25TH MARCH, 1890.

IN conformity with the 198th Section of the Metropolis Local Management Act, 1855, the Vestry submit the following Report for the year 1889-90, viz.:—

VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The return attached to this Report (pages 6 and 7) shows that the Vestry have held 27 meetings, and the various Committees 81 meetings, during the year ended Lady-day, 1890.

SANITARY.

The Vestry have caused 141 notices for Abatement of Nuisances to be served during the past year, and in all cases the works ordered have been executed.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS AND ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

ADVERTISING STATIONS (RATING).—The Bill provides for the rating of advertising stations upon houses and land. On the 4th April, 1889, it was resolved to petition in favour of the Bill, and Mr. Burdett-Coutts, by whom the Bill was introduced, was requested to insert a clause prohibiting the use of permanent hoardings for advertising purposes without the license of the local authorities. The Bill received the Royal Assent on the 12th August, 1889.

BEER ADULTERATION.—This Bill, which is for better securing the purity of beer is identical with that introduced in the previous Session, and on the 27th June, 1889, it was determined that the Rt. Hon. W. H. Smith, M.P., be requested to support the Bill, which was subsequently dropped.

BRIBERY (PUBLIC BODIES) PREVENTION.—The Bill is for the more effectual prevention and punishment of bribery and corruption of, and by members, officers, or servants of public bodies. On the 4th April, 1889, it was resolved to petition in favour of the Bill, to which the Royal Assent was given on the 30th August following.

COAL DUTIES (LONDON) ABOLITION BILL.—By the Bill it is provided that the City Corporation shall not exercise any right of measuring or weighing coal, &c., nor collect or receive any metage,

duties, or sums in respect of any coals, &c., imported into the Port of London or brought within the limits of the metropolitan police district, including the cities of London and Westminster, by any mode of conveyance, and on the 27th June, 1889, the Vestry resolved to petition against the Bill. The City Corporation appeared in opposition, and succeeded in retaining their proportion of the duties for a period of one year only. The Royal Assent was given on the 9th July, 1889.

HORSEFLESH (SALE OF FOOD).—This Bill is to regulate the sale of horseflesh for human food. The Royal Assent was given to the Bill on the 24th June, 1889.

HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES (LONDON).—Briefly epitomised, the object of the Bill is to enable the London County Council to acquire land, build and let houses and rooms at fair rentals, and provide open spaces, baths, halls, &c., for the benefit of the poorer classes. The Council are to be authorised to borrow and to provide for payment of interest and repayment of advances by adding not more than 1d. in the £ to the income tax paid on rents. A method of compulsory purchase is also provided. On the 16th May, 1889, the Parliamentary Committee recommended that a petition be presented against the Bill, but the subject was referred back to them for further consideration. The Bill was subsequently dropped.

INDECENT ADVERTISEMENTS.—This Bill provides for the punishment of persons affixing or distributing indecent advertisements, and also for the punishment of persons sending others to do such acts. The Bill received the Royal Assent on the 26th July, 1889.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE NOTIFICATION.—This Bill provides for the notification of cases of infectious disease to the local authorities. On the 11th July, 1889, it was determined to request Mr. W. H. Smith to support the Bill. The Royal Assent was given on the 30th August last.

LIFE AND PROPERTY PROTECTION.—The Bill provides that whosoever, armed with any dangerous or offensive weapon, enters any dwelling house between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. shall, in

addition to being guilty of felony, be sentenced to be whipped ; and on the 16th May, 1889, it was ordered that a petition be presented in favour of the Bill, which was subsequently dropped.

LONDON COAL AND WINE DUTIES CONTINUANCE.—This Bill is practically identical with the Bill introduced the previous Session, and reported upon in the last Annual Report, from which it differs only in so far as in the present Bill the period of extension is left blank, while the former Bill proposed to continue the duties until the 31st December, 1900. On the 16th May, 1889, a petition was ordered to be presented in favour of the Bill which was withdrawn in the House of Commons on the 4th July, 1889.

LONDON ELECTRIC SUPPLY CORPORATION, ELECTRIC LIGHTING ORDER.

METROPOLITAN ELECTRIC SUPPLY Co.—(*See Electric Lighting.*)

NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY.—This Bill is to provide a site for a National Portrait Gallery, and for other purposes connected therewith, at the rear of the National Gallery. The Royal Assent was given to the Bill on the 26th July, 1889.

POOR RATE (METROPOLIS).—This Bill which sought to provide for the equalisation of the Poor Rate in the Metropolitan area was on the 27th June, 1889, reported as having had its second reading put off for six months.

RATING OF MACHINERY.—The Bill provides for rating the annual value of machinery in addition to the value of the premises, and on the 4th April, 1889, it was resolved to petition against the Bill. The Bill was withdrawn on the 10th April, 1889.

SCHOOL BOARD FOR LONDON (ELECTIONS).—This Bill proposed to abolish the existing divisions for the purpose of the election of members, and, instead thereof, to enact that every undivided

parliamentary borough and every division of every divided parliamentary borough, shall be a division entitled to return one member, with the exception of the City of London, which shall be entitled to two. The Bill of last Session proposed to give 6 members to the divisions of the Strand, Westminster, and St. George, Hanover Square, in lieu of 5. This Bill, however, proposes to reduce the representation of the divisions to 3 members only. It was resolved on the 4th April, 1889, that the Board be informed the Vestry are opposed to the principle of cumulative voting, and are of opinion that casual vacancies should be filled up by the ratepayers of the respective divisions, and not by Members of the Board. On the 16th May, 1889, it was determined to communicate with the United Vestries of Westminster, the Vestries of St. James, and St. George, Hanover Square, and the Strand District Board, for the purpose of ascertaining their opinion of the Bill, and on the 30th May, letters were submitted from the Vestry of St. James, and the United Vestries of Westminster, stating they approve of the same. The Bill was subsequently dropped.

SHOPS (WEEKLY HALF-HOLIDAY).—This Bill is to enable local authorities to establish a weekly half-holiday for shops, and on the 4th April, 1889, it was resolved to request the Member for the Borough to oppose the Bill. The Bill was eventually dropped.

SOUTH-EASTERN RAILWAY (ADDITIONAL LANDS).—The Bill having been passed by the Commons on the 27th June, 1889, it was resolved to petition against the Bill in the House of Lords. The Vestry appeared by Counsel before a Select Committee of the Upper House on the 18th July, when they decided that the Vestry had no *locus standi*. The Bill received the Royal Assent on the 12th August, 1889.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION.—The Bill makes provision for Technical Education by any School Board or local authority in England and Wales (except as regards the Metropolis, where its provisions are not applicable to any local authority). On the 16th May, 1889, it was resolved to petition against the Bill which was subsequently withdrawn in the House of Commons on the 6th August following.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS—*continued.*

TECHNICAL INSTRUCTION.—This Bill received the Royal Assent on the 30th August, 1889.

THEATRES (COUNTY OF LONDON).—This Bill proposes to remove the control of theatres, music halls, and places of public resort for the purpose of dancing, music, or other public entertainment, from the control of the central authority, and to place the same under the control of the department of the Home Secretary. On the 4th April, 1889, it was determined that no action be taken thereon, and on the 27th June, the second reading of the Bill was reported as having been put off for six months.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

On the 30th May, 1889, a letter was submitted from the Board of Trade transmitting a copy of their Inspector's Report upon the various applications for Provisional Orders and Licenses, and on the 13th June it was reported by Mr. Laing on behalf of himself and Mr. Prescott, who had been appointed to attend the Board of Trade in opposition to the proposed allocation of certain districts to different companies, that they had been assured by the Board that there was every desire on their part to favour a competitive supply.

On the 13th June, 1889, a notice from Messrs. A. & S. Gatti, of intention to apply for a Provisional Order was submitted, when it was resolved to support them in their application for the same.

On the 27th June, 1889, a letter from the Board of Trade forwarding copy of a Model Provisional Order was considered, and on the 11th July it was determined that as the Order was not in the form agreed by the Vestry they would protest against the alterations made, and oppose the passing of any Bills in that form.

On the 11th July, 1889, the Vestry gave expression to their opinion that the London County Council had exceeded their functions in agreeing to proposals for the transfer to them of the control of Electric Lighting, and to the over-riding of the powers of the local authorities; and the Council, the Board of Trade, the local authorities, and the members for the Strand division were ordered to be informed accordingly.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING—*continued.*

On the 19th September, Counsel's Opinion relative to the laying of wires by Messrs. Gatti was considered, and a copy of the same was ordered to be forwarded to them, and on the 17th October it was determined to inform them that the laying of cables would be at their own risk, the Vestry disclaiming any responsibility in connection therewith.

The Royal Assent was given to the Metropolitan Electric Supply Company's Bill on the 26th August, 1889.

The Order Bill of the Electricity Supply Corporation received the Royal Assent on the 26th August, 1889.

On the 12th December, 1889, consent was given to the granting of a Provisional Order by the Board of Trade to Messrs. A. & S. Gatti for supplying electricity within the parish.

On the 20th March, 1890, a letter was received from the Board of Trade enclosing copy of, and asking for observations upon, a letter received from Messrs. Fladgates on behalf of the Electricity Supply Corporation, Limited, stating that arrangements are in course of completion by which the Corporation will purchase of Messrs. A. & S. Gatti the electric lighting premises and plant belonging to them. In reply the Board were informed that the Vestry had no observations to make thereon.

COAL AND WINE DUTIES.

On the 4th April, 1889, it was resolved that the London County Council be informed the Vestry are in favour of the continuance of the duties, and they hope the Council will reconsider their determination with regard thereto. It was also then decided to convene a conference of the local authorities upon the subject.

THE SURVEYORSHIP OF THE VESTRY.

On the 12th December, 1889, the resignation of Mr. H. Jacques was submitted, and the subject was referred to a Committee of the whole Vestry for consideration and report. On the 23rd January, 1890, it was determined to accept the resignation, and on the 6th March, 1890, a Superannuation Allowance of £150 per annum was granted to him.

THE SURVEYORSHIP OF THE VESTRY—*continued.*

On the 23rd January, 1890, it was resolved to invite candidates to fill the vacancy, and the conditions of the future appointment were then determined upon. There being 74 applicants for the appointment, they were reduced to 8 by the Special Committee and on the 20th February, the selected candidates having been seen, Mr. Charles Mason, formerly Assistant Borough Surveyor of Leicester, was ultimately unanimously appointed.

The London County Council having stated that the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association had intimated that they would be unable to keep the above open to the public owing to want of funds, and having enquired whether the Vestry considered the Churchyard of public use, and if so, whether they would maintain it or contribute towards the cost if the Council did so, it was resolved on the 14th November, 1889, that the Council be informed the Vestry consider the Churchyard of public use, but as it is an open space available to the Metropolis the Vestry did not consider that the local rates should be chargeable with any portion of the cost of its maintenance. On the 20th March, 1890, a letter was considered from the Council enquiring if the Vestry would contribute £40 per annum towards the cost in the event of the Council determining to maintain it, and the subject was referred to the Works Committee for consideration.

CHARING CROSS ROAD.

On the 1st May, 1889, a deputation waited upon the First Commissioner of H.M.'s Works, &c., relative to the subject of fencing in and planting the land at the rear of the National Gallery, but the Commissioner was unable to state whether the land would shortly be built upon or not. On the 8th August, a strong protest was ordered to be forwarded to the London County Council against arrangements being made by the Council to put up the plot for sale by public auction. On the 9th January, 1890, a letter from the Commissioners of H.M.'s Works, &c., was submitted, stating they had arranged with the Council for the conveyance to the Government of the vacant land north of Hemming's Row, upon the

understanding that a strip of the land should be thrown into Charing Cross Road, and a further strip at the north-east angle of the site of the National Gallery be surrendered by the Department, and requesting the Vestry to apply to the Justices for an Order to close Hemming's Row; whereupon instructions were given by the Vestry for the necessary steps to be taken to obtain an Order for that purpose.

NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY.

(*See Parliamentary Bills.*)

NEW VESTRY HALL.

On the 18th April, 1889, it was reported that the London County Council had agreed to advance £25,000 for the building, subject to Counsel's opinion being taken thereon. On the 8th August the Counsel's sanction to a loan for £22,200 (being the sum of £25,000, less £2,800, received from Mr. W. S. Gilbert for land transferred to him) was submitted, when it was decided to obtain temporary advances from the Treasurer, as required from time to time, the amount being ultimately repaid to him by means of a mortgage. On the same date, Mr. W. Woodward and Mr. H. E. Pollard were appointed Quantity Surveyors. On the 3rd October, 1889, tenders, 18 in number, for the erection of the building were considered, when it was determined to accept the lowest, that of Messrs. J. Mowlem & Co., for the sum of £23,206. On the 17th October, 1889, the Vicar was requested to make enquiries as to whether H.R.H. the Prince of Wales would consent to perform the ceremony of laying the foundation stones of the new buildings, or failing H.R.H. then some other member of the Royal Family; and it was determined to inform the Commissioners for Public Libraries, &c., that the Vestry would be pleased to co-operate with them in a joint ceremonial.

On the 23rd January, 1890, a letter was submitted from Sir D. M. Probyn, stating that it would afford H.R.H. much gratification to lay the foundation stones on some day before Easter. The Memorial Stones of the new buildings were laid by the Prince of Wales on the 18th March, H.R.H. being accompanied by Their Royal Highnesses

the Princess of Wales and the Princesses Victoria and Maud, and on the 20th March, 1890, it was resolved that votes of thanks be passed to Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Hon. and Rt. Rev. the Lord Bishop of London, the Rt. Hon. W. H. Smith, M.P., the Stewards, and the Parish Church Choir, for their services on the occasion, and expressions of the Vestry's appreciation of the work performed by the following be respectively conveyed to them, viz., Major Payne (commanding the Guard of Honour of the Queen's Westminster Volunteers), the Architect, Messrs. Mowlem & Co., Peto Bros., and Piggott, Bros. & Co., the Strand Union Guardians (for the Boy's Band), and to the Metropolitan Police.

On the 20th March, 1890, a formal notice from Messrs. Nicholson & Herbert was considered to prohibit the Vestry proceeding with the building so as to interfere with the light and air, and rights and easements of the Marquis of Salisbury, his lessees or tenants, when instructions were given to the Architect to submit drawings of the building to his Lordship's Surveyor.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

(See also New Vestry Hall.)

On the 2nd May, 1889, the Rev. John Fenwick Kitto, M.A., Mr. William Challice and Mr. David Laing were re-elected Commissioners.

On the 11th July, 1889, the Vestry resolved to reduce the amount to be paid by the Commissioners, for the land required by them, from £8,000 to £6,500. The Conveyance was duly sealed on the 19th September, 1889.

MR. GEORGE JAMES.

On the 4th April, 1889, the Chairman, on behalf of the Vestry, expressed their deep sense of the value of the services of Mr. G. James during the period he represented the parish at the Metropolitan Board of Works.

POOR, GENERAL, SEWERS, AND LIBRARY RATES.

CHURCHWARDENS AND SIDESMEN.

On the 25th April, 1889, Mr. William Challice and the Right Hon. Lord Kinnaird were re-elected Senior and Junior Churchwardens, Messrs. William Stephens Cross and Robert Walker, Sidesmen to the Senior Churchwarden, and Messrs. Robert Stokes and Thomas Prescott, Sidesmen to the Junior Churchwarden.

VESTRY ELECTIONS.

The Annual Election of Members of the Vestry and Auditors for Ward No. 2, took place on the 6th May, 1889. Polls having been demanded in Wards Nos. 1 and 3, the elections took place on the day following.

RESIGNATION OF A MEMBER OF THE VESTRY.

On the 28th November, 1889, the resignation of Mr. J. H. Heathman was submitted and accepted.

DEATH OF MEMBERS OF THE VESTRY.

The death of Mr. H. W. Pairpoint was reported on the 25th July, 1889, and on that day a vote of condolence with Mrs. Pairpoint and her family was passed, which was subsequently acknowledged.

DEATHS OF MEMBERS OF THE VESTRY—*continued.*

The death of Mr. R. Stokes, Sidesman, was reported on the 23rd January, 1890, and on that day a letter, expressive of sympathy, was ordered to be forwarded to Mrs. Stokes, which was duly acknowledged.

THE LATE MR. T. W. MARSHALL.

A resolution, expressive of the high appreciation by the Vestry of the deceased gentleman's services, was passed on the 25th April, 1889, and a letter of condolence ordered to be forwarded to Mrs. Marshall, accompanied by a copy of the resolution. Mr. C. W. Marshall's reply thereto was submitted on the 16th May, 1889.

WHITCOMB STREET IMPROVEMENT.

On the 14th November, 1889, a statement of the cost of the above amounting to £18,462 17s. 6d. was submitted, when it was resolved that the London County Council, as the successors of the Metropolitan Board of Works, be requested to contribute one half of such cost, and to sanction and advance a loan for the remaining moiety.

GREEN STREET IMPROVEMENT.

In reply to an enquiry by the London County Council they were, on the 3rd October, 1889, informed that in the opinion of the Vestry the cost of the proposed widening of the street should not be borne by them but by the Council. On the 9th January, 1890, a letter from the Council's Improvements Committee was submitted, stating that if the Vestry would secure the vacant land in the street the Committee would advise the Council to contribute two-thirds of the cost when it was determined to inform the Committee that the Vestry adhered to their opinion that no portion of the cost should be borne by them, that the Vestry regret the Council had omitted to obtain Parliamentary Powers to deal with the subject as a Metropolitan improvement, but in order to prevent buildings being erected on the vacant land, the Vestry would be willing to acquire the land, and to throw into the public way so much of the land as might be arranged between the Council and themselves, on condition that the Council repay to the Vestry three-fourths of the cost of the acquirement. On the 20th February, a letter was sub-

GREEN STREET IMPROVEMENT—*continued.*

mitted from the Council stating they disagreed with the Report of their Improvements Committee, but they would consent to the acquisition by the Vestry of the land, for the purpose of throwing into the street so much of the land as may be arranged by the Council, and that subject to the terms of an Agreement, to be prepared by their Solicitor, the Council would be prepared, upon the usual conditions, to contribute three-fourths of the net cost of the improvement, after deducting recoupment by sale of surplus land, such contribution not to exceed £6,750, it being provided by the Agreement that no part of the land when acquired shall be disposed of by the Vestry without the previous concurrence of the Council; whereupon it was determined to inform the Council that the Vestry adhered to the terms of their offer, and a deputation was appointed to wait upon the Improvements Committee to discuss the subject. Upon the report of the deputation being made to the Vestry they appointed a Committee with power to act in carrying out the improvement, and on the 20th March it was resolved that in the event of the Committee being unable to obtain certain modifications in the Agreement, they be authorised to accept the same.

CECIL COURT.

The Seal of the Vestry was on the 2nd May, 1889, affixed to the Agreement for widening the above Court.

MAIN ROADS, MAINTENANCE OF.

On the 21st March, 1889, a list of the streets which in the opinion of the Vestry are main roads, and should be so declared by the London County Council was agreed upon, and on the 8th August, it was determined to forward the list to the Council. A supplementary list was ordered to be forwarded on the 31st October, 1889.

SALE OF FOOD, &c., ACTS.

A summons was heard on the 28th August, 1889, at Marlborough Street Police Court, in respect of a sample of Milk certified by the Public Analyst as adulterated, when the vendor was fined £2 and costs. Seventeen samples of milk have been taken during the year for the purpose of analysis.

ST. MARTIN'S PUBLIC BATHS AND WASH-HOUSES.

The Rev. John Fenwick Kitto, M.A., and Messrs. David Laing and William Cope, were, on the 16th May, 1889, elected Commissioners of the above for the usual term of 3 years.

CAMDEN TOWN CEMETERY ACT.

On the 11th July, 1889, Mr. William Cope was elected a Trustee under the above Act in the place of the late Mr. T. W. Marshall.

ARCHBISHOP TENISON'S SCHOOL.

On the 2nd May, 1889, Mr. David Laing was re-elected a Representative Governor of the above for the customary period of 3 years.

HOARDINGS.

Counsel's Opinion on the above subject was considered by the Vestry on the 19th September, 1889. Therein Counsel (Mr. Glenn) advised that the Vestry may for public safety and convenience limit the height of any licensed hoarding, but have no power to prohibit advertisements being displayed thereon, and cited decided case in support of his Opinion. By the Advertising Stations (Rating) Act which passed into law after the Opinion had been submitted, powers have been given to local authorities either to prohibit the use of licensed hoardings for advertisement purposes or to sanction the affixing of advertisements upon payment of such sums as they may determine, and on the 3rd October, 1889, the Vestry resolved to prohibit the affixing of the same.

SLOP AND DUST COLLECTING, WATERING, &c.]

Comparative statements of the cost of the above works performed by the Vestry as compared with their previous execution under contracts have from time to time been submitted from which it has appeared that a considerable diminution in cost has resulted. Particulars of the works and their cost are shown in the Report of the Surveyor.

TRADE REFUSE.

On the 16th May, 1889, the Solicitors were instructed to take steps to obtain the stating of a case by the Magistrate for the decision of a Superior Court in the action of Mr. Frederick Gordon, of the Hôtel Métropole, against the Vestry. Acting under the advice of Counsel the Vestry determined on the 12th December, 1889, not to remove clinkers from the Hotel.

CHÂLET ACCOMMODATION.

On the 3rd October, 1889, plans and estimate for the construction of an underground châlet at a cost of £2,690 were submitted, and on the 17th October it was determined to construct the same at the refuge in St. Martin's Place south of the Provident Bank. The site not affording adequate accommodation, this resolution was subsequently varied, and it was resolved to construct the refuge south-west of the statue of King Charles I. in Charing Cross.

HOUSES LET IN LODGINGS, &c.

Monthly inspections of the above houses, which, in 1884 amounted to 263, but are now reduced to 221 in number, have been made by the Inspector for that purpose, who has found the regulations generally complied with. 117 notices have been served during the year, and the works required to be effected have in all cases been executed.

STATEMENT AS TO TEMPORARY READING ROOM (IN LONG ACRE) AND NEW LIBRARY.

The Reading Room in Long Acre has continued to be numerously attended. As is shown by the accompanying table over a quarter of a million of persons visited the room during the fifteen months ended March, 1890. The greater number of these visitors belonged to the respectable working class. The daily newspapers were largely used, especially by persons in search of work—on some mornings as many as ninety men coming in during the first ten minutes after opening, to scan the “situations” lists.

H.R.H. The Prince of Wales, who was accompanied by the Princess of Wales and the Princesses Maud and Victoria, placed a Memorial Stone in the Lending Library Hall of the New Library Buildings in St. Martin's Lane on 18th March, 1890.

An address was presented to T.R. Highnesses by Rev. J. F. Kitto, M.A., on behalf of the Library Commissioners, and Lord Kinnaird proposed a vote of thanks to T.R. Highnesses for their presence. The Prince, in reply, expressed the very great pleasure that the Princess and himself took in the proceedings, and said he had no doubt that the library would be of the greatest possible benefit and importance to the people of the district.

The new buildings are now approaching completion and the Commissioners are hopeful of being able to open the Lending Library and News-room in October next.

By that time the Lending Library will consist of about 10,000 volumes in all classes of literature, and will be fully catalogued.

It may be useful to state that all persons rated, resident or employed in the parish will be allowed to borrow books.

All ratepayers, whose names appear on the current Parliamentary Register, may borrow books on their own responsibility, and compound householders, non-ratepaying residents and non-resident employés, will be able to borrow on obtaining a guarantee from a duly qualified ratepayer.

The News-room will be fully supplied with the principal daily papers and weekly and monthly reviews and magazines, and the Reference Library will contain the more costly works which are beyond the reach of most individual purchasers. An effort is also being made to form as complete a collection as possible of books, maps and prints relating to the Parish, and the Commissioners will be glad to receive donations of anything in print or manuscript relating to St. Martin-in-the-Fields, or the neighbouring parishes.

*Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields,
for the Year 1889.*

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Twentieth Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish.

BIRTHS.

During the year the Births registered in the Parish were 283, a number 7 in excess of the previous year.

The following Table gives the number of Births registered in each month of the year:—

The Birth-rate of the Parish was 15.5 per 1,000.

The Births registered in London in 1889 numbered 131,487 and were in the proportion of 30.3 to 1,000 inhabitants. This is the lowest birth-rate as yet recorded in London, the rate having fallen continuously year after year since 1876.

DEATHS.

In the year 1889 the Deaths in St. Martin-in-the-Fields numbered 380, a mortality the lowest of the last ten years.

Of the above 380 Deaths, occurring in the Parish and Charing Cross Hospital, 160 did not belong to the district, and of course should be deducted from the total deaths in calculating the death-rate, but on the other hand the deaths of parishioners

Therefore the Death-rate of the Parish for the year 1889 would be 17·1.

Ratio of deaths to population 1 in 58·2. The deaths registered in London in the year 1889 numbered 75,683, and corresponded to an annual death-rate of 17·4 per 1,000. This is the lowest death-rate as yet recorded in London.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—The seven principal Zymotic Diseases are Small-pox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Fever and Diarrhœa.

The deaths actually occurring in the Parish from this class of disease numbered 34. This number includes those non-parishioners who died in the Charing Cross Hospital. After deducting those non-parishioners, and adding those who died in Institutions outside the Parish, the mortality due to St. Martin-in-the-Fields would be 24. This number is 9 less than the previous year. (*See Table 5.*)

SMALL-POX.—No death or illness from this disease came to my knowledge, and only one death occurred in the whole of London during the year.

MEASLES.—Six deaths occurred in the Parish from this complaint.

SCARLET FEVER.—One death took place in the Parish, and two deaths occurred of parishioners in the Metropolitan Asylums Hospital, making a total of three against nine of the previous year.

DIPHThERIA.—Ten deaths were recorded from this malady, eight of which were non-parishioners, patients of the Charing Cross Hospital, so that the Parish would be credited with only two deaths from Diphtheria.

WHOOPING COUGH.—Seven deaths occurred in the Parish, and one of a parishioner in King's College Hospital, making a total of eight. This number is double that of the previous year.

FEVER.—This includes Typhus, Typhoid, Simple continued Fever, and Remittant Fever. Five deaths occurred in the Parish from Typhoid, four of which died in the Charing Cross Hospital, and were all non-parishioners, so that only one death was due to St. Martin's.

DIARRHŒA.—Five deaths were due to this malady, one of which occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and was a non-parishioner, therefore only four deaths from this complaint were due to this Parish. This number is very low, same as in the previous year, and I have no doubt was attributable to the cool summer of 1889.

The deaths from all other causes, with the ages at death, will be found fully detailed in Tables 2 and 6.

INQUESTS.

THE SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

Under the above Act, 17 samples of Milk, 1 of Carbolic Powder and 1 Carbolic Acid were examined by your Analyst, and they were all found genuine with the exception of 1 sample of milk, the vendor of which was prosecuted with the result of being fined twenty shillings and costs.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE (NOTIFICATION) ACT.

This Act came into operation at the end of October, and its title fully explains the purport of the measure. All cases of Small-pox, Cholera, Diphtheria, Membranous Croup, Erysipelas, Scarlet Fever, and the fevers known by any of the following names:—Typhus

Typhoid, Enteric, Relapsing, Continued and Puerperal, are bound to be notified to the Medical Officer of Health by the medical practitioner in attendance, or a relative of the patient, and the Medical Officer of Health on the receipt of the certificate is compelled, within twelve hours, to send a copy of it to the clerk to the Managers of the Metropolitan Asylum District. In preparing for the administration of this Act, hand bills were distributed to the house-holders and notices were posted in prominent parts of the parish drawing the attention of the inhabitants to the measure. Also a circular notice was sent round to each medical practitioner resident in the district calling attention to the requirements of the Act, with a copy of memorandum of the Local Government Board, and a blank book of certificates for the notification of cases of disease coming under this Act.

At page 101 of this report will be found a copy of the form of certificate.

From the time this Act came into force to the end of the year (two months) 15 cases have been notified to me.

SANITARY WORK.

In the year 1889, notices to the number of 118 were served upon the owners or occupiers of property, also numerous verbal recommendations to remedy sanitary defects, and 16 notices were served for the purpose of disinfection after infectious disease.

Houses closed as insanitary—Four houses were closed in St. Martin's Street as being unfit for human habitation. A notice had been served upon the owner to put the drains into a proper state, also to put the houses generally into a habitable condition, no

attention was paid to the notice and a summons was accordingly taken out against the owner. On the day of hearing at Marlborough Street Police Court the owner, rather than do the necessary work, consented to close them, as he thought such old and dilapidated houses were not worth the outlay. The case was adjourned nine times for the purpose of getting the inmates out, they having such difficulty in finding fresh quarters.

38 Whitcomb Street. These premises, the lower part of which was used as stables, and the upper portion let out in tenements. I found on inspection they were in a very dilapidated condition, so much so that I wrote to the owner pointing out to him the necessity of closing them, when he at once agreed to shut them up.

My attention was drawn to a pickle factory in White Hart Street which was conducted in such a manner as to be a nuisance to the neighbours, and I caused representations to be made to the landlord of the annoyance these people were subjected to, and eventually the landlord gave the pickle manufacturer notice to quit.

BAKE-HOUSES.

The bake-houses have been duly inspected, and were all found in a satisfactory condition.

HOUSES LET OUT IN LODGINGS.

Your Inspector, whom you appointed permanent inspector of these houses, has regularly inspected them, and reported to me all sanitary defects that came under his notice.

The pipe-sewers have been regularly flushed, those gullies emitting offensive effluvia have also been flushed with carbolic acid and water, and the several courts and passages in the parish lime-whited.

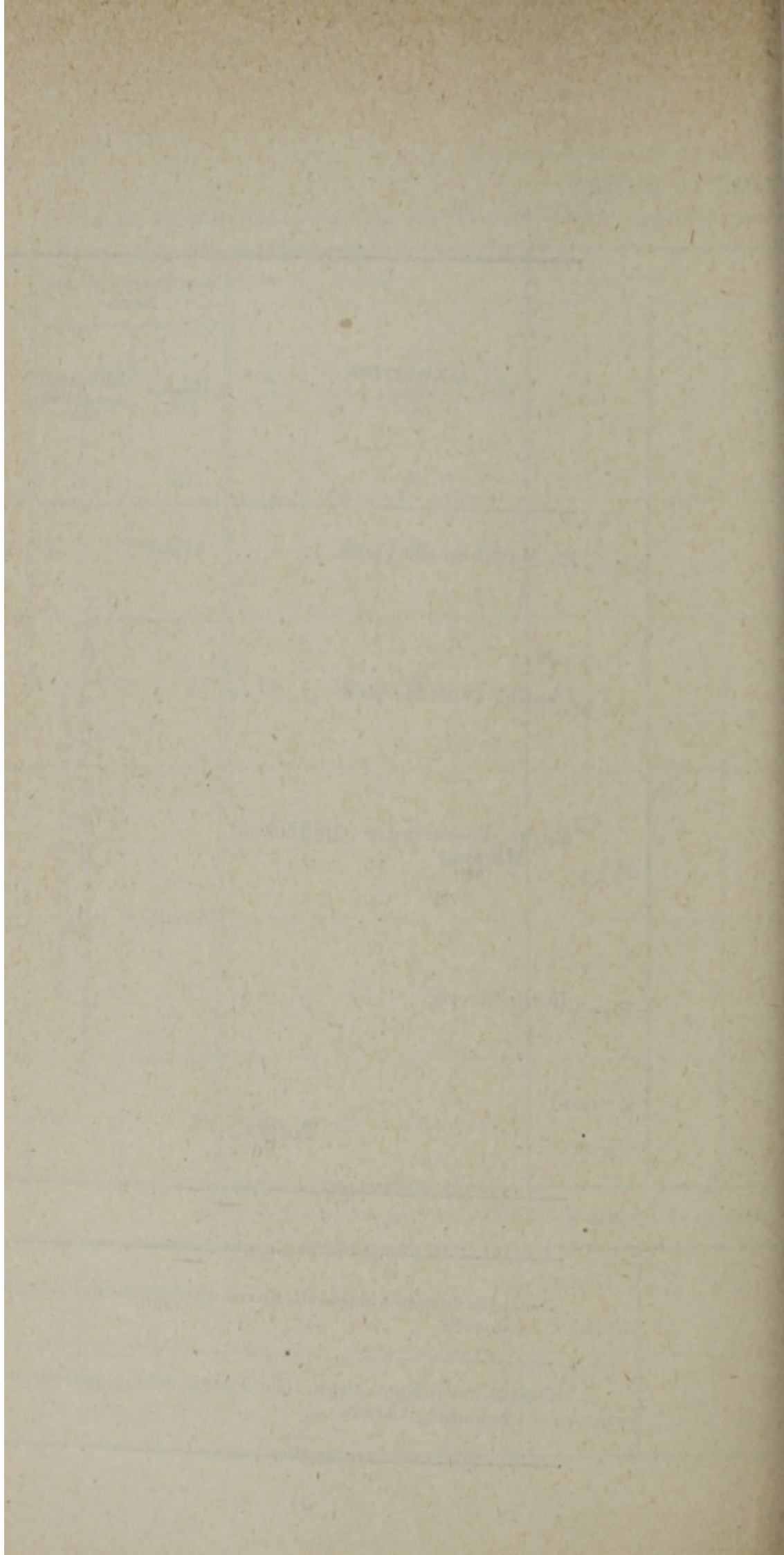

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE VESTRY OF
ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to report as follows upon the amount of work executed in the Surveyor's Department during the year ending March 25th, 1890.

Having been so recently appointed to my present position, in succession to your late Surveyor, Mr. Henry Jacques, I naturally have had to rely upon statistics collected from the various books and documents in the office, more than on my own personal experience of the works executed.

I have based my Report on the model of those previously submitted for your consideration by my predecessor, this Report embracing the work done under his jurisdiction during the twenty-fifth year of his service.

This sewer being on the boundary line between St. Martin's Parish and the Strand District Board of Works area is a joint sewer, arrangements were therefore made for it to be constructed by the Board, this Vestry paying a moiety of the cost amounting to £199 18s. 0d.

PUBLIC URINALS.

The urinals throughout the parish have been furnished with a self-acting intermittent supply of water, and painted throughout. New channels have also been laid down of white glazed channelling, and the standings have been paved with white glazed tiles.
