NEW TOWN HALL.

The Architect reported on the 16th November, 1867, that, with the exception of painting, the builder had completed the New Town Hall, as per contract, and on the 17th December, 1867, the Vestry appointed a Hall Keeper, who took possession of the building at Christmas, 1867.

A Committee appointed by the Vestry has furnished the offices for the Clerks, Surveyor, &c., and also the chairs, benches, and fittings for the large hall. The Council Chamber, in which the Vestry hold their meetings, has been temporarily fitted up for carrying on the business.

PAVING WORKS.

The following Paving Works have been done during the year ending 25th March, 1869,

Hyde Place.—A new Granite Crossing laid down at a cost of £26 12s. 10d.

East Road.—From Brunswick place to Mr. Green's gateway, a new Granite Channel laid down and the footway relaid with new 3-inch York, at a cost of £108 9s. 5d.

Hackney Road (portion of).—The footway relaid with new 3-inch York (where necessary) at a cost of £320 14s. 6d.

Brunswick Place.—The footway relaid with old stone at a cost of £33 0s. 8d.

Union Street, Hackney Road.—The carriageway repaved with old Granite Cubes at a cost of £87 10s. 8d.

Curtain Road.—The carriageway paved with new Granite Cubes at a cost of £5724 3s. 7d., and the footways repaved (where necessary) with new 2½-inch York, and new Granite Curb, at a cost of £341 13s. 3d.

Susannah Row.—The carriageway relaid at a cost of £72 12s. 9d., and the footways repaved at a cost of £17 14s. 1d.

New Inn Yard.—The carriageway relaid at a cost of £110 7s. 5d., and the footways repaved with new 3-inch York, at a cost of £255 2s. 1d.

Queens Road.—The footways paved with new 2½-inch York, 4 ft. 6 ins. wide, at a cost of £324 3s. 8d.

Great Cambridge Street.—From Canal Bridge to Hope Wharf, the footway paved with new 2½-inch York, at a cost of £29 10s. 2d.

Trafalgar Road (portion of).—The footway paved with new 2½-inch York, at a cost of £3 19s. 1d.

Edward Street, Wenlock.—The footway repaved with new 3-inch York, at a cost of £149 17s. 7d.

Vinegar Ground.—The whole of the footways relaid with old stone at a cost of £40 19s. 10d.

Reform Place.—The footways repaved with new 2½-inch York at a cost of £24 11s. 7d.

Castle Street.—The carriageway relaid at a cost of £13 2s. 0d.

The Surveyor has under his control two Foremen, one for the Eastern district, and one for the Western district of the Parish, and it is their duty to superintend the repair and maintenance of the roads and footways, to see that the watering is properly done, and to report to the Surveyor and Paving, &c., Committee, all matters relating to such roads, footways, &c., from time to time.

The number of laborers employed by the Surveyor on the roads is thirteen, and they have to attend to the general repair and maintenance of the roads throughout the Parish.

The Surveyor has also two Masons with a laborer each, for the repair of the footway pavements, and in most cases to repair the pavement after trenches have been opened by Companies or Contractors.

There are also three paviors and five laborers for the repair of the carriageways, crossings, channels, &c., in the parish.

There is one man employed to cleanse the Urinals (17) belonging to the Vestry. (This man has been placed under the control of the Sanitary Committee.)

The Surveyor has three men employed in flushing the Sewers in the Parish, also a laborer generally employed on sewers work.

Cleansing and Dusting the Parish.

The whole of the Parish has been cleansed, the dust removed and the gullies cleansed by Mr. C. T. Parsons, of Shadwell Dock Wharf, Lower Shadwell (under a contract) for a sum of £3980.

SANITARY CONDITION OF THE PARISH.

Report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

GENTLEMEN,

In submitting the annual Report of work carried out by your Inspectors, allow me to state a few facts. Although there have not been so many open cesspools abolished as last year, yet that is not caused by lack of vigilance in your Inspectors, but to the fact of nearly their total abolition in their open state.

I cannot let this pass without saying a word respecting cesspools. I have good reasons for saying that there are a very large number of cesspools still existing, and no doubt at some time or other orders have been served upon the owners to abolish them, but instead thereof, they have been covered over with boards or stone, or bason and trap fixed on the covering and there left. Cases of this kind have lately come under your Inspectors' attention.

Cesspools in this form are most dangerous to the inhabitants of the houses where they exist, also to the surrounding properties, in proof of this I will mention two cases of the most recent occurrence. In a house in Union Street, Nile Street, last spring, there were two cases of Typhus Fever, upon inspection the house was found in a fair state of repair, for that class of property. An order was served to cleanse and whitewash the house throughout, disinfect bedding and clothing contained in the room where the fever existed, also limewhite walls of yard and trap the drain. The whole was done. Nothing further transpired until the early part of this year, when Typhus again visited this house. Four persons were taken with it. In one case a fatal termination ensued.

Upon examining the premises my suspicion was aroused. Search was made and an old cesspool was discovered in front of closet-door, that had been covered up for years. In Westmoreland place, almost a similar case occurred. Two persons were stricken with fever, and upon examination of the house a large cesspool was discovered, partially covered up.

Sooner or later these old cesspools will be the cause of a serious outbreak of typhoid fever, and may perhaps prove a serious epidemic.

I have to point to the large increase of typhus and typhoid fever this year in the Parish over the former year.

Several cesspools situated at Socrates Place, New Inn Broadway, found covered up with boards and stone.

I wish also to draw attention to the overcrowding (in many cases indecent overcrowding) in this Parish, numbers of houses have been and are being demolished for the building of warehouses, churches, and other properties. Numbers of the working classes are by these means driven from their homes to seek shelter elsewhere, whose occupations compel them to live near their daily employment. They are therefore obliged to get into almost any place, often places totally unfit for so many to reside in, frequently they are underground dwellings contrary to 67th section of the Public Health Act.

2000 houses have been visited as house to house visitation, independently of

339 houses that have been visited where contagious diseases have existed, and orders made to disinfect these premises; in some instances done by the Inspectors.

87 proper Water Closets have been erected.

22 Cesspools have been abolished.

703 House Drains cleansed and repaired, in many instances the old brick drains have been taken out and glazed pipes laid down, and thus a far more efficient drain provided.

145 Houses have been drained into sewers.

447 Houses where the surface drainage of the yards were defective have been repaved.

421, Walls of Yards have been cleansed and limewhited, thereby adding to the light and comfort of the back rooms.

213 Houses have been repaired.

55 Houses have been closed, being unfit for human habitation, and the owners preferring to close them rather than to do the necessary repairs.

Dust Bins have been provided for 270 houses.

110 New Cisterns.

53 Water Butts, and 10 Water Waste Preventors, where constant supply is laid on.

111 Water Butts have been repitched.

In 72 cases of insufficient Water Supply, a greater quantity has been laid on.

26 Dung Pits have been provided.

During the year, 17 complaints have been made of pigs and other animals being kept in improper places, where they were a nuisance and injurious to health. Notices were given to the owners of the premises to have them removed, which was done in every case.

Proceedings have been compelled to be taken in 60 cases before the Police Magistrates at Worship Street Police Court, against owners of property where they have neglected or refused to carry out the orders of the Sanitary Committee.

Your Inspectors have been compelled upon several occasions to seize and have destroyed Fish and Meat, not being fit for human food. One conviction of a fine of £20 or three months' imprisonment has been imposed by Mr. Ellison, the Magistrate at the Worship Street Police Court, for exposing for sale diseased meat.

During the year there were 980 applications to have the dust removed. Notices were given to the Contractor who speedily attended to the same.

The cleansing of the streets and roads have been very satisfactorily carried out, and but few complaints made, these consisted of gullies being stopped.

The watering of the streets was done by the late contractor, Mr. Winn, in a very efficient manner, with but three complaints during the period of his contract.

There are 45 Licensed Cow Sheds and 78 Slaughter Houses in the Parish. The whole I have visited at least once in every quarter, and have reported to the Medical Officer of Health that they were generally in a fair state of repair, cleanliness and ventilation.

The Vestry have adopted the 35th Section of the Public Health Act, 1866. Regulations having been drawn up and certified by the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the following houses and properties are placed under the above regulations, viz.:

Many of these houses were in a most crowded and dirty condition. Water Supply in a very defective state, the people had but few opportunities of keeping their rooms or persons clean, owing to the want of water, frequently they were compelled to store their daily supply in pans or pails in their rooms to the injury of their health.

In every case where possible a constant supply of water has been obtained with "water waste preventors," and the water companies have expressed their wish to assist as far as possible for the more general supply of water on the constant service in courts and small properties.

The number of Sanitary Works executed since the establishment of the Vestry are as follows:
