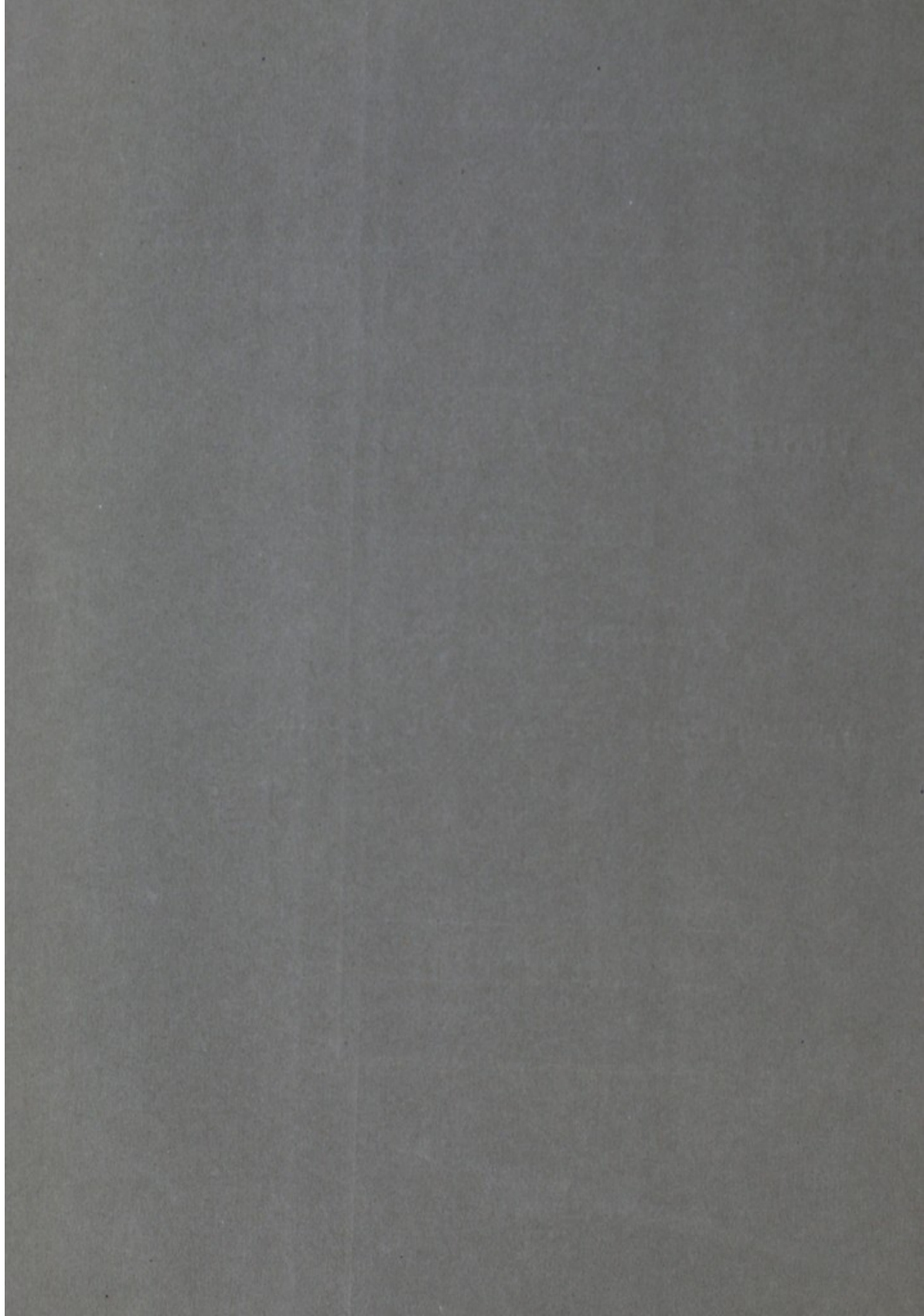

SEVENTH GENERAL REPORT

OF THE

Vestry of the Parish of Rotherhithe,

SURREY.

1863.

During the past year the Vestry has held twenty-two General and Special Meetings, and twenty-four Committee Meetings.

Sewers Works.

The lengths of drains and sewers laid by the Vestry to Lady-day, are :—

Eleven new road-gulleys, one side entrance, and forty-one drain mouths and junctions to sewers, have been formed.

Eighty-four applications have been made to drain houses into sewers, including notices of intended new buildings and plans checked and approved, comprising about 223 houses and premises, 188 of which have been drained and completed.

About fifty cesspools have been done away with.

Application having been made for the building and drainage of eighteen houses at the corner of Manor-road and Rotherhithe New-road, and for the filling up of a portion of the open ditch in front thereof, the Vestry ordered that 15 inch pipes should be laid in lieu of the ditch, and three road-gulleys formed; the applicant to be allowed to execute the work. The Vestry also directed that the said houses should be drained into cesspools, with an overflow into the said pipe, as a temporary measure.

A similar arrangement, as to piping the ditch and drainage, was made and carried out by Mr. Beardsell upon his erecting two houses in Manor-road, and abutting upon the said ditch.

The sewer at the rear of Dartmouth-terrace, Rotherhithe New-road, has been continued westward to the cross ditch by the mill, the ground landlord having contributed towards the cost as before.

Upon the erection of a Tar Distillery at the east end of Commercial-street, the applicants were allowed to arch over a portion of the open sewer there, upon their constructing a man-hole, and providing means of access for working the slide at the mouth of the Commercial-street drains.

In consequence of the great nuisances constantly arising from the want of means of drainage for the houses, Gardener's-row, Debnam's-road, &c., Rotherhithe New-road, the Vestry caused an Estimate to be made of the cost of carrying up a 12-inch pipe from the Sewer by the Manor Mill westward, as a temporary measure, such Estimate being £170; and the Vestry determined, under the circumstances, to contribute one moiety of the cost of such drain, upon the owners of the property paying the other moiety. The plan was approved by the Metropolitan Board of Works, and the majority of the owners having paid their amounts, the work has been carried out; and the Vestry have given directions that the amounts remaining unpaid are to be recovered from the owners in default.

The owners of the houses Maria-terrace, Branch-road, Rotherhithe New-road, having contributed towards the cost thereof, a pipe drain has been continued from the sewer, Dartmouth-terrace, up to the said houses, and the house drains have been connected with the same at the owners' expense.

The Vestry, in July, 1862, by the invitation of the Metropolitan Board of Works, again visited the Main Drainage Works, and report their approval of the progress made therewith.

The paving and kerbing of the footway on the left-hand side of the Deptford Lower-road, from China Hall-gate to Plough-road, stands over until the Main Drainage Works now in progress are completed.

The owner of the thirteen new houses, Trafalgar-terrace, Clarence-street, having applied to have the footway in front thereof paved with York paving and kerb, the Vestry did the work upon the applicant paying one moiety of the cost thereof, viz., £22.

The Vestry having deemed it expedient that Cross-street, Deptford-road, should be properly made up, paved, and drained, they caused an Estimate of the cost thereof to be made by their Surveyors, amounting to £234 3s. 0d., and it was determined that, upon the owners of the property paying three-fourths of the cost, the Vestry would contribute the remaining one-fourth, and carry out the work; and arrangements are now being made with the owners to pay their proportion by instalments, and, so soon as such arrangements are completed, the works will be proceeded with.

The Vestry have made up, paved, and drained Wellington-street, Albion-street, at a cost of £79 19s. 1d., the owners having paid three-fourths of the amount, the Vestry contributing the remaining one-fourth. The following being a detailed statement thereof.

Wyndham-road, by the side of the Gas Works, has also been made up, paved, and drained, at a cost of £327 4s. 5d., three-fourths of which was defrayed by the Surrey

Consumers' Gas Company and the owners on the west side of the street, and the remaining one-fourth by the Vestry.

The Pitcher paving in Princes-street-alley has been removed, and York paving laid in lieu thereof, and two small gulleys have been formed near the centre of the alley.

Lighting.

During the past year two new lamps have been placed as follows, viz.:—One on the east side of Nelson-street, Albion-street, and one in Winchester-street, Jamaica-level. One lamp has been discontinued in Rotherhithe-street, near Grand Surrey Dock entrance, making the total number of gas lamps in this Parish lighted under contract with the Surrey Consumers' Gas Company, 339 (for particulars of contract see page 4.)

The Vestry have, so far as this Parish is concerned, discontinued the office of Gas Examiner, which officer they appointed in conjunction with the St. Olave's District Board of Works, to test the gas supplied by the Surrey Consumers' Gas Company, by means of the apparatus erected in the vault under the Vestry Hall of St. John's, Horselydown.

Watering.

The Vestry still continue to contract with Messrs. Brady for the supply of two water carts at £7 10s. 0d. each cart for the season. The horses and drivers being supplied by Mrs. Catherine Wright, also under contract.

Cleansing, &c.

Mr. A. T. Hobman is the Contractor for removing the dust from the dwellings of the inhabitants, and out of the Parish, also for cleansing the paved streets, (for particulars of contract see page 4.)

Removal of Nuisances' Proceedings, &c.

From 25th March, 1862, to 25th March, 1863, 114 notices have been served in duplicate under the Nuisances Removal Act, upon complaints made by the Medical Officer and Inspector of Nuisances; forty-two of which have been effectually abated by proper drainage being made from the respective houses into covered sewers, forty-seven have been abated by removal, and twenty-five are in course of abatement and standing over.

Seven summonses have been issued, and Magistrates' orders obtained and carried out.

Fifty-eight notices to make drains and provide water-closets, ash-pits, and water supply, have been served in duplicate by order of the Vestry. In fifty cases the owners have properly complied therewith, and eight are in progress or standing over.

Thirteen notices of intention of butchers to apply to have their slaughterhouses licensed in this Parish were received by the Vestry, which were severally inspected and reported upon by the Medical Officer of Health. These slaughterhouses were all licensed by the Magistrates in October, 1862.

Five notices from cowkeepers, of their intention to apply to the special Sessions for licenses for their cowhouses under the provisions of the "Metropolis Management Amendment Act, 1862, were received by the Vestry, and the same having been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer of Health, they also were all licensed by the Magistrates in October, 1862.

The Vestry have had under their notice nuisances arising from the storing and refining of Petroleum at the factories near Plough-bridge, and in the rear of the Noah's Ark public house, Rotherhithe-street, and on application to the Metropolitan Board of Works, it was found that the said premises were not licensed under the Petroleum Act.

The proprietor of the factory in the rear of the Noah's Ark public house was summoned to the Greenwich Police Court for the nuisances arising from the large quantity of Petroleum he had stored on the premises, also from the process of manufacture. A Magistrate's order was obtained, and the proprietor having erected additional apparatus, the nuisance has since been much lessened.

Financial.

The loan of £800, borrowed of the London and Westminster Bank at 5 per cent., and the loan of £500, borrowed by the late Commissioners of Pavements of Mrs. Arnold, at $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., still continue.

Charity Estates.

The Committee appointed by the Vestry to investigate into the several Charities of the Parish, having made their Report, the Vestry ordered that 500 copies thereof be printed.

Miscellaneous.

The proceedings on the Appeal of the Grand Surrey Dock Company against being assessed to the Paving, Lighting, and Sewers' Rates, are still in progress, considerable delay having occurred in consequence of the death of the Appellant's Counsel (Mr. Knapp). The Appeals against the Sewers' Rates have lately been abandoned.

The Commercial Docks Company have abandoned all their Appeals against the Sewers, Paving and General Purposes, and Lighting Rates.

The Vestry have made arrangements with the Royal Society for the Protection of

Life from Fire, for the maintenance in this Parish of two Fire Escapes with Apparatus and Attendants, at an expense of £160 per annum. One of the Fire Escapes has been stationed opposite the Workhouse, Deptford Lower-road, and the other at Trinity Church.

The Attendants are on duty at the above-mentioned station from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. from September to April, inclusive, and from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. from May to August, inclusive.

The Vestry have appointed Mr. J. W. Barrett as their Representative to co-operate with the Representatives of the several other Boards and Vestries to oppose the removal of St. Thomas's Hospital from this vicinity.

In November last, Parliamentary Notices were received by the Vestry from the Promoters of the following Railway Schemes passing through this Parish, viz. :— The London, Chatham and Dover Railway, No. 1 (Thames Branch) ; The East London and Rotherhithe Railway ; The Rotherhithe Railway ; The Grand Surrey and Commercial Docks Railway, and The London, Brighton and South Coast Railway. The Vestry presented Petitions to Parliament to protect the interests of this Parish, and a Committee was appointed to watch the said Bills. The Committee had conferences with the Promoters of the Bills, and arrangements were being made with respect to The London, Chatham and Dover (Thames Branch), and The Commercial and Grand Surrey Docks Railways' Bills, but the Committee of the House of Lords having reported that they could see no necessity to proceed with those Bills, they were consequently withdrawn.

The Duties of the several Officers of the Vestry were referred to a Committee for consideration, and upon their report being laid before the Vestry, Mr. James John Stokes was appointed joint Clerk in conjunction with Mr. Robert Shafto Hawks, the Clerk, and the consideration of the remainder of the recommendations contained in the said Report was ordered to stand adjourned for twelve months.

With respect to the open ditch round the Cricket Field opposite Westfield-terrace, arrangements have been made with the ground landlady for filling in and fencing the same ; and also with the Trustees of the Roads for contributions towards the formation of three gulleys and drains for the road in lieu of the said ditch.

Several occupiers of large premises in Rotherhithe-street, on the east side of the Grand Surrey Dock entrance, having erected by subscription a Clock at Mr. Beech's premises, near the entrance to the said Docks, for the information of the Public as to the time they were detained by the Bridges across the said entrances being kept open, application was made to pay for the Gas for illuminating the said Clock at night ; and the Vestry, considering the Clock was for the benefit of the Inhabitants and the Public, acceded to such request, and the Clock is now lighted at the expense of the Vestry.

The Trustees of the Bermondsey, Rotherhithe, and Deptford Roads having brought

under the consideration of the Vestry a proposal to form the site over the New Main Low Level Sewer between St. James's Church, Bermondsey, and China Hall Gate, in this Parish, into a Public Road, a Committee was appointed to confer with the Trustees thereon ; and after several meetings, and upon mature consideration, the Vestry came to the conclusion that, inasmuch as the cost of keeping up the portion of the said Road in this parish would eventually fall upon the Vestry, while the benefit resulting therefrom would be small in comparison, they determined not to interfere in the matter.

The Valuation of the Parish, for Assessment to the Parochial Rates, has been completed. The total Assessment is now £98,583 15s., as against the old Assessment of £83,524, being an increase of £15,059 15s.

A Petition was presented by this Vestry to the House of Commons, praying that the Metropolitan Board of Works might be constituted the authority for expending the whole proceeds of the Coal and Wine Duties for Metropolitan Improvements.

The Vestry have memorialized the Commissioners of Metropolitan Police for an additional Police Station to be established in the East Division of this Parish.

A Memorial was also presented to the Metropolitan Board of Works in favour of their adopting some steps towards the utilization of the Metropolitan Sewage.

APPENDIX No. I.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH,

From 25th March, 1862, to 25th March, 1863.

To the Vestry of the Parish of Rotherhithe, Surrey,

GENTLEMEN,

The Metropolis Local Management Act, and the amendment to that Act, require that a Special Annual Report, by the Medical Officer of Health, shall be forwarded with the Parochial Financial Statement to the Metropolitan Board of Works. In accordance with the provisions of the above-named Acts of Parliament, the following Report has been prepared. It comments upon the diseases of the Parish, the Sanitary work done from March 25th, 1862, to March 25th, 1863, and to it is appended a tabular statement of the mortality.

The population of Rotherhithe in April, 1861, was 24,502, and the number of deaths registered between March 25th, 1862, and March 25th, 1863, was 520 ; collating these data, the yearly death rate of this Parish would be 21·21 in the thousand, but this result is fallacious.

First, because during the ten years from 1851 to 1861, the population increased from 17,805 to 24,502, that is by 6,697 souls, or in round numbers at the rate of 670 annually. Therefore, as we may reasonably suppose, that same rate of increase to have

continued during 1861, 1862, and 1863, twice 670, or 1340, ought to be added to the population of the Census of 1861 (24,502), which would make the present number of inhabitants amount to 25,842.

Secondly, if 520 deaths were registered between 25th March, 1862, and 25th March, 1863, of those deaths, 16 were of persons not connected with Rotherhithe, who were killed by accident while working there, or whose bodies were cast ashore from the Thames. These 16 ought to be deducted from the 520, leaving 504 as the true mortality; collating then the true mortality, 504, with the present population, 25,842, we get a death rate of 19.5 in the 1000, a low mortality for a metropolitan parish, the death rate of all London averaging between 22 and 23 in the 1000, and we are forced to conclude that last year Rotherhithe was a very healthy locality.

The number of deaths registered from 25th March, 1861, to 25th March, 1862, was 545, 25 more than during the just elapsed year, so that were we to compare only these two years, Rotherhithe presents the example of a decreasing mortality with an increasing population.

The number of births last year, from March 25th, 1862 to March, 25th, 1863, was 859, namely, 401 males and 458 females, showing an increase of only nine births on the preceding twelve months, from 25th March, 1861, to 25th March, 1862, 850 births.

The death register may be considered in regard to the seasons, the ages of the persons who died, and the diseases to which they succumbed.

The most unhealthy period was the autumn of the year from 29th September to 25th December, 1862, when 149 deaths were registered. The healthiest period was the winter quarter, from Christmas, 1862, to 25th March, 1863, during which only 105 persons died. From March 25th to June 24th, and from June 24th to September 29th, 128 and 138 deaths were respectively recorded.

In respect of age, 170 deaths, or not quite one-third of the whole number, were of children under 2 years, 77 were between 2 and 5 years, making together 247, or considerably less than half the whole mortality 520. The other numbers, according to the ages, may be ascertained by inspection of the appended tabular arrangement.

The Zymotic diseases together destroyed 106 persons. Of these, 58, or half, were carried off by scarlatina, 21 by measles, 13 by diarrhoea, 10 by whooping cough, 3 by small pox, and one by diphtheria. This last disease has never yet been common in Rotherhithe. Thus scarlatina alone was as fatal as all the other zymotic diseases united.

Fever caused 16 deaths, diseases of the respiratory organs 133 : namely, 57 from phthisis, 47 from bronchitis, 22 from pneumonia, 5 from croup and laryngitis, 2 from angina pectoris, and 1 from phthisis laryngea.

Let me now leave this dreary catalogue of human misery, and turn to a more hopeful and cheering subject, that is, the work done by this Board for the purpose of improving health, prolonging human life, and diminishing disease and death, which is the end and aim of all sanitary legislation. Now the business of a Board of Health in

every locality seems to consist in exercising vigilant surveillance over the food sold, the water drunk, and the air breathed by the inhabitants. I do not mean to affirm that no bad food has been sold in Rotherhithe during the past year, but that such food has never been brought under the notice of the Sanitary Officers.

I shall institute no odious comparison between the Water supplied to two different parts of this Parish by two different Companies. It is sufficient to say that the Water of both Companies is of good quality, and that almost every house has the Water laid on.

The few exceptions are blocks of very small houses, which have one large butt or cistern for a whole row, as Essex-place, the Cottages near the China Hall, Fisher's court, and perhaps a few others.

The worst contamination of the atmosphere arises from the want of proper drainage. In this the Board has not been idle; 114 notices have been served and the drainage of 188 houses effected and completed, and 3,440 feet of brick and pipe Sewers and drains have been constructed.

The Black Ditch, or Earl Sewer, so long complained of as a nuisance, will probably disappear when the Main Drainage Scheme comes into full operation. There will, however, still remain that receptacle of abominations, the Mill Pond, or Surrey Mill Stream, which has long been, and seems likely to continue to be, the disgrace and opprobrium of this Parish.

Next to good drainage—and second only to it—is good scavengering. Complaints used frequently to be made of neglect in the removal of the dust; such complaints have, of late, become fewer, and the work is better done.

There are thirteen licensed Slaughter-houses and five licensed Cow-houses in Rotherhithe. They seem all to be well conducted, not a word of complaint having ever been uttered against any of them by the Inhabitants.

The over-crowded and filthy dwellings in Fisher's-court have been spoken of in my monthly report.

The various Factories in Rotherhithe have also been often mentioned. The worst of all, and worse than all of them put together, is the Fish Manure Works at China Hall Gate.

Four Summonses were issued during the year; three relative to drainage, against Owners of property in Rotherhithe New-road, and one against the Proprietors of the Petroleum Works in the rear of the Noah's Ark.

To conclude, I have to thank the Board, collectively and individually, for the kindness I have always received at their hands; and my brother officers, for their counsel and assistance.
