FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1872.

IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 24 meetings, and the Committees appointed by the Vestry have held 24 meetings during the year.

PARLIAMENTARY MEASURES.

The Vestry has not had occasion to oppose any proceedings in Parliament during the present Session.

A Committee of Delegates, representing the Parishes and District Boards of the Metropolis, has been appointed to protect the Ratepayers as regards the supply of gas. The Committee has held its sittings from time to time at the Vestry Hall of St. Martin's. It is expected that a report of the result will be published shortly after the recess.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 131 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and 7 summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1871.

Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Year 1871.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my second Annual Report of the sanitary condition of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. The census was taken on the night of Palm Sunday, 2nd April, 1871, and the result, so far as our Parish is concerned, shows the population to be 21,157. The previous census, (1861) the population was 22,689. From the foregoing figures, it will be seen that the population of the Parish has decreased 1,532.

The Births during the year 1871 show a decrease over the year 1870 of 33.

The Deaths in the year 1871 were 526; this is a diminution of 94 over the previous year. The following table demonstrates the deaths for 1871 and 1870,

and also shows the annual death-rate per 1,000 of the estimated population.

By this table it will be seen that in the year 1871, the mortality was considerably less than the year 1870, the death-rate being 2·5 per 1,000 less in the former year than the latter year.

Of the 526 deaths in the year 1871, 150 of them occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital; 35 of this number which died in the Hospital were residents in the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, the remaining 115 were from other parts of London and the country. This circumstance will therefore diminish the death-rate of the Parish in the following manner:—

From the foregoing figures, the actual death-rate of the estimated population for the year 1871 will be 19·4.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

This most important class of disease, constituting Smallpox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Fever, Diarrhœa, Cholera, Diphtheria, &c., proved fatal to 86 during the year.

SMALLPOX.—The number who died in the Parish from this malady was 14. Mr. Bowman, the Relieving Officer, as shown by a return which he has furnished me with, sent 68 cases to the Smallpox Hospital, 9 of which terminated fatally.

This epidemic was due, like former epidemics no doubt, to the neglect of vaccination. With such a beneficent agent as vaccination, if properly carried out both as to primary vaccination of infants and re-vaccination of those older, this disease might be kept within a very limited compass or possibly stamped out. Last year I re-vaccinated a great number of adults, and in no single instance did it come to my knowledge of a case of Smallpox occurring amongst them.

The precautionary measures which were taken to prevent the spread of the disease were as follows:—On becoming acquainted with any case, I visited the house, gave instructions to be careful of the linen, and not to remove it out of the infected room, and urged re-vacci-

nation to those in the house who had not recently been vaccinated, also desired that friends should abstain from visiting the patient. If the patient was removed to the Smallpox Hospital, the room and its contents were at once thoroughly and efficiently disinfected by your Sanitary Officer; in the event of the patients remaining at their own homes, the rooms and the dirty linen were disinfected when the cases became convalescent. In a great number of instances it was difficult or impossible to ascertain where Smallpox existed, from the reluctance of friends in making public the fact of having Smallpox in the house for fear of injury to their business, &c. To remedy this, by your instructions, I sent a copy of the following letter to every Medical Gentleman in the Parish and neighbourhood:—

“ VESTRY HALL,

ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS,

February 1872.

“ DEAR SIR,

“ In consequence of the still prevalent state of Smallpox in the Metropolis, the Vestry of this Parish, anxious to limit its ravages, has passed a Resolution, in accordance with which I am requested to address a letter to every Medical Gentleman in this neighbourhood, to ask him to communicate to me any fresh case of this disease that may occur in his practice, in this Parish, so that means may be taken to prevent the further propagation of the malady.

"We have a Sanitary Officer appointed by the Vestry, whose duty is to disinfect the rooms and linen of Small-pox Patients, and whose services you could command.

"Any case you inform me of will be in strict confidence, only known to myself and the Sanitary Officer.

"Trusting you will aid the good intentions of the Vestry.

"I am, DEAR SIR,

I must not omit to mention the valuable assistance I received from Mr. Hunt, the Sanitary Officer; he was a most intelligent, zealous, and able servant. He performed in the year 1871, 102 disinfections in such a manner that Smallpox did not recur in any house which he had disinfected.

SCARLET FEVER. — From this highly contagious malady 8 deaths are recorded; this is the second lowest number during the last ten years. In the year 1867 the deaths numbered 6.

FEVER. — Under this head is classed Typhoid Fever, Typhus Fever, Simple continued Fever, and Remittent Fever. In the year 1871, the deaths numbered 8; this is the second lowest number for the last ten years; 1870 the deaths being 6.

DIARRHŒA.—19 died from this complaint during the year, they were all children under 5 years of age.

SANITARY WORK.

During the year, a house-to-house and a room-to-room visitation was made of almost all the houses in Bedfordbury and the courts therefrom, also of other parts of the parish, and notices were served upon the various owners to perform the necessary cleansings, &c. Unfortunately, the tenants of this class do not appreciate our efforts for their health and comfort: no

sooner are their places made clean, than in a short time they become as dirty as ever. Some of the owners very willingly perform the work ordered, others on the contrary are very reluctant. In seven cases, I was obliged to ask your sanction for summonses against those owners who paid not the slightest attention to the notices, and in each case gained a conviction. In all, 131 notices were served during the year 1871, and the summary will be found further on.

In concluding my Report, I must thank you for the kind consideration shown to me in the discharge of my duties.

MEMORANDUM.—The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 36s., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Ten Married Couples, each Couple receiving 30s. per Calendar Month; Twenty Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March 1872, were as follows:—46 Almswomen, 11 Married Couples, and 42 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B. This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
