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
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

## THE HEALTH STATISTICS OF THE METROPOLITAN BOROUGH OF SOUTHWARK FOR THE YEAR 1901.

By the London Government Act, 1899, the four Parishes of Christchurch, St. Saviour, St. George the Martyr, and St. Mary, Newington, were incorporated under the title of the Borough of Southwark. The latter two parishes up to that time had existed each as a separate Sanitary Area, whilst the former two parishes were associated together for public health administrative work under the title of the St. Saviour's District Board of Works. The population of these sanitary bodies at each Census since 1841 was—

The ancient and historic parishes of St. Saviour and Christchurch will be seen by this return to have suffered in each decade a serious depletion of its inhabitants. This was due to the building of large warehouses, which displaced the ordinary dwellings, and the widening of certain main thoroughfares. This decrease in the population by the substitution of warehouse accommodation for that of private houses has not been so marked in the other parts of the Borough up to the present time, yet there are indications that the same process is steadily at work.

The southern portion of the Borough is residential in character, the houses being chiefly occupied by the well-to-do artisan class, whilst the northern or river-side portion is frequented by the casual labouring class to a much larger extent. In this latter district common lodging houses abound. Taking the Borough as a whole, nearly all the houses, with the exception of the "model" dwellings are occupied by members of more than one family.

## **CENSUS**, 1901.

At the enumeration of the population at the end of March last, the Borough was found to contain 206,180 persons, of whom 103,260 were Males and 102,920 Females.

#### BIRTHS.

The number of Births registered in the Borough during 1901, was 6,875, of which 3,478 were males, and 3,397 females. This represents a birth-rate of 33.3 per 1,000 inhabitants.

The accompanying table shows that the births in the two larger parishes for some years have been steadily declining in numbers.

#### DEATHS.

The number of deaths registered in the year under consideration was 3,600, of which 1,857 were males and 1,743 females. Of the 3,600 deaths registered in the sub-districts of the borough, 770 occurred in the Poor-Law institutions, the various hospitals, and other public places for the treatment of the sick found within our boundaries. These deaths in institutions comprised 288 belonging to Southwark, and 482 to other boroughs of the Metropolis. The various localities in which the "outlying" deaths occurred are shown in the following table. The number of inhabitants belonging to the Borough dying away from home—that is, outside our boundaries in the various hospitals and infirmaries—was 1,295. Of this very large number as many as 705 died in the Southwark Infirmary at Champion Hill. The remainder, with but few exceptions, died in the large public hospitals.

The percentage of persons dying away from home in relation to the total number of deaths occurring in the Borough was 29.3.

When those persons who were non-parishioners, but who died in our Berough have been deducted, and the outlying deaths added, the actual or "corrected" number of deaths belonging to the Sanitary Area is found to be 4,413, of which number 2,376 were males, and 2,037 females.

The death-rate when calculated on this "corrected" number is 21.4 per 1,000 inhabitants for the whole Borough for the year 1901, as against 21.9 for Newington, 27.3 for St. George the Martyr, and 25.2 for St. Saviour's for 1900.

# Report submitted to the Council on 23rd July, 1902, on the Epidemic of Small-Pox in Southwark during 1901, and from January 1st to June 28th, 1902.

"For many years previous to the present epidemic Southwark had been entirely free from Small-pox. From time to time cases had been reported as belonging to the true disease but they were found on examination not to be as certified.

Small-pox in epidemic form was prevalent in Paris during 1900. The disease reached its maximum towards the end of that year and then rapidly declined. In the spring of 1901 it recommenced and again was at its height in the months of June and July. There are strong grounds for believing that persons arriving in London from the Continent introduced the disease into the Metropolis. About the end of June, 1901, several independent outbreaks of Small-pox occurred in different parts of London. An unrecognised case in Wandsworth was followed by a very serious spread of the disease, not only in that district, but in many other boroughs. Cases appeared in Marylebone, in St. Pancras, in Islington, and a little later in Holborn. The rapidity with which the disease at first spread in some of these districts was thought to be largely due to the difficulty, owing to the mildness of the complaint, of getting the cases recognised early, or in persuading the parents that any care was required.

The first case which occurred in Southwark was that of a compositor, who was accustomed to visit a social club in the Clerkenwell Road, where an outbreak of the disease had occurred. He was removed to hospital on August 21st. The disinfector, who attended to the room and who had not been re-vaccinated, fell ill with the disease at the end of the fortnight, and he in turn communicated it to his bed-fellow, a Borough dustman. For some time the disease spread very slowly in the Borough, only 11 cases being notified up to November 7th. In the course of the epidemic

five distinct outbreaks, which at the time threatened to be serious, occurred. I mention these in order to show the measures that were taken to stop the spread of the disease:—

Outbreak 1.—On the 7th November a man fell ill with malignant Small-pox which was thought to be Erysipelas. The house in which the man lived was a large tenemented one holding 12 families. The whole household was transferred to the Council's Reception House and re-vaccinated. Of the 30 residents in the tenemented house 7 persons were removed with the disease to the hospital. The house was cleansed and disinfected from top to bottom and no one else in the street took the complaint.

Outbreak 2.—In the latter part of November the disease appeared at 67, Union Street, a common lodging-house accommodating 84 women. The disease, in spite of careful disinfection of the rooms and frequent inspections made by our own officers and those of the London County Council, continued to spread until on December 10th the whole house was infected. On that date I vaccinated the entire population with the result that, excepting a woman who had the disease in the incubating stage when vaccinated, and another who was found to have the disease, whilst seeking admission in the week ending February 8th, no one else became infected, nor has the disease appeared in the lodging-house since.

OUTBREAK 3.—In the early part of February, 7 cases occurred at 57, Webber Row, and houses adjoining. The disease continued to spread until I had a house to house inspection made when some 50 unprotected persons were vaccinated, with the result that no other case occurred.

OUTBREAK 4.—In the months of March and April an increasing number of cases were being notified in connection with St. Olave's Chambers until at the end of April every part of this common lodging-house appeared to be infected. In the early part of May I vaccinated, with the consent of the Council who allowed me to give to each person 2/- as a compensation for probable loss of work, 500 residents. This had the effect of completely arresting the disease in this locality.

Outbreak 5.—This occurred in the latter part of April at 131, Great Suffolk Street. Revaccination in this case completely cleared the lodging-house of the disease.

With regard to the remainder of the cases which were scattered over every part of the Borough, the disease in nearly every case was confined to the house in which it first appeared.

It will be seen on reference to the tables that 409 cases occurred in private houses, 12 in the workhouses, and 134 in common lodging-houses. The case-rate per 1000 of the population is for private houses 1.9, and for common lodging-houses 32.0.

The total deaths at all ages during the epidemic numbered 86, and the total cases 555. This is a percentage of deaths on the total cases of 15.5. No person who was vaccinated in infancy died under the age of 19 years—I made very careful enquiries into all the cases and I was unable to find the disease occurring in any person vaccinated or revaccinated within the last ten years. Two men between ages 35 and 45, who were removed to hospital with the disease, stated that they had been re-vaccinated before they were 20, but they seemed unable to give any clear account of it.

## Preventive Measures.

REMOVAL OF FAMILY TO THE RECEPTION HOUSE-

Every endeavour was made to get the family, in which a case of Small-pox had occurred, at once into our Reception House, and in the case of a tenemented house to get as many families removed as it was possible. It was a rule with us to require all persons who had not been recently vaccinated to submit to the operation as soon after residence as it could be conveniently done. In this way as many as 550 persons were either vaccinated or re-vaccinated in the Reception House during the epidemic. The table referring to the work carried on at the Reception House shows the large number of persons admitted and the very small cost at which they were maintained. At times as many as 30 persons have been resident. The splendid service done to the Borough by the Reception House, which very often was found too small for our needs, and the comfort it gave to families are very pleasant matters to look back upon. I do not remember a single case of complaint, either of the fare provided for the residents or of the housing accommodation.

We were able to achieve two things by this residence (1) the vaccination of all persons who had been in contact with a case of Small-pox, and (2) the thorough disinfection of the rooms the patient occupied. At no time was complete quarantine maintained. As soon as vaccination had been performed the male workers were allowed to resume work and a certificate was given informing their employers, that, in the opinion of the Medical Officer, the individual referred to was not likely to convey infection to his fellow work-

men. In a large number of "Contacts" the vaccination was done on the second day of exposure to infection, and I have no doubt saved many from taking the disease.

I am satisfied that this early removal of the family to the Reception House, and the subsequent vaccination, prevented serious outbreaks in private houses. A reference to the weekly number of cases will show that with one exception no such outbreak in connection with a private house did occur.

THE DISTRIBUTION OF PAPERS CONTAINING INFORMATION IN RELATION TO SMALL-POX—

In the early part of the epidemic large posters were affixed to the walls in the more prominent portions of the Borough. These posters described the chief symptoms of the disease. Handbills containing the same information were left at a large number of houses, especially in neighbourhoods likely to suffer from an invasion of the disease. At the same time two women inspectors were employed in making a house to house inspection in streets where cases had occurred, in order to find out the persons unvaccinated.

All this information as to vaccination was brought to the notice of the vaccination officials daily. In cases where much difficulty was experienced in getting persons vaccinated the Medical Officer of Health assisted in the work.

The publicity given to the symptoms of the disease induced numbers of persons to attend at the Public Health Office. The general effect was to bring all cases at once to the notice of the Medical Officer.

In addition a circular letter was sent to all employers of labour in factories, informing them that if they wished it the Public Vaccinator would attend and vaccinate their workpeople free of cost. In this way thousands of factory workers were vaccinated.

## DISINFECTION OF ROOMS-

Our procedure in that respect was as follows, viz.:—Immediately after a case had been removed to hospital the room with all the clothes and bedding, just as the patient had left it, was treated with sulphur vapour by burning 2lbs. of roll sulphur in an ordinary brazier and keeping the room closed for at least 8 hours. Next morning the bedding and clothes were removed to a Washington Lyon's Steam Disinfector and exposed to steam of 20lbs. pressure for 20 minutes. The room in the meanwhile had the paper stripped off the walls and the whole interior of the room washed down with a solution of formalin applied with an ordinary garden syringe. The room was

again fumigated and after that allowed to remain for two days with all the windows open. The bedding then was returned home and the family allowed to re-occupy the room. The prolonged steaming of articles of attire frequently did harm to their general appearance, and in many cases compensation had to be made for the damage. The amount of money expended in this way for the whole epidemic has not exceeded £80.

There are two disinfecting stations in the Borough, one of which was kept exclusively for Small-pox, together with the collecting and discharging vans and ambulance for the removal of families. which had been in contact with cases, to the Reception House. In the table giving the number of families which have passed through the Reception House, it is shown that in the early part of the epidemic each person remained on an average 5 days, whereas in the later period the time was only 3 days.

#### CONTACTS-

In respect to persons who had been in contact with cases of Small-pox, and who worked or resided in other boroughs, information was at once sent to the Medical Officer of those Boroughs. It was found in a few cases that information as to their workplace was withheld by contacts. Considerable tact and care had to be exercised in the use of information so obtained from other boroughs. Our way was to send for the person who had been in contact, vaccinate him, and give him a certificate to enable him to continue his work.

All unvaccinated contacts were visited regularly for 14 days.

All contacts not feeling well were directed to send at once to the Medical Officer of Health.

## THE MEDICAL OFFICER AS EXPERT.

From the commencement of the epidemic a very large part of my time was occupied in this work. To my mind it was all important that no case for want of this assistance should be kept at home.

I find on referring to our records that 44 cases were returned home from the hospital as not suffering from Small-pox. This number does not include some 150 cases, of suspicious rashes in which the diagnosis was corrected. I feel that the Borough has been much indebted to the medical men practising in it for their ready and indeed anxious desire to get cases removed from the district to hospital.

I have at the same time to acknowledge with pleasure the services of all those officers who have been concerned in this epidemic, and to regret that recently we have lost through death the Superintendent of the Reception House, to whose energy much of the success of that place was due."

## POSTER AND HANDBILL ISSUED.

"To the Inhabitants of the Borough of Southwark-

"Small-pox is very prevalent in many parts of the Metropolis. Many cases have occurred in Southwark. In order, as far as possible, to guard against the spread of the complaint and for the proper treatment of those so suffering, it is highly necessary that the first symptoms of the disease should be understood and recognised.

"What is termed the incubation or hatching period of the disease, that is the time from the infection to the real beginning of the illness, is in nearly all cases twelve days. The first symptoms of the complaint are nausea or sickness, giddiness, pains in the head and back, and a miserable feeling of depression. After forty-eight hours pimples appear on the face, forehead and wrists, and later on the body and legs.

"A person suffering with these symptoms should without delay seek medical advice, either by applying to his own medical attendant or to the Medical Officer of Health at the Public Health Office, 81, Borough Road. In any case, and almost at any time, the Medical Officer of Health, when applied to, is ready to give advice and assist in every way possible.

"Re-vaccination is practically a complete safeguard against taking the complaint, and is necessary for persons who have not been vaccinated since childhood.

"Parents whose children are now unvaccinated run great risks, and, in the event of the children becoming infected, are likely to lose them. The Medical Officer of Health will be glad to receive information that can in any way assist him in preventing the spread of the disease in the Borough.

#### MAINTENANCE.

The cost of maintaining persons admitted to the Reception House in connection with infectious disease other than Small-pox was under £2 for he year, 1901.

In the same year 135 persons, either "suspects" or "contacts," in connection with Small-pox were maintained for 775 days at a total cost of £15 17s., or at the rate of 5d. per person per day.

In the year 1902, from January to the 28th of June, 684 persons in connection with Small-pox were maintained for 2,247 days at a total cost of £60 16s. 5d., or at the rate of 6½d. per person per day.

### SCARLET FEVER

The deaths from Scarlet Fever were 54 in the Borough during 1901, as against 22 in the year 1900.

The total number of cases notified was 1,301 this year, as against 689 for last year.

The annual mortality per 1,000 living was .26.

Of the 1,301 cases notified as many as 1,188 were removed to hospital. The deaths in the hospital were 51, a mortality of 4·3 per cent. The cases treated at home numbered 113, of which 3 died, a mortality of 2·6 per cent.

The percentage of cases removed to hospital was 91.3.

In the year under consideration not only has there been a very large increase in the number of cases when compared with the previous year, but the case mortality has been also higher. On referring to Tables 15 and 17, it will be seen that for a portion of the Borough (Newington), Scarlet Fever has been more than usually fatal.

One feels bound to mention year by year, the long period that cases are kept in hospital. That this lengthened stay in hospital, besides being a heavy burden upon the Borough's exchequer, is distinctly harmful to the patient I do not think there can be much doubt.

We have been hoping for years that the vexed question of how long a patient should be retained in hospital would be boldly considered by the Asylums Board's Medical Officers. It is known that there is a disclination to discharge the cases from hospital at an early date, for fear of blame attaching. I think that this fear is groundless. If the Medical Officers of the hospitals would only discharge all cases of Scarlet Fever after a residence in hospital of six weeks or thereabouts, and duly advise the Medical Officers of Health of such discharge, so that the cases can be watched, much benefit, in my opinion, would accrue. The present way of discharging patients to their homes without advising the Medical Officer of Health, so that the family can be watched, is, to say the least, an unbusinesslike method of doing things.

### DIPHTHERIA.

The deaths from this disease have still fallen during the year 1901, the number being 53 as against 108 for 1900.

The total number of cases notified, including Membranous Croup, was 558 as against 784 in 1900.

The annual mortality was .25 per 1,000 living.

Of the 558 cases notified, 484 were removed to hospital with 42 deaths, a mortality of 8.6. 74 cases were treated at home, with 11 deaths, a mortality of 14.8 per cent. The percentage of cases removed to hospital was 86.7.

In regard to Diphtheria, not only has there been a diminution in the number of cases occurring in the Borough during the year under consideration, but the case mortality, both in those treated in hospital and those at home, has been very remarkable.

In those treated at hospital, the lessened mortality has been as much as 40 per cent., and the same decrease has been noticed in those remaining at home. Either this has been due to a change in the type of the disease, or to the better treatment afforded to all cases at the present time.

#### WHOOPING COUGH.

The deaths from this disease during the year were 98, as against 120 for the year 1900.

This is a large diminution in the number of deaths when the average for the last ten years is taken into consideration:—

In all cases of Measles, Whooping Cough, and other non-notifiable diseases in which information has been sent to the Medical Officer from the Schools in the Borough, it has been our practice for the Women Sanitary Inspectors to visit at once and inspect the premises. At the same time that a visit was made, such advice and instruction as a Sanitary Inspector is allowed to give, was offered to those in charge of the patient. The work carried on by the Women Inspectors in this field has been of the most important character, and I believe has been fully appreciated by the inhabitants of the Borough.

The visiting of cases of infectious disease by the Women Inspectors has occasionally been a little misunderstood, and has been thought to savour of unnecessary interference.

The few cases which have arisen during the year calling for an explanation, speak eloquently to the tact and care shewn by the Women Inspectors in the carrying out of their very important but delicate duties.

### ENTERIC FEVER.

The deaths from Enteric Fever during the year 1901 numbered 18, as against 39 for the preceding year.

The number of cases notified was 135 for 1901, and 307 for 1900.

The annual rate per 1,000 living was .09.

Of the 135 cases notified, as many as 120 were removed to hospital, a percentage of 88.8.

The number of deaths occurring in hospital was 14, a mortality of 11.6 per cent.

The cases treated at home numbered 15, of which four died, a mortality of 26.6 per cent.

This large increase in the percentage of deaths in cases treated at home has been referred to by me in previous Annual Reports.

An interesting case of Enteric Fever arose in connection with the sending home of the kit of a soldier who had died at Krugersdorp from Enteric Fever. The following report was made to the Public Health Committee in relation to this matter:—

"TYPHOID FEVER DUE TO INFECTED CLOTHING SENT HOME FROM THE TRANSVAAL.—The case was that of John Dexter, aged 19 years, of 25, Price's Street, Blackfriars Road, who was notified on August 22nd, as suffering from Typhoid Fever. His father, who was serving with the Fusiliers in the Transvaal, died at Krugersdorp in July, 1900, of Typhoid Fever. His kit was sent home to his family, and after several misdirections ultimately reached them in the middle of July, 1901. The patient, John Dexter, unpacked them at once, and found them soiled, just as they had been taken from his father's body after his decease. He began to wear the boots at once, and also the socks after they had been washed. Both father and son suffered from tender and offensively smelling feet. The son, after a little more than a week, began to feel ill, and on August 1st was not able to attend to his work of porter to a hatter in Fore-street, City. On August 6th he was admitted to St. Bartholomew's Hospital. ard after a fortnight he was certified as suffering from Typhoid Fever. This case clearly shows that it is highly dangerous to send kits home in the way this was done. Even on sentimental grounds I have heard friends say that they would rather the things had been destroyed. I am strongly of opinion that the War Office should give instructions that all articles of clothing taken from the bodies of soldiers who have died from Enteric or Typhoid Fever should be at once burnt, and on no account should they allow any other article to be sent home without having it previously satisfactorily disinfected."

### DIARRHŒA.

The deaths during the year from this disease were 222, as against 233 for 1900.

# INSPECTION of HOUSES in which Deaths have occurred.

It had been the custom for the last nine years to visit every house in Newington in which death had occurred, and to make a complete inspection and report upon the sanitary state of the premises. This practice has been attended by the best results, and during the year under consideration has been extended to the other portions of the Borough.

### DISINFECTION.

The Borough is provided with two disinfecting stations containing in each case one of Manlove, Alliott & Co.'s Washington-Lyon apparatus.

In the disinfection of rooms we endeavour in all cases of notifiable infectious disease, other than Erysipelas, to strip the walls of all paper, and to spray the interior by means of a garden syringe with a solution of Formalin. After this has been done, the room is placed under sulphur fumigation for at least eight hours before it is allowed to be reoccupied.

During the year 2,184 rooms have been disinfected after the occurrence of Infectious Diseases.

### INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

In order that an efficient supervision might be maintained of all cases of Infectious Disease, the Council, on the 9th January resolved —

"That for the purpose of visitation of cases of infectious disease, the Borough be accordingly divided into districts north and south of a line running from the Borough boundary on the east along the centre of Bermondsey New Road, New Kent Road, Newington Butts and Lower Kennington Lane."

Miss E. M. Nicholas was appointed as Inspector in the north district commencing her duties on March 4th, and Miss Moffatt as Inspector in the south district, the duties of which were not commenced until a later period as the last mentioned Inspector continued for some time to carry out part supervision of No. 1 District (Houses let in Lodgings).

4,450 inspections and re-inspections have been made at premises after the occurrence of infectious disease by these Inspectors, and much good work has been done.

Immediately upon the occurrence of a case becoming known to the Medical Officer a visit was made by one of the Inspectors, and printed instructions, together with verbal advice, were given to the heads of families in every instance, the cases being kept under supervision until after the patients had either been removed to hospital or had recovered.

## POLICE COURT PROCEEDINGS.

During the year 166 summonses were taken out under the above Acts. Convictions have been obtained in 118 instances, 29 summonses have been withdrawn, mainly in cases where the persons serving the samples were not the actual proprietors of the business.—(Duplicate summonses were generally taken out in such instances and were withdrawn upon a conviction being obtained against either the proprietor or his servant). 16 summonses were dismissed and 3 summonses were not served (in two instances as the defendant had gone away, and in the third instance as the defendant had died.)

The following have been, from time to time during the year, reported to the Public Health Committee as cases of interest:—

David Jones, 10 & 11, Sturge Street.—Milk from which 21 per cent. of cream had been abstracted.

This sample was taken in pursuance of a suggestion made in Court upon the hearing of a summons taken against the same vendor in respect to another sample of Milk which was certified to have had 16 per cent. of cream abstracted therefrom. The above sample was therefore taken direct from the same cow in the presence of the Inspector (Mr. Weatheritt), and upon analysis was found poorer in quality than the first by 5 per cent. of cream. No proceedings could therefore be taken in this instance, and the summons in respect to the first sample (16 per cent. deficiency in cream) was withdrawn.

Evan Rees, 84, Deacon Street.—Milk 30 per cent. deficient in cream.

Evan Davies, 169, Borrett Road.—Milk 16 per cent. deficient in cream.

It was shown in evidence, at the hearing these two summonses, that the milk was demanded by the purchaser in each instance from a particular vessel pointed out by him. The Magistrate thereupon held that the milk being demanded from a certain vessel and being so supplied, the vendor had sold what was asked for, and no objection could be taken as to the quality of the milk. These cases were accordingly dismissed.

Joseph Carrick, 337, Walworth Road.—Syrup sold as golden syrup, but constituted as follows:—Cane sugar syrup 20 per cent.. glucose syrup 80 per cent.

The summons in this instance was withdrawn, the Council not being in a position to show that there is a proper commercial standard for "Golden Syrup."

Edward Gardiner, 150, Tabard Street.—Obstructing the Inspector (Mr. Weatheritt), in the carrying out of his duty (purchasing samples of milk and butter) and assaulting the latter's assistant. Fined 60/- and 42/- costs in respect to the obstruction, and 40/- and 21/- costs in respect to the assault.

#### WEATHERITT v. DRURY.

#### A MILK CASE—ABSTRACTION OF CREAM.

The defence set up in this case, "that the milk was genuine as drawn from the cow," is so important and far reaching as to require our closest attention. The particulars of the case are clearly given by Mr. Weatheritt in report to me, which I submit.

October 16th, 1901.

SIR-

I beg to submit the following report on the case of myself v. Drury, heard at the Lambeth Police Court on 2nd inst.

On the date named, Henry Drury, 8, Alvey Street, was summoned under Sec. 9 of the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, 1875, for selling on 28th August last, a pint of New Milk from which 12 per cent. of its cream had been abstracted so as to affect injuriously its quality, without making disclosure of its abstraction. When the case came on for hearing the defendant's solicitor, Mr. Ricketts, produced a tabulated report of the analyses of milk, alleged to have been collected from four cows on the morning of the 25th September last, being the same cows that produced the milk which was the subject of the summons. The report showed that the mixed milk of these cows was 57 per cent. deficient in cream. Mr. Ricketts also stated that he had the analyst and the man who collected the samples in Court, and was prepared to put them in the witness box.

The Magistrate (Mr. Horace Smith) said if Mr. Ricketts' statements were correct he would suggest the withdrawal of the summons. Mr. Topham was not at that time in a position to dispute the figures given in the report. The summons was accordingly withdrawn. As you are aware, under Sec. 4 of the Act, 1899, and the Board of Agriculture Regulations, the defendant cannot be convicted if he can show that, notwithstanding the fact that the milk is below the standard, the milk was genuine as drawn from the cow.

It is, of course, known that stall-fed cows do, under certain conditions, give milk below the standard. The Act of 1899, and the Board of Agriculture Regulations, really now give defendants a defence which was formerly not open to them.

On the 8th inst., you will remember, we visited Mr. Drury's cow shed and procured samples of milk from two of the cows before mentioned (the other two having been sold), and from three other cows in the shed. The result of the analyses of this milk is set out in the following table, alongside of which is a copy of the report produced by Mr. Ricketts.

The difference in these milks may be partially accounted for by the difference of the time between the milkings. Those on the 25th September being taken at 8 a.m., the previous milking would be about 15 or 16 hours before. Those on the 8th inst. were taken in the afternoon about 3 o'clock, the cows having been milked about eight or nine hours before. The feeding of the cows may have been better attended to after the first samples were taken; and the milking better done on the second occasion.

The points which suggest themselves by this report are-

- (a) Can the amount of solids and fat in milk be influenced by the way in which the cow is fed?
- (b) Is the first portion of milk taken from a cow at the milking period usually deficient in fat?
- (c) Is the first portion of milk taken from a cow at the milking period usually deficient in solids?
- (d) Can the amount of fat be influenced by the period of milking adopted by the milkman?
