IN conformity with the 198th Section of "The Metropolis Local Management Act," the following Report of the affairs and business of the Vestry during the past year, accompanied by an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure, duly audited as required by the Act, is made.

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The Return attached to this Report will show that the Vestry has held 24 meetings, and the Committees



appointed by the Vestry have held 26 meetings during the year.

#### SANITARY MEASURES.

The Medical Officer's Report is attached, showing the sanitary state of the parish, and the steps taken to improve it during the past year.

In connection therewith the Vestry have caused 85 notices for abatement of nuisances to be served during the past year, and two summonses have been issued to compel the inhabitants to abate the nuisances complained of. In all other cases the notices have been complied with.

#### SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

Under this head, all the works done under the direction of the Vestry will appear.

#### CONCLUSION.

Bound up with the Annual Report will be found a detailed account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the rents and dividends belonging to the Alms Fund in the parish devoted to charitable purposes, and distributed by the Churchwardens in the support of Alms Women and Out-Pensioners elected by the Vestry.

Also an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Poor Rates for the half-years ending respectively, the 29th September, 1880, and 25th March, 1881.

And an Abstract of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Commissioners of Baths and Wash-houses from the 1st January until the 31st December, 1880.

# MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT, 1880.

*Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Year 1880.*

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Eleventh Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields.

## BIRTHS.

The Births registered in the year 1880 were 445. This is the lowest number for the last ten years.

#### DEATHS.

The Deaths registered in the year 1880 amounted to 491. This number is 66 less than in the previous year. I attribute this decrease in the mortality to the displacement of inhabitants by the demolition of houses in Bedfordbury, and other parts of the Parish.

O Of the above 491 deaths, 160 occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and of this number who died in the Hospital, 134 were non-residents in St. Martin-in-the-Fields. These 134 deaths deducted from the total deaths will give the death-rate of the Parish.

By the above figures the death-rate per 1,000 was 16·8.

This death-rate is based upon data, supplied by the Census of 1871, the population was then 21,238; this year, 1881, the Census returns were 17,447, thus showing a decrease in the population since the last Census, which, as I before mentioned, is due to the migration of the people, from the demolition of houses, and other causes.

The death-rate for this present year, 1881, will be higher, because based upon a diminished population.

The correctness of a death-rate is not always to be relied upon, from the fact of the difficulties of ascertaining accurately the population. In a decennial period a population will vary so much, it may increase or decrease. The only way of knowing the correct population of any certain district for statistical purposes, would be to make an Annual Census, but for obvious reasons this would be out of the question.

## AGES AT DEATH.

Of the 491 deaths, 94 occurred under 1 year, 77 from 1 to 5 years, 39 from 5 to 20 years, 83 from 20 to 40 years, 127 from 40 to 60 years, 61 from 60 to 80 years, and 10 above 80 years.

## CAUSES OF DEATH.

**ZYMOTIC DISEASES.**—The seven principal Zymotic Diseases, the diseases most influenced by sanitation, caused 63 deaths. The above figures represent all the deaths from those diseases which actually occurred in the Parish, no cognizance being taken of the cases of infectious diseases removed to hospitals beyond its limits.

**SMALLPOX.**—No case of this disease came under my notice during the year.

I caused enquiries to be made of the Relieving Officer as to whether he had sent any cases of this disease to any of the Metropolitan Asylum Hospitals during 1880. I received a reply in the negative.

In London the deaths from this malady were 475 during the year in question. I may add that the immunity this Parish has enjoyed from this complaint is highly satisfactory.

**MEASLES.**—There were 5 deaths from this disease, the same number as in the previous year.

**DIPHTHERIA** caused 4 deaths, this was a diminution of 4 over the year previous.

**WHOOPING COUGH** was fatal to 20. This number is 8 in excess of the year 1879.

**FEVER.**—This includes Typhus, Typhoid, Simple Continued Fever and Remittent Fever. 5 deaths only were registered from this class of disorders. 3 were due to Typhoid Fever, 1 to Simple Continued Fever, and 1 to Remittent Fever.



DIARRHŒA.—17 deaths were caused by this malady, they were all in children under 5 years of age.

DISEASES OF THE RESPIRATORY ORGANS, including Consumption, destroyed 150. This number is 50 less than in the year 1879.

DISEASES OF THE HEART.—38 deaths were due to this complaint, against 48 of the previous year.

CANCER proved fatal to 17 persons.

The deaths from all other causes, with the ages at death, will be found fully detailed in the table at the end of my Report.

#### BAKEHOUSES.

The several Bakehouses situated in the Parish have been duly inspected. Some few I have caused notices to be served upon the occupiers for the purpose of lime-whiting, etc.

#### SANITARY WORK.

In the year 1880, 85 formal notices were served upon the owners or occupiers of property, besides numerous verbal recommendations to remedy sanitary defects.

Legal proceedings were taken in two cases, the owners or occupiers failing to comply with the terms of the notices.

In conclusion, I must bear testimony to the willingness, ability and zeal, displayed by your Inspector in carrying out my directions, and in drawing my attention to any nuisance that may come under his notice.

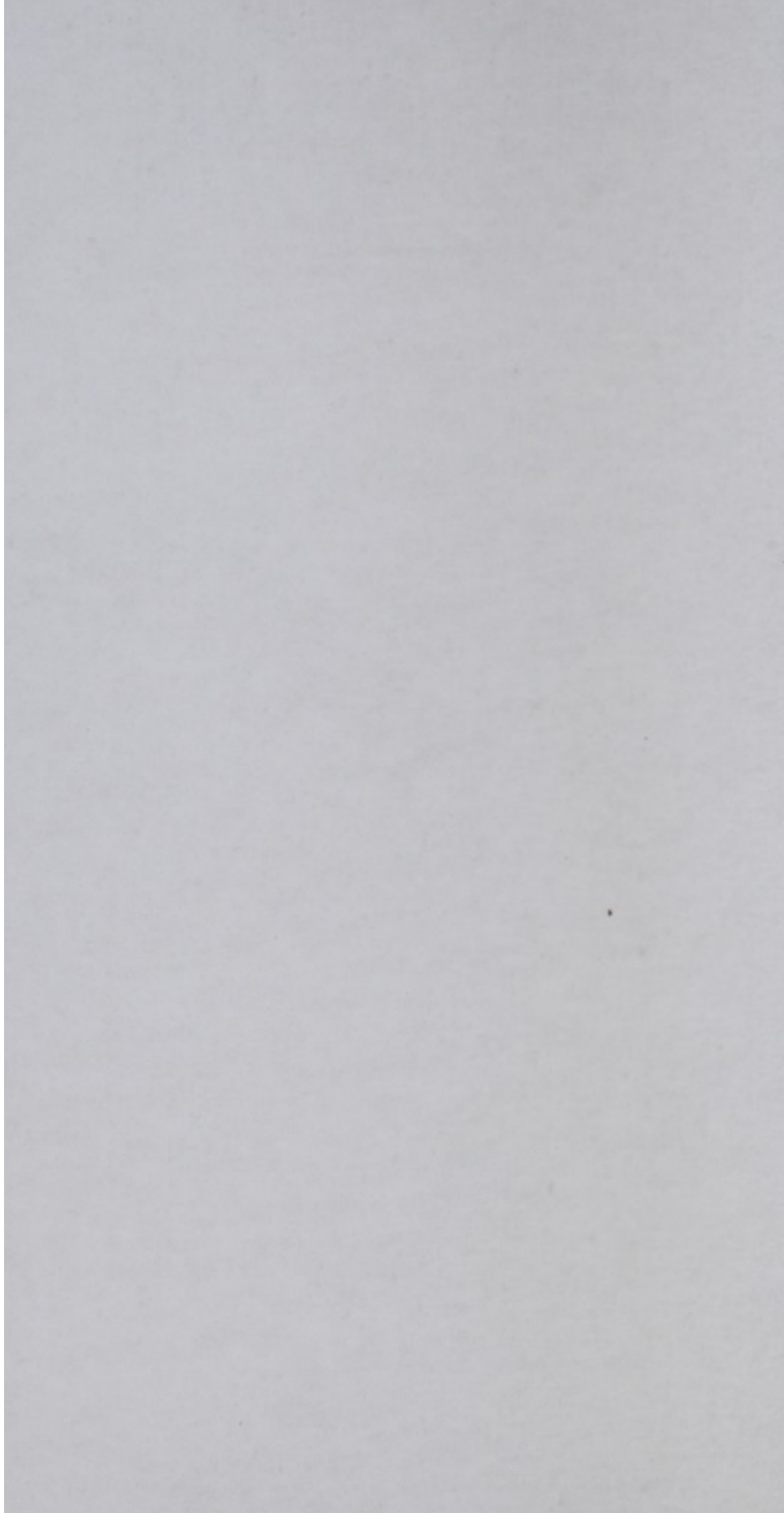

MEMORANDUM. — The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of Seventy Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 38s. 6d., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge. — The Out-Pensioners consist of Married Couples, who receive 30s. per Calendar Month; and Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have been also Housekeepers in the Parish. The Vestry having found that several applicants for the Alms Fund preferred receiving the Out-Pension and living with their friends, instead of residing in the Alms Houses, have during the last few years, elected the most deserving applicants as Out-Pensioners, by which means the Alms' Fund has been distributed between a larger number of Out-Pensioners than formerly. The number of Pensioners on the Fund in April 1881, were as follows:—41 Almswomen, 17 Married Couples, and 62 Single Persons—Out-Pensioners.

HENRY SMITH, Esq., bequeathed by will, in 1626, to 24 parishes the Rents, &c., of his Manor, and the amount of their respective shares vary from £12 to £30 per annum, according to the declarations of the Will.

The proportion of the Rent received by this Parish varies from £20 to £24 per annum; arises from the Manor and Rectory of Longney, in the county of Gloucester; Trustees, the Governors of Christ's Hospital, to whom an annual return is made of the distribution. The proceeds are distributed by the last senior Churchwarden, in Clothing, Provisions, or Money to poor persons of good character, who have been or are residents, or who have lived in the Parish at least five years, either as Housekeepers or Lodgers.

N.B.—This Charity is kept separate and distinct from the General Alms Fund.
