VESTRY MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES.

The return attached to this Report (pages 6 and 7) shows that the Vestry have held 27 meetings, and the various Committees 103 meetings, during the year ended Lady-day, 1892.

SANITARY.

The Vestry have caused 165 notices for Abatement of Nuisances to be served during the past year, and in all cases the works ordered have been executed.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS AND ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

BAKER STREET AND WATERLOO RAILWAY.—Plans and book of reference of the Bill were deposited on the 30th November, 1891. On the 11th February, 1892, it was determined to petition against the Bill.

HAMPSTEAD, ST. PANCRAS AND CHARING CROSS RAILWAY.—Plans and book of reference of the Bill were deposited on the 30th November, 1891. The Vestry, on the 11th February, 1892, resolved to lodge a petition against the Bill.

HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES ACT, 1890.—On the 16th April, 1891, a letter was submitted from the Housing of the Working Classes Committee of the London County Council, stating they were of opinion that the two modes of dealing with Turner's Court and premises adjacent, indicated by the plans forwarded by the Vestry, appeared to contemplate a local street improvement rather than a scheme under Part 2 of the Act, and they were unable to recommend either plan for the approval of the Council; they also forwarded an alternative plan, and suggested the preparation of a scheme and the appointment by the Vestry of a Committee to confer with them (the Council's Committee) as to details and as to the contribution, if any, to be made by the Council, and further stated it was essential that provision should be made for re-housing all persons of the working-class displaced. Whereupon the Committee were informed that the Vestry were unable to see how any improvement in the area could be effected by the plan proposed and they were not prepared to accept it, that the plans submitted by the Vestry were prepared with a view to provide dwellings for the working-classes and to improve the thoroughfare of Turner's Court, and the Committee were further informed that the Vestry would be pleased to confer with them (the Committee) to consider plans and to discuss the whole question.

LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL (TRAMWAYS) WESTMINSTER BRIDGE AND VICTORIA EMBANKMENT.—Plans and book of reference were deposited on the 30th November, 1891. The Vestry determined on the 11th February, 1892, to petition against the Bill.

PARLIAMENTARY BILLS, ETC.—*continued.*

LONDON TRAMWAYS (EXTENSION).—This Bill was thrown out in the House of Commons on the 7th May, 1891.

NATIONAL TELEPHONE.—On the 25th February, 1892, the Vestry resolved to request the Hon. W. F. D. Smith, M.P., to oppose the Bill.

NEW TELEPHONE COMPANY.—The Vestry determined on the 25th February, 1892, to request the Hon. W. F. D. Smith, M.P., to oppose the passing of this Bill.

PUBLIC HEALTH LONDON ACT, 1891.—This Act, which consolidates numerous previous Acts and introduces much needed amendments, came into operation on the 1st January, 1892.

TOWN HALL.

On the 16th April, 1891, it was determined to allow the Commissioners for the Free Public Library the use of the room in the basement under the Great Hall for the sum of £1 1s. 0d. per annum.

On the 30th April, 1891, it was determined to accept the offer of the London County Council to advance £22,200, repayable within 30 years, at 3½ per cent. per annum, in respect of the cost of the building, and a mortgage for that amount was duly sealed on the 28th May.

On the 9th July, 1891, it was reported that the Right Hon. W. H. Smith, M.P., had consented to open the building. On the 23rd July it was stated that Mr. W. H. Smith was indisposed, and that the Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, M.P., had consented to perform the ceremony. The building was opened by Mr. Balfour on the 16th July, 1891, Mr. C. T. Ritchie, M.P., and Mr. W. F. D. Smith, M.P., being also present.

The first meeting of the Vestry was held in the building on the 6th of August, 1891, when an address was delivered by Mr. Churchwarden Prescott, the chairman of the meeting. The Vicar being in Switzerland on the occasion, a telegram, expressive of regret at his absence, was ordered to be forwarded to him.

The license of the London County Council for Music and Dancing was received on the 24th October, 1891.

SCHOOL BOARD FOR LONDON.

Congratulations were on the 3rd December, 1891, tendered to Mr. David Laing upon his election as a member of the above Board.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

On the 30th April, 1891, Messrs. Roger de Coverly, George James and Thomas Prescott were re-elected Commissioners, and Messrs. Henry Grant and James Mason Andrew were elected in the place of Mr. William Challice, and the late Mr. Lionel Charles Drummond. On the 3rd December, 1891, the consent of the Vestry was given to a further borrowing of £800 by the Commissioners to meet the balance of the building account, and to defray the cost of fitting up the Boys' Room.

PUBLIC BATHS AND WASH-HOUSES.

On the 2nd April, 1891, an order was made by the Vestry on the Overseers of the Poor to pay the sum of £500 to the account of the Commissioners.

Messrs. James Mason Andrew and William Cope were on the 14th May, 1891, elected Commissioners of the above, and on the 3rd December, 1891, Mr. Henry Walkley was appointed in the place of Mr. William Cope, deceased.

ARCHBISHOP TENISON'S SCHOOL.

On the 16th April, 1891, Mr. John Scott was re-elected a Representative Governor of the above for the customary period of 3 years.

GREEN STREET IMPROVEMENT.

During the year the freeholder's interest in No. 3 has been acquired for £3,290, and the leaseholder's for £262. The freeholder's interest in the vacant sites of Nos. 4, 5, and 6, has also been acquired for the sum of £5,600.

In reply to an enquiry by the Vestry, the London County Council on the 23rd November, 1891, stated it was not their intention to include the completion of the improvement in any bill of the session of 1892.

On the 28th January, 1892, a letter was considered from a Mr. John Stent of St. Swithin's Lane, stating that he was willing to accept the Vestry's offer to exchange the triangular piece of land on the site of 9, Green Street for a similar plot at 9, Charing Cross Road, and he would give up so much of Nos. 7 and 8, Green Street, as will be required for the widening in exchange for the surplus land on the sites of Nos. 4, 5 and 6, on the understanding that the widening of the street will be effected with as little delay as possible, thereupon the Vestry communicated with the Council, who in reply stated that they consented to the proposed arrangement, and as their Valuer placed the value of the surplus land at 7 and 8, Green Street, at £1,600, their contribution would not exceed £1,200. On the 24th March, 1892, Mr. Stent was informed that the Vestry were prepared to consider any definite proposal he might desire to make.

WHITCOMB STREET IMPROVEMENT.

The London County Council having declined to set back Nos. 35 and 37, Whitcomb Street, and 12, James Street, (in process of rebuilding) the Vestry on the 16th April, 1891, determined to proceed no further with the widening of Whitcomb Street.

LAVATORIES, &c., CHARING CROSS.

On the 2nd April, 1891, the tender of Messrs. Allen & Son, to execute the General Builders' work for the underground lavatories &c., at Charing Cross, for the sum of £3,465 was accepted.

The tenders of Messrs. Doulton & Co., for supplying sanitary fittings for the sum of £200, and that of Messrs. Woodhouse & Rawson, for electric wires and fittings for £47 5s. 0d. have been accepted.

On the 6th August, it was determined to request the London County Council to advance the estimated cost of the lavatories, &c., (£4,000) on Mortgage. Difficulties were however raised by the Council requiring the Vestry to show that the consent of adjacent freeholders had been obtained, and it was determined to wait until the Public Health Act, 1891, came into operation, (1st January, 1892), under which such consent would not be required. A local inquiry was subsequently made by one of the Inspectors of the Local Government Board.

CAMDEN TOWN CEMETERY ACT, 1854.

Mr. Thomas Proctor Baptie, J.P., was on the 17th December, 1891, appointed a Trustee under the above Act, in the place of Mr. William Cope, deceased.

ALMSHOUSE AND PENSION CHARITY.

On the 15th October, 1891, Major Clifford Probyn and Mr. John Scott were appointed the Vestry's representative Trustees under the above Charity, and on the same date a vote of thanks was passed to Mr. William Challice for his past services as a Trustee.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

Suggestions have been made to the First Commissioner of H.M.'s Works, &c., for the lighting by the Commissioners of Trafalgar Square by electricity, and they have been informed on their consenting, the Vestry will consider relative to the lighting by them of the surrounding roadways in like manner. The Commissioners however have declined to adopt the suggestions.

CECIL STREET AND SALISBURY STREET.

An agreement has been entered into with Messrs. Hobbs & Co., the Strand District Board of Works and the Vestry, for the diversion of the above streets, and an application has been made to the Justices to view.

WARWICK MEWS.

An order by the London County Council for the re-numbering of the premises therein, and the re-naming of the place Carlton Mews was submitted to the Vestry on the 2nd April, 1891, and the officers were instructed to take the necessary proceedings thereon.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF COAL PLATES AND VAULTS.

On the 2nd April, draft regulations for the above were submitted by the Surveyor, and the Vestry having made certain alterations therein they were, as altered, approved, adopted, and entered upon the Minutes.

REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO PRIVATE LAMPS.

On the 9th July, 1891, the above regulations submitted by the Surveyor were adopted and approved by the Vestry and entered upon the Minutes.

REGULATIONS FOR HOUSE DRAINAGE.

Regulations for the above were submitted to the Vestry by the Surveyor, and alterations having been made by the Vestry therein they were, as altered, approved, adopted and entered upon the Minutes.

CHURCHWARDENS AND SIDESMEN.

On the 2nd April, 1891, the Right Hon. Lord Kinnaird and Mr. Thomas Prescott, were respectively elected Senior and Junior Churchwardens, and on the 30th April, Messrs. William Stephens Cross and Thomas Proctor Baptie, J.P., Sidesmen to the Senior Churchwarden, and Messrs. Henry Grant and Walter Lewin, Sidesmen to the Junior Churchwarden.

VESTRY ELECTIONS.

The Annual Election of Members of the Vestry and Auditors took place, without contests, on the 4th May, 1891.

H.R.H. THE LATE DUKE OF CLARENCE AND AVONDALE, K.G., K.P.

On the 14th January, 1892, reference was made to the death of His Royal Highness, and a resolution of sympathy with their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales was passed, a copy of the resolution was forwarded to Sir D. M. Probyn, B.C., which was duly acknowledged by him on behalf of their Royal Highnesses.

THE LATE RT. HON. W. H. SMITH, M.P.

On the 15th October, 1891, the death of Mr. Smith was reported, and a letter expressive of the Vestry's sympathy was ordered to be forwarded to Mrs. Smith. A copy of the letter was entered upon the Minutes on the 29th October, 1891.

DEATH OF A MEMBER OF THE VESTRY.

The death of Mr. William Cope was reported on the 29th October, 1891, and a vote of condolence with Mrs. Cope was passed, which she subsequently acknowledged.

DEATH OF THE LATE SURVEYOR.

On the 3rd December, 1891, the death of Mr. Henry Jacques was reported, and a letter expressive of sympathy was ordered to be forwarded to his family, which was acknowledged by his son.

ASSISTANT OVERSEER OF THE POOR.

On the 30th April, 1891, Mr. Charles Farror Partridge was appointed to the above office, and on the same day was also appointed a clerk in the Vestry Clerk's department.

RATE COLLECTOR.

On the 2nd April, 1891, Mr. William Challice was appointed Collector of the General and Sewers Rates for Ward No. 1.

*Annual Report on the Health of the Parish of St. Martin-in-the-Fields,
for the Year 1891.*

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Twenty-second Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of the Parish.

The decennial numbering of the people took place this year. As regards our own Parish, the population was found to have decreased since the last census of 1881. This falling off is due to many former residents having removed to the suburbs or the country, and to the demolition of so many houses for improvements, &c., but when the houses now in course of construction are finished, many of which will be let as residential flats, I think by the next census the population of the Parish will be found to have considerably increased.

BIRTHS.

The Births registered in the Parish during the year numbered 252, a number 15 less than the previous year, 1890.

The following Table shows the number of Births registered in each month of the year 1891:—

The Birth-rate of the Parish for the year 1891 would be 17·3 per 1,000.

This Birth-rate is higher than the one recorded in the previous year, notwithstanding the births were 15 less than in 1890. This circumstance is accounted for by the fact that the calculations for 1890 are based upon the higher census of 1881, whereas the birth-rate for 1891 is estimated upon the census of 1891, which, as before stated, is lower than the census of 1881. To arrive at the correct population of our ever changing parish, a census ought to be taken annually. The births registered in London in the year 1891 numbered 134,003, being in the proportion of 31·8 annually to 1,000 of the estimated population. This was a considerable rise from the rate in the immediately preceding year, which had been 30·8; but with this exception the rate in 1891 was the lowest as yet recorded.

DEATHS.

In St. Martin-in-the-Fields during the year 1891, the total Deaths numbered 420, being 38 more than in the previous year. This increase is due to the larger number of deaths in the Charing Cross Hospital.

These 420 Deaths include those non-parishioners who died in the Charing Cross Hospital, and therefore must be omitted in estimating the death-rate, but on the other hand the deaths occurring outside the Parish among persons belonging thereto, must be added. On referring to Table 7, it will at once clearly show my meaning.

The Death-rate for the year 1891, is 22·4 per 1,000. This rate of mortality is considerably higher than the previous year 1890, but as I stated in my remarks upon the birth-rate, which apply also to the death-rate, this rise over the previous year is due to the calculations being based upon a lower census. The number of deaths on which the death-rate was computed in 1890 was 325, and in 1891, 326, so that the two years are about equal. Then again, since the year 1883, I have included in the annual death-rate of our Parish all those deaths of parishioners occurring in Hospitals and Asylums outside the Parish, also the deaths in the Camden Town Alms Houses, and the Edmonton Workhouse of the Strand

Union. It has been a question whether the deaths in the Edmonton Workhouse should be included in the rate, and I must say not without reason, for it must be remembered that a great number of those who die in the Workhouse have been resident there many years prior to their death, and have therefore practically ceased to be parishioners. But I have been informed from the office of the Registrar-General that these deaths should be taken into account in computing the death-rate. Had I not included these deaths in the Edmonton Workhouse, 46 in number in the year 1891, the death-rate would have been 19·2. The death-rate for London in the year 1891 was 21·4 per 1,000.

INFANTILE MORTALITY.

The mortality of children under one year of age during the year 1891, was at the rate of 162·7 deaths to 1,000 registered births.

OLD AGE MORTALITY.

The deaths of parishioners over 60 occurring in and out of the Parish in the year 1891, numbered 115.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

ZYMOTIC DISEASES.—The principal Zymotic Diseases are Small-pox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Typhoid Fever, Typhus Fever, Cholera, and Diarrhœa.

The total number of deaths occurring in the Parish from the above-named diseases was 34. This number includes those non-parishioners who died in the Charing Cross Hospital. After deducting those non-parishioners, and adding those parishioners who died in Public Institutions outside the Parish, the mortality due to St. Martin-in-the-Fields would be 24. (*See Table 5.*)

SMALL-POX.—No death or case of illness came under my notice. In London 8 deaths were caused by small-pox during the year 1891.

MEASLES.—Seven deaths occurred in the Parish from this complaint, 2 of which number were in the Charing Cross Hospital, and were non-parishioners, but 1 death of a parishioner from measles took place in King's College Hospital.

SCARLET FEVER.—No death occurred in the Parish from this malady, but 1 of a parishioner was recorded at the Western Fever Hospital.

DIPHThERIA.—Twelve deaths were due to this disease, 10 of which occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital, and were all non-parishioners. In hospitals outside the Parish 3 deaths of parishioners were recorded.

WHOOPING COUGH.—Eight deaths were registered in the Parish from this complaint.

TYPHOID FEVER.—One death occurred from this disease in the Charing Cross Hospital, which was that of a non-parishioner.

TYPHUS FEVER.—One death was registered from this malady.

DIARRHŒA.—Four deaths were recorded from this complaint, 2 of which occurred in the Charing Cross Hospital and were non-parishioners.

The deaths from all causes, with the ages at death of those who died in the Parish, and also those parishioners who died in institutions outside the district will be found fully detailed in Tables 2 and 6.

INFLUENZA.

This mysterious scourge again visited us early in May, gradually diminishing as the year advanced. We had 11 deaths in the Parish from this disease during the year, and 6 deaths of parishioners outside, 17 in all. The immediate cause of death in all the cases

was due to pulmonary complications, with the exception of 1, which was certified "Influenza and Exhaustion." It will be seen from the Table below that the chief victims were the aged:—

INFECTIOUS DISEASE (NOTIFICATION) ACT, 1889.

In the year 1891 the cases of infectious disease notified in accordance with this Act numbered 57, against 41 of the previous year. At Table 9 will be found a classification of these 57 cases, and the localities wherein they occurred.

DISINFECTION AFTER INFECTIOUS DISEASE

The disinfection is done as hitherto by Mr. W. G. Lacy, of Fulham, who performs his work in a most punctual and satisfactory manner, so well that it very rarely happens that a second case of infectious disease appears in the same house in which he has operated.

In the latter part of the year your Sanitary Inspector and I made a visit of inspection to his establishment, situated at Town Mead Road, Fulham, close by Wandsworth Bridge, and the admirable arrangements, order, and method we witnessed left nothing to be desired. Mr. W. G. Lacy also disinfects for the following sanitary authorities:—Fulham, Westminster, Willesden, Clapham, Wandsworth, Battersea, Putney, Streatham and Richmond. During the year 1891 the disinfections numbered 32.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (LONDON) ACT, 1891.

This Act intended for the sanitary administration of the Metropolis, repeals a large number of former Acts in force relating to the public health. It consolidates these with amendments, so instead of the sanitary authority having to refer to a number of statutes in the discharge of its duties, thereby causing trouble and confusion, has this one Act in which to guide it.

The first part deals with nuisances and offensive trades, then as to smoke consumption. The Act then deals with workshops and

bake-houses, and provides for certain sanitary conditions therein. Then the regulations of dairies, removal of refuse, prevention of infectious disease, disinfection and many more details in connection with sanitation.

SANITARY WORK.

During the year, 165 sanitary notices were served upon the owners or occupiers of property, also numerous verbal recommendations to remedy sanitary defects.

At your fortnightly Vestry meeting of 1st October, 1891, I made a report to you respecting the insanitary condition of the house 24, Bedfordbury. You requested your Clerk to write to the agent desiring him to put the house into a proper and wholesome condition, or close it. To this request the agent replied he would be quite willing to shut up the premises, providing he could come to some arrangement with the leaseholder, who had another year of his lease to run. A good deal of correspondence and interviews passed with the agent and leaseholder without any definite result. At last it became necessary to apply for a summons against the agent, which was heard at Bow St. Police Court on 2nd February, 1892. The Magistrate granted a closing order, and inflicted the nominal penalty of ten shillings and costs.

BAKE-HOUSES.

The bake-houses have been regularly inspected, and were found in a satisfactory condition.

HOUSES LET OUT IN LODGINGS.

Your Inspector, whom you appointed permanent inspector of these houses, has regularly inspected them, and reported to me all sanitary defects that came under his notice.

The pipe-sewers have been regularly flushed, also those gullies emitting offensive effluvia, and the several courts and passages in the parish lime-whited.

Shows in a summary form the amount of life saved and the amount lost in the year, as compared with the preceding decennium, under each of the more important headings in the list of causes.

The net loss in the year amounted to no less than 4,147 lives, that is to say had the death-rate in the year been only equal to the average in the preceding decennium 4,147 fewer persons would have died in London than was actually the case.

The excess, as shown in the Table, was under many headings, some of which, as Diphtheria, Cancer, Premature Birth, Diseases of the Circulatory, and of the Urinary Organs, have shown similar excesses for many successive years, and appear to be persistently increasing. But there are others under which the increase is attributable to temporary causes, and among them the most noteworthy is Influenza; for, while more than one half of the whole net increased mortality was registered under this heading, it can scarcely be doubted that the main part of the enormous increase under Diseases of the Respiratory Organs, and some part of that under Diseases of the Circulatory System and other headings, was in reality determined by the same cause as were the deaths directly attributed to Influenza.

The wood pavements were laid with 9 in. by 6 in. by 3 in. yellow deal blocks, having $\frac{3}{8}$ in. joints, formed by means of cast metal studs, as described in my last year's Report.

The cab ranks in the centre of the Haymarket have been paved with asphalte, laid with a fall to the centre, thus forming a channel with a fall to the gulleys provided at the lower end of each rank. This work has been done at the joint expense of your Vestry and the Vestry of St. James', Westminster, the centre line of cab rank being

the parish boundary. The new refuges opposite Charles Street and at the top of the Haymarket have also been constructed at the joint expense of the the two Vestries. The roadways of Suffolk Place, James Street, and Panton Street, for a considerable length were also taken up and relaid at a lower level, thus giving an improved gradient to the Haymarket.

The west footway in the repaved portion of Exeter Street has been improved by being made up of an uniform width throughout.

A much needed improvement as regards the traffic in Long Acre has been effected by the altered position of the refuge when repaving the junction of this street with St. Martin's Lane.

A portion of Little Catherine Street being in the parish of St. Paul, Covent Garden, the expense of repaving was apportioned between the two parishes.

The repaving of the footway in Whitehall, from Craig's Court to Scotland Yard, was to have been in York stone. The cross fall, however, being so limited, it was thought preferable to repave with asphalt, as before.

The above amount includes the sum of £408 10s. 7d. the annual cost of maintenance of King William Street and Northumberland Avenue, which are repairable under Contract with the Improved Wood Pavement Company. The maintenance term for King William Street however, expired in November, 1891, having been in operation for 15 years. The annual amount for repairs in this street will in consequence be considerably reduced, for the future. It is not advisable to enter into contracts for the annual maintenance of wood pavements, as the work including renewals can be done more economically by our own men, and the work is moreover under the *direct* control of the Vestry.

The footway in Great Newport Street repairable by this Parish has had new kerbs, and the flagging has been relaid throughout.

The footway on the East side of Trafalgar Square has also been taken up and relaid.

An iron channel pipe in Turner's Court has been taken away and asphalt substituted therefore.

New refuges have been constructed in St. Martin's Place upon the crossing from Duncannon Street to the National Gallery, and in Northumberland Avenue, opposite the Avenue Theatre.

A new design of lamp column and lantern has been adopted for the ordinary street lighting, the column having the arms of the parish in relief upon the base, the whole being an improvement upon the old, and in most cases, unsightly lamps.

New lamps have been fixed upon the east footway of the Haymarket, it being found necessary to remove most of the old ones when repaving.

Additional lamps have been fixed as follows :—

A new ornamental 4-globe lamp has been fixed in connection with the Underground Lavatory work in Charing Cross, and a fifty feet per hour Westminster lamp upon the same site, facing Cockspur Street, in lieu of the previous twenty feet per hour lamp, which latter has been refixed upon the new refuge in St. Martin's Place.

SLOP AND DUST COLLECTING.

From the tabulated statement attached to this Report it will be seen that there have been removed from the parish 9,036 loads of house refuse, and 4,176 loads of slop.

8 sweepers, 2 machine brooms, and 10 Slop and Dust Vans have been employed in this work. In addition to these it is found necessary to employ extra slop vans when occasion requires.

It will be noticed that the cost of this work has materially increased upon the amount expended last year. This increase is chiefly due to the fact that considerably more slop and dust is now being removed from the Parish.

The amount of slop has increased mainly through the enormous increase in the vehicular traffic of the district, and also by reason of more strict regulations having been issued to prevent road detritus being swept into the gulleys.

The dust or house refuse has increased from the fact that the Vestry have now to take the clinkers from hotel furnaces, and the amount of house refuse from the large hotels, clubs, and other large buildings within the parish has materially increased.

There is also an increase in the wages amount, the dustmen now being paid tenpence per load removed, instead of fourpence half-penny. This increase came into operation in January, to prevent the men having the same excuse as formerly for taking "tips," the same being rigidly prohibited under the Public Health Act (London), 1891.

The surfaces of the wood and asphalt pavements are washed as often as is found necessary, fifteen orderly men are also employed in collecting horse droppings, and for the first part of the day in spreading ballast upon the roadways.

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The footways in front of vacant spaces have been swept and cleansed as previously, and on and after the 1st of January, 1892, when the provisions of the New Public Health Act (London), 1891, came into force, the whole of the footways in the parish have been regularly swept and cleansed. The number of men employed upon this work and the cleansing of the courts has varied from 4 to 10, according to the state of the weather.

This work has cost £144 17s. 1d.

The whole of the Vestry's vans have been thoroughly repaired and repainted.

The question of providing your own horses and drivers, and having a central Depôt for the work of the Vestry, is still under the consideration of your Committee.

In consequence of increased responsibilities resting with local authorities by reason of the new Public Health Act, special regulations for the removal of refuse have been adopted, which will come into force on the 1st April, this year. An Inspector has also been appointed whose duties are jointly to superintend the cleansing of footways and courts, and the removal of house and trade refuse.

The scavenging area has been slightly altered by an arrangement with the Strand Board of Works, that Burleigh Street be entirely cleansed by the Strand Board, and the portion of Chandos Street from the Parish Boundary to Agar Street, be for the future cleansed by this Vestry.

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In the very hot weather a solution of manganate of soda and sulphuric acid, being similar to the disinfectants used in flushing the courts and alleys, is mixed with the water.

The stand post in Rose Street has been removed, it being in an inconvenient place.

SNOW REMOVAL.

There has been no great amount of snow during the past winter, consequently little difficulty was experienced in dealing with same. The principal falls were on Feb. 16th, Feb. 19th March 9th and March 10th.

The method adopted has been to use as little salt as possible thus dispensing with the flushing system, the snow having been swept up immediately after each fall, and carted to the river. This is by far the most satisfactory method of snow removal for those using the streets, and should be adopted whenever practicable, but it is almost impossible to make a hard and fast rule for snow removal in every case.

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LIMEWHITING COURTS.

The courts and other passages in the parish have been limewhitened twice, at a cost of £32 15s. 0d.

STREET NAME PLATES.

New name plates have been fixed in the following streets and courts:—

Red Lion Court, Arundel Place, Mercer Street, and Banbury Court. These plates were chiefly required in place of broken glass ones and are of zinc metal painted, consequently unbreakable.

TREES—CHARING CROSS ROAD AND CHURCHYARD.

Three new trees have been planted in the Churchyard, to replace dead ones, at a cost of £5 8s.

The whole of the trees have also had attention; re-tied where necessary, and fresh soil supplied, at a further cost of £8 11s. 3d. The trees have been watered in the very dry weather.

The iron guards to all these trees, also the seats in Trafalgar Square belonging to the Vestry, have been painted, at a cost of £14 5s. 0d.

In consequence of the unsafe condition of several of the gratings around the trees in the Charing Cross Road, 13 of them have had proper rebated stone curbs fixed to form a perfectly secure bed for the gratings. All these gratings should be provided with these curbs.

HYDE PARK CORNER ROADS.

The Vestry's share for the past year of the cost of maintaining the above roads (viz.: one-third of the total cost as provided in the Hyde Park Maintenance Act, 1887), amounts to £536 4s. 6d.

These roads are about to be repaved with wood, instead of macadam. The annual cost of maintenance will, therefore, be considerably reduced, the macadamized roadway being very costly to maintain.

CLEANSING SEWERS AND GULLIES.

The Gullies in the parish, (about 420), exclusive of those under the control of the London County Council, have been emptied from time to time and flushed with a solution of manganate of soda and sulphuric acid; the surfaces of all courts have also been flushed periodically at the following total cost—

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HOUSE DRAINAGE.

New connections of house drains to the Sewers and fourteen examinations of the sewers have been made by the Vestry at the owners' cost.

All connections (from private property) within the street are constructed by the Vestry at the expense of the owners, the sum of £88 19s. 6d. being receivable in respect thereof for work at the before mentioned premises.

The new regulations for house drainage referred to in my previous annual report, have now been in use for nearly a year, and are found to work satisfactorily.

They are as follows:—

1. Seven days' notice of the intention to drain a house or building is to be given to the Vestry. Forms of application can be obtained from the Surveyor.

2. A second notice is required when the work has not been commenced within six months from the date of application, and the sanction is given only to the person or persons making the application.

3. Such notice must be accompanied by a plan drawn to a scale of not less than 8 feet to an inch, accompanied by a block plan, showing the locality of the intended works, drawn to a scale of not less than 44 feet to an inch. The plan must show as much detail of the house or premises proposed to be drained as is necessary to enable a judgment to be formed as to the efficiency of the intended drainage. It must also show the position of all water closets, sinks, bath wastes, &c., the lines of new drains with the sizes thereof to be shown in red, and any existing drains in blue upon the plan.

4. All horizontal pipes from water closets shall have an internal diameter of 6 inches if of stoneware, and an internal diameter of 5 inches if of iron. For the drainage from areas, sinks, and subsidiary drains, four inch pipes may be used.

5. The whole of the available fall is to be made use of, and no drain to have a less fall than 1 in 40. In any case, however, where a gradient of less than 1 in 40 cannot be avoided, special provision shall be made for an automatic flushing of the drains by the adoption of an approved flushing syphon.

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6. Each house or building shall have a separate drain in connection with the sewer, and no drain shall be laid under any house or building should it be practicable to lay them outside of same.

7. The drains shall be laid in direct lines between the points of inspection wherever possible.

8. The drains of all houses and buildings shall consist of glazed stoneware pipes or of cast iron coated with Dr. Angus Smith's bituminous rust prevention composition inside and out.

9. All pipes must be laid with watertight joints upon cement concrete, and where they pass underneath buildings they must, if of stoneware, be surrounded with not less than 6 inches of cement concrete in the proportions of one part of clean sharp sand, five parts of clean ballast, and one part of Portland cement, all by measure; where the covering of pipes underneath any building is less than one foot, iron pipes shall be used with lead and gaskin joints.

10. The connection with the street sewer will be made by the Vestry at the owner's expense, including so much of the work as will be beneath the public-way, and upon the estimated amount of same being paid by the applicant to the Surveyor to the Vestry.

11. No drain shall be laid on the premises until the drain from the sewer to the premises has been laid in accordance with the above regulation.

12. For the effectual ventilation of the drains at least two untrapped openings shall be provided.

(a) One opening being at or near the level of the surface of the ground adjoining such opening shall communicate with the drains by means of a suitable pipe, shaft, or disconnecting chamber, as near as practicable to the trap, which shall be provided between the main drain of the building and the sewer with which such drain communicates; such opening shall be situate on that side of the trap nearer the building.

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(b) The second opening shall be obtained by carrying up from the point or head of the drains farthest distant from the first-mentioned opening, a vertical pipe or shaft to such a height, and in such a manner as effectually to prevent any escape of foul air from such pipe or shaft into any building in the vicinity thereof.

13. A suitable trap to be provided in every main drain which directly communicates with the sewer at a point as distant as may be practicable from the building, within the curtilage thereof, and as near as may be practicable to the point at which such drain may be connected with the sewer.

14. Immediately above the disconnecting trap a suitable inspection chamber shall be constructed, provided with an air-tight cover.

15. Junctions of branch drains shall in no case be made at right angles, but with proper junction pipes, having the branch pipe formed on them at an angle of 45 to 60 degrees with the main drain in the direction of its flow; no cutting of pipes will be sanctioned, and no vertical right angle junctions will be allowed except as inspection shafts, or for ventilation purposes.

16. Rain water pipes, bath wastes, and all wastes from sinks, hydraulic lifts, or other business appliances shall deliver outside the building on to open trapped gullies, or if they must of necessity be within the building, on to special interceptors approved by the Vestry, which must in every case be connected to the drains, and all inlets to the drains shall be properly trapped except those inlets used for the purpose of ventilation. "Bell" traps will on no account be allowed.

17. Soil pipes placed vertically shall be of at least seven lbs. lead. They shall be of an internal diameter of 4 inches, and placed, wherever practicable, outside the house or building, and in every case extended full bore up to and above the eaves, finished with an approved cowl, at such a height as effectually to prevent any escape of foul air into any building in the vicinity thereof. The connection between the water-closet and the soil pipe and ventilating pipe shall be of lead. Soil pipes are not to be used as rain-water pipes.

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18. The principle of construction of all water-closets is subject to the approval of the Vestry. "D" traps, containers, receivers, and hopper-shaped pans cannot be permitted. Where a series of water-closets are placed one above the other, delivering into a common soil pipe, the traps of each closet basin must be specially ventilated to prevent syphonage by means of a 2 inch lead pipe turned into the main ventilation pipe.

19. No rain water will be allowed to deliver on to the footway, or roadways; water from the roofs, bay windows, cornices, &c., must be taken into the system of house drainage.

20. Overflow pipes from all cisterns, service boxes, "safes," &c., must discharge if practicable direct into the open air or be carried by means of lead or other suitable pipes to a proper trapped gully or syphon.

21. The whole of any system of drainage must be approved by the Surveyor before a single pipe is covered up, and the joints tested by charging with water or other means should the Surveyor so direct.

An old barrel drain was taken out when redraining Nos. 1 and 3, Suffolk Place, and the drainage of these premises, as well as the drainage from No. 2, Suffolk Place, was connected directly with the sewer.

STREET GULLIES.

The total cost of this work has been £88 17s. 5d.

REPAIRS TO SEWERS.

Surface ventilation has been provided to the sewers in Craven Street and St. Martin's Mews, these were in both cases "dead ends," numerous complaints being received as to the non-ventilation of same. It is very desirable that the few similar cases remaining within the Parish be so ventilated, pending the time when I hope to see all sewers ventilated by upcast shafts or other better means.

A man-hole has been constructed upon the pipe sewer in Arundel Court, at an estimated cost of £10, this sewer can now be properly inspected and flushed.

Proper iron covers have been fixed to inspection areas upon the public sewer under private property on the Adelphi Estate in place of fixed stone covers, these covers having to be removed for periodical cleansing, considerable time is saved in opening.

Sundry small repairs to sewers have been made at a cost of £23 5s. 3d.

NEW SEWERS.

WHITCOMB STREET, AND ST. MARTIN'S STREET.

Owing to the extremely dilapidated condition of the portion of these sewers from Monmouth Court to St. Martin's Street, including the portion of the sewer in the latter street running east and west, it became necessary to take out the old work completely.

A new 4 ft. by 2 ft. 8 in. egg-shaped brick sewer (9 in. brick-work) has been constructed in lieu thereof, having bell mouthed junction with St. Martin's Street with proper ventilation, new man hole, and gulleys; the new sewer has been constructed at a lower level, the old sewer being too shallow for the purposes of draining all the basements of adjoining properties.

The 12 in. waste water drain from the Orange Street Baths, which was originally connected to the old sewer opposite Monmouth Court, has been turned into the new manhole in St. Martin's Street

The cost of this work, which has been done by contract, has been £739 6s. 4d.

BANBURY COURT

Numerous complaints having been received from those occupying premises draining into the nine inch pipe sewer in this court, it was found, upon examination, that the joints were defective, and the general condition of the sewer such as to necessitate its immediate renewal.

This has been done by the Vestry's own men at a total cost of £41 9s. 7d.

I may here mention that an upcast iron ventilating shaft has been fixed to the upper end of this sewer, and carried well above the eaves of the adjoining buildings; this form of sewer ventilation is very desirable, and it is to be hoped that property owners will offer no opposition to the erection of these ventilators, as being the best known means, if properly erected, of relieving the sewers of noxious gases.

Two inspection pits have been constructed upon this sewer, and a proper trapped gulley fixed in the court; the sewer in its present condition will serve as a model for future drainage of other courts in the parish.

CECIL COURT.

The 12 inch pipe sewer within this court has now been constructed and connected to the main sewers in St. Martin's Lane and Charing Cross Road. This work has been done at the expense of the owners of the property abutting upon the court by agreement with the Vestry.

BULL INN COURT.

The 9 inch pipe sewer in this court, referred to in my last year's report, has now been completed at the expense of the Electric Supply Corporation, the work having been necessitated by the extensive alterations recently made to their station adjoining.

CRAVEN PASSAGE.

An iron gate has been erected at the top of the steps leading from Craven Passage to Brewers Lane, in order to prevent nuisances which formerly were of frequent occurrence at this place.

NEW ADMIRALTY OFFICES.

The foundations of these buildings are now completed, and the works in connection with the superstructure are now well in hand.

NEW STREET FROM WHITEHALL TO THE VICTORIA EMBANKMENT.

Plan for a proposed street, 60 feet wide, from Whitehall to the Thames Embankment, to be known as Horse Guards' Avenue, have been deposited with, and conditionally approved by, your Vestry. The street will be jointly in this Parish and the Parish of St. Margaret, Westminster. The work has not yet been commenced.

IMPROVEMENTS.

CHANDOS STREET.

The owner of Nos. 45 & 46, Chandos Street, has recently, by agreement with the Vestry, acquired a vacant area in Taylor's Buildings (for some time occupied by the Vestry) for the purposes of enlarging his premises. A condition was imposed by the Vestry that the walls of the new buildings be faced with white glazed bricks. This is being done, and the improvement is one greatly to be desired in all narrow courts within the parish, as tending to more efficient sanitation.

The Rose Street urinal has been provided with an inspection chamber and disconnecting trap, and the drainage generally overhauled.

In consequence of numerous complaints as to the overflow from the urinal in Durham Hill, the floor of same has been raised to enable a larger gulley to be placed therein, thus reducing the liability of choking. The whole surface of floor has also been taken up and relaid with mastic asphalte, thus preventing any leakage into the vaults below upon the Adelphi Estate.

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UNDERGROUND LAVATORIES.

The underground Lavatories in Charing Cross are now practically completed, and will be opened for public use on April 12th.

The work has not progressed so quickly as I anticipated, but the Lavatories will, I feel sure, rank well with any that have yet been constructed in London or elsewhere. The levels in the street make this an awkward site for covering in, and the site itself necessitated a plan of an irregular shape.

In getting out the excavation an old cast iron cylindrical well was discovered a few feet below the surface, having a depth of twenty-four feet and a diameter of 4 feet, at the time of opening there was 8 feet of water in the well. It is supposed to have supplied the public pump originally standing at Charing Cross. Several lengths of the old wooden water conduits were also found upon the site.

A large water main belonging to the Chelsea Water Works Co. had to be removed from the site, also smaller pipes connected with the Office of Works Water Scheme.

A considerable alteration has been made to the surface of the streets by enlarging the previous refuge, and including the pavement around King Charles I. Statue, thus dispensing with the cross street or roadway formerly dividing the two refuges.

The Building provides for the following accommodation:—

For Men—28 urinals.

12 water closets.

2 lavatory basins.

For Women—5 water closets.

2 lavatory basins.

In addition, attendants' quarters are provided with store-room for tools, &c.

Hot water is provided for the lavatories obtained by geysers under the control of each attendant.

The urinals are automatically flushed as often as is thought desirable by syphon cisterns, and the drainage has been rendered as complete as possible by proper inspection areas and lampholes at the end and intersection of each main drain, a trap being provided at the main outlet to sewer, to prevent gas entering the drains. Two air inlets are provided at the lower end of each drain extraction being obtained by continuing the pipes through to the base of an adjoining lamp column where provision is made for a gas ring to induce a current of air in special conditions of the atmosphere.

The building itself is ventilated in the usual way by side gratings open to the street as inlets, an extraction being provided in the base of the large overhead central lamp.

The means of ingress and egress are also relied upon for assisting ventilation, open iron gates being utilized for closing the place.

A special damp course has been provided, both horizontally and vertically in the walls, to ensure the building being thoroughly dry.

The whole is lighted by the electric light, which is far better than gas on account of its greater cleanliness and freedom from products of combustion, it is very doubtful, however, whether this light can be supplied as economically as gas.

The cost of the whole work will be approximately £4,000. It is not expected that any extra call upon the rates will be required, as the receipts should more than balance the cost of erection and maintenance.

PARISH MAP.

Considerable inconvenience has been experienced in having no plan of the parish correctly brought up to date. As it is essential for the proper working of the parish that a reliable plan be obtained, you specially instructed me to prepare same. The work, which has consisted in correcting the ordnance survey of 1874, is now nearing completion, and I hope shortly to submit the finished map for your approval.

DRURY LANE GARDENS.

A wrought iron fence has been erected across this ground, with a gate to same, so as to restrict the use of the swings to children under 13 years of age.

An iron hurdle fence has also been fixed to the south boundary to protect the previously exposed areas on this side.

The house drainage has also been taken up and relaid outside the building,

OLD VESTRY HALL.

The Vestry having entered into possession of the New Town Hall in August last, the Old Vestry Hall and Offices have been repapered, painted, and cleaned at a cost of £94 10s. 9d.

CHURCHYARD MORTUARY.

The Mortuary adjoining the Church has been enlarged, and additional matched-boardings affixed to the walls, at a cost of £6 8s. 0d.

CHURCHYARD RECREATION GROUND.

The cost of maintaining this ground has been £41 4s. 6d.

VAULTS UNDER FOOTWAYS, AND PAVEMENT LIGHTS.

The following regulations for the construction of vaults, etc., under the public footway have been approved by the Vestry, and are now in force:—

- i. The front or head wall of vault to be built in 14 in. brickwork in cement.
- ii. The external face of brickwork not to project more than two-thirds of the extreme width of the footway from face of building.

Continued.

Continued—

- iii. The space between excavated ground and brickwork of front wall of vault to be filled in with cement concrete.
- iv. The crown of vault to be two feet, in the clear, below the underside of pavement, and covered with asphalt or other damp-proof material.
- v. No area light shall have a greater projection than eighteen inches from the building line, nor be more than eight feet in length, and shall be securely let into a hard York stone kerb.

In ordinary glazed lights the bars shall not be more than four inches apart, filled in with rough plate glass; or approved prismatic lenses not more than 4 in. by 4 in. each may be used.

- vi. In case of cellar flaps and gangways special plans and sections must be submitted for the consideration of the Vestry.
- vii. The coal plate stones to be of 3-in. hard York paving bedded on at least six inches of cement concrete; no stone will be required in asphalt pavements.
- viii. All coal plates to be provided with iron rings, and the maximum size not to exceed 15 in. in diameter.
- ix. New stones will be provided and fixed by the Vestry, and all broken stones will be renewed by the Vestry, the expense of cutting the hole to be borne by the owner.
- x. The sum of half-a-crown will be charged in every case to cover the expense of cutting the coal plate holes and fixing the stones.
- xi. The concrete shall be composed of one part of clean sharp sand, five parts of clean ballast and one part of Portland cement, all by measure, and the whole work executed to the satisfaction of the Surveyor to the Vestry.

*Note—*The formation of any Vault, Arch, Cellar, or other structure under the public way in any Street is prohibited (18 & 19 Vict., c. 120, ss. 101-102) unless the consent of the Vestry be previously obtained.

LICENCES.

46 Licences (not including renewals) have been granted for hoardings and scaffolds for the purpose of pulling down, re-building, and alterations. Licences have also been granted, in 9 cases, to take up pavements for repairing rain water pipes, fixing lamps, and other similar purposes. The cost of making good these openings has been charged to the person taking out the Licence.
