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


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Summer Fruits for Winter Health

The scene depicted above is a typical South African Fruit Farm, not many miles from Cape Town. There are many such Farms in the Union of South Africa producing Peaches, Plums, Nectarines, Apricots, Grapes, Pears, Pines, Apples, Melons, Mangoes, Passion Fruit (Grenadillas), Avocado Pears, Litchies, Cape Gooseberries, etc., and most of these fruits arrive here at a time when from a trading point of view they are most acceptable.

To-day the South African Deciduous Fruit Orchards cover 125,000 acres.

TH AFRICAN SUNSHINE FRUITS

It is more than likely last year's record will be again exceeded as regards quantities of fruit shipped.

Notwithstanding the improvements of the past few years, grading and packing is being given still greater care this year: the advice offered by a number of their Retailer friends in this connection is gratefully acknowledged.

The first shipments of Apricots, Peaches and Plums have arrived and have met with approbation from both Trade and Public. While it is Winter here it is Summer-time in South Africa thus making it possible to brighten up window displays with this attractively coloured fruit and also offer customers something fresh and inviting.

This scheme has been made the subject of this year's poster "Summer fruit for Winter's health." A photographic reproduction of this design is given. It is being printed in two sizes, double crown $(30''\times20'')$ and crown $(20''\times15'')$. together with streamers to match $(30''\times10'')$ for Peaches, Plums and Nectarines, and for Grapes and Pears.

Lettering streamers and Bills on the lines of those issued last year which were so popular will also be available in a different colour scheme, and Price tickets for all fruits with packets of gummed-back price overlays.
