IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 26 meetings, and the Committees appointed by the Vestry have held 21 meetings during the year.

PARLIAMENTARY MEASURES.

The Bills introduced into the House of Commons in the present Session for substituting for Vestries and District Boards Municipal Corporations for the Management of the affairs of the Metropolis have been again postponed for consideration in the next Session of Parliament.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 106 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and 18 summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund

in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1869.

Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields for the Year 1869.

IN the Year 1869 there have been 576 births and 594 deaths. Reckoning the number of inhabitants in the parish at about 20,000, this gives the most approximate death-rate to be 25 per thousand.

A complaint was lately made that Bedfordbury and the neighbouring courts were in a very bad state in relation to dirt and want of whitewashing, &c. I have been in the habit of reporting such houses as require cleansing and whitewashing as soon in the year as the weather is mild enough for workmen to perform these operations without danger to the inhabitants, more especially the children. A large number of the houses have been cleansed and repaired, for I am happy to say I find little or no difficulty in getting many landlords to do

all that is reasonable in such cases. Of course there are some landlords who give us much trouble in these matters, but upon the whole they do what is required of them.

Although I can say with truth that the landlords do repair and cleanse the houses, I am sorry to report that many are no sooner cleansed than they are speedily made as dirty as ever. For example, the eight houses in Shelton Court are so small — both in relation to rooms and staircases — that they are speedily made as dirty as ever. All the houses in this court are so small, both in relation to rooms and staircases that the clothing of the occupiers very soon make them as bad as ever. I can report with pleasure that repairs and improvements are more easily effected every year; a few summonses to the police courts have shown that we are in earnest in requiring repairs, &c., and these are effected more speedily than formerly.

I continue my regular house to house visitations in all those parts of the parish where they are necessary. There are some places so bad that neither repairs nor cleansing can much improve them. Such places as Brewer's Court can only be benefited by pulling down and rebuilding; and I am gratified in having to offer my thanks to the Vestry for the attention given to the subject.

We must not altogether estimate the health of a district by the mere increase or diminution of the death-

rate, for there may be much sickness without any increase of the average number of deaths; or the epidemic and prevailing diseases may be of a more or less fatal nature. We may have an increase of deaths without any increase of cases of sickness from the more fatal nature of the diseases which have most generally prevailed.

MEMORANDUM.—The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 36s., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Ten Married Couples, each Couple receiving 30s. per Calendar Month; Twenty Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March, 1870, were as follows:—50 Almswomen, 13 Married Couples, and 48 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

Smith's Charity.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money, to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years, either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B. This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
