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



To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council of Surbiton.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my sixth Annual Report of the health and sanitary condition of the Urban District of Surbiton for the year ended December 31st, 1927.

This report is for the most part mainly statistical, drawn up according to the directions contained in the Ministry of Health Circular 834, and is known as an Ordinary Report.

The Birth Rate throughout England and Wales for 1927 is 16.7, while the rate for Surbiton is 14.8 per 1000 of the population, and is lower than last year; the cause for this is probably economical and housing shortage.

The Death Rate for England and Wales is 12.3 and that for Surbiton 12.3.

The Infantile Mortality Rate for England and Wales is #5 per 1000 births and for this district it is 50.3 per 1000 births.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The Infant Mortality rate is calculated on the number of deaths of children under one year of age per 1,000 births and that rate for Surbiton is 50.3 which is favourable as regards that for England and Wales, namely 69, however this is higher than the previous two years.

In looking into the deaths occurring in infants under one year there are a total of 17 and out of that 12 occurred in the first month and eight in the first week, 7 of the 12 deaths were due to premature births. This shows that with further care of the expectant mother and antenatal treatment the infantile mortality may be lowered.

CAUSES OF SICKNESS.

There were no special noteworthy causes of sickness during the year.

No schools were closed during the year in consequence of sickness.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

HOSPITALS.

1. Fever.

The Hospital provided for the isolation of cases of infectious diseases is under the management of a Joint Hospital Board appointed by the Urban District Councils of Surbiton, Malden, Esher and the Dittons, and Ham.

The Hospital is situated in this district.

2. Small-pox.

The Small-pox Hospital, situated at Clandon, is controlled by the Surrey County Council, and is subsidised by the District Council.

- Cases are admitted into sanitoria through the Surrey County Council.

 - 6. Other.

The Surbiton Hospital, which is supported by voluntary contributions.

Institutional provision for unmarried mothers, illegitimate children and homeless children.—Nil.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

- (a) For Infectious Cases.—A motor ambulance is provided by the Joint Hospital Board.
- (b) For Non-Infectious and Accident Cases.—A motor ambulance is provided by the Council which is available at any time night or day in cases of accident or sudden illness in the street.

The ambulance is also available for the removal of private cases at any time upon the production of a medical certificate and evidence of accommodation having been arranged at the Hospital, etc., to which the patient is to be taken, and upon payment of the prescribed fee.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.—Combined Maternity and Child Welfare Centre and School Clinic (provided by Surrey County Council), South Place, Surbiton.

Tuberculois Dispensary (provided by Surrey County Council), South Place, Surbiton.

VENEREAL DISEASES.—Arrangements are made by the County Council for the treatment of these diseases at various Hospitals and Centres.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

(a) General.

The St. Mark's, Surbiton and St. Mary's, Ditton, Nursing Association, which is affiliated with Queen Victoria's Jubilee Nurses Association, has a trained nurse who is available for attending cases of sickness (other than maternity cases) in the home, within a radius of two miles of the Surbiton Post Office.

In each of the Ecclesiastical Parishes of Christ Church and St. Matthew's a parish nurse is provided by the Church Authorities for home nursing.

There are also three private nursing associations, whose nurses are available for home nursing on payment of the prescribed fee.

(b) Infectious Disease.

There are no arrangements for the home nursing of cases of Measles and Whooping Cough.

MIDWIVES.—The District Council does not employ or subsidise any midwives.

The Surrey County Council is the supervising authority under the Midwives Act.

There are four midwives practising in the District.

6. -LABORATORY WORK.

Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are made for the Council by the Clinical Research Association.

BAKEHOUSES.

There are 13 bakehouses in use in the district, one of which is situated underground.

They have been visited at least twice during the year, and found to be kept in a satisfactory condition.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are only four slaughterhouses in the district, three of which are registered and one is subject to an annual licence.

They have been regularly inspected, and generally found to be well kept.

DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND MILKSHOPS.

During the year six persons have discontinued carrying on the trade of Retail Purveyors of Milk and have been struck off the register.

Two applications were received from persons residing in the district and one from a person residing outside the district to be registered as Retail Purveyors of Milk.

There are now 39 persons registered in accordance with the Milk and Dairies (Amendment) Act, 1922, as follows:—

All the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops were visited twice during the year and at irregular periods to ascertain if they were kept in a clean and satisfactory condition and in accordance with the Milk & Dairies Order, 1926.

At one farm the cows were found to be in a dirty condition but were cleansed upon the owner being served with a Statutory notice.

At another farm the milk cooler was fixed inside the cowshed contrary to the provisions of

Section 16 of the Order and a statutory notice had to be served to obtain its removal.

A Statutory notice was also served upon the owner of a cowshed and dairy to cleanse and pave the approaches to the cowsheds, and to repair the dairy floor. The work is now in progress.

Legal proceedings were taken against the occupier of the cowsheds at one Dairy Farm, for failing to cleanse and limewash the walls and ceilings during the months of September or October as required by the Milk & Dairies Order, 1926.

The Magistrates imposed a fine of £10 and £5 5s. costs.

Thirteen Statutory notices were served under Sections 12 (1) and 13 (1) of the Milk & Dairies Order, 1926, with respect to the lighting, ventilation and water supply to cowsheds.

The Act provides that the Sections under which these notices were served, shall not apply until 18 months after the service of the notices.

Three Dealer's Licences to sell Certified Milk, one to sell Pasteurised Milk, and one Supplementary Licence to sell Grade A (Tuberculin Tested) Milk were granted under the Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1923.

In accordance with instructions received from the Ministry of Health, five samples of Certified Milk were taken from local Dairymen, and sent to the Clinical Research Association for Bacteriological Examination. The following is a summary of the Bacteriologist's reports:—

The Milk (Special Designations) Order, 1923, stipulates that there shall not be more than 30,000 Bacteria per cubic centimetre, and that no Bacillus Coli shall be present in one tenth of a cubic centimetre.

FOOD INSPECTIONS.

Regular visits have been paid to the slaughter houses in the district for the purpose of inspecting the carcases of animals at the time of, or immediately after slaughter.

Visits have also been made to the shops &c., where food is prepared or exposed for sale.

Disinfection was also carried out at sixteen premises after deaths from non-notifiable diseases on the occupiers of the houses in which the deaths occurred agreeing to pay the expense.

The Public Elementary Schools were, as usual, disinfected as arranged with the Managers and the Surrey County Education Committee, the walls, floors and ceilings being sprayed with Formaldehyde during the Easter, Summer and Christmas vacations.


