Seventeenth Annual Report
OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF
THE VESTRY
OF THE PARISH OF
ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS
FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1873.

IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 25 meetings, and the Committees appointed by the Vestry have held 30 meetings during the year.

PARLIAMENTARY MEASURES.

The Vestry, in conjunction with several other Vestries and District Boards of the Metropolis, petitioned the House of Commons against the passing of two Bills during the present session of Parliament, viz.:—"The Gas Light and Coke Company's Bill," and "The Imperial Gas Light Company's Bill," and I was authorized to conduct the opposition with the assistance of counsel. The opposition had the effect of considerably reducing the powers sought for by the first named Bill, and of inducing the Committee to throw out the Imperial Gas Light Company's Bill altogether.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 101 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and 2 summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the Fields, for the Year 1872.

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my third Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, and in doing so I must congratulate you on the reduction of our death-rate. In the year 1872 the number of deaths was lower than it had been for many years past.

BIRTHS.

The Births during the year 1872 were 496; that is 63 less than in the previous year.

DEATHS.

The Deaths in the year 1872 amounted to 504; that is 22 less than in the previous year. The following is

an account of the deaths for 1872 and 1871, and also the annual death-rate per 1,000 of the estimated population :—

By this table it will be seen that in the year 1872 the mortality was less than in the year 1871, the death-rate being 1 less per 1,000 in the former year than in the latter. Of the 504 deaths in the year 1872, 139 occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital; of the 139 persons who died in the Hospital, 31 were resident in the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, the remaining 108 were from other parts of London and the country. This circumstance will therefore diminish the death-rate of the Parish in the following manner :—

The foregoing figures show that the actual death-rate per 1,000 of the estimated population of the parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields for the year 1872 was 18·7.

AGES AT DEATH.

The deaths during infancy, as is usually the case, were very numerous. Of the 504 deaths, 158 occurred in children under five years of age. This mortality might be very much mitigated if during infancy children were better cared for. Amongst the poor they are much neglected, badly clothed, many sleeping in one room, and during early infancy their supply of nourishment is scanty in quantity and poor in quality. If the infant is suckled by the mother, she is frequently away during the day for many hours earning her livelihood, consequently her offspring must be neglected. On the other hand, when an infant is brought up by hand, the food is rarely prepared with that care that is necessary for the wellbeing of an infant, hence many fall easy victims to disease during early childhood. 34 deaths occurred in persons between the ages of 5 and 20 years, 97 between 20 and 40 years, 142 between 40 and 60 years, 66 between 60 and 80 years, and 7 between 80 and 90 years.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—The deaths from this class of disease will compare favourably with those of the previous year (1871). In the year 1871 the deaths were 86, whereas in the year 1872 they were 56, being a reduction of 30.

SMALLPOX.—Smallpox was fatal to one only. From this disease we need not fear another epidemic if only the public will appreciate the value and blessings of vaccination.

MEASLES.—There were 3 deaths from this disease during the year; that is 3 less than in the previous year.

SCARLET FEVER.—Only one death occurred from this malady, whereas in the year 1871 there were 8.

DIPHTHERIA.—Diphtheria proved fatal to one only. In the previous year 5 deaths were recorded.

CROUP.—One death only occurred from Croup during the year, whilst 4 occurred in the year 1871.

FEVER.—This includes Typhus, Typhoid, and Simple Continued Fever. 9 deaths were registered from these causes, whereas in the preceding year there were 8 deaths, this is therefore 1 more than the previous year.

DIARRHŒA.—This disease was fatal to 23 persons; it principally prevailed amongst infants. Of the deaths just mentioned, 17 occurred in children under one year of age, 4 from 1 year to 5, and 2 persons from 40 to 60 years of age.

DISEASES OF THE RESPIRATORY ORGANS.—Diseases of the Respiratory Organs, including consumption, were fatal to 153 persons.

DISEASE OF HEART.—Disease of Heart caused 25 deaths; it was most fatal in persons aged between 40 and 60 years.

CANCER.—Cancer was fatal to 23 persons. This being a disease of middle life, the deaths occurred chiefly in persons between the ages of 40 and 60 years.

SUFFOCATION. — Three infants were accidentally suffocated whilst sleeping with their parents. This is not an uncommon accident amongst young infants, and it would be as well for mothers who are heavy sleepers not to have their children in bed with them all night, but lying beside the bed in a cot.

The deaths from other causes will be found fully detailed in the Tables at the end of my Report.

MORTUARY CHAPEL.

The Mortuary Chapel which is now being erected in the Drury Lane Burial Ground ought to be a great boon to our poorer parishioners. When this building is completed, people having only one room, or not having suitable accommodation for a corpse, will be able to remove their deceased relatives there during the interval of death and burial. In a sanitary point of view I cannot speak too favourably of the scheme, for nothing can be more pernicious to health than a dead

body remaining for perhaps a week in a room which the living are still inhabiting; and again, the demoralising influence it must exercise upon these people must be sad to contemplate.

It is to be hoped that it will be freely used by those for whom it is intended. The poor, I think, have a reasonable excuse for not liking to remove their deceased friends to the present Mortuary under the Church. The fact that post-mortem examinations are performed there, produces a feeling of horror towards the place, and again, its uninviting and dreary aspect all tend to prevent it being used as a temporary resting place for the dead.

BAKEHOUSES.

The Act for the Regulation of Bakehouses, 1863, says: "1. That no person under the age of eighteen years shall be employed in any bakehouse between the hours of 9 of the clock at night and 5 of the clock in morning." 2. The inside walls and ceiling or top of every bakehouse, and the passages and staircase leading thereto, shall be limewashed or painted from time to time. 3. Every bakehouse shall be kept in a cleanly state, and shall be provided with proper means for effectual ventilation, and be free from effluvia from any drain, privy, or other nuisance. 4. No place on the same level with the bakehouse shall be used as a sleeping place, unless it is constructed as follows:—it is

effectually to be separated from the bakehouse by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling, and to have an external glazed window of at least 9 superficial feet in area, of which at the least $4\frac{1}{2}$ superficial feet are made to open for ventilation."

On visiting the several Bakehouses in the Parish, I found them as a rule cleanly and well conducted. In no case could I ascertain that any person under 18 years of age was employed during the restricted hours. There was only one instance in which the men slept on a level with the Bakehouse, and in this case the requirements of the Act were complied with. The ventilation in many of the Bakehouses might be better, but the fact of their being situated under ground makes it exceedingly difficult to remedy this defect. In one case I had to order the removal of a privy which was in a most improper position in the Bakehouse.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

In the Parish there are four licensed Slaughterhouses. From time to time I have examined them, and always found them cleanly and in good order. On no occasion have I received any complaint from people living in the vicinity of these Slaughterhouses.

SANITARY WORK.

In the year 1872, 101 notices were served upon owners of houses to remedy sanitary defects. In many

instances it was necessary to order a large amount of work to be done, such as cleansing of rooms, yards, and basements, trapping of drains, laying on of water to closets, &c. In two instances summonses were taken out against owners who paid no attention to the notices. One of these cases was against the owner of two closets in Bedfordbury, who kept them in a most disgusting condition. He was fined by the Magistrate 40s. and costs.

I have made a room-to-room visitation of houses of a suspiciously dirty character, and paid immediate attention to every nuisance of which I have received notice.

The passages of the Courts leading out of Bedfordbury were all limewashed in the spring. The pipe sewers during the summer months have been regularly flushed, and the gullies in the streets also flushed with carbolic acid and water.

MEMORANDUM.—The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 36s., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Ten Married Couples, each Couple receiving 30s. per Calendar Month; Twenty Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March, 1873, were as follows:—46 Almswomen, 12 Married Couples, and 41 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money, to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years, either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B. This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
