ANNUAL REPORT

MADE TO THE VESTRY

BY THE

MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING LADY DAY, 1877.

CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

The year now ended, has proved uneventful, considered from a sanitary point of view. Nevertheless there has been heard the sound of progress. The Prime Minister has publicly said, "that the policy which diminished the death rate of a great nation, was a feat as considerable as any of those decisive battles, which generally decided nothing." And the Lord Chief Baron, followed in the same strain in his address to the Lord Mayor when presented to him. He stated that "the time was fast approaching, when he hoped through the efforts of the Corporation, and the assistance of the Legislature, with that of the Metropolitan Board of Works, not a single Workman's dwelling would exist within the space once surrounded and encompassed by the walls of the ancient City, would remain unrain, unventilated, and unprovided with an ample supply of pure water." I would add the hope, that not a single Workman's dwelling, not possessing these important necessities, will exist outside the space, "once encompassed and surrounded by the ancient Walls."

Utterances like these, and coming from men occupying the highest positions in the land, mark to what an extent sanitary subjects are now claiming attention. The time is not long gone by, when such declarations might have been looked for in vain, and if they would have created wonder and surprise that such small and insignificant subjects should have employed the brains of Statesmen.

Besides, Meetings and Conferences have been held during the year, under distinguished presidents, with reference to sanitary affairs, and at which propositions were made, and conclusions reached, that must need help on the cause of Public Health. In the course of human travail we have first thoughts, then words, and afterwards actions—the matured result.

It is sad to witness how wastefully our lives are spent, and their shortness, still further abridged; and we might feel inclined to murmur at the slow progress we make in dying this. But we must remember that perfection, or rather some distant approximation thereunto, can only be reached through prolonged labour and suffering.

With respect to this District, I am glad to say that some marked and beneficial changes are impending. Buildings, which have long been a disgrace to our parish, and hence unfit for human habitation, will I hope be replaced by others, which will stand in a reposition, and in which health, comfort, and cleanliness may be possible, and to which the name of home can be lovingly given. The Metropolitan Board of Works, from consideration of the representation made unto them of areas to be dealt with under the Artizans' and Labourers' Dwellings Act, 1875, have arrived at the conclusion that, as regards the following "it is desirable that schemes under the said Act should be taken with a view to their being confirmed by the Secretary of State." This has been done. An Official enquiry was held in this Hall on the 21st of March, by M. O. NICHOLLS, Esq., Commissioner appointed by the Secretary of State, and whose report now awaits the decision of the latter.

The three Areas are situated in what are named the Mint Street, King Street, and Elizabeth Place Areas. The Mint Street Area includes the street of that name, notorious for the desperate characters it has harboured, and for its associations with crime, robbery, and murder, unequalled probably by any other locality of the same extent in the metropolis. This Area consists of 64 houses, and stands upon 46,023 feet of ground. One hundred and forty tenements will be prepared by the new scheme, of which 90 will be set aside for registered Lodgers. The buildings proposed will only cover 22,122 feet, not half the number of the feet at present covered.

In the King Street Area will be met with some parts of Flint Street, Gun Street, and Martin Street. These are in a filthy and repulsive condition, and in a great measure unfit for the business carried on in them, for which they are totally unfit, namely, the fish curing. By reason of the smallness of the yards, a great part of the process is carried on in the open street. There are 58 houses including two shops which cover 18,247 feet. Only 11,997 feet will be covered by the new buildings.

Elizabeth Place contains houses most of which are placed back to back, consequently there are neither yards, nor means of through ventilation. There are 64 houses, which cover 26,782 feet. This number will be reduced to 13,122 feet.

The population living in these three Areas is 1,340, and occupies 602 rooms. These 602 rooms will be replaced by 810 tenements, comprising 160 of one room, 235 of two rooms, and 60 of three rooms. The space now covered is 91,052 feet; the space intended to be covered will only amount to 43,811 feet. There will thus remain more cubic feet for the occupants, and a larger open space. This will be brought about by the proper structure of the new buildings, as half of them will be made four stories high, and five stories high.

The estimated outlay, with widening of the roads and other improvements is £59,760. From this will be deducted the value of the land to be used for building, amounting to £407, leaving a net cost of £33,353.

There was another Area sent in—Union Street Area, but it was considered advisable by the Metropolitan Board of Works, to defer meddling with it, and only proceed with the others, lest inconvenience and injury should follow from closing so many dwellings, and leaving the inhabitants adrift.

With regard to the new street which will connect Long Lane, Great Dover Street, and Newington Causeway with the Southwark Bridge Road, mention will doubtless be made in the report of the Surveyor of Roads, as it more especially belongs to his department. However in its construction, unhealthy nooks, alleys and courts must necessarily be removed. There will be a broad high-way not only upon which traffic may be carried, but over which the wind may blow.

During the year that ended the 31st March, 2099 children born alive, were registered in this District. Of these 1054 were boys, and 1045 were girls. They were less in number than in the previous year.

The deaths registered were 1206, showing a decrease to those returned in the preceding year; indeed, only in one year of the last ten, have the deaths been less, and that was in 1862-3. The number of males and females were equal, 603 each. The range of the death rate from the one now given to the highest (1869—70) during the last ten years amounts to 534. In the 37th and 39th weeks of 1876, the deaths fell to the lowest number, 37 in each; and they reached the highest in the 50th week of 1876, and the thirteenth week of 1877, when the number was 37 in each. The lowest weekly temperature registered was in the 10th week, when the mean was 36° 9.

The death rate for the District was $21\frac{1}{2}$ in 1000 persons living; or one death in 47 persons living. This is satisfactory as it shows that the health and length of life of the people are increasing. In the previous year the death rate was $24\frac{1}{2}$ in 1000 persons; or one death in 40½ persons.

The following Table gives the number of deaths that happened weekly in the three districts, and also the mean temperature for each week.

The death rate in the three Sub-districts was as follows:—in the Kent Road district, there were registered 395 deaths, 19 in 1000 persons living, or one in 52½. In Borough Road Sub-district, there were registered 378 deaths, 22½ in 1000 persons living, or one in 44. In the London Road Sub-district there were registered 433 deaths, 23 in 1000 persons living, or one in 43. The Kent Road Sub-district as usual shows fewest deaths to the number of the population. I take the population as given by Census of 1871.

The death rate varies according to the seasons. Thus, there will be seen by Table No. 4 that the fewest number of deaths were registered in the quarter ending June, and the greatest number in the quarter ending March. The proportion of deaths does not happen equally in the quarters. In the year 1875—6, the greatest number of deaths occurred in the quarter, in which, in the last year, the fewest were recorded, the one ending June. This however seems to have been exceptional. The quarter ending March is always marked by a high death rate.

The Zymotic class are the most important diseases to which humanity is liable. They are characterised by their universality, their fatality, and their preventability.

The deaths referred to them numbered 253. They stand at the head of the class regards the rate of mortality. After them come lung diseases (not including consumption), then those of the brain and nerves, and lastly the tubercular.

Deaths from measles shewed a decline from the number returned in 1875—6, from 63 to 32; scarlet fever from 78 to 36; whooping-cough from 88 to 39; diarrhoea from 63 to 13; and fever from 15 to 13. The only disease of this class of which the death rate increased, is small-pox. During the year 1873—4 there was registered one death; during the years 1874—5, 1875—6 not one death was registered. In the year now ending there stand recorded 26 deaths, not including those who died in the Hospitals.

Epidemics generally point out sanitary neglect somewhere. This not necessarily from the Authorities, but often from the apathy, prejudice, and ignorance of the people. We are now suffering from one arising mainly from these latter sources. Small-pox otherwise would have only dwelt in our memories, instead of being met with face to face in our dwellings. No expense need have been incurred, nor alarm spread, nor seeds of premature death planted, nor faces "speckled with pock-holes" met with, nor widowers, nor widows, nor orphans made, nor graves filled up, from such a cause. Power has been given us to prevent this disease; we have not exercised that power, and we must now bear the inevitable consequences.

By the manner small-pox is spoken of, by a very few, but by a very active and influential portion of the community, we might be led to suppose that this disease was one of the most mild, and least fatal of all diseases, and that produced by vaccination the most foul, gross, and fatal. If that which was not true could prevail, and that which was true fail, then the might fear the extinction of small-pox would never come to pass. We hear much of poison from vaccination entering the blood, injuring the system, and giving rise among other evils to eruptions on the skin. What of the poison from small-pox entering the blood, destroying beauty, health, and life? Do we hear of the practice of vaccination killing hundreds a week, and leaving happy self-sustaining families, desolate and helpless? Do we meet with the blind turning up their sightless eyeballs and feeling along their darkened pathway from this operation? No comparison exists; none can possibly be made, yet if it should happen that any ailment followed from this cause, or imputed cause, how much is made of it. As if skin and other disease did not often follow attacks from measles, scarlet fever, and various other diseases, which produce a change and perturbation in the system, especially of children. Yet how exceedingly seldom among the hundreds of thousands vaccinated does any evil whatever manifest itself. Many things however, are worked together in favour of vaccination. There are the discomfort and inconvenience which accompanies the presence of small pox, the demand made for isolation, the secrecy need to be maintained lest injury should follow to business, compulsory idleness and loss of wages, the severance of all social fellowship, the avoidance of the neighbourhood, the expense and trouble involved to landlord and tenant from cleansing and disinfecting, a

flight of lodgers, with the need of producing a clean bill of health before the rooms can be let.

Shortly after presenting you with my last Annual Report, I received that of the Committee of Management of the Metropolitan Fever and Small Pox Hospitals at Homerton, on the work carried on from their establishment to the 31st December, 1875. The object of the Legislature in building these Hospitals, was to provide means whereby the separation of paupers suffering with contagious disorders, from the healthy portion of the community might be effected; and which has been duly appreciated by them.

Grave complaints are made in the Report upon the inefficient manner in which vaccination had been performed. Out of 1000 cases only 49 had been vaccinated in the way in which the National Vaccine Board fifty years ago declared to be the best. Hence is disclosed the error made so much of by the opponents of vaccination, that more vaccinated persons than unvaccinated have been attacked with small-pox. Death from small-pox after vaccination has been duly performed is of the rarest occurrence. Out of 1,194 cases treated in the Hospitals, no such death happened. Unvaccinated persons died at the rate of 17 per cent. No cases of small-pox were seen after revaccination. From the 15th February, to the 15th June, 1871, there were admitted 1,194 cases; and from the experience thus gained the Reporters are enabled to state that "overwhelming evidence of the protective power of vaccination and revaccination was afforded them."

No freedom from epidemics of small pox can be expected so long as children are allowed to escape vaccination, for such become an abiding source for the perpetuation and spread of the disease. The utmost watchfulness, energy and stringency should be exercised in carrying out vaccination. No fire can exist where there is no combustible matter.

What says STANLEY, the African traveller, about vaccination: one who has felt its need and experienced its benefit. Evidence of far higher value than that of those who in every respect lack knowledge, and who most probably never saw a case of small-pox in the whole course of their lives. Writing from Ujiji, in August he says, that he must hurry away, as his people are sad, very sad, in that place, owing to an epidemic of small-pox, which was decimating the population at the rate of from 40 to 75 persons daily. It is a small-pox of the most fatal kind. It ran like wild fire through the houses of Ujiji, Arab as well as native. The condition of his people was really deplorable; his numbers thinned, and fear prevailed among his favourite and faithful attendants. The success of the Expedition was imperilled; and the only thing he asserts which "saved it from total wreck was vaccination."

This Table shows the number of deaths that have happened from the chief zymotic diseases in each year of the last ten. The deaths vary from year to year, to a great extent, as for instance in scarlet fever, where we find in one year the deaths amounted to 132, in another to 11; and also in small-pox, where the range was from none to 120.

Scrofulous diseases have caused 189 deaths. These diseases show a degeneracy of vitality and are mainly hereditary. They might be prevented, but that prevention will require the practice of a wisdom and a self-denial, for which the age is not yet ripe. They include tubercles (the consumption of children), consumption, and hydrocephalus (water in the head). The former occasioned 63 deaths, the second 110, and the last 13, of which 11 were under 5 years of age. In the preceding year the deaths from the same causes were 70, 157, 17, as may be seen from the Table.

From diseases of the brain and nervous system, have been registered 195 deaths, two than in 1875—6. Of this class convulsions proved the most fatal; the deaths numbered of which 68 were under one year of age, and 95 under five years of age.

Bronchitis in the class of lung diseases, has caused the largest mortality of any single case, namely, 181 deaths. Consumption formerly used to stand at the head of the list.

Deaths from diseases of the heart have doubled in number. More attention is now paid to the diagnoses of these diseases, which may account somewhat for the large increase registered.

Owing to premature birth, debility and atrophy, 65 infants died. Thirty-two perished from violence and privation. Of these, nine were accidentally suffocated in bed, their ages ranged from eleven days to twenty-five years. The last had lain upon his face whilst drunk. Two persons, a male and female, aged respectively 23 and 62 years, hung themselves. Three died from taking phosphorus and cyanide of potassium. From the first, two females aged 45 and 69 years; from the latter a male aged 39 years. Three females died from hæmorrhage, aged 36, 38, and 55 years; one from ruptured varicose veins, and another two, the result of internal injuries. To burns and scalds three deaths were attributed. Two children aged one year each, by upsetting hot fluid over themselves; and the clothes of a man aged 82 caught fire. Five died from concussion of the brain produced in various ways, aged respectively 1, 10, 49, 57 and 67 years. Two deaths followed fracture of the skull to two males, aged 4 months and 43 years. A boy aged 14 years, died from inflammation of the bowels, brought on by drawing a truck; a male aged 34 years, from ruptured bladder, the consequence of jumping over a wall; another male, aged 4 years, from ruptured abdomen, having been run over.

Of those who died 649 were under five years of age, 333 were from 40 to 80 years and upwards, of which a male had reached 90, two females 92 years, a Waterloo veteran 95, female 98, and another 101 years.

The mortality shown by Peabody's Buildings, Blackfriars Road, gives evidence of the health enjoyed by those who dwell there. Whilst $21\frac{1}{2}$ died in 1000 living in the district, $12\frac{1}{2}$ died to the same proportion of persons in the buildings. Had the mortality been the same outside the walls as within, 505 lives would have been saved. This fact should be taken into consideration in the carrying out the Artizans' and Labourers' Dwellings Act, as no doubt can be ascertained but that the buildings of the Metropolitan Local Government Board, will prove efficient for the maintenance of health and life, as those which have been raised by the bequest of Peabody's gift. Out of a population consisting of 1438 persons, 18 deaths occurred; two from scarlet fever, one from diphtheria, one from diarrhoea, four from pneumonia, three from inflammation of the lungs, one from croup, one from cancer, one from tabes, one from convulsions, one from disease of heart, one from premature birth, and one from old age.

There have been held in the District during the year, 97 inquests.

The mode by which we shall get rid of our sewage in a cleanly and useful manner, without creating nuisances elsewhere by the process, remains yet an unsolved problem. We have, however, arrived at the knowledge of the inefficiency of many of the plans proposed. The difficulty is one inseparable from large towns. Water is one of the means most ready at hand and most in favour, but it is one by no means unaccompanied with danger. This is imminent, when decomposition takes place in the contents of the sewers from delay. If the sewage passes quickly along, then little fear need be entertained. Putrefaction is accompanied by the generation of gases, which being warmer are necessarily lighter than the air, and carry along with them the germs of disease which the sewage may contain. Besides these gases must be got rid of, otherwise they would penetrate into our houses and corrode the pipes as surely as rats would nibble them. If such means are not provided, men could not enter to cleanse the sewers. With reference to this subject our knowledge is widening. But no one plan will suffice for all towns. Different plans will have to be carried out according to the situations and surroundings of towns.

Three demands stand prominent with reference to our water supply; (1) That it should be pure in quality, (2) plentiful in quantity, and (3) as cheap as possible. At present we are supplied by eight Companies, to which are granted considerable powers, and which they seem to exercise in a somewhat arbitrary way. For the purpose of placing the water supply of the metropolis under the control of a responsible Public Body, a deputation waited upon Mr. Cass, and the Works Committee of the Metropolitan Board of Works have had the subject under discussion. So we may reasonably anticipate a more efficient mode of administration.

We have heard denounced, times out of number, and in the strongest terms, the conduct of the holders of small property, as being most selfish, and they themselves the most potent and obstinate opponents of sanitary measures and improvements; and moreover, this class formed a considerable portion of our Vestries. However this may be, they cannot claim a monopoly to this uneaviable distinction. Amongst them may be included the possessors of broad acres and vast domains. A lordly owner, holding property of a wretched and dilapidated kind, in one of our busy northern towns, not only would take steps to improve it, but opposed strongly any steps being taken in that direction. At one of the meetings of the sanitary authority of the town, the question was asked the Medical Officer of Health, if nothing had been done to better the condition of the property. "Yes," was the answer, "but a mistake had been made, for the pigs had been turned out, whereas the pigs ought to have remained, and the tenants have been turned out." Another case occurred, in which the owner held the same high title and position in the land. A number of his tenants and workmen were living in undrained, foul, ruinous houses, altogether unfit for human habitation, and quite inferior to the stables and kennels in which his Lordship kept his horses and dogs. Nothing could be done by the Town Council, unless his Lordship would either build upon the land, or sell it; and if the latter, promise that no mining operations should be carried on beneath. His Lordship would make no promise except to let the land, stating that the Town Council must take all the risk of danger to the structures, should mining operations be carried on. The mines, I may add, were almost valueless. Yet at this time his Lordship was spending vast sums of money on the restoration of a Cathedral. We may hope that upon the historic page of that Cathedral whilst the munificence of this donor is largely displayed, some small space may be set aside whereon may be given the account of the condition in which his tenants were then living. We have, in this case, a dead stone Cathedral, passing in interest and care, the beating hearts and thinking brains of men.

I would here remark, that much of the small-class property is placed in the hands of Agents, and who neither hold nor cultivate any interest in the welfare and comfort of the tenants. To get the most rent with the least possible trouble and outlay, seems to comprise their whole duty (of course there are exceptions.) How much better in all respects would it be, that the Owner himself should give some personal supervision to his property, and to the state of those who dwell in it. That he should ascertain their wants, listen to their complaints, manifest sympathy with and for them, and show by word and deed, that there exists between them and him a bond greater and higher than that of money, even a human bond. One who has had a very large experience with the lower and lowest class of tenants, gives it as her opinion, that when we can induce the rich to undertake the duties of landlord, in poor neighbourhoods, and ensure a sufficient amount of the wise, personal superintendence of educated people acting as their representatives, we achieve results which are not attainable in any other way. And that houses have not to be dealt with alone, but houses in connexion with their influence on the character and habits of the people who live in them. For as she truly adds, that repairs and all that is deemed necessary to put them in a sanitary condition, may be carried out, yet a few weeks may see them passing again into their neglected and foul condition, from the bad and careless habits of those who occupy them (Octavia Hill).

It is in localities like unto these, that diseases ride and gather strength, and from thence they are disseminated. One human being from unfortunate circumstances, or profligate and unwise conduct may set up a disease which shall spread near and far. Examples of this fact abound. A characteristic one is given by CARLYLE. "One of Dr. Ross's facts strikes us much" he says, "An Irish widow, her husband having died in one of the lanes of Edinburgh, went forth with her children bare of all resource, to seek aid from the Charitable Establishments of the City. She in all cases was refused. Her strength at last failed her; she sank down in typhus fever, infected her lane with it, so that seventeen other persons died from the disease in consequence. And thus she proved her sisterhood by her typhus fever killing them." We need hardly call to our remembrance the Black Assizes, as history calls them, when the wretched, neglected prisoners received that treatment by raying out from their filthy ragged persons contagion, which, assailed Chief Barons, Baronets, Lord Mayors, Sheriffs, Knights, Serjeants at Law, Clergymen, Justices, Juries, and thousands of the Commonality. The fever born and bred in the persons of the prisoners, spread from town to town producing dismay, disease and death. This destruction was evoked by sheer neglect and inhumanity.

"A man dies of cholera in the valley of the Ganges, and the disease there generated spreads to Europe, Asia and America; a child in Arabia has the small-pox, and the disease of that child spreads and exterminates tribes of North American Indians; the plague born in Constantinople, or Ethiopia, prostrates the population of the Roman Empire, and sweeps away at intervals through centuries a large proportion of the population of Athens, Florence, London and other large cities." Man must help man or destroy him. The latter has been usually the course pursued, and with considerable success. The means of safety are placed in our own hands, and whether we neglect them from ignorance, carelessness, or avarice, the results will be the same.

In some countries about which I have read, the paying of taxes is a season of rejoicing and festivity; a fact which seems hardly credible when we consider our own experience of the like demands. Yet it is possible to conceive that such rejoicing and festivity might be manifested here, did we feel quite assured they were applied to the ends intended, and that the ends were wise and beneficent. Anyhow, we often voluntarily tax ourselves, and to a large extent, for ends which are neither wise nor beneficent. To celebrate some passing occurrence, we raise up the most tawdry foolish structures out of canvas and plank, which represent nothing either in nature or art, and which vanish almost in the same hour that they rise, and this is done at a cost which would have drained, cleansed, and made beautiful a city or town, or built almshouses, or laid out parks and gardens, which would have proved useful, and remained as durable memorials of events, to future generations. This has been done by towns which for years have been discussing and haggling about money which would be required to wash and make themselves clean and healthy. I do not speak about the thousands upon thousands spent over even still more transitory and even less satisfactory objects. Certainly the money spent over our pageants and feasts might be much more reasonably and effectually spent in the promotion of the health and comfort and elevation of the people.

Again, if we may judge from the amount of money given and bequeathed for the relief of sickness, which should rather be given and bequeathed for the prevention of sickness, we might be led to suppose, that the final purpose of this world was, that it should be a ghastly Lazar-house, and its heritage disease and untimely death. That generation after generation should consist of feeble, deformed, degenerate, wailing creatures, fit only to be "lifted from bed to bed, from the nothing of life to the nothing of death;" instead of energetic men, ever rising to higher degrees of power, dignity and intelligence, and leaving on the sands of time the deep, ineffacable footprints of a manly march.

When we reflect upon our ways and doings however, and see with what energy and perseverance we do labour to make our short life still shorter, and fill up that short life with pain and sorrow, our hopes for the future become overcast with doubts. For instance, what an incalculable amount of physical evil is brought about by our fashions. He who is accounted as nothing, comfort cast aside, reason defied, and taste and ornament exaggerated into the ridiculous. Here ignorance, which generally and truly has such a burthen of sin to bear, may pass free from censure. Perversion of taste, the love of imitation, and the dread of not appearing as foolish as our neighbours, cease not to act as the chief motives of this strange and wayward conduct. We may readily laugh and sneer at the fanatic, who drives spikes into his flesh, and tortures himself in divers ways: but this he does mostly from deep and holy motives, whilst those of the devotees of fashion are free from such influences or any approximation thereunto. Dr. BROWN, speaking of a mad woman, says that he wishes he saw "Fashion dressed in crinoline, in bad shoes, a mantle, hat, and trailing petticoats, with her waist well nipped by a circlet of nails, with the petticoats inmost, drummed and hissed, blazing and shrieking out of the world." This language is by no means too severe, when we consider the evils which the practice of it brings about, not only to the living, but to generations yet unborn. What inconsistency we display whilst vehemently denouncing evils concerning which the way to get rid of them is beset with difficulties, we at the same time cultivate and develop those of a stupid and intolerant kind. This devotion to fashion does not say much for our civilisation, which should have produced far other and happier results.

The unwise economical notions which prevail, prove a serious hindrance in the way of getting rid of the difficulties against which we have to contend. As if economy were much as possible when practised in opposition to the laws by which man is governed; which are fixed in the condition of things. And which "eternal laws there is no possibility of hoodwinking in our dealings with them." inasmuch as "they never make a mistake, never overlook one, never forego an advantage, never shrink to exact retribution, nor feel remorse." The explanation of these laws, by which God governs the world, and the need of a strict and reverential obedience to them, should be one of the chief aims of an educational system, upon this knowledge our welfare depends. For if we walk according to them it will be well with us, if we do not walk according to them it will be ill with us. From inward conviction, and not from external force and coercion, will true and permanent advance be made. For great measures, be they ever so just and beneficial, will fail in bringing about the desired results, if thrust upon an unprepared people. "Were it," says MILTON, "the choicer, a dram of well-doing should be preferred before many times much the forcible hindrance of evil-doing."

Drink, crime, pauperism, disease, insanity, levy large and unceasing contributions. A people thus characterised are a disgrace and weakness to the land in which they live, and point out long and profound neglect. We neither think nor act as if we recognised a power which one generation possesses over that which is to follow. We may liken it to that influence which the parent exercises over the child. Whether that child shall be as a sound mind in a healthy body, and so be enabled to enjoy all the good which his surroundings may afford him, and to perform all the duties which may be required from him, will mainly depend upon the parent. This power, which we thus possess is immense, involves proportionate responsibility. How far reaching the former, and how grave the latter, we may not readily grasp. However, this feeling of responsibility is becoming manifest and acknowledged in the age in which we live, than it has been in any age that has preceded it, and we may confidently believe that it will become more and more so. Although we are "the ancients of the earth," we yet but "stand in the morning of our times."
