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F the times now present, and those I see approaching, make me the dolefull mesfenger of more misfortunes, the indisferent Reader will, I hope, excuse mee: For truth is truth, and a spade is a spade, if I might freely so call it. No prosit hath induced me to put ink in penne, or

penne to paper : no private revenge : no defire of fame, by publishing a work of this nature, of it self so contrary to the stream of these times : Sixteen years I happily lived under the government of Charles our King; I was in no particular in that space of time oppressed I felt no pressures, either of Ship-money, Billeting of Soulthe Sommal for male & gi winder yn Hers, a cold moist am philogemalique and contain 10-11-12 Jigm biz spine K. they are aga ino Devised into Sevision, of 21,8 2001.

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diers, or the like; no High-Commision had influence on me; no Star-Chamber ; no Court of Honour : Like an Hermit fourteen miles from London I lived neere Oatlands : But, the heavens appearing cloudy, and foretelling mee a storme was comming, I left my Countrey babitation 1640. and came to London, where now I am, and in which place I dayly hear the noyse of warre, and sound of trumpet, neither of which affright me; and yet I well know the ancient and moderne Prophecies of this City; Some predicting one thing, some another. Safety is in London; It will bee; Usque dum ? We want unity to make us perfectly happy. By Gods blessing, from, and in this City had I my subsistence in fortune : With this City, and its fortunes, and the most honourable CitiZens thereof, will I adventure, purse, person, and what may, if any thing can be, more deare; Holding it more honour to be buried in the ashes of the Citys ruines, then to survive a Monarch after Such a Catastrophe.

But Grave, and ever gallant-minded Citizens, your fame and zeal to Religion, and the Publique good shall flourish, when nothing but the Treasons, and cewardly backslidings of your Enemies shall be recorded : Those who are your enemies, the Parliaments, Religions ; God himself will memorize to all Ages, to the perpetuall infamy of those untrustry families, that undertook their Countries Protection, and have dishonourably, in a stime of sad distress not onely described, but fomented, and augmented their Countries ruines, with their persons in Arms, their purses open, their Associats countenanced; and to what end? but to enslave themselves in the first place, and the whole Kingdom, after their unlamented deaths.

Can either God overlook these perfidious men? or poste-

rity be unmindfull of their generation in time to come? Many will despise this Work for my meannesse, and want of education, being my self no Collegian of either University: Its not set forth with Eloquence, our Art denying us that lustre; but truth is eloquence, and eloquence is truth: No mortall mans envy do I care for; I have hitherto outlived envy, and beheld the confusion of mine enemies, or in a fair way for it.

The Work had been more compleat, had I not been as much, during its writing, oppressed with taxes, and weekly assessed ments, as ever Bellantius was fearfull of the approach of his enemies, while he wrote against Mirandula : Let us bee equally pardoned. Its true, it hath cost me more hours, then at first I intended, yet I do not repent it, my knowledge was thereby the more increased. Some things I have purposely omitted; I love Monarchy, and would not easily displease my Soveraigne: To none living but himself, if ever, will of I communicate my private Referves.

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The generall good do I aim at, and that men foreknowing the evills to come, might more patiently abide them, and with leffe trouble of minde receive them : Our Summer and Han vest are past ; our Winter is not ended, and why? there remains a kinde of men,

Omne nefas proni patrare, pudoris inanes, Crudeles, violenti, importunique tyranni, Mendaces, falfi, perverfi, perfidiofi,

Fœdifragi, falsis verbis infanda loquentes. but notwithstanding all their dissembling; Violenta fraude peribut. And so let them, and all thine enemies, oh miserable England.

I sould with no man would carp at the Subject I write of :

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But knowing its of Astrologie, exploded in vulgar conceptions, it will procure me many enemies ; but why it should, I know not. If they are both Christian and Protestant, fo am I : Would they reform Church and Church-Government? fo would I : Do these honour their King ? I do : Do they adhere to the Parliament of England fitting at Westminster: My living in the Strand, and willingnesse to Conformity, subscribes my consent. Why shall the difference of Opinion, in point of Learning, put us at oddes ? And let none mistake my meaning, when I write, This Planet, or that Constellation did, or doth such a thing; I mean, The influence of that Planet is such, it enclines (God permitting) to such or such acts, &c. Let man live meerly as a Naturall man, without parks of Grace, the influences then predominate; but where Grace rules, the Stars obey. This I mean in mens qualities, &c. Calvin, I know, is enemy to Aftrologie. Melancthon, as grave a Divine, and more learned, as most hold, was friend to, and Student in it; witnesse his version of the two last Books of Prolomie out of Greek into Latine, and his many Epistles in commendation thereof. Perkins was fo peevish and bitter, if that Posthumus Tract be his, not an Almanack must be framed; if made, not bought, though the price were but two pence. Let that be that good mans errour. Tet I never knew any Divinc of so tender a conscience, but, if five pounds were given him to preach a Funerall-Sermon, would be fo hard hearted as to refuse it : Such Baits are smilingly swallowed; and that party much extolled after his decease, that in his life-time never knew what it was to have a good word : Tot homines, tot Sententiæ. One Chambers wrote ag ainst us; but bad such a Lesson returned by the learned Sir Christopher Heydon, in answer of his folly, that very grief killed

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killed the old worme-eaten Cannon of Windfor nor to this day hath any adventured to answer that learned Knight : Since bis time one Melton and Vicars have railed but wrote nothing to purpose, one pretends every Aftrologer makes a speech of an houre long to the querent, its ill time fo fpent, if that were true, rne can returne very few answers in a day : Henry E. of Northhampton, of a noble family, writes against Judiciary Aftrology, and Comets, the Book was yet never thought worthy of answer, the Gentleman was learned but he never made it lesse ap. peare then in that discourse, intending to confute that subject of which he knew very little, if any thing at all; It were a great madneffe in me to write of Phylicksor to treate of the common or civill Law in which I have no judgement : All the Antagonists I meet with, mistake the ground of Art, and father Spurious bastards upon us in stead of legitimate iffue; they Geme to infer, that we believe fat all necessity, or that things contin. gent must necessarily come to passe according to our predictions ; and they dourge the darke sentences of Oracles against us, they yoake us with sorcerers, Negromancers, Magitians (though I hold it an honour to be Magus in that lense King JAMES tooke the word in Demonolagia) they call us figure flingers, Stargazers. Wifemen, and what not ? but what have we to doe with Oracles ? do we raife the dead, or require refponsion from the deceased : do we invocate Spirits ? or consult with them? doe we use more them nature? have not we our principall Bookes publickly fold, and licensed by every Common Wealth ? I will infert some horary questions into the end of this Booke, and a Nativity, that posterity may see how innocent wee are of the many false imputations fathered upon us. And although many have no conceipt of questions, thinking Ptolomey did not approve them; admit he did not : yet if the Centiloguium be his, the question is ended, for therein many of the Aphorismes belong to questions. But if he did not if Art since his time have found out more then he knew, shall we reject that knowledge becaule be spoke nothing of that? the most learned of these times maintaine the Earths motion, he the contrary, and fo the noble Tycho: was all learning buried with Aristotle, or Aftrology with Ptolomy ? How great is the difference betwist those Philitions that follow Galen, and those that adhere to Paracelfus ? to despise the one or other were starke madnesse. In matter of question I have given Satisfaction, as many well know, I

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have also erred, but it was in not heedfully observing my Rules or when the question was not radicall : I hold a Radicall question like a perfect instrument in the hands of a workeman, with which instrument if good morke be not made, he is no workeman but a botcher : yet somstimes men propound such questions, as put the poore Artist to his trumpes; amongst the rest, one propounds, if he shall enjoy such a moman for his nife, his own wife, the questiees husband being all alive, its impossible to resolve this, for I fee not how the lives of so many can be included in one question, two at least not confenting to the Quere; but, (Stultus interrogator facit sapientem deviare) We ty not men to believe we can doe this or that as Perkins unjustly taxethus, and as many ignorant people do imagine; our manner of dealing is thus : One loofeth a spoone, a peece of Plate or any thing elferevery man would willingly have his own, or know which way, or by whom its stollen or convayed : he commeth to us, and askes our advice, if we can belpe him unto it againe, this I confesse is the ordinary question and manner of proposal : I think no man ever warranted the goods againes that cannot be dones only thus much we doe, we ereit our figure, and give answer whether man or woman did the fact, their quality and flape, domeflicall or nots to what part of heaven the things are carried, the probability of being obtained againe or not. Who can be angry at this judgement? we cannot name any man or woman; but yet by our description many come to know the thief and to have their goods and to descover a knave or sut they little mistrusted is any man prejudiced in this, G.c. I have many times described a man or woman so exactly as might be, yet the parties durst not challenge them for any such manner of peoples though they much mistrusted them, but time did after find them out, and they have miraculously bin discovered guilty; I confesse theft especially in London is a difficult question, for bere is variety of men, women, and children A man is exceedingly in love, he defires to know if he shall have the party defired I fet my Scheame defcribe the party tell him I conceive she is not allotted for him, and where and what kind of people, or thing impedits his fuit : he leaves off is this prejudiciall? doth he not herby prevent abundance of fornow which would follow if he proceeded farther? A man is fick be inquires if his difease be mortal the better to dispose of his affaires , admit I fay he is like to die and name the day or neare the time the querent upon this makes his peace with God fets all in order yet lives

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lives, and then I lye: this happens not once in one hundered figures jis this prejudice to the querent 3 as men we may erre, for I never (peak politively in such a question: life and death are of God. One inquires for perferment, if he shall obtaine it, if we put him either in the way whereby he is advanced ; or give contradiction not to prosecute upon radicall grounds, what impeachment to Art or to the querent is this?

A Merchant intends to fet out a ship to such a Coast, or part of beaven, be comes to be advised; do we injure him if we admonish to adventure to that part of heaven which may be most advantagious for a happy return; many I am fure are undone for lack of advice few burt that ever I knew : only if men make our art a God, and rely on it as upon an Oracle, without baving relation to the Al-seeing providence of God it converts trath into falfood, and caufeth God to obfuscate our judgement: I ever abhorred to meddle with any that superstitionsly ran a whoring after the Art, or that would believe it must inevitably come to passe because I had said that I conceive inquisition for things lost, or stray, or the like questions are an . cient, as we find by Saul and his fathers fervant, and the phrase of Speech they used, I find not that either Saul or his servant were reprehended for it. Many are as ill fatisfied about nativities, as questions, the Art being reproved by many understood by few 3 I will indeavour plainly to fatisfy all of our manner in the judicatory part. One brings me the time of his birth viz. the yeer moneth, day, and houre of the day, or neere it according to estimation zand some accidents as sicknesse, casually perferment, marriage, or the like and this reduce th the estimative time to certainty: what do I now? I judge upon the generall good or ill may befall that party in a naturall course of life during his days, as also of his temperament, confitution, qualities, perfon, Oc. Then I direct the advantagious yeeres, and discommodious either for health, losse ofestate, perferment, &c, Now if I Say in fuch a yeere of his Age, by reason that one of the five Hylegiacalls, which is the fignificator comes to the or 8, or 8 of a malefical Promittor and that this intimates a fickneffe proceeding from the depravation of this or that humor, O name it especially that is vitiated, and sy, in time confult with the Philition and prevent the difease, and be sure to evacuate that predominating humour principally, what hurt is inthis manner of directionswherby (longe ante) he is delivered of the peccant humour before it could radicates and from a pestilent fever or a long lasting quartan

tan Ague fo that when the fignificator and Promittor meetes the native is crazy two or three dayes, and no more, fcarce that, whereas otherwayes his life might have bin indangered and he a long time fick : In these our now troubles and before they came in whose nativities I found ill directions, I advised to moderation in their actions according to the nature of the direction, by which meanes and other private advise, even in these times they live and enjoy as their own what others have totally loft. Its not the least part of my quier of mind, that I have done many offices of friendship in this nature, nor know I any that repine in following my advife, fome that did not, have, and will perpetually rue it. The grand question is betwixt King and Parliament, I have for the most part declined my refolution concerning any fuch demand : How happy had many bin, if having advised, they had obeyed the rules of Art: If I tell any one that about such a yeer he shall be in danger of drowning, having well confidered his nativity;ought not this man more then formerly avoyd going to Sea, paffage over dangerous waters, &c. and fo by Gods bleffing avoyding theoccafion he perceiveth not the effects, or very little, flipping perhaps with his foote where otherwise the whole body might be indangered. What Gentleman is there living, but if he be wife and have foreknowledge that in fuch a yeere he (ballfind his tenants inclinable to take new leafes, or remew lives, and that they will be more inclinable then, than at other times, and it will be more profitable, & c.who is he that will refuse this opportunity ? Mens dispositions are not allwayes alike, I sy, Sir, upon such a direction you will in this yeer exhaust your stock. & from or by such manner of men receive detriment, be that is judicious will avoyd furetiship that yeer, and profuse expence in his living, Cards, and Dice, O.c. I have known my directions observed by some, from whom I have afterwards received thanks and acknowledgment of the verity of Art. Seafons are not all alike, the Sun fhines now, it rains to morrow: ther's not a man upon the face of the earth whole temperament is alike at all times : is not the meekeft man we know, angry sometimes, and inclined to passion? Let me come nearer home to the subject I was speaking of; Had it bin lawfull, and His Majesty commanded, if any Artift had long since acquainted him, that about such a yeers be should have some scuffling with his subjects and mentioned the quarter of Heaven from whence; had the prediction proved falfe, His Majesty received no dammage thereby, but when he had feene part of the prediction verified,

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verified, & the remainder approaching it might bave moved him formbat to confider of the events which might further enfue, if the caufe were not taken amay. But fith our lames give us not that liberty or any I know is weary of bis life, that taske is yet unperformed. Augustus Cafar loved Nigidius Figulus. So did Vespasian Seleucus the Astrologian, and had many directions from him, although derided by Cornelius Tacitus for it. These were not the worst of men or Empercurs, &c. But let those things paffe, some may and I know will challenge me, because I stile my booke Merlinus Anglicus; or Propheticus : its easily answered ; may not any father name his own child ; how many are called Alexander, Cælar, Charles &c and yet Kings take no exception thereat. Some will fay Merline was a Prophet, time will make it appeare I am no lier. If I should arguains the world how Merlin made his predictions: fire and fagot : though for those prophecies of his that have come to my bands, Itruely acknowledge them no more then Astrologically fet down fo that without excellent judgement therein no mystery of his can be unlocked; he appeares an excellent Naturalift, and joyns both Art and Nature in one. All I aime at, is to let the World know, I know nothing: Many of my judgements are obscure, part whereof scall not be fulfilled during this generation; a time will come, and he will appeare, that will publish more then the world yet knoweth, or shall know of me, and will think our age for what I have done, and will hereafter (God permitting) does Thefe times fuffer not all truth to be unmasked, I adventure into the world amidst the most troublesome times England ever didsee, or hereafter shall jee; from these sad daies have I gathered experience, but no profit or wealth: Omnia mea mecum porto: Long live those honourable Oaken friends I have, and I feare not. Had Ino support of private fortune, bard were my hap if I could not sustaine my life ; let the Sunne shine upon me, I care for no more, it was the defire of Diogenes: but I am content, having reduced my mind to my fortune, & c. Upon the Subject I write, viz. the conjunction, I have perused no mans notes, nor offistance in judgment have I had from any; yet let me with much thankefulnesse acknow. ledge, that my ancient learned friend Mr. Nicholas Fiske hath freely lent me either his Manuscripts or any bookes in his Liberary treating of this (ubject, with much love and willingnesse, from whom fince my happy acquainstance with him I have received plentifull enlargment of my judgmens

ment, and the whole Art of direction in Nativities; who were he not English would be more esteemed; nor am I more beholding to the father then the fonne Mr. Matthew Ficke, who at all times gave me the exact places of the Planets, and calculated for me the severall scheames of the conjunction of 4 and h 1603. 164 and 1663. of whom I may fay without offence, that few of his yeeres (if any) in Europe can parallell his excellent gifts and endowments in all the learning of the Mathematiques he is to" his further bonour as religious as learned ; fush are the parts he now hisbin his tender yeeres swhat may or might they come unto, if some Alfonfus or Rudolphus would take notice of them. O.c. The matter I handle is Astrologie, and what conjunction in 1643, but had I not looked backe to the Comet in 1618, I ladbeen mired and gravelled. Authors. speake in generals of these conjunctions, no one Author giving any great fatisfaction, or teaching to handle one in particular, the more I laboured the more I perceived the key to unlock these conjunctionall influences. I could have enlarged the booke to a volume but its needlesse, such as it is, or as I durft let it be, receive; and let not the title or matter trouble thee. I intend God willing, (the Sunne and Saturne 1647 not impediting) to enlarge Dariot, and fit him with examples of all kinds, and to make fome peeces of Prolomey Speake English. Onely we, of all Nations, make leaft nfe of this Art; whether the defect be in the Nation or in us because fem of us attaine to any great perfection (if any at all) in this Art, I know not. I confesse our weaknesse is great, yet let me speake experimentally what I have feen in my time. I have had much acquaintance and fociety with Schollers of other Nations reputed learned in Aftrology in their owne Countreys, but I really affirm, that none of them were comparable either to that grave, reverend, and profoundly learned Dector Napier, or to bis Surviving kinsman Sir Richard Napier Knight, excellently judicious in Astrology, Physicke, and Philosophy; or to Mr. Thomas Allen of Gloncester hall, or to Mr. Bredon a rigid Ptolomeian, or to Mr. Nicholas Fiske curious in the art of directions, and exquisite in all the parts of Astrologie. Let them shew me a man hath given better proofe of his judgement in Afrologie, then my friend Mr. Booker in his Annuall prognaflicks. I intend to write of the famous Eclips in 1654, and of the next conjunction of Th and 4 1663, at what time Italy will be purged, and we cured of our madneffe, without Million to Anticyras, Lord God bow many changes

LOTHE READER changes shal this poore Island suffer, & most part of Europe before 1666 then remember the hand-writing in Daniel, chap. 5. v. 25: Mene, mene, tekel,upharsim:numeravit,numeravit,appendit;dividuntque.Not far from that time shall that of Merlin, if not long before, be fulfilled : Currus Lunz turbabit Zodiacum, & in fletum prorumpent Pleiades. In the meane time, Oh quot regnorum mutationes, oh quot lugubres & flebiles infortuniorum casus quot timenda periculorum discrimina, perturbationes, quot immensa flagitia, oh quot turbidas & perniciofas feditiones! quot inopinata feu insperata mortis exitia, oh quot malorum & improborum exaltationes, calorum conturbata acies, inudanter emittendo eructabunt ? oh quot pauperes & egeni extollentur ditabunturque! Nobility and Gentry I bonour, yet they would storm and call me to account if I should utter tantum quantum. How

We have formerly been thought to turn the ballance of Europe, our condition is now very low : one time and two faire gales of Wind make us fit and steere the spip, but welcome, welcome to that man that concludes our miseries and loves the English besides. Let us pray for peace.

Merlinus Anglicus Astrologicus, O R,

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A Mathematicall Discourse of the Effects which may succeed that Conjunction of Saturn and Fupiter, which was 1643. Feb.15. what Regions of Europe shall most suffer by it; in what nature the events shall be, and when they may determine.

Of some things confiderable before judgement.

STROLOGERS divide the Zodiack into twelve Signes, fo called and charactered, Aries, Y Taurus &, Gemini II, Cancer &, Leo N, Virgo M, Libra =, Scorpio M, Sagitarius F, Capricornus V, Aquarius =, Pisces H: Every Sign likewise is divided into 30. degrees.

There are also feven Planets; Saturn h, Jupiter 4, Mars 3 Sol O, Venus ?, Mercury ?, Luna D; There is also the head of the Dragon, and tail; the head is thus charactered Ω , the tail \mathfrak{V} thus; these are no Planets, but Nodes, &c.

The Planets have their feverall natures, and fo have the twelve Signs.

Every Planet hath two figns allotted for his House, (the Sunne and Moon excepted, who have but one apiece.)

Saturn hath for his Houses, Capricornus, and Aquarius, Jupiter hath Sagittarius, and Pisces.

Mars hath Aries, and Scorpio.

Sol hath Leo.

Venus hath Taurus, and Libra. Mercury hath Gemini and Virgo.

Luna hath Gancer.

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Befides this, every Planet hath exaltation in one or other of the figns: As Saturn is exalted in Libra, Jupiter in Cancer, Mars in Taurus, Sol in Aries, Venus in Pifces, Mercury in Virgo, Luna in Taurus, &c. being in any Signe where they are exalted, they are powerfall in their influence.

The Signshave also another division, As

Aries, Leo, Sagittarius, are cholerike and fiery, and fo make up the fiery Triplicity.

Taurus, Virgo, Capricornus, are earthly, and fo make the earthly Triplicity.

Gemini, Libra, Aquarius, are aiery, and make the aiery Trygon. Cancer, Scorpio, and Pifces, conftitute the watry Triplicity.

The fiery triplicity is governed by Sol and Jupiter.

The earthly triplicity by Venus, and the Moon.

The aiery by Saturn, and Mercury.

The watry by Mars alone, according to the beft Authors. Triplicity, Trygon, and Triangularity, are all of one fignification, and fignifie in effect thus much, viz. That three Signs of one pature, make a triplicity, trygon, &c.As Aries, Leo, Sagittarius, make the fiery triplicity, and fo of the reft.

Through the twelve Signs the Planets continually move, and in their direct motion, they move out of Aries into Taurus; but when they are Retrograde, they move backward, viz.out of Taurus into Aries; but the Suna nd Moon are ever direct, and fo confequently never Retrograde.

The Planets befides have feverall aspects each to other; which are either good, indifferently good, or very ill.

A Sextile alpect confilteth of 60. degrees of the Zodiack; As, when Saturn is in 15. degrees of Arics, and Jupiter in 15. degrees of Gemini, there is then a fextile betwixt them, or they behold each other with a fextile. This aspect is indifferent good.

A Quadrate aspect, or a quadrature containeth 90. degrees of the Zodiack, as if Saturnus be in 15. degrees of Aries, and Jupiter in 15. degrees of Cancer; here is a quadrate aspect bet wixt them, or they behold each other with a quadrate, or square aspect, for all is one; And this is ill, but not very ill.

A Trine afpect is, when there is 120. degrees difference, or di-Plance betwixt two Planets, viz. If Saturn be in 15. of Aries, and Jupiter in 15. of Leo, there is a trine afpect betwixt them; and this is a very good and promifing.

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Opposition is, when Planets are distant 180. degrees from each other, viz. Saturn in 15. degrees of Aries, and fupiter in 15. degrees of Libra, they are in perfect opposition to each other; and this opposition is an aspect of hate and continual enmity.

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Conjunction is, when two Planets are in one and the felf-fame Sign, degree, and minute, as now Saturn and Jupiter are in 25. & 26.minutes of Pifces: The characters of these aspects are Sextile *, Quadrate \square , Trine \triangle , Opposition \bigcirc , Conjunction] δ ., There are also many other aspects of the Planets, which are mentioned in Keplers Introduction to his Ephemerides: But in regard I have hitherto found no great matter in them, I forbear to speak of them: Nor is it my purpose to make an Accidence, but to explicate some words of Art.

A further Introduction to the Work, and of the nine Conjunctions preceding in the watry Triplicity.

MY onely intention was to have treated of the prefent Conjunction, but feeing I have opportunity offered mee, and that it will be very pleafant to the Reader, to confider of times preceding this Age; I have adventured to begin my labour fomething further of, and am contented in an Hiftoricall manner, to fet down all those nine Conjunctions which fore-went this I now am to write of. The Reader is to understand, that the Conjunction I write of, is of Saturn and Jupiter, and of their first meeting the feventh time in the watry Triplicity.

About the year of the World, 5 19. these two Planets had their first conjunction in *Cancer*, the first fign of the watry triplicity; and this was the first conjunction they ever had in the watry Trygon.

In Anno Mundi 1 3 3 3. they returned again into the fame Trygon, and made their first convention in Pifces, the last fign of the fame triangularity, and this was their fecond return.

In Anno 2 1 4 4. these heavenly bodies came to a conjunction in Scorpio, the second fign of the watry Trygon.

In Anno 2492. by Cœlestiall ordinance, they again entred the watry Trygon, their first meeting being in Scorpio, the second fign of this Triplicity.

Anno mundi 3756. Saturn and Jupiter the fifth time began their meetings, in the Aquaticall Trygon, and fign of Cancer.

About the year after Christ 590. the fixth time Saturn and B 2 Jupiter Jupiter made their revolution, and began again to make their conpjunction in Cancer, the first fign of this Trygon.

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If we may beleeve *John Ganivetus*, otherwife called *Amicus* medicorum; he tells us, That Saturn and Jupiter made their feventh return into the watry Triplicity, about the year of our Lord God, 1425. the thirtieth day of *August*, 17. hours and 45. minuts past noon, the position of the heavens fitted for the Elevation of the Meridian of *London*, being as followeth:


Beginning of the watry Trygon, 1425. or, the Sabbaticall return of the two superiour Planets into the watry Trygon. Ri

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• The judgement of Ganivetus, fol. 141. different 2ª. was thus Innuitur igitur propter elevationem Saturni super fovem, quod porestas Ecclesiastica in multis partibus opprimetur, a temporali posestate, maxime in substantiis Ecclesiasticis, & effectus illius conjuntionis nou videtur por integram evacuari ante quinquaginta annos, quia suit mutatio de triplicitate ad triplicitatem, & longo tempors fraudes, & bella debeut babere locum: That is, Because Saturne is elevated

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elevated above *Jupiter*, Ecclefialticall jurifdiction in many places fhall be oppressed by the Temporall powers, chiefly in Churchlivings or dignities : It feems, the effects shall not fully determine in fifty years, because it is the mutation of one triplicity into another, and deceit and warres are to be permanent a long time.

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He speaketh also something more of the effects of the same conjunction fol.213. differentia 3^a. Quia conjunctio fuit in signo aquatico, judicande sunt pluvie multe, quas consequitur corporum bumanorum humettatio excessiva, que est causa putrefactionum humorum, quam consequitur febris, & ratione excessiva nimit, consequitur penniciosor febrium species, que est pestilentialis, & Because the conjunction was in an aquaticall signe, we are to judge much rain to ensue; after which followeth the humectation of humane bodies in excesse, which is the cause of depravation of humanes, upon which ensue feavers; and by reason of too much excesse, there ariseth a more pernitious kinde of feavers, and more pestilentiall: Thus far he,

The Signe wherein they now began their return was Scorpio, a fign of the watry Triplicity, the houfe of Mars, a very treacherous and falfe fign, fixed and malitious: Conjunctiones in fignis aqueis quia est trigonus Martis, fignificant multa bella G inventiones operum mechanicorum propter Martem, & herest graves & magnas, dogma Mahumeti & aliorum lex & religio sub co trigono initium habuit: Conjunctions in aquaticall figns, which is the triplicity of Mars, denoteth many wars, and strange inventions of Mechanicall instruments, as also grievous and very great herefies: the opinion of Mahomet, and the Law and Religion of other heretiques began under this Trygon. They that are converfant in Histories, may do well to see, if these predictions did not jump right with the times fucceeding this conjunction,

This Conjunction found us in England engaged in a war with France, and much division and faction amongst our Nobility, mader an innocent King, Henry the fixth, being then about five or fix years of age, neither capable to give or take counfell. Of the aftairs of other Nations let their own Annals report. France was no leffe inraged then England; Spain had much division about succeffion; and after someflirs, John, some of Ferdinand of Anragon succeedeth in right of Blanch his wife. The year preceding this Conjunction, Constantinople was besieged by Amarath the second, but not taken; And also the valiant Zisca died of the plague, 2 ftout ftout defender of the Bohemians for their Religion. 1431. the Councell of Basill began, and Henry the fixth was crowned at Paris; and in the year 1444. Printing was invented at Strasburg, by John Guttenburg.

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But I am to examine, Whether any fuch actions might be predicted by Aftrologie.

Wee are to confider the Conjunction was in Scorpio, and Mars the difpofer of it in Libra his detriment; doth not Mars amongst the Planets, govern Aries, the afcendant of England and France? and did not these two Nations, for many years, continue in bloudy wars, &cc?

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The Religious are fignified by *Jupiter*, very unfortunate in the figure, and also by *Venus*, Lady of the ninth Houle, which together with the third fignifieth Religion, is not the combust, and in the twelfth House, as also in her fall? This being the first conjunction in the triplicity, hath principall and double fignification of the most generall actions that shall happen in Christendom, during the continuance of their meetings, either in *Cancer*, *Scorpio*, or *Pisces*.

As the Coujunction is in the third House (which judgeth of kindred) it portended much flaughter, bloudshed, and perfideous field, should be committed by men of one confanguinity and bloud : And was not this exactly verified, in the Uncles and Kindred of Henry the fixth, who never left perfecuting each other, untill a Kinsman, viz. the Duke of York, father to Edward the fourth, had almost thrust Henry the fixth out of his Throne, which yet he did not, but left it to his fonne, who perfected that work, and cut off whole families of the Royall House, to all which hee was more or leffe allied.

The tenth Houfe reprefenteth Kings; Is not Mersury Lord thereof in the tearms of the infortunes; But taking the Sun, who generally is the Significator of Kings and Princes, is he not in the twelfth Houfe of the figure, and opprefied by the fextill of Saturnus, in figns of long afcentions; though I could not have faid, Henry our then King, fhould have been deposed by any Aftrologicall judgement, yet I could have foretold him, by that positure of heaven, that both England should finart, and the King of England be in great perill, by his kindred and subjects: and that the Conjunction did portend infinite affliction unto him, &c. I could infinitly inlarge this point, but our own Histories speak fo feelingly of those times. times, I forbear further discourse, and come to the next conjunction fucceeding this, as I have it in a manuscript wrote by John Escuidus Anglus, of Merton Colledge in Oxford.

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The fecond Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, or, The first httle Conjunction in 12. Cancer. 21. July 1444. In the watry Triplicity.

In this year it was that *Julian* that unlucky Cardinall, perfwaded and also effected the breach of league with the *Turks*, whereupon followed the battell at *Varna*, in which *Ladiflans* was flain, the Chriftian Army defeated, to the great prejudice of all Chriftendom : also *Henry* the fixth married unfortunately with *Margaret* a *French* Lady; immediately after, our *English* Nobility began to be divided into faction, and so continued their malice, that by their own folly they brought upon them a Civill war, which fcarce ended untill most of the ancient Gentry were either destroyed, or strangly impoverished, & their poor King captived. About the time of this Conjunction, the *Venetians* by an inundation lost as many goods as were valued to be worth a Million of gold. We fay *Cancer* is afcendant of *Venice*.

Let any indifferent reader peruse those histories, that do treat of the affaires of *Eurspe* from the year of our Lord God, 1444. to the year 1464.

Did not the English lofe in France, what had been fortunately conquered by Henry the fifth.

Mahomet took the most noble City of Constantinople, whose afcendant is Cancer, the sign of the Conjunction.

Scotland hath Cancer its ascendant, nor was it, during these times, lesse ingaged in domestique broyles than England.

Nor can France rejoyce in any felicity the enjoyed, the most parts whereof were afflicted with the fword,&c.

A Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, or, The second little Conjunction in the watry Triplicity. 8 April. 1464, in grad. 6. Pifces.

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This Conjunction in England beginneth with the imprisonment of Henry the fixth, and the Revolt of the valiant Earl of." Warwick Warwick from Edward the fourth, as daring as any English King.

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During fome yeares after this conjunction, here was nothing but quarrelling in England; the truth is, we enjoyed no great happineffe under this King Edward the fourth : as he entred with blood, fo did he continue, and when he dyed, nothing lamented was he of his people, who love no tyrannicall government.

This King his posterity were requited with as much curtefie, as himself beltowed on the house of Lancaster.

I onely observe, that the meeting of the two superiours in the watry Triplicity, hath been obvious and disafterous to the Kings of England, their Nobility, and Commonalty. And the reason thereof I conceive to be, because most, or all of these Princes had Nativities discordant from that Triplicity under which the Norman Monarchy began, which was the earthly; and therefore there needed more circumspection in the mannaging of their affaires; and indeed as some have judged, our Kings were Bellipotentes, but not Sapientipotentes.

If the transit of Saturnus without the affiltance or strength of other malignant Promittors doth afflict any Hylegiacall place or places, he aspecteth either with Quadrature or Opposition in the Genitures of private perfons. Why shall he not then afford matter of trouble to the Kings of England, as often as he is in Conjunction with Jupiter in that sign, which is opposite to the ascendant of their Monarchy, viz. Pisces? Let any Chronologer see the success we have, when a conjunction is in Pisces.

The third little Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, in 24. Scorpio. 1484. 25. Novemb.

One year before this conjunction, Martin Luther was born, whole Nativity I have inferted, that posterity may see how it concurreth with this conjunction in regard of the great mutation which enfued in Religion by his meaner. Mrou Mergrou by

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(10) This very year the Moors of Granado were inforced to become Christians; and Henry the seventh the most politique and covetous of all the English Kings, employed Empson and Dudley about penall Statutes, which begot great affliction to the English Nation, who sove freedome and to be Masters of their own goods: but he not long after left all to Henry the 8. who knew how to spend more money than his Father could lay up: whose Nativity, Cardannes writes, is thus.

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A judicious eye may fee the Sympathy that this Princes Nativity hath with the politure of the preceding Conjunction, a confideration very remarkable, and much affiltant for better difcovery of the effects which shall fucceed after any of these Conjunctions. Here is almost the fame degree afcending both in the Nativity of the King and Conjuntion; a good sign that the effects should not harm that Prince. The Conjunction of the superiours is in the 10th house of heaven, the Luminary of the time, viz. the Sun at the birth of the King, is in the tenth house and neer the degree of the Conjunction,

The place of *Impiter* in the birth is neer the place of the Sun in the Conjunction, his cruelty (for he was cruell) is represented by the pofition

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fition of Mars, fo neer the degree ascending: and his dif-affection to his wives, appeareth to me to be fignified by the unluckie quadrature of Jupiter, lord of the seventh, and of Mars; as also by the squar of Luna to the Sun in Cardinall signes and Angles of heaven. For the number of his wives; the Moon her application to the Sun, to Jupiter, and her being in Sextile to Saturn, and in Trine to Mercury, and in Quadrate to Venue; might induce an Astrologer to judge he should have many wives, and wenches, but not from hence define the certaine number.

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The English had never any Prince of that largeneffe of heart, nor any that did 60 great matters, if we confider the ftrength of an Ecclefialticall party he had to encounter with, whom not with ftanding he foiled at their own weapon.

None was more valiant than he, or more vicious; No affront during his raign was offered to the *Englifk* Nation, which he did not retaliate in one kind or other; but he is dead, and his actions give caufe of wonder, if they be rightly confidered; if he was fubject to imperfections, he was a man; yet we have caufe to account him a brave man, that durft in those times oppose a proud infulting Clergie. In some measure we must acknowledge him to be the first that permitted the Gospell to be preached, though not in its purity, yet after a more pure manner then formerly: he was bleffed with a fon and a daughter, who after him cltablished the true Religion as to this prefent 1643 it continueth, and long may it continue without any addition in ceremony or doctrine.

But I return to the Conjunction in 1504. in the Scheam of whole true Polition, you find four plannets either in house or exaltation all in good houses, the Sun, Mercury, Saturn, and Jupiter in the Royall house of heaven, and Venus and the Moon both in the ninth house (viz. of Religion) and where they are effentially frong; an evident figne matters more than ordinary were enfuing. And you have alfo a Comet shewed it felf this year 1504. It is not recorded in what lign or part of heaven it appeared; but the effects of that no doubt did co-operate with the Conjunction; we finde during these 20. years, viz. from 1504.to 1524. That Martin Luther first published his Propositions against indulgences, viz. 1517. the first step to his greater quarrell with the Pope : Zninglins Preached the Gospell at Zurick; Eccins and Cajetan dispute; the Pope Excommunicateth Luther, his Books are burned; Lucher burneth the Popes Bull at Wittenburg. I finde that all Conjunctions of Saturn and Jupiter in Cancer are ominous C 2

(12) ominous to Rome, this Conjunction being the fift of this Triplicity, it feemes matter now grew fit, to put in Action what, was intended by the first according as Ganiverse had predicted. God now furring up active men to performe his Decrees.

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
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Now let us confider if Saturs being Lord of the ninth, and in the fign of Pifces, if he do not ftir up fome broyles for Religion, and some stormes to the English Kings.

The very year of this Conjunction, there was a Reformation of the Clergie at Ratisbone, and the fame year of Religion at Wittenburg. The King of France is taken prifoner by the Imperials at the fiege of Paurs and the next year enlarged by meanes of our Henry King of England.

1925. The Duke of Landburg and Governour of Sweden, become Lutherans.

1526. The Landgrave of Heffen goeth about to reform his Churches. and the meeting at Spire for Reformation.

1727. The herefie of the Anabaptiks beginnets to forced it felf. and Lusher and Zuinglins, as also Occolompadius contend each sogainst other about the Sacrament of the Lords Supper.

This year was the fiveating ficknesse in London: and the Duke of ?. Burbon and Imperials beliege and take Rome, and fack it to purpole: and now begins the diflike of Henry the 8. to his Queen Katherine 2. molt vertuous Lady.

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1528. At Bern the Maffe was abolished, and Images and Altars calt down, to were they at Bafil.

1529. The name of Protestants began upon the protesting of the Elector and Landgrave against a Popish Edict. In that year Saturn & by Transit passed through the figne of Taurus, and Jupiter of Leo: both fixed fignes, Popery will never prevaile totally against it.

Forraigne Universities pronounce the marriage of Henry the eight unlawfull. Wolfey the English Cardinall groweth in difgrace, the first leading Cafe to the downfall of Popery in England, which the year -1530. followed to fome purpole; the Clergie in England being a condemned in a Pramunire, and pay a round lum, viz. one hundred thousand pounds to the King.

The fame year the Angustan confession was exhibited to the Empecour, being composed by Melancton; and the Smalcaldian league betwixt divers Princes of Germany for defence of the Protestant Religion.

1532. King Hanry was divorced from his Queen, and married the 2 Lady Anne Bullen, by whom in the fucceeding year he had Elizabeth after wards Queen of England, a Mother to the English Nation.

Anno 1534. The Popes power was abrogated in England, but I think it not fit to accept of that year for the first year of allowing o Protestanisme in England; perhaps it was done for respective ends in. the Prince, &cc.

Anno 1535. Geneva expelleth the Bilhop, and alter Religion. In the e fameyear the most active order of the Jesuits began, instituted by Ignating Loiola, confirmed after in the year 1540. Whether the Comet that appeared in 1543, Enfiformis, did point out that learned people. I know not; but immediately after, there was in all parts of Chrittendome much alteration in Religion, and many novell Sects amongit the learned. And as if the heavens did take notice of the times, which immediately fucceeded, and of the plentifull matter there would be to work on, there appeared from the year 1530. to 1542. no lefte than eight Comets or blazing fars; they came after the Conjunction in Piscibus, and did co-operate in the effects which were deligned by that Conjunction, Sec.

1538. The Bible was commanded to be read in the English tongue: 9 G 3

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
and this year began the Antinomian Sect, which denied the Law to be taught; and do they not now 1642, 1643. again under a Conjunction of Saturn and Impiter in the figne of Pifces, trouble the English Synod? I conceive Protestani/me had now its first erection and allowance

in England; for the permittance of the English Bible, certainly gave us the first light and fruits of the Gospel.

1539. Reformation was made in Mifnia and Brandenburge, 1541. The act for fupremacy was made, and here in this year it was that the fix bloody Articles were made, fo that in effect we profeffed our felves Protestants, and yet executed men for holding Protestant tenents: Its hardly to be differented what Religion it was that was most in force fome years. But as I faid formerly, there hath not been any *Conjunction* of the two fuperiours in the figne of *Pifces*, but it hath in one kind or other been obnoxious to the *English* Kings, Nobility and Commonalty of *England*.

The years 1540. 1541. and 1542. were full of action not onely in England, but in all or molt parts of Europe • the Scottish Nation suffered much by the distraction of the Nobility. The Rochellers took up Armes, because a Garrison was there placed. The English enter France and Scotland, and burn part of Edenbrough: such like Actions as these were done during the twenty years intervall of the last, and this Sconjunction which now succeedeth.

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The Pleiades culminating and Saturn in the Alcendent, & Planets in their fals or detriments, might give caufe to fulpect this King thould neither live long, or have any quietneffe in his Raigne : the Conjunction preceding is in opposition to his tenth house: and Mars in the Conjunction, is in the place of the Moon at birth : I conceive pure Melancholly killed him, and that he was not poisoned : is not Saturn Lord of the fixth in the Afcendent; cannot Kings dyc upon bad directions without poilon : Accendens ad Saturn & Luna ad PJ. may be Ab. fciffor, to any living, fo placed as here.

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The Conjunction was in the eleventh house of heaven, but in the providence of the second seco

The Dragons taile in Cancer, might have warned Scotland of trou-

Anno 1545. The Councell of Trent began the last generall Councell that ever was, or perhaps that ever shall be; and yet it cannot properly be called generall, because many Christian Princes fent uot any Suffragans thither; yet whosoever shall read the Acts of it and confider its continuance, shall finde matter to wonder. Henry the 8. dyeth 1546. to whom succeeded his fon Edmard, of whom Cardane an Italian hath given an excellent Character. 1547 Religion was altered in England. The Neapolitans make infurrection in contradiction of the accurfed Inquisition. The Scots are overthrown at Muscleborough. Nothing but disputation about Religion, and controversite croverfie for Religion all this Kings Raigne all over Earope, the Councell of Trens fill fitting. 1553. Edward dyeth and Mary comes with a little trouble to Raigne.

She dyed when the Sun came to the body of Mars the 8. of Decemb. 1554. the Sun was almost totally Eclipfed in 27. Gemini, the Sun being in 27. S'agitt Ary the place of Saturn at her birth, Saturn then by tranfit being in Pisces, also 1555.the Moon was totally darkned in light : being in 0 23. of Gemini, Saturn by Transit being in Aries, which might bring forrow enough to this Queen, and affliction to the City of London and Kingdome S of England : Gemini being Athe Alcendent of London, 13, and Aries of England : 21 L Ecclipfe in either of thofe, o but especiall in Gemini is fatall to England.

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
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The Moon in Opposition to Jupicer, who is Lord of the tenth, give this Queen no honour or fame, the Moon being alto diminishing in light, addeth to the former infelicity. The place of the Sun in her Radix, is the place both in figne and degree of the Conjunction of Sam turn and Jupiter subsequent to her birth : Ex inde Regnum acquisivit. The Nativity doth not declare her to be of fo monftrous a condition as some have branded her with : The did permit the Roman Clergie to burn many of her English Subjects, for which to this very day the Nation doth not relifh that name, viz. Mary; Naturally they love that Prince molt, that is sparing of their bloods and purfes: and what King foever followes the advile, Henry the fourth gave to bis fon Henry, shall never loofe their loves, but he that fuffers them to be tyrannized over by infulting Officers, or permits Monopolies, he shall finde it a hard task to regaine their affections.

The time this Qieen raigned was fhort, to the great content of the English, although the Spaniard is a gallant man, yet her people were not well pleafed with that Match; for if Spain be fubject to Sagittarius, London, and much of England is to Gemini, figns oppofile one to another, and this is an Aftrologicall reason, why for the most part, we love not that majesticall people.

In 1557. we loft *Callie*, but could never fince obtain it: In the year fucceeding Queen *Mary* died, and with her all the forrows of the *Englifb* ended, God giving us in her room, the vertuous, and prudent *Elizabetb*: That very year Reformation began in *Scotland*.

I know no rea- o for why fhe fhould have The been angry with any A- u ftrologer, that fhould have faid; Madam, about your 69. year the Alcen. comes to the Pleiades, which denotes, not onely fickneffe unto your perfon, but difturbance in your government. Her M. C. about that time came to the Conjunction of Saturn. The Irifb warre was not very fucceffefull, which much afflicted her.

This Queens enemies are fignified by Saturn in the feventh Houle, who having no effentiall dignity there, could not much hurt, yet had the lived the years of Mathufelah, the could not have wanted detractors, and powerfull Adversaries, for Saturn feldom is reconciled, and the Dragons-tail in Aquarius, a fixed Sign, ftirred up the many flanders caft upon her honour; having three Planets in effentiall fortitudes, the feared no man: no enemy, no adversary could ever have advantage of her. How that Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1 4 8 4. as Junctinus would have us believe, could prognoficate any D

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
honour unto her, I fee not. The agreement of her Genefis, with the Scheame of the Conjunction in 1544. I confesse did portend glory, and renown unto her; as any that examine both the Positures may easily perceive.

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James, King of Great Britain, born 1566. June 19.9. hor. 10. min. A. M. Lat. 56.

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Venus culminating with eminent fixed Stars, & the mutuall reception of the Luminaries, the harmony betwixt his Scheame and the Conjunction preceding his birth, gave him that fame and effeem hee had in the world; and would God hee had lived. to our times : The Sun is Hyleg. and therefore hee died when the Sun came to the body of Saturn : I allo wonder, he never received hurt by falls from horles, or by fire: Its true, Saturn in the twelfth doth there most good, if ever any; leaft hurt I am fure he doth. Saturn and Mars in Leo gave him that eminent mole on his fide.

1569. Is a Councell at Millain; two English Earls rebell: Scotland afflicted extreamly; the Dragons-tail in Cancor gives that Nation trouble. A year full of milery to the Netherlands, by means of Duke D'alva. The English began to flourish in all parst: See what it is when the Afcendent of the Conjunction and the Princes are of one Triplicity, no general fate impending. Queen Elizabeths Afcendent being 15. of Capricornus, this in 1563. the 16. of Virgo, and although it was in the feventh of her birth, yet fupiter being well dignified, gave her victory over Saturnine enemies; the truth is, the Conjunction of the superiours being near the radical place of Saturn in her birth, excited her own Subjects to rebell, viz. the Iris, and many intestine troubles in England: God gave all her enemies super the federate of the effects of this last Conjunction.

1 5 8 2. The Gregorian Kalender was first instituted, in which year King James was detained by the Rathens as a prisoner. Many and fundry were the actions of these times, which I omit, and hasten to the next Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter.

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
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This Conjunction falls in the fecond Houfe of Queen Elizabeth, importing much confumption of her Treasure: Having the Moan at her birth in Taurus, which is now the figne Culminating, it prenoted her Victorious atchievements; the Sanne also in this Conjunction is in Trine to his place at her birth. All things now being in the memory of man, I give every man leave to peruse Histories.

W Hat now fucceeds, was formerly in the year 1643: a little before the Conjunction in February; written, and intended to have feen the World ere this time, but because, Difficile of judicium; de que caremus exemplis multarum nadicum in nostris temporibus: Rigel. Apho. 46. Its very difficult to judge of these matters, concerning which we have few or no Prefidents in our Age: I was inforced therefore to look behinde our times, and to procure, as well as I could, the nine Conjunctions of the watry Trygon, which preceded this, of which I intend my Difcourfe; of all which, the curious Aftrologer may make better ufe, then is fit for mee to expresse: If there be either errour in the true place of the Planets, or in some of the Scheames, let it be remembred that of Roger Bacon, De mirabilibus, fol. 10. Pluribus modis contingit deviare, quam fignum attingere, Gubi plura requirement facilius erratur. Its more easie, saith he, to erre, then hit the mark, and where many things are required, the more easily we may fail. Perhaps, my writing may ftir up either some more able man to convince me of errour, or to take more labour to amend my imperfections, with either of which I stall be well contented : in the mean time, receive this Discourfe as I formerly composed it.

The Authors former intentions, now published.

That I may not exceed the memory of man, we are to remember that, in the year of our Lord God, one thouland five hundred eighty and three, there was a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in the figne of Pisces; of which one Malter Harvy did write: What effects there then followed, let either the Annals of England, or of forraigne Nations informe you; Yet let not us forget the Spanish Ar-s made in 1588. which threatned no leffe then deftruction, or subversion to the English Nation, and yet one John Harvy, a Physician, in S contradiction of Regiomontanus, an admirable Astrologer, who defigned that year for a strange one, was pleased to publish his own folly, and indeavoured to maintain, It would be a year as others; but the actions of the year, which he lived to fee, confuted his erroneous judgement,

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ended publicitibus: colots ins well as The entrance of Saturn and Jupiter into the hery Trygon, calculated exactly with Initrument, by Sir Christopher Heydon Knight.

Before I can come to handle this laft Conjunction of the watry Trygon, I muft fpeak fomething of the two Superiours firft meeting in the fiery Trygon, 1603. for I muft leave nothing behind me: and of that Conjunction in 1623. I intend hereafter to be more copious in writing my judgement upon this Triplicity; yet flight not what now comes from mee.

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Having intreated my loving Friend, Malter Matthew Fiske, to give me the true Scheame of the great Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1603. (for it was fo) hee gave me the Positure aforeiaid, exactly done by the Rudolphine Tables : Some dayes after, I had occasion to peruse a letter lent me, which was wrote to Doctor Foster of London, 40. years before, wherein I found the Scheame as you see Calculated by Sir Christopher Heydon with Instrument; At which I wondred, and was not a little joyfull, that the Tables of Kepler were search, and my friend Master Matthew Fiske should be so able; for in truth, he hath as perfectly performed the Calculation, by the Tables of Kepler, as Sir Christopher Heydon did by his curious observation; which, in a word, makes good the Calculators exactnesses, and the verity of the Tables, being directed by an able hand.

Of the great, or, rather greatest Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, 1603. it being their entrance into the fiery Triplicity.

This Trygon is called by *Ptolomey*, The fift of the *Zodiatke*; and by the *Arabians*, The fiery Trygon: And we are to know, God hath alwayes innobled, and adorned these Trygonall returns with fome memorable, and notable changes in the Church and Commonwealth; 1 mongst which, this of the first, hath ever carried the prerogative from the rest, both for that the world was first created, and the chief Epoche of great Actions, and alterations have happened under it; and alfo because this Trygon beginneth with *Aries*, the chief of the Cardinall Signes.

The first relitution of this Trygon, after the Worlds creation, happened in Enochs time; the fecond, in the univerfall Deluge; the third, in Moses, and the children of Israels delivery from the bondage of Egypt; the fourth, in the Monarchy of the Meds; the fifth, in Christs, and the Romans Empire; the fixth, in Charles the Great, and the translation of the W stern Empire to the Germans: And now this feventh, hath a fectet mystery of Sabbatisme in it, and it promifeth fomething of more fingular moment to the World then the or ther: For as fohames Anglicus, fol. 13. tractar. prim. faith; Et propter hoc evenit, quod prima vice quum junguntur in Trygono, & cum de alio se mutatur hac Conjunctio, virtutem habeats magnam, & majorem quam alia conjunctiones, viz. For this cause it commeth to passe, when they are first conjoyned, after the leaving of one, & entring into

an other Triplicity ; fuch a Conjunction hath great vertue and operation, yea and greater then any other. What those effects may be, and what in a full measure of time may be expected, if wee beleeve the Arabians, or Cardane, they are set down by Campanella, de sensurerum. fol. 358. Sub Arietis Triangulo Sunt monarchia ingentes, leges justa, sapientes divinorum, pietas bona cali & Europes in nostro bemifherio. Under the fiery Trygon mighty Monarchies arife, just Laws, the Europeans in our Hemisphear will bee more conversant, and greater fearchers of divine things, &c, But the fame Authour, in his Aftrologicall Tract. fol. 64 delivers the matter more fully : Dum funt magna Conjunctiones in Trygono primo, qua durant annis 199. Osingulis 20. fiant annis, nascuntur orbi inferiori monarchie, tranguillitas, pax, ex Solis & fovis dominio, item sapientes insignes sterilitates magne ob triangulum igneum : Viz. Whilest the great Conjunctions of Saturn and fupiter are in the first Triplicity, which continueth 199, years, and are every twenty years once, in our inferiour world there arife Empires, Monarchies, tranquillity, peace, by reafon of the dominion of the Sun and Jupiter, great barrennesse alfo, because its the fiery Trygon.

All men know, that in this year 1603. James the fixth, came to be King of England: Could a more memorable thing bee in this world, then for a Scottifh King to become Monarch of the English, and that without blows, confidering the former Antipathie betwixt both Nations : Was not this in effect a new Monarchy, yea, and a great one to be King of England, Scotland, and Freland?

Did not that prudent King bring Peace, not onely to the English, but in effect, was the fole procurer of it over all Emrope, which not long after followed? And had wee not in 1603. a great plague in London, and during his raigne, many years of great fcarcity? All which, verifie the Arabian Doctrin exactly : If we examine the Conjunction, we shall find Mercury, that in the Conjunction was King Fames his Significator, in our Horizon was Combult, but separating; and was not that good man miraculoufly delivered from the fury of the Powder-plot in 1605. But I passe by these things, and do deliver my judgement, what may in time bee expected under the fiery Triplicity, this being the forc-runner of part of those many accidents, yet are remaining to be compleated. I fay, and judge : That God will reftrain Monarchicall Pomp, and reduce all to an Ariftocraticall mediocrity, both in the government of the Commonwealth, and of the Church ; But before this be effected, Omnia nutu unins 1.M.K

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(25) anius regentur, as Cardane long fince predicted : After which, God will give to long a Peace, and fuch tranquillity to the Earth, as thee never yet enjoyed the like; In the mean time as Mercury, Jupiter, and Saturne in this Scheame of their first return, are in the twelfth Houle, I conceive that privately, and underhand by lies, by treacheries, by faigned and diffembled Treaties, and Ambaffadours, and by the policie of the Jefuiticall faction all over Europe, the true Proteftant Religion shall infinitely be diffressed, and the heavenly intentions impedited, and all those Countreys that professe Protestantismne exceedingly be molefted, by fo fecret and close a compact of Villains. and falle hearted traytors, lurking in the bosomes and closets of Princes, as that many will think Popery and Papiline shall return to its old feat in every Countrey, but that it never will in our Kingdomes, for Inpiter being in his chief House, cannot but in fine overcome, and the rather, because he receives the Sun and Mercury in the Ascendent ; which fnew, that God will miraculoufly by meanes of fome young Prince, or Commonalty of people, difcover and bring to light, the close mystery of those Plots, that from the year 1602, untill almost 50. years be accomplished, shall involve all at sometimes, and part at other of Christendom in most bloudy broiles; but of this anon. 90 The actions performed during thefe 20. years, are fresh in the memory of every man : I therefore come to the next Conjunction. The Second Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in the fiery Trygon, called the first little one. 1623. 711-7. Munday 8. 48. min. P. M.

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We may fee things are not yet mature, to put the will of the Ce-Heftiall bodies, and in them the Decree, I hope, of the Almighty into full action. This Conjunction, is locally in the fixth House, in opposition to the precedent in 1 603. God retards his Decrees for a time ; hee is fearce born to this year 1 643. that shall fee the beginning, in any full measure, of what this Sabbaticall return of the Planets intend. The effects of this Conjunction, and the principall Sticklers do all their deeds of darknesse under-hand, in as much as concerns Religion : Is not Jupiter Lord of the House of Authority, and Sol generally the fignificator of Kings in the fixth Houfe, and fubterranean, and in Cancer the twelfth from Leo . Are Princes deluded, and will they not fee? After 17. years the Moon comming to the Suns Quadrature, will either give fight of former milgovernments, or elle puzzle them, & forfan: Here's Venus in the feventh, and Mercury, and the Conjunction it felf is in the figne of the feventh House : Shall women rule, or men of feminine constructions, and conftitutions, croffe all the Europian defignes, and make us all fick of the infinite milery they bring upon us; Let England beware when either Aquarius is the Ascendent of a Conjunction of the Superiors, or of an English King or Queen, withesfe this Conjunction, and the Afcendent of Queen Mary 1516. And forget not that King fames his death fucceeded this Conjunction fome few years, and a great plagve after his death, carrying away 50. thousand foules to accompanie fo noble a Prince.

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We in England, have had two of our best Princes deaths followed with two great plagves, viz. Queen Elizabeth 1603. and King James 1625. There's a mystery in it, if I durft unfold it; I hope wee ihall no more fuch great plagues, I with fuch Princes. But becaufe occafionally I shall touch other matters of this Conjunction, in my immediate fucceeding Difcourfe, I omit any further relation, and come to this Conjunction which was in 1642. according to the Englift account, which mult of neceffity be the Defignatrix of fome memorable Actions, in regard it is in a figne of contrary nature to the two preceding.

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This is the Conjunction of which I intend now, and first did intend, to write of, it happens, or is in a figne contrary to the two former Conjunctions, viz. in 1603. and 1623.¹ they convening in fignes of the fiery Triplicity, and this in the figne of the watery, the former two in Regall and diurnall fignes Masculine and Cholerick, this in a Feminine, Nocturnall, Watery, Moyst and Flegmatick, oblique and by corporeall, vitious and crooked figne, obedient and of divers proportions; quite contrary to the two former.

Let the inhabitants of Europe in generall observe, that as this Conjunction is in an aquaticall signe, so the effects proceeding from hence will be such, and of such like quality and operation, as fire is to water, or water to fire: for as water allayeth and abateth the extraordinary hotnesses of fire in naturall operations, so this Conjunction foretelleth that what either is now, or hath been illegally obtained by any Prince against his vassails, or by the Nobility and Gentry against their Tennants in the former fiery or Commanding times (when Will and E 2 Pleasure -

(28) Pleafure, were politive Lawes) thall now by the effects depending on this Conjunction, receive a quenching or abatement of their heat, violence and oppreffion, proportionable to the quality of the Patient or undergoer of former fufferings: Albumazer Diff. 2. Cap. I. Cum mutatio fuerit in aquaticis vel signis terreis, significat vulgi & mediocrium bominum equalitatem eorum cum regibus in ordine, viz. When mutation or change of any of these Conjunctions is either in watery or earthly fignes, it denotes the eftate of the common or mean man to be equall to that of Princes. An Aphorifme if judiciously observed and pithily underftood, not much deviating from truth.

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Let the Kings, Princes, and Magistrates of Europe observe and carefully beware, that if they have by any hoftility, fubtility, treachery, or any Court by unwarrantable meanes prevailed or incroached upon their inferiours, I fay here will be a time of recovery offered, here will a day of retaliation appear, before the effects of this Conjun-Etion furcease, so that the fame tyramy that any Prince hath used against his people, or the fame measure of injustice any Court of Ju-Itice, and its Officers have executed against poore offenders or Complainants; the fame proportion of hardnesse of heart in the Subject against his Soveraign, and of the weeping Client against the infulting Officer shall now be retorted, and with excelle in the execution thereof.

And further as the two precedent Conjunctions in 1603, and 1623. were both in Regall fignes, and fo thereby the Prerogative of Princes the power of the Magiltrate, and authority of many Courts was elevated to an exceeding height in greatneffe, fo by this Conjunction in the year 164?. the contrary may, or ought to happen, and a suppression of those exorbitancies in each feverall calling, may fortunately be expected, for this Conjunction shall be as a bridle to the two former; The appearance of this Conjunction, as I observe, is contrary to that of termer times; for usually these Conjuctions did successively and in an orderly progreffe fucceede each other in fignes of the fame Triangularity, for the space of 198. years, and 265. dayes, and when they had run over that Station the Almighty had decreed them in that Trigon, they entered into the sublequent Trigon, and therein accomplifhed the like number of years and dayes as aforelaid. But now in Anno 1642, as if the divine Providence, were about to change the conftant order of nature, and the whole Fabrick of the Universe, these two most waighty or ponderous Planets (after two Conjunctions in the fiery Trygon) come to their tenth and last Conjunction in the (29)

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figne of Pifees, the laft figne in number of the Zodiack, and perhaps the laft that thall ever be in this I regon, being in a figne which is the most weak and imporent of all the twelve; but yet a House wherein Inpiter hath much power. The Celeftiall bodies whether guided by the immediate finger of God, or whether to appointed by the Secundreian Intelligences or Planetary Angels, who move and direct our earthly e affaires, as the more fearet learning informethus, have given permiffion to two precedent Conjunctions, in the Regall Triangularity, before they would permit a perfect conclusion of the watery. Times have no Prefidents of the like excursion, or mutation (that ever I could read of) nor fhall the ages in future fee the like. It may justly be doubted and in an Aftrologicall way divined, that there shall be a fensible disturbance, if not a finall fubversion, to those Common-wealths and Monarchies, that had originally their beginning either in 1603. 1623. or neer, or fince thole times. For let that be granted, which is most certain, that the first Conjunction of the fiery Triplicity was in Sagittarius 1603. and this now is Pifces in perfect Quadrature in respect of Signe, but in most exact partill Quadrate to the place of the Sun and Venue; if the Moon in that was in Opposition to the Sun, in this fhe is in a Square; the Politure of Saturn and Jupiter then was in 7. deg. 58. min. Sagittary, that degree now is the culpe of the twelfth house; shall tribulation and affliction be brought upon us, after fo long a time, by the malice of those times or Action of those men that then lived, or thall we diffurbe the prepolterous opprefiions which then and fince had life and support,

Under the fourth Triplicity, which telpecteth the first Triplicity with an holtile Alpect; the Prerogative of the first Monarchy will be thaken; direfull herefies begin, protected with Armes, by reafon of Mars and the Moon, faith is more inlarged by the Sword than miracle: new Religions or Tenents arile, checking the former aufterity (or rather superstition) and yet to a good intent, because the property of the stars is to incline, but the use of Liberty is to use that inclination Well. or ill. I shall speak more amply of these things when I come to handle the Agent in this Conjunction; Let us now observe the face of

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6 2 all or most part of Europe at the moment of this Conjunction in Feb. 1643. I with we had been better employed, that is, had not been in Armes one against another. Que semel oft imbuta recens, Grc. France is in action against the Spaniard; Portugall writted about a year before from the Spanish crown, hardly ever to be recovered from that brave Prince enjoyes it; its his right, God keepe him fate in his Kingdome, and let his off-fpring long chjoy it.

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Catalonia, where fierce people inhabite, in Armes against their Soveraigne, for opprefling them with too heavie burthens.

Bondiron a longer The Swede in the bowels of Germany; * Denmark quiet and fecure, not yet molefted. The Irifh in Rebellion against the King of England, pretending subversion of their fundamentall Laws and Popish Religion was intended by the English. The Pope at odds with the Duke of Mantua, and some petty Italian Princes. I heare not but that the Turke is quiet, and fo the Polonian, the Coffack, the Transilvanian and Muscovites are all in peace; be it fo, and I pray God it may be fo, but I fear peace is fuch a bleffing they shall enjoy but a fhort space.

> This is the true condition of Europe the 15. Feb. 161. at the true time of Saturn and Jupiter their conjunction. The State of Venice is quiet.

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When I had well confidered our manifold troubles, and that they preceded the moment of this conjunction. I was enforced to look backward, and fo I did to the conjunction in 1603. and that in 1623. and to all the Eclipfes fince those times, and to the one hundred and twenty Conjunction, of which Ptolomy forewarneth the Astrologer diligently to confider in generall accidents, all these exactly confide-

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red, yet did they not give my mind fatisfaction, but incited me to a higher Scrutiny: for though I well know, that every visible Eclipse in our Horizon of the Sun or Moon, and every of those lefter Conjuctions afore mentioned have in one kind or other speciall and materiall fignifications in their influences upon the bodies and actions of men, yet because the effects of any Eclipse of the Sun cannot last above three yeers, nor of the Moon a far shorter time, I was induced to confider, if there were not some Comet or blazing star, whose effects were not as yet fully determined, and which as yet I had not remembred, and which might happily cooperate, or had prepared matter for this prefent Conjunction to work upon ; for the Conjunction could not begin to operate so long before its being : the effects we know mult alwayes succeed the causes.

The laft Comet which appeared in Europe was in Anno 1618. excellently observed by Longomontanus in Astronomia Danica. There are a people that do too much flight the appearance and effects of Comets, as if they fignified nothing, but let them confider, That God doth not alwayes speak unto men in expresse words and fillables but many times extraordinarily, admonishing us by the Motions and apparitions of the heavenly bodies (which are the works of his owne fingers) is fufficiently teltified, both by that ftar which led the Magi in the Gofpell to the knowledge of our Saviours Nativity, and by the words of Chrift himfelf, prefaging the deltruction of ferufalem, forewarned the fews to lift their heads to heaven, to behold the fignes that w should be in the Sun and in the Moon and in the stars, before that day. Neither did the events fail his prediction (for as fosephus a Captain no leffe famous in those Wars, than a true Hiltoriographer) reporteth, befides the great and fearfull Eclipfes preceding, there appeared a terricle Comet in form of a flaming fword over the City, by the fpace of a whole year together, as you may read Lib. 7. cap. 12. de bello fudaico. And furely I doubt not, but it pleafeth God by these heavenly Prodigies, no leffe to participate to, and communicate, and conferwith men about his fecret determinations, then he was wont of old by dreames and visions. It was excellently spoken by the Philosopher

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Herodotsu, When God is to punish a Nation or City, he first fignifies his intention by Prodigies. It was also as well faid of that Christian, who delivered this sentence. Lognitur cum hominibus Deus non modo lingua humana, per Prophetas, Apostolos & pastores, sed nonnunguam etiam ipsis elementis in formas & imaginas diversas compositis, viz. God doth not onely deliver his will unto us by Prophets, Apoltles, and Paftors, but foinetimes in the Elements composed into feverall formes and Images. I am informed by Ptolomy in Apborif. 98. Trajectiones atque crinita secundas partes in judiciis ferunt, viz. Comets and blazing ftars, carry a fecond part in judgements. And by Guido Bonasus, fol. 592. Omnes Cometa fignificant bella, terrores, &magnos oventus in mundo. All Comets fignifie Wars, terrours, and ftrange events in the world; we are commanded by Gardane in Segment. 2. Apporis. 133. In constitutionibus generalibus etiam Cometas er reliqua incidentia obfervare oportet : In giving judgements upon generall Conflictutions, confider the Comets and the reft of the judgements incident thereunto: of which opinion Prolomy is Lib. 2. Quadripartiti, fot. 105, Obfervanda funt Cometa in universalium eventuum consideratione, etenim effectus ha pariunt, quales a Marte cientur as Mercurios: ut bella, aftus, motus turbulentos, & alia que ista fogui confiseverunt; Comets in confideration of generall events are to be observed, for these produce effects, and are known by Mars and Mercury, viz, wars, droughts, violent commotions, and other enormities which usually accompany: Rigel, addeth Aphorif 137. Mutantur Regna per apparitionem Cometarum in signis regiis, dum movetur mite fensibili & de uno in alio signo, & magis quando plures una in uno anno erunt : Kingdomes are altered by the apparition of Comets in regall'Sines, (why not house?) more especially when they fenfibly moove out of one Signe into another, or when at one time and in one year many appear: There were feen 1618. three Comets, the first began and ended in the Signe of Leo, a Regall figne, and chiefly concerned by its verticality Bohemia and Hungaria, and I those Countries there adjacent, but by reason of the Signe Italy, and Rhetia neer the Alpes, G.c.

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The fecond Comet did not appear to us, nor was there any thing feen in our Horizon but the Tayle, it principally threatned those parts of the Indias, which the Spaniard and Portugals have obtained by their industrious Navigations.

The third is that which I must make use of in this discourse, as being exactly observed, and passed through three Signes, &c.

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It is conceived the Comet began the day above named, but in regard of the thick mifts and clouds which over-fpread that part of Denmarke, Longomontanus lived in, he could make no observation before the 21. of Novemb. although D. Bainbridge in London observed it the 18. of Novemb. being Wednesday, and finished his observation the 16. of December following, the Comet being after 28. dayes not visible in London. As there was a speech many dayes and a rumour of the appearance of a Comet, but no exact visibility thereof, fo it may be well observed, that the mercy of Almighty God is in.) Enite, that did as it were confult with himfelf, whether this direfull Comet fhould not be recalled, and adde fome more years of Repentance to the world.

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The Aftrologicall judgement which fucceeds, I frame according to the observation of Longomontanus, from the time of the full Moon fucceeding the Comet. And I do conceive as it was 28, days observed by my Author, and also by Doctor Bainebridge, and fo maony dayes was for the most part altogether visible, fo I fay, (falvo judicio aliorum) the effects fhall fhew themfelves 28. yeares, and be fo long time, ere the accidents fignified by it, fhall furceafe : See its mod 10 tion in Longitude, and its Declination.

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The Comet, as you may observe, was not fixed, (as that Star in 1572. whose effects this age shall scarce live to see) but in 28. dayes ran through part of Scorpio, all Libra, and 22. deg, and 15. min. of Virgo, in all the degrees of its motion were according to its Longitude, 77. deg. and 50. min. Cometa mobiles bella indicant ab externis. Cardanus, Seg. 3. Aphorif. 117. In Cardinibus Regum mortes, in nono loco religionis jacturam, in ottavo vel duodecimo pestilentiam, ant F 2 jasturam segetum, in undecimo Nobilium mortee : Mooving Comets fhew war from Forraigners: if the Comet fhew its felf in the tenth house, it portends the death of Kings, if in the ninth, the hazard of Religion and spoil of the Church, if in the twelfth or eighth, a peftilence or the spoil of corn; if in the eleventh, the death of many Nobles follow. Cardanus ends not fo, vide Seg. 5. Aphorif. 15. Cometes valde claras ac conspicuus, tum etiam mobilis ac diuturnus, mutationem alicujus Imperii decernit. When a Comet appeares clear and confpicuous, and also quick in his dayly motion, it pre-notes a mutation or change of some Empire. Cometes mutantes leges, si in nono, vel undecimo apparaerint, seditionem in lege, non legem oftendunt, nec crit in illa unum caput; Card. Seg. 2. Aphorif. 206. Comets that altar Laws, if they appear in the ninth or eleventh house of heaven, they rather shew controversie in points of Law, than the diffolution of the Law; yet they shall contend upon many points of the Law. Whether these profound Aphorismes have not been exactly verified, even upon the Engliß Nation in particular, and upon almost every Country in Europe fince this Comets appearance, I leave it to every honeft Reader to confider : Have an eye to the pressures of France, Germany, Denmarke, and Ireland, Gr.

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Not onely the fwiftneffe of the Comets Motion, but its Retrogradation or courfe in motion might have induced any verfed but meanly in the principles of Art, to judge fome more than ufuall accidents to be forth-comming into the world; and if we would know of what Nature these actions should be, heare Doctor Dee, Aphoris. 88. Planeta Retrogradus natura constans decretum guodam modo perfringere videtur, periodam suans diurnams breviori absolvendo tempore quam ipse Equator, Ge. A Retrograde Planet doth feem to break the constant order of Nature, finishing his diurnall period, in thorter time than the Equator it felf. So that it feemes some Princes and Potentates, many Noble men and Ecclefiafticall have ever fince the appearance in 1618 been fleated in the courfe of their lives by the influence of this Retrograde Comet, viz. They have laboured hard by a ftrict hand, and an awing domineering authority to oppresse their Neighbours Tenants and Subjects, effecting that the fafeft for them, whereas in truth it first undid them in the good opinion of the people, and lastly when the Comet came to be Verticall over the afflicted Countries, very neceffity inforced them to rife in Armes for destruction of their Retrograde Lords.

At first this Comet had Meridionall declination from the Equator,

as if God would willingly have spared us, that are on the North fide the *Aquator*, and live in Northern Latitude; and fent out his punishing Angell to more remote Countries, viz. the Indies, &c. But our fins encreasing, he gave direction to the Comet to point out *Europe*, and in *Europe*, *England*; yet his clemency was such, as that he permitted not the Comet to be Verticall over any part of *England*, untill it had been visible and verticall to many other places 21. dayes, which in measure of time, give, according to my limitation, twenty one yeares.

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By which his long forbearance, it appeareth, that God did reflect apon the many interceffions of some Abrahams, Samuels, Davids, and Daniels, that then lived amongst us : who, with weeping, fasting, and mourning, like fo many Hezekiahs, obtained thefe 21. yeares longer, for us to repent in. After the Comet, I fay, had been vifibly ap- E parent, 21. dayes, it had by the exact observation of Longomontanus, 49. degrees of Northerne Declination, and then entred the figne of Virgo the Common alcendent of the English Kings and Monarchy; C for many conceive William the Conquerour obtained England prefently after a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, in Virgo; I am certain D it was during the earthly Triplicity : and we finde by experience those Kings of England, that have any figne of the earthly Trigon their Ascendent, have been fortunate to the English, & fic e contrario; Queen Elizabeth, King fames, Henry the 8. and Edward the 6. had fo. As then it entred Virgo, it came neer to be Verticall and perpendicular over England: Quo magis ad perpendicularitatem super aliquam clementarem superficiem accedit axis radiosus alicujus stella, co fontius circa salem sua incidentia locum, suas vires illa stella imprimet; directo guidem modo, propter majorem agentis vicinitatem : reflexo autem, quia reflexi tales radii, ad incidentes, vicinius conducticantur. Dec. Aphorif. 54. By how much greater the Axis or radious beames of any ftar doth come to perpendicularity upon any elementary inperficies; by to much themore forcibly he doth imprint his influence upon fuch a place of his incidence, in a direct manner, by reafon of the greater's vicinity of the Agent : but in a reflexed way, because fuch beames bowed or turned back are neer conduplicated to the incidents. Stella verticales magnam habent vim, & funt ille, que tantam babent declina-I tionem ab Aquinoctiali, quanta est elevatio poli illius Regionis, Dasipodius, Aphoris. 68. Stars that are Verticall have great power, and are. those which have as much declination from the Aquinoctiall, as the elevation of the Pole of that Region : If we adde 21. years to 1618.

we shall arive to the year 1639. Who is ignorant of our then approaching troubles? And yet becaufe the Comet was not then Verticall fully over England, no great mischiefe then happened: a cloud was falling upon us, but did not; yet from the time it had 49. degrees of North Declination, it began to exafperate and ftir up matter in the English Nation, and so as its declination increased, our courages wereflirred up, and it was much augmented, I mean the effects of the Cometary influence by that great Ecclipte of the Sun, 22. May 1639 in Gemini, for the digits Eclipfed were 10. and 40. min. It began in the ninth house, its true Eclipse or middle, was in the 8. its conclusion in the 7. Church men began our mifery, war, and death shall end it. I was ever fearfull of the effects of that Eclipse: for he that observes it, shall finde that the Sun is Lord of the tenth, and he is Eclipted by the Moon in the eighth : Per Solem reges duplicitér intelliguntier, per Lunam populus, five vulgus : an cafie Artift may put this into fenfe. at Lottice ne

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The Comet now in 1639 came close home unto use it was four dayes or fomewhat more verticall over all England (for after it had 56. dégrees of Northern declination, it passed farther Northward towards Scotland) fo it had then time to leave its impression more deeply upon us, according to that 55. Aphorif. of Doctor Dee, Quó ftellærijusse mora, super horizontem major fuerit, eó ad sue virtuis fortiorem faciendam impressionem per directos suos radios, est accomodatior: By how much the greater or longer the mansion or abiding of the fame star is above the Horizon, by so much the more is he fitted by those his direct beames over those parts, to make a more shores feen the judgement I gave upon that Solar Eclipse in 1639, it might have frighted them, or exhorted them to look to themselves. But Princips ne magnum malum unquam predixeris, so the periculum : which in effect faith; Never tell your Prince truth, an horrid basenefie.

The 12. of Decemb. 1618. the Comet passed 26. deg. and 40. min. of Virgo, which is the degree within one, opposite to the Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 25. Pifies. Adde 22. yeares to 1618. and it answers 1640. Confider the Declination of the Comet, you finde it 51. The Comet was then Verticall over many places of England and in speciall manner to London it selfe; This year 1640. Our Parliament began at Westminster.

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The Positure of heaven at the beginning of the true English Parliament, 1640. die Martis, 3. No. 2. 4. P. M. Sol & Luna 21° Scorp10.

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 I take that time for the moment of its beginning, at what time his Majefty went after Sermon into the Parliament house, and began his speech, which was 2. bo. 4. min. P. M. dies pradicti.

Far be it from my thoughts Altrologically to judge, and publish my judgement, what success may be expected from the scheame aforesaid betwixt his Majesty and the Parliament, I defire to to carry my discourse, & in so equall a ballance, as I may not offend either his Majesty, whom I do konour as my Prince; or the Parliament, under whose protectionI now live, and whose just rights I am bound to maintaine by Protestation.

The angles of the figure are double bodied, common, or called by corporeall; the Sun is a little Eclipfed and in Scorpio, the most viperous Signe of the Zodiack: Mars possession of the East Angle in Pisces, a Signe of his own Trigon i Jupiter is Lord of the Ascendant, but not of the tenth house, because he beholds not the house: Saturne the supreamest of Planets, represents his Majestie, he is in the twelfth house, Houfe, the Sun and Moon applying to a Quadrature of him, the Afpect is in fixed fignes, and out of the worlt Houfes of Heaven: Abfolutely there's a cunning fpirit that pretends fair, and yet impedites both King and Parliaments reconcilement, a fpirit that will not let His Majefty fee the Parliaments realty to him, nor fuffer the Parliament to beleeve His Majefty intends fairly to them.

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Fear to offend filenceth my further thoughts, onely I will be bold to conjecture, death or, fome untimely accident may cut off three of the greatest enemies both King and Parliament have, ere the Moneth of December 1644. or it will bee then perceived openly who they are. and they queftioned and imprifoned, if they run not away; the reaion is, because both Mercury, Sun, and Moon are in square to Saturn in the 12, house, they in the 8, house, and being disposed by Mars, it may bee hoped Divine Justice will find them out, because Mercury wanteth 4. degrees of the Aspect, I judge 4. years (a tempore inceptionis) to determine the difcovery of these grand Machivillians. And herein I point at men, or the like in generalls, and not aime at any in particular; whether man or woman, both are guilty. Adde 23. years to 1618. which answers the 13. December, and it answers to 1641. The Comet then, had 53 degrees of Northern Declination; and was Verticallover most of our inland Counties of England, viz. Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Rutlandshire, Nottinghamsbire, Warwick, Derby, and Stafford, and many adjacent Counties, which have more then fifty one, and leffe then fifty four degrees of North Latitude : Did not our miferies steale upon us, and the cursed rebellion of the Irif begin 23. October 1641. And did not many of our inland Connties begin to fmart : But to fee how God concates nateth worldly affairs with Coelectiallapparitions: All January 1641, Stilo Anglicano, was full of fears, miltrults, jealoufies, 'and what not: "for then Mars by Transit, passed the ninth degree of Sagittarius, directly opposite to the place of the Sun Eclipsed 1639. and in that degree of Sagittarinshe was in perfect square to Saturn in the ninth degree of Pifces: So that at one time, and in one day, the two unfor-"tinate Planets beheld themfelves with Quadrat Afpect, and the one by Opposition, and Saturn by Quadrat the degree Eclipsed 1639. This their Quadrat was the first of January, at what time, and upon which day, as I remember, or neer it, many Apprentices came to Westminster. The tenth of January His Majeftie wen to Hampton Court, but returned not to this day : The eleventh of fannary . 3000. Buckinghamshire men, came in behalf of themselves and their honeft

(41) honeft Countrey-man John Hambden Esquire. The 18. of January the Esser men came in abundance to London. Ten Bish ops were questioned in Parliament, for now both the Comet passed the ninth in the Radix, and also the Eclips in 1639. was in great force.

When the Comet had been observed 24. dayes, and cut the 20. degree of Virgo, which was on the 14. of December 1618. and in proportion of time, points out 1642. having then 55. degrees of Northern Declination, it became perpendicular or verticall to Yorkfbire, part of Lincolnsbire, Bishoprick of Durham, Lancashire, Che-Shire, Westmerland, Cumberland, Northumberland and Wales : whether those Countreys then fuffered, and were quier, let the English. whom it most concerns, judge. From these Countreys especially, proceeded that Army of men wherewith his Majeftie gave battell to the valiant Patron of his oppressed Countrey Robert Earle of Effex : I am not certain, if any got by that field, the losse fell upon His Majeftie, by losing some thousands of English men; for not a man, or youth perifhed, whofe King and Soveraign he was not, and of whom he might not have expected better fervice against the inhumane Irifs; and therefore I use to fay, when I hear His Majefties forces have killed fo many of the Parliaments, That His Majeftic hath still the worst, for he hath a speciall interest in the life or death of any that is flain, or therwaies perisheth ; and when we are all killed, by these unkind divisions, if it happen His Majestie, or his posterity to furvive, Over whom shall He, or they raign ? The earth is the fame, but where, or whither are the men gone? Queen Elizabeth was used to fay, She would beleeve nothing against the meanest of her Subjects, which a father would not against his child. By these her loving words, and actions answerable to her promises, the was really Queen of England, and English-men, but I transgreffe too farre ; One William Cecill now at Court, was to be prized at as great a rate as the Horfe Richard the third cried for, at the loss of his Crown and Kingdom in Leice-Ster Bire.

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According to the former proportion of time, let us observe what part of Virgo the Comet cut the 15. of December 1618. and wee thall find it was the 18. of Virgo, almost the degree of the ninth House at the Comets apparition, and of the Ascendent the postventionall full-Moon; Did not our Parliament, and also the Synod of Divines for Reformation concur, and also put in action their agreement, by discussing points of doubt in Doctrin and Ceremony the year 1643. for if wee adde 25. years to 1618, doth not the Comet G then cut the degree of the ninth House, by which Religion is principally signified; the Comet had then 56. degrees, and 40. minutes of Northern Declination, and then became Verticall to that part of England, and Scotland which lieth betwixt York and Edinborough, and to Edinborough, and somewhat beyond it; I pray God no trouble or disturbance may arise in that Kingdom, or in those parts, this year 1643. perhaps it may beretarded untill 1644 or 1645. how ever Mars in Gemini, in the figura mundi, portends much warte and bloudshed in the West part of England.

When Scotland, and our Northern Countries have had their share, the effects of this Comet must go farther Northward, it cannot leave that wife Nation without trouble; The Comet worketh flowly, but it failes no where; Quacunque lentius operantur, diutius protrabunt successfieldus, neque enim delitescere vis syderis potest nec aboleri. Card. Seg. 1. Aph. 55. Those Stars, or Comets that work gently or flowly, protract their effects the longer; for the efficacy, or operation of a Star can neither be obscured, or abolished.

The 16. of December 1618. the Comet had appeared 26. dayes, anfwering to 26. years, and our 1644. The Comet then paffed the 14. degree, and 40. minutes of Virgo, the place of Mars, at the Comets appearance. The year 1644. by the figura mundi, and the potency of Mars in Aquarius, and the whole Figure, and his oppofition to the Moon in the tenth Houfe, is probably like to bee very full of action, and many battells to bee fought in the North, and Northweft of England, and fo alfo South-weft, and full Weft from London, &c. Both the Comet, and the figura mundi fignifie the year to bee extream ill,&c. And it threatens the death of a great Queen, or Lady, and alfo of an Ecclefiafticall perfon, and perfons; nay it portends fudden death to fome great King, or Prince; God bleffe His Majefty of England,&c. The Pope can find no leafure to die.

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When the Comet cut the 14. degree and 40. minutes of Virgo, it had 58. degrees and 10. minutes of Northern Declination; If Denmark, Norway and fome parts of Swetbland, have fo much Northern Latitude, as it is most certain they have, then may they expect the fame proportion, and trouble, at home, and abroad, both in warre, and its fubfequents that their neighbour Countreys undergo; for 1644. it will bee Verticall to Denmark, Norway and fome other Countreys fubject to the Dane, and to Swetbland and its Territories, as alfo to fome Confines of the Polacks, and Muskevians: The excurfion of the Tartar into Poland, or Wologda. Muscovia may be feared the]

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The 17, of December 1618. which was 27. dayes after the Co- of mets vificility, and in measure of time answers 1645. the Comet cut the the 11. grad. and 10. minutes of Virgo, and had 59. degrees and 35. minutes of Northern Declination. It will then be Verticall to those Tracts of Land which have so much Latitude Northerly, and they are some parts of Muscovia, adjoyning to the Crimensian Tarear, and that part of Tartaria, where the Mordway Tartar liveth, or to any Region habitable, that lieth under the same Paralell, or Latitude : Let those Princes living there, look both to the Turk and Tartar : for the time hastens, the enemy approaches.

The 18. of Deceember 1618. answering our 1646. the Comet entred, or passed the 7. degree and 45. minutes of Virgo, having 61. grades of North Declination from the Aquator; It then became Verticall to those people that have or live under the Elevation of the Pole 61. viz. Finland, and then to Swerbland it felf, and those that inhabite near the Baltique Sea; Livonia may begin the Dance, allotted for beginning those remote peoples troubles: After 28. dayes, neither did Doctor Bainbridge, or Longomontanus observe, or could have fight of the Comet any more; So that if we find my measure of time to hit right, then the effects fignified by that Comer, shall have no conclusion untill 28. years from its first apparition are compleated: now if we adde 28. to 1618. it will be in the year 1646. but I rather fay, 1647, before the generall calamity threatned by that Comet in 1618. shall turcease.

I have no prefident from Aftrology, that hath guided my fancy, to give for every day of the Comets appearance, one year in measure of time. When Olaus the Dane, wrote of the Comet in 1585, and came to write of the time, when, and how long the events should continue; Ab Astrologis hac dostrina sufficienter non sit declarata. This Doctrin (quoth he) is not sufficiently handled of Astrologers: Being therefore doubtfull of the fuccess of my precedent judgement, I laid aside my foule papers, and went to St. Peters at Westminster, the last Wednesday in April 1643. to hear the Fast Sermon preached before the Parliament. One Master Greenall, or Greenhill, a learned Gentleman, amongst many observations said; That God had often warned us of thele times, by his Ministers, and by signes from heaven; and in particular, by that Cemet in 1618. Whose effects, he faid, would continue, from the time of its beginning 28. years, as one Herlicius wrote: This G 2 Herlicine, or any of his works I never faw, (but I understand that he was a Dane, and wrote Almanacks) His, viz. Master Greenhills, words gave me incouragement, fo that I conceived, I was not fingle in my judgement, and thereupon I collected my dispersed Papers, and put them into that form, thou that reades these Lines, dost fee.

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The tail of this Comet, all the time of its being, pointed out the Welt, and North-welt parts of the World; if we beleeve Charles Pifo the French Phyfician : Caterum quibus locis miniscentar & intentent effectus suos, oftendunt Zodiaci partes sub quibus collecta ipsa & incense, primum exarserint : tum inclinationes comarum crinite pro ratione forma, Ptolomeus lib. 2. fol. 103. Quadripartiti. What places are principally threatned, and intended to feel the Comets influence. the parts of the Zodiack where first the matter was collected, and appeared, do manifest: as also the inclinations of the feattered haires, according to the form of the Comet. Auftria certainly, the feat of the Roman Empire, was chiefly pointed out by the Comet, to be either the feat of war, or the place from whence much mischief should come. The passage of this Comet through the forms of the fixed Stars is most to bee admired, and wanted nothing but a tongue, and an audible voice to expresse articulately the ends why God did. illuminate the fame. have sellt of the Comet any more

The generation of this Comet in Scorpio, under the Sun-beames, did plainly expresse, and shadow out unto us Virulent and Scorpion. like Counfels, and Confederacies of those who in the 19. chap. of the Revelation are described to have the faces of men, but the flings of Scorpions in their tails; I mean, the Jefuites, and Legates of the Pope, out of whofe mouth they are fent, and by their Vow of miffion are bound to go whither he shall fend them, and to execute whatfoever he shall employ them in : Being in this Emblematicall generation of the Comet, defcribed to lurk in the Courts of Kings, and Emperours (as it were under the Sun-beams) thereby more importunately to folicite and incenfe them to take any opportunity to fting and extinguish fuch as professe the true Protestant Religion in their Dominions. Do Kings and Princes harbour fuch monfters, and willnot beleeve it : will they not beleeve there are Bees in the Hive, unleffe they feele their fting first? when they are undone, and their Kingdoms, and Subjects deftroyed, fome belief will bee given to what I write, but Post of occasio calva; The axe is laid to the root, a few more blows cuts down the Tree: but this is Ænigma : Semper antem videntur, que contra ordinem signorum feruntur, mutationem legis fignificare:

(45) nificare ? anod motne is primi cali fit. atque ob id a Deo vel (apremo Rectore; leges autom permissione Dei sunt habitus vero ad solem declarat ipfins effectus initiam: nam fe orientalis extiterit Cometa, brevi inisium eft habiturus effectus. Cardanus 272. lib. 2. Ptol. Its ever observed, those Comets which move in a Retrograde courfe, do fignifie the mutation of Lawes ; because that motion is of the first Heaven, and therefore from God, or fome supream Rector of our Affairs, (perhaps he means, the Planetary Angel prefiding at this time) but Laws are by permission of God: the habit of the Comet to the Sun, the we his beginning to be quick and fudden, if hee be Orientall, &c. And fo it was, for Matthias the Emperour furvived not the Comet three Moneths: He had the 16. of Scorpio the Afcendent in his Nativity; he lived when the Comet blazed, but when the Comet cut the 16. of Scorpio he fickned, and not long after died : the Empresse died a little before, so did Queen Anne, in Anno 1619. and yet Comets have nothing to do with Princes, or fignine any thing, as fome erronioully hold.

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As the Comet first appeared in Scorpio, and was disposed by Mars; Multos labores in genere hominum, inter principes contentiones gravifsimas iras inter populares; summorum virorum mortem, inopiam & caritatem Annone, metum bellorum, regum surerem & ab ikis multorum defectionem, non sine civili motu & intestinis cadibus. Mizaldus in Cometog. lib. 2. fol. 170.

Many shall be the labours of mankind, (when a Comet is in Scorpio) fearfull diffention betwixt Princes, tumults amongst the vulgar, the death of Prime, and Eminent men, fcarfity and dearneffe of provision, fear of warres, the anger of Princes, much defection from them by their Subjects, not without civill difcord, and intelline flaughter. As the Comet passed through Libra; Mortum principum in tractu occiduo, cedes occultas cum conjuratione formidandas, censusplurimorum jacturam : If the Comet passe through Libra, Princes of the Welt part of the World shall die, fearful murders occultly carried, and mens effates confumed they know not how. The Comets passage through Virgo; Mercatoribus damnum, & mutuas inter homines injurias cum omni injustitia, nec non virorum proborum vexationem. & captivitates indicere plurimum folet. Nec in armorum strepitu otiof a crit & principum cade. Mizaldus in Comet. fol. 168. The Comets paffage through the figne of Virgo (who Enigmatically reprefents Religion and Justice, under whofe title the Church and Spoule of Chrift is figured) and over whom the Comets tail did bow five

five dayes, intimates that for fome years the Church of Chrift fhould be afflicted by the Pope, Emperour, King of Spain, and others Jefuitically addicted; But when the Church hath over-paffed those afflictions, they shall fear no more perfecutions to follow, but enjoy a perpetuall peace and tranquillity in this world. It further denotes, that the industrious Marchant shall make ill Voyages, and men shall profecute each other with all kind of injustice; good men shall bee vexed, and imprisoned; a rumour and fear of warre to no purpose, but great perfons made away suddenly. Let us observe Historically, if these axoimes of the learned, have not been true in our age, and Common-wealth.

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From the time of the Comets appearance, which was 1618. untill it became Verticall to England, which was 1639. wee did not milerably fuffer; but all men know, matter hath been preparing for these very times ever fince : How did the English groan under the preduces of the Monopolilts, about 1618. 1619. and 1620. How much treasure did we spend, and how much disgrace was it, that fimple employment to Algiers, in the latter end of King James his raign, our brave Sea-men, and the brave spirited Sir Robert Manfell, muzled up with a blank Commission : To number the Sea-men captivated in those times, or recount the unvaluable loffe of the London Marchants, were Infandum renovare dolorem; tears, but not words belt. expresse it; And immediately, or few years after, the Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1623. wee loft King James, whole raigne was spent in peace; what a monstrous plague afflicted the City of London that year 1625, and all, or the molt part of the Kingdome the next year; Now, or near this time, was our unfortunate attempt to relieve Rochell, after our owne Ships had undone them, and then we fight in the mud at the Ifle of Rees, where wee loft the belt men we had then living, not in fight, but by treachery in the Oufe and Dirt activant : 11 the Comes pairs phonen Libra, P. 538, 5710

The deltruction of the Rochellers, and in them of the Protestant party in France, and the innocent bloud of that Protestant party, cries aloud to heaven for vengeance against the Authour, and procurer of their finall destruction: A City, Queen Elizabeth loved; nor did the victorious Benry the fourth King of France distast it. To this day, the Rochellers believe Buckingham was the Authour of their undoing; Was he fo? He was exceedingly to be commended, for advancing his kindred; but in this, he hath left a blemish to his posterity, which time will not wipe off, and yet I really believe, it was not fo much hee as that Jefuiticall counfell too convertant with him; How ever, 2 he was the first on whom all Laws depended, for the Laws speak noto. thing, but what he and his Parafites would have them fay ; and had so n not an untimely death fwept his Ambition away, we had queltion effe ere this been contented flaves, or imbrued our hands in each others o bloud. But there's a Yeomanry of England, indures no flavery, its hard to root it out, they breed their fonns excellently well, and its an e ill bird defiles his owne neft; their fonnes prove excellent Lawyers, and best know the estate of every County they live in; are a valiant and different people : of this the Dake thought not of, nor the reve- ip rend, but unfortunate, William Land, Archbishop of Canterbury, in all his undertakings; nor Thomas Earl of Arundell, in his mercileffe Court of Honour, the Advocates abufing that honourable man; where it was a greater offence to call an idle Gentleman a Knave, P (when perhaps one might have added, Thief, and Beggar) then to have stollen an Ox, and answered the Indictment at Sessions : But I digreffe, and doubt not but to live, and fee vengeance in full measure powred and distributed upon him, them, and their families, that had any hand in furthering the oppression of the Rochellers, and the poor French Protestants, or in the miserable losse of the 12000, men Count Mansfield had, sono yns to monon ant noqu uontagia

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All our Parliaments have been unluckely, and by finister Counfels diffolved, fince 1625. what reason can be given, none certainly; onely it pleafed a prevailing faction to cloud His Majelties grace from his Subjects, rendring him unkind, but themfelves worfe then Achitophel. Were not many of our brave Gentlemen; whom their Countrey fent up for the Publique benefit imprisoned ? Did not fome die in prison, Gallant men, of the House of Commons, of the reprefentative Body of the Kingdom? Oh Elliot, well spoken, Sir John. Elliot, I ever expected the unmercifull usage of thee in the Towre, fhould be returned, and the fame merey (which was none at all) inflicted upon every private Counfellor, or Actor in thy miferies; they that advised thy first indurance, neither of God or man deferve tavour : what was done to thee, had it been poffible, fhould have been inflicted upon the whole Commonalty of England: But Elliot 15 dead, his death will have no nay, no mercy on his offenders, or afflictors : Others fuffered alfo. But to the Comet. How many Noble men fuddenly died? Who knew the difeafe, whereof either the Honourable Lodowick Duke of Richmond, or the very Noble Marquesse Hamilton died; and how suddenly was valiant Oxford, the Heroick

Heroick Earle of Southampton, and his valiant fon, and many other men of excellent birth and Nobility, taken from us: We have had many Princes in the Weft part of the world, dead fince the Comets appearance, many a dear yeer; Wheat I have feen at 12. fhillings a buthell; honeft preaching Minifters, I have feen captivated and opprefied; enforced to fly into forraigne Countries, or elfe filenced; I have feen the Laws fpeak, not law, but fancy: I wifh there had been no errour in the Clergie; Their pride began when the Dean of Weftminfter was made Lord Keeper; William Laud Archbishop of Camterbury augmented their infolency: not a Sexton must fiweep the Church unleffe put in by the Parson: a Vestery is no Vestery unleffe he confirmed it: Parochiall priviledges and cultomes were invalid, not withstanding antiquity and personall oathes of as good mens fons as himfelf, confirmed the truth thereof.

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Richlien of France was the onely wife Courtier and Clergie man that ever lived.

While Finch was Lord chiefe Justice of the Common Pleas, to obtaine a Prohibitian, was an Herculean task, yet Justice Hatten in his abfence would do it : fuch times, fuch Officers. But I am too tedious, yet let me be excufed, fith I do it not to blemiss any man, or to cast a false aspersion upon the honour of any one: I repeate these things onely to make the Cometary Aphori/mes better understood, and to shew their verity, I might be more copious, but should I so do, I might the more offend, and therefore I conclude what I intend to speak of the Comets effects, unless occasionally a word or two hereaster drop from my pen; this which is wrote will give the more light to the faceeding discourse, which now orderly follows.

The effects of the present Conjunction prosecuted.

BEfore I speak of this Conjunction, by some (falsely) called great I must acquaint you with that Aphorisme of Prolomy, viz. 50. Ne pretermittas centum & viginti conjunctiones; In bis enim posta est cognitio corum que siunt in mundo & generationis & corruptionis : In your generall judgement passe not over the 120. Conjunctions. For the knowledge of Mundane affaires is posited therein, as well of generation as corruption : that which I now handle is the first in order of the 120 but because few there are that understand Aphorisme, or what those one hundred and twenty Conjunctions are, I will orderly in a subsequent Table put them down, as also the dignities and debilities of all the feven Planets in this prefent Conjunction, 1643.

It is time I enter upon judgement, which I would willingly do, but that in profecution hereof I must first explain fome curiofities, not vulgar to many English Astrologers; my intention after that being to proceed methodically.

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First of the Agent, viz. a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter.

Secondly, the Patient or fubject matter in which the Events shall happen.

Thirdly, the place, Countries, or Kingdomes, the events shall ap-

Fourthly, the space of time the effects shall continue.

Fifthly, the nature of those effects, whether good or evill. Some reduce all to this Latine Verse,

Cur ? ubi, seu guando, quibus & quid provenit do : others thus, Ubi, quando, in quo genere rerum : cujus modi.

Where? when? in what kinde of things? the nature and qualitys viz. good or ill.

Of the Agent, viz. a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter.

Those that are not versed in Astrologie must know, that Saturn and Jupiter are the two chiefest Planets, and do once, and but once in 20. years, or more truely in 19. yeares, 318. dayes and twelve houres, come to Conjunction in some one of the twelve signes; when they are both in one signe, degree, and minute of that signe, then they are said to be in Conjunction.

They do also usually make ten feverall meetings or Conjunctions in fignes of the like nature, called a Trigon, Triplicity, or Triangularity; these ten Conjunctions they perform in 198. years, 265. dayes, &c. and then they defert that Trygon, and fall to their Conjunctions in the subsequent in an orderly processe, as out of the fiery Triangularity into the earthly, &c.

The ancients formerly wanting those exact Tables the latter ages have produced, were of opinion that Saturn and Inpiter might and did make 12. and fometimes thirteen Conjunctions in one Triplicity, of which minde was Guido Bonatus, Albumazar, Abraham Avenaris, Alcabitius, Haly Rodoan, and many others. The reason of their miltake was, because they did proportion eight fignes, two degrees.

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and thirty minutes, to be the true procefie of Saturn and Jupiter, betwixt one Conjunction and another, viz. if at their leaving of the watry Triplicity, they first met by Conjunction in no degrees of Aries; by adding 8. fignes, 2. grad. and 30. minutes, in their next Conjunction they should meete in the second degree and 30. minutes of Sagittarius, for so many signes, degrees and minutes it is from 00'. 00'. Aries w If to 2. grads, and 30' of Sagittarius you againe adde 8. signes, 2. grad. and 30. min. the third Conjunction in the fiery Triplicity shall be in the fifth degree of Leo, and so you should do in all the rest. By this account, the two superious must make 12. Conjunctions in each Triplicity, or ever they could go through the 3 Signes of that Trygon.

For if you multiply 20. viz. the space of time betwixt Conjunction and Conjunction by 12. viz. the number of Conjunctions, they will produce 240. for the measure of time, or the revolution of the two Planetary Conjunctions in one Trygon, and then it will be 960. years, cre they compleatly finish their severall Conjunctions in the source Triplicities, for if you multiply 240. by 4. the number of Trigens, it makes the refult 960.

But this Hypothefis is falf, for the modern Calculators do fay, and that with more verity, That the years betwixt one Conjunction and another, are nineteen, 318, dayes and twelve houres : fo that the two fuperiours come to Conjunction 47. dayes, and fome houres fooner then former Aftrologers conceived : and the procefie of degrees they run from one Conjunction to another, is not fo little as 8. fignes, 2. grad. and 30. minntes, but somewhat more, viz. 242. grad. 59.m.9. feconds or 8. fignes, 2. grads, 59:min. and 9. feconds, which is 19. min. more than the Ancients allowed. And yet I do not finde that this manner of proportion doth exactly concur in that Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1603. 14. Decemb. at what time by Origanus Saturn and 7upiter were in Conjunction in 9. g. 36. m. Sagittarins. Let us make experience for example fake : If I adde to 1603. 19. years, it brings me to 1622. the 14. of Decemb. being a Common yeere is the 348. day of the yeer, to which if I adde 318. dayes, the number allowed more then 19. years, it makes 666. dayes, from which if I substract 365. the complement of a whole year, there remains 301, for the day wherin, according to the rule aforefaid, the fecond Conjunction should happen, viz. 27. day of October 1623. the Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter was by Origanus his Calculation, the eight day of July 1623. one hundred and eleven dayes fooner : but let us examine the figne and degres of the two former Conjunctions by adding eight fignes 59. mins

to the figne and degree of the Conjunction in 1603. Place of the Conjunction after 8. Signes, 9. grad. and 36. minutes of Sagittarius :

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By this reckoning the Conjunction in 1623. Thould have been in the 132. grad. of the Zodiack, or after, 4. fignes, and fo in 12. grad, 35. min. of Leo, for Aries, Taurus, Gemini, Cancer, being numbred Leo fucceeds; but the true Conjunction according to Kepler, was in 6 grad. 45. of Leo; and fo also by Origanus.

By meanes of this addition of 10 many Signes, it came to passe that Alstedius did mistake, when he faid in Thesanro Chronologia, fol. 482. Anno 164³. Accidet Conjunctio, Saturni & Jovis in Ariete, (the Conjunction was in Pisces) que portendit novi alicujus imperii revolutionem. In the year 164³/₂ there shall happen a great Conjunction of h and 4 in Aries, which portends a Revolution of some new Monarchy.

That excellent Mathematician Kepley did alfo, by fome fuch rule without further Calculation, fay the fame in : Lib. 2°. Epito. Aftronomia, fol. 188. Anno 1603. Coiverant Saturnus & Jupiter in Sagittario, Anno 1623. in Leone. Anno 1643. in Ariste; Anno 1663. in Sagittario: Saturn and Jupiter made Conjunction in 1603. in Sagittary. In 1623 in Leone. In 1643. they meet in Ariste: and in one thousand fix hundredfixty three in Sagittario, &c.

I have the rather been tedious herein, to shew that there is not any certain rule can be made, whereby without Calculation the true Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter may be had, for there will be variation in degrees, if no worse errour happen. The best Tables now extant are Keplers, I conceive them to be so exact, as its possible for the Art of man to frame, and they perform the motion of the Planets with much verity, being handled by an able Artiss : to conclude then I say, asten times two degrees, make 20. degrees, and ten times 59'. doth make ten degrees wanting ten minuts; nay not so much, because ten time nine feconds make 90. feconds, a minute and a half, all these put together make up, 29. deg. 51. min. 30. feconds. Therefore this being the Complement of a Signe, the two superiours can make but 10. Conjunction in one Trygon, and no more, &c.

When one of the Conjunctions of Saturn and Jupiter is called 20 greatest, great, mean or the least.

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"He latter Astrologers, as Gardan, Naibod, Origanus, Haghen, and Co fince their death, Campanella fay, That there are three kinds of Conjunctions, which in Latine they tearm Maximam, viz. the greateft : Mediam, viz. the mean or middle : Minimam, viz. the leaft of all. Maxime vero Conjunctiones appellantur, que in Trigono igneo fieri incipiunt inprimis Ariste, primo Zodiaci signo; Cum enim in illis ex aqueo in igneum signum, que qualitatibus primis sibi maximé adversantur transitus fiat, maxima quoque mutationes in illis temporibus in toto mundo accidunt, Orig. folintraduct. 449. They are called the greatest Gonjunctions which begin in the fiery Trygon, and effectially in Aries, the first figne of the Zodiack; for when a Transit is made out of the watry Triplicity into a fiery figne, which are contrary to each other in their first qualities, then are there in the whole world the greatest mutations and alterations, &c.

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And that this is the true fense of all Authors, viz. that that onely. Conjunction is called Maxima or Magna, and no other, which is the first Conjunction Saturn and Inpiter make in the fiery Trygon, and efpecially in Aries, I prove by many examples. Alcabitius, diff. 4. Major autem omnibus Conjunctionibus est Conjunctio Saturni & Iovis in initio Arietis. The Conjunstion of Saturn and Jupiter in the beginning of Aries, is greater than all the other Conjunctions; of which opinion is Naibod, fol. 353. In Com. Sup. Alcab. Etenim prima, omniningue maxima Saturni scilicet & Jovis Conjunctio in principio Arietis celebrata, tempora generaliter disponere videtur. The first Conjunction of Saturn and Jupitir celebrated in the beginning of Aries, seemes generally to dispose of the times, and of all Conjunctions is the greateft. Maxima conjunctio dicitur cum permutando se ex aqueo, sieno Ariesem ingreditur : Its called the greate ft Conjunction, when the change is out of a watry figne into Aries, Card. Seg. 1. Apb. 67. Of the fame judgementis Johannes de Saxonia.

Paulus Prassicius sacerdos Aversanus is more plain. Quod Triples quum fit Saturni & Jovis Conjunctio, remotiffima illa que noningenis annis (it should be 794. & diebus 331.) contingit maxima dicatur; qua autem per singulos vigenos annos ex quo conjuncti jans fuerinto minima : Atque post fingulos feré ducentos & quadragenos circuitus (vult potius 198. Annos & 265. dies) quod inter minimam hanc as maximam remotissimamque illam contingit, media : Sith the conjunction of Saturn and

and Jupiter is threefold, that which is most remote and happens but once in 900. years, is called the greatest (it should have been in 794. and 331. dayes) that which is from the time of their last meeting once in 20. years, isftiled the leaft : but that which is after a progrefic, circuit or compasse of 240. years (it should have been 198. yeares and 261. dayes) and is between as it were the greatest and the lesser, is called a mean or middle Conjunction. Sed Ptolomeus & Haly in Centiloquio & proposit, 58. 6 64. volunt intelligi per conjunctionem majorem, conjunctionem, Saturni & Jovis in Ariete, & media conjunctio corum est, cum mutatur in novam Triplicitatem, & conjunctio minor cum conjunguntur in reliquis signis. Johannes Anglicus dist. 2. fol. 16. But Ptolome and Haly Rodoan his Commentator in 58. and 64. propolition, will have us understand by the greater conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, that it is onely when they enter Aries : their mean conjunction, when theyremove into a new Triplicity, and fo the leaft conjunction, when they are joyned together in feverall parts of the fignes of the fame Nature.

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Avenaris a learned Jew translated out of Hebrew into Latin by Henry Bate 1281. Shall conclude all, Conjunctio antem magna Jovis est cum Saturno, in signo Arietis, quodest, quia sunt stella graves & tarda, & non fignificant super particularia, imo super communia : & quia signum Arietis est signum primum inter signa, ergo hac conjunctio vocatur magna, sed quando vadunt a Triplicitate ad triplicitatem, tunc vocatur hac conjunctio media, conjunctio vero ipforum de 20. in 20. Annos in signis Triplicitatis, quacunque sit illa vocata, est conjunctio minor, Avenaris, fol. 79. de conjunctionibus. But, faith he, the conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter is called great when its in the figne of Aries, becaule they are pondrous and flow Planets, and fignific no finall matters, and Aries is the first amongst the fignes, therefore fuch a Conjunction is called great : and when they remove out of one Triplicity into another, that conjunction is called media or meane : but their Conjunction every 20. yeares in fignes of the fame Triplicity, be it in what figne it will, it is called the least Conjunction, or a leffer and no other, &cc.

By what I have collected, I gather thus much, That when the two fuperiour Planets remove out of the watry Triplicity, and enter the fiery, and do therein make their first conjunction in Aries, that is, properly by all antiquity called maxima or the greatest Conjunction, and no other, unless improperly was fo called, but that : Now if upon their mutation of Triplicity they first convene in Sagittarian or Leo,

as in 1603. their fift Conjunction was in Sagistarius ; that conjunctions may properly be called Magna, and was no other, but it had been abfurd to have called it Maxima, it was a great Conjunction because it was their first Conjunction in the fiery Trigon and in a fiery regall figne; but it was not Maxima, because it was not at that time in Aries, which is the first of the Zodiack, a Cardinall figne, the house of Mars, the exaltation of the Sun, a figne where Inpiter hath both a Triplicity and a Terme : when they viz. Saturn and Jupiter leave the fiery, and first meet in the earthly Trygon, be the conjunction in what figne it will, it shall be called a mean conjunction, all the nine conjunctions they make after in that Trygon, are called little ones; in this fense Alstedius spoke fol. 482. Chronologia, and calls the conjun-Etion of Saturn and Jupiter In 1603. Magnam : Hanc secuta eft ? Q Anno 1623. conjunctio minima Saturni & Jovis in Leone, figno regio On itidem igneo. After the great conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1603. there followed another little or the leffer conjunction of Saturn and fupiter, in Leo, a Kingly or regall and fiery figne; but whereas he goeth on & laith, Hujus conjunctionis ignis consumet omnes scorias & faces urbis Roma, Anno 1635. quo ad finem decurret revolutio Romani Imperis (no Trigonis : That is, the force of fire of this conjunction shall deftroy all the refuse or dreggs of the City of Rome, &c. In this I differ from that learned man, and do fay, that By any Constellation I can finde, the overthrow of Popery is not fo near, the first beginning of forrow and diffurbance to Popery in Italy will be about the year 1654.1655. or 1656. but not a generall fubverfion for fome ages : neither shall the Empire of Germany come to finall period, or the Illukrious house of Austria in that measure of time, some have fondly conceived : it will yet hold up his head, but not flowrith in that vigour it hath done many will be the afflictions, loffes, and enormities that stately family shall undergo, and that suddenly, but not such as mall bring it to confusion, &c.

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I am not ignorant that Meffahalab a learned Arabian thinketh otherwayes of these conjunctions, and onely calleth that of Saturn and Jupiter the greatest, that of Saturn and Mars the middle or mean conjunction, that of Jupiter and Mars the least conjunction; but because all antiquity and reason is against his opinion, and he stands fingle in r that matter, I forbear further answer, and come to the proper nature of each Triplicity, and figne of every Trigon. &c.

You must understand that Aries, Leo, and Sagittarius, make the first Trigon, vulgarly called the regall or fiery Triplicity, Trigonus bisigneus est Christianorum : Dasspodius, Aphor. 54. This Trigon reprefents Christianity, saith he. Those actions performed under the dominion of this Trigon, do farre in honour and glory exceed all the rest: Conjunctiones in signis igneis, st fiant, rum mundi imperia & monarchia constituuntur propter Solis, & fours dominium : qui significant tranquillitatem in mundo, apparent etiam sapientes & insignes viri, magna sterilitates propter dominium planetarum calidorum parumque humidorum : Dasspod. Aphor. 64. It Conjunctions be in fiery Signes then Empires, and Monarchies are created, because Sol and fupiter do rule that Trygon, and they signific tranquillity in the world; many wise men and famous appear in the world: generally barren years, because the Planets are rather hot and dry, then moist.

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The Aphorisme is generall, but for the most part, when Satarn and Jupiter make their first Conjunction in Aries, God suddenly raiseth up some new Monarch of great force and command, that by warre, and the destruction of some neighbouring Princes enlargeth his Dominions, and quite destroyeth the former Dominion they had, and the Laws they lived under. For many ages the posterity of this Princely man continues, and rather rules with strict hand, then with a gentle rod, and yet after fourty Conjunctions, his off-spring decayeth in fame and repute, and by little and little diminish, so that in fine, his own Subjects do parcell out his Inheritances, and convert them to their proper uses.

If Saturn and Jupiter have their first Conjunction in Leo, fome flurdy Prince, of an Herculean Valour, but not Creffian Purfe, troubles all his Confederates, and all Princes grow ravenous, and exercise tyrannie fome one thrives, and gets by all his indirect means, yet in the height of all his greatness, vanisheth by sudden death, or is much molefted by his Vassails, leaving no perfect conquest to his Posterity, who may much brag of a valiant Ancestor, themselves never after performing any fervice deferving the name of his kindred : That Trygon breeds valiant men, but extreamly unfortunate, and generally under that Trygon, the first position beginning in Leo, the evils are fixed, and every Prince doth then vainly conceit of himself to bee the onely Alexander for Magnanimity, when as in truth, the perfections of that great man are buried, and these upstarts have but the shadow of him.

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If the first Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter happen in Sagist varius, the world feems weary of former warres, and upon fmall intreaty will be ready to hearken to peace : fome ancient family is decaying, and a new one repairing and exalted : an appearance of Schifms, and new Doctrins, but none priviledged by authority : the Church much troubled with curious niceties, men flumbling at ftraws, and ftriding over blocks : the majeftie of Jupiter is fuch in Sagittarius, all things tend to peace, and do the Devill and Jefuits what they can, there will bee tranquillity upon the most parts of Chriftendom, during the first twenty years of that Trygons government; All the actions of those years ending in Treaties, Leagues, Meffages, and the like. Many men will be in hope to afpire to greatneffe, the end crowns onely one. But because Sagittarius is a double bodied Signe, two generations paffe not without superlative differed to the actions, or beginnings of this Conjunction. Wee must not poize down our judgement with example, left wee be thought partiall, Let it paffe; I come to the Earthly Triplicity.

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Earthly Triplicity.

He affairs of this world, which most flowrish under the earthly Trygon, or are most principally agitated in the world during these feverall Conjunctions in Taurus, Virgo, and Capricornus, are the displacing of unfaithfull, and perfidious Viceroys, Governours of Armies, Towns, Forts, and of all manner of men, of any quality, that are either entrusted by any Emperour, King, Prince, or any Principality, or private State, or that have great Offices under them, and in this generall Cataltrophe, they fuffer molt, whole Alcendents in their Nativities are Scorpio, Cancer, or Pisces.

Then doth it happen, and ufually it never failes, but there are great Inundations, Earthquakes, many Comets, and Blazing-Itars, much Idolatry, and Superstition in the Religion every people professe: It also commeth to passe, that the Revolution of this Trygon. or during the Conjunctions of Saturn and Jupiter in Taurus, Virgo, or Capricornus, that, that Kingdom is diffolved and brought to nothing, which had its originall in Cancer, Scorpio, or Pifces. Much famine, and fcarcity of provision for man and bealt.

If the first Conjunction in this earthly Triplicity, begin in Taurus, many stately Palaces, and curious Structures, brave and Princely Monasteries, Noble mens Houses, admirable in Architecture, and delightfull

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Se lightfull in Situation are crected ; Men wallow in luxury, and wano tonnelle overspreadeth those Climates subject to Taurus, or those are the men especially that most actively manage the great affairs of the World: the Husbandman hath many times excellent crops of Corn, but no great fuccefie in his Cattle, the Murrain deltroying his bigger Cattle, and the Rot, or fuch like difease many times the leffer Cattle. I shall relate a story, within the memory of man, out of Assures in Fatromathematicis, fol. 206. Refert Diomedes Cornarius, cum Anno 1598. & 1599. per universam Germaniam quadam boumm pestis immaniter grasaretur : ex decreto Archiducis Matthia, a Collegio Medico Viennensis archigymnasii: Que nam tanti contagii causa este, quefitum fuiss; Medici responderunt communicatis confiliis, Duas potistimum occurrere, unam remotiorem nempe Astrologicam, alteram propriam Physicam, quasi prior non effet vel maxime physica : Astrologicam guidem allegarunt hanc, Quod Anno 1597. in Tauro visus effet Cometa, tum etiam Conjunctiones multa in signis ruminantibus; Deinde & bane addiderunt rationem physicam, quod dinturna pracessifi fit nebulosa coli constitutio, & humiditates terra ob inundationes indu Eta; unde pascua infecta effent ex ejusmodi humiditatibus, atque Aer contagiosus redditus ex demortuorum pecorum decubitu. Cedo, vero, lector quis uspiamesse possit tam obtusa ingenii acie, qui non videat hanc posteriorem rationem effe longe communifimam; que si valeat, jam non folos boves, fed & oves, porcos, capras, equos, eliaque id genus animantia communibus & pascuis & Aereutentia, pestis promiscuo corripere debuerit : Consectaneum igitur est, nt quanquam causa illa & pandemia, & endemia, denique & epidemia simplices malum auxerint; vera tamen & propria istins pestis in solos boves grassate causa non statuatur, post Deum, alia, quam cœlestis illa a syderum Syzygiis dedu Eta.

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Dismedes Cornerius relateth, That in the years 1598. and 1599, there being an univerfall Peftilence, which unmercifully confumed the Oxen of Germany, the Archduke Matthias, commanded the Colledge of Phyficians in Vienna, to fhew the caufe thereof. The Phyficians returned their anfwer; That there were two caufes, one Aftrologicall, but that more remote; the other more near, and that was Phyficall; As if the first caufe were not more Phyficall: They faid, The Aftrologicall caufe was; becaufe in 1597. there was a Comet feen in Taurus, and there were alfo many Conjunctions of the Planets in ruminating fignes. (Aftrologers call Aries, Taurus, Capricornus, fignes ruminating, becaufe they reprefent those creatures that chew the cudd) The Phyficall reafon the Colledge gave was, That there had preceded a cloudy conflicution of heaven, and the earth very moift, by reafon of inundation of waters; whereby the Paftures were infected with furplufage of moyfure, and the ayre made contagious with the death of the dead cattle: Give me leave, Reader, (faith my Author) was ever any man fuch a blockhead, that perceives not the latter reafon to be a common one,&c? Thence it would have proceeded, that not onely Oxen, but Hogs, Sheep, and Horfes, mult have perifhed with the infection. The true caufe therefore, faith Affnerus, after God, is no other, then that which is drawn from the Afpects of the Planets, and Conftellation of heaven.

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If the first Conjunction of Saturn and Inpiter bee in Virgo, the effects materially fall upon men; their quality Kings, and Poten-retates; much affliction and great dammage to Archbishops, Bishops, Priors, and Clergy men, they are difgraced, and displaced, but for what cause none know; the Civilian and inferiour Lawyer, and many Judges unjustly handled, for Mercury having much to do in Virgo, he imployes mens wits to nothing but treachery, when Saturn and he have any Aspect to each other, either of them being therein, viz. in Virgo: And it sometimes comes to passe, that under this Conjunction, fome Princes, meerly by a trick of wit, lose all their fortunes without fighting, and so are fooles all the rest of their lives. Many dearths.

If Saturn and fapiter make their first meeting in Capricornus, it portendeth a great variation in the Ayre, and the weather: it argueth a change of government in those Churches, or Countries subject to Capricornus, and that then much filly Superstition shall be intruded upon the common people; It lightly in Christian Common-wealths erects fome superstitious Orders of Friers, and affords them large poly fessions:

And if there bee any dying finner in those times, in fuch a good condition, as he would willingly creft fome Pelt-house, for finning Friers, its alwayes observed, the good confessing Priest will have the pleasantest Mannour he hath, wherein the whole Fraternity may have freedom at large, to perpetrate their close devotions: Saturn in Capricornus loveth the most profitable and useful places, and grounds; but the Moon and Venus having to command in the Trygon, have a little, if not most regard to pleasure, luxury, and good honest feeding.

A Conjunction in this figne inventeth many admirable inventions in Mineralls, and many enrichments to cultivate the earth; it afford eth plentifull increase of all manner of grazing Cattle, but not much Corn, or Wine. It changeth the fashions of men in their attires, and makes men referved, austere and grave; it procureth much sobriety, and temperance upon earth, and its inhabitants, and it enclines the Kings of this World to accumulate wealth for an unthrifty posterity; It sheweth the exaltation of many families to great preferments, though themselves were descended of mean parents. The Yeoman in England, and the Peasant in France, and the Flandrian Boor breed up their children gallantly, &c. But those words are mysterious and not explicable.

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Airy Triplicity : under which

There are generally flowrifhing in the World excellent learned men, both in judgement and Science : Its a time, wherein all Arts have countenance, and all Artifts encouragement, by which learning increafeth, and excellent Mechanicks are cherifhed. The World, or the affairs of Princes Courts, and Kingdoms are fubtilly, and clofely governed, for the moft part, by Princes meaned fervants. If Saturn and Mercury give them their Character, those fellows are directly Rascalls, Atheilts, perjured Villains, that do all for their own advantage; Diffemblers they are, not fearing God, or loving their Prince, whose ears they do not onely inchant, but stupifie with forged lies, advancing their own proper ends. Will not Mercury procure men to speak much 2 and Saturn to diffemble much 2 Saturn was never yet found an enemy in jest, nor Mercury a friend in good earnest.

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If fo be Saturn and Impiter have their first Conjunction in Gemini, the learned that then flowrish, write more words then matter, and indeavour with Logick and Philosophy to maintain dangerous pofitions, which should rather be concluded with verity and honesty. This is understood in Divinity; But I conceive the point may bee stretched out to an other kind of learning.

If the first Convention of Saturn and Jupiter be in Libra, Divines then living, handle matters with great profundity and learning, and their works remain famous to fucceeding Ages: Divinity is now handled like Divinity, faving that fometimes they strain too high a point. Magick is earnessly fought after, which this foolish age condemns; though King James faid; Magus (was) rerum humanarum aivinarumque performator; A meer fearcher into Divine and Hu.

Bargan or drand dane po

(63) mane Learning: And Agrippa in his Epiftle to Trithemius, maintains, Magum apud literatos viros, non maleficum, uon [uperfittiofum, non damoniacum fonare; fed fapientem. fed Sacerdotem, fed Prophetam. That a Magician amongst learned onen, was not accounted a Witch a fuperfittious or devillish fellow, but a wife man, a Prick, a Prophet. But let an Angell preach this doctrine, twill not be received. Under this Conjunction to beginning, great actions are done in the world: The Marchant thriving by Sea, and by Land : If a Monarchy, an Herefie, or Order of Friers, or a Common-wealth begin now, it endureth very long; not fo much fupported with Armes, as Wifdome, and dexterity in Treaties, by which fur reptitious kind of prudence, immunities are obtained from fuch, or fuch a Common-wealth, as afterward are never to be regained.

If fo it chance, that Saturn and Jupiter bee in Conjunction, their first time of leaving the earthly Trygon, in the figne of Aquarius, which is the joy and delight of Saturn, not onely famous men in life, learning, and conversation arife, but also in honesty, integrity, and Religion; Saturn is so over-joyed in Aquarius, he permits Mercury but little dominion to do ill; wherefore excellent Schoolmen, Mathematicians, Astrologers, and men learned in every kind of learning, do find great encouragement in the world, so that the composition of all manner of excellent learning, comes usually from men living in these times, as born under a Conjunction in this Trygon.

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Of the Watry Triplicity.

L Aft of all, when the two Superiors make their return into the watry Triangularity, which Mars doth principally rule; There are ftirred up for Religion, and by the Clergy, many most dreadfull warres, as also many contrary Sects, and opinions in Religion, ftrange Engines for warre, and the destruction of mankind are framed, many plagues, and pestilences afflict the Earth. Yet if Saturn and Jupiter make their first Conjunction in Cancer, the Commonpeople make fome gentle Commotion, or defire to have fome reformation in Religion; and rather then fail, they crave help of the Nobility, by whose means they obtain their defires with moderation; and without blows: And although it might be otherwise doubted, because Saturn in Cancer is in detriment, and Mars in his fall, yet I do conceive, Cancer being the onely House of the Maon, the figure where Jupiter is exalted, and where Mars hath the onely government,

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ment, by Triplicity, all things go on in a loving way. unleffe Mare at the time be unluckely placed in Libra, and then nothing but change of opinion, new found Tenents in the Church, and what not? Not any Sectary knowing his owne heart: for let his Prince give him leave to broach one errour, and he will perform it with proclaiming twenty.

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Certainly if Mars have no hoftile radiation to the then Conjunction, the power of Japiter will perform wonders.

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Si qua fides altris, aut si quid ab alto Æthere cognatum nostris in mentibus hæret. Crediderim fas, ac lege, & jura, pinmque Et rectum manare, & amica fædera pacis.

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If any faith in stars there be, or from the heavens so high We knowledge do derive, when Jove doth rule the skie Beleeve me then, both Law, and Rights, or what is just me have, Leagues friendly, blessed peace besides: what more con we then crave?

Many Churchmen of inferiour Rank, come to great fame, and fat Benefices in the World, and admirable preferment in the Church; Private grudgings betwixt the ancient Nobility and the Clergy, &cc. If Saturn and Impiter have their first Conjunction in Scorpio, upon leaving one, and entring this Trygon, wherein neither Saturn or Impiter have any materiall dignities: An egge is not fo full of meat, as the Church of factions. Princes Courts are the Seminaries of fedition, faction, luxury, and lechery; ill government follows, feeble Princes, and masculine Queens, bloody warres, pestilential difeases: Now one of Mars his lying spirits hath licence to make the Prophets preach untruths, and the Priefts to babble vain words for found Dostrine. Post Conjunctionem Saturns & Jovis in Scorpio, surrexit feta venenosa, que tanquam lues totum pervasit orbem : After a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in Scorpio, an untoward Herefie arose, troubling all the world. Campanella.

If Saturn and Jupiter begin in Pisces, Reformation of Church and men; is talked of, and much expected; its long in agitation, unwillingly profecuted; a generall Councell amongst Christians; Herefies and novell opinions vex the Church: The figne is common, Men are double tongued; Can Authority fettle they know not what? In an other sense, Stultus interrogator facit seisentem deviare; Things done now, continue not a whole age; Its good to be sure.

The Agent handled, viz. a Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter.

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"He prefent conjunction of which I now treate, doth happen in 25. degrees and 26. minuts of Pifces, the Afcendent of the Scheam is Sagittarius : Neque enim ex signo conjunctionum duntaxas effectus cognoscimus, sed ex coorientium figura : For onely by the figne of the F conjunction, we do not judge the effects, but by the figure afcending at the time of the conjunction : Sciendum autem est minus esse mali in aspectibus signorum, quam partium, sic enim inevitabiles sunt effectus : to Prolus upon Ptolomey : had I treated of fome afpects of these two planets, viz. either of the Sextile, Quadrate, or Opposition, there had S been lesse matter or mischief to be thought on, but it being a conjun-Etion, the events will be very strong and inevitable; this is spoken with too much aggravation. Jupiter & Saturnus mutant res & convertunt, eritque variationis initium, cum mutantur ex una figura in aliam in conjunctionibus : Almansor. 127. Jupiter and Saturn convert and change matters; when in their conjunctions they change out of one form into another, there is the beginning of variation. This Conjun-Etion beginneth in a perfect Trine, to the last Comet we faw, viz. In 1618. that began in 25 Scorpio, the figne wherein the first conjunction of Satarn and Jupiter, was in their last return to this Trigon: this conjunction is in Pifces, the last figne of the Zodiack, and of this Triplicity. It may pleafe God after some cruell stormes and with much vexation to the whole Christian Common-wealth, this Conjunction may perfectly conclude fuch things, as feall remaine imperfectly begun by the Comer, when the effects of it are determined, this Conjunction being an affistant to execute Gods decree, intended by that former heavenly apparition, but in a milder execution, and not fo violently. But if any shall fay, Why did not the little Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, 1623. feeing it was after the apparition, work and cooperate as well as this prefent Conjunction ? I may answer cafily; That matter was not then prepared, but preparing, that Conjunction having no affinity, with either the figne of its first apparance or almost with any it passed through, during its continuance: for the Conjunction then was in a fiery figne, and rather stirred and fitted materialls for the building, then other wayes: we know the progreffe of the Comet was in Scorpio, Libra, and Virgo : And yet that Conjunction

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junction, I am fure, passed not away without a heavy touch of its malice, which came fully upon us, when in a due measure of years, it was Gods will, the effects should break forth upon England, viz. 1625. But now Pisces ob fouris domicilium, aquas dulces nobis suppeditat, Pro. fol. 70. Being Pisces is the house of fupiter, let us hope he will supply us with sweet and pleasant waters, we have had too much bitter : God grant us better dayes.

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In the Scheam of this present Conjunction, Saturn is absolutely the strongest, Majus infortunium Saturni est, cum fuerit in signis somininis; Martis cum suerit in masculinis, Almanson. proposit. 83.

Saturn doth molt mischiefe in Feminine fignes; Mars in Masculine : I in our Scheam they have fuch a position : Insuper, fi Saturnus sit in Decosin quo dignitatem habet; significat quod gens antiqua locum inhabitans quemcunque, devicta non erit, neque de loco suo extracta, & propter naturam Saturni multiplicabuntur per mundum odia, rancores, turbationes, fames, & infirmatatum species, Avenaris, fol. 80. Moreover if Saturn be in the figure where he hath dignity, an ancient people shall 1 not defert their habitations, nor be drawn out of their own foyle : hate, rancour, trouble, famine, and feverall forts of infirmities shall. 6 be multiplyed all over the world : Saturn, Jupiter, Sol, and Mercury There in their motions very fwift, exceeding their mean proportion ve-I'ry much, which may be one reason, why the effects hereby fignified, A fhall quicklier begin and go forward with greater vigour during their continuance : Quanto sydus majus est, ac motus velocior, co etiam opera syderis sunt manifestiora, Dasipod. Apho. 8. The swifter a star is, Sand the greater, the more eminent are his operations, Climatum diffeprentia facit, vt celerins aut tardius eventus proveniant, & ut planeta in L'angulis sunt velcadentibus vel succedentibus; Carda. Seg. 5. Aphorif.98: The difference of Climates cauleth the events to come fooner or later, and according as Planets are placed in Angles, cadent houses, or fuc-8 cedent.

Et generaliter, & fnerit infortuna fortuna cadenti copulata, aut infortuna clevata, fient dua infortuna; nibil fermé juvantes & multum nocentes, Génerally if an infortune be joyned to a fortune, either cadent in house or otherwaies, both become infortunes; helping firmely nothing, but impediting much. Car. Seg. 5. Aphorif. 123. Quod si fortuna elevatur, infortuna juvabit quidem; sed & nocebit, quoniam detrimenta magna facilius est inferre, quam falicitates, impediunt detrimenta felicitates, falicitates autem detrimenta impedire non solent : It a fortune be in Conjunction with an infortune, and in a cadent

house, and the fortune be elevated, the infortune may do good; but he shall also do mischiefe: for its easier to infer or produce great dammages or loffes then bleffings : detriments do impeach happineffes but very feldome that happineses do impeach or keep back milchiefes, Card. Seg. 5. Aphorif. 124.

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I judge Saturn, Jupiter, and Mars, wholly Lords of the Conjun-Ation; and although Mars is not very powerfull, yet being Lord of the tenth, and having exaltation in Capricorn an intercepted figne in the ascendant, and in longitude neer Oculus Tauri; I do allow him 2 Prerogative in judgement, and not without just grounds in Art. Some and those very good Altrologers, have efteemed Jupiter to be most strongly fortified in the Positure, and that he was directly Lord of the Conjunction, he hath the figne for his, and is elevated above Saturn, as having 60. minutes leffe South Latitude then Saturn :how much elevation is of confequence in this matter, and what it is, I handle hereafter. Thus much I fay, Had Jupiter been fo powerfull, we might have expected from fo benevolent a Planet, that which Aratus in Pheno. fol. 49. faith in another fense: A fove principium, &c. Plena vero fovis omnia quidem compita; Omnes vero hominum catus : plenum vero mare & portus : ubique autem fove indigemus omnes : Hic veró benevolus hominibus commoda significat : All places are full of Jupiter ; man, the Sea, heavens, what not? This benevolent Planet fignifieth all manner of emoluments to man, but heare it by Pontanus excellently and to the purpose in Urania, fol. 2903. Its Jupiters property being fole Ruler.

-Falicibus addere seclis

Secula, perpetuumg, annos extendere in avum, Tanta Jovis placidi clementia,

But being corrupted by the predominancy of Saturn, the fame Author tells us what may be expected.

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Sydere torpentes Saturnus funderet ignes, Funderet & lethi caufam infelicis, & omne Morborum genus, & mifera mala plurima vite :

viz. Jupiter being chiefe, he makes this age as happy as the former, or gives addition of bleffings, and extends his benevolence many ycares.

So much is the elemency of the mild Jupiter : but having affliction . by Saturn, one mischiefe comes in the neck of another, unhappy caufes of mens deaths, every kinde of ill and unwholefome difeafes, and the

the many miferies of mans life are increased. I defire every Reader to picke out my meaning out of fhort fentences and Aphorifmes, my intention being not to make a Comment. Benefica fi superata fuerit : efficatia ejus minuetur, es imbecilior fiet. Proclus. fol. 74.

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If a fortune be overfwayed by an infortune; his efficacy in working his effects is diminished, and is more imbecill.

The Planets are all fubterranean, viz. under the earth, certainely Gods Providence is wonderfull; the Conjunction in 1602. was in the twelfth house, that Conjunction in 1623. in the fixth house, this in the latter part of the fecond, if not part of it in the third : All men know, the two former houses mentioned, have no affinity with the alcendent, the one intimates the obscure managing of mundane affaires fince 1603. by a close hand not visible; but if you will know who it is; observe Mercury is neer Jupiter and Saturn in confultation; who is he: Mercury is Lord of the ninth, its Religion, or the Religious; Mercury in detriment signifies counterfeit.

Religion or the politikly Religious, or fuperflitioufly Religious, had, or were to mannage the actions of that first Conjunctions Rale and Dominion.

Come we to the Conjunction in 1623. observe, Mercury is then with Cor Leonis, as if the Clergie fhould get Regall Countenance and fupport to maintain their errours; if that will not ferve; obferve, Mercury is in the feventh house; he will ftir up war and bloodshed: By whole means and procurement? Is not the feventh house the place of heaven fignifying women? why then, the female Sex shall be furtherers of an erronious Clergie, & of the Apoltate Jeluits, I fay, of all their private defignes, which have, or fhall involve all Christendome in blood and flaughter. But if some fay Mars being in the figura Conjun-Etionis, 1623. in his exaltation, how comes it to paffe, Epifcopacy and the Clergie now faile in 1642. or 1643. First, I fay, that fince 1623, for many yeares their power was great and formidable, but at what time the Comet came to touch the ninth house of his figure; and when Mars by due direction came to the Opposition of the Sun in the fixth of the figure 1623: as you shall fee, if you substract 8. deg. 20. min. the place of Mars, from 24: deg. 36. min. the place of Sol, there remaines 16. degrees and 16. minutes, which put into time, make 16. years and 3. moneths. Adde 16. years and 3. moneths to the 8. of July 1623. and it brings you to the yeer 1639. and moneth of O Etober. Who s knows not that, to be the year of the Prelates first fense, that they . thould for fake their lufty Benefices and fat Bishopricks, and of the icnder

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fenfible diflike the Nobility and Commonalty took against them, for it was much about that time, they would have imposed a new Com- 3 mon Prayer Book upon the Scottifh Nation, and fome Inquilitionlike Canons on the patient English. This prefent Conjunction 1642. is also subterranean, as if God would not yet give light to mortall men, what really he intends by the return of Saturn and Jupiter into. the fiery Trygon; fome glymples we have now and then, either by Eclipfes, or the like; but if we observe things rightly, matters are not carried as apertly as informer times : Latet anguis in herba : All the affaires of Christendome are managed by a Cabinet Counfell, by almost an invisible fociety, which lurk in every place and are every where, and yet no where : The actions intended by fome, during the continuance of this Conjunction, are fuch, as God would not fuffer a Planet to be above the earth to countenance them; fuch- --like affaires being to detelted by man, and to punishable by God, as in thought a righteous foule detefteth naming the least part.

The Sun (that is Lux mundi) is in a watry figne, as if he fhed tears at the rehearfing, and fo is both Saturn, fupiter, and Mercury, as if young and old fhould weep their fill; the moone being the goddeffe of the night, is in the fixth house, and in an ayrie figne, as if she intended to fly into the defarts, and give no light at all, rather then to such foul intendments.

It had been good, that either the actions or the contrivers of these calamities had been strangled in their cradle and infancy. But againe to my figure, which when I have adorned with those fixed stars, which are neer the Cuspes of the twelve houses, and the Nature and quality of every house, not orderly, but somewhat confusedly, I then shall handle the effects, although I give in every line almost a little light of what may be expected.

Sciendam porró est, stellas fixas dominari : fixas sumemus tum spleadidas que sunt angulares, tum que sunt in parte Ecliptica : Proclusfol. 67.

We know the fixed stars have also power; those we take which are either Angular, or of great magnitude, or those which are in the Ecliptick.

I begin with the tenth house first, for if Kings and Princes be not first remembred, they will take it in pet, forme, and derifion : Ar Etrrus a noble fixed star culminateth, he is of prime magnitude and nature of Jupiter and Mars, his Latitude which is much, brings him to mediate heaven with almost the fecond degree of Scorpio: the Longi-

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tude of Arciurus is in 18. deg. 56. min. in Libra. In the name of God why do Princes fhoot fo far from the mark? all men know Libra is a humane figne; had it not been better to have refted therein; then to make transmigration into Scorpio: a figne which presents falsenesse. vaine oathes, treacherous Protestations; yet they would be reputed notwithstanding gods, and Saints; if they would really be fo; In Divis nihil est quo angantur, sed omnia equali guadam falicitate transigunt; Cardanus de Intelligentis. The gods or Intelligencers never are molefted; they do all things justly, or with equall Justice. With the Cuspe of the fourth house, a small star of the nature of Saturn and Mercury defcends. 0

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The tenth house represents Kings, Emperours, Princes, Dukes, Marqueffes, Lords, Vifcounts, Sir Thomas and Sir John, both Knights, &c. Authority; Magistracy, Courts of Justice and of Princes, and Lord chiefe Juffices, Judges of all Courts, or any man in command, or exercifing power over another, all offices, the profeffion any man lives in, be the quality or trade what it will: if either the Sun or Jupiter be in this house, or command that; its a signe of a happinesse in the matter in question, provided, they not onely afpect tott. the house, but have effentiall dignity where they are, either Saturn or Mars herein mar all the roft. .9

The fourth house naturally signifieth our predecessours, as Fathers, ٠ or Lands, Tenements and hereditaments, also pastures, fields, woods, towns besieged, treasures under ground; in figura mundi ; it signifieth Kings wives, great perfons wives, and Concubines, and being rightly understood it tells Kings who are their enemies, what Nation or people do love or hate them, but this is In judicio magnarum, mediarum Sond Spledo loveer and Conjunctionum, & in Eclipfium tam jotar um quant pralio-ser rium, medium Cali, Reges, legisque Dominos, judices, & etiam pralio-rum dominos, Angulus autem, terra partes, & terras, locum etiam, in quo rum dominos, Angulus autem, terra partes, & terras, locum etiam, in quo S' fignification of the houses.

U pon the Cuspe of the 11. house called the good Angell, there is a fixed ftar of the third magnitude, being the formost ftar in the palme I of the left hand of Ophinchus, of the nature of Saturn and Venus, having 17. degrees of Boreall Latitude, and with the Culpe of the fifth house there descends an obscure star of the nature of Mars and the), and its placed in the breft of the Bull, and hath 8. degrees of Meridio-Jognall Latitude; very neer unto it doth descend the Pleyades, of a ftirand, ring, active and feditious nature; fhall our eyes behold the father againt 1

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gainft his fon, and the fon in arms againft the father ? Shall the affiftance and aids one Prince fends another, either be unfeafonable, or of no concernment ? Shall the forraigner feldome finde the way home againe, unleffe he can devoure a Canon, or wade thorow the Sea? Can Saturn and Venus, that reprefent Kings favorites, be good counfellours to their mafters, the one being old, the other not fo, there being perfect antipathy betwixt them ? Do not thefe villaines betray their Princes fecrets, each in opposition to other, while the poor Potentates ftudy and admire how their Counfells are detected : all men know Venus is youthfull, and Saturn cynicall or churlish. This hard fate will follow the Courts of Kings, for many yeares yet enfuing.

By the eleventh house, we meane Kings servants, Favorites, their affiltants, good name and fame; friendship, the provision both of men and money for them, their amunition, &c. their Exchecquer or Treasury.

By the fifth house, I understand, Embassadours, (which in our climate will play their Prankes.) Children, Playes, Banquets, Ale-houses and Taverns; Messengers, Agents for Republiques, &c.

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Upon the Cuspe of the twelfth house there ariseth with the seventh of Sagittarius, which was the degree almost of the great Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, 1603, two fixed stars of the nature of Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, and Venus, and these are on the right knee of Ophinchus: The house it felf is the house of imprisonment, of Witchery and Sorcery, all underhand practises, of those enemies which work all manner of mischiefe and yet are not visible; of whispering Raschals, of malice, differition, private revenges and quarrels, of Horses, Cowes, and Oxen, Asses, and Camels; it tels the state of the Kindred of Princes, is it not the third from the tenth: I mean not this in Kings Nativities, but in Eclipses, Conjunctions, and Sel his ingresse into Aries.

So many Planets neer the Cuspe, and Mars in opposition to the Gaspe of the twelfth: shall we have Souldiers, Church-men, Nobles, and the whorish Venus, and now and then a Kinsman to a King, all in fetters, or imprisoned; or shall Mars in vaine afflict that house, and deftroy none of these Creatures at one time or other: Can these whisperours live alwayes so clandestinely, that neither a halter, a fword, or musket can finde them?

Upon the Cuspe of the fixth we have two fixed stars descending, of the nature of Saturn, Jupiter, and Mars. This house fignifieth all man-

Ener of fickneffes, and Servants both Male and female : all little Cattle I as Sheep, Hogs, Goats, &c. Shall Saturnine difeates, as the Spleen, old aches in mens bones and joynts, quartan Agues, Surfets by colds, Rhumes and Palfies, a dry Coughs, Lameneffe, &c. afflict?

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Shall the Confumption or walting of the Lungs, a found difeafe; Plurefies, distemper in the blood, and much ventofity, or Fluxes in both kinds, torment us ? Or shall the running of the Raines, sharpe Feavers, and madnesse be upon us ; which are Martiall diseases? I omit to repeat wounds in the head, face, and thighs, &c. Shall the Servant strive to be equall with his Master, nay, to beare rule over him: this founds like the dream of 70/oph, fo much contemned by his brethren, but fo fully afterwards verified. 10 9 Remet

The Cuspe of the ascendent, or first house, hath two stars co-arising with it, of the nature of Mars and Luna, Saturn and Venus; of the Scorpion, the first chine or joynt next the body, the other is of the two stars, of the North part of the sting of the Scorpion, without forme the Southermoft : Hinc Lachryme : the unruly multitude ftir up fudden commotion, and involve themfelves in Labyrinths: and as the fixed ftar neer their afcendent is without form, or is a Chaos; or mors cosides a e no aspact but a ofe of ils that his rudis indigestag, moles; so it may be conceived their judgements being unrefined, they labour for, they know not what; can neither digelt matter or form, for what they will pretend : and yet they will ftir up matter to gravell the most parts of Europe ; nor will beleeve, they know any thing, till they are well beaten : which in fine they will be. Old men also and young Melancholy maids, will helpe to foment, and put for wards the effects of this Conjunction.

This first house is called, the Horoscope in Nativities; the Ascendent in Eclipses, Conjunctions, and horary queftions ; it fignifies in our Conjunction, the State of the Commonalty of England; the State of the people ; how it shall go with them, well or ill : In Nativities, it represents the life and beginning of man; and partly his complection, and condition, &c. With the Cuspe of the feventh house, which generally fignifieth, women, war, contention, publique enemies, there doth descend divers stars of the nature of Mercury and Venus; CO 6 haractors these two Planets ever represent youth, witty facetious men, jefts, and fuch like : Papers, libels, pamphlets, or vaine books; young men and maids shall have a share in setting the world at variance, and shall also fuffer by the effects of this difinall Conjunction, and the calamities thereupon depending.

Mercury reprefents Secretaries, and Clerks of Councells, Meffen-

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gere, or Nuntio's, Embaliadors, Factors, or the like, fuch as agitate s with the pen in State affaires; Venus the weth us, women and children thall as well Act their parts, as men their Conjunctional Tragedy.

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A Star of the quality of Saturn and Mercury arifeth with the fixth of Aquarius in the fecond houfe : much Legerdemaine will be uled by the interloping Officer, or covetous Lawyer; and yet not fo much ... by the Lawyer as fhirking Clerk, and dull Country Gentleman, to obtaine the eftates and fortunes of other men: for plodding and reftleffe knaves are never quiet, or weary of doing mifchiefe. This houfe is prefents the fortune and eftate of the Country man in generall, which is not like to be good, becaufe Saturn is without effentiall fortitudes, c and Venus is Retrograde in the fecond, which fignifieth diminution of the husbandmans fortunes, his houfhold-ftuffe, his money, plate, corn, ... and what ever he fultaines himfelf by.

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Upon the cufpe of the eighth houfe, reprefenting the inheritances of the dead, and the death of mankind in generall, I finde divers flars of the condition of Saturn, Mars, Mercury, and Sol, of very malignant influence; which intimate mens effates and inheritances fhall be violently wrefted from them by kingly hand, or gift of Kings, becaufe Mars is one fignificatour; or by the infulting Souldiour or Commander; the worm-eaten Pettifog, or unjuft Judge: colourable pretences being accepted for ftrong evidence; many Tenants will feek to informe against their Landlords; &c. Such a connexion of fixed Stars on the cufpe of the eighth houfe, denoteth the feverall manners death ufeth, to bring men to their end: is there not the Affelli both North and South, and pettus Cancri within the limits of the houfe. Do not these denote violent and unexpected death, by fword, water, and halter.

With no degrees of Aries, no fixed ftar alcends, the third house is afcendent with & now brother against brother, kinsman to kinsman envious; the enemies of ones house are the worst: & fie ad infinitum: Neighbour against neighbour.

With the first of Libra descends no fixed star : Ω is in the ninth, but its not a Planet but a Node: this is the house of Religion, Clergie men of all forts, so that Religion for a long time will not be fully setled; because *fupiter* is less powerfull then Saturn, and Venus Lady of the ninth Retrograde. Its fit to regulate that first, yet the Conjunction saith, It will not be so: Oh the many disturbances the Synod shall finde.

The Cufpes of the houfes finished and Illustrated with fixed stars, I come to the Planets : Saturn and Jupiter being in the 25°, Pifces,

have with them a Star of the third magnitude and nature of Satura and Mercury : its an addition of ftrength to Saturn, that he hath a ftar of his own nature joyned with him; and Jupiter is in ftrength fomewhat diminished, to have a fixed star of the nature of his enemie, in Conjunction with him; he's the more invalid to refift the Potency and malice of his infulting enemie : for that Axiome is not ever true, Quicquid ligat Saturnus, folvit Jupiter : what ever Saturn hinders, Jupiter helps : thats onely to be understood, when Saturn is leffe predominant than Jupiter; for at all times, and in every figne and house of heaven, this is not true. If he mean Magically, it is true, with its proper limits : For let one be bewitched by Saturn, or by a man or woman of Saturn his conditions; the cure mult be by observing the progresse of Jupiter, by hearbs to him appropriated, gathered and ap1 plyed when he is valde potens, in his houre, &c. and winat switt in

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With Mars are the Lampadas, Succula, or Aldebaran, all of the nature of Mars, Jupiter, and Luna : from hence arife fudden tumults, commotions, much blood fhed, and want of duty in fervants, and inferiour forts of people; the one to their Masters, the other to their tory boilered with slory 5d Soveraignes.

With Sol, who reprefents the equipage of Princes, are fome (fella . juvantes) and but some, of Jupiter, Saturn, Mercury, their natures, the Sun may cry out for more helpe, himfelf being peregrine; and Almanfor in proposit. suis faith, Planeta Peregrinus, &c. is like a man thrust out of all : Venus is joyned with a fixed star of the Nature of Mercury and Saturn, as also Jupiter, but Jupiter comes in last of all: Post est occasio calva. Venus fignifies Ladies, Queenes, and the isialfo fignificatrix of the Clergie. It is a state of the store

Mercury having particular fignification in our Scheam of fuch as makestrife and contention, and of faithlesse fervants, is accompanied with a fixed ftar of his own influence; we may note, Birds of a feather will flock together. Luna is with a fixed ftar, of the nature of Mers and Mercury, generally the fignifieth (omnem hominem plebeium) when Mars, Mercury, and Luna are together (without a miracle) they incline a man to be a knave, falfe, and treacherous : what shall be the refult of a confultation, where Mars, Mercury, and Luna meet, Infanum valgus, never pleased: In this position, the fignificatrix of the commonalty in generall is fo ill placed, fo weak in fortitudes, they have great caufe to mourn, weep, howle, and lament ; but little neede of a paire of Bag-pipes, Scc.

of the patient, or subject matter, in which principally, the events shall happen; and whether good or evill.

TN treating hereof, I find at first fome repugnancy, and difference amongst the Learned : Haly Rodoan, in his Comment of the 63. Aphorisme of Ptolomy, hath these words. Oportet aspicere in conjun-- Etione Saturni & Jovis, in codem minuto ad elevationem unius corum super alterum : & judica cum fortitudine natura ejus ; scilicet elevati in hoc mundo, & similiter fac : Confider in every Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, who is most elevated, and judge according to the nature of him that is most elevated in the heavens, or in this World: do likewise so, &c. He goeth further ; Habent itaque effectus mirandos, sed superat elevatus; est autem judicium validum, cum fucrit conjunctio in ascendente, vel in Alchirem, vel in Eclipsi Solis vel Luna; These Conjunctions have marvelous effects, but the elevated Planet fuperates, The judgement is firme, if the Conjunction be in the Afcendent, or in the degree wherein any of the 21. principall Conjunctions 20 was, or in the degree, of an Eclipic, Solar or Lunar. Of this opinion of Almansor in pro. 60. seemeth not clearly to be, Ea que accidunt in hoc faculo, sciuntur & investigantur ex magna forticudine superioris fignificators of ex sua elevatione: Accidents of this world may bee found out, by the great strength of the superiour Significators, and from his Elevation. Trapezuntius tells us, what he conceives to bee intended by Elevation in this place; viz. in 63. Aphor. Ptel. Qui propinquior est maxime longitudini (ne in Epicaclo, incum clevari dicitur, qui a suaremotion est. The Planet, saith he, that is nearest to his Longitude, in his Epicycle, is elevated above him, who is more remote from it, viz. his Longitude. That the Arabian Aftrologians intended onely in these Conjunctions to judge the effects by that Planet molt elevated, I do verily beleeve; and that they meant by elevation, according to Trapezuntius the Greek. There are many other wayes not explicated, whereby one Planet is faid to be elevated above another; and yet I cannot conceive, that the fole elevation, in that ienie, molt speak of, shall be of such force, as to judge the effects of any Conjunction, by which of the two Planets is molt elevated; or to speak more near to common capacity, hath least South Latitude, It it bee South; or greater North Latitude, if it bee North; To conclude a follid judgement hereupon, I hold it altogether absurd : but the Ancients wanting those exact Tables which wee now enjoy, whereby L 2

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whereby they were made uncapable of the exact time of the two fuperiour Conjunctions, and fo of having a right Ascendent of the true Conjunction, we are content to take the figne, and degree, and the latitude of the Planet, without further confideration : And hereupon it was that Cardane, who lived in the dayes of Edward the fixth, wanting those conveniencies, which this age, by the industry of Tycho, and others enjoy, burft out into these speeches, when hee spake of these Conjunctions, and how impossible it was to have the exquifite Conjunction of Saturn and Impiter, because Impiter doth exceed Saturn in diurnall motion, fixe minutes, feldome feven ; Ad hos difcrimen nullus mortalium, ncc instrumento, nec aliter discernere potest : in Coment. lib. 2. Prol. fol. 215. The difadvantage is fuch, quoth he; no mortall man, either with Inftrument, or other wayes, can difcerne the time of the true Conjunction. But fince I had the Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 1603. fo exactly performed, by Sir Christopher Heydon with Instrument; and the fame (de novo) calculated by the excellent and industrious, Master Matthew Fiske, out of the Rudolphine Tables, betwixt whom there is no fenfible variation, but in place of the Moon : I fay, I conceive it possible, and I do beleeve I have the Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in 164. exquifitely done by the fame learned hand : and that either he, or any, as able as himfelf; may compasse the true moment of any Conjunction. But because the word Elevation is of great extent, you shall see more fully, how many wayes a Planet is faid to bee elevated above another:

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1. The Planet that is leffediftant from the Apogeon ofhis Eccentrick. is more elevated, then he that is more remote. 2. A Planet above the earth, is elevated above one below, or under the earth. 3. A Planet in the midd heaven, or near it, (or tends from the Horizon to the tenth House) is above him that is in the eleventh House: hee that is in the eleventh, is elevated above him in the twelfth: hee in the twelfth, above any in the Afcendent. 4. If all are above the earth, the neareft the midd heaven. 5. If all are under the earth, then the next to the Ascendent. 6. The Latitude is confiderable, viz. the elevation of a Planet, according to the Latitude of the Zodiack. In Conjunctions, North Latitude is preferred before South ; and therein the greater Latitude North, the greater elevation ; if both have South Latitude, he that hath leaft, is most elevated : forin truth hee is neerest the Ecliptique..

Not withstanding this Elevation, of which the Ancients fo much

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ftood upon, I shall make it appear by the confent of later Authors, and Reason it felf, the best Author, that something else besides elevation, is confiderable in judgement of these superiour Conjunctions, and that the effentiall and accidentall Dignities are of more concernment then sublimity, &c.

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Pontanus in Coment. 63. Apbor. Ptol. Quum autem fieri possit, na pari sublimitate ant declinatione ferantur, quid tune servandum esset, non expressit Ptolomeus, relinquens nobis consideranda permulta, quibus examinari vires utrinsque, atque invicem pensitari debeant : But sith, it may so happen, as both Planets are carried with one and the same sublimity and declination; Ptolomey doth not then direct what is to be done, leaving us to consider many things, and amongst the rest, the severall fortitudes of either Planet, are to be pensitated, or looked after.

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Cardanus resolveth the question more perfectly, in Seg.2°. Aphor.2. In omni planetarum conjunctione eum planetam dominatorem constitue, qui sublimior suerie in Eccentrico, & parvo circulo, & qui in loco plares habuerit dignitates, & qui plures stellas sua natura similes habuerie. In every, or any Conjunction of the Planets, constitute him Ruler, who is highest in his Eccentrick, and in his lesser Circle, and who hath most Dignities in the place of the Conjunction, and hath most Starres of his own nature with him.

Doctor Dee, a learned Britain, and one of the acutelt Aftrologers the last Age produced, in Aphorif. 116. confenteth with Cardanas Circa illas 120. conjunctiones, generalifimam nos hanc proponimus methodum; quando solum duo ex septem copulantur, 21. varia esse possunt conjunctiones, & in illarum fingulis quis duorum planetarum erit fortior confider ari debet. Concerning the 120. Conlunctions Prolomey speaketh of, we deliver this generall Methode; When two onely are in Conjunction, there may be 21 Conjunctions, in every of which conjunctions, we ought to confider which is ftrongelt. So faith Theodoricus Hagheu; Eorum effectus (ecundum fortitudinum convenientiam evenit: The effects of the Planetary Conjunctions do come to passe according to the conveniencie of their Fortitudes. By all which, Ido affirm it the fafelt way, whereupon to ground a certain judgement, to examine the fortitudes and debilities effentiall, and accidentall of the two Planets, at the time of their Conjunction, according either to the Methode of Darius, Leovitius, Junctine, but especially of Origanns, fol. 539. And I conceive the meaning of Ptolomey in that 63; Aphorif. was this; That when both Planets in a Conjunction have equall

equall fortitudes or debilities, that then wee are to confider, whic of the two is in the highest part of his Epicicle.

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In our present Conjunction, Saturnus transit Apogeon, 20. Martii; & Jupiter in Epiciclo superiorem partem 23. Martii. By this meanes, Saturn is nearest his Absis: Origanus in fine Ephemerid. Anno 1643.

Its therefore certain, Saturn hath most dignities, and Jupiter more elevated; by which I conceive, what Religion, Law, or Justice would have effected, shall again finde impediment by Saturn, viz. cunning plotting, treachery, falfehood, &c. The subject matter, upon which this Conjunction shall have most influence, shall therefore be of the nature of Saturn first, then of Jupiter, and last of all, Mars shall claim his part in the Tragedy, for it will be one. Wee usually fay, Labour is from Saturn, Religion from Jupiter, Fire and Sword from Mars.

If we confider the figne afcending, or of the Conjunction it felf, or the figne where Mars and Lana are, its Bicorporeall, Bicorporea hominibus & Regibus judicium prabent, ob duplicem affectionem: Rex enim respectu subditorum, & subditi respectu regis dicuntur. Proclus fol. 68. Double bodied fignes give judgement upon men and Kings; A King in respect of Subjects, and Subjects in confideration of a King, are fo called, upon a twofold affection. Pifces is an Aquaticall and flegmatique figne, but very near to the Equinoctionall, and Cardinall figne Aries; it will not belong ere matters appear in farre different courfe to former times, in a more majelticall straine. The figne is appropriate to Aupiter, and is his Houle: Si Conjunctio fit in Scorpione velPiscibus, que sunt domus altiorum planetarum, significant longitudinem temporum, quam signa inferiorum planetarum. Albumazar] diff. 2. cap. 1. If the Conjunction of the superiors is in Scorpio or Pifces, they being the Houfes of the weightier Planets, fhew a longer time of the duration of effects, then if the figne had been of the inferiour Planets.

If the place of heaven be confidered, as Cardane will have it, Aphor. 89. feg. 5. In omni Conjunctione confider a locum, & quis eorum fit fuperior. In every Coniunction, confider the place of the Coniunction, and who is fuperiour of the two Planets. If this bee true, as I doubt, it is, the Coniunction it felf is in the fecond Houfe, or in that part of heaven, which fignifieth riches, eftate, goods of fortune, money, plate, houfhold-fluffe, Corne, Jewels, or in plaine words, fuch things, or livelihoods, as without which one cannot live, and are the

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(79) proper perfonall estate of every man. And this Escuidus fol, 17. In quo genere rerum apparebie effectus, boc scietur ex qualitatibus es formis : And more punctually, and to purpole. fol. 41. Conjunctio Saturni & Jovis in ferunda domo, muta erit venditio & emptio, & acquisitio cenfus, & crit multa concupiscentia in illis. V From the quality and forme of the figner, we know the manner of the effects. A Con: - junction of Satura and Jupiter in the fecond House, there will bee fmall buying and felling, and as little enriching ones eftate, not with-Randing many shall much defire it. Here are no leffe then five Planets pofited in the fecond Houle; Mars and the Sun in Iquare Afpect, the Moon in the fixth, applying, or rather feparating, for in partill Quadrature with Mercury, &cc. I cannot but judge from hence, the judden undoing of many a man, by rapine, theevery, taxes, legall, or illegall, Mercury makes any thing legall. I mult Prognosticate great impoverishment to the effates, and inheritances of the Nobility,

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to the Clergy, to the Gentleman, to the Lawyer, and the industrious Yeoman, and hard labouring Farmer, the *diarnall* operating labouter, the curious, or idle Mechanick, the Collier, Tincker, and the most fordid of all Professions, except the hangman.

To the Merchant I divine great loffe by Piracies, Shipwracks, and by broken Creditors, or bankrupt Debtors: I cannot imagine by this Conjunction, who, or what kinde of man, or of what nature, and profession he shall be of, that in these turbulent times, shall either thrive, or keep his own. As there are many Planets in the House of riches, and they in a common signe; so also shall bee the meanes whereby men shall bee impoverished; Hee that is rich to day, is not certain to abound to morrow; Hee that kept fervants this Moneth, may be fervant himself the next: An universall poverty in estate, in Cattle, Corne, and what not. A time most uncomfortable, I fee, for fome succeeding years, bad to all, good to a few.

If the tenth Houfe fignifie Kings, in generall, or particularly in our Scheame, you shall finde Mars but moderately dignified, as ill as Cadent, and worst of all, having no Aspect to the eleventh House, that fignifies the support of Princes. Consider their part of fortune, proiected from the tenth house; its then in 9.grad.12.min. Aquarius: who dispose the function of Aquarius, doth not Jupiter? and is not he Lord of the twelfth, of the Ascendent, and disposer of the Coniunction it self? With what difficulty, labour, and discontent so for part of the years alotted to the conclusion of this Conjunction. In the next place

place let me make fupitor the generall fignificatour of Nobility, Gentry, Epilcopacy, Lawyers. A Jove Pralatura, a Saturno auftera Relivio. Prelacy is from Jupiter, Munkery from Saturn : So that Cloilters of Fryers, as well as Benefices of idle Bifhops will fmart, and come thort of their revenues; for as much as *Impiser* is in the fecond house. in a particular way he must fignific according to his polition therein: but because he is there personally, he may and doth in generall fignific the perions above named, and then admitting that house for the afcendent, the subsequent house demonstrates their fortunes and estates. but therein you behold the Dragons taile, then which there is no greater argument of either walting all, or a remedilesse impoverishment, or valt and unneceffary expences, and expending their private flocks: as Mars is Lord of their house of substance, so is their part of fortune in Conjunction with him; what may that fignific, but confumption of their revenues, and devaltation of their moveables: for Gemini is an humane figne : if you will know by whom this shall be, Mars being Lord of the tenth, points out by Authority and ftrong hand, by the Souldier: the dragons taile denoteth vulgar perfons, clownes, day labourers, vagabond fellows; their own tenants as for ward as other: what either the Souldier, Regall commands, or Magistracy leaves, the Peafant will in time lay hold of the reft.

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Let us confider the Yeomanry and Farmers of England, they are generally reprefented by Saturn and the Moon; and together with them. is involved the generall fortune of the whole Commonalty; their part of fortune is in Aries, in company with the dragons taile, and Venus being Retrograde is neer the Cuspe of the fecond, Sol, Mercury, Saturn, and Jupiter, all posited partly in the house; here's every one catching and fnatching a part, and yet harken what Guido Bonatus faith, fol. 551. Si Jupiter fuerit corporaliter junctus Saturno, erunt opera qua homines faciunt cum silentio, & operabuntur per modam religionis, & cum apparitione fidei & observatione praceptorum justitia : if fupiter be corporeally joyned to Saturn, men do their actions filently, cloking all their actions with Religion, with an appearance of fidelity, and observation of the Commands of Justice. Shall this age be partaker of the fight of fuch men, as either in Religious habits, or pretending aufterity of life, rob and devoure mens eftates? it will be fo, Saturnus fert mala cum tarditate; Hermes Aphoris. 90. Saturn produceth his influence flowly, and he makes the Jovialist, or the indifferent Clergie-man, a very worme-eaten Prieft; give Saturn money and let the Parish Clerk preach : hoc (nfficit.

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(81)8) But I proceed, Neque enim sufficit, vel satis est artifici scire, bonum fore ant malum, infe proprietas cognoscatur, quale sit futurum, bonum illud an malum: Proclus in Ptol. 71. fol. An Artift is not fatisfied, in knowing whether the thing fignified by a Conjunction be good or bad, unleffe he know the propriety or quality, viz. what manner of thing shall be good or evill : In our Scheame Sasurn and Jupiter have in a manner the whole or the greatest Prerogative: Cum planeta fimul due dominantur, crit judicium ex amberum fignificatione mixtum, cum antem dominus ipse alteri assimilatur, pracipuam quandam vim obtinebit : Cardanus, Seg. 4. Apho. 21. When two Planets Rule, the judgement shall be mixed, and taken from them both; but when the Lord of the figure is joyned with him, or to either, he shall obtain principall Dominion : Actions fignified by Saturn and Jupiter finall give us the most eminent direction in our judgement ; I say, then Saturn for his part according to Escuidus, fol. 13. Significatio Saturni est ad res incaptibiles, nt funt secta vices, regna, & quodcung, fieret in temporibus prolixis : Saturn hath fignification to fome matters already begun, to Sects, Mutations in the course of this world, Kingdomes, and what ever may require long time ere it be finished . nor is this Apherifme vaine, or thall posterity finde it erroniously alleadged; for my whole speech is in Aphorismes. Saturn prenoteth much decay in tillage and husbandry, much loffe to those that deale in Minerals, and fo in Coalemines, Tin, or Lead, for its probable, either the banks shall fall in, or water over-flow the works; and drown out the work-men; destruction (in fructibus ex terra nascentibus) to fruits produced or growing out of the earth, five in rebus qua ex abditis terre erunntur, or hinderance in fuch commodities, as are got out of the bowels of the earth; many curious buildings shall be levelled, and made as low as the earth: a generall tribulation amongst all men: the prifons full of people; hundreds of people undone by unlucky creditors: the inheritances of very many unjustly and irregularly wrefted from them: extream perplexities afflicting the minds of molt men: many defirous but few shall be able to preferve a competency to subfilt with; In terra erit caritas fructuum, & penuria, & vastitas maxime necessariorum ad victum; Bestiarum, boum, equorum, sive ovium penuriam efficit : & eas que relique sunt morbis ad fligir, adeo ut contagium ad homines perveniat, qui iis utuntur. In mari communiter naufragia, & savas tempestates, difficiles cursus, penuriam & interritume piscium. In hominum corporibus morbos diuturnos, tabem & consumptionem, humorum persurbationem, fluxus, quartanas febres, exilia, inopise, Angu-

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(82) ungustias, luttus, pavores, interritus, maxime fenum efficit ; Acris sur bationes, densas nubes, caligines, copiosas nives non utiles, sed damnosas, Peruccas & locustas, damnum hominibus per diluvia & imbres, seu per grandines, coufq ut homines fame & similibus malis percant, Ptol. in 2º Quadripart. fol. 99. There ihall be fcarcity of graines penury, and Pgreat walt, or want of those things are most necessary for our food. Wand living; it makes a dearth or fcarcity of beafts, Oxen, Horfes, and "Theep; and fo contaminates the remainder left behinde alive, that it C breeds contagion in those that cate or use them. In the Sea commond ly fhipwracks and cruell ftormes fucceede; hard paffages or evill voyages for the Merchant, scarce competent filh for our use; for a deftru-Sction of fish is intended. It pollutes the body of man with dayly. o difeafes, confumptions, dry coughes, molestation of the humours, Auxes, quartane agues; banishment either voluntary or inforced, poverty, perplexities, mournings, feares, burialls, of old men especially. Mroubled ayres, thick clouds, darkeneffe, plentifull fnowes, nothing * profitable, but extream obnoxious : it breeds canker-wormes and butter-flyes to devour the tender buds, unfeasonable showers hindring mens proper feasons, with haile, and men endangered thereby to perifh with famine or want of bread.

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A cold featon followes, unfeatonable milts and fogs, many apparitions in the ayre, the colour of the Elements changed, the skies ma-3191 ny times varying from their former hue; fights of armed men, people in the night extreamly frighted with these like visions; if any faith be in the writings of the Ancients; when these or the like appear, or are more frequent than ordinary, viz. these strange alterations in "the ayre, or in the heavens, in what part of the heavens these do rile, f or where they first appear, or over what part of heaven they continuelongest, let those expect vengeance is at hand : for whether na-30 ture being troubled, or the Aerie spirits prefiding that quarter of heaven, are molefted, and by this visible, but mute kinde of prefage, declare to man what is approaching. I leave to be difcuffed by the more fecret Theologers, that have yet a glimps of the more fecret learning; but meddle not with it my felfe, though I am also filins Artis.

Luoman. Vapores accensi per aerem.currentes, sive in forma Cometa, sive in aliss o formis, infirmitates calidas, acutag, nature designant, proling, & dissen-Ducones regnorum: Currentes vero hinc inde per omnes partes, malum universale demonstrant, fin una magis quam in alia, in illa magis erit fignificatum, sed si omnes igneitates in una parte discurrerint, in ipsa crit L'extremitas omnium malorum, fimul & fames : Signa qua videntur in Calo.

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Calo, vel in Luna, que apparuerint extra motum & curfum nature, sed alio modo, ut ita dicam, ignoto velut cruces vel rotunditates circulares, vel sicut columna vel alia forma, si horam considerabis, in qua hac apparuerint, comprehendes, certificabis (j, te in significatione barum, quamvis quod ece nunquam eveniunt sine magna mutatione regnorum, illius climatis in quo apparuerint, Rigel. 87. Aphoris.

Kindled vapours streaming through the ayre, whether in form of a Comet, or other wife, points out, hot difeases of an acute quality, as also wars and the diffentions of Kingdomes. But running here and there and through all parts, they demonstrate an universall evill : if the appearance be more in one quarter of heaven than another, in that especially shall the extremity of the signification be manifest, and not long after that, famine. Signes which are seen in heaven, or in the Moon, which appear beyond the course of nature; but, as I may so fay, appear after an universall manner, as Cross, or circular rotundities, or pillars, or of any other form, if you consider the time of their first visibility, you may divine what they intend, yet be fure they never in vaine appear, without great alteration of that Kingdome where they so first happen to be seene.

Since 1628. to this prefent year, we have had in England our share of these unnaturall fights in the ayre. I have observed many my felf: if after the writing hereof we have any more of these unusuall aftonilhments in the Elements, let the rules above written be rightly applyed: and let not the French, Irifs, Danish, Scots, or Hollander, or any other Nation of Europe, forget these observations. We had one strange circular appearance about the 26. of March last 1643. at what time Saturn entred into Aries, which might verifie that 33. Apborif. of Hermes, Saturnus quidem transeunte ab une signo in alind, funt in Calo Diachohontes, quod Arabes vocant Asub, vel quadam alia figna ignea : When Saturn pafieth out of one figne into another, there are in the heavens strange fiery Meteors, or burning flames in the skies, which the Arabians call Affub; ufually upon this his transit there are extraordinary gapings or the like, in the Firmament. These notions come to my memory occasionally, fome perhaps will make good use of them, others smile, because they can conceive no natural reason for them. I onely fay, Res multe funt, que non videntur ratione naturali effe, attamen experientia multorum seculorum cas verissimos effectus habere comprobavit : There are many matters performed, which feeme not at all to be done by naturall reason, and yet the expérience of many ages have approved them to be most true.

The signification of Jupiter in this present Conjunction.

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F Rom Nature we derive naturall effects and judgements, and therefore in order I come to handle the matters wherein *Jupiter* may have a fignification; for it being a *Conjunction* one Planet cannot, though never fo well dignified, have all the power of disposing the effects and events to himself, but must have familiarity with others, though the quality of the events, shall most manifeltly appear by such men, and in such things as he is principall dominator of.

Jupiter naturally fignifieth, matters Politicall, Ecclefiafticall affairs, or Church Government, Cannons, or Presbyteriall Ordinances, Corporations of Towns and Cities, Subjects Priviledges ; Courts of Juffice, Obedience to Princes, Juffice of Kings to Subjects ; Lawes, Statutes, Ordinances, Decrees : Jobannes Anglicus Distinct. 2. Cap. 1. Et relata eft significatio fovis super abservationes legis atg, decreta bommg, similia : The fignification of Jupiter hath relation to the obfervation of Laws, to Decrees, and fuch like. Of Perfons he lookes principally upon Clergy-men, because the Conjunction it felf is in the house of Jupiter, and in the degrees of Ecclesiasticall men, upon such as are great, but extreamly corrupted by the prefence of Saturn: who represents covetousneffe or superstition : In a word, this intends Superstition in Religon, and much difcord in Religion, or in fuch things as concern the Ecclesiasticall party : Bishops, Abbots, Popes, Munks, Fryers, Protestant Ministers, Preachers, Lawyers, Civillians, Judges, Country Gentlemen ; are all concerned by this Conjunction, and if I had faid, Nobility of the best rank and quality, I had spoke truth; for what concerns, the Gentleman hath affinity to their fortunes; for of late most of them were no better. Being that. Jupiter hath not equall Authority with Saturn, I fay the quality of men before namedashall fuffer moft : The Divines fuffer by reason of the Comets paffage now through the house of Religion : The Gentleman, because Jupiter is afflicted, and is also Lord of the twelfih and first house; which denotes they have done themselves most wrong, and are occafioners of their own fufferings; and therefore harmewatch, harme-catch.

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I also observe this Conjunction is in the fifth house from the tenth: Caveant Reges, principes & Magnates, ne nimium indulgeant filiis. I et Kings, Princes, and great men beware, how they too much cocker their children. Coveant & Caveant ab insurrectione & perfidia filiorum

rum & cognatorum : Let the perfons named, again and again take heed. their own children and Kinfmen prove not Vipers, and raife Infurrection. Filius ante diem. Jack would be a Gentleman before his Father 1200 dyeth. To as many as these words shall arive, let them observe, and preferve the fense (inter fecreta cordis) amongst their greatest fereceies; what I fay to Kings, I fay to Nobility, Gentry, &cc.

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All former Lawes confirmed during the revolution of 40. years now last past, by this pernitious Conjunction and evill Influence of Saturn, and weaknesse of the reft of the Significatours, that would affift, but cannot, or will not, shall be in danger of subversion and utter runne.

Many Common-wealths and Townes Corporate shall either totally be undone and impoverished, and scarce have a face of government, or elfe abfolutely lofe both Town and government at once.

Men must not expect these accidents to happen fo foon, as the words are out of my mouth ; there's a time for all things : its long ere this Conjunction leave working, the Comet is yet in force, what remaines when the Comet hath done, this Conjunction shall profecute, what the Conjunction leaves imperfect, the Eclipse 1654. in Lcone, will be fure to determine ; at, or neer which time if we have - no new blazing Star, as the Precurfor of fome eminent perfon,

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- What Champion may with fuch a man compare ? Or whost binks I, shall be against him fet ? Who is fo bold ? or what is he that dare Defend his force, in such enconnter met ?

I much wonder : but this is out of my Text.

Those Lawes, those Constitutions, Courts of Jultice, Commonwealths, Kingdomes, Monarchies, Titles in honour, or earthly families, that either had beginning 1603. or fince, or much about that time increased their Authority over the poore Client, Tennant, or afflicted Complainant; these men, these Officers, these Landlords, these cruell Courts, during the effects of this Conjunction shall finde fmall caufe to rejoyce, and leffer caufe to infult, then ever they drea- /med of : The providence of Almighty God doth fo order the affaires. of this troublefome age, by guiding the Celeftiall influences according to his immutable Decree, that all exceffe in tyranny, government, command, or exercise of illegall commands, must yeeld to justice, / to a troubled and disturbed kinde of Justice. All imperiousnesse in rule, all firict and hard Lawes incroached upon the Subject by tyrannous Commanders, must either have a period or disturbance. Thole

Those censures Canonicall, or Injunctions Civill, of too strict performance, shall either now be abolished, or alleviated, so as they shall no more be a burthen; either to the weak Christian or modern Proteltant. If fire be not converted into water, or if there be not a contradiction in celeftiall constellations at this present to precedent ones, or if this Conjunction be not diffimilar to the last, then perhaps I may speak falle, but if in Art I finde the truth of what I write, and fuch a conversion or transversion of every place in the Zodiack to the last, and last but one Conjunction; I may then Mathematically conclude, here are ftrange and wonderfull things to be performed, totally contradictory to the actions of the two last precedent Conjunctions. And certainly, as the two Planets which in effect are the fubject of my discourse, are the two waightiest, and represent great actions, so the actions intended hereby, will in the full measure of time break out to be of as much concernment as I write. Cum superioribus nunquam judicia de rebus parvis facies; cumq, inferioribus de rebus magnis, vilescunt tamen superiores per dispositionem inferiorum, uti magnificentur & amplificentur virtutes corum inferiores per superiorum dispositionem, Rigel. 59. 6 40. Aphorif. Judge not of small matters by the superiour Planets, nor of great actions by the inferiour : the superiours are vilified by the difpolition of the inferiours, but the vertues of the inriour Planets are augmented and amplified by the disposall of the fuperiours. By what I have faid, I perceive, Princes will do no good of the matter, if during fome fucceeding yeares they intend any enlargement of Prerogative : the time is palt, and Fryer Bacons braffe head hath loft its opportunity of speaking.

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As Mars is the next in Order, so is he the next in dignity, for hee hath three, and is Lord of medii cali, and hath exaltation in the Afcendent, therefore his judgement mult not be pretermitted, hee being also Lord of the Comet in 1618. and having, or ruling the Triplicity where the Conjunction is, as also a tearm, whereby hee is made capable of copartnership in judgement. I fay, hee must not with filence be passed over, for he is Angular at the Summe his ingresse into Aries, presently after the Conjunction, hee was also in the tenth House, in the preventiall new Moon, and postventionall full Moon before this Conjunction. Conjunctio duorum superiorum in signe aquatico, significat multitudinem pluviarum & pestilentias. Escuidus, fol. 17. The Conjunction of the two superiours, in a Watry signe, intimates many showers, and a great pestilence. So hee in generall tearms. But to go on in an Astrologicall discoursive way: As the (87) two superiors, who make up, or give plentifull matter for present discourse, are in a bycorporeall, double bodied, or common signe, so is also Mars, of whom I am now to speak in Geminis near oculus Tauri : Significatio principalis bujus Conjunctionis pertinger ad homines, Reges, Principes & Nobiles. The principall signification of this Conjunction, hathrelation to Kings, Princes, (not Utopian) and to Noble-men. Haly gives the reason, why the Conjunction being in a bycorporeall signe, should have such signification of men. Quid sicut signa bycorporea significant, sive participant de natura fixorum & mobilium, ita homo babet participationem cum aliis substantiis omnibus: unde dicitur, microcosmus, id est, minor mundus : Because as doublebodied signes, do participate of the nature of fixed, and moveable signes, so a man hath participation with all other substances, whereupon he is called, a little World, or a Microcosme.

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Princes are fubject to the Lawes of Nature, (unius ejufdemque natura fumus omnes, faith Caius Marius) and were it lawfull to deale as freely with them, as other men, certainly many most grievous calamities might have been prevented by a judicious prefeience, either what might naturally, or contingently have happened to their private, and fo particular fates, or as they are involved in a more generall way, by the Republique, unto their Subjects in generall : I do as much forme to flatter them, as any calling whatfoever, and therefore I fay : Let all the European Kings, and Princes that are this day living, carefully mannage the government God hath committed to them; for without doubt, this prefent Coniunction, and the precedent Comet, and fome Constellations immediatly fucceeding, will engage them, both in forraigne and domestique broiles and wars.

In Conjunctione superiorum in aqueis signis, bella magna exoriuntur propter Scorpium, qua tamen in pacem non internecionem plerunque rediguntur propter Cancerum & Pises. Cardane seg. 5. Aphoris. 48. The Coniunction of the superiours in watery signes, shew great warres will arise, because of Scorpio, yet notwithstanding they end in peace, or are brought to a peaceable conclusion, because Cancer is Jupiters exaltation, and Pisces his House.

Et relata est significatio Martis ad bella, & ad guerras, & ad vi-Etorias, & consimilia, qua sunt quasi fines rerum, & fines qua significant dissolutionem earum : nam bene non accidunt, nisi per observationem legin, vel carum mutationem, sectarum vel regnorum. Escuidus. diss. 2, cap. 1. Mars hath signification of strife, and wars, battells, victories, and the like, which may seem to be the ends of matters, of such determindetermination as concludes undoubtedly; for warres arife not, where Lawes are maintained, but where there is mutation of them, and new fects arife, &c. An

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This gives gentle caveats to all incroaching Rulers; Its good they be wife in time. Can all the rules of Aftrology fo faile me, that I shall in this deliver a false Position? There's none but God, by a divine providentiall hand, can prevent the destruction of many thoufand families in Europe. This is a hard Chapter; hee that reads it, let him amend one, and then he need fear the less. The effects of the Coniunction shall not easily passe away. Cum fuerint fortes fignificatores, & planete dominatores fortes fuerint, distins durabit effects. Anglicus fol. 17.

When the fignificators are ftrong, and the Planets well dignified that rule, the effects shall continue the longer. But let us fee what the Ancients speak, when Mars hath any fignification ; I am fure in our Conjunction he hath, and therefore men mult participate, and Martiall defignes have a principall fignification. You may beleeve Prolomey, lib. 2. Quadrip. Mars ciet bella, seditiones intestinas, captivitates, excidia urbium, populi tumultus, principum iras, & propter cam causam subisas neces ; propterea & febres tertianas, sanguinis eruptiones, morbos acentos, violentos interritus, juveum violentiam, injurias, incendia, homicidia, rapinas, latrocinia. In aere vero aftus, ventos calidos, pestiferos, & pabificos, fulminum jaculationes, turbines, ficcitates, in mari subita naufragia, propter flatus turbulentos, & fulmina, & similes causas, &c. Mars having dominion in the Conjunction, tells you of wars, inteftine feditions, imprisonments, the befieging of Towns and Cities, Popular tumults, wrath of Princes, and therefore fudden beheadings, or making away with the parties, violent difeases, eruption of blood, the unufuall and fudden violent death of young men ; violence, injuries, burning of Houfes and Towns, murthere, rapines, high-way-robberies; In the ayre, there are ftirred up poyfonous windes, difperfion of thunder-bolts; haileftones, droughts, fudden thipwracks, by reason of extraordinary tempelts.

By this it appears, that mens actions, guided by fuch an influence, or participating with it, are inclined to do and commit fuch, or actions of fuch like nature.

Men represented by Mars in Geminis generally, are handicraftimen, Tradefmen, Merchants, Schollers, Apothecaries, Physicians, Chirurgions, Cannonneers, Musketteers, Highway-theeves, Brokers, and Scriveners. Particularly, in our Scheame he fignifieth, Generals of Armies, Kings, Princes, Colonels, Serjant-Majors, Captaines, Men of Authority, Commanders of Towns, and Forts, men given to blood and flaughter, Scoutes, Quartermasters, Drummers, Trumpeters of war, &c. So that I perceive, the kindes, or qualties of the events, shall appear in the things specified, and shall be performed by men accordingly qualified.

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The effects which we shall assuredly feele, and of which we shall in time bee fensible, are excellently fet down by Pontansus in Urania. Lib. 1°.

Magnum opus : & jam signa Dei fulgentia terrent Armorumque haurit strepitus, clangorque tubarum. Ipse Deus, rapidis insistens pronus habenis, Tela manu quatit insultans, accrque sruento Ore tonat, pellunt agili temone jugales Exanguis metus, atque tremor ; tum ferreus ora

Terror, sanguineus que pavor, quatit ante flagellum. God is now doing a great Work, his gliftring fignes affright us : We hear the noise of weapons, and the sound of trumpets; God himself inclines to punish us with a sharpe bridle. God shakes darts with bit hand over us and thunders with his angry voyce. Pale fear, and trembling drives away men equally yoaked in the same condition of misery: hard hearted threatning, sanguine dread gives warning before the lash. All this works nething with fome: Yet in these kindes specified by mee, and by such men as are Saturnine, Joviall, Martiall, &c. shall the great work, by God intended to be done after this Conjunction, bee performed. And of this I am confident, and now come to the parts of the World materially fignified, wherein the events shall most manifestly appear.

Kingdoms, and Countreys, wherein the effects of the Conjunction shall have most predominancy.

A IL Authors agree not in the diffribution of the feverall Countreys of the earth, to fuch or fuch a Planet. or Signe. The Arabians divided the feverall habitable parts of the earth into Climates, and fo according to the feverall Latitudes of each Countrey were used to judge of the events, depending on these Conjunctions, &c. Ptolemey in some measure refined their error, and out of the whole earth, known to him in those dayes, formed four Quadrangles, out of Enrope, Asia, and Affrick, as if the earth were four-square. The East part he allotted to Saturnus, the Waft to Mars, the South to Ve-

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nu, the North to fupiter; the Sun, Venus, and Mercury, he omitted. In every Quadrant he put feverall Triangles, or made in every Quadrant feverall Trygons: Aries, Leo, and Sagistarius, hee attributed to Saturn, fupiter, and Mars, and to Europe: Taurus, Virgo, and Capricornus, hee gave to Saturn, and Venus, and to the South of Afia : the third Triplicity, containing Gemini, Libra, and Aquarius, hee affigned to Saturn, and fupiter, and the North of Afia, where Scythia, Arfaret, and Cataica are: Cancer, Scorpio, and Pifces hee allotted to Mars, and Venus, and to Affrique; and then again hee made many divisions, and partitions of every Trygon, viz. into the Ealt, Welt, &c.

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Sir Christopher Heydon did not allow of these his distinctions, and Campanella speaking hereof, Pater, Ptolomeum curtum offe in his affignandis judicius. Ptolomey is too curt, or short in affigning his judgements in this nature. I intend neither to defert Ptolomey, or altogether to follow him. I conceive it most rationall, first to confider the figne, wherein the Conjunction is. 2. The Angles of the figure. 3. The fignes afflicted, by the prefence of any of the Infortunes. 4, Those places of heaven, the Conjunction it felf casteth either a Quadrate, or opposite Aspect unto. 5. The Lords of those figures, and quarters of heaven they are in. And 6. Whether they are strong, or weak.

The figne it felf is Pifces, a Northerly figne, and double bodied, for it represents two filhes; the Conjunction is in 25. degrees of the figne, not farre from entring Aries, an Easterly figne, Equinoctiall and fiery; fo that hence, one may conceive, Religion, aud breach of Lawes and Priviledges, or queltions about fuch things, &c. The figne is Northerne, yet palt the middle the Conjunction is : from London full North; and North-East shall many of the actions intended by this Conjunction be performed. Abfolutely the figne points out the North, and North-East part of Europe from London. There's no Planet in any Angle, but Mars Lord of Scorpio, viz. the tenth, and fupitor of the Ascendent, Mercury of the seventh, and Venus of the fourth: they all point out the North part of Europe, with fome fmall Westerne limitation. The fignes afflicted, by prefence, of infortunes, are Pisces, Gemini, and Aries : the places of heaven with Quadrat, or Opposition are Virgo, the opposite figne to the Conjunction, Sagittarius with perfect Quadrature, and also Gemini; the Lords of those fignes are Inpiter, and Mercury, both in fuccedent Houfes, the one afflicted by Saturn, the other within the limits of combustion.

. The preventionall new Moon, before this Conjunction, points out Italy, and Ireland; not much better then destruction to that Kingdom: Peace with a qualification to Italy, after some broyles, but with much ado, and that but for a while. The Conjunction defigneth Spain, and the Northeast parts thereof, therein shall be much defolation, famine, and many tumults, uproars, &c.

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The City of London in England, by the unlucky position of Mars, in her figne, being Cadent from Aries, and also Mercury his Dispofitor combust, and in detriment, shall indure many hard shocks, two plagues, extream dammage in her wealth, the losse of many valiant Citizens, and yet shall it bee with honour, and to her perpetuall renowne, because that Mars is with Oculus Tauri, one of the most notable fixed Stars: Nor fhall any man yet alive, fee the dayes Mother Shipton spake of concerning London; yet in time all Cities must have end : I rather conceive, that about the year of our Lord God 1-687, the City shall be in great danger, then come to a finall Cataftrophe, during the revolution of that fifth Conjunction.

If Cancer bee the Ascendent of Scotland, as some affirme it is, though Henricus de Fenby think otherwife, let us confider the Moon, and we finde her in Gemini, in the twelfth from Cancer. This Conjunction will affoord much distraction, discontent, forrow, and penury to that Nation, fo alfo to Venice, when thee least thinks of it, and to Constantinople, and the City of Rome her felf, and the change of two Popes, if not more, before 1656. Hungaria is immediatly to feele the hand of warre, and not long after Slavonia, Bulgaria, Moravia, and Dalmatia; Dalmatia will last fmart, but to molt purpose. Calabria is now threatned; Portugall will bee invaded, but not reconquered. Some parts of Normandy, in France ; Paris, and many very honourable and rich Cities in France ; as Lions, Tholow, are all subject to the lash, to popular tumults, insurrections, the sword, and pestilence, &cc. Many domestique broiles shall France endure, more troublefome then a forraigne invalion, though both may bee feared. Some Cities of Zeland, and Towns in Holland shall murmur, and intollerably fuffer by shipwrack, and Piracies. Denmark, though * yet in Peace, by the effects of this Conjunction, and Come- * It was tary influence, 1644. or 1645. may expect a bitter potion of trou- when I first wrot ble, if the providence of Almighty God, give not an understanding, this. and preventionall knowledge in that State : If Art fail not, it fhould be fo. By that, and the Scottifh actions, I conceive I am right. I must write from my heart, what I conceive Astrologically to

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Jacet extremis in partibus orbis Oceano cineta, & Pelagi resonantibus undis Gens Orco sata, gens Ditem commenta parentem Caruleis quondam tellus babicata Britannis.

England these Verses meane; and so do I; It will be said, Efferus has habitat sedes Deus: huic comes haret Et bellum, beliique parens discordia, & ira, Injustum, insidiaque, & pallida tabe cruensa Cades, inque sum rabies armata cruorem.

Some angry God, for some years possessed our habitations; his companions, warre, discord, and fury, the parents of warre, injustice, fraud, pale murther, with cruell Consumptions, and armed madnesse into his owne destruction.

Norway under the Danish Government, must be sensible of our judgment, for its subject to Scorpio, and both by the Comet and Conjunction must be the subject of trouble. Flandors I pitty thee : Brabane weep : Catalonia belonging to the Empire of Spain hath already suffered, and as I heare is still in Armes; be it in Armes now, or not in Armes, Catalonia must not yet be quiet from further molestation. Germany, both Comet and Conjunction point out; even she that is,

Dives aquis, dives nemorum viridantibus ambris Savarumá, parens facunda, altrixá, ferarum.

I would I might live to fee an end or conclusion of thy intelline wars, I cannot yet give thee comfort : If Scorpio be the Alcendent of that most honourable house of Austria, (which I extremely honour) thou wilt in time want friends and support; this Conjunction and the Cometary influence, defigne thee out a greater blow then yet thou halt had : but be comforted; thou shalt flourish many yeares : that Crosses that but be comforted; thou shalt flourish many yeares : that Crosses that had is but be comforted; thou shalt for many years have betrayed thee wilt perceive thine enemies that for many years have betrayed thee thou wilt take vengeance on them; but for ever after live a free Prince, untill the measure of years alotted for continuation of thy house have Period. The first Eclipe in Taurus and with Caput Algol, shall moles thee, but fome of the minor Conjunctions in Taurus undoe thee.

I wrote my mind a little before of England, the North-East quarter of the Kingdome, and Southwest especially are to be sensible, in an ill. manner, of the effects of this Conjunction, but the Comet pointeth

out the whole Kingdome. By the Map of England, any may almost point out the place (confideratis confiderandis:) Guido Bonatus fol. 157. Si fignificata earum Conjunctionum cadunt ut pluries super ea que significantur per signum Ascendentis, vel per ejus dominum, & per signum Conjunctionis, fi fiserit in Septentrionali parte, accident mutationes ibidem, &c. If the fignification of those Conjunctions do happen, as many times it doth, to take place from the figne alcending, or by the Lord thereof, and by the figne, in which the Conjunction is; if thefe be in the North, from thence expect the beginning of changes and Alteration. There are many other places, Citics, and Countries, which purpolely I paffe over without denomination; though I am perfwaded, all or most of the Countries and Kingdomes, on this North fide of the Equinoctiall Line, and most of all the famous Citics therein feituated, shall have vexation and annoyance at one time or other : let their Latitude be more or leffe : For as the Comet paffed over the Æquator, and to by degrees had more and more Declination. though at first very little, yet left not his appearance, untill he came to have 60. degrees : by which meanes, one time or other, during its continuance, it was verticall to all Kingdomes and Countries in Enrope, and to in due time its effects will manifelt themfelves. We have few Countries, habitable with rationall or fociable men, that exceed it in their habitation the Latitude of 60.or 61. deg. and therefore it were needleffe, in our judgement, to exceede any Country beyond that proportion of Latitude : And yet without doubt, those Savages that live neer to 61. and fomewhat more in Northern Latitude, shall fenfibly perceive great alterations in their petty Common-wealths, 1646. 1647. So that if no Invader oppose, they will kill one another. For what the Comet in 1618. the Conjunction in 1623. the terrible Eclipte in 1639, the feverall leffe Conjunctions of Saturn and Mars, and Mars and Japiter do not performe ; that shall have incouragement from this Conjunction, which comes in a prepolterous order ; and what this cannot perform, shall with a witnesse in 1654. 1655. and 1656, be accomplished by the formidable Eclipfe of the Sun, and divers other configurations, then in force. But left any one think I have deviated from Prolomie and his followers; in this my partition,... I shall alleadge Proclus fol. 61. lib. 2. Confiderandum est fignum in que contingit Conjunctio, & ejus triangulus & co perveniens quadrans, nam in regionibus quadranti subjectis, eventum effe dicemus : Let us confider the figne wherein the Conjunction is, and his Triangle, and the Quadrant or quarter of heaven belonging thereto, we pronounce the evener 3-

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event to fhew its felf in those Regions belonging to that Quarter of the world : I have, for fatisfaction of fome friends, declared my mind herein, but with this caution, that my arguments are not demonstrative, or can be made fo : I acknowledge my Prognosticks to be onely grounded upon conjecturall probabilitie, and are not fubject to the fenses, or Geometricall demonstration; this I speak to avoyd carping.

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A Probable conjecture of the Authors, concerning the space of time, in which the effects of this Conjunction shall shew themselves; and when the world may expect a period, and England better dayes.

F the prefidents of former Conjunctions may either helpe our judgment, or get credit with the Antagonists of Astrologie; or if experience in matters naturall, may be beleeved; as amongh Soules rationall it fhould : I shall make it appear, that not any one of these Conjunctions, hath ever hapned in our quietelt times, without fome extraordinary or almost miraculous accident, and passages memorable, fignified precifely by the Conjunction precedent, or eminent at hand: But not alwayes at the moment of its Conjunction, or in that year, or in fome years fubfequent: this was in nature prepofterous, who irregularly doth nothing ; we must confider in the first place, what every Conjunction principally is made the fore-runner of : fecondly, in what proportion of time the events may fhew themfelves : thirdly, when any Eclipfe, or minor Conjunction, or Annuall revolution doth put that act or accident forward into the world; do not we know that, the Phyfition giving a medicine to his patient, expecteth not that it shall immediately operate, some houres he alloweth for the medicines operation. God is our Phyfitian, the heavens his ftorehouse or shop ; the Planets his Instrumentall medicines, and druggs ; their motion his time he gives in operation. If Phyfick work not, as the learned Doctor conceiveth it ought; (aliquid later) there is an obstruction he little thought of : If I faile in my Prognostick, God perhaps referves the honour for fome more worthy man, and fo blinds my fenfes, or permits not me to fee fo much truth, as I should.

Non semper eodem mode eveniunt, sed alias plus grassantur, alias minus. The effects chance not alwayes after one manner, but sometimes affailes us more forcibly at one time, than another : Impedimenta que

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Ventura sunt, in annis Alynthia evenient; cum pervenerit annus mundi ad corpora malorum, unicuig, signo da annum. Almansor proposit. 82. The Impediments which are to happen or chance in the world, will appear in the years of profection (for the Arabians call Alinthia profectio) when the year of the world comes to the bodies of the infortunes, give to every figne one yeer. The meaning of Almansor is thus; that if the profectionall fign in any year, be the figne and degree, wherein at the time of one of the leffer or greater Conjunctions, an infortune was: the evill intended by that Planet in the Conjunctions on, or perhaps an Eclipse, shall apparently shew its felfe, according to its fortitude or debility, and also relation, being had to the figure of the world; which is the ingresse of the Sun into Aries.

I finde much difference in my Authors concerning the time when, and the time how long the effects shall continue. Vide ubi ceciderit locus Alkirem minoris ab ascendente Anni in quo fuerit illa Conjunctio -& secundum quantitatem quam fuerit inter illum & ascendens ex signis; erunt anni usque ad majus quicquam in illa Conjunctione fuerit: this is the 58. Aphoris. of Ptolomey: by Alkirem he meanes. Conjunction.

Haly expounds it thus : Cumque sciveris illud ascendens Anni: & fignum Conjunctionis : aspice quid fuerit inter illa loca ex signis & gradibus, & pone omne signum annum; & gradus partes anni secundum proportionem suam. See where the place of the greater or lesser Conjuntion falleth from the Ascendent of the year wherein it is; according to the number of signes betwixt that and the Ascendent, the yeares shall be betwixt that and the great action, the Conjunction intends : or thus, as Haly in his Comment, When thou knowess the Ascendent of the year and signe of the Conjunction, consider the number of signes and degrees betwixt them, and give to every sign one year, and divide the parts of degrees accordingly.

Trapezantius will have this Aphorisme understood of Profections in Nativities, and illustrates it by his own Nativity : In Nativities we have the directions of the 5. hylegiacall places which better directeth to the fatall or happy year, far more certainly then Profections do: for if Profection be admitted to do any thing without a particular direction; then every twelfth year the fame actions must happen; but they do not fo; therefore I hold Trapezantius not right in this his exposition, nor indeed in many other. Pontanus, following the steps of Trapezantius, is angry any one should think other wayes : Hoc Ptelomes praceptum tempestate nostra non mode non scruatur at par rum intellectum, vero male conversum ad fouis Saturnia, conjunction nem refertur : quod ne somniari quidem Grace ex verbis Ptolomei poseft. In our age this precept of Prolomey is not onely not kept, but ill underftood ; and worfe than that, is converted to fignifie the Conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn ; which cannot fo much as be dreamed of, out of the Greek words of Prolomey. The two last mentioned Authors translate the Aphorisme thus : Adverse Conjunctionis locum, in quo loce ab ascendente Annieft ; viz. Marke the place of the Conjunction in what place it is from the Alcendent of the year : when the Profection comes thither, the accident happens. Some would have this understood of the Conjunction preceding the ingresse of the Sun into Aries, viz. if the place of heaven, wherin the Conjunction before the ingreffe into Aries, be confidered, and then in what part of heaven, at the Ingreffe, it happens, and obferve the afpects then calt to that place, or when any leffer Conjunction is in that degree, or in afpect to it; that then, and in that moneth, &c. For my own part I conceive, it may with much limitation be fo underftood; but cettainly its the more rationall way to understand and make use of the Aphori/me according to Haly; for its most probable that he, being an Egyptian, and living 400. yeares before Trapezuntins, had as exact a Greek coppy to follow, as those times could produce : and if he have translated it right, the Controversie is ended.

fohannes Anglicus in Tract. 1. Cap. 10. fol. 17. hath these words, which do absolutely satisfie me : Assice quantum est inter Conjunctionem minorem, & ascendens anni in quo est, & intellige his per Conjunctionems minorems, Conjunctionem Saturni & Jovis, cum mutatur de uno signo ad aliud, scilicet in 20. Annis, & quot signa suerins inter illa duo losa, ad tot annos cris major significatio, quam ipsa significat.

See the difference betwixt the Conjunction and the alcendent of the yeer wherein it is; and understand by leffer Conjunction, that of Saturn and Jupiter, which they make every twenty years, out of one figne into another; fo many Signes as are betwixt them, fo many yeers shall the greatest fignification of the Conjunction shew its felf. We will make use of this Rule in our prefent Conjunction, but must not take the ingresse of the Sun, immediately succeeding the Conjuntion; but I must take the ingresse, the preceding, viz. that of 1642. whose as and 36.min. the Conjunction is after 11. fignes, 25. deg. and 26. min. if we substract the place of the Conjunction from the alcendent of the years Revolution, there will remain, 3. Signes, 4. deg. and 10 m. which

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G of th which represents three years, and neer two moneths; fo that 1643. 1644. 1645. and part of 1645. it is apparent that the effects of this Conjunction shall extreamly and most forcibly work.

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But some may demaund this nicety, why I take not my measure of time from the ascendent of the year succeeding the Conjunction: to this I answer: That the Conjunction it felf falleth not in that Revolution, but in the former; for the Sun his entrance into Aries is the time when we begin our Astrologicall Revolution, and before he come to the same point or beginning of Aries againe, we cannot say he hath performed his yearly Revolution: now the Conjunction being celebrated the 15. of February, you know preceded the 'subfequent ingress almost 24, dayes, and therefore I could not make fabduction in difference of degrees from the ascendent of the year 1643. But because experience will onely make manifest the Question to future ages: I will also perform it the latter way, though I am fatisfied in the former.

By this reckoning: 1643. 1644. 1645. 1646. 1647. and half a yeer more almost, will be the space of time wherein the effects may most vigorously operate.

Give me leave to adde my private conjecture, concerning the heate of this Conjunctions operation : I did conceive, becaule we were involved in broyles before the being of this Conjunction, that wee might expect a finattering of comfort at what time *fupiter* by direction, not Transit, might get into Aries, the Ascendent of England; and perhaps this may prove no vaine conjecture; it doth also very neer jump with the measure of years above writ. We see in the Scheam *fupiter* is in the Termes of the infortunes, it may be hoped when he arives to the first degree of Aries, the Ascendent of England, wherein he hath a Terme and Triplicity, and meets with no impediments, he will assist the *English* either with forraigne or Domestique ayde : My way was thus; to take the Circle of Position of *fupiter* in the Conjunction and so to perform the work.

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By this conjecture of mine, which is not altogether difcrepant from Escudims, I fay, that 1643. and 1644. we shall have very great action, nor shall it determine, or much cease, untill after 1645. And fo it may be hoped by this order of direction, that in the year, 1645. towards the latter end thereof, we shall have great likelihood of being in a better condition then now we are in. About this time or not far from hence the Comet feemes to transmit the war to more remote Countries and habitations . That we should have any establifhed peace before that time, I fcarce beleeve, (God grant it then) for Saturnus on the 25. of March 1643. entred Aries the Alcendent of England, and therein he continueth untill the 21. of May 1645. at what time he enters Taurus, where having made progreffe almost five moneths, he again, the 26. of Octob. 1645. comes tumbling by Retrogradation into Aries, (as if then he would bring in a Forraigner with a vengeance.) But on Munday the ninth of February following, he leaves Aries and again enters Taurus, (beware Ireland) no more then visiting our English Alcendent in almost thirty years : In Anno 1646. June 19, Saturn and Jupiter come to a Sextile Aspect: Saturn in 15. Taurus, Jupiter in 15. Cancer : Affrice Ascensionem. Planete, & gradum exaltationis, gradum quoque sui casus; nam hac funt que fignificant homines, & corum opera : Almanfor. proposit. 129. Behold the Ascension of a Planet and the degree of his exaltation and fall; for these fignifie both the men and their works: Jupiter in the Conjunction now, being Lord of the Afcendent and of the figne the Conjunction is in, being then 1646. got into Cancer his exaltation, and in Sextile to Saturn in Taurns, the figne of the fourth house in. the Conjunction, and at or neer that time, all the Planets except Mercary faluting each other with one benevolent afpect or other : those do most undoubtedly declare, that the miseries of the afflicted English. do draw neer to a Period. And yet things may not be perfectly fetled, or there may not be a visible face of fatety untill, 1647. Let none understand me, as if I thought that about these times we should have so tirme a peace or fuch a durable happineffe as many of us have feen formerly :-

formerly: no, it will be a great comfort if then we fenfibly feele fome melioration of fortune to our State in generall: All the time that Saturn paffeth through Aries, viz. about 1643. to 1645. I expect nothing but either deftruction, moleflation, war, famine, plague, forraigne Invalion, or the like, to the English; one milchiefe happening in the neck of another; all being thought concluded this day, the day following produceth new matter; and in fuch a condition shall we be in for fome yeares, according to the courfe of heavens: I am doubtfull that this year 1643. Saturn will afflict us in the City of London with the plague, strange, confumptions, giddinesse in the head, and a kinde of stupid Lethargie; neither known or thought of by Galen or Hypocrates.

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Towards September 1644. if not before, Saturn will be malicious to the English in afflicting another kinde of disease, dulnesse, and stupidnesse all over the the body; some shall be visited with the Plague or confumption of the Lights, and dry Coughs; and an exact Phrensic to purpose, making prophets.

In the year 1645. Saturn and his Angel Orifiel will be more mile chievous (if Sol and Michael his fecundeian Intelligencer prevent it not) for not long after he is to take his leave of Aries and England, and to he will with a witneffe, if the plague in men, and fearcity of provision for men, and a generall misfortune, be any terrour or affliction. These are like to happen, God not preventing.

It was observed by the learned Cambden, that Saturn cannot paste through a figne of the fiery Triplicity, but he will afflict the City of London with a Plague; A Plague to the City is a curfe to the whole Kingdome : I have in my time feen fome experience hereof : did not Saturn in 1625. passe through Leo? Did he not in 1636. passe through Sagittarius? the position of Jupiter and Venus in the fixth house 1644. may mitigate his fury somewhat; but 1645. I fear he will maliciously oppresse the City of London, if not the whole Kingdome, or most of our great Towns, either with a Plague, which is most probable, or with some generall calamity as bad, &c. For then in that years Revolution, Mars and Solare in Quadrate Aspect, out of Cardinall fignes : the Dragons Taile is in the Ascendent (I fear the poor Commonalty) the Moon neer the degree Alcending at the leffer Conjunction in 164; and in the 12. house, the people will be full of forrow; Saturn in the 12. of Aries his fall, and in the third house; now Treacherous Kinfman, Act thy part : Wo to fome Eastern Countries, Jupiter is not much elongated from the Plejades, the Nobles play falt

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and loofe, and pay for it : the Moon separates from a Trine of Saturn, and goes to a Iquar of Sol; Kings of Europe offend not your people, provoke them not too much : the almost degree of the Comets appearance, now culminating, fnews now, as if all the whole world were up in Armes, and all Nations mad or drunk with the fury of the Comets laft Salutation, and the influence of the Conjunction, and co-operating Ecliptes and minor Conjunctions. Indeed in 1646. 7 spiter in the figura mundi, is in the Alcendent, but Mercury Lord of the Ascendent with Mars in Piscibus; matters are not yet right and perfectly fetled, yet better then formerly. Some Prince either fled or Captivated. 1647. Saturn in 15. Taurus, and in the medium Gali of the worlds figure, one Monarchy begins to totter ; and fo by degrees-God brings his purpose to perfection : but these judgements will be displeasing : for Princes love not to hear of such matters ; I will return to my intended task; and do remember that of Cardane, which in some fence materially concerns this matter. Card. Seg. 3. Apho.85. Planeta quilibet virtutem (nam ad actum perducit per Luminaria, non quod Luminaria talia fignificent. Every Planet brings to paffe his vertue by the Luminaries, not that the Luminaries fignifie fuch things : if this be fo, why shall not the Sun being in the same figne our Conjunction is in, give us light at what time God will openly manifest the fecrets of his decrees by this Commetion; if we chance to direct him to the bodies of Saturn and Jupiter. I conceive if I take the Circle of polition of the Sun, and under the Elevation of that Pole. both the oblique Ascension of Sol, Saturn, and Impiter; I shall discover the year, or very neer, when the effects shall break out, and be molt visible, or when the great and principall matter of the whole Conjunction, shall be molt in force. For I am doubtfull, because both the lights are under the earth, it will be long ere this Conjunction accomplifh his effects, or declare what it would have to any purpose, Let no one think that because we are in England at the time of the Conjunctions appearance, in Armes one against another ; or becaufe we have many new and Novell opinions, and fpeak of Reformation of doctrine and difcipline, that this is all shall happen, No: its not all : Or that these quarrells shall soon be composed, and Religion established : Let us go on, I confeste the influence of the Conjunction doth operate already, though but obfourely ; for it is at prefent impedited by the Comets Influence, which being above the course of nature, must needs hinder naturall progressions, untill its turn is ferved, and that its not yet ended, there's one English man of my mind, and

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he very learned, though he professe himself no friend to Astrologic. Nuntius Propheticus, 35. fol. Natura mea semper hactenus a pradictionibus eventnum ex aftris ab horruit : My nature (quoth he) hath his therto abhorred any prediction of events from the Stars : and yet fee how he goeth on, in the next lines : Fateor Super-celestia maxime in hec sub-caleftia agere : I confesse the heavenly bodies have much to do upon our sub-celestiall. Fateor etiam coitum superiorum erronum malorum Iliade ut plurimum Comitari, & consequenter multum energia & portenti habere ; I confeste the congresse of the superiour erraticalls are lightly accompanied with an Iliad of mischiefe; and fo confequently to have fignification of fome eminent matters and materiall operation : but the conclusion, he thinks, kills us all ; with Ipfe dixit : Sed id, quicquid est extra humanam scientiam, at q, dijudicationem, positum cum Tychone Brabe in re non dissimili arbitror : But if the Altrologer can give any judgement, or if these Conjunctions fignifie any thing; 'tis above humane knowledge and judgement, and in fuch like a matter I conceive Tycho was of the fame opinion. What this Schollers intention was to acquaint us with the ftar in 1572. learnedly explained by Tycho, or of the Comets before 1618. of Keplers Aftrologicall prediction in generall; and of Sybilla Tiburtina her Prophefie, and mother Shiptons, and Alftedius his conjecture of the Conjunction in 1.643: and yet abhors predictions, I know not: fure I am none of these can be predicted without Aftrologie, and for him to mention these predictions, and directly affirm, man hath no knowledge in the interpretation. Certainly it feems to me, Nuntius writ that Tract to fhew he could write Latine, but either could not, or would not interpret the meaning of them; without which it were better we know them not, or that he had not collected them. But Nuntius fol. 22. and I, agree very well : Sane opinor significata Comete, 1618. Licet vates non sum nondum expirasse, boc eft, ut luculentius agam univer fas mutationes, que per boc infolens & portentosum oftensum innuebantur, nec dum terminari. Though no Prophet, yet he judged the universall mutations, intended by that Comet, were not yet determined. But let us fee when the Sun comes to the body of Saturn and Jupiter, for more full manifestation of the grand action of this Conjunctions nis sham or

The Oblique Ascension of Jupicer, is the same, some minutes excepted of Saturn : If I adde 12. years to 1642. it produceth 1654. but added to 1643. it maketh 1653. Which years if they prove not admirable, I am much mistaken. If there were any Prince borne about the year 1618. or 1623. that is naturally of heroicall difpofition, he may perhaps fhew himfelf near the Alpes about that time, and perform wonders with fmall help, I am confident, the greateft Action fignified by this Conjunction, fall then, and in those years appear, to the terrour of many thousands . The very action I cannot divine, but I verily conceive, that it shall most concern the Pope and Clergy of Rome, who though hee shall not be absolutely then deftroyed, yet shall he be fo shaken, fo toffed, fo curbed, fo forfaken, as his power after that will daily fink and decline, untill the full meafure of his time is accomplished, after which hee shall never againe have either strength or being. Certainly, it may be conjectured, that about those years, God will miraculously raise up a potent Prince in Italy, or near to Italy, for that work onely, that shall little care for Bulls, or Papall curfes, and one that shall either fubdue Rome, or break the ftrength of the Popes authority in Italy. But shall Italy containe him? It cannot ; like a whirlewinde he runs through, oocooo. (but a Northern ftar extinguisheth that light, &c.) Where hee affists as a friend, he conquers like an enemy, &c. But because the Moon is the Luminary of the time, I will fee in what space of degrees shee will get above the earth, and put them into years; perhaps when the gets to the Cusps of the seventh House, a discovery of some grand actions may be.

If I adde 7. years to 1642. it cuts out 1649. but if I adde 7. to 1643. it points out the year 1650. But assuming the distance of the Moon, without Latitude, from the Cuspe of the feveth House, they fall to make almost 15. years, which points out the year 1657. and 1658. Surely the explication of this Conjunctionall influence upon Europe, will be difficult to finde out, or of more concernment then at prefent we imagine. The fwift motion of the Planets, shew a celerity in action, the fublimity of the two grand Planets being princi-

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pall Agents, shew the greatnesse, durability, or Magnitude of the action. Ecnimirum seditiones que a Saturno & four portenduntur sunt durabiliores. The stirrings, proceeding from Saturn and Jupiter, are more durable.

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That the principall matter intended shall not prefently break out, I do judge, because both the lights, and all the Planets are under the earth. Later planeres, quum stella eam significans aut sub terra est, aut in alieno loco Soli conjungitur; contra patet quum edepressione in altitudinem tollitur, proprioque in loco collocatur. Ptol. Aphoris. 26. The matter is obscured, when the Planet signifying it, is either under the earth, or joyned to the Summe in an obscure House: on the other side, all is manifest, when a Planet is brought out of his depression to his Altitude, and posited in his proper Sphear, or Element.

If wee observe the Conjunction in 1603. we shall finde it above the earth, though obscured in the twelfth House; yet the two Luminaries in Angles; the Moon in perfect Opposition to the Sum and Vemus. Part of the action, fignified by that Conjunction, broke out immediatly: As King fames his access to the English Crown rather preceded; but other matters not so foon, but lay cunningly fmothered, and yet to this day are: Let the Jesuite tell you what. Look upon that 1623. The Moon is ascending, and the Sum descending, and yet in reception, as if both King and people were deluded, but yet the Moon getting first above the earth, discovered part of the secrets intended by that Conjunction. The Moon is in this Conjunction going to a Quadrat of the Sum. If not fairly, the people by foul means will discover the fecrets of Princes; By foulness, to this day all is not yet discovered; but it will be shortly, &ce,

The wars we now grone under, and the infinite preflures wee fuffer, by his Majelties averfnelle from his Parliament, and City of London; the defertion of thole many Lords, and untrulty Members of the Houfe of Commons, do all make way, and prepare matter for their owne, and posterities confusion in the first place; and next, for the utter defolation of this Kingdom, and his Majelties Posterity: And I know there's a Family, or Faction of Christendom finiles, and laughes at the folly of the English, fith wee do our felves what they would, but never could, without these diffuonourable breaches in the Lords, and the too too obstinate Commoners, absent at this prefent from Westminster. It grieves me to see a people fo misled, and yet know not by whom; For of the Cabinet Counfell they are not, nor his his Majefty himfelf, &c. Well; Let them bee advised in time; Post eft occasio calva: Let not specious and luke-warme pretences delude them any longer; let not them indeavour to raife a people that hate the name of Gentleman. Let the undeferving Bishop, and Clergyman suffer; they onely have stirred these tumults, with the affistance of the Jesuite; but I forbear, &c. Non argumentis, aut ambagibus in judicando uti debemus, aut adulationibus: Wee must not in these manner of judgements use arguments, trifles, or flatteries, but speak truth, &c. Aper

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For my own part I conceive, that for three years and a half, or thereabouts, from the beginning of the Conjunction, wee shall have tharp and quick action, after wards perhaps, fome feeming quietneffe: About 1650. or 1649. a whilpering of some greater matter, or some new matter, not formerly divulged agitated, or first receives impreffion : matters after for two or three years, may feeme composed : In 1654. 1655. or 1656. all things are as apparent as the Sunshine, and then, either hee, fhee, they, or fomething, declare what hath for fome years been clofited in the breafts of a few : That is most certaine, Operationes Planetarum nunquam ceffant, donec contraria, a planeta aut fixa stella, aut signi parte contraria qualitatu impediantur vel in Solis radios incidant. Planets never ceale to work, untill contradicted by fome Planet of contrary nature, or fixed ftarre, or figne, or happen upon the Sun-beams. If this be fo, it makes me more confident, that when the Sunne comes to the bodies of Saturn and Jupiter, things will happen as by me Predicted ; and that in the interim. more or leffe, the effects of this Conjunction will Annually caufe fome alteration in humane affairs, and fir up mens mindes, and fit matter to receive that judgement, which God in his providence hath from eternity decreed, and which will about that time crave the execution of his preordained Ordinances : and if that wee beleeve Almanfor, Proposit. 30, Cum planete ponderosi fuerint occidentales a sole, dabuntprobitatem circa finem vita : Weighty or ponderous Planets, being Occidentall of the Sunne, give goodnesse in the latter part of our life. Why may not this be applied to our Conjunction? and we after (tot tantofque labores) enjoy a most blessed time, peace, quietneffe, and all earthly bleffings, which we formerly have enjoyed.

I have run fomewhat an extravagant way, for determining the time of the events of this Conjunction, having no certain limitation, more then conjecturall, from the Ancients, in deciding the controversie; Yet it will not be amisse, if we try the rule of *Hermes*, preferibed in

Item per Luminare cujus erit authoritas, & dominum ejus, & per planetam cui luminare ipsum conjungitur & dominum ejus : The end of events of every inception, aad of every doubtfull matter, is determined by these fignificators, viz. by the Cuspe of the fourth House, his Lord, and the Planet therein, if any be; also by the Luminary of the time, and his Lord, and by the Planet to whom that light is conjoyned, and by the Lord thereof, &c. Venus is here Lady of the fourth House, the Moon is the light of the time, the Conjunction being Nocturnall, the is as it were separated from a Quadrature of Mercury, and applies to a Trine of Venus : In degrees, the difference betwixt their comming to Aspect, are 7. grad, and 44. minutes : but if under the Elevation of the Lunar Pole of Polition, we take their diltance by Oblique delcenfion, we shall find them 9. grad. and 24, minutes, which added to 1643, and allowing one year for each degree, it pointeth 1652, and almost one half year, before the events be fully concluded. The Retrogradation of Venus may happily shew the many probabilities of determining fooner; but as things many times are near to an end, and yet are not finished, Multa cadunt inter calicem supremaque labra : So doubtleffe, one inconveniency or other, may for many years, when things are near conclusion, break off, and hinder our happinese, untill the exact measure of time be fulfilled : for you mult observe, that the figne of the fourth Houfe is fixed, as also that Venus is in a fixed figne, fo that the fignification of things hereby promifed are prolonged and continued. TY 18. Sutton, 9.22 ST

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It will be queftioned by fome perhaps, why I give for each degree in diffinction of time, one year ? Befides that I my felf hold it fittelt, I have fome encouragement from the learned Almanfor. Aporif. 41. Cum fignificator fuerit inter feptimam & quartam, erunt anni. When the fignificator is between the feventh and fourth Houfe, in judgement of time, you shall give years, &c. The Moon being in that quarter, and the light of the time. I think I have not done amisse. And that the Moon is to have great prerogative in determining the end of these events, Rigel. Apborif. 84. lib. 2. confirmeth. Finis rerum est periodus fignificatoris, & per quartum & dominium ejus, quando Laminare temporis cum ipso adjungitur. The end of things, is the period of the fignificator, and by the fourth House, and his dominion, when the light of the time is joyned with the Lord of the fourth.

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(106) I have now almost done what I intended, but because Origanus, fol. 411. or rather Cardane, whose words they are, faith, Non folum conjunctiones, verum etiam oppositiones & Quadratiradii superiorum planetarum magnas in mundo mutationes designant. Not onely these Conjunctions, but their Oppositions and Quadrate Aspects designe great mutations; I have therefore inferted the progression of Saturn and fupiter, in the severall Aspects they make each to other, before the year 1663. at what time they come to their third Conjunction in the fiery Trygon.

A short Astrologicall judgement upon the precedent Aspects.

W Ere it not for the malicious Quadrature of Mars to Saturn: Aprill 30. 1645. (both the infortunes at that time in their falls) Saturn being in 27. 32. Arietis, beholding the Afcendent of the last Conjunction with Trine Afpect: we might I fay expect a mitigation of war, penury, plundring, misfortune, and other destructive miseries, and ficknesses then afflicting us, and approaching to disturb us more fiercely; but that malignant Afpect, preventing the pious intentions of the honess Protestantine party, seems to keep on foot preceding mischiefes, and by the conniving of a distempered and difsembling Religious faction, our happiness is impedited. Men of desperate fortunes, have unlucky designes; Let Mars and Saturn command, viz. the needy Souldier and superstitious Sectary; Englishman look for an end of our wars at Dooms day. Oh I cannot endure

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these whining raschals, that pretend Conscience and Religion, and yet n either fear God, honour their King, or are in charity, or ever will be with an offended Neighbour : But let these dregs of irreligious villaines passe; the onely destruction of our flourishing London and Common-wealth; the onely incendiaries of every Common-wealth, let me leave them, I fay, to the mercy of an enraged people, when their hypocricy is discovered, &c. and the measure of their iniquity at the height, &c. But how long shall we fusser them.

The first Sextile of Saturn and Jupiter is the 19. June 1646. it may be judged some better attonment amongst us; some Treaties or forraign Embassadours may arive to intercede, and compose our unluckie differences: for Saturn then is in 15. Taurus, neer the Cufpe of the fifth in the Conjunction; and Jupiter in 15 Cancer, in Trine to the. figne culminating, viz. Scorpio: If God give a bleffing; and the prefence of Mars in 19. Taurus, lately in Conjunction with Saturn, caufe not some disturbance by Ireland, or the Popish Irish faction; much good may then be expected : Now, the true meaning and doing Proteltant, Divine, and Gentleman, begin to weede out the Apoltate counterfeits, who difperfe to feverall parts of the world, their purfes well filled with the fpoil of a defolate Nation : many remain amongst us, and fwear outward conformity; but we cannot lade the Sea dry,&c. or ever dive into the depth of these Anabaptificall, and Independent, Seditious, intentions, &c. Thefe are the onely Achans have moletted us fince 1642.

Upon the first Quadrature of Saturn and Jupiter, Sept. 30. 1647. Saturn then ariving to the place of Mars in the Conjunction, and Jupiter to a square of Saturn by Transit; the peregrination of Jupiter in that signe not hindring by a double debility in signe and house, vize if there were then no underhand dealing, juggling, shirking, and difsembling fellows in request; we might hope well, and that with some trouble we should sensibly taste the fruits of peace, or have a glimpse of it; but whether the hypocritically Religious Saints, or the disturbed Trade of an impoverished people produce nothing; or above all this the much lamented and untimely death of a gallant, and not to be paralel'd Generall, or brave field Officer, put us in confusion, I know not; here's much time spent to no purpose; but it being not, the first time fowl actions smooth over deceitfull pretensions; I leave all to God: Let the Sun shine upon the Author this year, or ammia bené.

The English Nation now wearied with continued mischiefes, and

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molt Nations either engaged, or having had their bellies full of war? famine, plague, murrain of cattle, and civill difcord ; Saturn at length comes the 10. of August 1648. to a second Quadrature of Jupiter : Now cunning Saturn being Transited to the very degree of the Moon in the Conjunction ; the people have now enough feen their own folly, they flurdily refift an incroaching Clergic, and Gentry : the Londoners are not the laft in this action, their impoverishment and fufferings are without example. Well, tyranny in Religion first broke the neck of an infulting Episcopacy : if now too much austerity and a little Coveoufneffe and partiality produce an uproar, and work confusion; let some filly Affes thank themselves : Merlinus Anglicus is not of the Faction. Yet in January 1649. there being a Platick Trine betwixt Saturn and Jupiter, he being neer the place of the Dragons head in the Conjunction, who was then in the 9. houfe, properly fignifying Religion; we have strong confidence of being quite cured of our distempers : both fignificators are Retrograde ; nothing but diffimulation; fair words butter no Parsnips; both parties play fast and loofe: The Comet now feemes to have performed its effects, we may lament that it operated to long ; it leaves us, and we begin to fmile : but Monarchy is not in fuch great request as formerly, nor by reason of a Pestilence amongst them, shall our Neighbour Enemies rejoyce; Provision may be dear : and my mother London had needein time to look out, for the will have many poor; and very many fickneffes.

But behold, 1650. in May, Saturn in 00. 37. of Cancer, a Cardinall figne; and Jupiter in 00. 37. Scorpie, fignes of long Ascensions, do promise us a setled beginning of much happinesse, if we over-do not: its not good to be over-wife : this Trine is neer the degree culminating in the Conjunction, as if Kings and Authority fhould recuperate: a little, (by what meanes I urge not) I diflike nothing in this Trine, but that the Commonalty entrult fome Potent Nobleman or elfe fome grave Councellour, that will play the knave with them ; and with many fugured Protestations (if those will ferve) deceive them, he appeares like a Wolf in theeps cloathing; and being the Puppy of an old Fox, he knows how to betray and cozen the Country by Petit degrees : and now either time or very shame compells us to unite a little in points of Religion, &c. This is but conjecturall concerning the Religious. About the 9. of October, 1650. Saturn and Jupiter come to a perfect Trine, Saturn in 14. 53. Cancer : Jupiter in : 14,53. Scorpio, Ere this year go about, plain dealing is more used ::: P and . and things reconciled handfomely, mens purfes pay for former miftakes, the heavens thine cleer: and if the London Merchant escape Pyracy at Sea, he may prove a rich man.

About February 1652. Saturn and Jupiter make their fift opposition, Saturn in 6. 22: Leo: Jupiter in Aquarius : this their opposition is in partill Conjunction with the degree of the fecond and eighth house of their last Conjunction. A curious eye may fearch further: Woe, to a great family of Europe, that was, is now, but shall be no more : its not old, its not ancient ; like an untimely birth its cut off, and shall never again flourish, either in branch or root, &c. Lord God I Shall the number of fifty cut off more then five? or shall leffe then 90. be alotted for 4. Shall the Virgin be barren, and the Lyon have no iffue? Shall leffe than 36. end in two? Shall the fecond end in a Cipher ? Shall 7. come to be one, and then none, &c. doth Italy now begin to murmur, and Rome to tremble : In Europe we begin to shoot neer Rome; we misse our mark a little, we make breaches, but enter not: How ever this opposition of Saturn and Jupiter is indirect termes averfe to the Conjunction in 1623. Old men dye of Confumptions, and every year the Londoner fears the Plague.

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About July 1653. the degree of the feventh house in the Conjun-Stion of 1623. is the place of Satura in this fecond difastrous opport fition : here's Transversion of figure in the heavens, fo is all unity and friendship amongst the Italian Princes, quite disfolved, Tom 7e-(nite will have it fo: what hath been obscured fince 1623.now plainly appeares by a large manifesto to all the world : The European Princes perceive by whom and whofe meanes the troubles of this prefent age were fomented and raifed, and what Prince would have been Dominus fao totum : most men are wife, when its too late : the Retrogradation of Jupiter in this opposition makes me mindfall to perfwade every one to bear a little, another war, or a new combustion may undo us : if the all diffembling Pharefee trouble us not at home, we may do pretty well : and the world alfo, &c. But in 1654. when fome wife Italians are in confultation how to conclude of peace, war, like a thunderbolt, fuddenly breaks out; and the Pope thinking to benefit the Church by encroachment, in feifing on the Dutchy of of a deceased Prince, or estate of a defunct fat Cardinall, indangers hereby his Papacy, and ftirs up fuch a flame as about 1655. 1656. or neer these times, almost confounds his Primacy and confumes his Patrimony : thefe years feeme to be the first of his down lying, wherein his Fatherly authority begins to be flighted under his nofe. Saturn and Jupiter come to two Trine Afpects ; Ireland begins again to be populated, after a large time of devaltation; the yeer spends it felf in frequent Embassages amongst the Inhabitants of Europe; nor do I see any reason why the Scepter of the Octoman family should not now either be extinguished, or a family arising and setting up for its selfe, that will share Greece and some of his Dominions with him.

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In the year 1657. and moneths of August and October; Saturn and Jupiter come to two Quadrate Aspects; Saturn in Libra, and Jupiter in Cancer, and to another Quadrature in the fame Signes the next year 1658. the Signes are the Exaltations of these weighty Planets; very great matters are now in agitation all over Europe; the Noble Austrian family is much herein concerned : the States of Holland appear more fplendid. The Scottif Nation have a great hand in these two years Actions ; One new Pope, and he no fool, a very gentleman. More muttering these two years about Religion, mens fancies not yet fetled, as if the Divines of times preceding, and now in effe were dolts, and knew nothing ; hot disputes, cold conclusions, with difficulty some things are for a time foldred, but not perfectly ; moveable fignes fix nothing : Sores ill healed break out again to worfe ends :. A German Prince pricks up his eares, he may advance. We English are pretty quiet, and in a good polture. If the Hollander encroach too much, we shall be angry, and retort, and remember former matters , flumbring, but not buried in fleep. We shall now begin to ballance, or one for us, or we for all : forget not.

In the years 1659, and 1660. Saturn and Impiter make three Sextile Affects out of fignes of long Afcenfions; Some ftrict League more firm then any formerly, betwixt the Pope and Emperour of Germany, who yet ftands up: these fuperiour Noble Planets in their first Sextile do both with Partill Aspect, behold the degree ascending of their last Conjunction; this their friendly Salutation comforts us in England, every mannow posses his own Vineyard; our young youths grow up to mans estate, and our old men live their full years; our Nobles and Gentlemen roote again; our Yeomanry many years disconfolated, now take pleasure in their Husbandry; the Merchant sends out sing, here's almost a new world, new laws, fome new Lords: now my Country of England shall thed no more teares, but rejoyce with, and in the many bleffings God affords her annually.

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A fortune being Lord of the firth, and he in the ninth, with a fired Star, of femeluhat an immernone gature -

Bertill with Venus ; It imports our fa. tive to have but few fickne fes, and those easily cured by medicine, the difea. fes may be the wind collicit, fone in the raines, fluxes, paine many times in the reines of the back, without any gravell appearing, furfets, and calually biolent fevers, the polithre of Mars in the Alcendant, may caule much beads MS MULTINB MI ach accidentally, fc.

Seventh Houle. Women, &c.

Which properly bath lignification of women, wives, law-fuits, parts ners in any profession, fc.

I will endeavour by the Rules of Art, to give reasons why this Pative hath not, or is likely to marry bereafter, ec.

Prolomey, Leovitius, and all the Learned fag, If Venus and Luna bee in barren fignes, the patibe will hardly marry.

Venus is here in Leo Reirograde, one argument of not marriage. The Moon is in Taurus, alfl. deb by Cauda Draconis, in the eighth houle of heaben; these two planets to condituted, Conjugium negant, aut a conjugio animo alienore reddunt : They veny marriage either at all, of incline mento bæ moze aberle from it. The politure of Mars allo in a barren figne, being part. ly 1020 of the leventh, 02 babing much bominion there, may be some occasion of a fingle life. Peither is lelle confideration to be had to Jupiter, who is Lord of part of the lebenth boule, and he is in a barren ligne; to that by the tellimonies both of Veuus, Luna, and lupiter, the proper lignificators of marriage, a fingle life was defigned for him; vet Luna neer the Dragons-tail, her cannot have avoided fome falle afperfions by womens means.

Ninth Houfe. Travell, long journeys.

Which defigneth whether the Pative Mall travell, yea oz not, and with what successe, herein the confider especially Mercury, the Moon, and Venus, thefe Planets do denoat fome excurtions of this Patibe into four aigne parts, and if the forceffe be required from the tenth house, which is the subfrance obtained by travell, I conceive be obtained what he occationally fought for. without any let og diffurbance, he may have travelled Southward by Dea, from the place he was boan in, the Countreps fubied to Taurus, but efvecis ally Geminis, would have fatted belt with the good Angell of this native, ec.

Tenth Houle. Preferment, estimation, &cc

What amongst pobility is called honour, amongst people that exercise a trade, is termed reputation, effimation, credit, and the like, sc. Babing the Sun, Mercury, and part of fortune in the tenth, and the Moon Dipolitric of the Sun, in her exaltation, F cannot but pronounce, that this Pative Iball erced in fame and repute, and in the goods of fortune molt of his Ancestors: he thall have high eftern among it the best fost of people wherefoever he that live, and according to the degree of his birth, live in a glorious, and illutivis

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(123) ons way. The profettion the native bath formerly aled, may be berived from Mercury, and Luna, who fignifie a profettion wherein a voluble tongne may be erercifed, and for the kindes of it, in such things as are delightfull to women, sc. I forbear particulars, because my friend is living, sc.

Eleventh Houfe. Friends, and friendship.

It may fignifie that our Pative shall have the acquaintance, and friends ship of many perfons of good quality, both Courtiers and Citizens; these signified by venus, may prove reall but unable, those by the Sume mutable. these by the Moon, the being in Square to the Cuspe of the eleventh, and els pecially women, unprofitable, burthensome, and never satisfied. I should have mentioned both the Hyleg, and Alcochoden, and have spoken of death, captibuty, fc. But I sopear these till I judge the Directions.

The Authors judgement upon many directions, since the Natives birth to this year, 1641.

Is the fifth year of his Age, the Afcendant comming to the body of Mars, might caule the Meafels, of Small por fome windinesse in the bowels, impediting his health for a time, but the other directions at the fame time, being under the termes of the benevalent, cauled a refloring to former health. The year following, about Taly 1391. the Sun comming to the Square of the Moon, might import fome impeachment to the eyes, and fome cold reumes to defcend into them, whereby the spatible might for a time be dis flempered; It also pointeth out fome infirmmetic to the mother, if the were then hong, which I conceibe the twas.

He had the meafels, &c. but remembers not the year.

The year following, viz. 1592. our Pative thould have enjoyed a healthfull time, and be kept close to School, as is fignified by the Sunne to a Sertill of Iupiter, and all the Hylegiacall places to good directions.

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In the year of our Lozd 1596. the occourfe of the Moon to the Dragonstail in a bestiall figne, might intimate some sudden accident should have burt the Pative, either on the head, arms, neck, or shoulders, or some four source beast by violence, have indangered the members abovesaid, or else by the fall of some rusticall, and bestiall materiall, but the Sexual of Mercury happening in the same degree and minute the direction falls in, Mercury being Lord of the Ascendant, some Dechanicall man should have lessened this accident, and annihilated the asocesaid malevolent radiation.

He really confesseth, a Cart-wheel had like to have fallen upon him, but that a Wheelwright flanding by prevented it.

About the 16. year of his age, the Medium Coeli comming to the body of Mercury, and some other directions to the termes of Saturn, its probable the Patibe came to London to be a serbant, and to indeabour sor preferment in his profession, Mercury being Promittor denoat it might bir good and profitable.

This is really true, as himfelf tells me.

During

During the time of ferbice, much cannot be erpected, fabing that about the year 1605. the Afcendant meeting with the square Aspect of Mercury, might vectore some difficulty in his Accompts, and some frowardnesse in his Dafter, and unmediately after a journey beyond the Seas.

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He then travelled into France, &c. Nor was the reft falfe.

About, of in the 26. of his age, the Mid-heaven comming to the Square of Saturn, beclare a turbulent and unquiet year, and years unto the Matibe, by the aspersions of some malebolent bulgar people : years of much afficition and biscontent, years of much expense of substance unerpectedly, some betriment in his protession, by such as he bealt, or negotiated with.

This proved too true, but in what nature I forbear, &c.

About the 27. year, the Sun directed to the Trine of Saturn, might canfe a reconciliation of former differences, and great expressions of lobe from an aged Citizen, or a rich widow : and now the part fortune, comming to the body of the Sunne, might cause the City to take notice of his Trading, and manner of libing 3 It begot very good acquaintance, much increase in wealth, and prosperity in all worldly affairs, nor do 3 se any contradiction to this happinelle, unless forme fail from a Boy's, about June 1611 might indanger his fafety, sc.

I remember not what answer was given to this.

From the year 1611. to the 36. of his age, he thould live in great hap, pinette, have the proffer of many fair Gentlewomen, belight in haves, and borlemanthip, in Bulicke, Hittory, and all belightfull fludies he thould have plentifell trading, featt, and be featted, live fortially and meerily.

This was fo.

But in 1620. the Afcendant comming to the Dppolition of Saturd, both Promittor, and Direction being Malguant, it might cause some Welancholie humours to abound, much bentosity all over the body, a great weaknesse in the back, backsliding in estate, by some morgage, or meanes of ill ferbants, much troubled to get in Webts, many Law suits, much labour to get in the goods of some deceased party, or creditors : It denoats ill digestion, a weak fromack. This year was enough to undor many a man by loss, and other calualties incident to such a Direction.

He confesseth both the ficknesse in the parts of the body named, and the rest of the Accidents to have fallen out exactly.

In the year 1625, the Moon comming to a Sexuil of Inpiter, a principall lignificator of Preferment; It might incline the Pative to afpire to fome better preferment, then at prefent he had; it thould give him fome notable Office in the Common wealth, to the Patives credit, but no incrementof wealth; for although this Alpectis very good, yet was it not of fuffisient fortitude, to effect what immediatly fucceded; it produced our Pative, or thould fo bo, fome familiarity with a perfor of honour, and intimates familiarity with a learned Lawyer; it demoats orders motions for a wife, fc. Thefe are acknowledged.

ines provident, startury bound admitting o

this is really cittle, as him has to listnes.

In July 1626. being compleat 41. years of age, the Sunne was bir rected to a Trine of the Moon, and Medium Coeli to a Sextill of Iupiter, near the Cuspeof the 11. house. Now he had a good Office.

1By this accident I rectified the whole Mativity.

From the time of his accelle to Office, till this pielent 1641. some mes mozable accidents mult have happened, which purposely I palle ober. I conceive the Medium Colli to the body of Venus 1628. and Currant

I conceive the Medium Coell to the boog of Venus 1828. and Cuttait 43. of his age, might intimate fome affaies to a young Bentlewoman, and might offer oppoztunity of marriage.

This was true.

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When the Alcendant 1636, and 52. of his age came into Scorpio, and therein to an oppolition of the Moon : It hould deligne fome infirmmelle in those members represented by Scorpio.

This was fo, a virulent effluxion of matter iffuing Ex partibus predictis.

But in November, the Moon comming to the termes of Venus, by benefit. of medicine he was cured.

He was subject to Surfets that year upon small occasion.

In the 54. year of his age, Part Fortune comming to the termes of Mars, in the last begræs of Leo, and Pisces being the Ascendant in the profectionall figure, some finite fiegmatique humans were firred up, and caused some obstructions in the small guts, and much pain in those parts, but supiter being then in a benevalent place, all things by benefit of medicine came to a good conclusion.

I his was alfo true, &c.

I now palle to the remainder of years yet unerpired.

1644. passet without any Annual directions, wherefore the Action of this year must participate in the nature of what preceded in 1642. and 1643.

I 645. Part Fortune comes to the termes of Mercury, whereby its intimated, the Pative will be folicitous to procure in moneys, either formerly lent, or to acquire fome more to adde to his former Bank : But foralmuch as Mercury is Lord of the 12: house, as well as of the Krift, it points out fome conning fellow or other indebted unto the Pative, will delay payment of ubat is juligone. Mercury reprefents Secretaries, Lean men.

The Clymactericall year beginning 1647. 9, July, 21. boures P. M. Tear 63.

The 20 of Virgo is alcending in the Revolution, and Mars in 21. degrees

This year being many times fatall, requireth confideration of all the five Hylegiacall places, of the Revolution, yearly Profection, aufpitious, and unfortunate Transites, and inhatsoever the Artific can be for happy direction of the Patibe, and better prevention of Talualties depending upon that year.

Medium Coeli and the Sunne come both to the termes of Mars, here's pros

bability of diffemper in the body, principally dicationed by choler and beration of the spirits about some kiniman, whereby the humours are repeabed, and so in taly, upon, or near the day of birth, the diffemper may be at its height : the Pative shall do well, if in Aprill 1647. he feell any symptoms of such like difference, or since any crassing to appear, let him take addice of the learned Poystcian, and have such medicine prescribed, as may less the icr, and melancholip; and he may conveniently take his physicise the 19. and 20. Aprill 1647. The bowels or small guiss seem to be burdened with bictons ercrescencies, sc. We will have some fits of the frome, and passions of the twind chollick, gripings in the bowels, sc.

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But becaule Mercury, Lozd of the Alcendant in the Revolution, is going to Conjunction of Iupiter, and is in the very vegree of Venus at the birth, I boubt not, but the Patibe by means of such a Physician as is represented by Iupiter, will diminish the force of the influence, and so evade any sicknesse of long continuance, which is also forefer by the position of the Moon in Pifces, a bycorporeall and common signe: The Patibe is desired very little to credit Coclessificall men with matter of money; nor will it be healthfull to trabell into the South-west of England this year.

The Native is premonished to be carefull of himself, these following dayes, 1647.

15. August, The Alcendant by profection comes to the body of Mars, beware of anger, of watery places, be not firring to early in the morning, least foggy mills caule flopping, and benemous agres to get into the body. 14. October, Come not on Borleback, or amongst Cattle, aboid flas bies, out-houses, deal not in any old house-hold fluffe : the Moon then comes to the Dragons tail.

27. Ostober, The Sunne comes to the body of Venus; the Patibe may be cherfull and fear not, nay his heart will be merry. Some fociety with a good Gentlewoman, et.o: entertained at a good Ladies Boule.

17. March, Part Fortune comes to a Trine of the Moon; fome woman papes in money formerly borrowed; fome finall prefent from a lobing neighbour.

2. Aprill, 1648. The Alcendant comes to opposition of Saturn: The native for two or three bayes falls into bain fears, that an old acquaintance lately dead, died to por hie thall lose by him: time makes it appear there was no caule, for if the generall infelicity of England at that time hinder not, the native regains his money with advantage: for 3 finde after the 15. August, Jupiter is Divisor of the remainder of the year, and that venus bath bominion of the Alfridary, both which confidered, induce me to judge that the native field happily evade any infirmmeffe, or calualty depending on this Climatericall year, and also overcome any difficulty incident unto him upon any directions.

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The 64. year, beginning July, 1648.

Conherein the Afcendant comes to the Dragons-head, and to a Trine of Mercury, 3. Febr. 1648. and to the termes of Mercury Day 1649.

The first Aspect is equivalent to a fortune, both put together, in effect, tell the native somuch, That like a man escaped out of some small danger, hereisyceth, and solaceth hunfels at a kinsman or friends house; though not in years, here's probability of a journey beyond Deas; or into the remote parts of this Lungtom: the native will be much imployed in taking accounts, perusing rechanings, reconciling many disgrating neighbours, and friends; he may be carefull in setting some estate upon a kinsman, and thall more then many years before be conversant with Lawyers, Clerks, Decretaries of Estate: the Aspets stone publike imployment from the States, or from that person, or those persons of greatest quality, where he shall then refive, unexpectedly some new beneficiall and materiall preferment. Its probably like to be a year of great action unto the native; wherein notwithfranding he is addited to be very careful:

Becaule in the 65. gear, and 1649. September 24. Part of Fortune comming to the Square of Iupiter, some Gentlman, or Statill of quality will bifurb him in his proceedings, or question his actions. The addectary is more words then matter; itssor a Webt owing that this mans malice appears to great : yet things term to be reconciled by an honest Divine, and to the nafibe again follows his imployment, which yet continue,

In December 1649. the Moone comming to the termes of Mars, flirre up some cholerick matter, and cause tha little weaknesse in the eyes, for a day or two, after which, the remainder of the year passeth without more than common accidents. Some years have no directions.

Being entred the firty and eighth year of age, Part of Fortune comes to the termes of Venus, which intimates little more then a healthfull conflictution, and fome finall increase of a temporal effate, a continuance of former imployments.

The 70. year of Age, which begins 10. July 1654. ending July 1655.

The Moon now comes to the degree culminating; to a man active and befirous of preferment, this direction would perform it. It intimates bealth, effimation, respect, and what not unto the native, that his age, or place are capable of in a very high measure: Aged Ladies and Gentlewomen with the native. The man in the highest authority neer his habitation, will much respect him. Some new preferment, or remoball for better.

In November 1654. the Sun commeth to his own Sextill, theiving a cheerfull old man, and that nature by art both much comfort life, with convenient Cordialis. In Aprill 1655, the Sun comes to the degree alcending at birth, which reconciles fome Rubborne, advertary, and now as the Sunce becomes. becomes more powerfall, and more near to our northern Clime, to the native becomes more lively, and patteth his time with greater tranquillity of minde, enjoying in a plentifull manner all those contentments the world affoardeth to a private man; which is the more increated by the comming of the Medium Coeli to the Trine of the Moon. The native thall finde this year fomewhat formidable to the City of London, by realon of a great plague, and thall allo hear wonders out of Italy, the Pope beginning to be ruined : there will allo in others Committee of Curope break out fuddenly fuch actions, as thall affonith the living, \$c. I have confidered the Medoution of this year, which onely gives the native caution, to aboid crude and raw fruits.

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71, Year of age, beginning 10. July 1655. ending July 1656.

The Sume in December 1655. comes to the termes of Saturn, who at the birth being ill polited, may flitte up fome clownith fellows to conteft with the native, it probokes the native to walpilpneffe, care, and melanchelly, fomellight infirmmelle is fenfibly perceived, he cannot be always young: The native takes cold, and is therefore bered with a cough all the winter, and abundance of spittle, reume descends into the right eye: but the spring approaching, and the profectionall figure being benevolent, the Sunne, and Mercury divolved to the place of the Moon, and Venus to the place of Iupiter, and the Dragons head to the figure Docoscopating, the native is admonibled to change his apre, by benefit whereof he grows likely, and lufty according to the measure of his age.

72. Year, from July 1656. to July 1657.

The Part Fortune mets with the Sextill of Mercury, the day of his birth, going on the 72 year of age: It promifeth some Annual increase of his rebenues, and getting in of former lent moneps, it indites to a purchase, moberate health is foresen; it provokes to debotion more then formerly, it inbites to a setting of effate: The profectionall figure presents Mercury in his own house, Venus in Cancer, the Moon in Aries: De is afflicted at the beath of a friend; the times ber the native, he is doubtfull how to provide for one; he fears in bain; let him serve God, the place God puts him in at beginning of the yea. will be secure.

73. Year, and probably, like to be the last year of the Natives life, from July 1657. to July 1658.

The profectionall figure of this year being the fame of the birth, the Pative mult return to the place from which he came, viz. to the earth. Pot, that the Profections absolutely do fignific such a thing, but the concurring of two interficient directions in one and the same year, and almost moneth, make me confident of the great danger the native will be in this year.

In September 1657. the Moon comes to the Square of Mars; the fame Poneth the medium Coeli to a Square of Iupiter; in November the Sunne being Hyleg, and the tempozall light at the birth meets with the body of Mars,

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(129) who is Promittor to both Significators. At the fall of the leafe, the native becomes ill, and is oppreffed with the wind chollik, but firibing to berio of that, and his Medicines not operating to purpole, it puts the native into a Feber, of which, about the 5. of December 1657. according to natural caules, he ought to die. I politively conclude not his death, for thats onely, in the hands of God.

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For the measure of time in Directions I have followed the rule of Naibod, tobo allows for one degree of the Aequator one pear and 5. dayes, and 8. hours, and for every minute fir dayes and 4. hours : This measure of time Maginus prefers before that of his ston in his Primum mobile, fol. 52. The Ans cients bid give for every degree one year, and for every minute fir dayes : let every one use that measure of time be finds most truth in; I bo verily bea lebe Naibods to be molt erad. Abe Learned in Art, muft pardon met for performing this Nativity follenderly, 3 have made it plain of purpole, and emitted all termes of Art, and the Directions, which would have ben trou-blefome, had they ben inferted by the Painter; for our Pation feldome Paint any thing of Afrology : I remember not any thing of this Subject printed Ance Dariot 1598. Such as it is, receive, either with love, joz bildaine, thou that art ignozant : foz I value the not.

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The Urine of John Pym Esquire; a member of the House of Parliament, brought so me, without his knowledge or consent; and my judgement required whether be would live or dye.

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Aftrologers Snow, Cancer is here the Alcendant of the figure, and fignifies the breft, upper part of be bolly, cold fromack, er. becaufe no Planet afflicted that fign, but upiter Lozd of the 6. honfe, with his Duartile Dmilter. I judges od the breft and flomack increment fo much at prefent afflicted, as formerly they had been : pet 3 faid there appeared small or little dis gestion: I had then recourse to the firth house, in which were the. Moon, Sol, and Venus; the Moon lately leverated from a Conjunction of Mars and Cor Scorpii. Ile not fay he was polloned, perhaps it was some former surfet, 4c.

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
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finding the Moon Lady of the Afcendant, to be the tempozall light in Sagittarius, and Sol allo both fubterranean, and polited in the fir. h. (131) mil fortanes in fichneties, and in the proper house of infirmitie, must n eds cut off life. De whole fignificatoz is molt firong, ought to ob. tain the better, and he is bell dignified that is in an Angle, and in any of his own houses: Deeing in this figure the Moon to be in her own house and in the Afcendant, in Trine to Mars in the 10. and in Sexue berter with the Sun, Lord of the fecond, and part of fortune with the dragons head : 3 judged the Querent thould overcome his enemy, and to be did; Cauda draconis in the 10th. 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And thus, to the everlatting difference of some in the world, was in Augult 1644. verified: when the noble Effex was worlded, in not having times is allitance, which I forefaw by the houre of his going out, being exactly taken for me: he that could never be beaten by an Army or Armies of men, was folled by plaine treachery, under pretence of I know not what parlimony: if men forbear to speak of this, the flones of every first will be transformed into Cryers, and cry aloud for bengeance against the perfidious.



I defcribed Iupiter a more elderly man, to be also mittrafted, but in my indgement acquitted him : I faid further, because both the Moon and Venus applyed to Mars, the fellow had two sweet-hearts at that time, and that the man fignified by Iupiter, was a very friend of the thefes, et. Upon my words the party applyed himfelf to fuch a (13?) man as I velcribed', and he well knew, and had part of his goods again: For venus in the fecond house promileth part, but not all, because Mercury Lord of the fecond was Retrograde.

Unleffe for a very friend, I hate the vift queffions : the which usually bring frandall to the Artifft : few men veleving the perfon of the threfe can be deferived by any lawfull Art, as also many times the party is mill aken, one man being accused for another, and so much milchief comes therean: for if the Artifft deferive a perfon any thing neare to the thape of the party they millruff, they build confidently on the judgement, let us do what we can to contradic them. I have known the judgement, let us do what we felves very much by our judgement, and to have recovered beyond erpectation, fr. And so on the contrary.

a man as Mars, viz. a Captaine of Souldier, tc. and that the thould be crotted therein, by realon both Mars and the Moon were in unfortunate houles: nor had Mercury of Luna any dignities where Mars was, or in the figue, and degree where himfelf was: all this was acknowledged with teaves: becaule I found Saturn and Mars in the eighth, and that Mars was the impediting Planet; I had the maide require a joynture of the old man, and fee what it would be which at next meeting the did, but then it appeared he could not make any, there being an incumbrance upon his IL and, as Saturn with Mars, in his fecond house of fubfrance both ercellently fignifie: after this they broke off all termes of marriage, birectly as I told her.

piece of Stuff, a meer Chaos and mixture of Confusion : And yet, how mean foever it be, it may fir up fome more able hand to fecond it, and to polifh my ragged Inventions ; Res facilis addere inventis. Were I now to perform it again, I could do it twice fo well : perhaps I will , Si venia dabitur.

There's a time for all things. Some may gueffe I have done little : Dulce Bellum inexpertis: Others will form and rage at me, because

Terribiles toti mundo divinitús iras

Postremi Secli venturas tempore pando.

Let them fay what they will, I care not : I fay to all,

Sola est causa mili cunctis dementia habendi.

Had not this madneffe of encreaching poffeffed the European Demi-gods , we had to this day been quiet in most Countreys of Europe ; whereas now

Infælix vita adveniet, tempulq; cruentum. To England what fhall I fay ? Ehcu: immanis regio, gens barbara valde. After a while, I fear, nay at present

Tibia multiferi non turbat pectora cantu. No mirth or melodie : the heavens deceive us not, when they fay,

Splendentemq; Cometam Appellant homines Stellam mala fignificantem,

Imminet ut multum Bellum, vaftatio, ftrages.

Our times of perill are before our eyes, and approaching,

Nam fic in fatis fixum vertentibus Annis.

I write to you that are versed in heavenly Constellations, and defire you would peruse the Books of the Ancient, and not flight our Modern Writers, you fhall observe abundant verity in Astrologie 3 you, I mean, that are the fons of Art : Never did the world afford more matter to work upon : the heavenly Bodies do as plainly discover the times succeeding, as if they were in present view.

Quicunque conditionem Cœleftis harmoniæ notam haberet ; tam præterita quam futura cognolceret. The Key if our Art, de futuris contingentibus in mundo, is, I confesse, involved in many Riddles , So that very few obtain it.

Quis mihi dabitur ex millibus unus, qui hanc harmoniam intelligat cœlestem : Let m labour that every one may understand a little, and attain to the knowledge of this celestiall harmony. The afcent thereunto is by Nature, plain Nature ; and the exact knowledge of the nature and property of every Planet, and intelligence : Inferiora enim superiorit us subje & funt, & fola similitudine, que substantia, accidente, potentia, virtute, numero, gradu ac proprietate constat, per applicationem unius ad aliud; &c.

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He that reads Mizaldus his Harmoniam microcolmi cum macrocolmo, five humani corporis cum Cœlo, may perceive fomething more, and, as in a certain Scale, may afcend to greater matters. Nor fhall 1 at any time attribute more to the beavenly Conftellations then God hatb given: I well know, Aftra nullum imperium habent in mentem, nec aliquod in nos domin.um habent, qui Spiritu ambulamus, confitentes Dominum Jelum Christum omnia in fua potelistera habentem, &c. They are Defignatrices temporum, and of that mutation which is as well in man, as in this world, by the perm ffion of the All feeing providence of God. When God will croffe Naure, he works by Miracles; when he will not have man to understand his Ordinances, be clouds his understanding with doubts, fears and errours. Ars longa, vita brevis. Art is tedious, our life ends when we are but Smatterers in any learning. Indeed our intensions never fix, we would aftend to a higher measure of knowledge then God is willing we should : A fault Adam was guilty of. Perfuafus conjuge, partem

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By which miferable fall and failing of Adam, we have warning to be content with that measure of knowledge God imparts unto us in Nature, and by Nature, and not to invocate the Spirits to our offistance, or to use any unlawfull Course in our Predictions : For, certainly, be that understands the face of heaven, and frame of nature rightly, shall see abundance of matter, and all the negatiations of this later Age, concurring with the heavenly Constellations, and ordered according to the course of the keavens; and shall not need to tread in any illicite path of knowledge.

I intended onely, at first; to have handled the Conjunction in 164²/₄: But being engaged in the Atlion, I found I could make nothing of it, unless I ascended to former times. Doubtlesse, as this Conjunction is the last of the Warry Triplicity this Return, and is by divine providence, after fourty y ers continuance of the Fiery Trygon, permitted to make its Conjunction in a Watry Signe, and is invironed, as I may so say, betwizt that Conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in Leo, 1623; and that in Sagiturius, 1663. The Effects hereof shall assured be more admirable, and more miraculows, then any that hath preceded these many yeers.

The Cavils of some pragmatick Novices, and of seditions Sectaries, that have undone us, I noither care, nor fear : You cannot make it fink into their noddles that, there's twelve Houfes, or feven-Planets ; or that there's any influence in the Stars, though God himfelf name the influence of the Pleiades, and ask thefe fools, If they can restrain it : Let them passe, Sic canibus catulos, &c. Who knows not, Acceffu Solis vegitantur vires, velut rescuffaque veterno ; difeeffu ejuldem feu, destitutæ adminiculis necessarii prælidii elanguescunt : Experience in every man tells us, Sunt & sensus cogitationesq; actiores aut hebitiores uno magis quam alio tempore, non ex ulla causa obvia, aut nota ; Sed ut vis illa ætheria in corposibus nofiris a Cœlefti lumine incitatut, aut retunditur. I ingenuoufly confesse, That I hat 5 fome Confiderations, omitted many curious judgements ; fo have many, before my time , purpojely kept back much learning from the knowledge of the world : Res mundi pulchertime ob arrogantiam hominum ignorantur, dum nihil flatuunt credere, nifi humana mens rationem illius per ceperit ; which is impossible : Who gives the reason of the curing at a distance by the weapon Salve ? What reason hath found out the vertue, and the cause of it, in the Load-stene ? So long as time is, and menupon the face of the earth, there will be difference in Opinion : All men will not approve of allasti. How many hundred yeers was it, before Phylick was admitted in the Romane Common-wealth ? and yet who knows not the excellent benefit that man bath, by means of the lear ned Phylitian? our lives, in many conditions, were miferable, without it, and the Phylitian. But I haften to a conclusion. For writing to you that understand Astrologie, I need no Apologie : Rogamus itaque omnes cœlum afpicientes & colentes hæc fludia, ut boni confulant, & contra Scorpiones, & maledicos Mathematum hoftes ac caluminatores defendant, & ut meamquoque existimationem tucantur etiam atque etiam rogo. And

And my request to forraigue Aftrologersis, Uc fi qui Exempla geniturarum colligerunt fummorum principum atque Heroum & tingularium cafuum in Francia, Hifpinia & Ger mania, aut vicinis Regnis, nec non aulis verlantur, geneleos ad nos, vel tempora faltem transmittant: And I will return it exchange thereof fush as have come to my hands, either of our own Nation, or any other. I have in most places delivered my minde Astrologically, some few ex-cepted, yet no judgement but extracted radically from the Art, my words are in length, and not for every word a letter, as Sibilla Delphica dealt with Romulus, who destring to know the face of Rome, bad no arfwire of the Sibill, then theft 14. letters, wrote in the bake of trees : R. R. R. T. S. D. D. R. R. R. F. F. F. F. A37. yeares after this Prophecy, Sibilla Erithra came to Rome, who aid fo interpret and ex ound them, as if fibe and none other had composed them; in this manner. Romulo, Regnante, Roma, Triumphans, Sibilla, Delphica, Dixir, Regnum, Roma, Ruct, Ferro, Flamma, Fame, Frigore : The Prediction proved exactly true; as any that read The Romane hiftorie will finde out. I could have delivered fome truths in the like nature, had I fo ache ed, perhas snow and then I may.

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Thelift thing in which I crave your gentle acceptance, is the measure of time concerning the determination of the eff fis of this Conjunction, accuse me not untill you finde it erroncous, which if you do, let ay errour teach you to measure the time aright; I have not done it with confidence that events will answere my proportion absted. I have endeavoured divers wayes, time and the successe will either confirme or disprove it, and by this meanes finde out one certain measure, the thing I onely ayine at. Remember we are men, no one man knoweth all things, no not in any Science. Illa Deus in Magnete proposuit oculis mortalium spectanda : qualia aliis in rebus subtiliori mentis indagini, & fedulitati experiendi majori, invenienda reliquit : words as true as truthit felf: let us modefily feek, and we shall finde that proportion God hath appointed for us, whether in he oneledge of this, or any other Science ; and let all men know : Duplices funt ftellarum omnium radii : alii fensibiles five luminofi, alii secretioris influentia : hi omnia qua in hoc mund) continentur penetrant : illi ne adeo penetrant, quodam modo impediri poffunte If underflood I wright enough, not apprehended I write too much.
