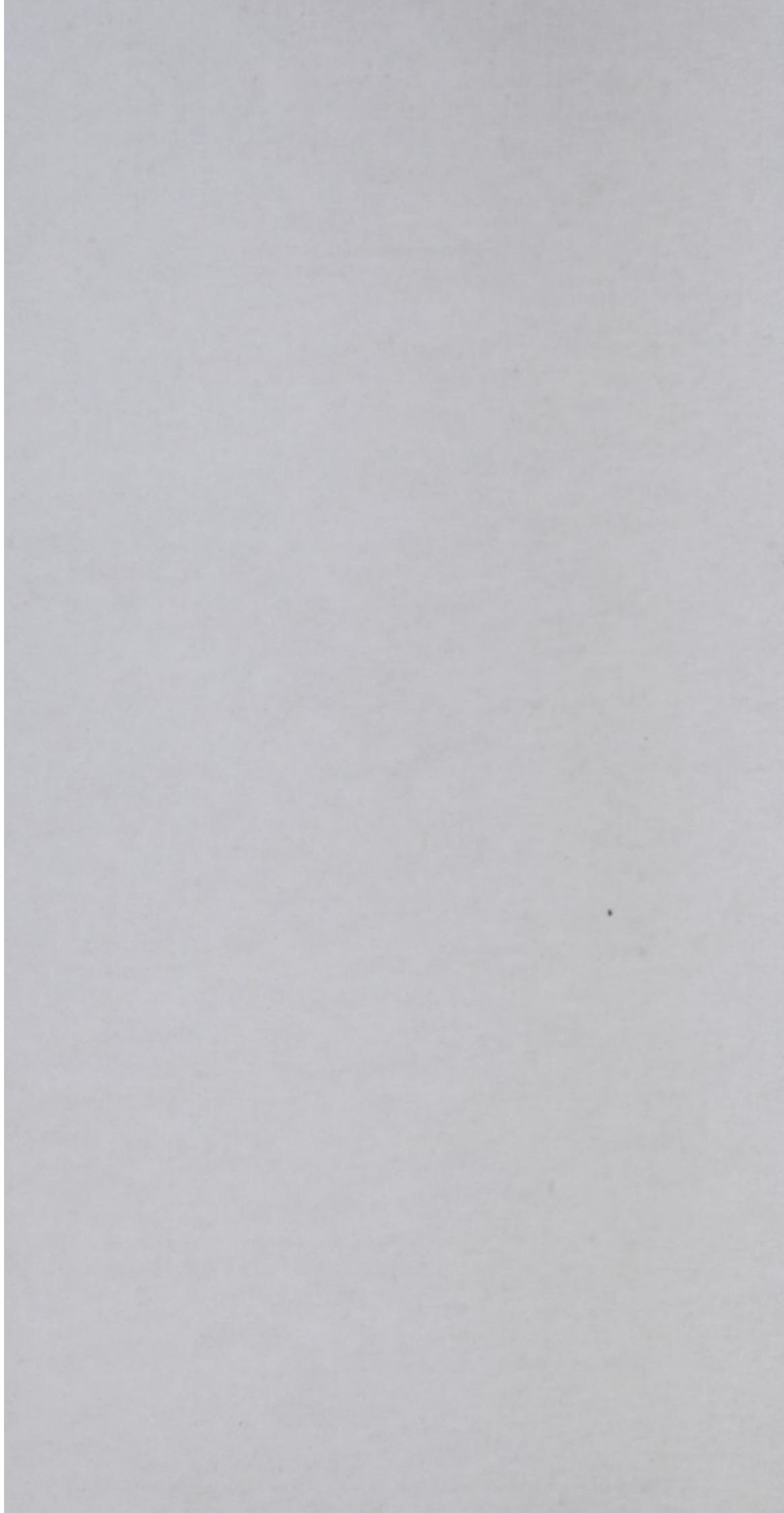

 THE VESTRY
 OF THE PARISH OF
 ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS,
 COMMENCING 26TH MARCH, 1884, AND ENDING
 25TH MARCH, 1885.

IN conformity with the 198th Section of the Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855, the Vestry submit the following Report for the year 1884-85, viz.:—

A Statement of the General and Sewers Rates made, and amounts collected, irrecoverable, and uncollected (pages 24 to 27).

A Statement of their Receipts and Expenditure during the year ended 25th March, 1885, and of their Assets and Liabilities on that day, with the Schedules referred to in such Statements, containing detailed particulars of each item therein (pages 30 to 43).

A Statement of the Contracts of the Vestry in force during the year ended 25th March, 1885 (page 44).

A Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Charity Trustees (pages 46 to 50).

A Statement of the Churchwardens' Alms and Church Accounts (pages 52 to 59).

A Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Poor Rates for the half-years ending respectively Michaelmas, 1884, and Lady Day, 1885 (pages 62 and 63).

A Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Commissioners of Public Baths and Wash-houses for the year ending 31st December, 1884 (pages 66 and 67).

The Report of the Vestry's Medical Officer of Health, for the year ended 31st December, 1884, containing particulars of the population, rate of mortality, and other statistics relating to the general health of the Parish (pages 68 to 98).

And the Report of the Vestry's Surveyor for the year ended Lady-day, 1885, in which will be found the particulars of the works carried out under his supervision (pages 99 to 104).

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The return attached to this Report (pages 6 and 7) shows that the Vestry have held 25 meetings, and the various Committees 27 meetings, during the year ended Lady-day, 1885.

SANITARY.

The Vestry have caused 121 Notices for Abatement of Nuisances to be served during the past year, and in all cases such notices have been complied with.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS.

Metropolitan Railway (Park Railway and Parliament Street Improvement). On the 3rd April, 1884, the Clerk reported that the Solicitor to the above Bill had consented to insert a provision in the Bill for the purpose of making good any deficiency in the rates during the construction of the line. On the 20th May, the Select Committee reported to the House of Commons that the Preamble of the Bill had not been proved.

Waterworks Clauses Act (1847) Amendment. By this Bill it is proposed that the annual value of any tenement supplied with water shall mean the "net annual value as settled from time to time by the local authority duly constituted." On the 17th April, 1884, it was resolved to request the Borough Members to support the same.

London Government. On the 1st May, 1884, the Vestry resolved to petition against this Bill, and to convene a meeting of Ratepayers of the parish to discuss its provisions; the Meeting was held at the Vestry Hall on the 14th of the same month, when Resolutions condemnatory of the principles of the Bill were carried. The Bill was withdrawn on the 10th July, 1884.

Dwelling Houses Inspection. It was resolved to petition against this Bill on the 1st May, 1884.

Metropolitan Board of Works (Fire Brigade Expenses). A Petition praying that the Metropolitan Board's powers of rating in respect of such expenses should be limited to 1*d.* in the £. was resolved to be forwarded on 1st May, 1884. The Bill was subsequently dropped.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS—*continued.*

London Central Railway. On the 1st May the Clerk reported that the Preamble of the Bill had not been proved.

Smoke Nuisance Abatement (Metropolis). The Vestry intimated to Lord Stratheden and Campbell their desire that the Bill introduced by him might pass into law.

Metropolis Water Supply. The Clerk reported that a Bill to confer further powers upon the Metropolitan Board of Works with respect to applications to Parliament and legal proceedings relating to the supply of water in the Metropolis had been brought in by Sir J. M. Hogg on the 2nd December, 1884. No action thereon was taken by the Vestry.

Charing Cross and Euston Railway. On the 22nd January, 1885, the Vestry were informed that the promoters would deviate the line so as not to interfere with the churchyard. On the 5th March, 1885, the Clerk reported that he had been informed by the Solicitor to the Company that it was not their intention to proceed with the Bill during the present Session.

Railway (Rates and Charges) Bills. A Petition was lodged against these Bills on the 4th March, 1885.

King's Cross, Charing Cross, and Waterloo Subway. A Petition was lodged against the above Bill on the 4th March, 1885. On the 19th March the Vestry resolved not to proceed further with their opposition on the Company undertaking to introduce a clause to make good any deficiency in the rates during the course of construction of the subway.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS—*continued.*

Charing Cross and Waterloo Electric Railway (Extension to Cockspur Street). A Petition was lodged against the above Bill on the 4th March, 1885.

London Central Subway. A Petition was lodged against 1882. The Vestry, on the 11th December, 1884, considered the above Bill on the 4th March, 1885, and on the 19th March the Vestry resolved to withdraw their opposition on the Company undertaking to introduce a clause to make good any deficiency in the rates during the course of construction of the subway.

South Eastern Railway Company's (Various Powers) Act, notice from the Solicitors to the Company of their intention to apply for an extension of time with regard to the above, when it was resolved not to oppose the application.

Companies' Acts Consolidation. A Petition was lodged against this Bill, which was subsequently dropped.

Waterworks (Regulation of Powers). On the 19th March, 1885, the Vestry resolved to petition in favour of this Bill.

Metropolis Management Elections Ballot. On the 19th February, 1885, a Petition was ordered to be presented praying that this Bill might not pass into law.

United Telephone Company (Limited). On the 5th March, 1885, the Vestry resolved to petition that the Vestries and District Boards, and not the Metropolitan Board of Works, should be constituted the sole authorities to sanction the laying of telephone wires in the Metropolis.

HYDE PARK CORNER (NEW STREETS).

A Bill was introduced in the House of Commons, as stated in the last Annual Report, on the 14th March, 1884, which proposed to confer upon the Metropolitan Board of Works the power of directing in what manner the costs of the maintenance of the above new streets should be defrayed, whether by contributions from all or any, or wholly by one of the following bodies, viz., the Metropolitan Board of Works, the Vestry of St. George, Hanover Square, and this Vestry.

The Vestry's Petition against the Bill was presented in the House of Commons by Mr. Hicks, M.P. for Cambridge-shire, on the 28th March, 1884.

On the 17th April, 1884, directions were given to the Clerk to prepare a statement of the case of the Vestry, with instructions to forward the same to every member of the House of Commons.

The Bill was *withdrawn* in the House of Commons on the 5th May, 1884.

The Bill was afterwards introduced in the House of Lords, being read a first time on the 15th May, 1884, thereupon the Vestry determined to petition against the Bill, and forward the statement of case, referred to above, to every member of the Upper House. The Bill was *thrown out* on second reading in the House of Lords on the 17th June, 1884.

On the 5th March, 1885, the Clerk reported that a similar Bill had been read a first time in the House of Commons on the 26th February, 1885, and directions were given to him to prepare a Petition for presentation, with instructions

to adopt a similar course of action to that of last Session. On the 5th March, 1885, the Clerk reported that Mr. Hicks, M.P., had informed him that Mr. Herbert Gladstone, who has charge of the Bill, was desirous of arriving at a compromise, and the terms of the compromise, as suggested by Mr. Hicks, having been privately stated, the Vestry resolved, without prejudice, to accept the terms of the same.

WATER COMPANIES' CHARGES.

On the 3rd April, 1884, the Vestry resolved to support the motion to be made by the Right Hon. W. H. Smith, M.P., to inquire into the origin of the powers of rating now possessed by Water Companies.

A copy of a resolution of the Vestry, on the 5th March, 1885, calling the attention of the Local Government Board and of the Metropolitan Board of Works, to the power possessed by Water Companies to cut off the supply of water on non-payment of water rental, and to the desirability of legislation for the purpose of effecting a modification of sec. 74 of the Water Companies' Act, 1847, was ordered to be forwarded to the Local Government Board, the Metropolitan Board of Works, the City Corporation, the Vestries and district Boards of the Metropolis, and to Mr. W. T. M. Torrens, M.P.

GATES, BARS, ETC.

On the 2nd October, 1884, the Vestry resolved to memorialise the Metropolitan Board of Works to introduce a Bill for the removal of gates, bars, and other obstructions from metropolitan streets and thoroughfares, where the cost of

their maintenance is defrayed by means of rates, and on the 5th March, 1885, the Vestry expressed their approval of that portion of the Metropolitan Board of Works (Various Powers) Bill, which proposed to deal with the subject.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

On the 1st May, 1884, a copy of a Provisional Order authorising the West Middlesex Electric Lighting Co. to supply electricity, &c., to a portion of this parish was laid before the Vestry.

On the 11th December, 1884, the Vestry resolved not to oppose the application of the Company for an extension of time for the deposit of £6,500 to be made by them, and on the 8th January, 1885, the Vestry were informed that the Board of Trade had extended the period until the 3rd July, 1885.

OVERHEAD WIRES.

On the 24th July, 1884, it was resolved to request the Government to fulfil their promise to introduce a Bill to confer upon local authorities the control of the erection and maintenance of overhead wires, and the Home Secretary was communicated with accordingly.

HOUSES LET IN LODGINGS, Etc.

The Seal of the Vestry was affixed to the Regulations for the above on the 15th May, 1884, and on the 26th June they were duly confirmed by the Local Government Board.

HOUSES LET IN LODGINGS, ETC.—*continued.*

The Regulations give power to the Vestry at all times, by their Officers, to enter and inspect all houses let out in lodgings, or occupied by members of more than one family, of the maximum rateable value of £80 per annum and under, to fix the number of persons who shall occupy such houses, to compel the proper cleansing and ventilation of the premises, to require adequate accommodation for washing and an efficient supply of water, for the notification of all cases of infectious disease, for efficient water-closet accommodation, and for the proper paving of all yards and areas.

Persons offending against any of the Regulations are liable to a penalty not exceeding 40s. for any one offence, and an additional penalty not exceeding 20s. for every day during which any default may continue.

Mr. William Cooke (Inspector of Nuisances and Pavements) has been appointed Inspector of such houses.

WOOD PAVING.

The following streets have been paved with wood during the year, viz.:—Exeter Street (re-paved), and part of the south side of Leicester Square.

ASPHALTE PAVING.

The carriage-ways of the following streets have been paved with asphalt during the year, viz.:—White Hart Street (part of) and Craven Street.

THAMES EMBANKMENT.

On the 19th March, 1885, a letter from the Metropolitan Board of Works was considered, requesting the Vestry to

take over the maintenance, &c., of the extension of Whitehall Place to the Embankment and the approach road to Villiers Street. In reply, the Board were informed that inasmuch as the circumstances which induced the Board, in the first instance, to take upon themselves the cost of the maintenance of the roads had not been materially altered, the Vestry were not prepared to accept any liability in respect of their maintenance, but would give their further consideration to the subject as soon as they had the power "of rating the lands and hereditaments situate and being within the same."

VENTILATION OF SEWERS.

The Vestry have considered the above subject and have communicated with the Metropolitan Vestries and District Boards, from whom 24 replies, stating the systems adopted by them, have been received; the Vestry's Surveyor has expressed his opinion that in special cases Harrington's self-acting wind-power ventilator may be adopted with advantage. The Vestry ultimately resolved that it was not desirable to carry out the above system of ventilation of the parish sewers as a whole, and gave directions to the Surveyor that they be reported upon from time to time, as occasion may require, and the Metropolitan Board was requested to more efficiently ventilate the main sewers.

Control of Overhead Wires, at Charing Cross Hotel, on the 17th November, 1884, convened by the Wandsworth District Board of Works.

Redistribution of Seats Bill, at Westminster Town Hall, on the 11th February, 1885.

ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS ACTS.

The works required to be effected at Nos. 2, 3, and 4, Chymister Alley; Nos. 4, 5, and 6, Hanover Court; and Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, Lumley Court, under the above Acts, and referred to in the last Annual Report, were all carried out to the satisfaction of the Surveyor and Medical Officer.

Proceedings were taken with regard to No. 7, Hunt's Court, Leicester Square, and the works required by the Vestry were duly effected.

MINUTES OF THE VESTRY.

By resolution, on the 7th August, 1884, it was ordered that the Minutes of the Proceedings of the Vestry be printed, and copies of the same supplied to each member of the Vestry.

HIS LATE R.H. THE DUKE OF ALBANY.

On the 3rd April, 1884, the Vestry passed a resolution expressive of sympathy with Her Majesty the Queen and H.R.H. the Duchess of Albany, on the unexpected decease of H.R.H. the Duke of Albany.

H.R.H. PRINCE ALBERT VICTOR CHRISTIAN EDWARD.

Congratulatory addresses were ordered, on the 8th January, 1885, to be forwarded to Their R.H. the Prince and Princess of Wales, and to H.R.H. Prince Albert Victor Christian Edward, on the latter's coming of age, which had on that day occurred.

METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS.

METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS.

Mr. W. H. Dalton, representative of the parish at the above Board, died on the 20th June, 1884, and on the 26th June, the Vestry passed a resolution expressive of sympathy with Mrs. Dalton and her family.

On the 17th July, 1884, Mr. George James was elected in the place of the late Mr. Dalton for the remainder of the time unexpired of the deceased gentleman's term of office.

CHURCHWARDENS AND SIDESMEN.

On the 17th April, 1884, Mr. Francis John Barron and Captain Clifford Probyn were respectively elected Senior and Junior Churchwardens, and Messrs. William Challice, John Francis Arnold, Thomas Hill, and Robert Stokes were subsequently elected Sidesmen.

DEATHS OF MEMBERS OF THE VESTRY.

Mr. Edward White died on the 25th April, on the 29th May the decease of Mr. F. L. West was reported, and Mr. C. C. Eames died on the 4th December, 1884. Letters expressive of sympathy and condolence with the bereaved families were in all cases forwarded.

RETIREMENT OF A MEMBER OF THE VESTRY.

On the 2nd October, 1884, the Clerk reported that Mr. C. J. Skeet having ceased to be a rated occupier in the parish, his office of Vestryman was thereby vacated.

VESTRY ELECTIONS.

The Annual Elections of the Vestry for Wards Nos. 1 and 2 took place on the 5th May, 1884. With regard to No. 3 Ward, a poll having been demanded, the Elections took place on the day following.

PUBLIC BATHS AND WASH-HOUSES.

Messrs. Geo. James, Thos. Hill, and Jas. Johnston were, on the 15th May, 1884, elected Commissioners of the above for the usual term of three years, and on the 22nd January, 1885, Mr. David Laing was elected in the place of Mr. C. C. Eames, deceased.

ARCHBISHOP TENISON'S SCHOOL.

On the 15th May, 1884, Mr. Charles Chambers Eames (subsequently deceased) was elected a representative Governor of the above School for the usual term of three years.

ARCHBISHOP TENISON'S SCHOOL—*continued.*

On the 24th July, Mr. Churchwarden Francis John Barron was elected in the place of Mr. W. H. Dalton, deceased, and Churchwarden Captain Clifford Probyn on the 22nd January, 1885, in the place of Mr. C. C. Eames, deceased.

CAMDEN TOWN CEMETERY ACT, 1854.

Mr. George James was, on the 12th June, 1884, appointed a Trustee under the above Act, in the place of Mr. Edward White, deceased, and on the 22nd January, 1885, Mr. Churchwarden Francis John Barron was elected in the place of Mr. C. C. Eames, deceased.

ST. MARTIN'S MIDDLE-CLASS SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

On the 22nd January, 1885, Mr. George James was elected a Governor of the above School in the place of Mr. C. C. Eames, deceased.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS.

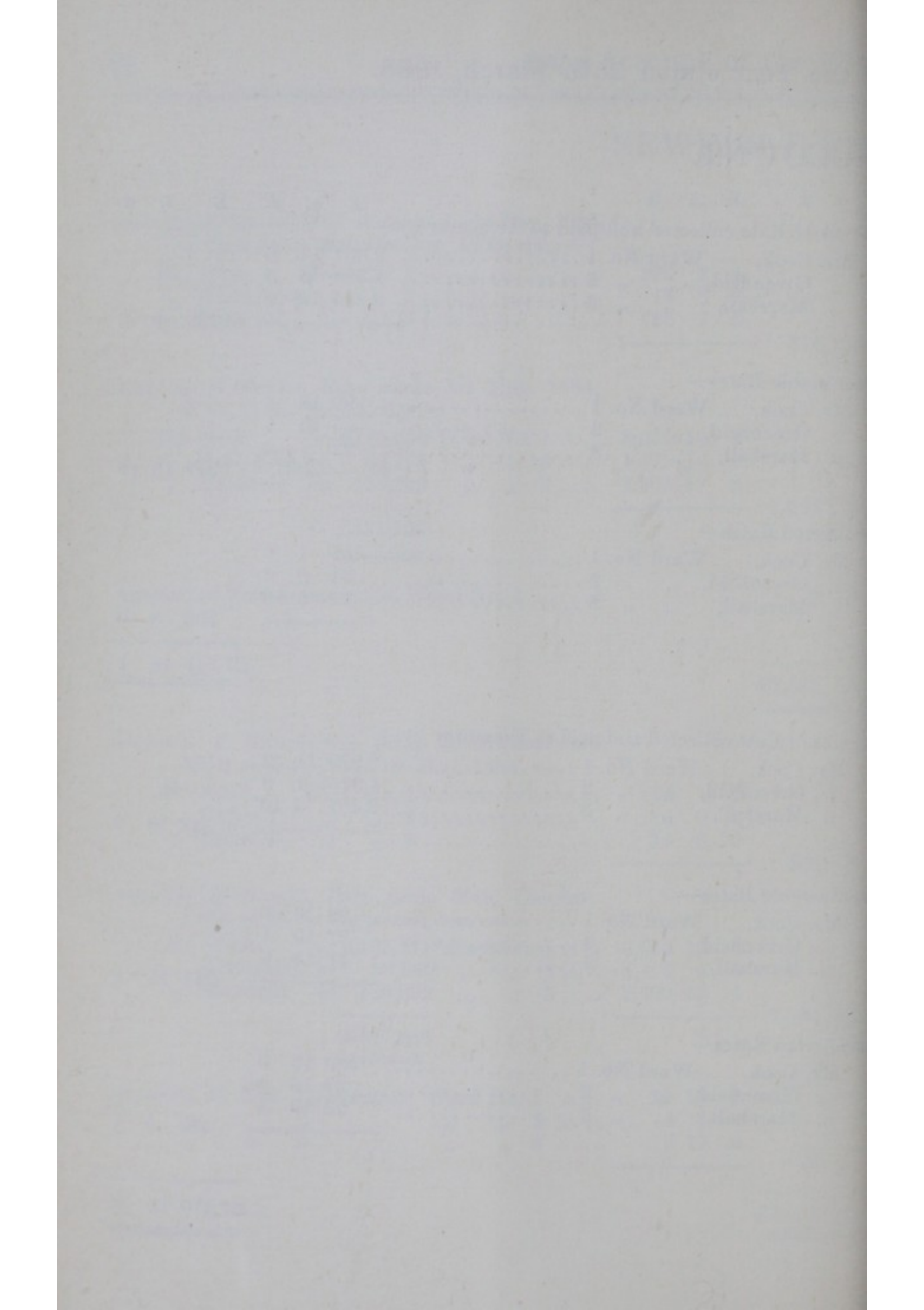

MEMORANDUM.—The full establishment in the Alms Houses consists of 42 Widows and Unmarried Women, who have been Housekeepers in the Parish; they receive 34s. 6d., 38s. 6d., and 42s. 6d. per Calendar Month, according to the several Foundations to which they have been elected. Those labouring under sickness, or other infirmities, are provided with Nurses at the charge of the Funds. A Chaplain attends at Chapel on Sunday and Thursday in each week, to perform Divine Service; they are also attended by an eminent Medical Gentleman, and are furnished with Medicine free of charge.—The Out-Pensioners consist of Married Couples, who receive 30s. per Calendar Month; and Single Persons receive 20s. per Calendar Month each; they have also been Housekeepers in the Parish. The number of Pensioners on the Fund on the 31st December, 1884, was as follows:—38 Alms Women and 17 Married Couples, and 61 Single Persons Out-Pensioners.

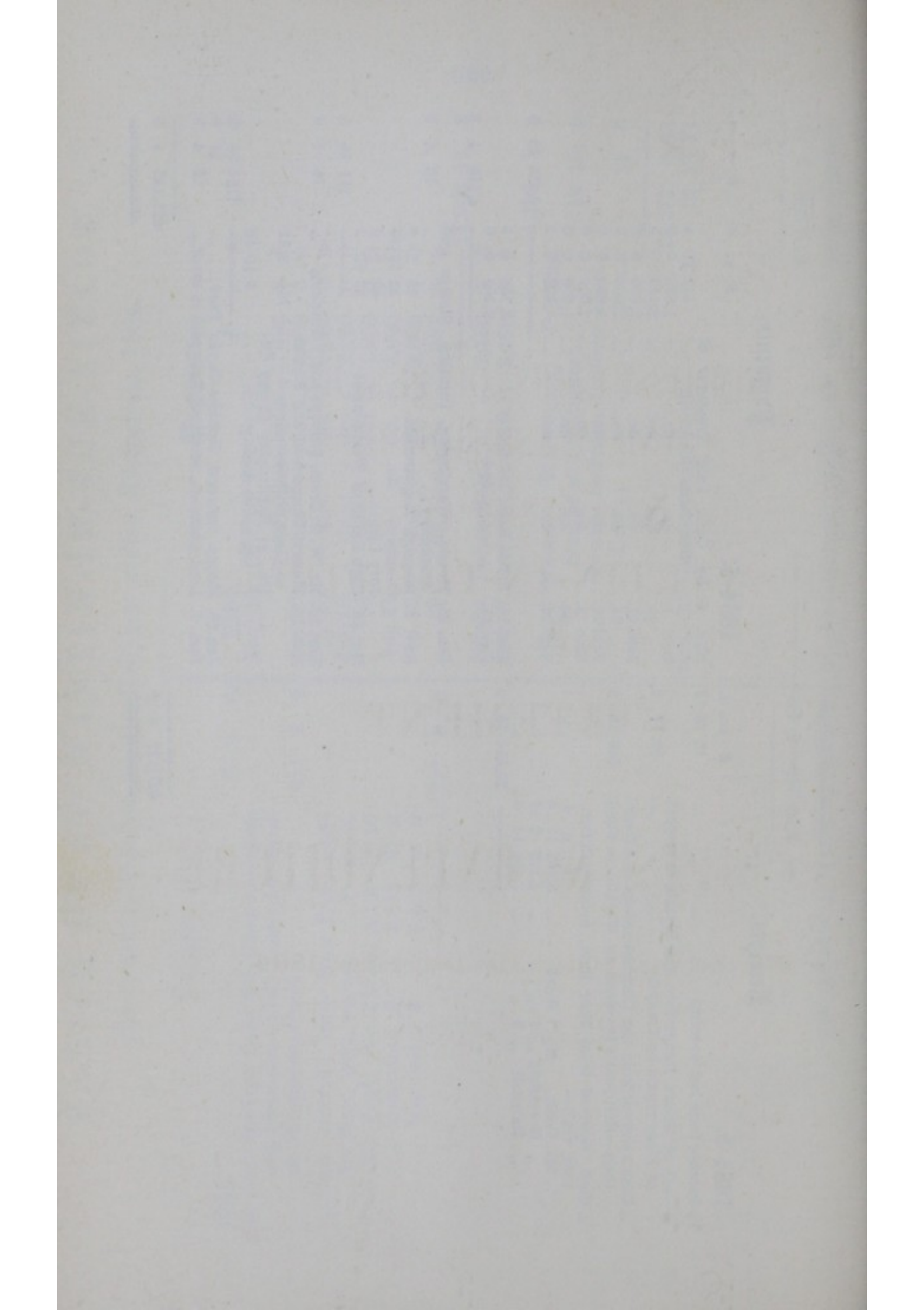

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT,

1884.

Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, for the Year 1884.

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Fifteenth Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish. This year is remarkable for another epidemic of Small-pox, of which I shall speak further on.

BIRTHS.

During the year 1884 there were 401 Births registered, of which 208 were males, and 193 females. This was 2 less than in the previous year 1883, and the lowest number of the last ten years.

The birth-rate of the parish for the year 1884 was 22·0 per 1,000 inhabitants.

In London the Births registered in the year 1884 were 137,495, which corresponded to an annual birth-rate of 33·7 per 1,000. On comparing these two birth-rates it will be observed how low ours is to that of the whole of London. This circumstance, I believe, is due to the families of so many of the inhabitants residing in the suburbs.

DEATHS.

In the year 1884 there were registered 469 Deaths; this number was 61 in excess of the previous year.

Of the above 469 Deaths, 178 occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and of this number who died in that Institution, 158 were non-residents in the Parish. In public institutions situate without the

These 359 Deaths will be the number on which to estimate the death-rate.

Death-rate per 1,000 of the population for the year 1884, 19·7.

Ratio of deaths to population, 1 in 50·5.

This slight increase in the death-rate over the previous year is not due to the Zymotic class of disease, for in the year 1884 the deaths from the seven principal Zymotic diseases were 9 less than in 1883, but is owing to an increase in the mortality from general diseases, over which sanitary science has not the control it has with infectious or contagious maladies.

The deaths registered in London in the year 1884 amounted to 83,050, and corresponded to a rate of 20·3 per 1,000. This was the lowest death-rate on record in London; the next lowest having been that of the immediately preceding year 1883, when the rate was 20·4 per 1,000.

AGES AT DEATH.

Of the 469 deaths, 78 occurred under 1 year, 64 from 1 to 5 years, 32 from 5 to 20 years, 94 from 20 to 40 years, 126 from 40 to 60 years, 67 from 60 to 80 years, and 8 above 80 years.

* This is the first year returns have been supplied to me from the Registrar-General's Office of deaths of parishioners occurring in Public Institutions outside the Parish, which deaths have been added to the death-rate.—J. J. S.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—The seven principal Zymotic Diseases are Small-pox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Fever, and Diarrhoea. From these complaints 47 deaths occurred in the Parish. This number is 9 less than in the previous year. Ten out of the 47 deaths occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and they were all those of non-parishioners.

SMALL-POX.—This unwelcome visitor, which every now and then comes among us as an epidemic, visited us as such in the year 1884, and destroyed 1,251 persons in London.

There was no death from this disease recorded in the Parish, but two cases of residents suffering from this complaint were removed to the Stockwell Small-pox Hospital and there died; one was a female, 24 years of age, who had *never* been vaccinated, and the other, a lad of 17, who also had *never* been vaccinated. The number of cases occurring in the Parish which came under my notice was 21, 14 of which were sent to the Metropolitan Asylums' Hospitals.

If the public would more appreciate the beneficial influence of vaccination, these visitations would, I believe, cease to come among us. The two cases of the persons just mentioned who had never been vaccinated, and who died in the Stockwell Hospital, show

the value of vaccination, for I make bold to assert had they in their infancy been vaccinated there is every probability they would not have died from that disease.

The following facts will, I think, clearly show to an unprejudiced mind the wonderful protective powers of vaccination against small-pox.

In a communication addressed to me by Mr. Herbert Goude, the Resident Surgeon of the Small-pox and Vaccination Hospital, Highgate, he says :—
 “During the past 50 years, of which alone I have the records, no permanent official of the Hospital has ever taken small-pox, even in a modified form. They are re-vaccinated on entering upon their duties, unless they bear unmistakable evidence of having had small-pox. The only official who has contracted small-pox in these 50 years was a temporary gardener engaged in 1881; this man refused to be re-vaccinated, took the disease and died.”

How anybody in the face of such strong testimony can ignore the blessings of vaccination, I am at a loss to understand.

MEASLES.—There were 8 deaths from this disease, against 27 of the previous year.

SCARLET FEVER.—Only 1 death was due to this complaint; the lowest number of the last seven years.

DIPHTHERIA.—From this malady 4 deaths were recorded, 3 of which occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and were those of non-parishioners.

WHOOPIING COUGH.—There were 13 deaths from this disease, against 2 of the previous year.

FEVER.—This includes Typhus, Typhoid, Simple Continued Fever, and Remittent Fever. Seven deaths were registered from this class of disorders, they were all due to Typhoid Fever, 6 of which occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and were those of non-parishioners.

DIARRHŒA caused 14 deaths, 13 of which were in children under 5 years of age.

DISEASES OF THE RESPIRATORY ORGANS, including Consumption, destroyed 137. This number is 17 in excess of the previous year.

DISEASE OF THE HEART.—24 deaths were recorded from this complaint, against 32 of the previous year.

CANCER proved fatal to 18 persons.

The deaths from all other causes, with the ages at death, will be found fully detailed further on.

SANITARY WORK.

In the year 1884, 121 notices were served upon owners or occupiers of property, besides numerous verbal recommendations to remedy nuisances and sanitary defects.

A summons had to be taken out against the owner of 4, St. Martin's Court, for neglecting to comply with the notice served upon him, ordering certain sanitary works and repairs to be performed to the house above-mentioned. The magistrate condemned the owner in costs.

BAKEHOUSES.

The duty of inspecting the bakehouses having reverted to the Vestry, I have accordingly devoted my attention to them. On the whole they are well kept. I have been very particular in insisting that the water used in the manufacture of the bread should come from a cistern independent of that supplying a closet.

HOUSES LET IN LODGINGS, &c.

Section 35 of the Sanitary Act, 1866, was put in force in this Parish. The section says:—"On application to one of her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, by the nuisance authority of the City of

London, or any district or parish included within the Act for the better local government of the metropolis, or of any municipal borough, or of any place under the Local Government Act, 1858, or any local improvement Act, or of any city or town containing, according to the census for the time being in force, a population of not less than five thousand inhabitants, the Secretary of State may, as he may think fit, by notice to be published in the *London Gazette*, declare the following enactment to be in force in the district of such nuisance authority, and from and after the publication of such notice the nuisance authority shall be empowered to make regulations for the following matters; that is to say:

- “1. For fixing the number of persons who may occupy a house or part of a house which is let in lodgings, or occupied by members of more than one family.
- “2. For the registration of houses thus let or occupied in lodgings.
- “3. For the inspection of such houses, and the keeping the same in a cleanly and wholesome state
- “4. For enforcing therein the provision of privy accommodation, and other appliances and means of cleanliness, in proportion to the

number of lodgings and occupiers, and the cleansing and ventilation of the common passages and staircases.

“5. For the cleansing and lime-whiting at stated times of such premises:

“The nuisance authority may provide for the enforcement of the above regulations, by penalties not exceeding forty shillings for any one offence, with an additional penalty not exceeding twenty shillings for every day during which a default in obeying such regulations may continue; but such regulations shall not be of any validity unless and until they shall have been confirmed by the Secretary of State.

“But this section shall not apply to common lodging houses within the provisions of the Common Lodging Houses Act, 1851, or any Act amending the same.”

To carry out the provisions of the above section you appointed a special Sanitary Inspector to assist me in the details; 292 houses were inspected, and the 2,038 rooms therein were measured for the purpose of ascertaining their cubical contents. Regulations were drawn up for the management of these houses, which were confirmed by the Local Government Board on 26th June, 1884. Mr. William Cooke, the Inspector

of Nuisances, you appointed permanent inspector of these houses. The question will be naturally asked—How do these new regulations work? My reply is that the time since they have been in force is too short to ascertain the result.

At the end of the tables will be found a copy of the regulations for houses let in lodgings, &c. (pages 91 to 98).

MORTUARY CHAPEL.

This building was erected ten years ago on a part of the site of the Drury Lane burial ground for the purpose of receiving the dead in the interval between death and burial of those people who have no accommodation for keeping a corpse in their home. I have ascertained that 290 bodies have been received there since it was opened. This is a small number for ten years, and I think it is a great pity such a convenient place is not more appreciated.

The pipe-sewers have been regularly flushed, those gullies emitting offensive effluvia have also been flushed with carbolic acid and water, and the several courts and passages in the Parish lime-whited.

In conclusion, I must again bear testimony to the zeal and intelligence of your Inspector in the discharge of his duties, and also acknowledge with

and thanks the promptitude with which the Relieving
Officer of the district keeps me informed of all in-
fectious diseases and nuisances coming under his
notice.

Regulations made by the Vestry of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Westminster, with respect to Houses Let in Lodgings, or occupied by members of more than one family.

INTERPRETATION OF TERMS.

1. A lodging-house means a house or part of a house which is let in lodgings, or occupied by members of more than one family.

2. A landlord means the person by whom or for whom such house, or part thereof, is so let, or who receives, or is entitled to receive the profits of such letting.

3. A lodger means the person to whom any room or rooms in such house may have been let for his use or occupation.

EXEMPTED HOUSES.

4. A lodging-house shall be exempt from the operation of these regulations in either of the following cases, viz. :—

(a.) Where the rateable value of the house

exceeds £80, and the rent payable by such lodger, *exclusive* of the charge for the use by such lodger of any furniture, exceeds the sum of Eight Shillings per week.

- (b.) Where the rateable value of the house exceeds £80, and the rent payable by such lodger, *inclusive* of the charge for the use of any furniture, exceeds the sum of Ten Shillings per week.

NUMBER OF LODGERS.

5. No landlord or lodger shall permit or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 300 cubic feet of free air space for each person of an age exceeding 10 years, and of 150 cubic feet for each person of an age not exceeding 10 years, to occupy at any one time as a sleeping apartment a room *exclusively* used for that purpose.

6. No landlord or lodger shall permit or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 400 cubic feet of free air space for each person of an age exceeding 10 years, and of 200 cubic feet for each person of an age not exceeding 10 years, to occupy at any one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is *not exclusively* used for that purpose.

7. The landlord of a lodging-house shall, within a period of seven days after he shall have been required by a notice, signed by the Clerk to the Vestry, and duly served upon him, supply the information necessary for the registration of such house by the Vestry, and sign a true statement of the following particulars, viz. :—

- (a.) The total number of rooms in the house.
- (b.) The total number of rooms let in lodgings or occupied by members of more than one family.
- (c.) The manner of use of each room.
- (d.) The number, age, and sex of the occupants of each room used for sleeping.
- (e.) The Christian name and surname of the occupier of each room.
- (f.) The amount of rent or charge payable by each occupier.

INSPECTION.

8. The landlord of or lodger in a lodging house shall at all times afford free access to the Medical Officer of Health, and to any officer authorised by the Vestry for the purpose of inspection, nor shall any landlord or lodger wilfully obstruct any officer,

nor neglect or refuse to render such assistance as may reasonably be necessary for the purpose of such inspection.

CLEANSING.

9. In every case where two or more lodgers in a lodging-house are entitled to the use in common of any court, courtyard, area or other open space within the curtilage of the premises, or of any water-closet, ash-pit, or dust-bin belonging to such house, or of any cistern or other receptacle for the storage of water supplied to the premises, the landlord shall cause every part of such court, courtyard, area or other open space, water-closet, ash-pit, dust-bin, or cistern to be thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be requisite for the purpose of keeping the same in a clean and wholesome condition.

10. In every case where a lodger in a lodging-house is entitled to the exclusive use of any court, courtyard, area, or other open space within the curtilage of the premises, or of any water-closet, ash-pit, or dust-bin belonging to such house, or of any cistern or other receptacle for the storage of water supplied to the premises, such lodger shall cause every part of such court, courtyard, area, or other open space, water-closet, ash-pit, dust-bin, or cistern to be

thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be requisite for the purpose of keeping the same in a clean and wholesome condition.

11. The landlord of a lodging-house shall cause every common passage or staircase in such house to be thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be requisite.

12. The landlord of a lodging-house shall, in the first week of the month of April, in every year, cause every part of the premises to be cleansed.

13. In every case where a lodger in a lodging-house is entitled to the exclusive use of any staircase, landing, or passage, in such house, such lodger shall cause every part of such staircase, landing, or passage to be thoroughly cleansed from time to time as often as may be requisite.

VENTILATION.

14. The landlord of a lodging-house shall cause every room and passage therein to be efficiently ventilated, and every lodger shall twice at least in every day (weather permitting) freely admit air to the sleeping apartments.

WASHING AND WATER.

15. The landlord of a lodging-house shall pro-

vide adequate accommodation for washing and an efficient supply of water for the use of the lodgers therein.

INFECTIOUS AND CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

16. The landlord of a lodging-house, immediately after he shall have been informed, or shall have ascertained that any person in such house is ill of a dangerously infectious or contagious disease, shall give written notice thereof to the Medical Officer of Health.

17. In every case where a lodger in a lodging-house has been informed, or has ascertained or has reasonable grounds for believing that an occupant of any room which has been let to such lodger is ill of a dangerously infectious or contagious disease, such lodger shall forthwith give written notice thereof to the landlord and to the Medical Officer of Health, and verbal or written notice thereof to every other lodger in such house.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

18. The landlord of a lodging-house shall provide such house with efficient water-closet accommodation in the proportion of not less than one water-closet for every twelve persons.

19. The landlord of a lodging-house shall cause the yards and areas in connection therewith to be properly paved, and so constructed as to take away all waste water, and shall at all times keep such yards and areas in good order and in proper repair.

PENALTIES.

20. Every person offending against any of the foregoing Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding 40s. for any one offence, with an additional penalty not exceeding 20s. for every day during which any default in obeying such Regulations may continue.
