

Hinth Annual Report

OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF

THE VESTRY

OF

ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 25TH MARCH, 1865.

Is conformity with the 110th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is shown.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 30 meetings, and the Committees appointed by the Vestry have held 38 meetings during the year.

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL *v*. LORD CRAVEN—THE PEST-HOUSE FIELD CHARITY.

Since my last report a scheme for the future administration of the funds of this charity has been sanctioned by the Master of the Rolls. The whole of the income of the Charity is thereby directed to be given to King's College Hospital, on the terms and conditions referred to in that scheme. The following is the scheme approved of and settled by the Master of the Rolls, viz.:—

Trustees and their qualification.

1. The charity, and the lands and property thereof (the particulars whereof are set forth in the schedule hereto), shall be under the management and control of Trustees, the full number of whom shall be 21.

The Incumbents of each of the parishes of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, St. George Hanover Square, St. Clement Danes, St. James Westminster, and St. Paul Covent Garden, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, always be Trustees.

Mode of appointment of Trustees.

2. Within one month after the confirmation of this scheme, the Vestry elected under the provisions of the Act of the 18th and 19th Vict., cap. 120, commonly called "The Metropolis Local Management Act," for each of the parishes of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, and St. George Hanover Square, shall nominate four resident householders in each of the two last-named parishes for the office of Trustees.

Within the like period of one month, the Vestry elected under the provisions of "The Metropolis Local Management Act" for each of the parishes of St. Clement Danes, St. James Westminster, and St. Paul Covent Garden, shall nominate eight resident shareholders in each of the three last-named parishes for the office of Trustees.

Such Vestries shall respectively forthwith submit to the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales lists of the persons so nominated as aforesaid.

Such Commissioners may, if and so often as they shall think fit, require such lists to be altered or revised by the Vestries, by the substitution, either wholly or partially, of the names of other persons having the like qualification, and may direct public notice of the lists of persons to be so nominated to be given by the Vestry or Vestries submitting the particular list or lists, in such manner and so often as the same Commissioners shall consider necessary or desirable. Such Commissioners, upon being satisfied of the sufficiency of the respective lists, shall, by order under their seal, appoint from such respective lists two persons from each of the respective parishes of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, and St. George Hanover Square, and four persons from each of the respective parishes of St. Clement Danes, St. James Westminster, and St. Paul Covent Garden, to be the first Trustees for the purposes of this scheme.

3. One of the persons to be appointed Trustees One of the from each parish other than the respective Incumbents, go out of shall, without reference to the disqualifications stated office every in the fourth clause of this scheme, go out of office by third year. rotation every third year, but shall be eligible for reelection. The first retirement in the case of the Trustees appointed from the parishes of St. Martin-inthe-fields, and St. George Hanover Square, respectively, and the first, second and third retirements in the case of the Trustees appointed from the other parishes shall be by lot.

4. Upon the death, resignation, refusing, declining Disqualifior becoming incapable to act, or ceasing to act for one cation of Trustees. year, of any Trustee, or on his compounding with his creditors, becoming bankrupt, ceasing to be a resident householder within the parish from which he shall have been appointed, or retiring from the office under the third clause of this scheme, the Vestry of the parish from which he shall have been appointed shall forthwith submit to the Charity Commissioners a list containing the names of two persons for each such vacancy; and such Commissioners shall have the same power of requiring every or any such list to be revised or altered, and of directing public notice to be given of the same, as are contained in the second clause of this scheme, with

regard to the first Trustees to be appointed; and the same Commissioners shall from time to time, upon being satisfied of the sufficiency of any list so to be submitted to them, by Order under their Seal, appoint from such list or lists a person or persons to supply such vacancy or vacancies.

Clerk and Receiver. 5. The Trustees shall appoint some fit and proper person or persons to be their Clerk, and to be the Receiver of the rents and income of the charity. The Trustees may, if they see fit, combine the two offices in one person. The stipends for Clerk and Receiver shall not together exceed £30 per annum.

The Clerk and Receiver shall hold office during the approbation of the Trustees. The Receiver shall give such security as they shall direct.

Duties of the Clerk.

6. The duties of the Clerk shall be to attend the Trustees at their meetings, to attend and give information to any Committee appointed by them, to enter the minutes of the proceedings at their meetings, to keep the accounts of the charity, and to furnish and send such duplicates thereof, statements, and balance sheets as the Trustees may by law be bound to supply, to preserve, subject to their directions, all vouchers for payments made on behalf of the charity, to make once in every year a detailed account of the receipts and payments on behalf of the charity during the preceding year, which shall be vouched and passed before the Trustees at their first General Meeting in each year, or at some adjournment thereof, and also a statement of the assets and liabilities of the charity, to make out an abstract of such account if required, and to perform all such other duties and acts appertaining to the office of Clerk in respect of the charity and the management thereof as the Trustees shall direct.

Duties of Receiver.

7. The duties of the Receiver shall be to see that the covenants contained in the leases of the charity property are properly performed, to collect and receive

the rents and income of the charity, and to pay the same when received to the bankers of the Trustees, to submit to the Trustees annually an account of his receipts, and a report showing the state and condition of the charity estate, and to perform all such other duties and acts appertaining to the office of Receiver in respect of the charity and the management thereof as the Trustees shall direct.

8. Notice of every meeting of the Trustees (except Notice of as after provided) shall be given in writing by the Clerk Meetings. to each Trustee three clear days at the least before the time appointed for holding the same. Such notice may be delivered at the residences of the Trustees or be sent by post.

9. The first meeting of the Trustees shall be held ing of as soon as conveniently may be after the confirmation Trustees. of this scheme. Notice of the time and place of holding such meeting shall be given by the Solicitor to Her Majesty's Attorney-General in writing to each Trustee not less than seven days previous to the time appointed. Such notice may be sent by post.

10. The Trustees shall hold not less than four General General Meetings in each year for transacting the Meetings. business of the charity, which shall be held at such convenient place as they shall determine.

Such meetings shall be held on the Monday fortnight after Lady-day, Midsummer-day, Michaelmasday, and Christmas-day, respectively, in each year, unless the Trustees shall in any year appoint some other days for the holding thereof, provided, however, that such substituted days of meeting shall be within thirty days of the several feast days abovementioned.

11. If at any time any matter shall arise requiring Special Meetings. the consideration of the Trustees which cannot conveniently be deferred to the next General Meeting, any two of them may by a requisition in writing call a

Special Meeting. The Clerk shall upon receipt of such requisition give notice in writing to each Trustee of the time, place, and object of such meeting. No business shall be transacted thereat other than that which shall be specified in the notice.

Quorum at Meetings. At any meeting of the Trustees any five of them shall form a quorum; so soon after the time fixed for the holding of any meeting as a sufficient number of Trustees shall be in attendance to form a quorum, they shall proceed to elect a Chairman from amongst those present. In the event of an equality of votes on such election, the question shall be decided between the persons proposed by lot.

The acts and proceedings of a majority of the Trustees present at any meeting duly constituted shall be binding on the whole body of the Trustees, but the Trustees, or the majority of them present at any subsequent meeting duly constituted shall have power to vary or rescind any resolution or direction which may have been come to or given at any previous meeting, provided due notice shall have been given of the intention to move to vary or rescind any such resolution or direction.

The Chairman shall, in the event of an equality of votes, have in addition to his original vote a second or casting vote.

Adjournment of Meetings. 13. If at any time there shall not, after the space of half an hour from the time appointed for holding any meeting, be a sufficient number of Trustees in attendance to form a quorum, or the business of any meeting shall remain undisposed of, the Trustees, or any one or more of them present, or if no Trustee be in attendance, then the Clerk may adjourn the same until some subsequent day.

14. The Trustees shall, at the first meeting, appoint a Committee, to be called the Order Committee, and such Committee shall consist of five persons, one

Appointment of Committee. Trustee being appointed in respect of each of the said five parishes, and such Committee shall continue for a year, or until the re-appointment of the said Committee; and the Trustees shall annually re-appoint the said Committee and shall from time to time fill up any vacancy which may occur therein by any member of the Committee dying, resigning, ceasing to be a Trustee, or otherwise : Provided that the Trustee appointed to fill the vacancy be appointed in respect of the parish from which the Trustee creating the vacancy came, and that the remaining members of the Committee may act during any such vacancy. The Order Committee shall perform such duties as are hereinafter specified. The Trustees may, at any meeting, appoint from their own body three or more of them to be a Committee for the purpose of making any inquiry, or superintending or performing any specific act or duty (not falling within the duties of the Order Committee) which in the judgment of the Trustees would be more effectually executed by such Committee.

15. The Trustees shall provide a minute book, Minutes of wherein shall be entered the names of the Trustees Meetings. attending, and the proceedings at their meetings, all orders given for the disposal of any of the funds of the charity, the reports of Committees, and all other matter relating to the charity transacted by such Trustees.

The minutes shall be signed by the Chairman of the next succeeding meeting.

16. The Trustees shall provide all necessary account Accounts. books, wherein shall be entered accounts of the receipts and payments on behalf of the charity, and such other particulars as they shall direct; such accounts shall be examined, vouched, and audited by the Trustees at their first General Meeting in each year, or at some adjournment thereof, and shall be signed by the Chairman of the meeting and two of the Trustees, and

be deposited and kept with the other vouchers and papers relating to the charity.

17. All cheques and orders for the payment of money shall be signed by the Chairman at some of the meetings of the Trustees, and by two of the other Trustees present at such meeting, and shall be countersigned by the Clerk.

Banker.

18. The Trustees shall appoint as their Banker some fit and responsible person or persons carrying on the business of Banker, or some Joint Stock Banking Company, with whom shall be deposited the monies of the charity. They may at any time change such Banker if they think fit.

19. The Trustees shall provide a box or safe, with a secure lock and two keys, wherein shall be deposited the deeds and documents belonging to the charity, and also a list of the same.

Such box shall be kept locked, and in such secure place as they shall direct; one key thereof shall be kept by the Clerk, and the other by such one of the Trustees as the majority of them present at any meeting shall appoint. They shall annually, at one of their meetings, examine the contents of the box.

20. After providing for any costs or expenses which may from time to time be directed by any court or authority of competent jurisdiction, to be paid out of the funds of the charity, and paying the current expenses of the management and administration of the trust, in pursuance of this scheme the Trustees shall, until the further order or direction of the Court of Chancery, from time to time pay the net annual income mentioned and referred to in the schedule at the foot hereof, to the Treasurers, or other the persons for the time being acting in the administration of the funds of King's College Hospital, in Portugal-street, Lincoln's-Inn-Fields, on the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

Custody of Documents.

Application of Income.

Cheques.

- I. The Governors of such Hospital shall set apart twenty-four beds in a convenient part or parts of the Hospital, and shall receive therein such patients (herein called in-patients), being sick and otherwise qualified according to the provisions hereof, as shall be sent by the Trustees with in-patients' orders, as hereinafter provided.
- II. The said Governors shall also receive and supply with advice and medicine, as out-patients, all poor persons resident in the said several parishes who shall be sent by the Trustees with outpatients' letters, at the customary times for the attendance of out-patients.
- III. The Secretary of the said Hospital shall give immediate notice to the Clerk of all vacancies in the number of in-patients and of any person being rejected as an in-patient.
- IV. All in-patients requiring medical or surgical aid, and being fit cases for Hospital treatment, shall be received indiscriminately, whether suffering from contagious or infectious disorders or not (small-pox alone being excepted), and shall be treated in all respects in the same manner as the other patients received into the Hospital.

21. In the event of a breach of any of the above conditions, or of any difference arising as to the true construction thereof, after notice in writing of such breach shall have been given by the Trustees to the said Governors, the Trustees shall give notice thereof to the Attorney-General, whom failing, to the Charity Commissioners, who after hearing both parties shall, if he or they see fit, authorize the Trustees to cease from paying the net income to the said Governors, and in such case, or in case the said Hospital shall at any time cease to exist or be discontinued, the Trustees shall give notice thereof to the Attorney-General, who Application for Relief.

Election of

Patients.

shall thereupon, if he see fit, apply to the Court for the settlement of a new scheme.

22. All applications for relief as in-patients or as out-patients shall be made to the Order Committee, or any one of them.

Such applications shall state the name, sex, age, place of residence, condition in life, and state of health of the applicant, and such other particulars as the Order Committee shall from time to time direct.

23. The Order Committee, or any one of them (subject to such regulations not inconsistent with this scheme, as such Committee shall from time to time make), shall grant orders for the admission of in-patients to the said Hospital to the extent of the accommodation so to be provided as aforesaid, and for the treatment of out-patients of the said Hospital.

Such orders shall be given to poor persons belonging to the said parishes on application, provided that in the case of in-patients a preference shall be given to those applicants who shall not for the longest period immediately preceding their application have been in the receipt of parochial relief. The in-patients' orders, shall be given so that as far as possible six of the said twenty-four beds shall be filled by poor persons from each of the parishes of Saint Paul Covent Garden, Saint James Westminster, and Saint Clement Danes, and three of the said twenty-four beds by poor persons from each of the two remaining parishes: Provided always that, whilst from the want of applications there shall be a less number of poor persons from any of the said parishes in the said Hospital than the proper number, the Order Committee shall grant in-patients' orders for the vacant beds to poor persons from the other parishes, but subsequent applications from the parish whose beds are so filled by poor persons from the other parishes shall have a priority over all other applications.

The Member of the Order Committee giving an inpatient's order shall indorse a memorandum thereof on the application, and send the same to the Clerk.

24. Once at least in every week, or oftener if Clerk to required by the Order Committee, the Clerk shall send List to furnish a list to each Member of the Order Committee, Order showing the in-patients then in the Hospital on orders of the Order Committee and the parish from which each of such in-patients came.

25. When by the falling in of leases of the charity New scheme property or otherwise, the income of the charity shall to be obtained on be increased to a sum which, in the opinion of Her increase of Majesty's Attorney-General, shall make it desirable that a new or further scheme should be settled for the due administration of this charity, application shall be made by him to the Court of Chancery for the purpose.

26. This scheme shall be printed, and a copy be scheme to given to every person who shall become a Trustee of be printed. the charity, and also to the Treasurers and Governors of King's College Hospital.

The Vestry of this parish in pursuance of the foregoing scheme have appointed Mr. Thomas Woolley Marshall and Mr. Joseph Henry Garlant to be Trustees to represent this parish in conjunction with the Vicar for the time being.

METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS.

William Henry Dalton, Esq., the representative of this parish at the Metropolitan Board of Works, was unanimously re-elected, he having retired from that office at the end of the third year of his appointment in pursuance of the provisions of the Metropolis Local Management Act.

LEICESTER SQUARE.

The Metropolitan Board of Works, in pursuance of the authority vested in them by the "Gardens in Towns Act," have given the necessary notice that the inclosure of Leicester Square has been taken under their care.

METROPOLIS RAILWAYS.

Since my last Report an Act, originally entitled "The Hampstead, Midland, North Western, and Charing Cross Railway Bill," has passed into a law, and is now called "The North Western and Charing Cross Railway Act." The House of Commons having declined to grant the necessary protection to the Vestry and the parishioners at large, a Petition, under the instructions of the Vestry, was prepared by me and presented to the House of Lords, and I appeared before a Select Committee of that House, in support thereof accordingly. The result has been that various clauses for protection of the rates and the public thoroughfares, and for providing against damage to the ratepayers, have been secured by that opposition.

During the present Session a Bill for making a Railway from the Waterloo Station to Whitehall has passed both Houses, and received the Royal Assent.

By direction of the Vestry I prepared a Petition against the Bill, for the purpose of securing protective clauses for the Parish, and appeared before the Committee of the House of Commons in support of it. The result has been that the Clauses required for protection of the Parish have been inserted in the Act.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the Parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 74 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and eleven summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all the other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends in this parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1865.

Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-

Fields for the Year ending 25th March, 1865.

PERHAPS the most remarkable feature of my Report for the year 1865, is, that the number of deaths exceed that of the births, the former being in number 624, while the latter was only 551. The deaths exceed those of any year since 1859; and the births are fewer than for the last ten years. It was not from epidemic diseases that the excessive mortality was caused, for they were less by 44 than in the preceding year. Whooping-cough was the most fatal among this class of diseases, no doubt influenced, as all other diseases of the respiratory organs were, by the very cold and ungenial winter. There were 85 deaths from consumption, and 110 from other diseases of the lungs, making a total of 213 from affections of the breathing organs, or more than one-third of the total number.

The great mortality of the year is also evidenced in the deaths of 221 children under 5, being also more than one-third of the total number, which is above the average in our Parish, and greatly above the average in country districts; but below the average of some more overcrowded districts. The locality of the Parish of St. Martin is not unhealthy, at least it ought not to be so for a London Parish. About Charing Cross we have considerable open spaces, and the northern parts about Long Acre are so very much elevated above the level of the River, that where other causes of bad health do not intervene the inhabitants are healthy. The great increase of mortality may be imputed partly to overcrowding; all our courts and places where rent is low are more crowded than ever, and latterly the character of the residents is not so good as it was; and I am disposed to think that our increased mortality may have been partly caused by increased immigration into London of destitute people from the cotton districts, &c.

We are all desirous that the status of our working classes should be improved, but I fear all our efforts to spread civilization will long be counteracted by the great difficulty of lodging the families of a large portion of the community, especially in London. Rents have become so heavy that few labouring men can afford more than one room; overcrowding in such rooms must increase, and with it the fearful results of men, women, girls and boys all sleeping in the same apart-Neither religion nor morality can increase ment. under the existing circumstances of our poorer classes. It is almost returning to the habits of our barbarous ancestors, or the untutored savages of Africa and Australia; and while our eyes are daily afflicted with the wretched objects of abject poverty in our streets, we know on the other hand that the resources of the country are on the increase, and the great increase of wealth is obvious from the multiplication of luxurious residences in the suburbs of all our towns and cities. With the increase of wealth there is also evidence of increased munificence in the holders of it to improve the condition of their less fortunate brethren, and we may hope that remedies will be found to check the great evil of overcrowded tenements. I have been

asked whether the appointment of Medical Officers of Health has yet produced any great benefit, and my answer has been that, although we do not effect such rapid improvements as we hoped to have done, yet much real benefit has resulted, in making places and occupations more healthy than they were. By extending the cleansing and whitewashing of every tenement at least once every year, we offer inducements to the people themselves to pay more attention to cleanliness. The very fact that by our frequent inspections the inhabitants of our wretched courts find they are cared for, is of itself a stimulus to improve their habits of life. Everybody is taught, by our inspections of houses where fever or other infectious diseases have prevailed, the necessity of taking steps to check the spread of such diseases.

The spread of sanitary knowledge is slow, but the continued efforts to teach people that health is the greatest blessing of life, and that it is in the power of almost every one to secure it, by temperance, cleanliness, fresh air, good ventilation of rooms, and proper exercise of mind and body, will annually increase the numbers of those who learn and feel it to be their interest to sacrifice selfish and sensual pleasures to the real good of their families and themselves. All knowledge is slow in its progress among the masses of mankind, but it does make its way, and there is now a larger class of educated people than at any former period of history. So we may be assured that knowledge of the laws of health will continue to be diffused, and that a larger number of our people will year by year be added to those who have already participated in the great blessings that result from such knowledge.

The inhabitants of several courts about Bedfordbury complain of the want of water on Sundays, the very day they most require it. This results from the

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new laws of the water companies to have no water supplied on that day, and as the cisterns, &c., of the poorer houses are seldom large enough for more than one day's consumption, we can easily see that the great improvidence of most people who live in courts will leave them on Sundays little or no water. It is to be lamented that people should at any time have to go about begging water, and more especially so on Sundays. There is an ingenious invention called the "Water Waste Preventor," by which one pail of water can be obtained, and then the reservoir which supplies this quantity fills again for the next applicant, and no waste can occur. It would be an act of benevolence, as with drinking fountains, to erect a few of these suppliers of water in some of our crowded courts.

It is very important that some of the land to be reclaimed by embanking the River should be applied to the very beneficial purposes of gymnasia and swimming baths. Swimming baths are doubly beneficial to health, by keeping the skin in good condition, and affording a most agreeable kind of exercise. There can be no greater boon to the inhabitants of a crowded city than swimming baths, and the several parishes through which the embankment extends might combine in the expense of having some of large size for all classes; or the Metropolitan Board of Works might gratify their constituents by building some on a very magnificent scale. Looking upon it as highly probable that we shall have swimming baths on the land to be reclaimed from the River, I would suggest that on one or two mornings every week they should be appropriated to the use of women; so admirable a source of health and strength should not be closed to females, among whom the art of swimming is making great progress, and there is no reason why it should not be adopted by all classes, as one of the

most direct sources of good health which we can have recourse to. There are few large towns on the continent without their swimming baths, and no city in this respect is so ill supplied as London.

In the first quarter of the year ending Saturday, April 2, there were 162 births and 187 deaths. This large excess of deaths is very remarkable; but we know that, even in this part of London, many births escape registration. In the corresponding quarter of last year there were 159 deaths, showing this year an excess of 28; all to be accounted for in the increased number of deaths in persons over 60, there having been 88 in the last quarter and in the same time in 1863 only 69. Under 5 years of age the deaths were 57. The deaths from epidemic diseases amounted to 18; 2 small-pox, 1 measles, 3 scarlatina, 1 diarrhœa, 4 whooping-cough, 5 fever, 2 croup. While in the same quarter last year the deaths were 30; 10 being from measles and 10 from scarlet fever ; 24 of the deaths were caused by consumption and 52 by other diseases of the lungs, these diseases being the principal source of the increased mortality, reaching the number of 74 this and only 44 last year. There were 30 deaths from diseases of the brain, 14 from diseases of the heart, 14 from those of the digestive organs, and 12 from old age. We have one death recorded from want, in a woman carried from the streets in a state of exhaustion to Charing Cross Hospital, where she died in spite of every attempt to rally her.

In the quarter ending Saturday, July 2, 1864, there have been 149 deaths, and in the corresponding quarter of last year 147. The most fatal epidemic of the quarter has been whooping-cough, from which cause we have had 17 deaths. The deaths from smallpox having fallen to 1 in last quarter, while in the same time last year there were 6 deaths. Typhus fever

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caused 8 deaths, scarlet fever 4, diarrhœa 3. The deaths from consumption numbered 28, from other diseases of the breathing organs 21; from this cause in the preceding quarter we had 52 deaths, showing the remarkable influence of mild weather on this important class of diseases. There were 7 deaths from diseases of the digestive organs, 5 from diseases of the brain, 7 from those of the heart, 5 from debility at birth, and 7 from old age. Fifty-two, rather more than one-third, of the deaths, were in children under 5 years. Twenty were at ages over 60 years. Seventyeight, or rather more than one-half of the total number, occurred at the intermediate active period of human life; this is considerably above the average, and is one of the most marked proofs of what may be termed an unhealthy season. All the deaths from consumption in the last quarter (28) were in persons from 20 to 60 years of age.

In the three months ending Saturday, October 1st, there have been 136 deaths; in the corresponding quarter of 1863 and 1862, 149 and 141. The number of deaths from epidemic diseases have been 35. Seventeen of these diarrhea, almost all infants. Ten of the deaths were from typhus fever, which, although not so common as it has been, still continues its ravages beyond the usual average. From scarlatina only 2 deaths, and measles only 1. Consumption caused 16, and other diseases of the respiratory organs 10. From heart disease we had 7 deaths, from those of the brain 12, from diseases of stomach, &c., 12 deaths, and 8 from old age. From accidents there were 10 deaths, 6 being fractures of bones, and the others internal injuries. Fifty-seven of the 136 deaths were in children under 5; this is consideraby above the average, and caused chiefly by diarrhœa; 17 of the deaths were in persons over 60; this was rather below the average number.

In the last quarter of 1864, ending Saturday,

December 31st, there have been 150 deaths, which is about the average of the winter quarter. Twenty-seven persons died from epidemic diseases, of which 6 measles, 6 scarlatina, 1 diarrhœa, 3 whooping-cough, 4 typhus. Twenty-one persons died from tubercular diseases, of which 18 were cases of consumption; from diseases of the brain there were 14 deaths, from heart disease 13, diseases of respiratory organs 27, digestive organs 15, old age 10, accidents 6. On the whole, this has not been so unhealthy a period in our district as in many others.

I have inspected all the bakehouses in the parish, 15 in number. All except two were in good order and in accordance with the Act for the Regulation of Bakehouses (26 and 27 Victoria).

The two exceptions were those of Johnson & Co., 79, St. Martin's Lane, and of Mr. Oram, 27, Charing Cross. At Messrs. Johnson's I found two bed rooms in the basement, which, although separated as the Act directs, from the bakehouse, are insufficiently ventilated; one where eight men have slept has nothing that deserves the name of a window, and the cubic space of the apartment is too little for eight adults.

In the case of Mr. Oram, a very small closet is used as a sleeping place for a boy; it is utterly unfit for such a purpose in itself, and is not separated from the bakery as the Act directs.

In both instances satisfactory alterations have been made in accordance with the new law.

The following tables require a few words of explanation :---

Table No. 1, gives the variations in the number of births, deaths, and causes of death during the last nine years. In the last Census the population of our Parish was found to have diminished nearly 2,000 since the Census of 1851. This table does not show any very remarkable difference in the average numbers of births and deaths.

Tables Nos. 2 and 3, show how much larger is the death-rate in our poorest localities. The two districts of Charing Cross and Long Acre contain nearly the same amount of population, but there is considerable difference in the condition of the people. In the Long Acre district we have Drury Lane, Bedfordbury, and the largest number of courts, &c., where the poorest of our population reside, and the number of deaths exceed that of the Charing Cross district by more than 100. The proportion of deaths from epidemic diseases is also larger, as is also the deaths of children under 5 years. Nothing can more clearly show that the mortality of a district is increased by poverty and its accompaniments, overcrowding, bad management of children, and illventilated rooms.

Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Ten Married Couples, each Couple receiving 30s per Calendar Month; Twenty Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March, 1865, were as follows:—65 Almswomen, 8 Married Couples, and 43 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution.
