county of Cornwall, is the fourth son of Mr. Edward Arthur
Wilde, and nephew of the late Chief Justice Sir Thomas
Wilde, who was raised to the peerage on being appointed to

of Lord Truro—from the same far-western county. His

promoted to a seat on the judicial bench as one of the Barons
of the Exchequer, and received the honour of knighthood,
In 1863, on the sudden and lamented death of Sir Cresswell
Cresswell, Sir James Wilde was appointed Judge of Her
Majesty's Court of Divorce and Martimonial Causes, the
duties of which post he has discharged with eminent ability
down to the present time. His lordship was sworn a Privy
Councillor on receiving this last appointment. Lord Penzance married in 1860 the Lady Mary Pleydell Bouverie,
daughter of the venerable Earl of Radnor.

British Premiers.—The resignation of office by Lord Derby renders it interesting to recall the Premiers who have held office for the last 114 years. The Duke of Newenstle came into power April 5, 1754, and held office for eight years and 52 days. The Earl of Ratte took office May 29, 1762, and held it for 322 days. The Administration of Mr. G. Grenville commenced April 16, 1763, and lasted for two years and 87 days. The Marquis of Rockingham took office July 12, 1765, and held it for one year and 21 days. The Administration of the Duke of Graften, which commenced August 2, 1766, lasted three years and 179 days. The Administration of Lord North was one of unusual duration, commencing January 28, 1770, and lasting 12 years and 34 days. The Marquis of Rockingham again came into power March 3, 1782, and held it for 132 days. He was succeeded July 13, 1782, by the Earl of Shelborne, whose term of power was 266 days. The next Premier was the Duke of Portland, who came into power April 5, 1783, and remained in office 260 days. Then came a very long Administration, that of Mr. Pitt, who came into power December 27, 1783, and held office for 17 years and 80 days. Mr. Pitt was succeeded March 17, 1801, by Lord Sidmonth, who remained in office three years and 55 days. Then came the second Pitt Administration, commencing May 12, 1804, and lasting one year and 246 days. Lord Grenville took office Jan. 8, 1805, and held it for one year and 64 days. The Duke of Portland again became Premier March 13, 1807, and remained in office three years and 102 days. He was succeeded Mr. Caministration, which commenced June 28, 1810, by Mr. Spencer Perceval, whose term of power extended over one year and 350 days. The Earl of Liverpool's Administration, which commenced June 28, 1812, was a very long one, lasting 14 years and 307 days. Mr. Canning aucceeded Lord Liverpool April 11, 1827, but only remained in office 121 days. Lord Goderich, who succeeded Mr. Canning August 10, 1827, also held office only 168 days. The next Administration wa BRITISH PREMIERS. -The resignation of office by Sir Robert Peel took office December 8, 1834, but only remained in power 131 days. The second Administration of Lord Melbourge, which commenced April 18, 1835, lasted six years and 133 days. Sir Robert Peel took office a second time September 3, 1841, and held it for four years and 97 days. Then Lord J. Russell was sent for, December 10, 1845, but his Lordship only held office ten days. Sir Robert Peel returned to power December 20, 1845, and remained in office 183 days. The second Administration of Lord John Russell, which commenced June 26, 1846, lasted five years and 239 days. The Earl of Derby came into office February 22, 1852, and held it 300 days. The Administration of the Earl of Aberdeen, which commenced December 19, 1852, lasted two years and 45 days. The first Administration of Lord Palmorston, which commenced February 5, 1855, lasted three years and 17 days. The Earl of Derby's second Administration commenced February 21, 1838, and lasted one year and 111 days. Then came Lord Palmorston's second Administration, which, commencing June 13, 1839, iasted six years and 128 days. On the death of Lord Palmorston, Earl Russell became Premier for the third time, but his Lordship only held office on this occasion 240 days. The Earl of Derby's third tenure of power commenced June, 27, 1866, and has now terminated after the lapse of one year and 241 days.

Gregory, James; mathematician; inventor of the reflecting telescope; a man of very acute and penetrating genius.

He was the most important member of a very important scientific family, partly eminent as mathematicians, and largely so as physicians. The following pedigree is necessary to explain their relationships, but I should add that I know it does not do full justice to the family. The talent came from the Andersons, of whom I wish I knew more. We may accept, at least, the following letters for the subject of this notice: f., g., gB., B., 3 N., NS., NS., S., 2 P., and 2 Pp.

SIR DAVID BREWSTER:

HIS LAST DAYS AND DEATH.

Professor Lyon Playfair, C.B., Vice-President of the Society, said—Gentlemen, before beginning the business of this meeting, I wish to refer to the lamented death of two of the office-bearers of this Society. Dr Burt, a member of our Council, was well known as a public-spirited citizen, who has long usefully devoted himself to the development of our institutions, and who, by his genial disposition and honesty of character, endeared himself to all those who enjoyed his acquaintance. The other loss has had a more marked relation to us, because in the death of Sir David Brewster this Society has lost its President, and this country one of her

most distinguished philosophers. This is not the time to refer to the benefits which Sir David Brewster has bestowed upon science. These have been so numerous and important, that we may expect a special evening to be devoted to their consideration. If Professor Tait, who is so capable to do justice to the merits of his deceased friend, were to undertake this subject, I am sure the Royal Society would hail with pleasure the announcement of his intention. Such a record of the achievements of a great philosopher has a much higher purpose than that of an éloge, for while they become landmarks in the progress of science over new and untrodden paths, they indicate the method by which future progress is to be attained. Sir David Brewster entered this Society so long ago as 1808, and has been a constant contributor to its Transactions. In announcing to us at the opening of the session the death of Faraday, he said that there was only one person living who had, like Faraday, taken all the medals of the Royal Society of Lon-

don-the Copley, Rumford, and Royal medals. There is no one living now to , claim this high honour, for the "one" so modestly hinted at was himself. In Brewster and Faraday the nation has suffered a heavy loss. Both were great philosophers and ardent Christians. We point to them as conclusive proofs that science and infidelity are not akin. I dare not trust myself to speak of the last days of Brewster. The perfect calmness and kindly consideration with which he wrote farewell letters to the public bodies which had honoured themselves by honouring him during life, were perhaps to have been looked for in one who viewed death as a means of attaining a higher and purer knowledge of God and of His works. But it is given to few men to possess, as he did, their mental faculties unclouded to the last. A week before his death I had a long letter in his own handwriting, showing the liveliest interest in the affairs of the University, and in some optical discoveries regarding which he frequently corresponded with me. A few

days after, while his mind was still clear, but his bodily frame weaker, he dictated a letter to the Council of this Society, in which he took a touching leave of his old associates and of the Society itself, and left to it, as a precious legacy, a research nearly completed, which formed the deathbed study of the old philosopher. I am sure that the Society would not have wished to commence the business of this evening without some allusion to the death of their venerable President, and without some expression of sympathy with his widow and family. I therefore invite, from the body of the Society, a resolution which will record the sense of our own sorrow, and of our strong sympathy with that deeper personal affliction which is felt by the widow and children of so great and good a man.

SIR J. Y. SIMPSON said—It happens that I was the last Fellow of the Royal Society who conversed with Sir David Brewster before his death. Specially, I be-

lieve, on this account, I have been requested by the Council to draw up a minute with reference to him. Most willingly do I comply with that request; and I beg therefore to move the following resolutions expressive of our admiration for his genius and of our regret for his loss:—

"The Royal Society of Edinburgh hereby record their deep sense of the great loss which the Society have sustained by the death of their late venerable and esteemed president, Sir David Brewster.

"Early in life an earnest worker and a happy discoverer in some of the most recondite fields of physical knowledge, Sir David Brewster has, during the last sixty and more years, continued with ceaseless energy to pour into the contemporary stream of science and literature a series of contributions of rare excellence and originality. At last he has passed from among us, as ripe in fame as in years; for he has reaped all the highest academic and other distinctions, both domestic and foreign, which a British philosopher can possibly win; and in his chosen departments of

research he has left behind him no name more illustrious than his own.

"The Society further resolve to send a copy of this minute to Lady Brewster and the other members of Sir David Brewster's family; at the same time expressing their sincere sympathy with them in their late bereavement."

Perhaps the Society will kindly bear with me while I venture to add to these resolutions a very few remarks. With you, Mr President, I hope our colleague Professor Tait will, at some early meeting, give us a full resumé of all the wonderful discoveries and inventions in science, and specially in optical science, which we owe to the genius and researches of Sir David Brewster. But permit me to make one or two observations on other matters, not scientific.

As early as the age of twelve, Sir David became a student at the University, and he was still a student in the truest sense of the term during the subsequent seventy-five years of his life. While yet only ten years old, he constructed a telescope (with his friend Mr

Veitch)—a trait significant of the chief future bent of his work and genius. Few men, we all know, have ever been more successful in detecting and unfolding some of the most hidden laws of nature, and in observing and generalizing some of her most obscure phenomena. His self-imposed task only ended with his life. And on this subject it seems to me that I carry almost a mission from him to us-from the dead to the living; for when I last visited him at Allerley, when he was within a few hours of death, when he was already pulseless, his mind was perfectly entire and perfectly composed; and on asking him, among other matters, if he wished any particular scientific friend to take charge of his remaining scientific papers and notes, he answered me "No; I have done what every scientific man should do, viz., published almost all my observations of any value, just as they have occurred." He then explained that he had left one paper on Film forms for the Society, and went on to express an earnest regret that he had not had time to write for

the Society another, descriptive of the optical phenomena which he had latterly observed in his own field of vision, where there was a partial degree of increasing amaurosis, which, he thought, might be yet found a common form of failure in the eyes of men, ageing and aged like himself. He described the appearance of this partial amaurosis minutely and energetically, telling me, for your information, that the print of the Times newspaper had begun for a year or two past to look at one part in his field of vision as if the white interstices between the letters "were lightly peppered over with minute dark powder;" and this amaurotic point was, he observed, latterly extending like the faint extending circle around a recent ink spot on blotting-paper. The clearness, and the vigour, with which he detailed all this, and more, were amazing in one already so very weak, and so very near the last ebb-wave of the tide of life.

Let me remark further, that his death has broken asunder several curious links by which, through him as it were, we felt connected with the past. For example,—as I was reminded when lately down in that part of the country,-he was the last of the stars that forty years ago dwelt on the banks of the Tweed, and formed the constellation of friends that then and there clustered around the Great Wizard of the North at Abbotsford, where Sir David, then Dr Brewster, was a constant and welcome visitor. In the first years of this century—1802-1803—he was much, when in London, with Cavendish, connecting us thus with the grand band of philosophers who at that date made the science of England so renowned. Married, first, to a daughter of the well-known James Macpherson, the translator of Ossian, he thus carried us backward, as it were, to the time-more than a hundred years ago-when Johnson, Blair, Home, and others, disputed so acrimoniously as to whether Ossian's poems were true or false; ancient or modern. I would make only one remark more in this direction. Professor Fraser told me today what I have heard before with regard to

the almost mathematical exactitude and correctness of his mental work, that in the seven years during which he (Professor Fraser) was editor of the North British Review, Sir David Brewster contributed an article to every number; and he had been a contributor for years before to this, as to other periodicals. But the certainty of his work was more wondrous than even the amount of it. For he was in the habit of stating—as Professor Fraser informs me-not only the day when his first slip of paper would arrive, and the day when his article would be finished; but his manuscripts came as they were writtenday after day, and sheet after sheet-without the aid and necessity of correcting the latter by the revisal of those preceding. In these literary and scientific articles, he thus worked with the methodized precision and regularity of a mechanical rather than of a mental machine.

Sir David Brewster must have been originally endowed with a robust and iron constitution. Few men ever reached the age of eighty-seven with an intellect so unimpaired and an ear so acute. In later years, however, he had repeated attacks of serious illness. But since he attended the meeting of the British Association at Dundee in Autumn last; where he was carried out from one of its crowded meetings in a state of syncope, his health has rapidly declined. He died ultimately of an attack of pneumonia and bronchitis. A rigor, ushering in the fatal illness, occurred eight days previous to death. From the date of its occurrence, he felt and stated that the grasp of the cold hand of death was now fixed upon him, and that he had very few days to live. Yet, though feeble and weak, he rose and worked for a few hours daily. Three days before he died he insisted on dressing and going into his study, where he dictated several farewell letters, and amongst others, one to our secretary, Dr Balfour. "Permit me," he plcd with those around him, and who anxiously wished him to remain quiet, " permit me to rise once more, for I have still a little work to

do." "I know," he added, "it is the last time I shall ever be in my study." Towards the end of that day's exertions his friend and pastor, Mr Cousin, visited him. "My race," said he to Mr Cousin, "is now quite run. I am now of no use either to myself or to others, and I have no wish to linger longer here." "Yet," he added after a while-" yet it is not without a wrench that one parts from all those he has loved so dearly." To Mr Phin, and other clerical friends, he freely expressed in these—his last days—the unbounded and undoubting faith of a very humble and a very happy Christian. No shadow of doubt ever once seemed to cloud his mind. In his march toward, and through, the river of death, it seemed, as I heard a friend remark, as if Christ were ever whispering into his ear, "Fear thou not, for I am with thee," "Be of good cheer, it is I." Like my former dear friend and old school companion, Professor John Reid, he appeared to be impressed with the idea that one of the great joys and glories of heaven would consist in

the revelation of all the marvels and mysteries and laws of creation and science by Him by whom "all things were made;" and who, as Professor George Wilson held, was not only the Head of the Church, but "the Head of the Schools of Science," as he is indeed the centre and origin and source of all Science. "I have," he remarked to me, "been very happy here; but I shall soon be infinitely happier there with my Saviour and Creator." As death drew more and more nigh, the one idea of his Saviour, and of his being speedily and eternally with Him, grew stronger and more absorbing.

His elder daughter arrived from a great distance about twenty-four hours before he died. "He often," she writes me, "during that time spoke of the different members of his family whom he would meet in Heaven. On one of these occasions he paused, and seemed to gather up his strength to say, with a wonderful power and emphasis, 'I shall see Jesus too—Jesus who created all things—Jesus who made the worlds—I shall see Him as He

is.' I said, 'You will understand everything then,' and it seemed to me as if the 'Oh yes,' of his answer came out of the very fulness of content. Once I said to him, 'I wish all learned men had your simple faith.' Again there was the pause, and each word was dropped out with a never to be forgotten weight of meaning: 'I have had the light for many years, and oh! how bright it is. I feel so safe, so perfectly safe, so perfectly happy.'"

A near connection, but not a relative, who in former years often lived in his house, and latterly formed one of the three loving watchers by his deathbed, writes me this characteristic and striking anecdote:— "When we were living in his house at St. Andrews twelve years ago, he was much occupied with the microscope; and, as was his custom always, he used to sit up studying it after the rest of the household had gone to bed. I often crept back into the room on the pretence of having letters to write or something to finish, but just to watch him.

After a little he would forget that I was there, and I have often seen him suddenly throw himself back in his chair, lift up his hands, and exclaim, 'Good God! Good God! Good! Good! How marvellous are thy works.'" Remembering these scenes I, on Sunday morning (the day before he died) said to him that it had been given to him to show forth much of God's great and marvellous works, and he answered, "Yes, I found them to be great and marvellous, and I have felt them to be His."

As a physician, I have often watched by the dying; but I have never seen a deathbed scene more full of pure love and faith than our late President's was. His deathbed was indeed a sermon of unapproachable eloquence and pathos in its silence as well as in its words. For there he lay, this greatest and most illustrious of modern philosophers, this hoary grand arch-priest of science, passing fearlessly through the valley of death, sustained and gladdened with the all-simple and all-sufficient Chris-

tian faith of a very child; and looking forward with unclouded intellect, and bright and happy prospects, to the mighty change that was about to carry him from time to eternity. "I feel," writes the lady whose note I have last quoted-"I feel that words express very little of that death-bed, for the marvellous triumph of mind over matter, of grace over nature, was shown, not so much in words as in the whole spirit of the scene. I never saw a soul actually pass away before, but I thank God I have been present when his passed away. The sight was a cordial from Heaven to me. I believed before, but now I have seen, that Christ has truly abolished death."

I hope I shall be kindly excused by the Society if I have dwelt too long on the task which the Council have imposed on me. May I be permitted to add one single remark more? Sir David Brewster appears to have left for us all a deep, and touching, and marvellous lesson, alike in his life and in his death. In his life he has

shown us what a gifted and gigantic intellect can effect, when conjoined with industry and energy, in the way of unveiling and unfolding the secret laws and phenomena of nature. In his death he has shown us that one, possessing an intellect so gifted and so gigantic, could possess also and lean upon the faith of a pure and simple-hearted Chris-That faith made, to him, the dreaded darkness of the valley of death, a serene scene of beauty and brightness. May God grant that it do so to every one of us. His spirit even now seems to me to be beckoning on the votaries of literature and science, here and elsewhere, along that path which he has so gloriously trodden-upward and heavenward and Christward.

Mr David Stevenson, civil-engineer said —In common, I am sure, with all now present, I have listened with great satisfaction to Sir James Simpson's beautiful notice of the late distinguished Principal of our University and President of our Society,—whose numer-

ous and valuable contributions to science and literature, during a lifetime remarkably prolonged, call not only for special acknowledgement in this Society, but demand the substantial recognition of his fellow-countrymen. I most cordially concur in the sentiments that have been uttered, and especially in the feeling of sympathy that has been expressed for Lady Brewster and the other members of the family, in the bereavement which has taken place; and I have therefore to thank the Council of the Society for their considerate kindness in affording me this opportunity, which I cheerfully embrace, of seconding the motion which Sir James has submitted to the meeting in terms at once so eloquent and so appropriate to the circumstances in which we are met together this evening. I am well aware that this is neither the time nor the place to refer to matters of a personal nature. But I am sure the Society will not accuse me of trangressing the bounds of strict propriety if I venture, in a single sentence, to add that, for myself and other

members of my family who have unfortunately had occasion to differ from Sir David Brewster, it is my own as I know it is their sincere desire, that in the grave which has closed over the veteran philosopher all past animosities may not only be buried, but be for ever forgotten.

The resolution was unanimously adopted, and the public business of the Society proceeded with. hav Houvens

Within the space of 50 years Macaulay has counted among the sons and grandsons of the Countess Temple alone, and she died in 1752, three First Lords of the Treasury (George Grenville, W. Pitt, and Lord Grenville), three Secretaries of State, two Keepers of the Privy Seal, and four First Lords of the Admiralty. Although Lord Palmerston belonged to a different branch of the Temple family, he too, whose father had been a Lord both of the Admiralty and of the Treasury, looked forward to political life, and, in 1806, infinediately on the death of Pitt, offered himself to the University of Cambridge as a candidate to represent it in Parliament.







GENERAL MOURAVEEFF. - The death of General Mouravieff, so unpleasantly notorious in connexion with the suppression of the last Polish insurrection, has been reported by telegraph. It appears that he died of apoplexy, at his country house, near St. Petersburg, on Tuesday morning. The deceased was a member of an old Russian family, and was born at Moscow in 1793. He entered the military service in 1810, and was for some time attached to the staff of the army of the Caucasus. In 1819 he was intrusted by General Jermoloff with a mission to the Shah of Persia, at Khiva, the particulars of which he has himself recorded in a pamphlet. Being promoted to the rank of major general during the war with Persia, he distinguished himself before Kars in 1828, and before Kabla in 1829. In 1830 he actively served in the war with Poland, contributing greatly to the victory of Kazimiez, where his gallautry procured for him the grade of lieutenant-general. He commanded the right wing of the army at the capture of War-saw, and was intrusted in 1832 with the negotiation for the suspension of hostilities with Mehemet Ali, Viceroy of Egypt, when he received the command of the troops on the Bosphorus, and in 1835 that of the 5th Corps of Infantry. In 1838 he fell into disgrace with the Czar, owing to certain disorders which had broken out in his corps, and for having neglected the care of the defence of Sebastopol. In 1848 he was reinstated in his military position, and became member of the Council of War and Commander of the Grenadiers of the Guard. In 1851, on the outbreak of the Crimean war, he was appointed to the command of the army in Asia, and after a severe repulse by Sir W. F. Williams, before Kars, succeeded eventually in occupying that place on the latter evacuating it, and surrendering as a prisoner of way. At the peace he took the command of the army of the Caucasus, where his operations resulted in breaking the power of Schamyl, who surrendered to one of his efficers in 1859. Whereas, in reality, we are now working easily all kinds of schemes of a similar tendency, which to a past generation appeared the most visionary of caprices, while the cost of punishing the crimes which result from our present neglect of the hordes of undeveloped criminals is nothing less than enormous.

In the second place, the foundation and the management of the institutions contemplated by the Industrial Schools Act must be made an affair of national recognition. It is useless to trust to the charity of individuals or local bodies, or to the zeal of theological partisanship, to rise to the level of so vast a design. The national care of the destitute, old, middle aged, and young, by a universally enforced poor law, is now as truly a part of the English Constitution at the three estates of the realm. And there can be no satisfactory solution of the terrific criminal question until we recognize the duty of doing for the children who are worse than fatherless and motherless what we do on so gigantic a scale for the orphans of the mere pauper. The establishment of industrial schools or reformatories for young children must be a charge upon the national exchequer, or upon local town and country resources. An appeal and misoriarritum like that of Mr. Woolrych must be made an impossibility. And we entirely agree with Lord Houghton that the country, and not the town, is the place for such institutions, and that as far as possible they should adopt the Redhill Reformatory as their model. If the sensibilities of religious bodies are wounded by the State's adoption of the outcasts for whom they themselves have done nothing, they have but to continue their present plans, and keep up industrial schools where the Thirty-nine Articles or the decrees of Trent or the Assembly's Catechism may be sedulously and exclusively inculcated. But for the misrable throng of boys and girls who belong to no Church save the universal community of thieves, the State must come in as the State, and do its duty; for we may rest assured that the work it has to do is beyond the stretch of any abilities but its own.

BULLETIN OF FOREIGN POLITICS.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENCE.)

A CORRESPONDENT from Florence says:—"Now that Venetia has been finally incorporated with the Italian kingdom the subject which most occupies politicians here is the forthcoming session of the Chamber, which is to meet on the 12th of December. On this occasion, besides the old depaties, there will be fifty new members from Venetia, who are to be elected on the 25th inst. There is a very general impression that even with this reinforcement the Chamber, as at present constituted, will not be an efficient representation of the people, as the strength of the revolutionary element in the House is out of all proportion with its real influence in the coentry. A dissolution of the Chamber, followed by a general election, has been proposed as the only remedy for this anomaly, but Baron Ricasoli is opposed to this measure on the ground that it might lay him open to the charge of bad faith. Notwithstanding this, it is generally believed that the session will be a very short one, and that the present deputies will be allowed to retain their seats only for so long as will be necessary to give them an opportunity of voting the union of Venetia to Italy and settling some of the more pressing questions of finance, after which Ricasoli, if he still remain in power, will no longer have any reason to postpone the dissolution of the present parliament, and the election of new members who would be more suitable representatives of public opinion. As for the Roman question, there is a very strong feeling in favour of a reconciliation with the Pope, and I hear that it is not improbable that Signor Vegezzi may be again sent on a mission to Rome with that object before many days are out."

The Count, who is now at Vienna, enjoys the confidence both of the Emperor and the Ministry, and has had repeated interviews with his Majesty, Count Beleredi, Baron Beust, and Count Komers, the Minister of Justice. It is stated on good authority that the Emperor has not only abolished the separate Government Commission which has hitherto sat at Cracow, but that he has also held out hopes of the appointment of a Chancellor for Galicia, who would occupy a similar position to that of the Chancellor of Croatia.

Some curious facts have transpired in regard to the negotiations entered into by Baron Beust with the Prussian Government for the settlement of the commercial relations between Austria and Prussia. The first despatch proceeded from Baron Beust, and is dated the 8th inst. Referring to the thirteenth article of the peace of Prague, by which it is provided that negotiations on this subject are to be opened as speedily as possible between the two Powers, the Austrian Cabinet points out the inconvenience of any further delay, and urges that of Berlin to state whether and how soon it will be prepared to give effect to the article in question. It now appears from the communications made by Prussia in reply to this despatch that she considers it unadvisable to discuss the matter until after the German Parliament shall have expressed its opinion in regard to the future organization of the Zollverein. zation of the Zollverein.

'L'Amour est Mon Péché' (Paris: Calmann Lévy) is by the author of 'Amitié Amoureuse,' a volume which created something of a sensation, and was, by some hasty critics, attributed to Guy de Maupassant. The present work manifests unusual power and literary skill. In form it is the diary of a high-strung and high-bred French girl who comes of a noble but impoverished family, and is constrained by her necessities to accept a position as governess and companion in an aristocratic English household. Its interest hinges on the one topic that furnishes forth the staple of French fiction; but this inevitable feature is kept out of sight so long that the reader might go through two-thirds of the story under the agreeable delusion that he had at last found a French novel which was inoffensive without being inane. Another original trait is that the author holds up to real and not to hypocritical reprobation the sin he depicts, and thereby gains for his book a moral dignity which is infrequent in Gallic literature.

'Die Verwirrung der Kunstbegriffe,' by Wilhelm Trübner (Frankfort: Literarische Anstalt), is a little work which owes its origin to the growing tendency of many contemporary painters to break away from conventionalism, and to strive after greater independence of artistic conception and representation. It is calculated to throw light upon various phases of modern art, and deserves to be as favorably received as was the same author's 'Das Kunstverständniss von Heute,' published anonymously half-adozen years ago.

The sixteenth annual report of the Dante Society of Cambridge, Mass. (Boston: Ginn & Co.), tells of a prosperous year, and shows the Society's collection of books to have trebled in the past twelve or thirteen years. The number of volumes now exceeds 2,000. The rest of the report is divided between Theodore W. Koch's list of additions from 1895 to 1897, and a valuable collation of Prof. Rajna's critical text of the 'De Vulgari Eloquentia' with Dr. Moore's Oxford text of 1894, by Paget Toynbee. Prof. Rajna's text has been reedited by himself, and the results are given in an appendix. Amusing is the way a Tuscan scribe garbles the title to Book I., chapter 13, in which Dante stigmatized the Tuscan dialect as preëminent for its baseness. The scribe substituted excelens for turpissimum, perhaps.

The committee of Italian scholars who have in charge the preparation for the twelfth International Congress of Orientalists is evidently determined to get ready in The convention has been appointed for the first two weeks in October, 1899, and will be held in Rome. Several weeks age a Preliminary Appeal was issued, and this is now followed by a First Bulletin, in which comparatively complete reports are given on the prospective work of the congress. The Bulletin states that there will be twelve dif-ferent sections, one of them (that on India) being divided into two branches Special sub-committees, representing the various Italian universities, have been appointed for the several sections, and in many cases two and three committees for sub-sections in one chief department. The Bulletin contains also letters from prominent scholars in England, France, Germany, and Italy, promising cooperation. During the session papers may be read and discussions held in Italian, Latin, French, German, and English, and for international correspondence the French has been selected. The Bulletin is in this language. Further preparatory reports will be published in December.

The Riga Tageblatt publishes extracts from a series of educational articles written by the School Curator of the Caucasus district that illustrates the peculiar phases of higher education in Russia. The Curator says: "So many lectures must be attended by the student that it is impossible for him to devote his attention to any particular branch in which he may be specially interested. If he has an inclination to specialism, he cannot follow this inclination before the completion of the regular university course, and it is not every student who is so situated that he can do this. The superficiality thus engendered affects his whole life work." Curator points out the fact that the academic year in the university course of Russia, if the time devoted to examinations be deducted, really covers only five or six months, and that the professors, in order at least nominally and formally to cover their subjects, are compelled to crowd into this short period an altogether too large number of lectures. He also complains that there are so many examinations that the time for lectures is unduly curtailed. It seems, however, that Russian educators are preparing to do away with some of these evils. In the Mosc district a number of examinations have already been abolished, and a conference of the directors of the technical schools has asked for further changes in this direction.

The Geographical Journal for August contains a paper by Dr. Sir John Murray on the annual range of temperature in the surface waters of the ocean, which is largely a commentary on the acc Upon this the ocean is divided by colors into five great zones, to represent intervals of 10 degrees Fahrenheit of range of temperature, while lines are drawn for intervals of 5 degrees Fahrenheit. In closing, the writer treats briefly of the relation of range of temperature to biological phenomena, and especially to the destruction of life, as of the tile-fish on our coasts in 1882. In an account of an exploration in 1897 of some Spitsbergen glaciers, Sir. W. Martin Conway develops a theory of glacial action by which he attempts to explain some of the natural features of certain Alpine and Himalayan valleys. He also dwells upon the necessity of distinguishing between the action of an ice-sheet and a glacier. "Under an icesheet, the forces acting on the land-surface are conservative"-that is, the moving ice does little beyond polishing the surface of the rock it covers. "In the case of a glacial region the acting forces are formative."

The death is announced of the Danish composer Emil Hartmann. Born in Copenhagen, February 21, 1836, he came of a remarkable musical family. His father, J. E. P. Hartmann, who is still living at the age of ninety-three, is an even more popular composer in Denmark than the son; his grandfather was an organist, and his greatgrandfather, a Silesian by birth, enjoyed considerable vogue in Copenhagen as a co poser during the latter part of the eighteenth century. Apart from his work as a composer, Hartmann's life was almost wholly uneventful. In 1861 he was appointed organist at St. John's Church in Copenhagen, and ten years later he was transferred to the Palace Church, where he remained until his death. For a short time he directed the Music Society of Copenhagen. His compositions (in all forms), which enjoy special favor in Germany, show great variety, though almost all share the Northern coloring that distinguishes the works of his brother-in-law Gade and his father. He was remarkably successful as an orchestral leader, and appeared frequently at concerts both at bome and abroad. In Denmark Emil Hartmann suffered in reputation from being the son of his father.

-For many years Mr. William Spohn Baker was an ardent collector of Washingtoniana, and late in life he began to use this material in compilations designed to assist others in following Washington's career almost from day to day. The last of the series, 'Washington After the Revolution,' was fortunately completed before Mr. Baker's death, and now appears in book form, a worthy companion to the earlier issues (Philadelphia: Lippincott). Without reference to the connection of events. a note is made of the more important incidents in Washington's private and official life from 1784 to 1799, and the record is generally in Washington's own words. A few impressions of contemporaries are included, and fewer reminiscences of those writing long after the events. It would be unkind to criticise too closely the mode of selection, for a genial tone runs through the volume and rather adds to the personal interest. The man receives more attention than passing events, and it is Washington as a farmer, a land speculator, an undertaker of canal improvements, a President and Lieutenant-General that is emphasized. The real history of the day passed over, and the political intrigues that were carried on around Washington have no attraction for the compiler. Where the President dined or attended the theatre; how he behaved at a levée or impressed a visitor; what success attended him in foxhunting, and what places he visited in his tours to the East and South, are recorded with a fulness leaving little to require. The more serious topics must be sought elsewhere.

-Naturally there is much of curious interest in these disconnected jottings. journey to his Western lands, Washington does not visit his people on a Sunday because they were "apparently very religious." During the sittings of the Constitutional Convention he goes to see a mangle at Dr. Franklin's, and gravely notes, "which Machine from the facility with which it despatches business is well calculated for Table cloths & such articles as have not pleats & irregular foldings, and would be very useful in all large families." The model of Rumsey's steamboat hardly excited greater interest in him. On a Sunday he sends his "two Jackasses to the Election at Marlborough in Maryland, that they might be seen"-a feature of elections long since abandoned. When making his Eastern tour, he received an invitation to attend the funeral of the wife of a New York Senator, but "declined complying with it-first, because the propriety of accepting any invitation of this sort appeared very questionable-and secondly, (though to do it in this instance might not be improper), because it might be difficult to discriminate in cases which might hereafter happen." The comment on attending morning service at the Dutch Reformed Church may be placed next: "which, being in that



language [Dutch] not a word of which I understood I was in no danger of becoming a proselyte to its religion by the eloquence of the preacher." Attempts at humor on Washington's part were very infrequent and were very grim indeed. It may be noticed that Mr. Baker includes the exhibition of temper over St. Clair's defeat, although Mr. Morse has given proof that the story is untrue. The account of the Randolph incident is too partial to Randolph. The copyists of the Diaries have played strange pranks with names, and for this Mr. Baker cannot be held responsible.

-An obituary notice of the late Thomas Sterry Hunt, by James Douglas, has been reprinted from the memorial volume of the American Philosophical Society. One of the most versatile and distinguished men of science of his generation, Hunt's posthumous reputation has suffered from the effects of his controversial disposition, while his really great contributions to the chemistry of geology are appreciated only by a select few. He was born September 5, 1826, in Norwich, Conn., and died in New York February 12, 1892, after a lingering illness which he supported with the utmost fortitude. He was a natural student, and rose, from almost menial duties as a boy, by unswerving application and native genius, to a position of acknowledged distinction in the scientific world. From an assistant in Silliman's laboratory he passed to the position of chemist and mineralogist to the Geological Survey of Canada, became professor of chemistry in the Laval University and subsequently in McGill University. and later professor of geology in the Boston Institute of Technology. He became a fellow of the Royal Society and a member of the National Academy of Sciences, and was made chevalier and officer of the Legion of Honor, among many other testimonials to his scientific eminence. Perhaps his most interesting contribution to applied science was his invention of the sesquioxide of chromium ink, as a safeguard against counterfeiters, which, first employed in Canada, has penetrated the civilized world on the "greenbacks" of the United States. Mr. Douglas's memoir is written in excellent taste, and, without concealing the foibles of its subject, justly insists on the ardor and courage with which Hunt met their consequences, and the importance of his contributions to science. Of these the bibliography, appended to the paper, covers seventeen pages.

-A volume of travels of rather exceptional merit is the work of Paul Rohrbach, entitled 'In Turan und Armenien' (Berlin: G. Stilke). The subtitle, "Auf den Pfaden russischer Weltpolitik," prepares one for matter of interest not only to the Oriental archeeologist, but to the student of the problems and perplexities of modern world politics. The author was exceptionally well fitted for his task, by a good acquaintance with the historical ups and downs of the districts visited-mainly from the neighborhood of the Caspian Sea to Samarkand, Bokhara, and Merv, as well as by his ability to use the Russian language as easily as a native. He explains the almost phenomenal success of the Russians in spreading their influence in these territories by their ability patiently to adapt themselves to the peculiarities of Oriental nationalities, including the Moslem peoples. His observations confirm a general opinion that Russia's civilizing mission finds its proper sphere of operation in Asia, and not in Europe. On the vexed question as to the noble or ignoble character of the martyr nation of Armenians, the author reports that the small merchant minority of the Armenians, with whom other Orientals and Europeans come in contact, amply deserve the bad reputation they bear, but that, as regards fully 90 per cent. of the Armenians, the conviction expressed by Moltke half a century ago must be upheld, namely, that they are a peaceable and industrious peasant and shepherd population, and politically perfectly harmones.

HEARNIUS REDIVIVUS.

Remarks and Collections of Thomas Hearne, Vol. IV. (Dec. 15, 1712—Nov. 30, 1714). Edited by D. W. Rannie, M.A. Oxford: Printed for the Oxford Historical Society at the Clarendon Press. New York: Henry Fronde, 1888.

Not only are we compelled to place a Latin title at the head of this article, it is with difficulty that we refrain from attempting to write of Hearne in the language which he regarded as the proper dialect of scholars. When treating of trivial, every-day affairs, English is good enough for him, but let it be the important question of a rare coin in the Ray collection at the "Bodlejan," and he at once drops the vulgar for the learned tongue. "In Bibl. Bodl. habemus nummum argenteum Balbini, in cujus parte aversa legitur FIDES MVTVA AVG G CC. Hunc non habet Occo. Nec quidem alibi inveni." How can one communicate the flavor of such a man, unless he use the medium of communication which served the grammarians and antiquaries of 200 years ago? They pickled in the brine of academic Latin (that there was not much Affic salt in Oxford when Hearne came to it the Phalaris controversy will witness), and it has preserved them well, if any one cares to search for them in the museum. Briefly, Hearne is unknown outside the small circle of amateur and professional bookworms, who would probably prefer a Latin discourse on him to an English essay.

When we term this circle of bookworms "small," we apply the word relatively. The bibliography of fifty years past shows that a considerable number of people still exist who will buy Hearne's books and books about him. In 1848 a 'Bibliotheca Hearniana,' or excerpts from Hearne's Catalogue, appeared: in 1857 Dr. Philip Bliss published 'Reliquim Hearnianm,' a series of excerpts from his diaries, and this anthology, having found its way into a second edition, 1869, is given an honored place on the shelves of the students who own it; finally, in 1884, the Oxford Historical Society began its publications with the Register of the University, Vol. I., and Hearne's Collections, Vol. I. To be granted precedence of Anthony Wood, and that in Oxford itself, would be a distinc tion worth putting to our antiquary's credit if we could be sure that he was not taken up first on the grounds of bulk and editorial difficulty. Certainly the task of selecting from and editing his bundred-odd MS. volumes of diary has till now made but moderate progress. In the fourteenth year from the outset, we receive the fourth volume, and an interval of nine years separates it from vol. iii. This tedious delay, however, can be accounted for by a change of editors. Mr. Doble, a very accomplished expert, having brought down the notes and journals from July 4, 1704, to December 14, 1712, was forced to relinquish the task, and his successor, Mr. Rannie, has doubless found that the first step costs a good deal. But though the labor of choice, transcription, and annotation has been slow, its fruit is excellent, and for our own part we are not sorry to resume the subject at greater length than we should had the sequence of volumes been more rapid.

One characteristic of the true antiquary is that he goes through life without ever being young. Hearne's boyhood was spent in learning Latin, he took his Oxford B.A. at twenty-one and at twenty-three he was an assistant in the Bodleian, where he employed what leisure he could snatch voluntarily correcting the catalogue. The point at which the present instalment of his diary starts is 1712. He had then risen to be assistant keeper and janitor of his beloved library, ingeniously securing the latter post in order to range the building free from every hindrance. He was still at a lusty age, thirty-four, yet no token of exuberance rises to the surface unless he is required to slate a piece of bad scholarship, or to register his scorn of some time-server who has renounced allegiance to the Stuarts. Modern Oxford boasts that whereas the German universities produce scholars, she produces statesmen. Hearne, despite his allegiance to a lost cause, was no statesman nor politician; but he was a scholar like him of Stacey Marks's picture, or of whom Southey sings: "My days among the dead are past."

The early eighteenth century can muster a fairly large band of devotees to litera humasieres and archeology-men who watched the seething and churning rapid of human action from the bank, yet who in a literary sense may be called belated humanists. Many of them preferred the acquisition of knowledge to its diffusion or transference from one book to another, and, if they happened to command independent means, published little, sometimes nothing. Hearne was of a different disposition. He had within certain limits a utilitarian instinct, and wished to contribute his share to the common store of erudition. Writing July 13, 1713, to one who had sent him a present of six guineas (presumably to assist in the publication of unremunerative books) he says: "Tho' I have not those Abilities we might capacitate me for doing great things, yet I am sensible that I have a good Intention, and that I have accordingly applyed my self to do as much publick service as can be exspected from Persons in my mean Circumstances." one is glad that his infinite industry had its reward; for, quite apart from any value we may assign to these diaries and to his editions of Leland, the series of English mediaval historians which he issued held the field till this last generation. It is perhaps fortunate that Hearne belonged to a sect of political pariahs, the Non-jurors, for thus he escaped the misfortune of excessive attention. His curiosity was so general that, once courted by patrons of the classics, he might have been altogether deflected from the department of English antiquities, where he was sorely needed.



The conduct of Marcus Aurelius in yielding to the cry of "The Christians to the lious!" is compared to that of some eminent modern statesmen who have let themselves be carried away by the similar cry of "No Popery!" Is not this a little too political for Sunday! At best it is like an answer to some of those sermons that are preached in support of the Irish Church. But this is not the normal tone of Mr. Farrar's book. Take it for all in all, it answers fully to its purpose, that of providing pleasant and instructive matter of a kind well suited for the day of rest, and of keeping that day from being either frivolous with worldly reading or vexatious with dozing over homilies. whom he has chosen for his subjects either ignored,

This title is far too pretentious for a simple paper of forty-two pages, which was read before the Geologists' Association of London, and which contains little or nothing of particular value. Phillips and Tyndall. We need say no more, especially as the series of papers which appeared in our columns during the continuance of the recent eruption gives information on many phenomena which Mr. Lobley has never mentioned.

Whilst crediting the author of 'Peggy' with humane and laudable intentions, we are constrained to say that we would as soon put poison in our little ones' bread and milk, or impregnate the air they breathe with noxious gases, as place his capitally-written volume on their shelves of nursery literature. That an able and manifestly conscientious writer could even think of making entertainment for nurselings out of such appalling miseries and brutal crimes as crush and grind the life out of Peggy and her miserable mother is a noteworthy illustration of the evil effect which the recent seasationalism of romantic art has had on kindly natures. It is with regret that we speak thus unfavourably of a tale whose literary merit is very considerable; but what else can we do when the strength and the erre of the author's style only heighbon the unpleasantness and pernicious effect of his "lelineations?"

THE SOLAR ECLIPSE.

I have just received a letter, dated August 23-25, from Major Tennant, which, I believe, will be interesting to your readers, as it contains some results which he has obtained by a closer examination of his photographs than was practicable when he sent off his letter to the Astronomer Royal on the day of the Eclipse, an abstract of which appeared in the last number of the Atheneum. I beg to direct the attention of your readers to the spiral structure of the "great horn," as an observation of much importance. While I avail myself of this opportunity of mentioning that a similar but closer spiral structure is visible in the boomerang prominence depicted in my photographs of the total eclipse of 1860, I wish at the same time to state, that the credit of having first pointed out this peculiarity is due to Major Tennant. In his letter to the Astronomer Royal, Major Tennant describes the prominence in question as "somewhat zigzagged, like a flash of lightning." This description ascords with the appearance an open spiral structure would present. Warrier De La Rue.

I did myself the pleasure of sending Mr. Airy a report, such as I could hurriedly make, upon the 18th, of what we had seen and done. Since then we have been enlarging the photographs, and I am very well satisfied. The clouds reduced the actinism very much and very unequally, but that has shown new things to me. 1st. There is very little corona. 2nd. The cloudy structure of prominences is very marked. But the most remarkable thing is a great horn, which seems to have been 3° 20° nearly high. I have, as I told Mr. Airy, clearly seen in its spectrum C D and 6, and believe I saw F, but did not identify it. Now, this shows both in Nos. 1 and 3 [photographs] as a ribbon of light, coiled spirally round a semi-transparent centre. It is very beautiful, and marked in 3 which was taken two minutes after the [commencement of] totality, and I am doing my best to keep this feature [to rotain this feature] in the copies. No. 1 was taken apparently before the last of the sum went. Phillips [one of his assistants] says it was, and there is a spot of fog such as would be the result. There is a fine line of light seen through all this fog, much brighter than the corona. This, too, I am keeping on enlarging. We have got six enlarged positives about 24 inches in diameter from each negative. Every one of these shows the same remarkable spiral structure in the great horn. I find there are traces in a drawing which Dr. Janssen got made of that prominence [montioned in the first part of his letters as invisible to the eye] of which I spoke. The positive copies I will enlarge to 9 inches.

The Athenous of Sept. 19th contains a letter from Dr. Wallich, in which he says that Prof. Huxley was wrong in attributing to me the discovery that what Ehrenberg had described as "the crystalloids" of the chalk are not of crystalline origin, but are similar to the coccoliths of the

Atlantic mud. Dr. Wallich claims this discovery as his own; but in doing so seems strangely to have overlooked what he had previously written. His first paper in the 'Annals of Natural History' (3 Ser. vii. 396) contains no reference at all to chalk; but in the second (viii. 52), as he says in his letter, "the identification of the coccoliths of the soundings with those of the chalk was announced for the first time"; but he most distinctly announced that the discovery was made by me. My paper 'On the Organic Origin of the so-called Crystalloids of the Chalk' was not printed till two months later; but then I had described to him personally what I had observed before he published his paper; and this explains why he was acquainted with it before any account had appeared in print. Dr. Wallich says, "These minute bodies, however, possess a high degree of interest apart from that arising from their association with the deep-sea deposits actually taking place in our day, and this renders it particularly desirable that the attention of observers should be directed to them. I allude to the discovery in the chalk by Mr. H. C. Sorby, of Sheffield, of objects either identical with them or so nearly identical as to leave no doubt of their close affinity, and to the important additional evidence herein furnished regarding the identity in origin of some of the recent and more ancient oceanic deposits."

If "wine maketh glad the heart of man" there should be great rejoicing in this fair land of sunny France, for God has blessed Burgundy with a most wonderful vintage this year. An invitation from a gentleman of this town largely engaged in the wine trade to be present at the vintage drew me hither. "You will see," he wrote, "a very remarkable sight, for seldom has the Côte d'Or, even in the most famous vintage years, borne such a grape crop as that of this year." He did not exaggerate. The vines are literally bowed down beneath the weight of fruit, the purple glory culminating to extraordinary richness between Beame and the famous Clos de Vougeot. My friend drove me to the latter vineyard yesterday (fifteen miles from this town). Both sides of the road were almost purple with grapes, which seemed to outnumber the vine-leaves. The great size and lusciousness of the fruit are also very remarkable. But as a perfect agricultural crop is a kind of phenomenon rarely witnessed, the vineyard proprietors complain, and I believe justily, that the excessive heat of this summer has had the effect of ripening the grapes exposed to the full influence of the sun too rapidly. Thus, although the crop is enormous, the wine-yield will not be quite so great as was expected some months ago. Still, the quantity that will be made in Burgundy this year will be far

above the average, and, what is of even greater consequence, it will be of a very superior quality.

All the way to Vougeot, the road was alive with peasants engaged in the vintage. Many of them have come this year from very distant localities, in the expectation of receiving high wages. Nor have they been disappointed. The demand for labour in the vineyards is so great, that as much as five francs a day is offered by some vine-proprietors, who are anxious to garner their rich crops speedily. As early as three o'clock in the morning, I am roused by not very harmonious trumpet blasts, which continue for half an hour until all the men and women who are engaged vintaging around Beaune, and who have slept for the most part on straw, in barns and outhouses, are gathered together. Then after a drink of weak wine they go forth to their labour in apparently joyous mood, for the streets echo their songs, which refer for the most part to the vintage. Here is a stanza from one frequently sung, which is significant of unquiet nights:—

Prior to the great French Revolution several cere monies were observed in Beaune having reference to the vintage. The most important was that entitled *Le Ban*. This gave authority to the mayor entitled Le Ben. This gave authority to the mayor of the town to open the vintage when he thought proper. Nor was vintaging allowed to be carried on in any vineyard without his permission. Having procured information from competent and trust-worthy persons respecting the condition of the grapes, when they were pronounced to be fit for gathering in a vineyard, he proceeded just before dawn to the public square, accompanied by the town authorities. There, trumpets having sounded, by the light of torches he made known what vineyards were to be vintaged, and any vinewhat vineyards were to be vintaged, and any vine-proprietor infringing his orders was heavily fined. The sale of grapes, and the grappillage, or right of gleaning, were forbidden until the expiration of fifteen days after the vintage. All these restric-tions are at an end; the trempets which call the vintagers to their daily labour being the only relic of the Bass. But the Agricultural Society of Beaune in some measure fulfils the purposes of this ancient institution; for it is only when the Council of the Society (from personal observation) declare the grapes to be perfectly ripe that the vintage com-mences. At noon, as we drove along the road, the vintagers came from among the vines, and gathered in groups in the shade of the rich walnut-trees which fringe the vines in the Côte d'Or. Here they partook of their frugal repast. They do not eat meat; their dinner consisting of rather black bread, cheese, salad and light wine, but with an unlimited quantity of grapes, of which many eat enormously. On this fare they thrive, and are, with few exceptions, vigorous and well made.

But here we are at the famous Clos de Vougeot. You cannot well miss it, for over the great gateway which gives access to the vineyard the name is inscribed in large characters. We have a letter to the manager, and are admitted at once by the Concilerge, who is wary of strangers; and no wonder, for the Clos glows with rich purple, and every bunch of grapes is of considerable value this year. Most glorious is the sight. Not a weed is visible among the well-trimmed tofty vines, which, in many localities, bend beneath the purple fruit. Few persons are probably aware that it is the custom of Freuch troops when passing the Clos de Vougeot to present arms. Assuredly it deserves this honour. If Burgundy produces in a greater degree than any other country wines distinguished by their beautiful colour and exquisite flavour and aroma, the Côte d'Or produces the prince of Burgundy wines. No wonder that the kings of France should have coveted this rich territory. The Clos de Vougeot is surrounded by the famous vineyards of Nuits, Romanée and St. George; but the Clos

is as a british of the puress water amoust these jewels.

Clos de Vougeot originally belonged to the monks of the Abbey of Citeaux. They converted it into a vineyard, and spared no pains to carry its cultivation to the highest perfection. They succeeded beyond their expectations, and in their hands the Clos de Vougeot became the most famous vineyard in Bergundy. There are few more perplexing agricultural phenomena than the produce of vines. Here, as in almost all vine countries, is a small district (for the Clos de Vougeot only contains about 115 acres) consisting of light red loam, mixed with the débris of limestone, abounding with shells, similar, apparently, to the soil of neighbouring vineyards; and yet the latter never produce a wine at all equal in excellence to that of Vougeot. The vines in the upper part of the vineyard, which grow on very dry ground, produce the best wine. Those on the clay soil yield the ordinary vin de pays.

When the Recolution distributed the monks, and

When the Revolution disturbed the monks, and expelled them from their fine convent in the Clos, the celebrated vineyard became the property of Ouvrard, the loan-contractor. He made the garden near the ancient convent. Ouvrard, it may be remembered,

ancient convent. Onvrard, it may be remembered, had a passion for gardens, and it was to him that the fascinating Madame Tallien (afterwards his mistress) was indebted for what was at that period the loveliest garden in Paris. Subsequently, the Clos de Vougeet passed through various hands, and it now belongs to the Marquis de La Garde, of Paris. It is valued at two and a half million france. On arriving at the ci-decard convent, we were received by M. Roex, who has long been at the head of this great wine-making establishment. He was surrounded by a very army of workmen and women, no less than 830 being this year engaged in grape-picking and wine-making. Under the guidance of an intelligent foreman, we visited the vast cellars, which still contain the capacious tuns (each holding 900 gallons) used by the monks of old for the reception of the new wine. cious tuns (each holding 900 gallons) used by the monks of old for the reception of the new wine. They are still employed for this purpose, and it is only when you see their great number that you realize the enormous produce of this vineyard; and yet we read that the monks never sold their Bur-gundy, but made presents of what they did not consume themselves. M. Roux's face brightened when we congratulated him on the produce of this year's vintage. "Yes," he exclaimed, "it is truly marvellous, and, what is even better, the quantity of wine will not only be far in excess of the annual marvellous, and, what is even better, the quantity of wine will not only be far in excess of the annual average (250 hogsheads); but it will be of a very superior quality." And how transcendently delicious is the prime crus of the Clos de Vougeot you will not soon forget, if you have the good fortune to be favoured, as we were, with a "tasting order." It requires at least ten years to develope the exquisite flavour and aroma of this wine; but many thousand bottles which we saw in the cellars contain wine far older than this.

DEAN MILMAN.

IN the year 1783, when royalty still walked the pantiles at Tunbridge Wells, and led off country-dances there with blushing young daughters of the nobility and gentry; when balls opened at seven o'clock, when supper was announced at ten, and susceptible partners were dreaming of each other by midnight, there was a handsome physician who was the centle tyrant of the place, and whose by mininght, there was a manuscripe payacian who was the gentle tyrant of the place, and whose potentiality was pleasantly acknowledged by all sojourners, drinkers of the waters or idlers by the Wells. His name was Francis Milman; his ability

and his merits were equal to his fine physical quali-ties. He was the son of a distinguished Devonshire clergyman, and his mother was of an old family in that county, the Dyers of Levaton. Dr. Milman had not only all the qualifications to warrant his being the leading physician at the fashionable Wells, he had other recommendations which made him still more acceptable in the sure of "the Wells, he had other recommendations which made him still more acceptable in the eyes of "the quality," and of common people who imitated them. He had cured the King's brother, the Duke of Gloucester, of an indigestion, at Rome; and the healer of princes took first rank at Tunbridge from at he appeared there among the people

The father had the happier destiny of seeing all his sons prosperous. He lived to see his youngest emoble the family mane. To the long and illustrious roll of born Londoners, the last addition is the name of a man who belonged to the noble army of workers, and whose honourable place is among the scholars, poets, critics, historians and divines. 6.1791 x

The stricter folk of Reading and elsewhere were probably pacified by the writer's half-protest against the tragedy having been acted, and his ample assertion that he had had neither hand, voice nor opinion in making the alterations that were necessary to render it an acting drama. Pious people, however, satisfied themselves with prophesying that a vicar who wrote a drama that could be acted would never rise to higher dignity. The vicar kept after this a discreet silence, well content, no doubt, that the acting of the play had pushed the poem from a second to a sixth edition in one year. 'Fazio' brought the author more fame than the religious epic 'Samor, Lord of the Beight City,' which proved too beavy even for the meat resolutely pious, though monthly magazines took passages from it and illustrated them with engravings after wonderfully queer designs. Milman, when Professor of Poetry at Oxford, made amends for this failure by producing his dramatic poem, 'The Fall of Jerusalem,' and subsequently 'The Marty of Antioch,' and 'Belshazzar,' and to them he added his 'Aune Boleyn.' In Milman's own neighbourhood, the feeling aroused by this well-abused and popular 'History of the Jews' was more intense than elsewhere. He was now, in the opinions of the ultra-rightoous, a lost man, certainly as to preferment here, and possibly hereafter. There were clergymen who read the book with much enjoyment in their studies, and stowed it away at the back of upper shelves, leat sons and daughters should come at the forbidden fruit, and escape less easily than their sires from the consequences. The prelate hardly recovered his character when he grew alarmed, and left Milman to be pelted. Exaggerated as feeling then was in its manifestation against the Vicar of St. Mary's, it was met by manifestations of sentiment quite as exaggerated on the part of those fair young church-goers who, at all events, adored the poet, and did not censure the minister, either for rectifying Jewish history, or for saying, as he had done in his sermon on the death of Princess Charlotte, that "our piety should be founded upon, and regulated by, sound and sober reason." For them, the Margaret Professor, Gregory Faussett, declared in vain that a spirit of cavil and irreverence pervaded 'Milman's History of the Jews,' that its general tendency was acceptical, and that it bristled with unhallowed speculations. Milman was beffeted by many a zealous antagenist, but by no one more mercilessly than the Lady Margaret Professor.

The controversy was maintained with extraordinary bitterness; and even they who admitted the statements of the author of the 'History of the Jews,' looked upon him, and all of his profession who imitated him, as doomed to advance no higher in the Church! A few weeks after this article appeared, Milman, Moore and Mr. Murray were together in the publisher's parlour, where the divine learned, to his profound amazement, that Moore was the author of the article in question. When convinced of the authorship, Milman courageously (as he was wont) expressed his opinion of Gesenius, and that writer's work on Isaiah. Milman continued to hold the Deanery till his death, last week, after an attack of paralysis, at his rural retreat at Sunninghill, not very far from the locality where he commenced his career as Vicar. Between his appointment to the deanery and his demise, he only once grievensly offended those who seemed to look towards him for offence. Three years ago he advocated, not the modification of subscription to the Thirty-nine Articles, but its abolition. He advocated subscription to the Liturgy only, on the ground that the doctrines of our Church are more simply, fully, and more winningly taught in the Liturgy than in the Articles. Dean Milman saw clearly, moreover, that there was not merely a permanent but a progressive element in theology. This enlarged view, no doubt, alarmed many excellent persons. "The Right Hon. J. Napler," of Dublin, could not allow it to be held for a moment. He attacked the Dean, and probably thought that even if Milman had been willing to exchange his deanery for a bishopric, he had now forfeited all claim to have his willingness gratified.

His fame as a dramatic poet still lives; for his 'Fazio' is now being played on various provincial stages. As a divine, his Bampton Lectures, delivered in 1827, afford ample warrant of his excellence, His latest editions (and he worked at them to the last) of his several histories of the Jews, of Latin Christianity, and of Christianity down to the Abolition of Pogganism, have placed him in the first rank of historians. The many works he edited give evidence of his ability and research, and as a writer of prefaces he was nearer the standard of Dryden than any other Englishman. But there is another recollection which these crowded columns of candidates for public favour summon painfully up in the mind. Of all the hard-working crowd that thus struggles to find us amusement, how few there are who can ever win that eminence which they hoped to win when they took to music as a paying profession. Every profession has its failures, its many failures. But probably none can furnish so long a record of the disappointed hopes of eager and uncalculating youth as the musical profession. Every boy fiddler hopes to develop into a Joachim, and every boy singer into a Santley or a Sims Reeves. And yet, by the nature of the case, all but a very few are doomed to mediocrity, or something below mediocrity, and to that life-long restless struggle against circumstances which is the accompaniment of mediocrity and inefficiency. In other trades and professions respectable abilities, steady work, and the same start as his competitors, are pretty nearly sure to enable a man to make a sufficient living in the grade of life to which he belongs. If there are not many great prizes and great fortunes to be won, there are at least a great many satisfactory positions of a second-rate stamp. But great success in the concert-room is utterly hopeless without the possession of gifts which are granted by nature to very few. And so it is that these interminable advertisements are to our eyes a perpetual reminder of the vanity of youthful hopes, and the hardness of matured life, and of the intolerable tedium of an existence spent in an apparent devotion to art, while in reality it is simply a devotion to the sale of goods which nobody cares very much to buy, and of which the supply is considerably in excess of the demand.

Strange superstitions come out now and then in courts of justice, and one of a very curious character amused the Court of Exchequer yesterday. DEATH OF MISS ROMER.—This celebrated English prima donna is no more. She died at her residence at Margate last Monday, in her 54th year. Few singers have had a wider range of operatic characters. She made her debut on the Covent Garden stage, the 16th of October, 1830, as Clara, in the Duenna, on the same night that the Scotch tenor, Mr. John Wilson (who died in America), made his first appearance as Don Carlos. At the same theatre Miss Romer was the original Zerlina, in Auber's Fra Diavolo, when Braham enacted the hero, Mr. Wilson Lorenzo, Mr. G. Penson Lord Allcash, and Miss Cawse Lady Allcash. Miss Romer was also the original Mountain Sylph, at the Lyceum, in John Barrett's charming opera. Miss Romer, after the death of Malibran, sustained with signal success the Maid of Artois' of Balfe, and the Sonnambula of Bellini. She also sang the part of Leonora, in Donizetti's Favorita, Matilda, in Rossini's William Tell, with Duprez, the famed French tenor. Miss Romer's repertoire included the leading characters in Balfe's Bohemian Girl, the Bondsman, Wallace's Maritana, Meyerbeer's Alice (Robert le Diable), Agatha in Weber's Der Freyschutz, &c. Miss Romer was gifted with one of the finest sopranovices ever heard. Her early studies commenced under Mr. Elliott, a composer of glees, and it was unfortunate for her style that she did not receive the advantage of Italian training. Her acting was admirable. Miss Romer was directress for some years of an English opera company at the Surrey Theatre. She was married to the late Mr. George Almond, the army clothier, of St. James'sstreet; and she retired from the stage a few years since. Miss Romer (Mrs. George Almond), was universally liked and respected. One of her sisters is married to Mr. Mark Lemon, the editor of Punch, and her brother, Mr. Frank Romer, is known as the composer of some operas of more than ordinary merit. The Romers, in fact, are a musical family, for two cousins of the late prima donna, the Misses Romer of Liverpool, were also on the lyric stage, and were married to the Brothers Brough. Mr. Tom Romer, a cousin, was the tenor at Drury-lane Theatre in Mr. Bunn's time. Mr. Charles Romer was also a tenor, and Mr. Robert Romer is the comic actor at the Adelphi Theatre. Miss Maria Romer is married to Ansdell, the animal painter. Miss Romer (Mrs. G. Almond), resided at Tulse-hill after she withdrew from the stage, but on the death of her husband took up her residence at Margate. Her health had been failing for some time past. An attack of spasms of the heart was the immediate cause of death. She was assuredly one of the most distinguished of English singers.



FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)
PARIS, TUESDAY, JUNE 13, 7 A.M.

The friends of Prince Napoleon have strong reason to apprehend, as his enemies have to wish, that his political career is at an end for the present, if not for ever. His Imperial Highness is, it is feared, irretrievably in disgrace, and the Emperor, whose patience, the courtiers tell you, is tired out, is more irritated against his cousin than ever. When His Majesty reached the Lyons terminus on Saturday one of the Painter Lyons terminus on Saturday. day one of the Prince's household was in attendance to offer, in his Highness's name, the usual congratulations, and to ask for the Emperor's orders. "Tell my cousin," was the reply, "that I am obliged to him, and that I hope to see him to-morrow morning, at 10, at the Tuileries." The aide-de-camp then made his obeisance, returned to his chief, and delivered his message with the accaracy of one of Homer's heralds. In the course of the same evening the Prince was unlucky enough to be thrown from his carriage, a very light one, and received a hurt, also a very light one, but which, light as it may be, keeps him to his apartment. The aide-de-camp once more appeared at the hour fixed by the Emperor for the rendezvous to express the Prince's profound regret that his accident prevented him from complying with his cousin's orders, and from offering his congratulations As the Prince cannot come to the Emperor, the Emperor will probably go to him; but it is generally thought that the affair will end by the Prince's travelling in foreign parts for a season. What has added to the Emperor's anger is the publication in La Presse of the Prince's resignation of his office the same day the Emperor's letter appeared, and, of course, before the resignation could reach his hands.

The Emperor has shown his usual tact in leaving to the Empress the more graceful exercise of authority, that of the amnesty to newspapers still under avertissements, and the bestowal of the Cross of the Legion of Honour on Rosalie Bonheur, the well-known painter of animals and landscapes. These acts, which will, it is hoped, procure for the Empress that popularity among the masses which assuredly, without any fault of her own, is not yet so general as might be wished, were arranged, it is said, before the Emperor's departure or during his absence. This, however, does not take from their merit, and neither the amnestied journals nor the new Knight of the Legion of Honour will care for the motives to which they owe their pardon or their honours. The honour is the more remarkable, as it is the first time that a woman unconnected with the army has received it. It is sometimes conferred on vivandières who are on the strength of a regiment, and who distinguish themselves by their courage and zeal in attending the sick and wounded. The regulations of the army require that the military salute shall be given by soldiers to all persons, in uniform or out of it, wearing the Cross-for the riband alone will not suffice—and a sentry on duty is bound to carry arms. Rosalie, or Rosa, Bonheur, the present recipient, belongs to a family of painters well known in their native city of Bordeaux, where she was born in 1822. Her father, who died in 1853, and who was her first in-structor, was an artist of some merit. Rosalie structor, was an artist of some merit. Rosalie first exhibited in 1841 two small pictures, the rabbits, goats, and sheep. Her two brothers, Aurabbits, goats, and sheep. guste and Jules, have produced paintings, some of which have obtained certain honorific distinctions, but the latter is said to be a far better sculptor than painter. A sister, Juliette, better known under her married name of Peyrol, also learnt to paint in her father's studio, and exhibited pictures of animals in 1853 and 1855. She was for some years Rosalie's assistant in the direction of the gratuitous school of design. Rosalie is also a sculptor, and has exhibited groups of animals, which, it appears, have not added. much to her reputation as an artist. There is no difference of opinion, however, as to her deserving the honour conferred upon her by the Emperor, and every one approves it





The death of Canon Shirley, which has been apprehended for some weeks, took place on Tuesday night. The late canon, who was only thirty-eight years old, was Professor of Ecclesiastical History, Canon of Christ Church, and delegate of the University Press. He was the only son of the late Dr. Shirley, sometime Bishop of Sodor and Man. He was educated at Rugby, where he had been captain of the school, and matriculated at University College in 1847, obtaining a scholarship the same year at Wadham College, where he was afterwards fellow and tutor. In 1851 he gained a first class in mathematics, and was prevented by illness from securing a similar honour in classics. In 1864 he was nominated by Lord Palmerston to the regius professorship of Ecclesiastical History and canonry of Christ Church, vacated by the promotion of Dr. Stanley to the deanery of Westminster. Dr. Shirley was a cousin of Earl Ferrers, and heir presumptive to that title.

Lord STANLEY,—I think my hos, friend the member for Taunton is entitled to our thanks for having brought this subject before the House. (Hear, hear.) No one is now, I believe, opposed to the principle of competitive examination for appointments in the Civil Service of India. Even my hon. friend the member for Honiton, who was one of the most consistent opponents of the system, has expressed a wish that it should have a fair trial. It is, however, precisely because no one objects to a principle which w lieve to be sound in itself that we ought to take all the more care that it does not suffer in popular opinion owing to any mismanagement. (Hear, hear.) My hon, friend behind me seems to be of opinion that the class of men seeking those appointments has become, socially speaking, lower, but I cannot gather from the information which I have obtained on the subject that that is the case. So far as I can form a judgment from the reports received from India, I believe that the social position of those young men who go out now is pretty much what it has hitherto been, while there would appear to be a higher degree of average efficiency, though it is but fair to say that a certain number at the bottom of the list when the competition was not so severe did not reach a very high standard of efficiency, Again, it is said that these well-paid Indian places are not sufficiently valued to make the competition for them real and effectual, but the answer to that is that there have been about 450 vacancies during the last 10 years, and that for these there have been about 1,300 candidates, or very nearly at the rate of three caudidates for each place. It must at the same time be acknowledged that so far as Oxford and Cambridge are concerned the percentage of competitors for these appointments is considerably less than at first; nor do I think this fact is attributable to accident, because the percentage has from the commencement gone on steadily diminishing. The percentage was at first 70; it shortly after fell to 50, and it is now only a little after fell to 50, and it is now only a little above 25. There are, however, in my opinion, reasons for this falling off altogether independent of the character of the examination. In the first place, it is only within the last ten years that many tutorships, scholarships, and other appeintments of various kinds have been open to free competition for the great mass of students at the two Universities. Those appointments draw off a great number of those who would otherwise compete for situations in the Indian Civil Service. Then we must not leave out of sight the great tendency on the part of young men at the present day of the very class who formerly went out to India to enter into new professions, like that of the civil engineer, or to go to Australia or some other colony. We have to take into consideration, also, the enormous increase which has taken place in the wealth of the country during the last few years, and the consequent diminution of the relative, though not of the absolute, value of those Indian appointments. There has been for some years a very great dislike to go to a country where scenes of so deplorable a character have so recently taken place, and where so bad a feeling notoriously existed between the native and European population. That cause is now partly removed, but everybody must be award that much higher emoduments than a man can obtain at home must be offered in order to Induce him to leave this country to enter the Indian service. I myself have had, some small experience of the correctness of this view, for I well remember, and I daresay my right hos. friend opposite knows the case to which I refer, that an appointment in India worth 5,000% or 6,000% a year was declined by a gentleman who not long afterwards accepted a county court judgeship. (Hear, hear.) These circumstances are, I think, sufficient in themselves to explain why the competition for these appointments is not greater. (Hear.) Again, something has been said as to the period of probation, and perhaps I may be allowed to say above 25. There are, however, in my opinion, reasons for this falling off altogether independent of the character of





MEMOIR

OF

MRS. DENISON.



Extracted from the Leamington Courier,

January 29, 1859.

Death of Mrs. Denison.—On Wednesday, the 26th of January, died, at 6, Clarence Terrace, Leamington, at the house of her daughter (Mrs. Des Vœux), in the 83rd year of her age, Charlotte, daughter of Samuel Estwick, Esq., M.P., and widow of the late John Denison, Esq., M.P., of Ossington Hall, in the county of Nottingham. This lady was left a widow at the age of forty-two, with a family of twelve children,—nine sons and three daughters; two others died in infancy.

The three daughters are Julia, who married did 1857 - the Rev. Henry Des Vœux; Henrietta, who *married Henry Jacob, Esq.; and Charlotte, who married Robert Phillimore, Esq., D.C.L., Q.C.1+

The excellent judgment with which Mrs. Denison discharged the important trust so early confided to her may be gathered from the following brief notice of her nine sons.²

- * Mrs. Jacob died January 11, 1860, aged 51; Mr. Jacob died August 15, 1862, aged 58, leaving two sons and six daughters; one died April, 1862.
- † 1862, Queen's Advocate; 1867, Judge of the Admiralty Court and Privy Councillor.
- ¹ Mr. Denison by a former wife had two daughters; Charlotte, who married Mr. Manners Sutton, who was Speaker of the House of Commons from 1817 to 1834, and afterwards Viscount Canterbury; and Matilda, who married Thomas Smith, Esq., of Fir Hill, in the county of Hants.
- ² Their tutor at home and at Eton was the Rev. Charles Drury, Fellow of Queen's College, Oxford, Rector of Pontesbury, Salop.

The eldest John Evelyn, was educated at Eton and Christ Church, and is the present member for Nottinghamshire, and Speaker of the House of Commons.

The second, Edward, also educated at Eton and Christ Church, gained the highest classical honours at Oxford; was elected a Fellow of Merton College; and became Bishop of Salisbury at the age of thirty-six. He died in 1854.§

The third, William, is a Colonel in the Royal Engineers, K.C.B., and the present Governor-General of Australia.

The fourth, George, was also educated at Eton and Christ Church, and gained the highest classical honours at Oxford; won two University prizes; was elected a Fellow of Oriel College; and is the present Archdeacon of Taunton.

The fifth, Henry (whose death preceded* that of his beloved mother by a few weeks), was educated at Eton, gained the highest honours both in mathematics and classics at Oxford; was a Student of Christ Church; and, subsequently, a Fellow of All Souls, and Vinerian Fellow.

The sixth, Stephen, was also educated at Eton, and gained the highest classical honours at Oxford; was elected a Scholar of Balliol, and Stowell; Fellow of University College; and is the present Deputy Judge Advocate.

The seventh, Frank, died in early manhood, ‡ a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy, much esteemed in his profession, and beloved by all who knew him.

The eight, Alfred, after having completed his education at Christ Church, became one of the most enterprising colonists of Australia; and is at present Private Secretary to his brother, the Governor-General of that colony.

The ninth, Charles, is Lieutenant-Colonel of the 52nd Queen's Light Infantry, and Deputy Adjutant-General at Madras.§

The Mother, whose cares were so amply rewarded, and whose long life was so much embellished, by the honours of her distinguished Sons, preserved throughout the calm simplicity and unassuming modesty which were the natural ornaments of her remarkable character.

SIR WILLIAM DENISON.

Copied from the "Indian Statesman"
Newspaper.

Madras, November 3rd, 1860.

SIR WILLIAM DENISON belongs to what may be emphatically called a fine family: one of those broad headed, energetic, and intellectual families which seem to make their way in the world, first, by generally carrying off the highest honours which a University has to bestow, and then by their force of character, by acknowledged position, and by doing to the best of their ability, whatever work is set before them, be it small or great.

His father, John Denison, Esq., M.P., died more than forty years ago, leaving

behind him a large family of nine Sons and three Daughters, under the care of his Widow, a venerable Lady, who died only a year or two ago, at a very advanced age. As far as we can learn, all the Sons have made their way to good positions.

The eldest, the Right. Hon. John Evelyn Denison, is the present Speaker of the House of Commons like most of the family he was an Eton boy and an Oxford man, and graduated at Christ Church. He entered Parliament at an early age; married a daughter of the Duke of Portland, and became a Lord of the Admiralty. He has now been a Member of Parliament for thirty years, and represents his own County of Nottingham. In 1857, he was chosen Speaker of the House without opposition; and in 1867 he will probably be sitting in the House of Peers.

The second Son became Bishop of Salisbury at the age of thirty-six, and had he lived, would probably have raised himself to a still higher position. Those who can remember Oxford some twenty years ago, will also remember the Rev. Edward Denison, who, after getting the highest Classical honours at Oxford, was elected Fellow of Merton, and rapidly attracted attention to the Church of St. Peters-in-the-East, by a style of preaching as superior to the meretricious Sermons of the present day, as Hooker and Butler are superior to Spurgeon.

The third is Sir William Denison, K.C.B., the Governor-General of all the Australian Colonies, of whom, we shall have more to say presently.

The fourth obtained the highest Classical honours at Oxford, like his two brothers, and is now Archdeacon of Taunton.

The fifth was a double first classman at Oxford—that is, he gained the highest honours both in Classics and Mathematics, and thus achieved a success, which has been achieved by few—but amongst those few, stands out the name of the great Sir Robert Peel.

The sixth also gained the highest Classical honours at Oxford, and is at present Deputy Judge Advocate General.

The seventh entered the Royal Navy, but died early.

The eighth finished his career at Oxford, and then became one of the most enterprising Colonists in Australia, and Private Secretary to his Brother; but last year, he appears to have sold his property, and returned to England. The ninth Colonel Denison, 52nd Light Infantry, is known to all our readers as Deputy—Adjutant General in this Presidency.

Search England through, and we doubt whether another family would be found having four of its Sons first Classmen at Oxford, and one a double first.

Such early successes prove that the rewards which the Denisons have obtained, were not the mere results of interest, but were as duly earned as any rewards which the world has to bestow.

Sir William Denison, K.C.B., is a Colonel of the Royal Engineers. Active service he has never seen, but he has been extensively employed under different Governments, in a variety of important works. The first work on which he was engaged, was the Rideu Canal, nearly 140 miles long. It

extends from Lake Ontario, at Kingston, to the Ottawa River, at Chaudiere, and is large enough to receive vessels of 120 tons burden. This was a work of peculiar magnitude, from the extensive Locks which it was found necessary to construct. Colonel Bye, of the R.E., was his Senior Officer, and the town of Byetown was called after him. Sir William was also employed for several years by the Home Government, in the construction of Docks and Barracks at Woolwich. The fine building known as the Marine Barrack, was constructed by him; so also were some of the largest Docks, From Woolwich, he was sent to Portsmouth, on similar duty. There he built the first large steam Basin. He was also sent out by Government, to report specially on the Defences and Dock-yard of Bermunda. He thus proved himself to be a practical man, and had good opportunities of displaying his abilities. At the same time, he was for

many years, the Editor of the Professional Papers of the Royal Engineers, a book which may be said, in a great measure, to owe its existence to him.

But the time was now arriving when he was to be employed in Governing as well as in Constructing. In 1846, after twenty years service in the Royal Engineers, and having entered his 42nd year, he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor in Van Dieman's Land, where he remained eight years. His administration there was surrounded with difficulties. At that time, transportation was in its full swing, and the society was of a very mixed kind. He had the satisfaction, however, of remaining there long enough to see honourable testimony borne to the measures which he had advocated, by all, excepting his bitterest opponents, which are said to have been, for the most part, either descendants or

connexions of the Convict class; and on his departure, above £2,000 was subscribed towards a piece of Plate which was presented to him as a testimonial of the estimation in which he was held by the better classes of Colonial Society. In 1854 Sir William was appointed to succeed Sir Charles Fitzroy, as Governor-General of all the Australian Colonies, and that position he is at this moment occupying. Concerning his general administration we have but little to say, excepting that in many instances, it bore a close resemblance to that of our late Governor. He did much towards promoting Public Works, such as Docks, Railways, and other works of utility; and he was also so active in the formation of Volunteer Corps, that we may expect to see him accept the Colonelcy of the Madras Volunteer Guards, with as much zeal as it was accepted by Sir C. Trevelyan. We have been given to

understand, that he would have done very much more, had he not been hampered by his Legislative Council. Possibly, he may have to encounter similar opposition from the Council at Calcutta, but is Australian experiences in this direction will do him good service in his coming battles with Bengal. Had the Madras Council possessed any powers during a recent reign, Sir C. Trevelyan would have still been reigning in this Presidency.

Such then is the Man who, in all probability, will shortly be the Governor of Madras. His antecedents require no comment, they speak for themselves.

We have also to add, that Sir William Denison is now in his 56th year, a Colonel in the R.E.; that Lady Denison is a Daughter of Admiral Sir Phipps Hornby, and that Sir William has a large family of Sons and Daughters.
