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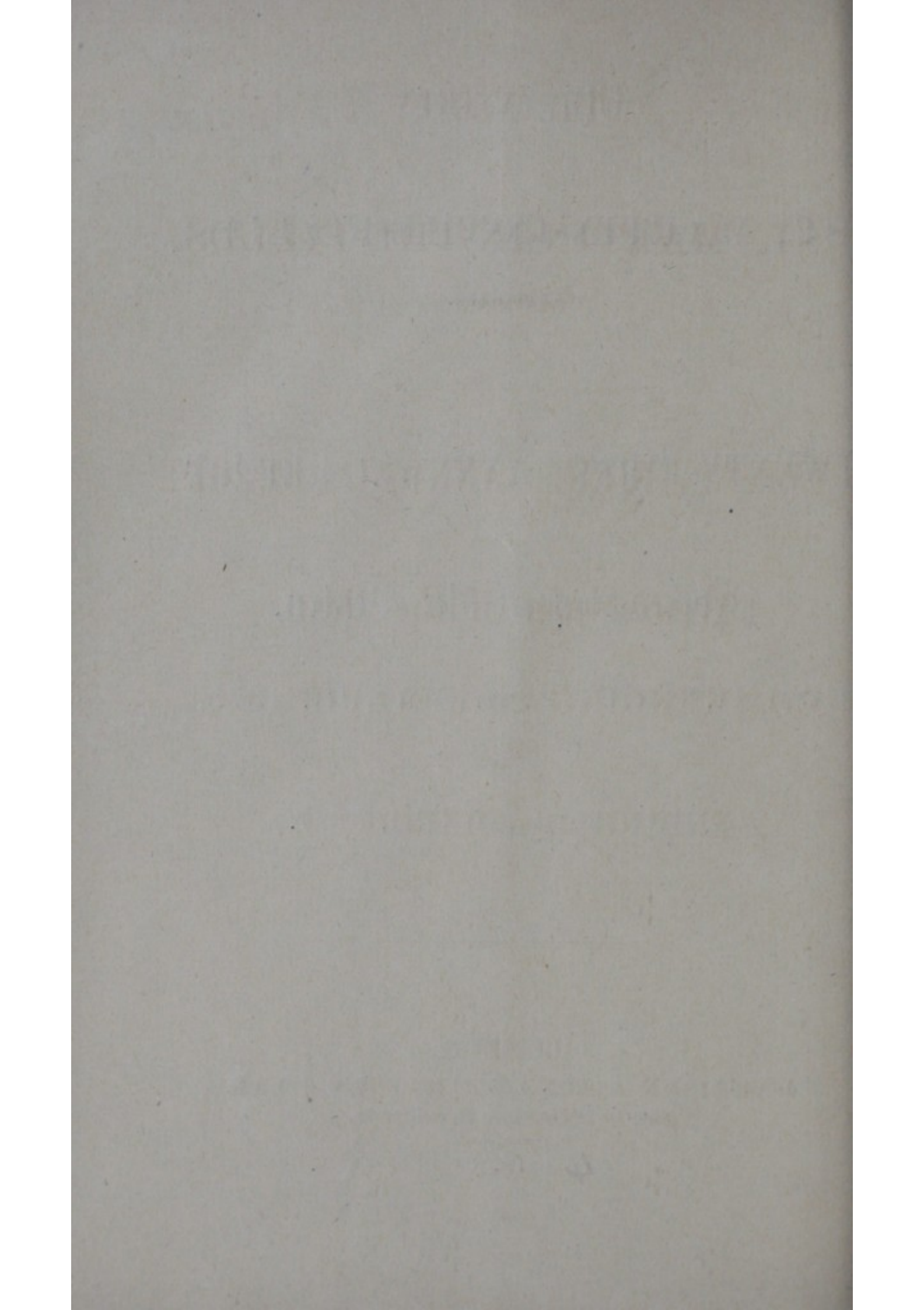

IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 24 meetings, and the Committees

appointed by the Vestry have held 32 meetings during the year.

PARLIAMENTARY MEASURES.

METROPOLITAN STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

A Bill for enabling the Metropolitan Board of Works to make certain New Streets and Street Improvements within the Metropolis was introduced into the House of Commons during the present Session. Inasmuch as the Bill proposed to remove or interfere with the steps and portico of St. Martin's Church, it was determined that, on the part of the parishioners, every means should be used to oppose that portion of the Bill. The Metropolitan Board of Works having been in vain appealed to to relinquish the Clause in question, the House of Commons was moved by Sir Charles Russell, Bart., M.P. for Westminster, to reject the Bill on its second reading, the result of which was an undertaking by the Chairman of the Metropolitan Board of Works that the Bill should omit the objectionable Clause, and the Bill was amended accordingly.

SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused

64 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and 3 summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

An Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Poor Rates for the half-years ending respectively, the 29th September, 1876, and 25th March, 1877, has also been added.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1876.

Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Year 1876.

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Seventh Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields.

In the latter part of this year an epidemic of Smallpox again visited us. The last appearance of this disease as an epidemic in the Metropolis was in the years 1870 and 1871. This complaint appears regularly amongst us after an interval of a few years, and is due, no doubt, to the neglect of vaccination and re-vaccination. In the absence of the prevalence of Smallpox the public neglect to guard themselves by the prophylactic properties of vaccination against the terrible scourge of Smallpox.

In all cases of this disease coming under my notice

I have seen that the room wherein the patient was during the illness was thoroughly and efficiently disinfected, together with the clothing and all dirty linen.

All pauper cases of this disease should undoubtedly be at once removed to the public Smallpox Hospital; the houses of the poor are so miserable and in most cases so many living in one room, that allowing a case to remain is sure to spread the disease through the whole family, the other inmates of the house, and the surrounding neighbourhood. Isolation is the only sure method of stamping out the disease.

The question has been mooted lately as to the advisability of providing hospital accommodation for the treatment of epidemic infectious disease for the non-pauper class.

The question then arises as to the constitution, the authority, and the administration of these hospitals. The Society of Medical Officers of Health passed the following resolution at one of their meetings. "That adequate provision for the isolation and treatment of epidemic infectious disease in the Metropolis does not exist; that such provision could be best made in a comprehensive and systematic manner by one central authority acting for the whole Metropolis." To this suggestion I entirely agree, it would be a far better method than each parish of the Metropolis providing a hospital of its own; it would be more economical, and would, I am sure, work well.

The Births registered in the year 1876 were 494, that is 18 more than in the previous year.

DEATHS.

The Deaths registered in the year amounted to 418, that is 85 less than in the previous year. This decrease is due to the closure of the Charing Cross Hospital for six weeks whilst undergoing enlargement, and when this establishment was re-opened for some time afterwards the Governors had only accommodation for a limited number of beds.

Of the above 418 deaths, 78 occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital; of this latter number, 54 were non-residents in St. Martin-in-the-Fields. This circumstance will therefore give the true death-rate of the Parish.

The following tables will show the number of deaths occurring in the Parish for the years 1876 and 1875,

By the above figures the death-rate per 1,000 for the year 1876 was 17·2. This is a very low death-rate, thus showing the healthy condition of our Parish.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 for the whole of London in the year 1876 was 22·3.

Appended is the annual death-rate per 1,000 in the parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields for the last six years :—

AGES AT DEATH.

Of the 418 deaths, 152 occurred in children under five years of age, 24 between the ages of 5 and 20 years, 88 between 20 and 40 years, 79 between 40 and 60 years, 63 between 60 and 80 years, and 12 above 80 years.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—This class of complaints includes Smallpox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Croup, Whooping Cough, Typhus Fever, Typhoid Fever, Simple Continued Fever, Remittent Fever, Diarrhœa, and Cholera. The mortality from these diseases is 43, that is 15 less than in the previous year.

SMALLPOX.—One death was due to this disease.

MEASLES.—There were 5 deaths from this disease. This number is 3 more than in the previous year.

SCARLET FEVER.—Only 4 deaths were due to this malady.

WHOOPING COUGH was fatal to 11. This is 2 less than in the preceding year.

FEVER.—This includes Typhus, Typhoid, Simple Continued Fever, and Remittent Fever. Only 4 deaths were registered from this class of disease. Three were due to Typhoid Fever, and 1 to Remittent Fever.

DIARRHŒA.—Eighteen deaths occurred from this malady, all in children under 5 years of age.

DISEASES OF THE RESPIRATORY ORGANS.—Diseases of the Respiratory Organs, including Consumption, destroyed 135. This is 48 less than in the previous year.

DISEASE OF HEART.—Nineteen deaths were registered from this complaint, against 41 in the previous year.

CANCER proved fatal to 11 persons.

The deaths from all other causes, with the ages at death, will be found fully detailed at the end of my Report.

BAKEHOUSES.

The several Bakehouses situated in the Parish have been duly inspected. Some few I have caused notices to be served upon the owners for the purpose of lime-whiting, etc.

SANITARY WORK.

In the year 1876, 60 notices were served upon owners or occupiers of property to remedy sanitary defects. Legal proceedings in three cases were resorted to, the owners or occupiers failing to act upon the notices served.

The several courts and passages in the Parish have been lime-whited from time to time. The pipe sewers have been regularly flushed; also those gullies in the streets which at times emit offensive effluvia, also flushed with carbolic acid and water.

MEMORANDUM.—The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 36s., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Married Couples, who receive 30s. per Calendar Month; and Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in March 1877, were as follows:—49 Almswomen, 17 Married Couples, and 48 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

Smith's Charity.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money, to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years, either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B.—This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
