Dear Hastings,

Would you please tell the Committee that the Turkey Units duly arrived on the 5th; November at Constantinople. That I at once called on the ambassador who thought that Sir. E. Cassell's Manager, Mr. Kingham, had made all arrangements, referred me also to Omar Bessim Pasha, a doctor by profession, and a Director of the Ottoman Red Crescent Society. This Society sent a representative to meet us, and we, he and I, and Dr. Page went together to inspect the proposed building for a base hospital. It is a fine airy and clean building for a base with room in it for medical officers, orderlies and about 150 patients - situated near Seraglio point in Stamboul, and used a-s a Fine Art school in connection with the Imperial Museum. This we found suitable and the Red Crescent promised us mattresses, water laid on, and light, as well as fuel. At our suggestions they arranged for a kitchen and allowed us to make field latrines, refuse destructor etc. But they asked us not to come in for a day on account of necessary work and suggested our going to the Pera Palace Rotel for the night. As this would have cost at the present scale of prices at least £100. I declined, and arranged with the Captain of our Paguet boat to let us stay on board another day on payment. The ship put herself to great inconvenience for us and we owe her commander much gratitude. The extra payments for lodging and meals for 24 hours for 56 people came only to about £18.10.-.

Dr. Page and I also visited a proposed temporary hospital near the Customs House, where Sir Richard Crawford offered to find us food for patients and transport. But unfortunately the warehouse available was damp and dark and pronounced by Dr. Page to be extremely unsuitable for sick men.

We had offers of houses from Miss Burgess of Koum Kapu, from Dr. Clemow late of the Embassy, and from a Turkish gentleman on the Asiatic side of the Bosphorus. Any or all of them we might afterwards use, but they are all very widely separated and without refusing any of them I did not close for the present.

I heard privately in the Embassy of the apparently desperate state of the Turkish Army and cause, and of the consequent bitter feeling among the Moslems against the Christians, and the tendency to panie among the latter. But as all this will have been now in the newspapers I need not enlarge upon it, only mentioning it as an additional reason for keeping our Unit in one locality if I could.

So much for November 5th.

On November 6th. (te-day) we moved early in to the Fine Art school, now a Red Cross Hospital. The Ottoman Red Crescent (which by the eay is the name of the official

Ottoman Society charged with the succour of the wounded) most kindly finding us baggage carts.

A very busy day was spent in laying down mattresses, unpacking and arranging stores - buying food - making latrines etc. - Every facility was given us. The rooms are empty with board floors, except that reserved for an operation theatre which has a stone floor. The water supply is not yet finished but will be to-morrow. The drinking water is not very good and must be boiled. A kitchen will be made in about 4 days I hope. At present we use a field kitchen.

We were visited by Lady Lowther, wife of the Ambassador, by Mr. Waugh, British Consul, and Dr. Mc.Lean, Embassy medical officer, Dr. Osborn, Omar Bessim Pasha, and many members of the Ottoman Society and various others.

Hearing from Ledy Lowther that Mr. Gerard heard that the wounded at Chataldja were in a terrible condition - there being neither food nor doctors, end only those who can crawl to the train having much chance of life - I am asking him to support me with the War Minister in a proposal to send a unit or small party at once to Chataldja or thereabouts to collect dress and despatch wounded to our base hospital.

With our personnel it is obvious that we can once established, look after more than 150 beds and therefore it is decided not to go to Chataldja. I am ready to take over another 200 bedded building, or rather a building sure to be empty but capable of holding 200 patients.

The health of Constantinople is uncertain. Small pox is said to be rife, and cholera if not already existing is suspected and feared. All our party were vaccinated and inoculated against typhoid on board ship.

Dr. Page and a stretcher party meet the train of wounded at the station to-morrow morning - about five minutes from here - so as to chose as far as may be his cases and transport them quickly to the hospital. Many of them it is said are nearly dying of starvation.

Mr. Kingham, Sir Ernest Cassell's Manager, has been doing all he possibly could to prepare for our arrival and to help us in every way.

The City is in confusion, and the Government uncertain. It is plain to me that we must really depend as we are already doing, upon ourselves entirely to feed patients as well as staff. We are it is true promised rations, but I am expecting difficulties about it.

I have not cabled to you thinking it for the moment an unnecessary expense.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR DIRECTORS OF BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY.

THE DIRECTOR:

- 1. Is the chief officer of the British Red Cross Society in the area of operations allotted to him.
 - 2. He has complete control of the personnel within his area.
- 3. He shall be responsible for the rationing of the units under his control, and must make such arrangements as the conditions in the country indicate.
- 4. He shall be responsible for the maintenance of the equipment and organisation of transport and supplies necessary for the units in his area.
- 5. He shall not pledge the funds of the British Red Cross Society without the sanction of the London Committee.
- 6. On arrival within his area he shall report himself to the Chief Military and Military Medical Authorities, as well as to the official representatives of Great Britain (if any).
- 7. He will be careful to carry out such orders as are conveyed to him by the responsible Military Authorities, and will regard himself, subject to such orders as he may receive from the Society in England, as under the control of the Chief Army Medical Authority.
- 8. He will be careful to impress upon all those officers and subordinate officials of the Red Cross Society the necessity upon all occasions of obedience to the Military Authorities.
- 9. He will keep a careful account of all expenditure incurred on behalf of the Red Cross Society, supporting this by vouchers when possible.
- 10. He will forward a weekly report to Society, and if required, furnish a copy of such report to the Chief Military Medical Authority in his area. He will keep a

On matters of special importance he should telegraph to the London Committee.

11. No communications should be made to the Press either by the Director or those serving under him.

Subject to the above Regulations the Director will bear in mind that the resources of the Society are at present very limited. In the first instance he will utilise to the best advantage the stores and personnel at his disposal, but the Committee are anxious that he should, as quickly as possible after arrival in his area, acquaint them with the most pressing necessities of the situation. In general terms it may be stated that his first care shall be the care of the sick and wounded, but as the position developes it may become necessary to consider the extension of the Society's work to other victims of the war, more especially to suffering women and children. Since it is impossible for the Committee at this early period of the war to issue more definite instructions than those now given, the Director must bear in mind that the Committee can only rely upon him as to the future work. It is therefore essential that in advising the Society he should fully appreciate the responsibility which the Society asks him to accept. It is of the very highest importance that he and those serving under him should render implicit obedience to the Authorities of the State with which they are serving and should do all they can to cultivate cordial relations with those with whom they come in contact.

In any case of insubordination or of improper or unsatisfactory conduct the Director has full authority to discharge the offender.


