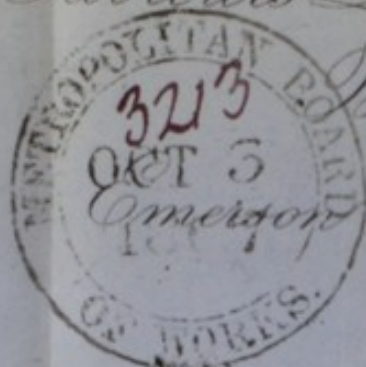

# AN ABSTRACT OF ACCOUNTS

OF THE

St. Saviour's District Board of Works,

For the Twelve Months ending 25th March, 1867,

AND

## REPORTS

compiled and Published in accordance with the 198th section of R. & 19 Vict., c. 120.—“An Act for the better Local Management of the Metropolis,” and respectfully presented to the Inhabitants of the District.

### CLERK'S REPORT.

OF the preventive and remedial measures taken during last summer, and in the later period when Cholera and Diarrhœa were fatally prevalent in London, a detailed account is presented in the Medical Officer's Report hereto annexed. It is only necessary to add that, the Sanitary Committee, from the earliest period of the existence of the Epidemic in London, and before its appearance in the Southern districts, held frequent meetings on the subject, and that no amount of labor and reasonable expense was spared in the prosecution of Sanitary Works and distribution of Disinfectants. The total amount of expenditure by the Board from the putting in force of the “Diseases Prevention Act,” consequent on the appearance of the epidemic, to the present time, including Salaries to Assistant Medical Officers and every incidental outlay, has been the sum of £545 13s. 1d.

By the 35th section of Sanitary Act of 1866, power is given to the Board (with certain restrictions), to make regulations for fixing



the number of occupants of houses tenanted by more than one family, and for registration of such houses; and Rules, in accordance therewith, were drawn up by the Medical Officer, but the Sanitary Committee, after careful consideration of the subject, were of opinion that, looking to the powers already possessed by the Board, the benefits which might accrue from putting the Clause in force would not (in St. Saviour's) be commensurate with the inconvenience and expense necessarily attending its enforcement.

The usual tabulated statements of the Medical Officer and Sanitary Inspector's labors, and the works resulting from house to house visitations, are appended to the Report of the former, at page 15.

Since the date of their last Annual Report, the Board have presented Petitions and Memorials as under, viz.: to Parliament against the Metropolitan Improvement Rate Bill, and in favor of the second reading of the Metropolitan Gas Bill, with a view to its being considered before a Committee of the House of Commons; to the Metropolitan Board, in reference to the Traffic Regulation Bill; and to the President of the Privy Council, praying for Inquiry into the Provisions of the Vaccination Act, with a view to better precautions being taken for preventing unsuccessful or insufficient operations.

An inspection of the several passages and places near the water side, through which the Board possess a right of way, was, on the 7th of November last, made by the Paving Committee, accompanied by twelve boys from St. Saviour's and six from Christchurch National Schools, resulting in several encroachments and obstructions being discovered and checked. It was found that a warehouse had been erected over a passage formerly known as Bull Alley, in Christchurch, without consent of the Board to appropriate the site of such passage, and the owner or lessees of the warehouse have been required to sign an Agreement acknowledging the rights of the Board, and reserving a nominal rental in respect of the ground occupied.

A portion of Bridge Street, Southwark, extending from Southwark Street to Union Street, has been paved with new Granite cubes, and part of Union Street has been repaved, and other paving and sewerage works have been executed, details of which as to quantities will be found in the Surveyor's Report.

Mr. Benthall, the recent Contractor for Paviers' and Masons' work in the Clink and Christchurch, being unable to carry out his Contracts to the satisfaction of the Board, the same were determined by mutual arrangement at Christmas last, and fresh Contracts have since been entered into by Messrs. Mowlem & Co. and Mr. Henry Booth, for such work in the whole District, and a Contract for Sewerage works has been entered into, full particulars of all which are contained in the List of Contracts in force on the 25th of

Ch, in page 30. Subsequent to this date other Contracts have been entered into, viz., by Mr. Hearn, for the Cleansing of the District, and by Mr. Boakes, for the Collection of Dust therein, the former to receive £1,750 per annum, the latter to pay £200 per annum. Each Contract is for a term of Three Years.

It will be remembered that the Clock Tower, at the foot of London Bridge, was presented to and accepted by the Metropolitan Board of Works, with a view to its removal, and re-erection in Southwark Park, as stated in the Ninth Annual Report of this Board; but, after the lapse of eighteen months, a communication was received from the Metropolitan Board, stating that they had obtained Tenders for its removal, the lowest of which was £959, and that sum being very much in excess of what they had anticipated, they must decline to accept the Tower. To this letter a reply was sent, calling their attention to the fact of their previous acceptance of the Tower, and expressing an opinion that it was not competent for them to repudiate the responsibility of its removal; but the Metropolitan Board, in a letter dated the 10th of October, 1866, wholly declined to carry out their engagement. The responsibility being thus thrown back into the hands of this Board, it was thought inadvisable to take any steps for its removal in the winter, and it now stands referred to the Paving Committee to make arrangements for disposing of the materials of the Tower, and to having the site cleared in accordance with a Resolution of the Board, bearing date the 14th of November last. It is proposed to erect a Sanctuary and Lamp Column on or near the site.

By the lamented death of Henry Withers, Esq., of the London and Westminster Bank, the office of Treasurer became vacant, and on April last, the Board elected William McKewan, Esq., Manager of the London and County Bank in his stead, the Account of the Board being transferred accordingly.

The Foot and Carriage-way pavements have been made good, after removals and alterations of gas and water-pipes in 1,223 cases in all.

34 Licenses to put up Scaffolds and Hoards have been issued, and the paving, &c., relaid and made good after.

Many of the Brick Sewers and the whole of the Pipe Sewers have been several times flushed by water direct from the River or by water-cart.

The whole of the Macadamized Roads and Streets have been repaired as required, partly with new granite, and with old materials from Ewer Street Yard and other places.



## MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

For the first time since the passing of the Act of Parliament under which this Board is constituted, Cholera appears as an Epidemic in the Statistical Tables I have the honor to submit for your information. In my last report, in anticipation of the appearance of this fearful scourge, I ventured to adduce a few reasons for believing that if the disease should unhappily visit us, its ravages would be inconsiderable compared with those of former years. A larger supply of purer water was a chief ground for encouraging this hope, and the experience of the past year has confirmed in a very remarkable manner the opinion of those who have long held that, in the spread of Cholera, impure water had a preponderating influence. This District, as I then pointed out, afforded in former Cholera periods a very striking illustration confirmatory of this theory. The revelations of the past year make it impossible for us to conclude that the excessive mortality from Cholera in one district of London is to be explained by the doctrine of chances. The mortality from Cholera for the whole of London was 5,577, but of this number, 3,931 persons died in the East District. In population this portion of London is about one-fifth, which would leave to the other four-fifths an average of a little more than 400 deaths each. The mortality of the East was therefore ten times greater than the rest of London. The death-rate of these four districts varied with the elevation of the land, and the wealth of the residents—the West giving the smallest mortality, and the South the largest—while in the mortality from all causes, the South is lower than three of the remaining districts into which London is divided. With regard to the East, however, we find that there were remarkable variations in the death-rate in the different sub-districts. The Registrar General states that “the whole of the districts where “the mortality was from thirty to forty-fold higher than it was “either in the West or the central in the North or South of London, “were supplied with water from the Old Ford reservoirs. London “is divided into 37 districts; 6 are supplied from Old Ford, and “every one has been ravaged by the Epidemic: the other 31 “districts suffered slightly. The 37 districts are subdivided into “135 sub-districts; 21 are supplied from the same water, and “have all suffered considerably in comparison with the remaining “114.” I have stated these facts respecting the East of London thus fully, because they have an important bearing upon our sanitary measures, especially in Epidemic periods. The existence of a fatal connection between impure water and disease is an established fact, and I have no doubt that a continuous instead of an intermittent



supply from pure sources, would be found one of the most powerful agents in the extermination of Cholera from the Metropolis.

The comparative immunity of the Saint Saviour's District from this fearful disease, is attested by the following facts. In the year 1849 the deaths from Cholera were 539, in 1854, 491, and in 1866 32, including 11 deaths in Guy's Hospital of persons who had been received from other parishes. The figures represent a mortality in the rates of 152, 131, and 9 to every 10,000 living persons. But if the 11 persons whose deaths are not properly due to the Saint Saviour's District are eliminated, there remain only 21 deaths, or about 6 to every 10,000 living persons. The mortality therefore, during the two previous outbreaks, was more than 20 times greater than during the past year.

It is not inconsistent with a grateful recognition of so merciful an exemption from this terrible Epidemic, to believe that the various measures which have been adopted to combat the disease, have been instrumental in producing so desirable a result. Upon the appearance of Cholera in the East of London, a special meeting of this Board was convened, and it was resolved to empower the Sanitary Committee to take immediate steps, to check, if possible, the progress of the Epidemic, and in conformity with the directions of the Privy Council, the following arrangements were made. Two additional Medical Visitors were appointed to devote their whole time to the performance of duties apportioned to them: also three Inspectors of Nuisances; four Chemists to supply all medicines prescribed for the sick poor gratuitously, and a place of accommodation for the reception of persons attacked by the disease was provided. A house-to-house inspection was instituted, and in three months the whole of the District was visited once, and many portions of it several times. In addition to the services of the Medical Officers of the Union, the Medical Visitors reported over 3,000 attendances upon persons suffering from Diarrhœa and Cholera, and over 2,000 separate cases of Diarrhœa and 75 of Choleraic Diarrhœa were prescribed for. Disinfectants were gratuitously supplied to poor persons who chose to apply for them, and liberally used by the Inspectors. The Medical Visitors were empowered to administer wine and brandy, and various forms of nourishment, in such cases as they deemed fit. Whenever necessary the compulsory powers of the Board were exercised in the removal of nuisances, and the destruction of whatever was likely to carry infection.

The amount of Sanitary work done will be found fully recorded in the Statistical Table appended to this report. Notwithstanding however the large amount of time and labor expended upon Sanitary measures, it is satisfactory to record that the district was at first found to contrast favorably with that of former epidemic periods, and that there was a very general desire on the part of the inhabitants to second the efforts of your Officers.



Mr. Horley, as an Assistant Inspector of Nuisances, in one of his Reports to me, says: "It was part of my duty, during the last season of Cholera, to visit and point out to Dr. Greenhow, who was appointed to this District from the Board of Health, some of the poorer and most unhealthy portions of the two Parishes; and, contrasting the state of things then existing with what I have observed during my visits this year, I can testify to the great improvement that has taken place. The inhabitants generally are alive to the importance of clean water and clean closets, and, excepting where some fear exists of offending the landlord, show a laudable desire to aid in abating nuisances. Conspicuous among present evils is overcrowding. This probably exists in a greater degree than in 1854, for the difficulty of obtaining house room induces tenants to tolerate evils of which they would otherwise complain. In many parts of the District the pressure on the water is insufficient to carry it to the level of the closet, and, consequently, there is no connection between them. A want of cleanliness is most apparent in houses let in tenements, where I usually found the tenants could not agree as to their respective share in the necessary duty of cleansing. It appears to me desirable that all houses of that class should be periodically visited. Another prominent evil is the accumulation of dust and offal. The poorer classes complain of the fees that are exacted for its removal, and the absolute refusal to remove anything but dust without pay, so that the matter most injurious to health is frequently allowed to remain behind. These, however, are small evils compared with those existing in 1853-54. I remember the case of one court containing twelve houses, where the cellars of eight of them were literally filled with drainage from the privies, and it was necessary to issue eight summonses against the owner before the filth was removed. There was then scarcely anywhere the same appreciation of the value of a good supply of clean water, and the importance of its constant use in preserving health."

The total number of deaths in the District during the year was 910, which is 23 less than the average of ten years, but 122 more than were registered in the year 1865. In this total, 35 persons are included who died in Guy's Hospital, but were not previously resident in the District. In the previous year there were only 18 deaths of the same class. It must be observed that last year showed a lower mortality than any of the ten of which this Board has any record, and that in the year now under review, this District does not appear to disadvantage compared with the rest of London. The mortality of St. Saviour's was in the ratio of about 25 to every 1,000 living persons, in the South District about 27, and in the whole of London 28. These estimates are based upon the population of 1861. The increase shows itself among persons of all ages, excepting those above 80 years, in which class there was a decrease of 9 deaths.



In the Workhouse of the Union there were 95 deaths during the year. A large number of these were persons sent there in a hopeless state of disease, to secure for their last days comforts which could not be obtained at home.

The death rate from Whooping Cough and Measles still continues high, and no abatement can be fairly anticipated until the home accommodation of the poor is considerably improved and extended. This is the great want of the District, and the most difficult to remedy.

During the past year ten persons died of Small Pox in this District. Notwithstanding the energetic measures adopted by the Guardians of the Poor to insure efficient Vaccination, it is to be feared that this safeguard against its virulence is, in many cases, neglected, or the operation imperfectly performed. I have more than once referred to the fact that the Statistics of the Small Pox Hospital for ten years prove that, of vaccinated persons, only 7 per cent. die, while the per centage of persons not vaccinated is 36; and there can be no doubt that this mortality would be still lower if more care was exhibited by many operators to insure a successful issue. The peculiarly loathsome character of this epidemic justifies the application of stringent measures for its extirpation, and it is worthy of consideration whether this desirable result would not be effected by the appointment of an independent Inspector for each District, whose duty it should be to certify to the success or otherwise of every case contained in the books of the Public Vaccinator.

Forty-three Coroner's Inquests were held during the year, principally respecting persons whose deaths had been caused by violent or accidental causes.

The number of births registered in the year was 1079, being 169 in excess of the deaths.

I have now, gentlemen, gone through the principal points suggested by the tables which I beg to submit to you for perusal, and although my Report is not so favorable in regard to the health of the District as some others have been, it affords grounds for thankfulness that we have passed through an epidemic season without those fearful visitations of death which were experienced in former years.

It is again my pleasing duty to conclude by expressing my thanks to the Board and its Officers for their hearty co-operation and kindness during the past year. And I venture to suggest, that your commendation is particularly due to Mr. Errington, the Inspector, for the energy he has displayed in the discovery and abatement of nuisances, and in carrying out the suggestions of the Board and its Officers; especially as the zealous manner in which he accepted the responsibility of his position resulted in a temporary loss of health.
