FOR THE YEAR ENDING 25TH MARCH, 1869.

IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 25 meetings, and the Committees appointed by the Vestry have held 28 meetings during the year.

PARLIAMENTARY MEASURES.

The Bills introduced into the House of Commons in the present Session for substituting for Vestries and District Boards Municipal Corporations for the Management of the affairs of the Metropolis were withdrawn. The Home Secretary has proposed to introduce some Measure, having a similar object in view, in a future Session.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 128 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and 11 summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund

in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1868.

Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields for the Year 1868.

THERE have been during the year 670 births and 631 deaths. One hundred and thirty-one of the deaths took place in Charing-cross Hospital, a much larger number than in any former year. This large proportion of hospital deaths gives us the appearance of having a rate much above the average of an equal population with our own; but in estimating the percentage of deaths, we must deduct all the deaths in the hospital except those of our own parishioners.

OF children under five years of age there have been 229 deaths, and of persons over 60 years 135. There have been ninety-five deaths in the year. Four being cases of smallpox, 13 of measles, 22 of scarlatina, 10 of the deaths were caused by whooping-cough, 28 by diarrhœa, and 28 by fever. There were 78 deaths

from consumption, and 97 from other diseases of the lungs. In the workhouse the deaths amounted to 82, twelve of the number being 80 years and upwards.

In comparing the mortality of the year 1868 with that of former years, we find that the number of deaths was above the average. The number of deaths caused by scarlatina, diarrhœa, and croup were considerably larger than usual, as were diseases of the brain, of the heart, and of the lungs. Whooping cough has been much below the average. Fever has not been so fatal this year as usual, but so many cases are at once sent to the Fever Hospital that the spread of the disease is checked. From apoplexy and other diseases of the brain we had 58 deaths, while in the preceding year there were 74. From premature birth and infantile debility we had 29 deaths, which is about the average from this cause. Thirty-six deaths were attributed to old age, no disease having been specified as a cause of death. Out of these 36 deaths, 12 were 80 years old and upwards. Fractures, burns, and other accidents were the cause of 32 deaths, being above the average from these causes.

The condition of the houses occupied by the working classes has improved, the Vestry notices in regard to cleanliness and repairs are fairly carried out in most instances. I am of opinion that the great evils of dirt and destructiveness, on the part of tenants, are much more difficult of cure than the neglect of landlords in relation to repairs, &c., for we observe too frequently that tenants of such houses are very careless in keeping the rooms and staircases in decent order.

In the worst parts of the parish the houses are cleansed and whitewashed once in the year. The supply of water is satisfactory, but the vessels for storing it are too frequently tubs, which are necessarily more exposed to dirt and impurities than proper cisterns. The condition of the closets in some of the courts are too often in a very neglected state, and, in

many instances, the landlords are obliged to employ persons to cleanse them daily. Upon the whole I am of opinion that all classes, even the very poorest, are much more alive to their own interest in supporting measures suggested for the maintenance of health; and all are disposed to second our efforts in keeping rooms and houses in a clean and decent state as a means of good health to themselves and their children.

MEMORANDUM. —The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 36s., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge. —The Out-Pensioners consist of Ten Married Couples, each Couple receiving 30s. per Calendar Month; Twenty Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March, 1869, were as follows:—50 Almswomen, 11 Married Couples, and 41 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

Smith's Charity.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money, to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years, either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B. This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
