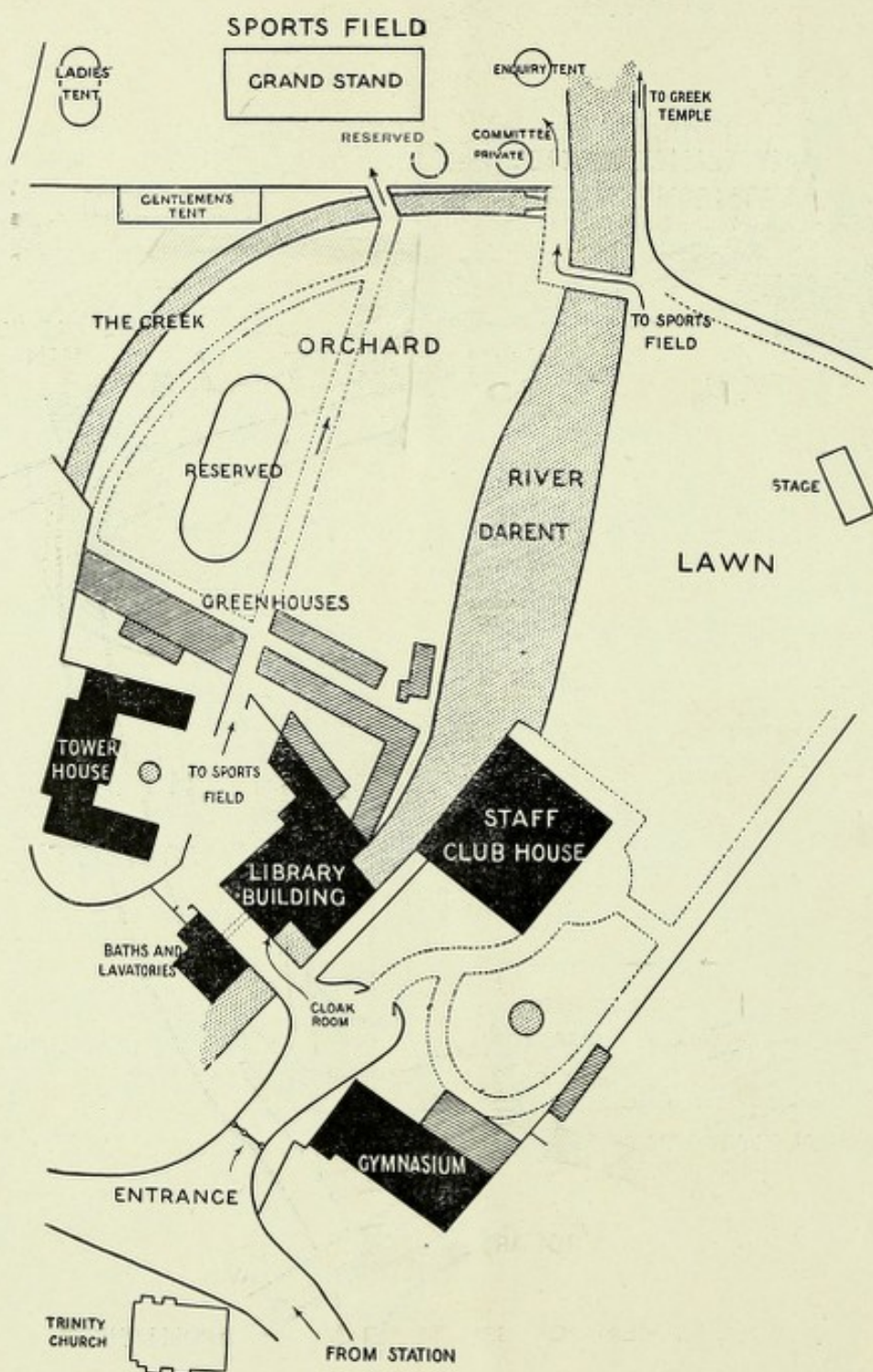
Members of the Committee and Stewards will wear white rosettes with red centres, and will be glad to give information to visitors and others.

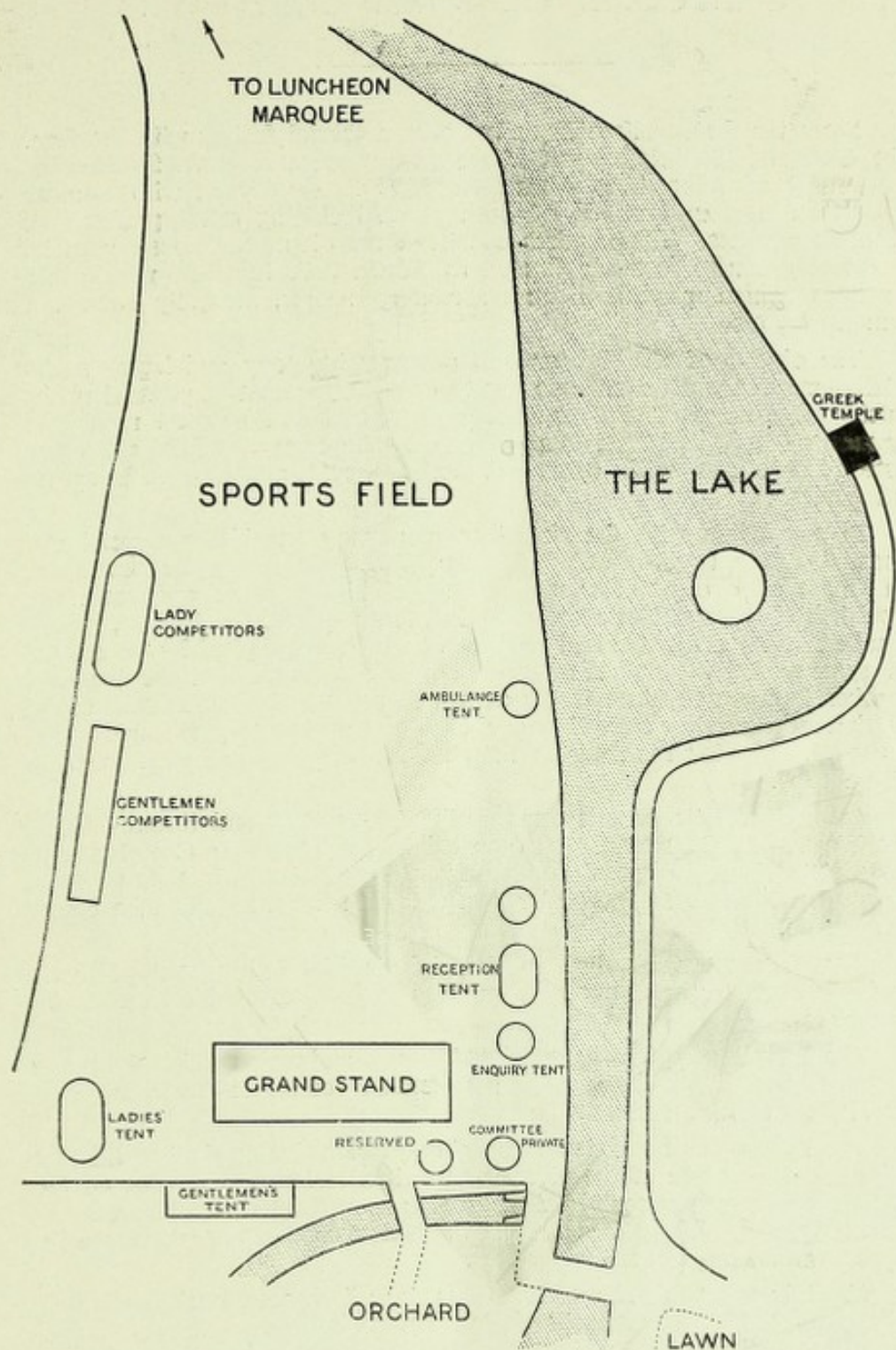


PLAN OF DARTFORD

OBJECTS OF THE WELLCOME CLUB AND INSTITUTE

From the first, Welfare Work has been a special feature with the firm. The Club and Institute is a part of the general scheme and was founded for the benefit of BURROUGHS WELLCOME & CO.'s employees, who number more than thirteen hundred of both sexes, including many professional scientific workers. The premises consist of the old manor house (with its extensive grounds) formerly known as Acacia Hall, together with other buildings which provide libraries, reading rooms, assembly rooms, a gymnasium, etc.

The objects of the club are—to promote harmony and happy social intercourse amongst the employees and to supply them with a pleasant resort outside of business hours—to encourage mental and physical recreation by means of music, literary and other entertainments, technical and other instruction classes with occasional lectures, and athletics, field sports and games.

In connection with the club there are many subsidiary associations, amongst which may be mentioned the WELLCOME PHOTOGRAPHIC CLUB. An ample suite of dark rooms and a full photographic equipment are provided. An important annual photographic exhibition is held, where members show work, the high quality of which is endorsed by the awards this same work has obtained at other exhibitions throughout the country. Another important feature is the annual ARTS AND CRAFTS EXHIBITION, at which a representative collection of objects of craftsmanship of employees is presented. Provision is made at the club for carrying out such work in leisure time.

Amongst athletic organisations are the TENNIS CLUB and HOCKEY CLUB. The WELLCOME CRICKET CLUB competed in the Wholesale Chemists' and Druggists' Cricket League of London from its foundation in 1899 to 1903. It won the CHAMPIONSHIP CUP for FIVE SUCCESSIVE YEARS, and then ceased to compete.

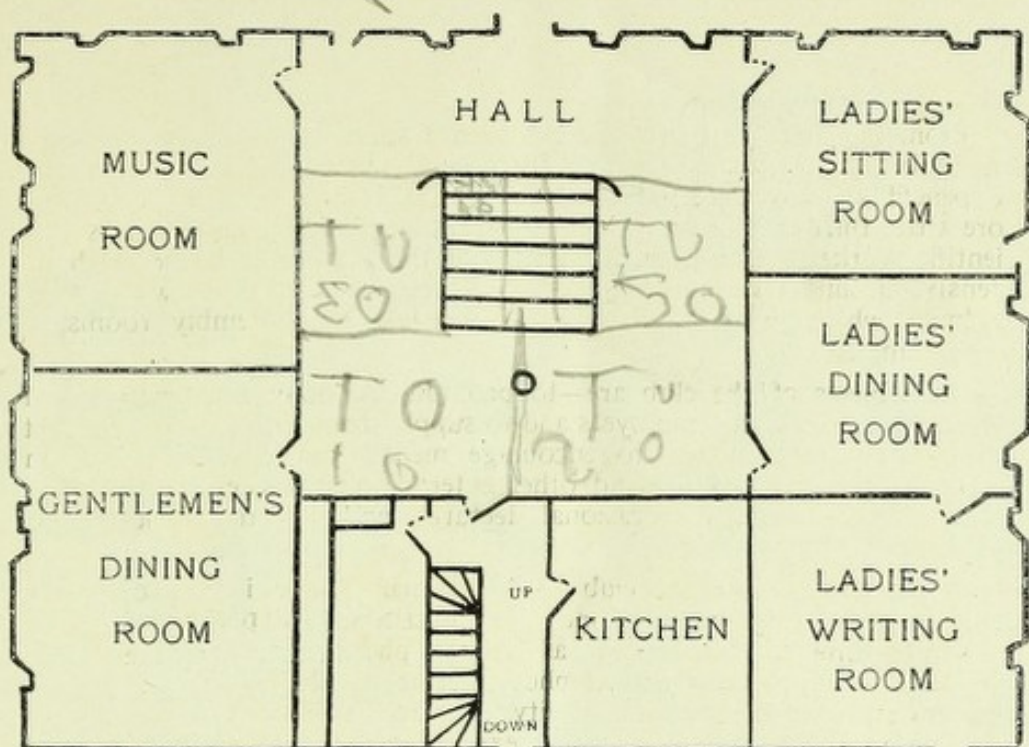
The GYMNASIUM attached to the club is thoroughly equipped with modern gymnastic appliances. A military instructor conducts classes for both sexes.

The SCIENTIFIC and LITERARY, ORCHESTRAL, and various other SOCIETIES associated with the club, have been successfully conducted for years with great benefit to the members.

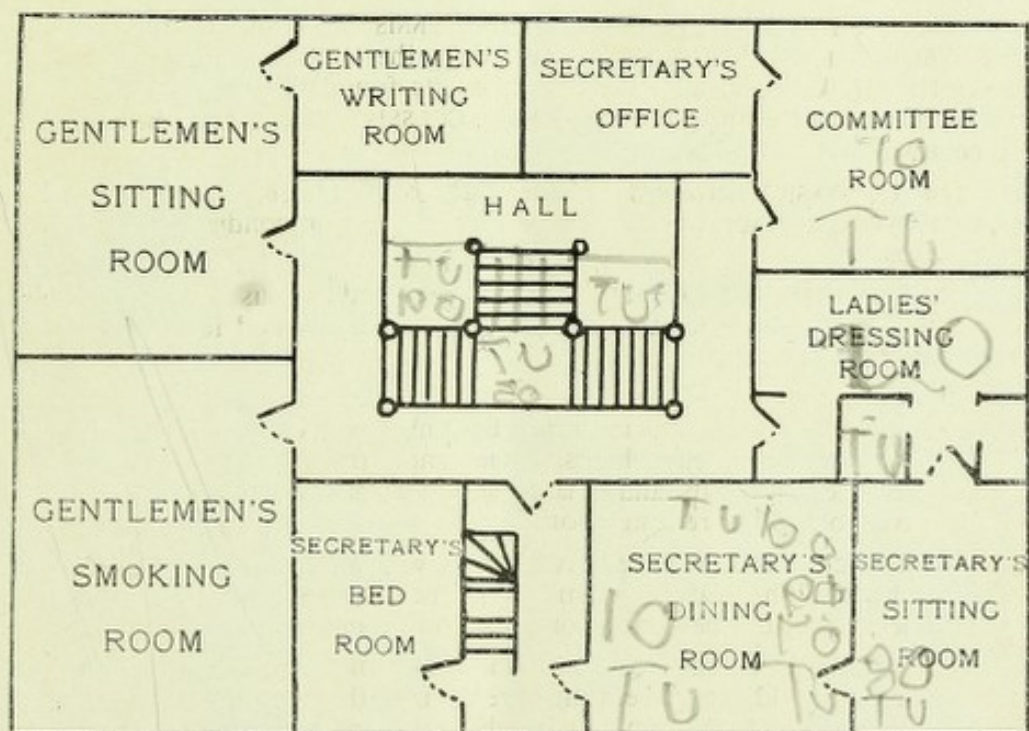
The Executive Committee of the club regulates the conduct of the club and controls the use of the river for boating, swimming, fishing, etc., as well as the library, museum, baths, games and various other features. All suitable technical journals and a large selection of newspapers, magazines, etc., are available in the reading rooms.

Monthly concerts and weekly dances as well as occasional fancy dress balls are held in the season. Rambles, picnics, lectures, etc., are arranged from time to time by the various organisations connected with the club.

All employees willing to attend the DARTFORD TECHNICAL INSTITUTE have their fees paid, and the firm gives prizes through the Institute for proficiency in the technical subjects in which it is interested. It is gratifying to know that out of seven prizes given in the last session, five were secured by employees of the firm.

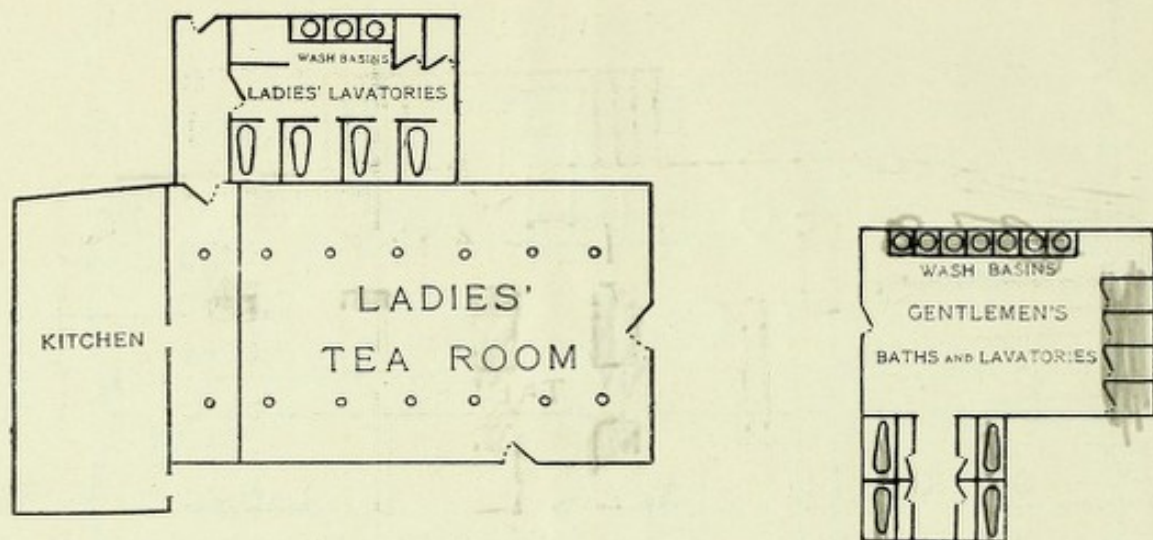


STAFF CLUB HOUSE—GROUND FLOOR PLAN



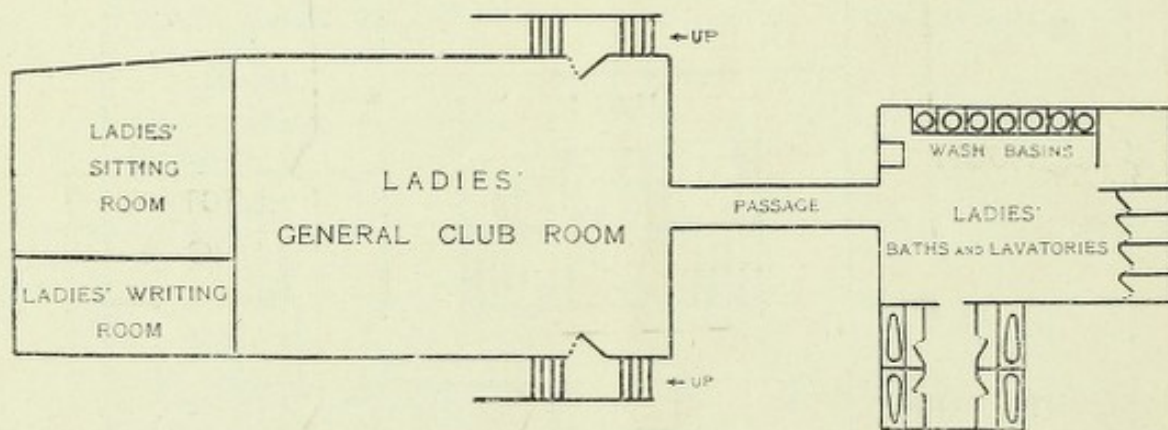
STAFF CLUB HOUSE—FIRST FLOOR PLAN

The Club Buildings and Grounds are illuminated by an electric light installation run by water power



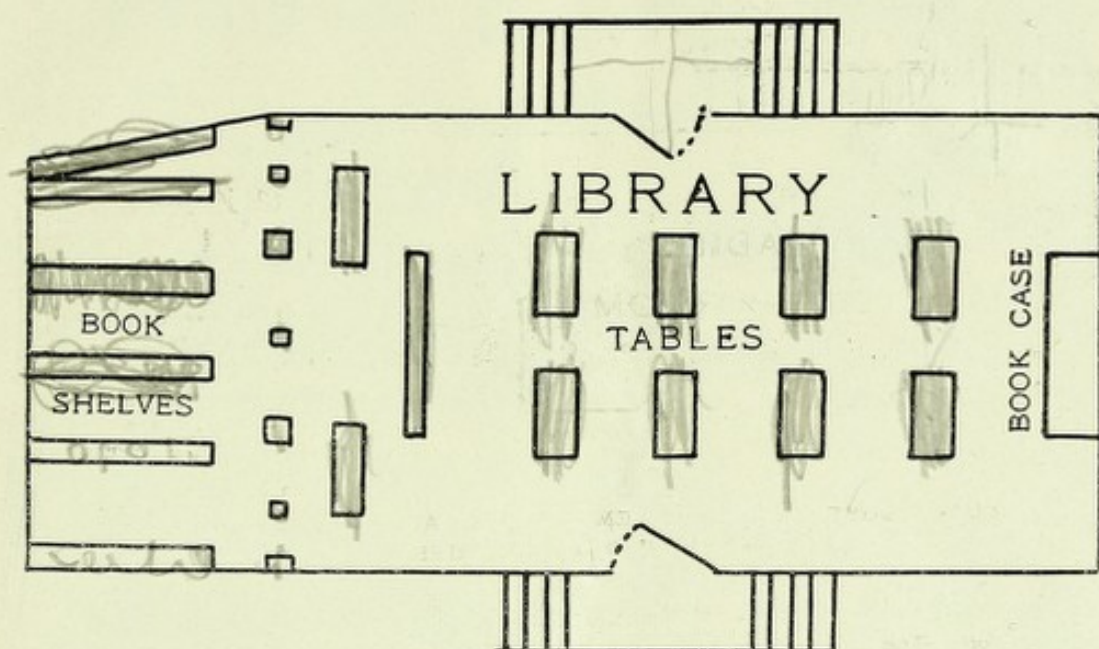
CLUB HOUSE FOR LADY EMPLOYEES, AND GENTLEMEN'S BATHS AND LAVATORIES

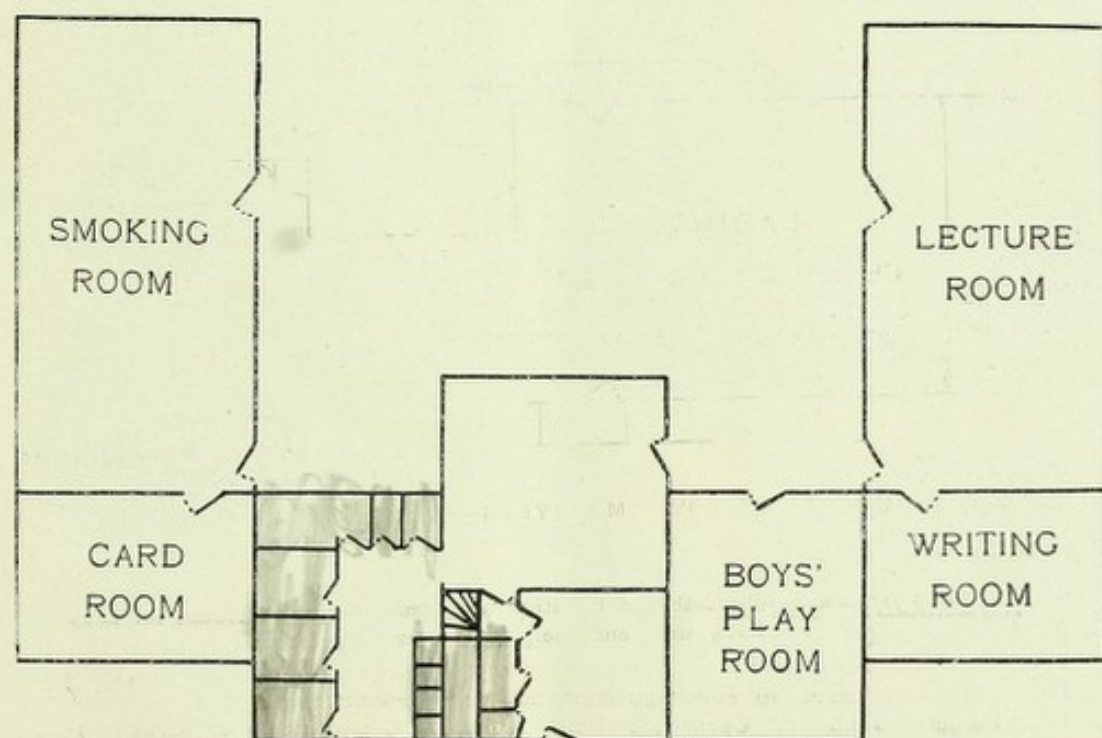


CLUB HOUSE FOR LADY EMPLOYEES—FIRST FLOOR PLAN

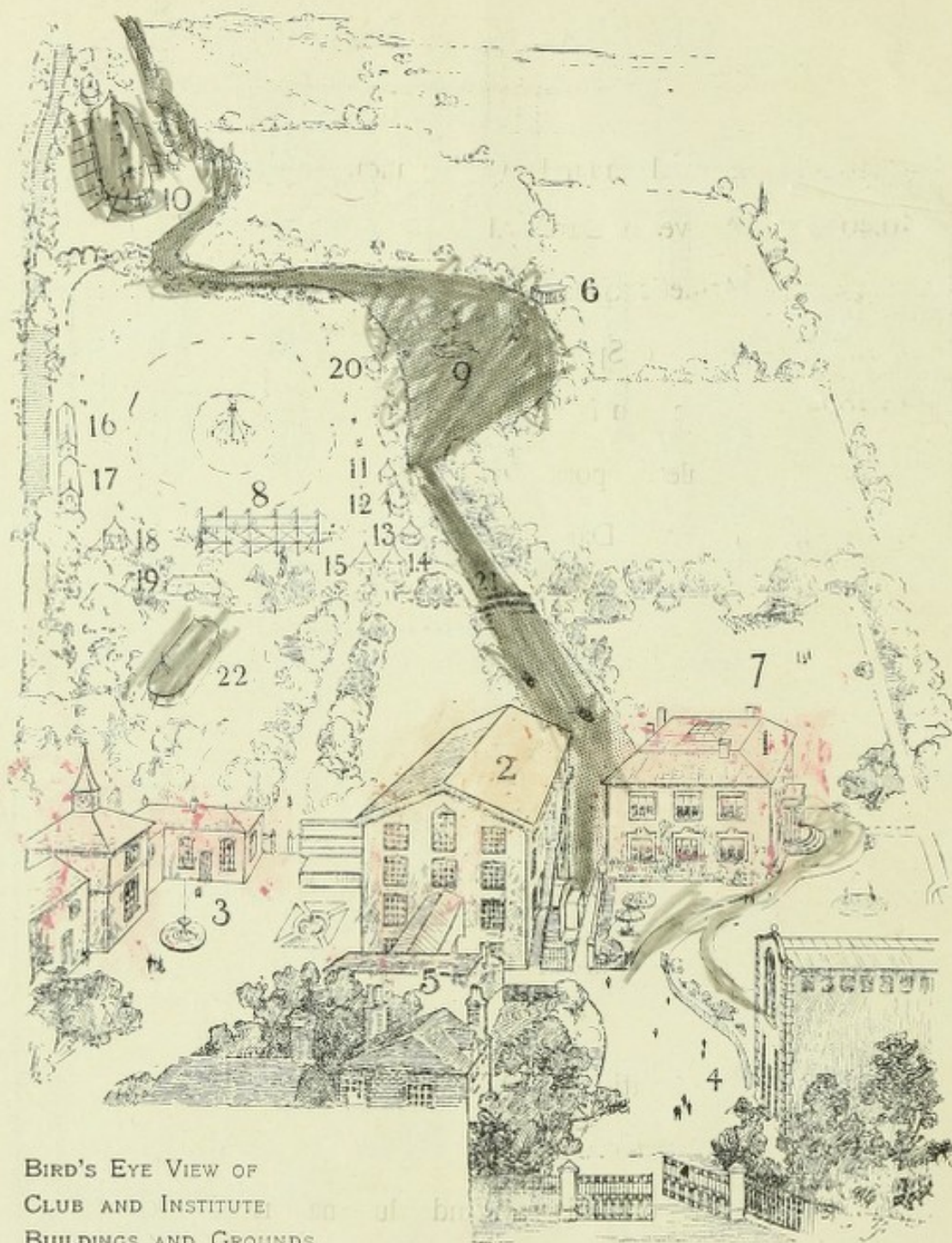

NOTICE TO COMPETITORS

IN

ATHLETIC AND AQUATIC SPORTS

The Rules of the A.A.A. will be strictly enforced

Competitors must be ready to start when the bell rings, and they must also wear the numbers provided for them by the committee.

The flat races will be started by the report of a pistol. A snap of the cap will be counted a mis-fire. If a competitor oversteps his mark before the pistol has been fired, he will be put back in--

(a.) 100 yards race	...	...	...	1 yard
(b.) $\frac{1}{4}$ -mile race	...	...	...	2 yards
(c.) 1 mile race	...	...	...	5 ..

These penalties will be doubled for a second offence, and disqualification will follow a further repetition of the same offence.

The decision of the Judges will in all cases be final, and will be notified on the telegraph board.

Tables will be placed in the Competitors' Tents, at which all competitors must attend and give in their names and numbers at least ten minutes before the time for the event in which they intend to compete. They will then receive the number cards to be worn. No competitor will be allowed to start without a number.

A bell will be rung immediately before the commencement of each event. The committee do not bind themselves to give any other notice and no delay will be permitted through the absence of any competitor.

Not more than two first prizes, nor more than three prizes in all, may be retained by any one competitor, excluding those for the Tug-of-War.

In the Aquatic Sports University Costume must be worn. The numbers against the names of competitors indicate the order in which they stand at the starting-point, counting from the bank leading to the Greek Temple.

The Sports Judges and Stewards will wear a white badge on the arm. No other person will be allowed inside the ring during the progress of the Sports.

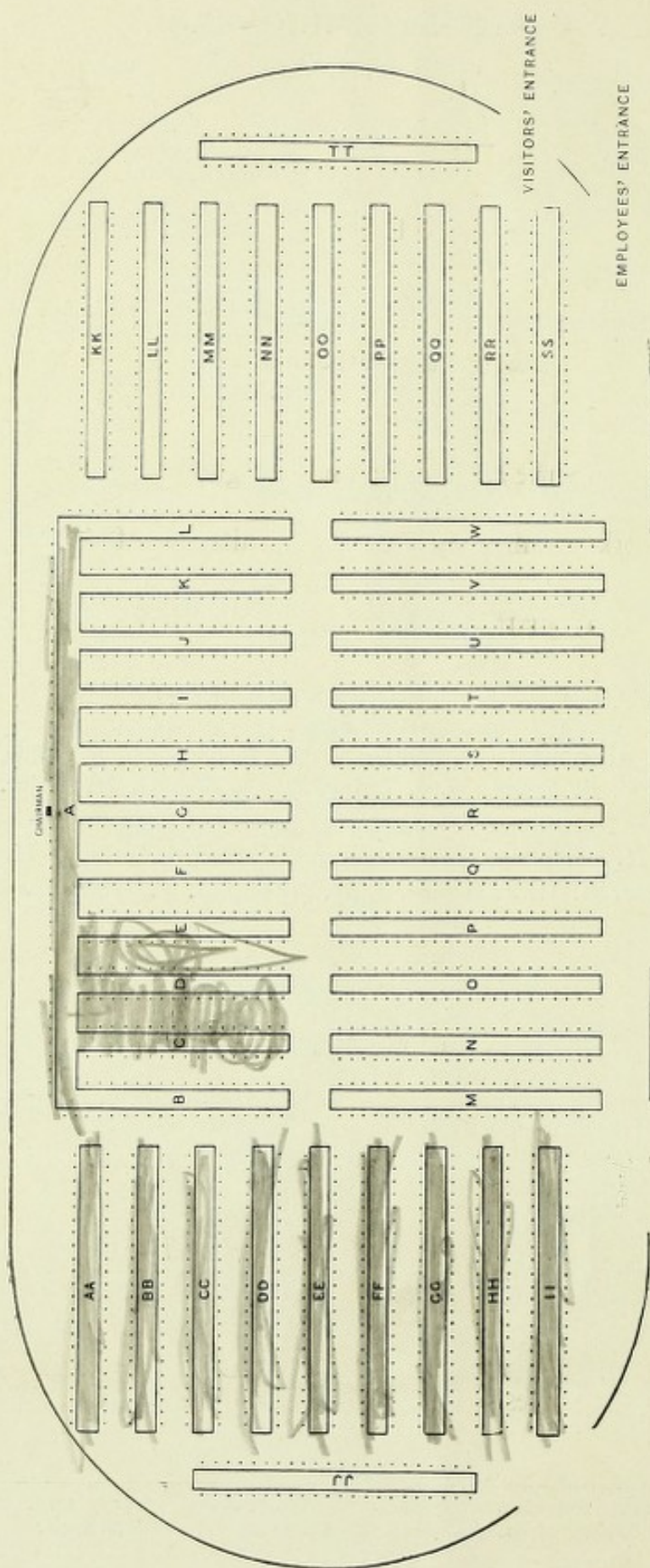

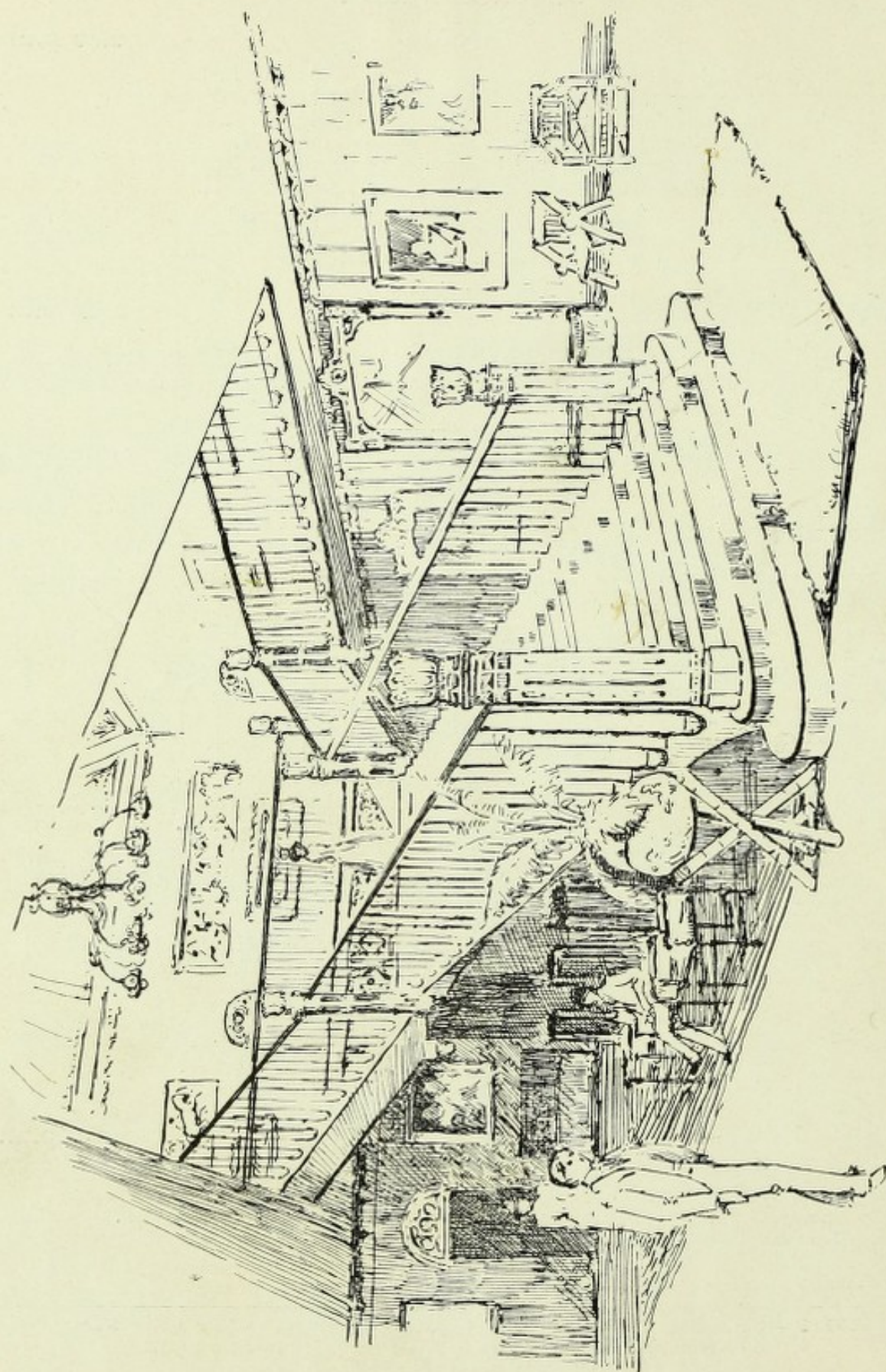

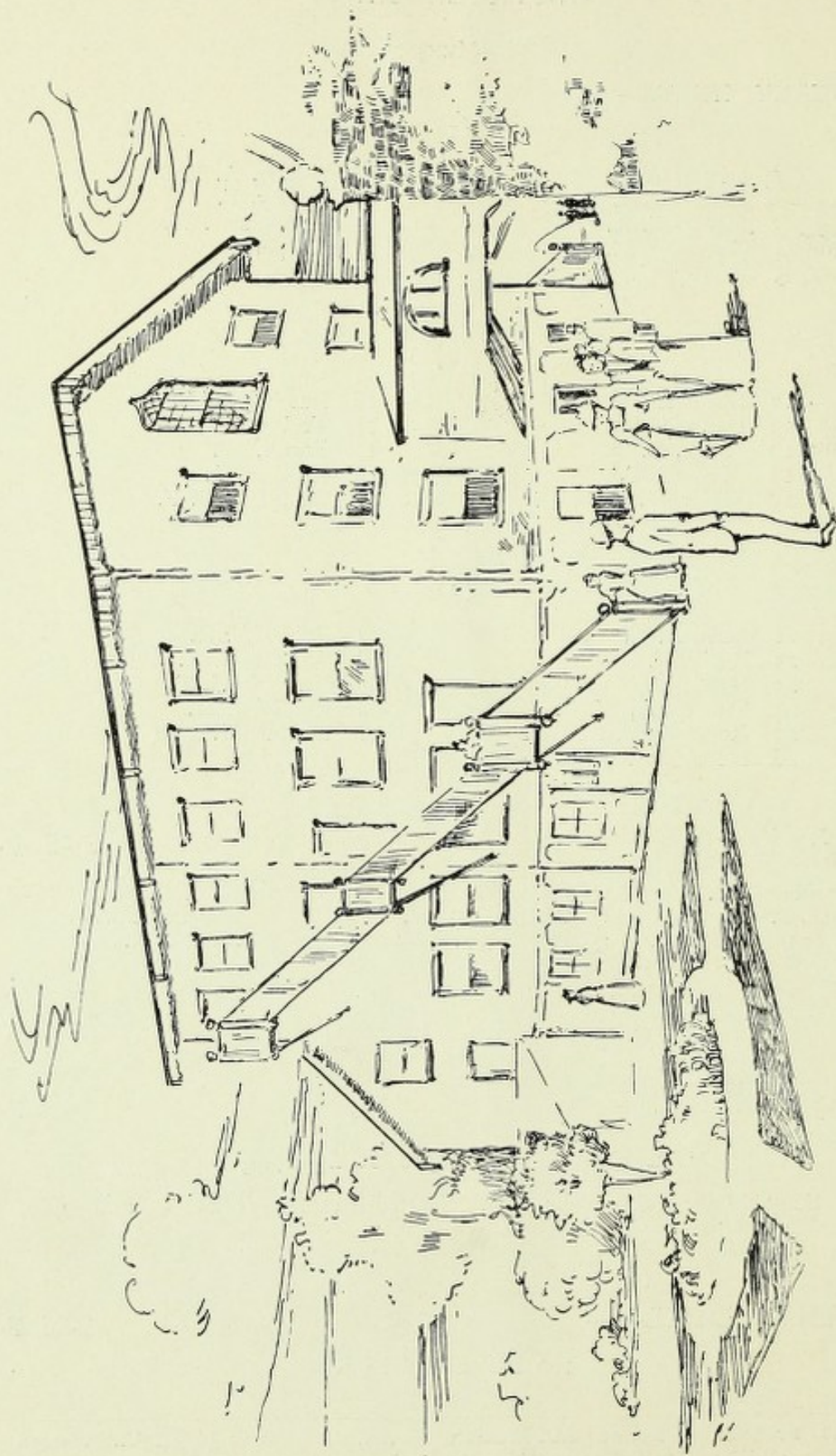
