REPORT

OF

MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH,

For 1874.



To the Vestry of St. James and St. John, Clerkenwell.

GENTLEMEN,

The present is my 19th Annual Report, for the past year 1874, and which may be regarded as forming a summary of the Reports presented periodically to your ordinary meetings.

The number of deaths arising from all causes in Clerkenwell during the year 1874, was 1417. The annual average of the last 10 years was 1506; so that the deaths were 89 below the average. The deaths in 1873 having been 1513, those in 1874 were 96 less than in that year.

The accompanying table exhibits the number of deaths taking place in each of the last 10 years, the number of births for each year being placed opposite:—

Every year a number of the deaths of parishioners takes place in general and special hospitals, and in Lunatic Asylums, situated in other parishes. The estimated number of these for 1874 is 105.

The number of births being 2565, and of deaths 1417, the excess, or the natural increase of the population, amounted to 1148.

The number of deaths arising from the principal zymotic diseases in 1874 was 260; being an increase of 26 above that of the preceding year. The numbers and the causes of the deaths taking place from these principal zymotic diseases during the last 10 years are exhibited in the subjoined table:—

The average number of the principal zymotic diseases, during the last 10 years, was 303; so that the number for 1874 is 43 below the average.

The number of deaths from all diseases, in infants under 1 year, was 403; and 225 deaths occurred at and above 60 years of age.

102 inquest-deaths were registered in the year.

87 deaths (48 of males, 39 females) occurred in the Workhouse. The numbers for the preceding 10 years were 167, 174, 156, 186, 178, 140, 107, 75, 38 and 112.

19 deaths took place in the House of Correction, and 2 in the House of Detention.

35 deaths arose from violence.

Hence the mortality of the year was below that of the average of the last 10 years, and below that of the preceding year. The mortality amounted to 21 per 1000. If the deaths of persons dying in Hospitals, &c., as determined by calculation are added, the mortality would be 23 per 1000.

In 21 large towns of the United Kingdom, the mortality per 1000 was determined by the Registrar General to amount, for 1874, to:— average total 25.4; London, 22.5; Portsmouth, 20.4; Norwich, 23.5; Bristol, 22.7; Wolverhampton, 23.9; Birmingham, 26.8; Leicester, 24.1; Nottingham, 24.8; Liverpool, 32.0; Manchester, 30.4; Salford, 29.6; Oldham, 29.7; Bradford, 27.0; Leeds, 28.7; Sheffield, 26.9; Hull, 25.5; Sunderland, 23.4; Newcastle-on-Tyne, 29.2; Edinburgh, 23.6; Glasgow, 31.1; Dublin, 26.0.

Although the mortality of Clerkenwell in 1874, was about that of the Metropolis generally, it was as in the previous year, below that of the entire Central District, in which it amounted to 25.6

Hence the mortality has been below the average of the last 10 years, and below that of the preceding year. But there has been an

increase in the zymotic mortality, and by referring to the second Table, it will be seen that it amounts to 26. It is also there shown, that two deaths took place from Small Pox, against 0 in the preceding year; that the deaths from Measles were 15 more; those from Scarlet Fever 58 more; from Hooping Cough 11 less; from Typhus 2 more; and from Diarrhœa 40 less. So that the principal increase was in the deaths from Scarlet Fever. But this increase was not confined to Clerkenwell, but prevailed over the Metropolis, the deaths having been 2662 against 652 in the preceding year. I pointed out years ago, how this disease was mainly spread by the Schools; in consequence of children coming from rooms in which the disease prevails, being allowed to mix with healthy children.

The important plan of removing affected persons from their dwellings, when isolation at home was impracticable, was carried out to a great extent: 82 cases of Fever (Typhus and Scarlet Fever), and 3 cases of Small Pox having been so removed in the year.

Of the 31 deaths from Typhus, 7 are registered as having arisen from Typhus, 17 from Typhoid, and 7 from simple continued Fever.

It is gratifying to notice that out of 50 cases of Typhus sent from the Holborn Union to the Fever Hospital, 5 only came from Clerkenwell.

I think it will be well to publish the rules, which are so important for the prevention of the spread of infectious diseases; a copy of which is left at each house in which zymotic disease is known to prevail, they are as follows:—

RULES FOR THE PREVENTION OF THE SPREAD OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

- 1.—When a person is attacked with infectious disease, the patient should be placed in a separate room, and all carpets, curtains, &c., at once removed. When this cannot be done, the patient should be sent to a hospital. And all persons who have not had the disease should be sent out of the house to lodge elsewhere.

- 2.—If the disease be Small Pox, all in the house should be submitted to medical examination, and Vaccinated or Re-vaccinated, if deemed necessary.
- 3.—The evacuations of the patient should be mixed with carbolic water before removal from the room; and every handkerchief or other soiled article should be soaked in carbolic water before being washed.
- 4.—A sheet wetted with carbolic water should be suspended in the passage immediately outside the door of the patient's room.
- 5.—A shallow dish containing sand wetted with carbolic acid, or carbolic powder, should be kept in the infected room and renewed daily; some of these should also be sprinkled upon the floor.
- 6.—The least possible communication should take place between the nurse or attending parent and the other inmates of the house.
- 7.—Persons remaining for any time in an infected room, and then mixing with others, can spread the infection rapidly, without necessarily suffering themselves.
- 8.—No person should be conveyed to a hospital in a cab or other public conveyance. Penalty £5. Poor persons can make use of the carriage provided by the Vestry for this purpose.
- 9.—No bedding, clothing, or rags, &c., can be removed from an infected room until they have been thoroughly disinfected to the satisfaction of a medical man. Penalty £5.
- 10.—No room in which any person suffering from dangerous infectious disease has been, can be re-let, until it, and all articles in it, have been thoroughly disinfected. Penalty £20.
- 11.—All parts of houses in which infectious disease has existed, and all articles in them, must be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected as soon as the patient has been removed, or has recovered. Penalty 10s. a day.

- 12.—In case of death, a pound of the carbolic powder should be spread over the bottom of the coffin; and the body should be wrapped in a sheet wetted with carbolic water.
- 13.—Fumigation of an infected room may be done thus: The chimney, windows, and all crevices having been thoroughly stopped up, 1 or 2 lbs. of common sulphur are placed in a brasier, or the lid of an iron saucepan inverted and resting upon a pair of tongs, placed over a pail of water, in the middle of the room. The sulphur is then lighted with hot cinders or a red-hot poker, and the door immediately closed and stopped up. Articles of clothing, &c., should be spread out or hung up in the room to remain during the process. The longer the room is kept closed, the better; but four hours at least are necessary.

Carbolic Acid Water is made by mixing a table-spoonful of the acid with each quart of water and stirring well; or half a pint of acid to each pailful. This acid should also be mixed with the lime in lime-washing the ceilings and walls of apartments.

The poor may obtain carbolic acid at the Vestry Hall gratuitously.

Slaughter-houses.—These were inspected once only during the year, on the 5th and 17th of October. They were 29, kept by the same number of butchers. In the preceding year they were 30 in each case.

Cow-houses.—These were also inspected during the year, at the same times as the Slaughter-houses. They were 31, kept by 28 Cow-keepers; the number of Cows being 394. In the preceding year, these numbers were 27, 25, and 402. They were all in fair order, and the recommendations of the Sanitary Committee were carried out.

Bakehouses.—These were visited and examined by the Sanitary Committee and myself on June 15th and July 20th; and all defects were ordered and seen to be remedied.

The Fried-Fish shops were also inspected during the year, and the requisite means for reducing the nuisance arising from them, to a *minimum*, ordered.

Mortuary.—The Mortuary which was destroyed to make room for the School-Board School, has not yet been replaced, in spite of the most earnest endeavours of the Vestry. Two or three sites have been found; but no sooner was it discovered by the neighbours that a Mortuary was about to be erected, than petitions were presented to the ground landlords, who at once prevented the use of the land for such purpose. The same endeavours are still being made, and it is hoped with a prospect of early success. It seems odd, however, in regard to this matter, that while the School-Board has compulsory power of purchase of land for simple educational purposes, the Vestry who have to preserve life by preventing the dead from destroying the living, have no such power.

Registrar's Returns.—The Vestry will notice that my Report is not so complete this year, as it has usually been; in consequence of the absence of the Table containing the details of the deaths, at various ages &c. In 1857, and subsequently, the Registrar-General kindly transmitted to me weekly, and in Cholera times daily (after he had made use of them,) the returns furnished to him by the District-Registrars of the Parish. But in October, 1874, after a fortnight's notice, these returns ceased to be forwarded, so that it has been impossible for me to ascertain where the deaths have taken place, and to enforce the adoption of the usual sanitary precautions. Hence, there are unfortunately many houses in which infectious diseases have prevailed, where the usual disinfecting agencies have not been employed. It is to be hoped that some arrangement will speedily be made, by which these returns may be transmitted as of yore.

GENTLEMEN,

I present herewith a detailed statement of the Analyses of Articles supplied to me for that purpose by your Inspector, during the quarter ending on the 31st December. The List of Articles includes Milk, Butter, Tea, Mustard, Pepper, Vinegar, Sweets, Beer, Gin, Whiskey, Brandy, Rum, Port Wine and Sherry. The whole number of Samples analysed amounts to 54, of which only two were found to be clearly adulterated. Two samples of Sweets were also found to be in an impure state, but samples of the same articles subsequently obtained from the same place were free from that defect. It is satisfactory to find that the proportion of adulterated articles among those submitted to analysis is much smaller than it has been on former occasions. The article which still continues to be most frequently and most largely adulterated, is Milk, and referring to my experience in other districts as well as this, I cannot say that there is any very decided permanent improvement in the quality of this article, as supplied to the public. The addition of water is so easily made and so difficultly detected by the general public, that the temptation to resort to the practice of thus adulterating Milk, can only, I believe, be suppressed by strictly carrying the law into effect, and causing the Inspector not only to visit the retail dealers, but to assist as far as possible in getting at the fountain-head of the evil, by tracing out the wholesale adulterators.

GENTLEMEN,

During the quarter, ending the 31st March, I received from your Inspector, 55 samples of articles of food for analysis, all of which were duly tested and reported upon. The articles consisted of Mustard, Pepper, Vinegar, Tea, Arrowroot, Sweets and Milk. Of these two samples of Mustard, and ten Samples of Milk, were found to be adulterated while the other articles were free from adulteration.

The results of analyses made in your district, as well as others, tend to show that with regard to many articles of food the practice of selling them in an adulterated state has considerably diminished, but we cannot say as much with regard to Milk, which still continues to be frequently and sometimes largely adulterated with water.
