To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the

Metropolitan Borough of Stepney.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report of the Health and Sanitary condition of the Borough for the year 1901.

Population.

The census was taken in March, and I have taken the liberty of extracting some of the particulars from the Registrar-General's report.

The population was 298,600, which shows an increase of 13,484 over that in 1891, and of 2,892 over the enumeration in 1896.

The number of births in the intercensal period, 1891–1901, was 112,697, and the number of deaths was 68,241. The increase of births over deaths was 44,456, but as the total increase was 13,484 there was really a loss of 30,972 by migration.

The population consists of 150,711 males and 147,889 females; an excess of 2,822 males. Under 10 years of age there are 215 more females than males, but over 10 years of age there are 3,037 more males than females.

There are 113,855 males over 10 years of age, 96,650 being engaged in some occupation, and 17,205 being retired or unoccupied.

There are 110,818 females over 10 years of age, 40,446 being engaged in some occupation, 12,087 of them being married or widows.

Table A shows that there has been an increase in the population in all the parishes with the exception of the Old Artillery Ground, Ratcliff, St. Botolph Without and the Tower of London. In all these there has been a slight decrease.

Wapping has been practically stationary.

The most marked increase has been in St. George's-in-the-East.

Though there has been an increase in the four Sanitary Districts as a whole, there has not been the same increase as in the previous intercensal periods. The effect of that has been that the estimated population for the last four years has been incorrect. For the purpose of calculating the birth and death rates, the population at the two previous censuses are taken, and for every succeeding year after the census, the population is estimated by logarithms, taking for granted the rate of increase will be the same as in the intercensal period. The population in Limehouse was over-estimated by 2,963; in Mile End by 6,956; and in Whitechapel by 6,366. In St. George's it was under-estimated by 3,090.

The practical importance of this is that the birth rates in Limehouse, Mile End and Whitechapel were much lower and the death rates were much higher than actually stated. In St. George's the reverse was the case; the birth rates were higher and the death rates lower than were officially stated.

It also proves that there has been greater immigration into St. George's than in the rest of the District, but as this leads to the question of overcrowding it will be dealt with later.

The following table taken from the Registrar-General's report shews the increase during the last century in the various districts in London.





In 17 Boroughs the population has increased as since 1896, and in 13 it has decreased.



Births.

The births registered during the year numbered 11,052, which consisted of 5,562 males and 5,490 females.

- 1,891 were registered in the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 32.6 per 1,000.
- 4,184 were registered in the Mile End District, or at the rate of 37 per 1,000.
- 2,119 were registered in the St. George's District, or at the rate of 43·1 per 1,000.
- 2,858 were registered in the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 36.2 per 1,000.

This corresponds to a birth rate of 37 per 1,000 of the population for the whole of the Borough, the average for the last ten years being 38 per 1,000.

Marriages.

The marriages during the year numbered 2,724.

The proportion of persons married was 18 per 1,000 of the population.

If the number of marriages be any criterion as to the prosperity of a District, then Mile End is the most prosperous,

and St. George's is the least. I think the immigration of young married people is, however, responsible for the low marriage rate and high birth rate in St. George's.

The registered deaths, exclusive of those non-residents which occurred in the Public Institutions situated in the Borough but inclusive of those residents which occurred in Out-lying Institutions, numbered 6,217. This corresponds to a death rate of 20.8 per 1,000 of the population.

Though the death rate for the Limehouse District is '9 per 1,000 less than in the previous year, and also less by the same number than the average for the last 10 years, it is very much above that of the other parts of the District.

The death rate is therefore high amongst children under 5 years of age, low between 5 and 15, and again very low between 15 and 25. It is also low between 25 to 45 or 50, and then gradually rises. The nearer the age to 25 the lower will be the death rate; the higher the age approaches 65 the higher will be the death rate, so that taking all the ages between 25 and 65 it will approximate to the ordinary death rate for all ages.

The death rate among persons above 65 years of age is very high. This table shows that the larger the number of people between the ages of 5 and 35 or 40 the lower will be the death rate. The following gives the percentage of people at the various ages:—






Small Pox.

Vaccination has been discarded, and the Vaccination Acts have been systematically evaded for many years, in the various parishes comprising the Borough of Stepney, that it is no wonder an epidemic of Small Pox has broken out among its teeming thousands.

The first case in the epidemic did not occur till the middle of September, though several cases occurred in the rest of London in the early part of August. Two isolated cases occurred, one in January and the other in June, and though all the surroundings favoured the spread of the disease, no second case occurred.

From September 21st to December 31st, 168 cases occurred, and 31 proved fatal.

Forty-two—or one-fourth—occurred in common lodging houses—39 in Whitechapel, and 3 in St. George's.

Nine occurred in the Whitechapel Infirmary. Of the remainder—

42 occurred in the Limehouse District.

One was vaccinated in infancy and 32 years ago, the remaining three were doubtful. The ages of the doubtful cases were $10\frac{1}{2}$, 50 and 60. None proved fatal.

No child under 10 years of age that had been vaccinated in infancy, and no person over 10 years of age that had been re-vaccinated within the previous ten years, contracted Small Pox.

Of the 22 persons between 10 and 20 years of age that had been vaccinated in infancy not one proved fatal.

Of the 45 unvaccinated persons under 20 years of age attacked, 11 proved fatal—or nearly 25 per cent.

The death rate at all ages among those vaccinated in infancy only was 14.4 per cent., and 29.1 per cent. among those that had never been vaccinated.

As soon as a case of Small Pox was notified to me, I visited the premises and made inquiries as to the source of infection. The names of all the children were taken and the schools communicated with. The names of the employers of all those that had been in contact with the patient were written to, and were kept under observation for 14 days. The names and addresses of persons that had visited the premises were also obtained, and the Medical Officer of Health for the district was informed. I personally visited the houses, and examined all the persons living in the house at least twice a

week. The Inspectors made daily visits, and if anyone appeared ill, or kept to his bed, the Inspector immediately called my attention to the fact, and I called to examine him. In this way I discovered cases where no doctor had been called in to the patient. All the people in the house were urged to be at once vaccinated, and the rooms were fumigated. The paper was stripped from the walls, and the clothing, &c., was disinfected by steam. In some cases the bedding was in such a filthy condition that it was burnt.

In 29 houses all the persons in the house not protected by vaccination were immediately re-vaccinated, and not in a single instance did a second case occur. In 2 houses where re-vaccination was not performed for 6 and 9 days respectively after exposure to the disease, second cases occurred. In 33 houses the people absolutely refused to be re-vaccinated, and in 24 of these second and third cases occurred. In 9 houses only there was no recurrence. I consider that when a case of Small Pox has occurred, it ought to be compulsory on the rest of the family to be at once vaccinated.

I give below full particulars of all the cases. Where it is not stated that the patient died, he recovered. Where no second case is quoted, it may be taken for granted that no other case occurred in that house.

- 17, Batty Gardens.—Annie Delinsky, aged 16, was taken ill on January 20th and removed to the Small Pox Hospital on January 23rd. She was vaccinated in infancy only. The other people in the house were immediately re-vaccinated.
- 25, Heneage Street.—John Cohen, aged 3, was taken ill on June 6th, and removed to the Hospital on June 10th. He was not vaccinated. This family consisted of the parents and another child in addition to the patient. They were immediately vaccinated. The room they lived in was illegally occupied, as it was an underground one, and was overcrowded as well. It was also used as a work-room as well as a living-room and bedroom. Certain articles of underclothing were being manufactured at the time, and I distinctly informed the father,

through an interpreter, that he was not on any consideration to take away anything from the room until it had been disinfected by us. In spite of this he removed some of the things, and some were subsequently discovered in the yard at the rear of the premises. He was summoned for this offence and he was fined the maximum penalty of £5 and 23s. costs.

14, Antcliff Street.—H. C. Ballard, aged 21, a printer's ruler, was taken ill on September 17th and removed to the hospital on September 21st. He was vaccinated in infancy only. Vaccination was urged on the rest of the family, but they refused to have it done. Annie Ballard, aged 19, sister of the above, was taken ill on October 3rd and removed to the hospital on October 5th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

204, Wentworth Buildings, Goulston Street.—Leah Cohen, aged 17, cigar maker, was taken ill on September 18th and removed to the hospital on September 22nd. She was vaccinated in infancy only. This family consisted of the mother and four daughters living at the above address, and two daughters—one married—living at 32, Scarborough Street. Vaccination was urged on the rest of the family as well as on the other people living on the same landing. This patient was discharged from the hospital on October 14th. Her sister, Miriam Cohen, aged 14, and Philip Green, aged 23, who lived at number 207 (on the same landing) were taken ill on October 26th and removed to the hospital on October 31st. Both were vaccinated in infancy only.

Adelaide Cohen, aged 10, attended the Jewish Free School on October 21st as well as on the 22nd and the morning of the 23rd. She did not attend in the afternoon of the 23rd, and the teacher was informed that she was suffering from a slight cold. On October 28th, Mrs. Cohen called to see the teacher, and told her that her daughter was all right and would attend school in a day or two. The teacher advised Mrs. Cohen to keep her at home for a few days longer. On October 31st I informed the teacher that there was another case of Small Pox at number 20t, and I again stopped the children from going to

school. When I called to examine the rest of the family on that and the following day, Adelaide Cohen was out. My opinion now is, that she was deliberately kept out of sight. This happened on subsequent days, but on November 13th I was informed that she was suffering from a rash, and I waited until she returned home. I examined her and found that she was suffering from Small Pox. She was at once removed to the hospital. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

32, Scarborough Street.—Barnet Finkelstein, aged 26—Mrs. Cohen's son-in-law—was taken ill on November 3rd and removed to the hospital on November 9th. He had been vaccinated in infancy only. Sarah Cohen, aged 21, who had gone to 32, Scarborough Street (to nurse her sister who was about to be confined), was taken ill on November 9th and removed to the hospital on November 10th. She died on November 20th. She had never been vaccinated.

Mrs. Finkelstein was urged to be vaccinated, but refused. She was confined on November 16th, and the baby developed Small Pox 12 days afterwards, and died on November 28th. The baby was not vaccinated.

205, Wentworth Buildings (on the same landing as No. 204).—Louis De Haan, aged 12, was taken ill on November 10th and removed to the hospital on November 14th. He had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Alexander Green, aged 21, was taken ill on November 13th and removed to the hospital on November 16th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. On November 15th a doctor was called to 207, Wentworth Buildings to see Alexander Green, who was suffering from Small Pox, but he was not asked to see anyone else of that family. The notification was received by me on the 16th, and the patient was removed on the same day. The sanitary inspector immediately called, and upon enquiry found that Louis Green was ill in bed, but he was distinctly told that there was no one else ill. Later in the afternoon I visited the premises and discovered that Louis, aged 9, and Deborah, aged 13, were suffering from Small Pox. I found that Deborah Green had been suffering from the disease for

several days, and that the rash had appeared on the twelfth. I taxed the parents with knowing that the children were suffering from Small Pox, and after a great deal of hesitation they admitted that they knew on November 12th that the girl was suffering from the disease, but as she was the only daughter they did not ask the doctor to see her, as they did not want her to be removed to the hospital.

Proceedings were taken against the father for not notifying the disease to me. He pleaded guilty. He was fined £2—the maximum penalty—and 25s. costs.

Deborah Green was vaccinated in infancy only, but Louis had never been vaccinated. He died on November 21st.

On November 24th, John De Haan, aged 6, was taken ill, and removed to the hospital on the following day. He was not vaccinated.

114, Backchurch Lane.—Samuel Morris, aged 23 (who was keeping company with Sarah Cohen), fell ill on November 21st, and was removed to the hospital on November 26th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Lena De Haan, aged 5, was taken ill on November 24th, and removed to the hospital on November 27th. She was not vaccinated.

These three families consisted of 28 persons. Of these 20 were over 10 years of age, and 8 were under 10. 19 out of the 20 had been vaccinated in infancy only, and of these 9 contracted Small Pox; but not one died. 1 had never been vaccinated and she died. Of the 8 children under 10, 3 had been vaccinated and none contracted Small Pox. Of the remaining 5, 3 had Small Pox and 1 died.

70, Ernest Street.—G. Robinson, aged 34, worked with people from an infected area on the Charing Cross Electric Light Works at Aldgate. He was taken ill on September 19th and removed on September 22nd; he died on September 30th. He was not vaccinated. His wife was immediately re-vaccinated. They had no children. There was another family in

the house, consisting of father, mother and 5 children, as well as 2 adult lodgers. They were all immediately re-vaccinated. No other case occurred.

86, Anthony Street.—G. Capon, aged 31, was taken ill on September 21st and removed on September 27th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

17, St. Thomas's Road.—Alfred Cecil, aged 40, visited 86, Anthony Street on September 28th. He was taken ill on October 12th and removed on October 14th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

86, Anthony Street.—Margaret Capon, aged 30, was taken ill on October 12th and removed on October 18th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

17, St. Thomas's Road.—Arthur Capon, aged 25, was taken ill on October 26th and removed on October 28th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

86, Anthony Street.—Carry Christian, aged 8, was taken ill on October 27th and removed on November 1st. She was not vaccinated. The parents refused to have her vaccinated when the other cases occurred.

22, Spencer Street.—Mary Hughes, aged 4 months, was taken ill on October 1st and removed to the hospital on October 3rd; she died on October 5th. She was not vaccinated. There were 2 adults and 3 children over 10 years of age in the family who were vaccinated in infancy only. 2 children under 10 years of age were not vaccinated. The parents refused to have them vaccinated.

Alfred Hughes, aged 10½, was taken ill on October 4th and removed to the hospital on October 7th. He was stated to be vaccinated in infancy, but the marks were not visible.

Sarah Hughes, aged 3, was taken ill on October 13th and removed on October 15th. She was not vaccinated.

40, Blount Street.—Mary Tucker, aged 19, was taken ill on October 8th and removed on October 12th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. The rest of the people in the house refused to be re-vaccinated.

Louisa Wingfield, aged 28 (sister of the above), fell ill on November 11th and was removed on November 15th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Alfred Tucker was taken ill some time after his wife was removed, and was nursed by Louisa Wingfield. He was attended by a medical man, but his illness was not diagnosed correctly.

When Louisa Wingfield was notified, I visited her and found that Alfred Tucker, aged 21, was at work. I waited until he came home. In my opinion he had Small Pox, and was on the date of my visit still in an infectious condition. He was removed to the hospital on November 18th.

5, Regent's Place.—Elizabeth Bowen, aged 6, suffered from Chicken Pox on September 27th. A doctor was called to see her. He treated her till the rash disappeared. Soon afterwards a second rash appeared, and the parents mistaking it for a recurrence of the Chicken Pox, did not trouble to call in a doctor till October 13th, when she was found to be suffering from Small Pox. The medical man on his arrival found in addition, that Annie, aged 12, had died from Hæmorrhagic Small Pox, and that Norah, aged 7; Mary, aged 14; Ellen, aged 9; Cornelius, aged 17; and Thomas, aged 2, were also suffering from the same disease. None of them had been vaccinated, and curiously enough the parents had never registered their births.

On the following day Mary Casey, aged 45, a relative, was removed to the hospital. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Though the house is a small one, two other families occupied rooms in it. One family consisted of the parents and two children aged 4 and 2. Both these children had been vaccinated in infancy.

Though no other cases developed in the house, others were traced to it, namely: John Lerner, aged 10, of 12, Parnham Street, and T. Tallantye, aged 7, of 24, Copenhagen Place.

Both these children attended the same school and were in

the same class as Annie Bowen. Annie Bowen was ill in school and was sent home. Neither Lerner nor Tallantye had been vaccinated. Most of the other members of the class were vaccinated.

29, Brook Street.—Frederick Smart, aged 1, was taken ill on the 11th October and was removed to hospital on October 15th. He was not vaccinated and he died on October 21st.

Kate Gilbert, aged 11, was taken ill on October 27th and removed on October 30th. She was vaccinated on October 21st, or 6 days after the removal of the first patient. The rest of the family were re-vaccinated.

18, Oley Place.—Harry Sclater, aged 44, was taken ill on October 21st and removed on October 27th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. The patient's wife and child as well as 5 other people in the house were immediately re-vaccinated.

63, Brushfield Street.—Ada Draper, aged 15, was taken ill on October 24th and removed on October 27th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. Nine other girls slept at the Shelter, and they were all immediately successfully re-vaccinated, with the exception of her sister who was unsuccessfully done.

51, Spencer Street.—Henry Lane, aged 4, was taken ill on October 24th and removed on October 29th. He died on November 2nd, the only child not vaccinated in the family. In this family the parents, with 2 children over 10 years of age and 3 under 10, were vaccinated in infancy.

Charles Shepherd, aged 4, of the same address, was taken ill on November 7th and removed on November 10th. He was not vaccinated. Reuben, aged 5 months, and Emma, aged 3 years were vaccinated on October 31st; the parents were vaccinated in infancy. The parents and two children under 10 were immediately re-vaccinated. Charles was the only one that contracted the disease.

2, Railway Place, York Road.—Lydia Miller, aged 4, Albert, aged 6, and Louisa, aged 12, were taken ill on October 31st and removed on November the 3rd. Lydia and Albert were unvaccinated, and Louisa had been vaccinated in infancy only. Albert died on November 9th. There were no other children in the house, and the parents were immediately re-vaccinated.

St. George's Casual Ward.—Charles Stockton, aged 30, was taken ill on November 6th, and removed on November 9th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Charles Knapman, aged 46, admitted from 106, St. George Street (a common lodging house). The rash appeared on November 18th, and he was removed on November 19th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on November 28th.

Whitechapel Infirmary.—John Harlington, aged 30, was removed to the hospital from the casual ward on October 27th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Thomas Sutton, aged 50, admitted to the infirmary from the Victoria Home on November 12th. He fell ill on November 9th, and was removed on November 13th. He was vaccinated in infancy, and re-vaccinated in 1870. He had slept at the Victoria Home since October 31st.

Isabella McQuinn, aged 34, fell ill on November 9th, and was removed to hospital on November 17th. She had slept at the Salvation Army Shelter, Hanbury Street, for the previous three months, and removed to the infirmary on November 16th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

John McQuinn, aged 42, was brought to the infirmary from 41, Commercial Street on November 19th, complaining that he was not very well. The rash appeared on November 27th, and he was removed to the hospital on the same day.

Alfred Vercoe, aged 67, was admitted to the infirmary on October 18th. He left the infirmary for South Grove Workhouse on November 14th. He was re-admitted on November 26th, on the day that he was taken ill. The rash appeared on November 28th, and he was removed to the hospital on the same date. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

William Clark, aged 5, was admitted to the infirmary on October 2nd. He was taken ill on the 26th of November, and removed to the hospital on November 28th. He was not vaccinated.

Elizabeth Gallagher, aged 59, was admitted on November 28th, and removed on the same day. The last night she slept in a bed was at the Salvation Army Shelter on the night of November 15th, which was the last night Mrs. McQuinn slept at the Shelter. Since that date Mrs. Gallagher slept in the streets, and on the landing of 107, Wentworth Street on November 28th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Mary Brookland, aged 36, was admitted to the infirmary from the Salvation Army Shelter on November 29th, and removed to the hospital on November 30th. She died on December 10th. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Ellen King, aged 70, was admitted from 35, Dorset Street (common lodging house) on November 27th, and removed to the hospital on November 30th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Dora Reed, aged 40, was admitted to the infirmary from 15, Great Pearl Street (common lodging house), and removed to the hospital on December 2nd. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died on December 12th.

Ellen Smith, aged 42, was admitted to the infirmary from the Salvation Army Shelter on December 4th (the rash having appeared on the 2nd), and was removed to the hospital on the same day. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Emily Smith, aged 35, was admitted from the Salvation Army Shelter on December 2nd, and removed to the hospital on December 4th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

George Jones, aged 40, became an in-patient at the infirmary on September 6th. He was taken ill on December 2nd, and was removed to the hospital on December 5th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

John Nicholson, aged 43, was admitted from 43, Crispin Street (common lodging house) on December the 8th, and was removed on the same day to the hospital. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on December 16th.

George Button, aged 23, had been an inmate of the infirmary since September 19th. He was taken ill on December 7th, and removed to the hospital on December 9th. He had been vaccinated in infancy only. He died on December 21st.

David Tucker, aged 44, was admitted from 43, Crispin Street (common lodging house) on December 11th, and was removed to the hospital on the same day. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Jacob Miller, aged 39, was an inmate since October 31st, and was in the same ward as William Clark. He was taken ill on December 13th, and removed to the hospital on December 14th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on January 11th, 1902.

Alexander Douglas, aged 30, was admitted on December 16th, from 15, Little Pearl Street. He was removed to the hospital on December 17th. He had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Nellie Field, aged 11, was an in-patient since December 3rd. She was taken ill on December 16th and removed to the hospital on December 17th. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Thomas Gardiner, aged 62, had been in the infirmary since November 18th. He was taken ill on December 15th and removed on December 17th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Ada Studd, aged 41, was admitted to the infirmary on December 14th and removed on December 16th. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Alfred Murray, aged 48, had been an in-patient since November 21st. He was taken ill on December 15th, and removed to the hospital on December 18th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on December 25th. Army Shelter on December 16th and removed to the hospital on the same day. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died on December 18th.

Jane Lucas, aged 32, was admitted from the Salvation Army Shelter on December 16th and removed on the same day. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

George Watson, aged 32, was admitted from the Salvation Army Shelter on December 16th and removed on the same day. He had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Mary Lyons, aged 52, was a scrubber in the infirmary. She had been at work in a ward from which persons had been removed to the hospital suffering from Small Pox. She was taken ill on December 13th, and removed on December 16th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Clara Hall, aged 3, was admitted from 50, Crispin Street (common lodging house), on December 18th and removed to the hospital on December 19th. She had never been vaccinated.

Mary Shea, aged 44, was admitted from 35, Dorset Street (common lodging house), on December 20th, and removed to the hospital on the same date. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Annie Wilson, aged 42, was admitted from the Salvation Army Shelter on December 24th and removed to the hospital on the same date. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Thomas McQuire, aged 63, was admitted from 1, Heneage Street (common lodging house), on December 26th and removed on the same day. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Emily Durham, aged 46, was admitted on December 26th from 56, Flower and Dean Street (common lodging house), and removed to the hospital on the same day. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

James Perkins, aged 22, was admitted on December 27th from 177, Whitechapel Road (common lodging house), and was removed to the hospital on the same day. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on January 1st, 1902.

James Duprey, aged 41, was admitted on December 27th

from 1, Heneage Street (common lodging house), and removed on the same day. He was vaccinated in infancy only. He died on January 2nd, 1902.

63, Spencer Street.—Sidney Take, aged 18 months, was taken ill on November 9th and removed on November 13th. He was not vaccinated. The parents were vaccinated in infancy only. They had five other children all unvaccinated. The eldest, aged 13, was taken ill and removed to the Small Pox Observation Ward from the London Hospital. He was returned to the London Hospital, as it was believed he was suffering from Peritonitis and not from Small Pox. A postmortem examination revealed the fact that he died from Hæmorrhagic Small Pox.

113, Salmon Lane.—Kate Louisa Gower, aged 42, fell ill on November 11th and removed on November 15th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died on November 18th. The husband, children, servant and shop girls were immediately revaccinated.

5, Thomas Street, Ratcliff.—Rebecca Macdonald, aged 28, fell ill on November 12th and removed on November 15th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She had 3 children all under 10 who had been vaccinated.

23, Halley Street.—Alfred Deaves, aged 15, who fell ill on November 13th and was removed to hospital on November 14th. He was not vaccinated. There were 3 children under 10 and 7 persons over 10 living in this house beside the patient. They were immediately vaccinated.

9, Jupps Road.—Amelia Pitman, aged 10 months, fell ill on November 12th and was removed on November 18th. She was not vaccinated, and died on November 21st. Vaccination was refused by the rest of the family.

Joseph Pitman, aged 5, fell ill on November 11th and was removed on November 18th. He was not vaccinated.

Alice Pitman, aged 10, was taken ill on November 23rd and removed on November 25th. She was not vaccinated.

Frederick Mills, aged 21, was taken ill on November 25th and removed to the hospital on November 28th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Clara Mills, aged 23, was taken ill on November 23rd and removed on November 28th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died on December 7th.

Annie Johnson, aged 19, was taken ill on November 28th and removed on December 4th. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

29, Maroon Street.—Alice Pearson, aged 7, was taken ill on November 15th and was removed to the hospital on November 20th. She was not vaccinated. She died. There were 4 other children in the family who were all unvaccinated. In this house there was a man of the name of Groves. On the first occasion the name of the father and mother were given as the only persons in the family. Later on it was discovered that they had two sons. Both developed Small Pox, but as the father was a cowman and would have been stopped from work if the fact was known, the second case was not reported, and a medical man was not called in to see him.

Albert Pearson, aged 3½, was taken ill on November 26th, and removed on December 1st.

George F. Pearson, aged 5½, was taken ill on the 27th and was removed on December 1st.

James H. Pearson, aged 8, was taken ill on November 27th and removed on the 1st December.

William Groves, aged 24, was taken ill on December 1st and removed on December 4th.

Frederick Groves, aged 22, was taken ill about December 13th and removed on December 31st.

The last two were vaccinated in infancy only.

Mr. and Mrs. Pearson were re-vaccinated.

For being in charge of a person suffering from Small Pox and not reporting the fact Mrs. Groves was fined £5 and 23s. costs, and the son for exposing himself whilst in an infectious condition was fined £2 and 23s. costs.

8, Entick Street.—Thomas Perkins, aged 18, was taken ill on November 13th and removed on November 20th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. In this house there were 8 over 10 and 2 under 10 years of age who had been vaccinated in infancy only, and 1 under 10 who had not been vaccinated. Vaccination was refused.

Maud Perkins, aged 12, was taken ill on November 29th and removed on December 2nd. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

Samuel Perkins, of 3, Argyle Road, aged 26, a relation of the above, often visited 8, Entick Street. He was taken ill on November 30th and removed to the hospital on December 4th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Caroline Bishop, of 40, Stayners Road, aged 27, was taken ill on November 27th and was removed to the hospital on November 29th. She had been vaccinated in infancy only. This patient frequently visited 8, Entick Street and no doubt contracted the disease at that place.

There was another family living at this house consisting of 5 children, all vaccinated in infancy, and 2 adults who were recently re-vaccinated.

Mr. Bishop, the husband of the last patient, moved to Bethnal Green and contracted Small Pox a fortnight later.

- 37, London Street.—Lawrence Brennan, aged 22, was taken ill on November 18th and removed on November 21st. He was vaccinated in infancy and 12 years previous to the present attack. There were 3 others in this family who had not been vaccinated. They were immediately re-vaccinated and no other case occurred.
- 13, Endive Street.—Sophia Warne, aged 24, was taken ill on November 21st and removed on November 25th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. There were 6 others in the house, all vaccinated in infancy. None had been re-vaccinated except Edwin Warne, who was re-vaccinated 24 years ago.

William Warne, aged 21, was taken ill on December 7th and removed to the hospital on December 8th. He was vacciuated in infancy only. He died on December 15th.

Frederick Warne, aged 16, was taken ill on December 7th and removed to the hospital on December 8th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

4, Tenter Street North.—Emanuel Kloot, aged 30, was taken ill on November 23rd and removed to hospital on November 28th. He was vaccinated in infancy. His wife and 3 children who were under 10 were all vaccinated in infancy. In addition to these, 2 adults and 5 children under 10 years of age lived in this house. These were vaccinated in infancy.

Jane Kloot, aged 30, was taken ill on December 9th and removed to the hospital on December 13th. She was vaccinated in infancy and again on December 5th, or at least 9 days after she had contracted the disease.

36, Moody Street.—Thomas Howard, aged 53, was taken ill on November 24th and removed to the hospital on November 30th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. The wife and 4 children, who were all over 20 years of age, were vaccinated in infancy; they were all urged to be re-vaccinated but they refused.

Ann Howard, aged 50, was taken ill on December 8th and removed to the hospital on December 11th. She died on December 15th.

Ann Howard, aged 23, was taken ill on December 15th and removed to the hospital on December 19th.

John James Howard, aged 26, was taken ill on December 25th and was removed to the hospital on December 27th.

2, Mason's Court, Gt. Garden Street.—William Darby, aged 27, was taken ill on November 28th and removed to the hospital on November 29th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. Two adults and 3 children under 10 years of age who had been vaccinated in infancy also lived in this house.

116, Eastfield Street.—Margaret Evans, aged 16, was taken ill on November 28th and removed to the hospital on November 30th. She had visited a friend a fortnight previously at 53, Park Street, Poplar, who was afterwards found to be suffering

from Small Pox. She was vaccinated in infancy only. In addition to the mother of the patient there was another family in the house, consisting of the parents, who had been vaccinated in infancy, and 5 children who had never been vaccinated. They were all immediately revaccinated, and no other case occurred in the house.

15, Jupps Road.—Joseph Thornton, aged 11, was taken ill on November 26th, and removed to the hospital on November 30th. He was not vaccinated. In addition to the parents, who had been vaccinated in infancy only, there were 2 other children both unvaccinated.

8, North Place, Buxton Street.—John Carter, age 22, was taken ill on November 29th, and removed to the hospital on December 1st. He was vaccinated in infancy. In addition to the parents there were 3 other adults in this house, all vaccinated in infancy. They were all immediately re-vaccinated.

1, Heneage Street (common lodging-house).—Patrick Donovan, aged 49, was taken ill on November 30th, and removed to the hospital on December 3rd. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Edward Collingwood Brown, aged 49, was taken ill on December 14th, and removed to the hospital on December 15th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

George Buckingham, aged 42, was taken ill on December 16th, and removed on December 17th. He died on December 28th. He had never been vaccinated.

John Barnes, aged 40, was taken ill on December 26th, and removed on December 30th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

John Jones, aged 50, was taken ill on December 27th, and removed on December 30th. It is not known whether he was vaccinated or not.

George Partridge, aged 26, was taken ill on December 27th, and removed on December 30th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Edward Nixon, aged 37, was taken ill on December 28th, and removed on December 30th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Edward Graham, aged 26, was taken ill on December 27th, and removed on December 29th. He was vaccinated in infancy only (two scars). He died on January 6th, 1902.

Edward Hawkins, aged 41, was taken ill on December 27th, and removed on December 29th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

Charles Davidson, aged 20, was taken ill on December 27th, and removed on December 31st. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

48, Longfellow Road.—William Everett, aged 3, was taken ill on November 29th, and removed to the hospital on December 4th. He was not vaccinated. This child used to visit his grandmother at 9, Jupp's Road, where he contracted the disease. There were 6 other persons in the house, all above 10 years of age, and all vaccinated in infancy. They were urged to be re-vaccinated but refused.

Sarah E. Everett, aged 25 (mother of William Everett), was taken ill on December 12th, and removed to the hospital on December 14th.

Mary Ann Matheson, aged 20, was taken ill on December 12th, and was removed to the hospital on December 16th. She was vaccinated in infancy.

Maud Matheson, aged 11, was taken ill on December 14th, and removed to the hospital on December 18th. She was vaccinated in infancy.

Elizabeth Hiron, aged 20, was taken ill on December 16th, and removed to hospital on December 19th. She was vaccinated in infancy.

The only other people in the house were Mr. and Mrs. Matheson, and they were re-vaccinated the day their children were removed to the hospital.

190, Rhodeswell Road.—Emma Clara Lee, aged 15, was taken ill on December 1st, and removed to hospital on December 3rd. This family consisted of 10 children in

addition to the patient; but she was the only unvaccinated child. All above 10 years of age were immediately revaccinated.

38, Blount Street.—Thomas Marshall, aged 20, was taken ill on December 2nd, and removed on December 7th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. The parents, and one daughter aged 18, were vaccinated in infancy.

Thomas Marshall, aged 49, was taken ill on December 18th, and removed on December 24th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

30, Halley Street.—Emma Cope, aged 35, was taken ill on December 5th, and was removed to the hospital on December 8th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She came from 29, Crooks Road, Deptford, on December 5th, and was ill when she arrived. She had 2 children, one was 9 years of age vaccinated 2 years ago, and another 2 years of age vaccinated in infancy.

50, Spencer Street.—Amy Maddams, aged 12 months, was taken ill on December 3rd, and removed to the hospital on December 9th. She died on January, 8th, 1902. She had not been vaccinated. She was the only child. The parents were vaccinated in infancy and refused to be re-vaccinated.

Herbert Maddams, aged 23, was taken ill on December 19th, and removed to the hospital on December 22nd.

Amy Maddams, aged 23, was taken ill on December 20th, and removed to the hospital on December 23rd.

61, Church Row.—Walter Westbrook, aged 21, was taken ill on November 27th and was too ill to be removed. He died on December 3rd. He had been vaccinated in infancy only. He contracted the disease at 13, Endive Street, where he was a frequent visitor. In the house lived 7 other adults and 1 child, all vaccinated in infancy. All were re-vaccinated except the father and sister who had contracted the disease some years ago.

132, Bow Common Lane.—Benjamin J. Weed, aged 26, was taken ill on December 4th, and removed to the hospital on December 9th. He was vaccinated in infancy. He had one child only, who was vaccinated in infancy. His wife refused to be re-vaccinated.

Mary Ann Weed, aged 24 (wife of the above), was taken ill on December 16th and removed on December 19th. The child did not have Small Pox.

85, Salmon Lane.—Clifford Fearne, aged 6, was taken ill on December 5th and removed to the hospital on December 11th. He was not vaccinated. The parents were vaccinated in infancy only. There were 2 other children, Thomas, aged 10, vaccinated in infancy, and Ethel, aged 9, vaccinated three times unsuccessfully.

Thomas Fearne, aged 33, was taken ill on December 21st, and removed to the hospital on December 27th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

107, Wentworth Street.—Ellen Bryan, aged 37, was taken ill on December 8th and removed to the hospital on December 13th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. This patient contracted the disease in a peculiar way. Mrs. Gallagher, who was actually suffering from Small Pox at the time, slept on the landing outside the bedroom door on November 28th. She left immediately Ellen Bryan opened the door. Ellen Bryan washed the landing soon afterwards.

73, South Grove Buildings.—Emma Sands, aged 35, was taken ill on December 9th and removed to the hospital on December 13th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died. The husband and 1 daughter aged 8 had been vaccinated in infancy. The remaining 3 children were unvaccinated. The father refused to have them vaccinated.

Mary Sands, aged 6, was taken ill on December 12th and removed to the hospital on December 15th.

Alice Sands, aged 8½, was taken ill on December 12th and removed to the hospital on December 15th.

John Sands, aged 13, was taken ill on December 17th and removed to the hospital on December 20th. All this family developed Small Pox, with the exception of the father and the only vaccinated child.

- 18, Osborn Street.—Leah Schwartz, aged 17, was taken ill on December 7th and removed to the hospital on December 15th. She was vaccinated in infancy. This patient was a cripple and had not been out of her room for months. She had not been visited by any friends for some weeks. She occupied her time in making cigarettes. The rest of the family were revaccinated.
- 24, Heneage Street.—Sophie Cohen, aged 19, was taken ill on December 13th and removed to the hospital on December 16th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. In addition to the parents there were 7 children over 10 and 1 under 10 years of age, all vaccinated in infancy. They were immediately re-vaccinated.
- 21, Portland Street.—Ernest Charles Ansell, aged 24, was taken ill on December 13th and removed on December 17th. He had been vaccinated in infancy. 5 other persons lived in the same house, all were vaccinated in infancy and immediately re-vaccinated.
- 11, Robert Street.—Jane Williamson, aged 17, was taken ill on December 15th and removed on December 17th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. There was one other child who had been vaccinated in infancy and recently re-vaccinated.
- 10, Hunt Place.—Samuel Lazarus, aged 14, was taken ill on December 14th and removed on December 17th. Patient had never been vaccinated. He died on December 26th. In addition to the father, who was vaccinated in infancy, there were 2 other children under 10 years of age; both were unvaccinated. They left this place soon afterwards, and I am

unable to verify whether they were afterwards vaccinated or developed Small Pox.

9, Market Buildings.—Lilian A. Innocent, aged 17, was taken ill on December 15th and removed on December 18th. She had been vaccinated in infancy. In addition to the father there were 5 other children who had been vaccinated in infancy. The father and children were immediately re-vaccinated.

Ellen King, an aunt of these children, visited them on December 3rd, when she kissed Lilian. She did not kiss the others. Ellen King was suffering from Small Pox at the time, and was removed to the hospital on the following day.

Salvation Army Shelter.—Mary Arrowsmith, aged 60, was taken ill on December 17th and removed to the hospital on December 18th. It is not known whether she was vaccinated or not.

Sarah Parr, aged 36, was taken ill on December 16th and removed on December 20th. She had been vaccinated in infancy only.

Selina Bryan, aged 27, was taken ill on December 27th and removed on December 31st. She was vaccinated in infancy only. She died on January 6th, 1902.

Ellen Bryan, aged 5 months, was taken ill on December 27th and removed with her mother on December 31st. She was not vaccinated.

Sarah Jones, aged 11, was taken ill on December 28th and removed on December 31st. She was vaccinated in infancy only.

11, Mulberry Street.—Benjamin Schwartz, aged 25, was kicked by a horse on November 25th and removed to the London Hospital on the same day. He was operated upon the same table that had just been used by a child who had been sent to the Small Pox Hospital and immediately returned to the London Hospital, as he was supposed to be suffering from Peritonitis and not from Small Pox. The child's brother had been a fortnight previously removed to the Small Pox Hospital. The child that had been returned and operated upon died. A

post-mortem examination was made, and it was found that he had died from Hæmorrhagic Small Pox. Twelve days after Schwartz was operated upon, he developed Small Pox and was removed to the Small Pox Hospital on December 9th. He died on December 25th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.

- 5, Brownson's Court, Gt. Alie Street.—Elizabeth Speyers, aged 29, was taken ill on December 23rd and removed on December 25th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. The patient contracted the disease at 4, Tenter Street North. The rest of the family were advised to be re-vaccinated, but they refused.
- 11, Maritime Street.—C. W. Mortimer, aged 40, was taken ill on December 22nd and removed on December 25th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. The patient was a friend of Weed's, of 132, Bow Common Lane, and visited Weed just before he was removed to the hospital. His wife was revaccinated on December 27th. He had no children.
- 95, Satton Street (Common Lodging House). John Becken, aged 47, was taken ill on December 24th and removed on December 28th. He was vaccinated in infancy only.
- 16, Lolesworth Buildings.—Minnie Hallis, aged 23, was taken ill on December 27th and removed to the hospital on December 30th. She was vaccinated in infancy only. This house is let out in furnished rooms, and no one occupied the room with her.
- 1, Scarborough Street.—Jacob Mendis De Costa, aged 21, was taken ill on December 28th, and removed on December 31st. He was vaccinated in infancy only. The family of the patient, consisting of the parents and a sister, were all vaccinated in infancy, but they refused to be re-vaccinated.

and 4 children above 10 years of age. They were vaccinated in infancy, and were all immediately re-vaccinated.

- 8, New Gravel Lane.—George Bullen, aged 35, was taken ill on December 23rd, and removed on December 28th. He was vaccinated in infancy only. His wife and 3 children were revaccinated on December 28th.
- 85, Oxford Street.—Harris Barr, aged 1½, was taken ill on December 19th, and removed to the Hospital on December 22nd. He was not vaccinated. He had been an inpatient of the London Hospital previously for several weeks.

Measles.

Ten deaths out of 11 cases appear a very high mortality. The true facts of the case are that probably medical men do not notify every case that occurs in their practice, and notify those only where they fear a fatal result.

The total deaths from Zymotic Diseases numbered 694, and correspond with a death rate of 2·3 per 1,000 of the population. These deaths include Small Pox, Measles, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, Croup, Enteric Fever, Puerperal Fever and Diarrhœa.

Mr. Rothstein, 35, Old Montague Street, claimed £49 5s. and £2 9s. 10d. compensation for damages caused by one of the Council's men in disinfecting his premises.

On November 6th the case was dismissed with costs for the Council.

Two of the disinfecting men died from Consumption during the year.

The Mortuary.

689 bodies were deposited in the Mortuary during the year.

620 were removed to the Mortuary by the Coroner, 43 by the Police, 13 by the Medical Officer of Health, 7 by the Relieving Officer, 1 by Mr. Dickinson (the Stipendiary Magistrate), 1 by the Governor of H.M. Prison, Wandsworth, 4 by friends of the deceased.

689 inquests were held and 64 post mortem examinations were made.

Unsound Food.

A large quantity of food was seized and a still larger quantity was surrendered. With only a few exceptions the latter was found on the various wharves in the District.

In the great majority of cases I called the attention of the owner to their condition and gave them an opportunity of surrendering them.

I have no hesitation in stating that the greater percentage of tinned foods would have found its way on the Market had it not been discovered by the Food Inspector.

March 25th, but dismissed the summons without costs. There was no evidence to show that Mr. Vavasour knew their condition when they were sold, but he characterized the action of the defendant afterwards through his employees as "most disgraceful."

- (16) Mr. Nicholsberg, Wholesale Dealer, of Spitalfields Market, for exposing for sale, on April 29th, five boxes of Tomatoes, was fined £4 and £2 2s. costs.
- (17) Jacob Rosen, 46, Samuel Street, was summoned for exposing for sale four baskets of Cherries on July 25th. The summons was dismissed, as the Cherries were in such a rotten condition that in the Magistrate's opinion no one would buy them.

General Sanitary Work.

At the end of the first quarter the work was centralised in one office, and the districts allotted to each Inspector were rearranged to make them as compact as possible and to distribute the work equally among each Inspector.

At the present time there are 15 Sanitary Inspectors with separate districts. They are also Inspectors under the Food and Drugs Act. There are two Inspectors appointed to register and enforce the Bye-laws of houses let in lodgings. Another Inspector devotes his whole time to the examination of foods on wharves.

The Clerical Department consists of a Chief and five other Clerks.

There are 18 disinfectors who have to test drains under the supervision of the Inspectors in addition to their duties in connection with infectious diseases.

During the year the Inspectors have abated 444 cases of overcrowding, 36 of which occurred in workshops. Of these

35 occurred in Limehouse, 42 in Mile End, 190 in St. George's and 177 in Whitechapel.

No doubt want of housing accommodation and overcrowding is a difficult problem in most districts, but there are exceptional circumstances in the Borough of Stepney which accentuate the overcrowding. The natural increase of the population—that is the excess of births over deaths—would lead in that direction when the number of houses in the district remains practically stationary.

The addition of a large number of immigrants annually is bound to complicate matters. Poverty is the main cause of overcrowding, therefore the poorer the immigrants the greater their tendency to live in rooms inadequate to their number. These immigrants when they arrive have a tendency to keep together, and the larger number flock to Stepney and more particularly to St. George's and Whitechapel.

The Act provides for the closing of a house by a Magistrate's order if two convictions can be obtained in three months. This is practically impossible, and the section remains a dead letter.

Of the 434 cases of overcrowding, 376 were caused by Jews and 58 by Christians.

In most instances the overcrowding was abated after the notices were received, but in the following it was necessary to take proceedings at the Police Court:—

22,716 houses were inspected during the year, 10,441 being the result of systematic house-to-house inspection, and the remainder were miscellaneous inspections or due to infectious diseases occurring in them or on account of complaints received.

Defects or nuisances were discovered in 10,341. These were remedied in 6,342 houses as a result of "Intimation" notices. In 3,910 the Intimations had to be followed by Statutory notices, and in 89 only was it found necessary to take proceedings in the Police Court.

53,083 revisits were made to these premises.

3,851 houses were ordered to be cleansed and 3,391 drains were constructed, cleansed or trapped. 268 new soil pipes were fixed and ventilated. 2,050 new closet pans and traps were fixed. 3,716 closets were cleansed, provided with light and ventilation, or with a water supply and flushing apparatus.

767 workshops were inspected and 434 various nuisances were remedied.

70 smoke nuisances were abated, of which Police Court proceedings were taken in 3 cases and Magistrates' Orders were obtained to prevent the recurrence of the nuisance.

1,130 slaughterhouses, cowhouses, dairies and milk shops were inspected and kept under constant supervision.

Proceedings under the Public Health Act, 1891, during the year 1901.

March 1st.—Messrs. Hill & Jones were summoned for permitting black smoke to issue from their chimney at Brunton's Wharf. Prohibition order granted with £1 3s. costs.

March 22nd.—The owner of 32, Church Lane was summoned for allowing the basement room to be illegally occupied as a dwelling. Fined £1 and £1 3s. costs.

March 22nd.—The occupier of 32, Church Lane was summoned for not remedying the insanitary condition of the bakehouse. Fined £2 and £1 5s. costs.

March 22nd.—Closing orders were obtained in respect of Nos. 25, 27, 29, John's Place, with £2 14s. costs.

March 29th —Messrs. Clark & Sons, 42, Thomas Street, were summoned for allowing black smoke. Abatement and prohibition order granted with £1 5s. costs.

April 12th.—Messrs. Wm. Good, 591, Commercial Road, were summoned for disobeying Magistrate's order prohibiting recurrence of black smoke. Summons dismissed, without costs, due to a technical error in the wording of the summons.

April 12th.—The owner of 33, Emmott Street was summoned for erecting 3 w.c.'s without giving the necessary notice under the Bye-Laws. Fined £4 and £1 3s. costs. For putting in defective apparatus he was fined £4 and £1 3s. costs.

May 16th.—The owner of Nos. 22, 24, 26, 28, Heneage Street was summoned for the dirty and dilapidated condition of the walls and ceilings. As the work was completed before the hearing, the summonses were withdrawn on payment of £7 7s. costs.

May 16th.—The owner of 17, Old Montague Street was summoned for sanitary defects, viz., no receptacle for manure, and rain-water pipe connected directly with the drain. An order was made to carry out the work within seven days, with £1 5s. costs.

May 16th.—The owner of 18, Old Montague Street was summoned for failing to remedy the defective yard paving. The defendant was ordered to carry out the work within 14 days, with £1 5s. costs.

May 16th.—The owner of 66, Brick Lane was summoned for the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings. An order was made to carry out the work within 28 days, with 4s. costs.

May 17th.—The owner of Nos. 10, 11, 12 and 13, Jamaica Passage was summoned for the defective condition of the roof and eaves-gutters, and the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings of the houses. Abatement orders for the work to be done in 14 days, and £1 5s. costs, were granted for Nos. 10, 12 and 13. An order was made for the work to be done in 28 days, with 4s. costs, at No. 11.

May 30th.—Proceedings were taken against the owner of 27, Denmark Street for refusing to abate various nuisances in connection with the w.c. An order was made to abate within 14 days, with £1 3s. costs.

June 13th.—The owner of 26, Grey Eagle Street was summoned for fixing w.c. pan and trap without giving notice. Summons dismissed.

June 26th.—The owner of Nos. 5 and 7, Grey Eagle Street was summoned for the dirty and dilapidated condition of the walls and ceilings. Closing orders were granted, with £1 5s. costs.

June 26th.—Proceedings were taken against the owner of Booth Street Buildings for the filthy condition of the latrines in Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10. The summonses were adjourned *sine die*, to enable the owner to carry out the necessary work.

July 12th.—The owner of 7B, Christian Street was summoned for letting the premises without a proper water supply. Fined £5 and £1 3s. costs.

July 17th.—Closing orders were obtained in respect of Nos. 118 and 120, Elsa Street. Mr. John Cole, for refusing to leave 120, Elsa Street, after a closing order had been granted, was fined £3 and £2 4s. costs.

September 4th.—The owner of 54, Commercial Road was summoned for the insanitary position of the water cistern. The cistern was cleansed and the summons withdrawn.

September 4th.—Proceedings were taken against the occupiers of the Brewery, Brick Lane, for allowing black smoke to issue from the shaft. Fined £2 and £1 3s. costs on each of three summonses.

September 11th.—The owner of 17, Old Montague Street was summoned for disobeying a Magistrate's Order of May 16th, 1901. Fined £1 and £2 2s. costs.

September 31st.—The owner of 6, Booth Street was summoned for the defective condition of the drainage, &c. An order was made to carry out the necessary work in 7 days, with 6s. costs.

October 11th.—Mr. Sprung, the owner of 78, Old Church Road, was summoned for permitting a nuisance arising from a defective w.c. drain. Order for the necessary work to be completed in 14 days, with £1 5s. costs.

October 18th.—Mr. Finkelstein, St. Thomas's Road, the owner of 11 and 12, Union Terrace, Eastfield Street, was summoned for neglecting to provide a proper and sufficient supply

of water. An order was made to complete the work in 10 days, with £1 5s. costs.

October 31st.—Proceedings were taken against the owner of 1A, Heneage Street for permitting nuisances arising from the defective condition of the drainage and the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings. A closing order was made, with £1 5s. costs.

October 31st.—Proceedings were taken against the owner of 66, Brick Lane for permitting nuisances arising from the defective condition of the drainage and the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings. A closing order was made, with £1 5s. costs.

October 31st.—Proceedings were taken against the owner of 68, Brick Lane for allowing nuisances arising from the defective condition of the drainage and the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings. A closing order was made, with £1 5s. costs.

December 12th.—The owner of 5, 6 and 7, Cox Square was summoned for the dirty condition of the walls and ceilings. The work was done and summonses were withdrawn on payment of £3 9s. costs.

PUBLIC ANALYST'S ANNUAL REPORT.

During the year 1901, 693 samples were analysed under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, consisting of 283 Milks, 142 Butters, 24 Cheeses, 8 Margarines, 2 Lards, 43 Coffees, 5 Cocoas, 58 Mustards, 46 Peppers, 1 Ground Ginger, 12 Oatmeals, 5 Ground Rices, 4 Sagos, 3 Flours, 13 Breads, 1 Baking Powder, 6 Vinegars, 3 Malt Vinegars, 15 Beers, 5 Porters, 3 Gins, 6 Whiskies, 1 Rum, 1 Sweet, 1 Jam, 2 Sugars.

107 samples (15.4%) were found to be adulterated; these consisted of 63 Milks, 30 Butters, 2 Coffees, 6 Mustards, 3 Peppers, 3 Malt Vinegars.

Proceedings were taken in 66 cases.

Four cases were dismissed.

The samples of Beer, Porter, Sweets and Jam were specially tested for arsenic and found to be free.


In two cases only did the Magistrate dismiss summonses and grant costs against the Council. The amount of such costs was £9. 9s.


