry about 5 years ago (but which is now removed), in order to consume the foul air of this sewer.

There has not yet been any arrangement come to by the Vestry and the West Middlesex Water Company as to an agreement for the supply of water to the tanks in question.

The cost of the two tanks complete to the present time is £93 8s. 8d.

In consequence of the defective condition of the old drains through the premises of No. 133A, Queen's Road, notice was served upon the owner to reconstruct them. The drain was destroyed, and in doing so the outlet was found connected with an old and defective portion of a brick sewer, 3-feet high and 2-feet wide, alongside the front area of the premises, and which was charged with sewer deposit. This was reported to the Sanitary Committee, and the same referred to the Works Committee, who instructed me to take such steps necessary for abolishing the sewer, which was subsequently found to extend along the forecourts of the adjoining houses, Nos. 133 to 139, Queen's Road, and also across the roadway to Porchester Gardens, and to make proper connections for the drains into the main sewer in Queen's Road, so far as the

Vestry would be liable. The new drain outlet from No. 133A has been connected with the sewer in Porchester Gardens at the owner's expense. A new drain has been constructed from No. 133, and connected with sewer in Queen's Road, at the cost of the Vestry, and the drains from Nos. 135 and 137 at the expense of Mr. Whiteley. The brickwork of old sewer, as far as necessary, has been taken out, and the trenches filled in with ground, hard core, and concrete, at the Vestry's expense, inclusive of the cost of the new drain connections, amounting to £125 9s. 7d. The Vestry also refunded the sum of £6 10s. which had been paid by Mr. Cole, the owner of No. 133A, Queen's Road, to his builder for work done in removing a portion of the old sewer, at the time of destroying the defective drain of his premises.

Special Repairs to Old Sewers and Cost of Work relative thereto.

The sewers in the undermentioned localities have been rendered more effective by their improvements, as regards inverts and quicker gradients, as recommended in my Reports to the Vestry.

The works executed in the Parish for the Vestry only, by the contractors, Messrs. Neave & Son, under the jobbing works schedule of prices, during the year, includes the construction of Flushing Tanks, Manholes,

Side entrances to Sewers, Sandpits, Gulleys, and various other repairs to sewers, &c.

The amount expended being £861 13s. 10d.

The works also executed under the same contract, at the cost of private persons, for the reconstruction of one hundred and thirty-three pipe drains under roadways and footways to existing premises, has amounted to the sum of £1,017 16s. 6d., which has been received by the Accountant and paid into the Vestry's Banking Account.

Various private persons have also paid to the Vestry £16 6s., for examinations of house drains, in order to obtain information as to their condition, and, if necessary, to have them reconstructed; also with regard to obstructions, in order that they might be relieved. The number examined by the Vestry's workmen being eighty.

The small brick and pipe sewers, which cannot be cleansed by hand labour, have been flushed with water and the deposits therein removed.

New Buildings, &c.

The private houses erected during the year have been very limited (16 only). As the ground at the North-Western part of the Parish is nearly covered, the only portion now available for building purposes being the ground situate between Sutherland and Elgin Avenues, and the portion North of Elgin Avenue and abutting on the Recreation Ground.

The proposed sewers and new roads in the latter locality will, no doubt, be commenced at an early date, thereby giving an opportunity for the erection of new buildings.

CLARENDON STREET LAVATORY.

London Overhead Wires Act, 1891.

During the past year the following works have been carried out under this Act:—

The whole of the plant of the Exchange Telegraph Company in the Parish has been examined, there being about 61 attachments, poles, &c., at that time. The result of this showed that the plan and information submitted was very incorrectly prepared, many spans of the wire being entirely omitted, and others wrongly shown. A corrected plan was made in the office, and a report sent to the Secretary of the Company. Many defects were discovered in the attachments, stays, &c.; 13 spans exceeded the limit allowed by the Bye-Laws, viz., 115 yards. The Company eventually made good all the defects, took down a large number of spans, the wires being out of use, and shortened 7 of the

excessive spans, and the remaining 6 the Company have made application (in accordance with the Bye-Laws), to the London County Council, asking for permission to allow them to remain up, and the matter is still under the consideration of the Council.

Messrs. George Hinchliffe & Co. own a private telephone wire running from their office at the Mileage Coal Wharves, Great Western Road, to Mr. Whiteley's premises in Queen's Road. They supplied particulars of this wire early in November last, and the attachments on this line, 10 in number, were examined and found to be in good condition, but two spans exceeded the limit. The owners were informed of this, and after making unsuccessful efforts to obtain new way leaves to shorten them, they also made application to the London County Council, as in the case of the Exchange Telegraph Company.

The National Telephone Company, the District Messenger Service and News Company, and Mr. William Whiteley, all owners of wires in the Parish, have been repeatedly requested to furnish particulars under the Act, but have not yet done so, and the Vestry at its last meeting resolved to grant the above owners a month longer to prepare and supply the information in, and if they were not sent in at the expiration of that time, legal proceedings should be taken against them.

In September last two spans of a wire crossing Church Street and Edgware Road, and in a very unsafe condition, were removed. The wire and attachments were very old, and in a dilapidated condition. The owner of it could not be discovered, although every effort was made to do so.

Tracings showing the wires belonging to the General Post Office have been made (these wires are exempt from the operation of the Act), through the courtesy of their Engineer, who furnished the information enabling them to be prepared. They will be very useful in assisting to identify private wires.

PUBLIC LIGHTING DEPARTMENT.

The number of public lamp posts and bracket lamps in lighting on the 25th March last was 1,996, each consuming 4·6 feet of gas per hour, and being in lighting for a total number of 3,879·99 hours during the year.

The number of refuge and corner lamps, their candle and gas consumption, &c., will be found on pages 122, 125.

The Gas Company have been served with 167 notices during the year for the rectification of defective services pipes, and for the removal of accumulations of naphthalene, &c., therein.

During the twelve months 10 lamp-posts were knocked down, 26 columns and stand-pipes broken,

29 head-irons and 27 lanterns damaged by various parties, the restoration being made good by the Vestry's own staff of workmen, they being compensated for the expense in 15 cases out of a total of 37. The remainder either escaped detection, or there was no evidence to prove the case.

During the months of April, May, and June, the whole of the lamp-posts, head-irons, lanterns, bracket-irons, as well as the refuge lamp-posts, lanterns, and guard-posts, were washed and painted with two coats of paint, the work being done by the Vestry's own workmen, at a cost of £157 15s., and this amount also includes the cost of the paint for the meter boxes, all of which were painted one coat.

The following list gives the number of pieces of glass that were broken during the year, and which were replaced by the Vestry's glazier at a cost of £22 2s. 6d. for labour :—

In the month of October the Vestry had under consideration the question of improving the lighting of Edgware Road and Maida Vale. The matter was referred to the Works Committee, who, on the evening of October 18th, visited the thoroughfare, and after

inspecting the lighting thereof, passed the following recommendation, which was approved at the Vestry on the 7th of November:—

“That the Surveyor be instructed to fix Victoria lamps, with 10-feet per hour burners, on the West side of Maida Vale, from Maida Hill West to the Northern boundary of the Parish, the lamps to be fixed Northwards from Maida Hill West as and when the present lamps need replacing by their being either worn out or damaged by accident.”

DUSTING DEPARTMENT.

The difficulty of disposing of ashes and breeze continues to increase, as I have repeatedly reported would be the case owing to the enormous quantity collected in the Metropolis, but I think principally to the rapid development of the suburbs. As houses extend nearer the brickfields it is to the interest of brickmakers to obtain their materials from premises contiguous to their fields, which necessarily decreases their expenses of haulage, tonnage, and cartage. To keep the wharves clear, in many cases payment has had to be resorted to to induce the brickmakers to boat it away.

The only way to overcome the difficulty is to cremate the rough dust, as is done in many provincial towns, and also in several parts of the Metropolis, and sooner or later this plan will have to be adopted, and generally, I believe, throughout the whole of the Metropolis, or else a speedy method must be devised to boat it away directly it is brought to the depôts, as it is evident that the framers of the Public Health Act, 1891, contemplated the abolition of dust wharves in close proximity to residences.

From the month of April until the end of September, each dust-bin, after emptying, was thoroughly sprinkled with carbolic powder by the dustmen.

In the collection of the rough dust during the year the men were employed 303 days, 5,952 horses and vans being engaged in the work ; 25,704 $\frac{1}{2}$ loads were collected, giving a daily average of 84.83 loads, or 4.31 loads per horse per day, the maximum loads collected in one week being 709, and the minimum 320 ; the cost of collecting being £1,972 0s. 7d., and of sifting £1,785 2s.

Materials abstracted.—The following miscellaneous materials were abstracted from the before-mentioned loads of rough dust:—15,081 chaldrons of ashes, 8,267 $\frac{1}{2}$ chaldrons of breeze, 5 cart loads and 22 boat loads of hard core, or 572 tons ; 255 boats of soft core, or 4,503 $\frac{3}{4}$ tons ; 16 tons of coals, 50 tons 13 cwt.

3 qrs. of bones, 108 tons of rags, 68 tons 19 cwt. 3 qrs. of cast and wrought iron, 3 tons 3 cwt. 3 qrs. of various metals, 12 tons 15 cwt. of white sheet glass, and 40 tons of black glass, broken bottles, &c.

The hard and soft core is boated away at an expense of 3s. per ton.

SLOPPING DEPARTMENT.

All dry sweepings, slop, snow, &c., collected by the Vestry's carmen, are brought to the depôt, and when in a dry state it is tipped into boats direct, and when in a fluid state it is deposited into the filtering tanks. When the water has drained away the mud is loaded into boats and sent away by canal to Southall, under a contract with Messrs. Studds, at 1s. 11d. per ton. This amount includes haulage, tonnage, unloading, and providing a shoot.

During the year 22,839 loads were collected, 8,034 horses and vans being employed, working 306 days, giving an average of 74.63 loads per day, the maximum number brought to the depôt in one week being 1,599, and the minimum 231 loads; 24,560½ tons were taken away by canal by means of 660 boats.

Carting Road Materials and General Work.

During the year 2,209 horses and carts were engaged in this class of work for 294 days, giving an average of 7.51 per day.

Cleansing the Public Streets.

The main thoroughfares and most important streets are swept daily, especially the wood-paved roads; other roads two or three times weekly, as occasion requires. Periodically the wood-paved roads are washed and cleaned.

Sanding Frosty Roads and Snowy Roads.

It is now customary to send out before midnight and in the early hours of the morning men, horses, carts, and sanding machines, to scatter sand and shingle on frosty and slippery roads; 286 horses and carts were out on 33 occasions, the total hours worked being 2,521, and 768 cubic yards of shingle, 202 chaldrons of ashes, and 33 cubic yards of hoggin were thus used.

Road Watering.

The vans and horses were out on 148 days, 5,787 horses being thus engaged, giving an average of 39.10 per day. Owing to the continuous dry weather, this class of work was very heavy during the whole season. From April until the end of September there was placed daily in each water van about 3-lbs. of Kuna Pine disinfectant.

The general miscellaneous repairs have been carried out by artizans in the employ of the Vestry at the Works Department, including the following smiths' work for the Highway Department:—

The work attending the maintenance of these grounds has been carried out by the gardeners during the year, but owing to the very dry summer the results have not been so satisfactory as might have been expected.

The grave of the late Mrs. Siddons has been cleaned and painted, and the inscription re-cut. Three glazed terra cotta vases, with shrubs, have been obtained and placed on the stone slab by order of the Committee of Management.

The petition for faculty for the removal of St. Philip's Temporary Iron Church in St. Mary's Churchyard, Northern Portion, was heard before Dr. Tristram

on the 6th November, 1893, and granted, but as the Church might be required pending contemplated repairs to St. Mary's Church, the order stood suspended till the 1st March, 1894.

Local Unemployed Men.

A Deputation attended the Vestry on the 21st November, and submitted certain suggestions as to finding them employment during the winter season.

The Chairman expressed the sympathy of the Vestry with the object of the Deputation and informed them of the difficulties surrounding the question, and the suggestions were referred to the Works Committee, and they instructed the Surveyor to obtain some Narboro' and Guernsey granite sprawls, so that willing hands might be employed in breaking the same for road metalling, and he was also to employ a certain number as road sweepers, but at the same time following out the points suggested by the Board of Guardians in their printed letter of the 25th October, 1893, viz. :—

- (a) "That temporary employment be given, as far as possible, to such persons as may be recommended to the Vestry by the Guardians during the coming winter, as *persons who owing to their previous condition and circumstances* it is desirable should not become subjects of Poor Law Relief."

(b) "That only those applicants for work who have been resident in the Parish for at least twelve months be employed."

(c) "That the wages should in no case exceed 2s. 6d. a day."

(d) "That in no case should the temporary work be given for more than 13 weeks."

Acting upon these instructions, the following list will show the number of men put on, the length of time they were employed, and the amount of money paid to each:—

Many of the leaders of the men applying for work strongly protested against undertaking any stone-breaking, when informed this was the only class of work that could be found them during the winter months, they classing this as only offering them "convict labour," stating that they did not come for that kind of work; they wanted something at which they could earn a "living rate of wage." They tried to influence the men generally, but without effect, and those who did undertake the work—and many of them, to their credit, persevered day by day—were paid at the rate of 3½d. per bushel; 6,510 bushels were broken by the 62 men put on. Eight out of every

ten of the class of men who apply are naturally unsuitable for this description of work. They worked about 7 hours daily, and many of them could only earn $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. to 1s. during that time, others about 2s. 6d. In two instances the rate ranged to 4s. 9d. and 5s. 4d., but these were *accomplished* stone breakers, and had they been allowed could have earned even more than this amount per day.

XXXIX. — ABSTRACT OF THE QUARTERLY REPORTS OF THE PUBLIC ANALYST,

For the Year ending March 25th, 1894.

The total number of samples of food analyzed was 361, consisting of Milk 217, Groceries 59, Butter 58, Lard 18, Spirits 8, and Pastry 1.

Of these, 33 samples of Milk, 4 of the Groceries, and 1 of Butter, proved to be adulterated.

Reviewing the separate articles we find as follows :—

Milk shows that 15 per cent. of the samples taken have been either skimmed or watered. The quantity of water added varied from 5 to 27 per cent., with an average of 10 per cent. The quantity of cream abstracted ranged from 15 to 33 per cent., the average being 25 per cent. The Milk samples have been obtained from all portions of the Parish, on week-days and on Sundays, some from retail dealers in the streets and in shops, others from country farmers at the railway stations. Much of the adulteration is due to the farmers. Of the street samples the adulteration is worst on Sundays.

The average adulteration in the Metropolis is about 21 per cent., so that this Parish with only 15 per cent. is well below the average.

Besides the 33 samples of undoubtedly adulterated milk, there were 15 other samples which were probably adulterated, but not to an extent to warrant a prosecution. Milk being the chief food of infants and invalids, it is most important to ensure its purity.

Butter, this year, owing to the mildness of the season, has been plentiful and cheap, hence there has been little temptation to adulterate it. We therefore find out of the 58 samples only 1 adulterated. That contained 90 per cent. of margarine. It is very satisfactory to find that, on the whole, Butter is far better made now than some years ago. It is rare now to find rancid and stale samples, such as were at one time sold commonly.

Groceries, as a whole, keep very free from adulteration. Only 4 out of the 59 samples proved to be adulterated, giving an average of $6\frac{3}{4}$ per cent.

The more prominent articles amongst the Groceries are :—

Coffee.—This continues to be the most adulterated amongst the groceries. Out of 36 samples 3, or $8\frac{1}{4}$ per cent., contained chicory in proportions ranging from 5 to 85 per cent.

Pepper.—Of 11 samples, 1 contained 35 per cent. of ground rice. At one time Pepper was more often adulterated, olive stones being used as well as rice. This of late years has been put a stop to by Analysts.

Tea.—Since this article was examined in bond it has become rare to find an adulterated sample. Of the 6 samples purchased all were genuine.

Lard used to be adulterated with cotton-seed oil, or water, and is now frequently mixed with beef stearin. None of these forms of adulteration, however, were found in the 18 samples purchased during the past year in this district.

Spirits.—Only 8 samples were procured. They were all up to the legal limit of strength, and free from foreign ingredients.

Pastry.—An anonymous letter was forwarded through the London County Council complaining of some pastry sold at a certain shop. Samples were obtained and found to be pure and wholesome. Later, however, one of the Sanitary Inspectors visited the shop and found a number of rotten eggs ready for making into pastry. The shop-owner was summoned and fined for their possession. Probably on the previous occasion the eggs were good, though not at the first time when the pastry was accused of making a child very ill. A visit to the bakehouse disclosed the cause.

The total amount for fines ordered to be paid into the Vestry's account was £26 8s. The average fine, therefore, imposed on each fraudulent vendor was 13s. 10d. It is pretty clear that a very moderate

amount of adulteration would soon repay this trivial fine.

An instance may show how some magistrates carry out the Food and Drugs Adulteration Act. A man was summoned for selling Butter containing 90 per cent. of margarine. He said it was sold to him in that state by the wholesale vendor. This latter appeared and, whilst admitting the fact, offered to help in paying the fine. The magistrate imposed a fine of 1s. The two managed to pay it.

The increase in the receipts has enabled the Commissioners to meet the additional expenditure incurred for electric lighting and steam heating apparatus, the object of the latter being to reduce the working expenses. They have also been enabled to commence an important improvement in the drying closets of the Laundry Department by heating the same with steam pipes in lieu of the old furnaces, which they hope may also effect a saving in fuel and labour.

THE
BUILDING.

The alterations to the furnaces noted above has obviated the necessity of extensive repairs, which would have had to be done had the newer system not been adopted, so that the extra cost of this improvement is minimized to that extent.

Electric
Lighting.

The Commissioners, as foreshadowed in last year's Report, considered that it would be a great advantage to have the Large Hall and Entrances lighted by means of Electricity. They accordingly invited Tenders for carrying out the work from several well-known Firms, finally accepting the Tender of Messrs. Dawson and Hammond,

who have completed the lighting in a very satisfactory manner.

The question of providing means for raising the temperature of the Baths has been under consideration for some considerable time, and during the past year practical effect has been given to this improvement, the work having been carried out by Messrs. Wenham and Waters, engineers, of Paragon Works, Croydon. The equable temperature at which the air in the several baths can be now maintained is a source of great comfort to bathers, and cannot fail to have a beneficial effect, keeping, as it does, the Institution up to date, and in the front line of modern requirements.

Heating by
Hot Air.

Although there has been no increase in the Receipts from letting the Hall, the Commissioners feel that the advantage of the improved lighting and warming has been fully appreciated by those who have hired it during the past winter.

In October last a serious leakage occurred in No. 4 Boiler, which had been in constant use for 19 years, and upon examination it was found to be in such a defective state that it would be necessary either to replace it by a new one, or have it extensively repaired. Upon the Boiler being turned over, the Commissioners decided upon the latter course, and invited Tenders by public advertisement for cutting away the front, the whole of the bottom plates, and the inner tube, practically making a new Boiler.

No. 4 Boiler.

The Tenders for this work varied to such an extent that the Commissioners were somewhat apprehensive of difficulty in accepting the lowest Tender. They however caused very careful enquiries to be made, and finding the

references satisfactory, entrusted the work to Mr. William Astley, of Bolton, who has completed the Boiler in a most satisfactory manner for the sum of £128.

The establishment is now in possession of 4 Boilers in thorough going order, and it is hoped that no expense under this head will be required for several years.

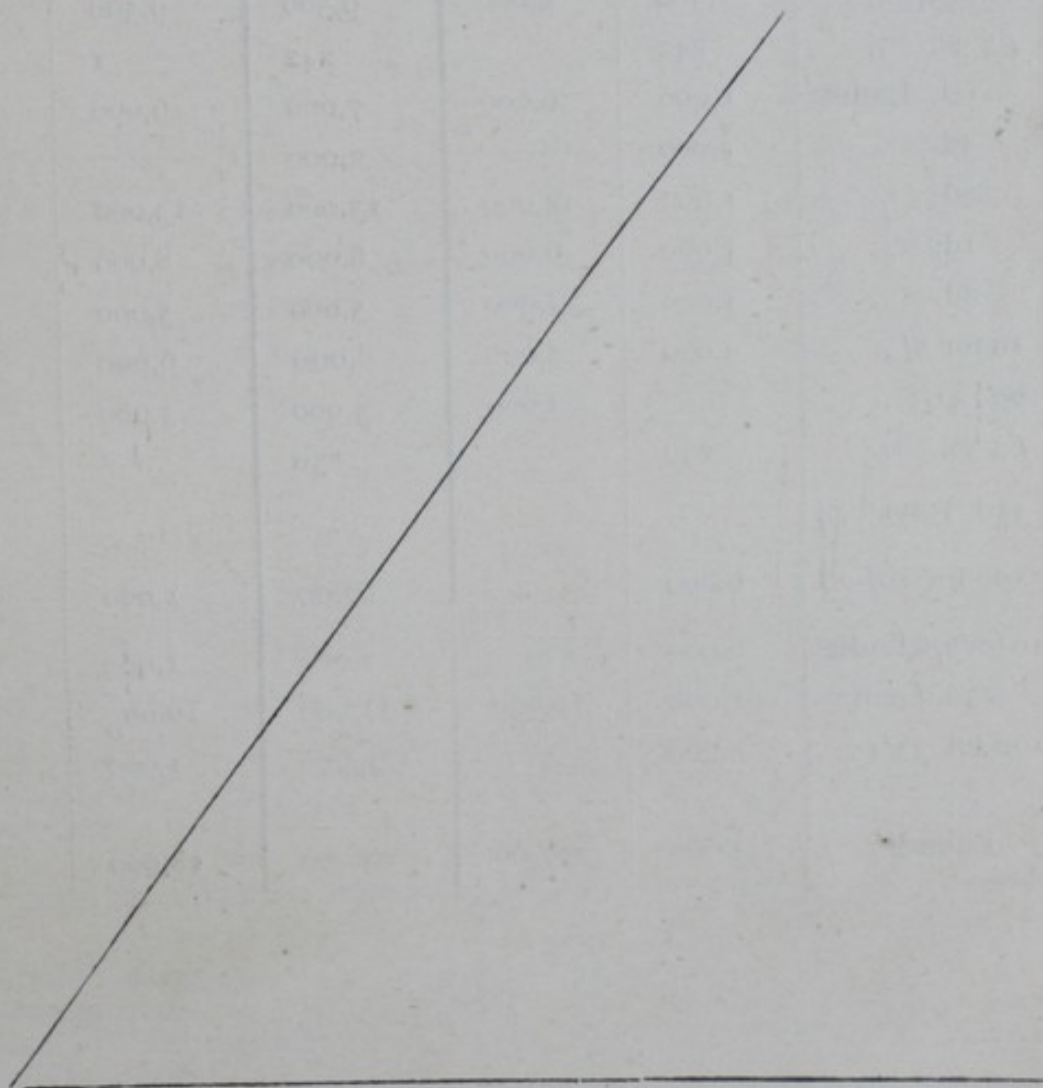



During the 13 weeks ending 1st April, 1893, being the first quarter of the registration year, 806 births and 611 deaths were registered in Paddington. Of the 806 births, comprising 399 male and 407 female

children, 679 occurred in St. Mary's and 127 in St. John's Sub-district. The 806 births were equivalent to an annual rate of 27·0 per 1,000 of the estimated population of the Parish. In London the births were equivalent to an annual rate of 32·7 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Deducting from the total deaths (611) those of 72 non-parishioners—71 in St. Mary's Hospital and 1 in the Lock Hospital—the corrected number of deaths in the Parish is seen to be 539. To this number must be added the deaths of 39 parishioners in extra-parochial hospitals and institutions within the Metropolis during the same period, making a total of 578 deaths—243 males and 335 females—equivalent to an annual death-rate of 19·4 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The number of births and deaths, together with the birth and death-rates in the parish, and in its two Sub-districts, during the quarter, is shown in the subjoined table :—

In the public Institutions in the parish there were 149 deaths, viz., 13 in the Workhouse, 40 in the Paddington Infirmary, 1 in the Lock Hospital, and 95 in St. Mary's Hospital.

The 13 deaths in the Workhouse—6 males and 7 females—and the 40 deaths in the Paddington Infirmary—23 males and 17 females—being regarded as those of parishioners, are included in the 449 deaths in St. Mary's Sub-district. 71 of the deaths in St. Mary's Hospital were of non-parishioners, as was also

the 1 death in the Lock Hospital, and are therefore not dealt with in this Report.

These 39 deaths—35 of parishioners from St. Mary's Sub-district, and 4 of parishioners from St. John's—are included in the corrected total deaths (578), and throughout this Report are dealt with in the same manner as if they had actually occurred in the parish.

Of the 578 deaths, 85 were of infants under 1 year of age, 130 of children under 5 years, and 176 of persons aged 65 years and upwards.

The rate of infantile mortality in Paddington was 105 deaths to 1,000 registered births. In London it was 131. In the thirty-three largest provincial towns it ranged from 124 in Huddersfield to 203 in Burnley. In sixty-seven other large town districts the infant mortality averaged 142 per 1,000 births, ranging from 79 in Scarborough to 221 in Merthyr Tydvil.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age constituted 22·5 per cent. of the total deaths. 20 of these deaths were due to one or other of the seven principal zymotic diseases, of which 19 occurred in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's Sub-district.

The number of deaths from the seven principal preventable (zymotic) diseases was 31, as compared with 34 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and was equivalent to an annual rate of 1·04 per 1,000 inhabitants. In London the zymotic death-rate was equivalent to an annual rate of 2·02 per 1,000 inhabitants. In the 33 great towns it ranged from 0·67 in Wolverhampton to 6·53 in Bolton. In England and Wales the deaths corresponded to an annual rate of 1·60 per 1,000 persons living, the average annual rate in the ten preceding first quarters having been 1·87.

Small-pox caused no death in Paddington, nor was any case notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department.

In London there were 38 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·04 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Measles caused only 2 deaths, both of which occurred in St. Mary's Sub-district, as compared with 6 in the corresponding quarter of last year.

In London there were 317 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·30 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Scarlet Fever caused only 4 deaths, all of which occurred in St. Mary's Sub-district. 104 cases were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 66 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 76 of these cases—67 from St. Mary's and 9 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—20 in St. Mary's and 8 in St. John's—being treated at home.

In London there were 335 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·31 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diphtheria caused 14 deaths—11 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·5 per 1,000 inhabitants. The number of deaths during the corresponding quarter of last year was 2. 53 cases were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 20 during the corresponding quarter of last year. 39 of these cases—38 from St. Mary's and 1 from St. John's Sub-

district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—9 in St. Mary's and 5 in St. John's—being treated at home.

All the houses in which Diphtheria occurred were carefully inspected, also the cisterns and water supply, and the house drains were examined. In almost every instance sanitary defects were discovered. Details of the sanitary condition of the houses in which deaths occurred are shown as under :—

North Wharf Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective and combined with that of No. 23, also defective and unventilated. No intercepting syphon. One water supply with water-waste preventers.

Elgin Avenue.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C. on landing an old pan-closet. W.C. in back area a “long-hopper” pan with water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Neeld Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard a “long-hopper” pan, supplied from cistern by means of spindle-valve. Cistern uncovered. One water supply.

Welling's Place.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Iron dip-traps to inlets. No intercepting syphon. One water supply with water-waste preventer.

Alfred Road.—Combined drainage. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Soil-

pipe, consisting of 4-in. glazed stoneware pipes, inside house and unventilated. Rain-water pipe directly connected with drain. Bell-traps. W.C. in yard, "long-hopper" pan with water-waste preventer. Separate water supply.

Campbell Street.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard with "long-hopper" pan and spindle-valve. One water supply.

Cornwall Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Bell-traps with defective brick connections. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. Waste-pipes from scullery sink and lavatory basin directly connected with drain. W.C. on landing an old pan-closet. W.C. in basement a "long-hopper" pan, and no external ventilation to closet. One water supply.

Barnsdale Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Clay joints. No intercepting syphon. W.C. on landing an old pan-closet. W.C. in yard, "long-hopper" pan with water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Hermitage Street.—Ground opened. Combined drainage. Drain defective. Joints open. Separate water supply.

Amberley Road.—Two deaths. Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. W.C. on first floor a "short-hopper," and W.C. in

yard a "long-hopper" pan, with water-waste preventers. Separate water supply.

Gloucester Square.—A new iron drain, sound, and ventilated. Sanitary arrangements satisfactory. Separate water supply.

Connaught Square.—Ground opened. 6-in. pipe drain leaky and unventilated, and laid in an old brick barrel drain. Pan-closets. One water supply.

Shirland Road.—Water test. Drain sound. Sanitary arrangements satisfactory.

In London there were 639 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·60 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Whooping Cough caused 8 deaths, all of which occurred in St. Mary's Sub-district, and were equivalent to an annual rate of 0·3 per 1,000 inhabitants. The number of deaths during the corresponding quarter of last year was 16.

In London there were 531 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·49 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Fever (Typhoid) caused only 2 deaths—1 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's Sub-district. 7 cases were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 5 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 3 of these cases—2 from St. Mary's and 1 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—3 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's—being treated at home.

Windsor Gardens.—Ground opened. Combined drainage. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe inside the house and unventilated. W.C. on top floor landing a “short-hopper” pan with lead D trap beneath. No external ventilation to closet. One water supply. In this house the service-pipe was laid in the same trench as the drain, and was defective. The service being intermittent, the supply-pipe is at times empty, when it serves as a conduit for foul air into the cistern from the trench in which the defective drain is laid, and for sewage matter when the water is again turned on.

Shirland Road.—Ground opened. Water test. Drain defective. Iron D traps to surface inlets. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard and on first floor landing with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

In London there were 105 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·10 per 1,000 inhabitants.

METEOROLOGY.

Mr. James Glaisher, F.R.S., in his Report to the Registrar-General on the Meteorology of England and Wales, observes that the weather in January was very cold during the first week, cold till the 18th, with frequent snow and rain, but was warm with fogs from the 19th. The temperature of the air was constantly below its average till the 18th. The fall of rain at most places was a little below the average.

In February the weather was warm and unsettled, with rain falling on two days out of three at nearly all stations. The temperature of the air was above its average from the 1st to the 3rd, and from the 7th to the 21st. The fall of rain was above the average.

In March the weather was exceptionally fine, warm, and dry. The temperature of the air, except from the 17th to the 21st, was above the average. The fall of rain was remarkably small.

About London the mean temperature of the air for January was $35^{\circ}4$, being $1^{\circ}2$ below the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for February was $41^{\circ}1$, being $2^{\circ}3$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for March was $46^{\circ}2$, being $5^{\circ}2$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air in London for the quarter was $40^{\circ}9$.

The rainfall in London during the quarter was 4.60 inches.

During the 13 weeks ending 1st July, 1893, being the second quarter of the registration year, 754 births and 518 deaths were registered in Paddington. Of

the 754 births, comprising 368 male and 386 female children, 648 occurred in St. Mary's and 106 in St. John's Sub-district. The 754 births were equivalent to an annual rate of 25·3 per 1,000 of the estimated population of the Parish. In London the births were equivalent to an annual rate of 30·7 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Deducting from the total deaths (518) those of 91 non-parishioners in St. Mary's Hospital, the corrected number of deaths in the Parish is seen to be 427. To this number must be added the deaths of 44 parishioners in extra-parochial hospitals and institutions within the Metropolis during the same period, making a total of 471 deaths—233 males and 238 females—equivalent to an annual death-rate of 15·8 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The number of births and deaths, together with the birth and death-rate in the Parish, and in its two sub-districts, during the quarter, is shown in the sub-joined table :—

In the public Institutions in the Parish there were 160 deaths, viz., 7 in the Workhouse, 40 in the Paddington Infirmary, and 113 in St. Mary's Hospital.

The 7 deaths in the Workhouse—3 males and 4 females—and the 40 deaths in the Paddington Infirmary—25 males and 15 females—being regarded as those of parishioners, are included in the 360 deaths in St. Mary's Sub-district. 91 of the deaths in St.

Mary's Hospital were of non-parishioners, and are therefore not dealt with in this Report.

Of the 471 deaths, 107 were of infants under 1 year of age, 163 of children under 5 years, and 90 of persons aged 65 years and upwards.

The rate of infantile mortality in Paddington was 142 deaths to 1,000 registered births. In London it was 148. In the 33 largest provincial towns it ranged from 103 in Croydon to 248 in Preston. In 67 other large town districts the infant mortality averaged 144 per 1,000 births, ranging from 79 in Reading to 212 in St. Helen's.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age constituted 34·6 per cent. of the total deaths. 43 of these deaths were due to one or other of the seven principal zymotic diseases, of which 32 occurred in St. Mary's, and 11 in St. John's Sub-district.

The number of deaths from the seven principal preventable (zymotic) diseases was 57, as compared with 85 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and was equivalent to an annual rate of 1·9 per 1,000 inhabitants. In London, the zymotic death-rate was equivalent to an annual rate of 2·82 per 1,000 inhabitants. In the 33 great towns it ranged from 0·78 in Huddersfield to 8·08 in Preston. In England and Wales the deaths corresponded to an annual rate of 1·98 per 1,000 persons living, the average annual rate in the ten preceding second quarters having been 1·80.

Small-pox caused 3 deaths in Paddington during the quarter, all of which occurred in St. Mary's Sub-

district. 29 cases—26 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified to the Sanitary Department during the quarter. All the cases were removed to Hospital.

In London there were 100 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·09 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Measles caused no death in Paddington, as compared with 58 in the corresponding quarter of last year.

In London there were 439 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·41 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Scarlet Fever caused 5 deaths—3 in St. Mary's and 2 in St. John's Sub-district—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·16 per 1,000 inhabitants. 187 cases—139 in St. Mary's and 48 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 93 in the corresponding period of last year. 105 of these cases—82 from St. Mary's and 23 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—57 in St. Mary's and 25 in St. John's—being treated at home.

In London there were 336 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·31 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diphtheria caused 13 deaths—9 in St. Mary's and 4 in St. John's Sub-district—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·4 per 1,000 inhabitants. The number

of deaths during the corresponding quarter of last year was 6. 66 cases—51 in St. Mary's and 15 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 32 in the corresponding quarter of last year. These 66 cases do not include 4 cases of Membranous Croup. 37 cases—26 from St. Mary's and 11 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—25 in St. Mary's and 4 in St. John's—being treated at home.

All the houses in which Diphtheria occurred were carefully inspected, not omitting the cisterns, and the house-drains where necessary were tested with water. Details of the sanitary condition of the houses in which the 13 deaths occurred are shown as under :—

Chippenham Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Bell traps. No intercepting syphon. W.C. on first floor and in yard, “wash-outs” with water-waste preventers. Separate water supply.

Blomfield Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe inside premises and not ventilated. Waste pipe from sink in W.C. on first floor apparently connected with D trap in closet or soil-pipe. W.C. on first floor, a pan closet. W.C. in front area, a “wash-out” with water-waste preventer. Separate water supply.

Craven Hill Gardens.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Bell trap. No intercepting

syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe and opens near window. Waste-pipe from cistern directly connected with drain. W.C. on ground floor, a pan closet. W.C. in basement, a "long-hopper." Cistern dirty. One water supply.

Blomfield Street.—Ground opened. Combined drainage. Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe and opens near window. W.C. on first floor, a pan closet. W.C. in yard, a "short hopper" pan, with water-waste preventer. Cistern uncovered. Separate water supply, but water can be drawn from same cistern as supplies the closets.

Woodfield Place.—Water test. Drain sound. W.C. in yard, a "long hopper" pan, with water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Oxford Mews.—Water test, Drain sound, trapped, and ventilated. One water supply with water-waste preventer.

High Road, Kilburn.—Ground opened Water test. Drain defective. Iron D traps to surface inlets. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe inside the premises and unventilated. W.C. on ground floor, an old pan closet, foul. W.C. in yard, a "long hopper" pan, foul, with spindle valve. One water supply.

Hall Place.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Pipes unjointed. No intercepting syphon. Gully traps with defective brick connections. Zinc rain-water

pipe with slip joints, and directly connected with drain. W.C. in yard, with defective flushing apparatus. Separate water supply.

Fernhead Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Bell traps. Soil pipe serves as rain-water pipe and opens near window. One water supply with water-waste preventer.

Hall Place.—Ground opened. Drain defective and unventilated. Joints open. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Defective iron D trap to surface inlet. W.C. in yard, with "long hopper" pan and spindle valve. One water supply.

Netley Street.—Disease contracted in the Western Fever Hospital, when patient was convalescent from Scarlet Fever.

Poplar Place.—Ground opened. Brick-barrel drain, partly choked. Pipes in connection with the same not properly jointed. No intercepting syphon. Separate water supply.

Church Place.—Drain sound. No intercepting syphon. Separate water supply.

In London there were 677 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·63 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Whooping Cough caused 21 deaths—18 in St.

Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·7 per 1,000 inhabitants. The number of deaths during the corresponding quarter of last year was 6.

In London there were 592 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·55 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Fever (Typhus).—One case was notified in St. Mary's Sub-district. The disease is believed to have been contracted abroad. The patient was ill when he arrived in this country.

Fever (Typhoid) caused 3 deaths—2 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's Sub-district. 17 cases—14 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 9 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 11 of these cases—9 from St. Mary's and 2 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—5 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's—being treated at home.

Harrow Road.—This drain was reconstructed two years ago. Water test. Drain sound. Soil pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C. on landing, and in back area, "short hoppers" with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

Richmond Road.—Ground opened. Water test. Drain defective. Clay joints. No intercepting syphon.

Soil-pipe inside the house, and unventilated. W.C. on landing, a "long hopper" pan, foul and insufficiently flushed. Cistern foul. One water supply.

Kilburn Park Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Soil saturated with sewage. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Soil pipe serves as rain-water pipe, the joints of which are defective. W.C.'s in basement and on first floor landing are "wash-outs," with water-waste preventers. Separate water supply.

In London there were 122 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·11 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diarrhæa caused 12 deaths—9 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·4 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In London there were 757 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·72 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The Canal Basin.

The Canal Basin was emptied on Saturday, April 1st, and re-filled with water on the 5th. About 500 tons of mud were removed. The concreting of the bottom of the Basin now extends from South Wharf Road up to and under Bishop's Road Bridge.

METEOROLOGY.

Mr. James Glaisher, F.R.S., in his Report to the Registrar-General on the Meteorology of England and Wales, observes that the weather in April was remarkable for its small rainfall, unusual amount of sunshine and fineness generally. With the exception of seven days the temperature of the air was above the average every day, and after the middle of the month was that of summer. The fall of rain was the smallest since 1855.

The weather in May was remarkably fine and dry. The temperature of the air was above its average on every day till the 29th, with the exception of the 7th and 8th. The fall of rain was small.

The weather in June was very fine and dry. The temperature of the air was generally above the average, but was occasionally for two or three days together below. The fall of rain was small, the drought, which began on March 5th, continuing till June 22nd.

About London the mean temperature of the air for April was $51^{\circ}4$, being $5^{\circ}3$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for May was $57^{\circ}7$, being $5^{\circ}2$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for June was $61^{\circ}8$, being $3^{\circ}5$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air in London for the quarter was $57^{\circ}0$.

The rainfall in London during the quarter was 1.47 inches.

During the 13 weeks ending the 30th September, 1893, being the third quarter of the registration year, 751 births and 540 deaths were registered in Paddington. Of the 751 births, comprising 380 male

and 371 female children, 642 occurred in St. Mary's, and 109 in St. John's Sub-district. The 751 births were equivalent to an annual rate of 24·9 per 1,000 of the estimated population of the Parish. In London the births were equivalent to an annual rate of 30·6 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Deducting from the total deaths (540) those of 71 non-parishioners—70 in St. Mary's Hospital and 1 in the Lock Hospital—the corrected number of deaths in the Parish is seen to be 469. To this number must be added the deaths of 40 parishioners in extra-parochial hospitals and institutions within the Metropolis during the same period, making a total of 509 deaths—244 males and 265 females—equivalent to an annual death-rate of 16·9 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The number of births and deaths, together with the birth and death-rates in the Parish, and in its two sub-districts during the quarter, is shown in the sub-joined table:—

were of non-parishioners, and are therefore not dealt with in this Report.

Of the 509 deaths, 162 were of infants under 1 year of age, 220 of children under 5 years, and 90 of persons aged 65 years and upwards.

The rate of infantile mortality in Paddington was 216 deaths to 1,000 registered births, as compared with 189 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In London it was 208, as compared with 171 last year. In the thirty-three largest provincial towns it ranged from 154 in Bristol to 476 in Preston. In sixty-seven other large town districts the infant mortality averaged 245 per 1,000 births, ranging from 140 in Devonport to 405 in Grimsby.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age constituted 43·2 per cent. of the total deaths. 104 of these deaths were due to one or other of the seven

principal zymotic diseases, of which 87 occurred in St. Mary's, and 17 in St. John's Sub-district.

The number of deaths from the seven principal preventable (zymotic) diseases was 126, as compared with 92 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and was equivalent to an annual rate of 4·2 per 1,000 inhabitants, as compared with 3·1 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In London the zymotic death-rate was equivalent to an annual rate of 4·52 per 1,000 inhabitants, as compared with 3·31 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In the 33 great towns it

ranged from 1·89 in Bristol to 11·61 in Preston. In England and Wales the deaths corresponded to an annual rate of 4·27 per 1,000 persons living, the average annual rate in the ten preceding third quarters having been 2·80.

Small-pox caused 1 death in Paddington, which occurred in St. John's Sub-district. 9 cases—5 in St. Mary's and 4 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, and were removed to Hospital.

In London there were 49 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·05 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Measles caused 18 deaths, as compared with 16 in the corresponding quarter of last year. All occurred in St. Mary's Sub-district, and were equivalent to an annual rate of 0·59 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In London there were 459 deaths, equivalent to an annual death rate of 0·43 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Scarlet Fever caused 5 deaths, as compared with 4 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 266 cases—223 in St. Mary's and 43 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department. 157 of these cases—131 from St. Mary's and 26 from St. John's—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—92 in St. Mary's and 17 in St. John's—being treated at home.

In London there were 458 deaths, equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·43 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diphtheria caused 17 deaths—as compared with 10 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and were equivalent to an annual rate of 0·56 per 1,000 inhabitants. 11 occurred in St. Mary's and 6 in St. John's Sub-district. 67 cases—56 from St. Mary's and 11 from St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department. 30 of these cases—25 from St. Mary's and 5 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—31 in St. Mary's and 6 in St. John's—being treated at home.

All the houses in which *Diphtheria* and Typhoid Fever occur are carefully inspected, not omitting the cisterns; and the house-drains, where necessary, are tested with water. Details of the sanitary condition of the houses in which the deaths occurred are shown as under :—

Shirland Road.—Ground opened. Water test. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. W.C. on first floor a “cottage pan,” and in yard a “long-hopper,” with water-waste preventers. Separate water supply.

Shirland Road.—Disease contracted in Willesden, from which place deceased was removed to St. Mary's Hospital.

Chippenham Mews.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Defective bell-traps. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Scullery sink waste defective,

and directly connected with drain. Rain-water pipe directly connected with drain, and opens near windows. W.C. with "long-hopper" pan foul and defective, situated under stairs, insufficiently ventilated, and has no water supply. Premises very dirty. One water supply. Cistern foul.

Portsdown Road.—Water test. Drain defective. W.C. on second floor a "wash-out," and W.C. in yard a "short-hopper" pan with water-waste preventer. Separate water supply.

Hermitage Street.—Ground open. Water test. Drain defective. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard a "short-hopper" with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

North Wharf Road.—Ground opened. Combined drainage. Drain defective. Joints open. Separate water supply.

North Wharf Road.—Drain sound and ventilated. W.C., "cottage basin" with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

North Wharf Road.—Combined drainage. Drain sound. No intercepting syphon. Constant water supply.

Junction Mews.—No intercepting syphon. W.C., which is supplied by water-waste preventer, is under the stairs, and without external ventilation. Paving in yard defective.

South Wharf Road.—Ground opened. Drain very defective and unventilated. No intercepting syphon.

W.C. in yard a "long-hopper" with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

Conduit Mews.—Drain sound. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory.

In London there were 860 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·80 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Whooping Cough caused 19 deaths—17 in St. Mary's and 2 in St. John's Sub-district—as compared with 1 in the corresponding quarter of last year, being equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·63 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In London there were 619 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·58 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Fever (Typhoid) caused 6 deaths—2 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—as compared with 2 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 15 cases—12 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's Sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 9 in the corresponding quarter of last year. 8 of these cases—6 from St. Mary's and 2 from St. John's Sub-district—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—6 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's—being treated at home.

The sanitary condition of the houses in which the deaths occurred was as under:—

Burwood Place.—Water test. Drain defective. W.C.'s are "flush-outs" with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

Star Street.—Ground opened. Water test. Drain defective. Bell-traps. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard a "short-hopper" with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

Junction Place.—Combined drainage. No intercepting syphon. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory. Constant water supply.

Hormead Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory. One water supply.

Maida Vale.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. W.C. on second floor a "short-hopper," and W.C. in yard a "long-hopper," both with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

In London there were 219 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·20 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diarrhœa caused 60 deaths, as compared with 59 in the corresponding quarter of last year—equivalent to an annual death rate of 2·0 per 1,000 inhabitants. 50 of the deaths occurred in St. Mary's and 10 in St. John's Sub-district.

In London there were 2,186 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 2·03 per 1,000 inhabitants.

METEOROLOGY.

Mr. James Glaisher, F.R.S., in his Report to the Registrar-General on the Meteorology of England and Wales, observes that the weather in the early part of July was very warm, and the month was generally fine and warm. The temperature of the air was above its average till the 11th and from the 20th to the 25th. The fall of rain was generally small, but at a few stations it slightly exceeded the average.

In August the weather was very warm, fine, and dry, with a remarkably hot period extending from the 8th to the 18th. The temperature of the air was above the average, except till the 7th, and from the 23rd to the 29th. The fall of rain was below the average.

In September the weather was generally very fine and dry, particularly during the first half of the month. The temperature of the air was above the average till the 8th, from the 14th to the 20th, and from the 26th to the end of the month. The fall of rain was very variable, being much below the average at most stations, and fully up to it at a few.

About London the mean temperature of the air for July was $63^{\circ}\cdot 1$, being $1^{\circ}\cdot 5$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for August was $65^{\circ}5$, being $4^{\circ}6$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for September was $57^{\circ}1$, being $0^{\circ}5$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air in London for the quarter was $61^{\circ}9$.

The rainfall in London during the quarter was $5\cdot87$ inches.

During the 13 weeks ending 30th December, 1893, being the fourth quarter of the registration year, 700 births and 608 deaths were registered in Paddington. Of the 700 births, comprising 359 male and 341 female

children, 598 occurred in St. Mary's and 102 in St. John's Sub-district. The 700 births were equivalent to an annual rate of 23·2 per 1,000 of the estimated population of the Parish. In London the births were equivalent to an annual rate of 29·8 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Deducting from the total deaths (608) those of 60 non-parishioners—59 in St. Mary's Hospital and 1 in the Lock Hospital—the corrected number of deaths in the Parish is seen to be 548. To this number must be added the deaths of 49 parishioners in extra-parochial hospitals and institutions within the Metropolis during the same period, making a total of 597 deaths—271 males and 326 females—equivalent to an annual death-rate of 19·8 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The number of births and deaths, together with the birth and death-rates in the parish, and in its two sub-districts, during the quarter, is shown in the sub-joined table :—

In the public Institutions in the parish there were 142 deaths, viz., 8 in the Workhouse, 41 in the Paddington Infirmary, 1 in the Lock Hospital, and 92 in St. Mary's Hospital.

The 8 deaths in the Workhouse—1 male and 7 females—and the 41 deaths in the Paddington Infirmary—20 males and 21 females—being regarded as those of parishioners, are included in the 456 deaths in St. Mary's sub-district. 59 of the deaths in St. Mary's Hospital, and the 1 death in the Lock Hos-

pital, were of non-parishioners, and are therefore not dealt with in this Report.

Of the 597 deaths, 105 were of infants under 1 year of age, 184 of children under 5 years, and 163 of persons aged 65 years and upwards.

The rate of infantile mortality in Paddington was 150 deaths to 1,000 registered births, as compared with 120 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In London it was 173, as compared with 140 last year. In the thirty-three largest provincial towns it ranged from 127 in Portsmouth to 229 in Blackburn. In sixty-seven other large town districts the infantile mortality averaged 161 per 1,000 births, ranging from 75 in Hastings to 269 in Darwen.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age constituted 30·8 per cent. of the total deaths. 56 of these deaths were due to one or other of the seven prin-

cipal zymotic diseases, of which 46 occurred in St. Mary's and 10 in St. John's sub-district.

The number of deaths from the seven principal preventable (zymotic) diseases was 79, as compared with 37 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and was equivalent to an annual rate of 2·6 per 1,000 inhabitants, as compared with 1·2 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In London the zymotic death-rate was equivalent to an annual rate of 2·96 per 1,000 inhabitants, as compared with 1·89 in the corresponding quarter of last year. In the 33 great towns

it ranged from 0·52 in Halifax to 3·97 in Norwich. In England and Wales the deaths corresponded to an annual rate of 2·01 per 1,000 persons living, the average annual rate in the ten preceding fourth quarters having been 2·06.

Small-pox caused no death in Paddington. 29 cases—28 in St. Mary's and 1 in St. John's sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, and of these 27 were removed to Hospital, and 2 treated at home.

In London there were 19 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·02 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Measles caused 12 deaths, as compared with 1 in the corresponding quarter of last year. All occurred in St. Mary's sub-district, and were equivalent to an annual rate of 0·4 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In London there were 446 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·42 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Scarlet Fever caused 14 deaths, 13 in St. Mary's sub-district, and 1 in St. John's—equivalent to an annual rate of 0·5 per 1,000. The number of deaths in the corresponding quarter of last year was 5. 212 cases—169 in St. Mary's and 43 in St. John's sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department. 110 of these cases—94 from St. Mary's and 16 from St. John's—were removed to

Hospital, the remainder—75 in St. Mary's, and 27 in St. John's—being treated at home.

In London there were 467 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·43 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Diphtheria caused 25 deaths, as compared with 14 in the corresponding quarter of last year, and were equivalent to an annual rate of 0·8 per 1,000 inhabitants. 14 occurred in St. Mary's and 11 in St. John's sub-district. 95 cases—78 from St. Mary's and 17 from St. John's—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department. 38 of these cases—30 from St. Mary's and 8 from St. John's—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—48 in St. Mary's and 9 in St. John's—being treated at home.

All the houses in which *Diphtheria* and Typhoid Fever occurred were carefully inspected, not omitting the cisterns; and the house-drains, where necessary, were tested with water. Details of the sanitary condition of the houses in which the deaths occurred are shewn as under :—

DIPHTHERIA.

Westbourne Park Villas.—Drain defective. Open joints. No intercepting syphon-trap. Unventilated soil-pipe. Drainage combined with next house. Rain-water pipe direct to drain and opens near windows. W.C. a “long-hopper.”

Hasborough Street.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Bell traps. No intercepting syphon. Soil pipe serves as rain-water pipe. Waste-pipe from scullery—sink directly connected with drain. Pan-closet on ground floor foul and defective. W.C. in basement a “short-hopper” with water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Cirencester Street.—Ground opened. Drain unventilated and with open joints. No intercepting syphon. W.C. in yard a “long-hopper” pan with water-waste preventer. Premises dirty. Separate water supply.

Dartington Terrace. — Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Rain-water pipe directly connected to drain, and opens about one foot above windows. Soil-pipe not ventilated. W.C. a “long-hopper.”

Southam Street.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Bell traps. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe, and opens under windows. Premises dirty. One water supply with water-waste preventer.

Palace Court.—Water test. Drain sound. Soil-pipe tested with smoke-test, but no defects apparent. Cisterns require cleansing. Gulley traps and inspection chambers very dirty. Man-hole covers defective. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory.

Portsdown Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Soil saturated with sewage. No intercepting syphon. Two soil-pipes outside premises unventilated. Waste-pipes from lavatory basin on ground floor, sink on second floor, and from lavatory basin and bath on third floor directly connected to soil-pipes. W.C.'s on ground floor and on second floor, pan-closets without flushing apparatus. W.C. in front area a "long-hopper" pan with flushing apparatus. Separate water supply.

Great Western Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. Waste-pipe from scullery sink directly connected to drain. Constant water supply.

Coburg Place.—Water test. Drain sound and ventilated. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory. Separate water supply.

Hall Place.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Gulley traps with defective brickwork connections to drain. Rain-water pipe directly connected to drain, with defective brickwork; the head of same opening near window. Waste-pipe from scullery sink directly connected to drain. W.C. in yard a "long-hopper" pan with flushing rim and water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Saltram Crescent.—Water test. Drain defective. One water supply.

Bradiston Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C.'s in yard and on first and second floors "short-hopper" pans with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

Ashmore Road.—Water test. Drain defective and choked. Inspection chamber partly full. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C.'s in yard and on first and second floors "short-hopper" pans with water-waste preventers. One water supply.

Chapel Side.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Separate water supply.

Talbot Road.—Water test. Drains sound and recently re-constructed. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory.

Richmond Mews West.—Drain defective. Clay joints. Bell traps. No intercepting syphon. Rain-water pipe ventilates the drain, but opens away from all windows. W.C. insufficiently ventilated on ground-floor with "long-hopper" pan and water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Amberley Road Board Schools. — Water test. Drains sound. Properly ventilated. W.C. in caretaker's house of "container" pattern and foul.

Fernhead Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C. on landing and in yard "short-hopper" pans with water-waste preventer. One water supply.

Westbourne Park Villas.—Water test. Drain sound. W.C. in yard a “long-hopper” pan with water-waste preventer. W.C. on landing, a “valve.” Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory. Separate water supply.

Eastbourne Terrace.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe and opens near top back window. Three W.C.’s of “long-hopper” and “container” pattern.

Hermitage Street.—Drain sound and recently re-constructed.

Upper Brook Mews.—Drain defective and improperly ventilated. No intercepting syphon. W.C., which is in kitchen, with “long-hopper” and no external ventilation. No cover to cistern. Premises dirty. Paving in stable defective.

Church Place.—Drain improperly ventilated. No intercepting syphon. W.C. a cottage pan with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

In London there were 1,089 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 1·01 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Whooping Cough caused 12 deaths, as compared with 6 in the corresponding quarter of last year, being equivalent to an annual rate of 0·4 per 1,000 inhabitants. All occurred in St. Mary’s sub-district.

In London there were 588 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·55 per 1,000 inhabitants.

Fever (Typhoid) caused 8 deaths—6 in St. Mary's and 2 in St. John's sub-district—equivalent to an annual death-rate of 0·3 per 1,000 inhabitants. The number of deaths during the corresponding quarter of last year was 4. 26 cases—22 in St. Mary's and 4 in St. John's sub-district—were notified during the quarter to the Sanitary Department, as compared with 24 during the corresponding quarter of last year. 5 of these cases—4 from St. Mary's and 1 from St. John's—were removed to Hospital, the remainder—18 in St. Mary's and 3 in St. John's—being treated at home.

TYPHOID FEVER.

Westmoreland Road.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Joints open. No intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C. on landing of “container” pattern. W.C. in yard a “long-hopper” pan with water-waste preventer.

Hyde Park Gardens.—Water test. Drain sound. Other sanitary arrangements satisfactory.

Shirland Road.—Water test. Drain defective. Soil-pipe built into wall and unventilated. One water supply with water-waste preventer.

Elgin Avenue.—Ground opened. Drain defective. Clay joints. Bell traps. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe and opens under windows. Rain-water pipe from back addition directly connected to drain. W.C. on

ground-floor and on first-floor landing of the "container" pattern. W.C. in basement a "long-hopper" pan foul. One water supply.

Fermoy Road.—Drain defective. Clay joints. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Soil-pipe serves as rain-water pipe. W.C. in yard a "long-hopper" pan with water-waste preventer. W.C. on landing of "container" pattern. One water supply.

Chichester Road.—Disease contracted by deceased while nursing a case of typhoid fever at Worthing.

Welling's Place.—Drain connected with stables. Apparently no intercepting syphon. Sink-waste directly connected to drain. W.C. placed under stairs a "long-hopper" pan with water-waste preventer. Constant water supply.

In London there were 273 deaths, equivalent to an annual rate of 0·25 per 1,000.

METEOROLOGY.

Mr. James Glaisher, F.R.S., in his Report to the Registrar-General on the Meteorology of England and Wales, observes that the weather in October was generally fine, with frequent rain towards the middle of the month. The temperature of the air was generally above its average till the 29th, and below the average on the last two days. The fall of rain was above its average at most stations.

In November the weather was cloudy and cold, with frequent changes, both of temperature and atmospheric pressure. The temperature of the air was generally below its average till the 27th, and above from the 28th to the 30th. The fall of rain about London was a little below the average.

In December the weather was generally dull and mild. The temperature of the air was generally above the average from the 6th to the 28th. The fall of rain was a little above its average at all stations.

About London the mean temperature of the air for October was $51^{\circ}5$, being $2^{\circ}1$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for November was $41^{\circ}8$, being $0^{\circ}7$ below the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air for December was $40^{\circ}6$, being $1^{\circ}6$ above the average of 122 years.

The mean temperature of the air in London for the quarter was $44^{\circ}6$.

The rainfall in London during the quarter was 8.19 inches.

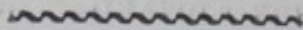
