



To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Surbiton.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Seventh Annual Report dealing with the health and sanitary condition of the District for the year ending December 31st, 1928.

This Report is drawn up according to the directions set forth in a Memorandum sent by the Ministry of Health, and is therefore of a statistical character.

There has been a steady increase in the population, the estimated population for 1928 as sent by the Registrar General is 22,340.

I have great pleasure in stating that the health of the District is still maintaining a good standard and especially the Infantile Mortality rate which is only 16.78 per 1,000 births. The comparison between this and the figures for England and Wales (Smaller Towns) is shown on page 9.

The most important feature that occurred during 1928 was the running of a Health Week in the form of a Health Exhibition, Baby Show, and Lectures. This was the third attempt and owed its success to the capable way in which it was carried out by the Honorary Organiser, assisted by the Staff of all departments of the Council. The estimated number of persons who visited the Exhibition amounted to 6,000, representing a daily average of 1,000. The Lectures dealing with different health subjects were well patronised.

Meat inspection still occupies a good deal of the Sanitary Inspector's time, especially outside office hours.

I have to thank Mr. Nesfield and his Assistant for their assistance during the year.

The group of other defined diseases contain the majority of deaths, and of those specified, Cancer heads the list, followed by deaths due to Heart Disease, Arterio-Sclerosis and Pneumonia.

CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

No cases of Small-pox occurred in the District, although there were several in the neighbourhood.

The rate for Puerperal Pyrexia continues to rise. This is accounted for by the fact that regulations were put into force by the Ministry that all temperatures occurring after birth of 99.4 and over were to be notified. Previously these cases were not notified.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

HOSPITALS.

1. Fever.

The Hospital provided for the isolation of cases of infectious diseases is under the management of a Joint Hospital Board appointed by the Urban District Councils of Surbiton, Malden, Esher and the Dittons, and Ham.

The Hospital is situated in this district.

2. Small-pox.

The Small-pox Hospital, situated at Clandon, is controlled by the Surrey County Council, and is subsidised by the District Council.

3. Tuberculosis.

Cases are admitted into sanatoria through the Surrey County Council.

- 4. Maternity-Nil.
- 5. Children-Nil.
- 6. Other.

The Surbiton Hospital, which is supported by voluntary contributions.

Institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illegitimate children and homeless children.—Nil.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

- (a) For Infectious Cases.—A motor ambulance is provided by the Joint Hospital Board.
- (b) For Non-Infectious and Accident Cases.—A motor ambulance is provided by the Council which is available at any time night or day in cases of accident or sudden illness in the street.

The ambulance is also available for the removal of private cases at any time upon the production of a medical certificate and evidence of accommodation having been arranged at the Hospital, etc., to which the patient is to be taken, and upon payment of the prescribed fee.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.—Combined Maternity and Child Welfare Centre and

School Clinic (provided by Surrey County Council), South Place, Surbiton.

Tuberculosis Dispensary (provided by Surrey County County), South Place, Surbiton.

VENEREAL DISEASES.—Arrangements are made by the County Council for the treatment of these diseases at various Hospitals and Centres.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

(a) General.

The St. Mark's, Surbiton and St. Mary's, Ditton, Nursing Association, which is affiliated with Queen Victoria's Jubilee Nurses Association, has a trained nurse who is available for attending cases of sickness (other than maternity cases) in the home, within a radius of two miles of the Surbiton Post Office.

In each of the Ecclesiastical Parishes of Christ Church and St. Matthew's a parish nurse is provided by the Church Authorities for home nursing.

There are also three private nursing associations, whose nurses are available for home nursing on payment of the prescribed fee.

(b) Infectious Disease.

There are no arrangements for the home nursing of cases of Measles and Whooping Cough.

MIDWIVES.—The District Council does not employ or subsidise any midwives.

The Surrey County Council is the supervising authority under the Midwives Act.

There are four midwives practising in the District.

LABORATORY WORK.

Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are made for the Council by the Clinical Research Association.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply througout the District is furnished by the Metropolitan Water Board. It is of excellent quality and the supply to all houses is constant.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

It has not been found necessary to take any action with regard to the pollution of Rivers and Streams in this area. The Thames Conservancy are responsible for the inspection of the Thames and its tributaries, to ascertain if there is any pollution, and I have had no communication from their officials in regard to such matter.

Considerable additions are now contemplated in regard to the Council's Sewage Disposal Works, plans for which are now in course of preparation.

WATER CLOSETS.

All closets in the District, with the exception of a few at Worcester Park, which is outside the drainage area, are on the Water Carriage system.

SCAVENGING.

During the year the method of transport of house refuse has been altered from that of Electric and Petrol Vehicles to the Tractor-Trailor system, with which certain economies have been effected.

Owing to the increased bulk of House Refuse

it will be necessary in the near future to carry out additions at the Dust Destructor.

CEMETERY.

In March, 1926, an additional portion of the land purchased for cemetery purposes was drained and laid out for burials, and the first interment in the added portion took place on 16th May, 1928. There are 1,694 grave spaces in this added portion.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF AREA.

This is fully dealt with in the report of the Sanitary Inspector, which is attached hereto.

BAKEHOUSES.

There are 13 bakehouses in use in the district, one of which is situated underground.

They have been visited at least twice during the year, and found to be kept in a satisfactory condition.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are only four slaughterhouses in the district, three of which are registered and one is subject to an annual licence.

They have been regularly inspected, and generally found to be well kept.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

During the year seven persons have discontinued carrying on the trade of Retail Purveyors of Milk and have been struck off the register.

Three applications were received from persons residing in the district to be registered as Retail Purveyors of Milk.

There are now 35 persons registered in accordance with the Milk and Dairies (Amendment) Act, 1922, as follows:--

All the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops were visited twice during the year and at irregular periods to ascertain if they were kept in a clean and satisfactory condition and in accordance with the Milk & Dairies Order, 1926.

At one farm the cows were found to be in a dirty condition but were cleansed upon the owner being served with a preliminary notice.

Three Dealer's Licences to sell Certified Milk, three to sell Pasteurised Milk, one to sell Grade A (Tuberculin Tested) Milk and one Supplementary Licence to sell Grade A (Tuberculin Tested) Milk were granted under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1923.

In accordance with instructions received from the Ministry of Health, four samples of Certified Milk were taken from local Dairymen, and sent to the Clinical Research Association for Bacteriological Examination. The following is a summary of the Bacteriologist's reports:—

The Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1923, stipulates that there shall not be more than 30,000 Bacteria per cubic centimetre, and that no Bacillus Coli shall be present in one tenth of a cubic centimetre.
