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

Tuberculosis.

Under the Public Health Tuberculosis Regulations a register of all notifications is kept and weekly returns of cases are sent to the County Medical Officer. The continual movement of cases from one district to another requires constant supervision so that particulars can be brought up to date and represent a true record.

Of the sixty-five new cases tabulated above, twenty-one are cases transferred from other districts.

Of the total number of deaths from Tuberculosis there were three of patients who had not been notified.

The table shows an increase compared with last year of nine new Pulmonary cases of Tuber-culosis, but the new Non-Pulmonary cases show a decrease of four. The deaths show an increase of Jixteen.

At the commencement of the year there were 187 cases of Tuberculosis on the register, and at the end of the year this figure had increased to 202.

During the year 4 cases were notified as recovered from the disease, 15 patients left the district and there were 29 deaths. Of the 65 new cases it is interesting to note that 33 of these were cases first notified in this district.

Sputum pots for use in connection with examinations for Tubercle Bacilli are available to general practitioners at this Department. These are marked chargeable to the Surbiton Corporation.

There is a close co-operation between the Surbiton Public Health Department and the Health Department of the Surrey County Council, the County Council making all arrangements for the provision of sanatorium and hospital treatment.

The County Medical Officer of Health periodically sends Health Visitors' reports to this Department on the Home Conditions of Tuberculosis patients, and where necessary, visits are made to ascertain if overcrowding exists, and if patients could beneficially be removed to Council Houses.

Measles.

In accordance with the Measles and Whooping Cough Act, 1939, issued by the Minister of Health, Measles has been a notifiable disease in Surbiton since 23rd October, 1939, and accurate records of the number of cases are kept.

Headmasters and Headmistresses notify the cases occurring in Schools.

The Tolworth Isolation Hospital takes in complicated cases of measles. No cases were asmitted from Surbiton during the year.

There were no deaths from measles during the year.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum is a purulent discharge from the eyes within twenty-one days of birth.

All notifications of Ophthalmia Neonatorum are now sent direct to the Surrey County Council

by the local general practitioners, as the County Council are the authority for Maternity and Child Welfare in this district.

No cases were notified during this year.

Puerperal Pyrexia.

Nine cases of Puerperal Pyrexia were notified during the year, seven being removed to hospital and others nursed at home. No deaths occurred.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

The general provision of health services in the area, hospitals, fever, small-pox, tuberculosis, maternity, children, blind persons and other facilities remain the same as in previous years.

Ambulance Facilities.

These are the same as in previous years.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

Combined Maternity and Child Welfare Centre and School Clinic (provided by Surrey County Council), South Place, Surbiton.

Tuberculosis Dispensary (provided by Surrey County Council), South Place, Surbiton. Sessions twice weekly or more often if required.

Venereal Diseases.

Arrangements are made by the County Council for the treatment of these diseases at various Hospitals and Centres.

Professional Nursing in the Home.

(a) General.

The Surbiton and District Nursing Association, which is affiliated to the Queen's Institute of District Nursing, has a superintendent nurse, three general nurses and three midwives available for attending cases in the home, within the Borough of Surbiton.

In the Ecclesiastical Parish of Christ Church a parish nurse is provided by the Church Authorities for home nursing.

(b) Infectious Disease.

There are no arrangements for the home nursing of cases of Measles and Whooping Cough. Provision is made in the Isolation Hospital for the admission of complicated cases of Measles and Whooping Cough.

Midwives.

The Corporation does not employ or subsidise any midwives.

The Surrey County Council is the supervising authority under the Midwives Act.

There are fourteen midwives practising in the District, excluding those employed at Surbiton Hospital.

Laboratory Facilities.

Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are made for the Corporation by the Clinical Research Association.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. Water Supply.

The water supply throughout the District is furnished by the Metropolitan Water Board and is a constant supply of excellent quality. I am supplied with monthly reports by the Board giving details of their chemical and bacteriological examinations.

Drainage and Sewerage.

Extensive schemes have been prepared for soil and surface water drainage in the Borough, and would in the ordinary course of events be in hand. The schemes, however, have been deferred owing to the outbreak of hostilities.

Swimming Baths and Pools.

Publicly-owned Baths.

Surbiton Lagoon, situated in Raeburn Avenue, Surbiton, is an open air pool 165 feet long and 90 feet wide with a depth of 3 to 9 feet.

The water is treated by continuous pressure sand filtration, sterilisation by injection of chlorine and oxygenation over an ornamental cascade.

Periodic samples of the water are taken by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor and the plant adjusted accordingly. In addition, one sample was taken by the Public Health Department which proved to be satisfactory.

Privately-owned Pools open to the Public.

Ace of Spades Swimming Pool, Kingston By-Pass Road, is an open air pool 40 feet by 20 feet with a depth of 4 feet to 7 feet 6 inches.

The water is treated by means of a Candy chlorine filtration plant.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS.

The Food and Drugs Acts in this district were administered by an Inspector acting under the direction of the Surrey County Council until the 30th September, and he has kindly furnished the following particulars for 1939:—

FACTORIES.

There are 235 factories (including 19 bake-houses) on the register.

86 visits were made, and the following contraventions dealt with:—

The only underground bakehouse in the Borough was closed under the provisions of Section 54, Factories Act, 1937.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

Three registered slaughterhouses are in use.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

There are 66 persons registered in accordance with the Milk and Dairies Act, 1922. 27 licences were issued under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1936.

FOOD INSPECTION.

Carcases and offal of 4348 animals were inspected, of which number 258 were affected with disease in some part.

The total quantity of food condemned as unfit for human consumption was 3454 lbs. 12 ozs,

DISINFECTION.

Disinfection was carried out at 26 premises following cases of infectious disease, and at 30 other premises on payment. 49 books from the Public Libary were disinfected.

PUBLIC MORTUARY.

During the year, twenty-eight bodies were received into the mortuary, twenty-three post mortem examinations carried out, and seventeen inquests held.

The Mortuary was closed until May for alterations and modernisation.

GENERAL.

The work of the Department was seriously hampered in consequence of 3 Inspectors and 2 Clerks being given permission to join the Territorial Army. These men were all absent for a fortnight in the summer for training and were called to the colours in August.

Difficulty was experienced in finding suitable substitutes, and I had to complete the year's work

with temporary clerks, and the occasional assistance, for which I was extremely grateful, of an Inspector in a neighbouring Borough.

In addition to Civil Defence duties, which in common with other officers, have brought added work and responsibility, a careful watch has been kept on all developments arising from the war which may be prejudicial to the health of the people. Shelters, both public, private and at industrial buildings, have been regularly visited and many extra sanitary conveniences and comforts for the occupants secured. Officers responsible for other Services have been extremely helpful in this direction, and it is due to this good spirit of cooperation that no serious troubles have gone unsolved.

In consequence of the foregoing the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, which came into operation on the 1st October, 1939, could not be set in motion.
