We would suggest to the profession, the necessity for caution, the large doses sometimes recommended—1-2, 3-4, and even 1 grain, are unsafe for the first trial, unless the conditions requiring the injection be exceptional. In commencing, it should not exceed one-third of that ordinarily administered internally.

DIRECTIONS.—The syringe is charged with the requisite amount of water, which is poured into a teaspoon or other convenient receptacle; the pellet being dropped in, is crushed with the end of the syringe, to which the needle fits, and after all the humps are broken the solution is drawn up and forced out three or four times, when usually the whole mass will be entirely dissolved and ready for use.

If warm water is used, or the spoon is heated over a lamp or gas jet, a perfect solution is effected in a moment. The Tablets may be readily powdered with the blade of a knife, and a solution is even more speedily made in this way.
