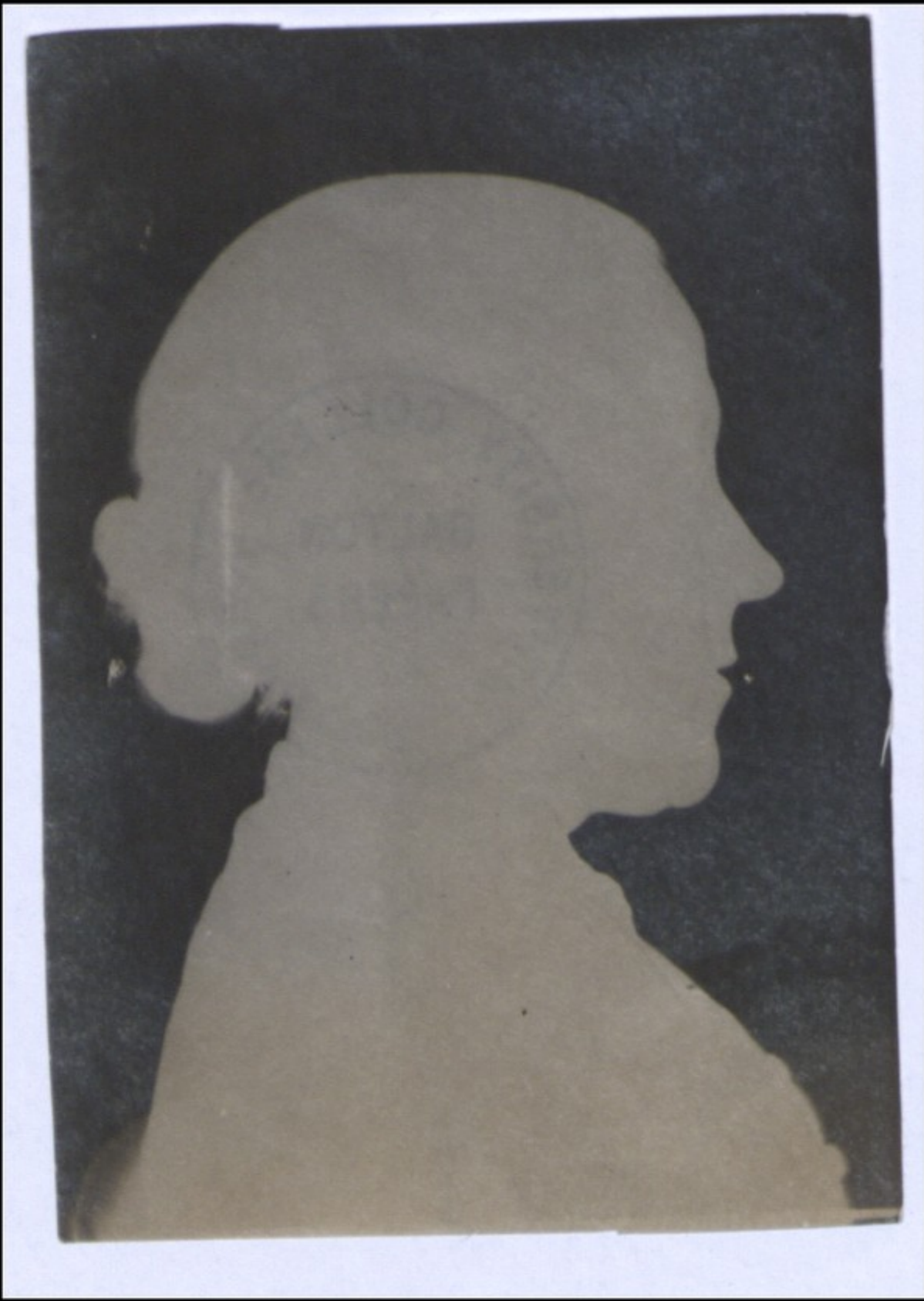


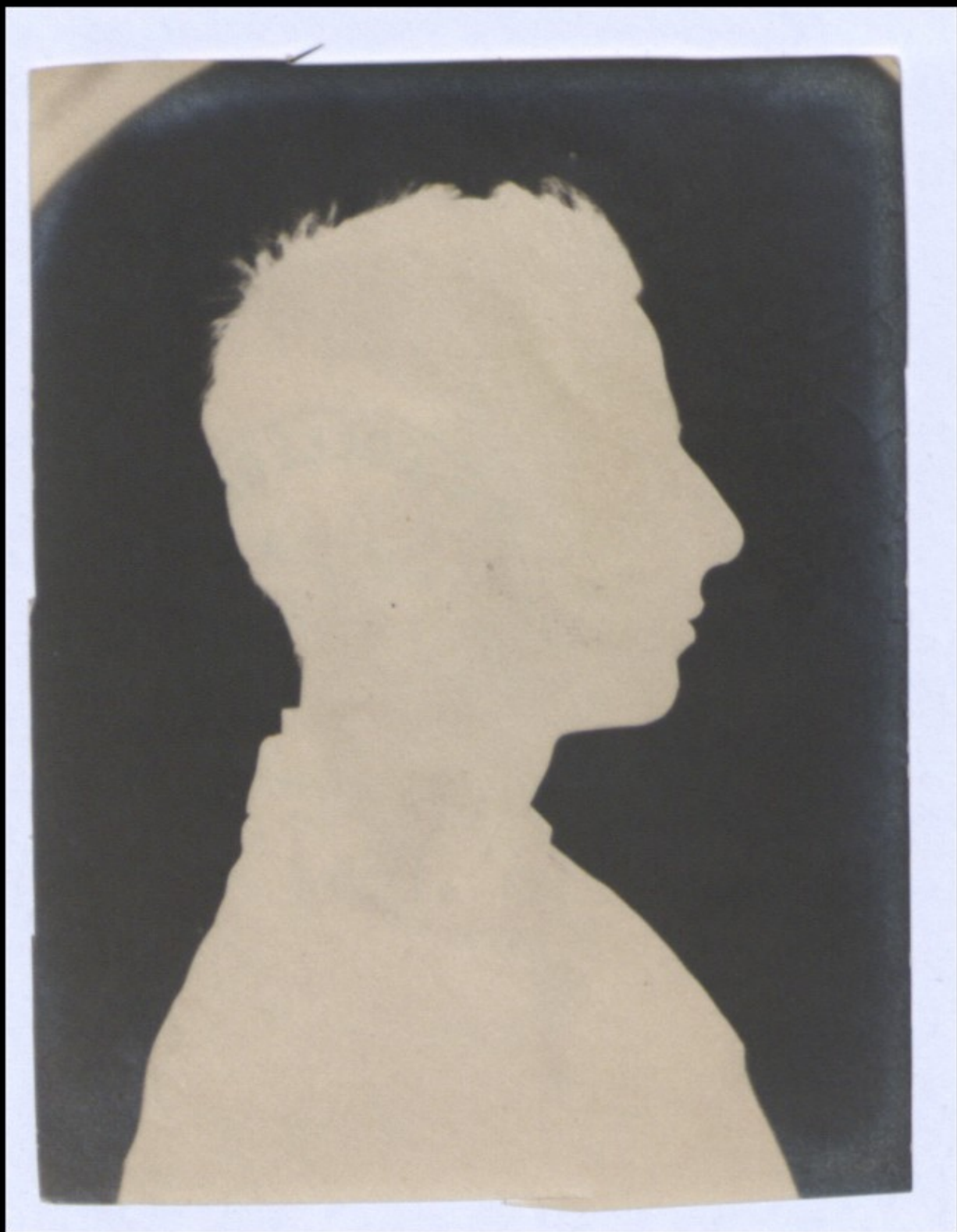




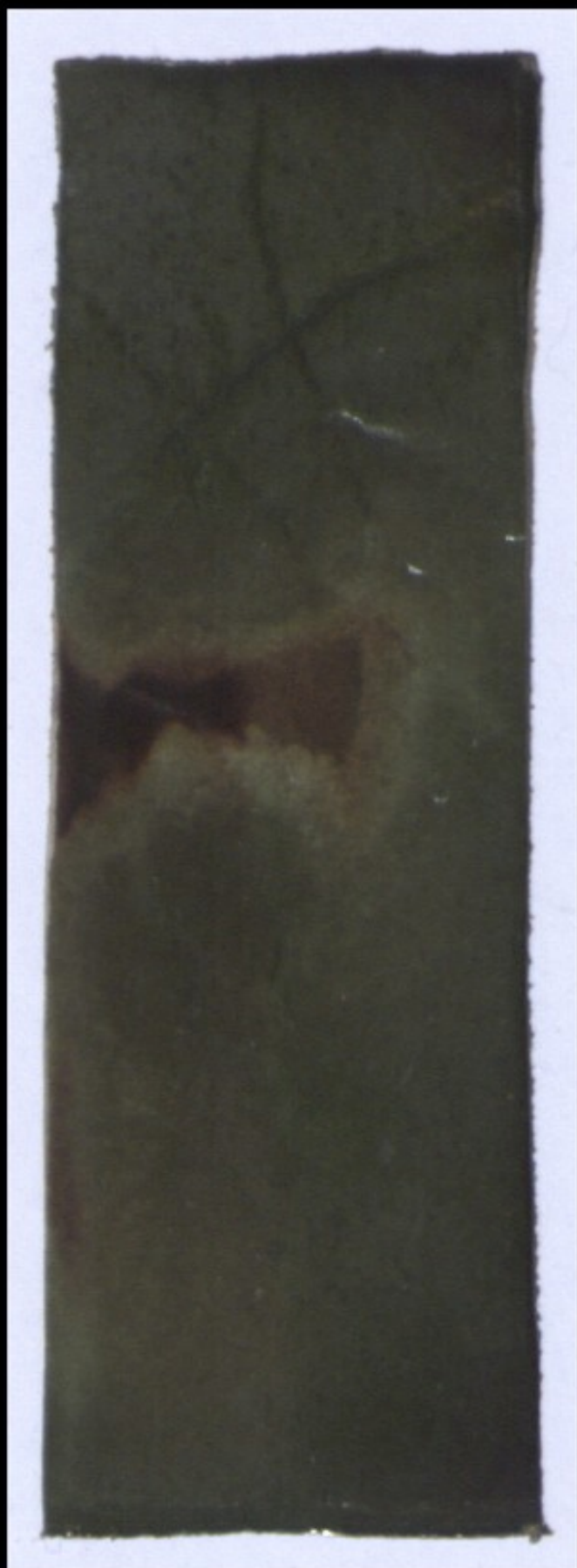


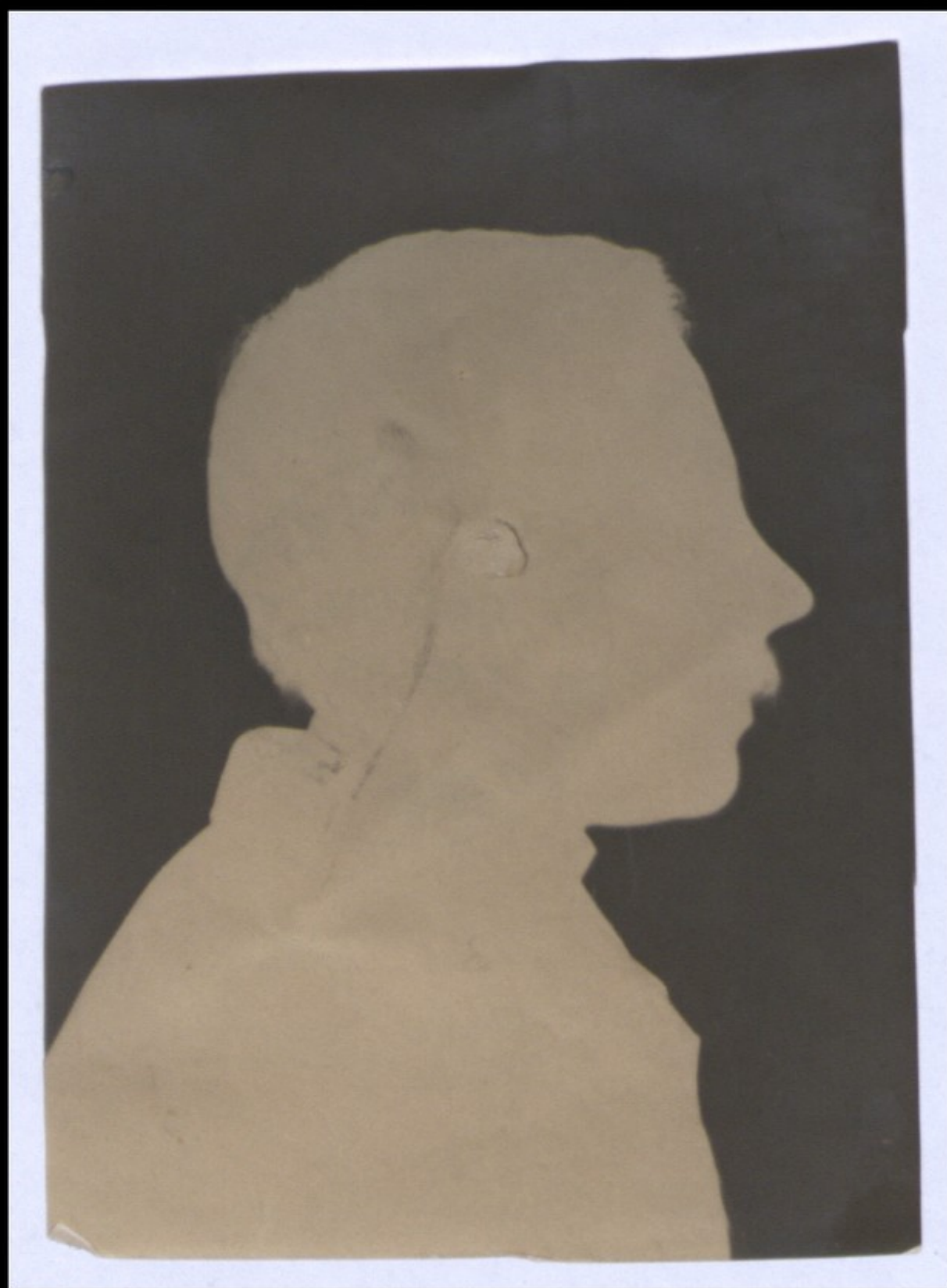
























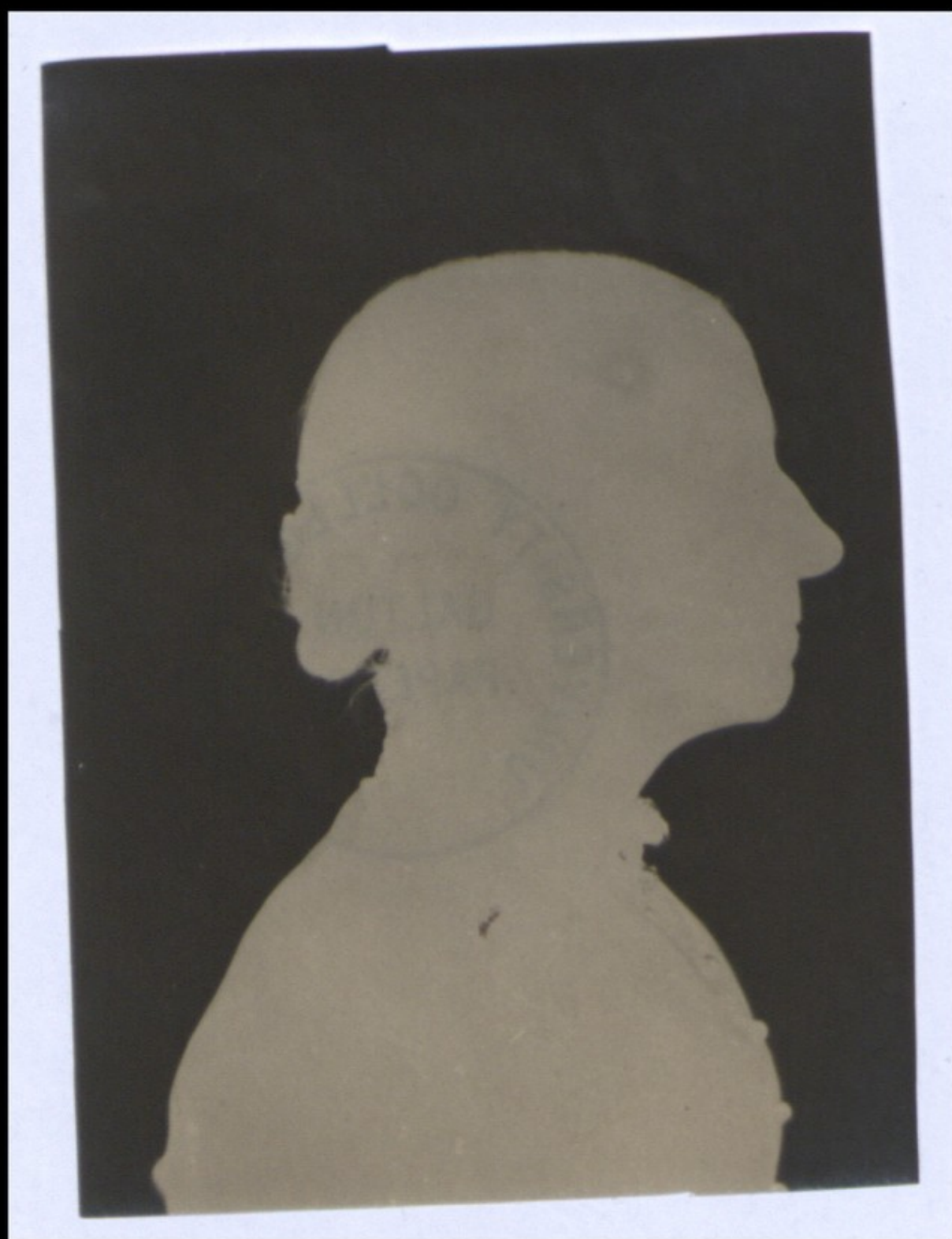






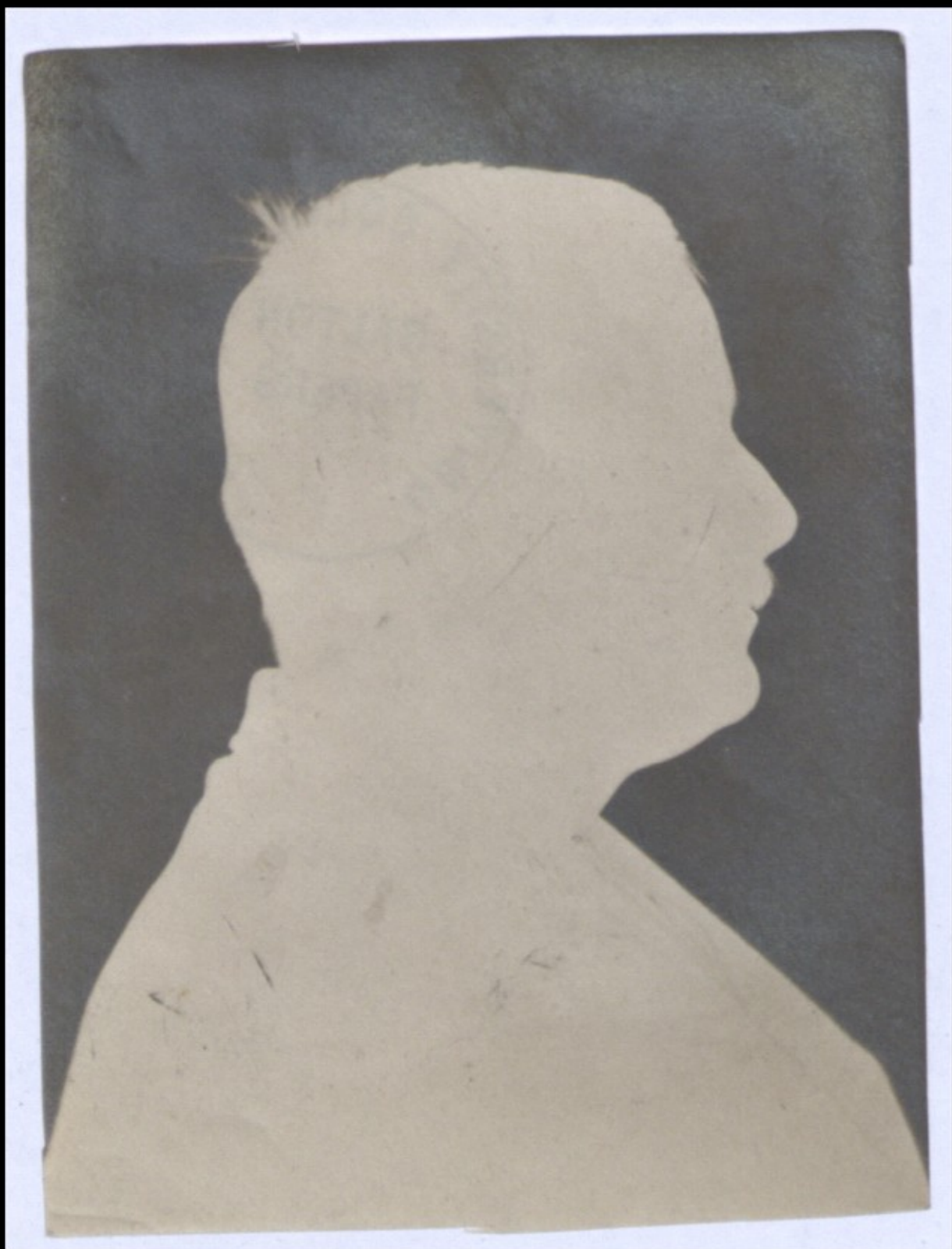


















per cent. higher, the money market having shown slightly more ease. India 4 per Cent. Rupee Paper declined $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent., but the $4\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. advanced $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. Southampton Corporation $3\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. Stock improved $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. In the foreign market international securities generally showed greater strength on better prices from the Continent and more satisfactory intelligence with regard to foreign affairs, especially as concerns the Afghan frontier question, the rise ranging from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., the principal advances being in Russian of 1873, Hungarian 4 per Cents., and Egyptian State Domain. In South American stocks Uruguay advanced 1 and Argentine Hard Dollar Bonds $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Mexican were also stronger on the prospect of an early settlement of the dispute with the United States. English railway stocks were irregular, there being about an equal number of advances and declines, generally ranging from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., but North-Eastern recovered $1\frac{1}{2}$ on purchases to cover recent sales. Canadian were again stronger, Grand Trunk preferences improving $\frac{3}{4}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and Canadian Pacific shares 1 per cent. American opened very strong, on better prices from New York, and an active business ensued, resulting in a general rise of $\frac{1}{4}$ to $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., whilst Wabash stocks showed an improvement of $2\frac{1}{4}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Mexican were firmer. Hudson's Bay Shares improved $1\frac{1}{4}$, and Suez Canal $\frac{1}{4}$. Submarine Telegraph Stocks were $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. higher.

ENGLISH FUNDS.—Consols closed 1-16 per cent. firmer at 101 3-16 5-16 for money, and 101 $\frac{1}{2}$ for account. Reduced and New 3 per Cents. were steady at 101 $\frac{1}{2}$, and 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. at 89 $\frac{1}{2}$. Bank Stock fetched 254 $\frac{1}{2}$.

ENGLISH CORPORATION STOCKS.—Southampton 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cents. improved $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. to 97 $\frac{1}{2}$. Metropolitan Board of Works 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cents. were done at 108 $\frac{1}{2}$, and 3 per Cent. at 99 $\frac{1}{2}$. Birmingham 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cents. at 102 $\frac{1}{2}$. Liverpool 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. at 102 $\frac{1}{2}$. Nottingham 3 per Cent. at 96 $\frac{1}{2}$, and Reading 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cents. at 101 $\frac{1}{2}$.

INDIAN STOCKS.—4 per Cent. Stock was dealt in at 102 $\frac{1}{2}$, 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent. at 100 $\frac{1}{2}$, and 3 per Cent. at 88 $\frac{1}{2}$. 4 per Cent. Rupee Paper was $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. lower at 66 $\frac{1}{2}$, and $\frac{1}{4}$ per Cent. $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. lower at 65 $\frac{1}{2}$.

At Paris the private rate of discount has declined to 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. at Frankfurt to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and at Berlin advanced to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

The silver market was weak, but without alteration at 3s. 6d. for bars and 3s. 7d. per oz. for Mexican dollars.

The Elder, from New York, brought £2,500 in specie. The Adriatic has left New York with £28,000 in specie for this country.

The Council of Foreign Bondholders have received from the Commissioners of the Special Treasury of the Public Debt of Egypt their report, dated July 12, respecting the proceeds (£3,980,425) of the Guaranteed Loan of 1885, of which the following is a summary, all amounts being given in pounds sterling:—The account of amounts paid to the 31st of December, 1885, is subject to modifications and verification. The amount available (after deducting expenses and the settlement of the ascertained indemnities, amounting to £4,309,196) for the objects enumerated in the decree of the 27th of July, 1885, was £1,671,229. Out of this amount there has been applied to the 31st of December, 1885, £2,988,655; adding receipts up to December 31, 1885, £10,345—£141,385; less expenses, £43,949; balance available, subject to verification, £97,436. Net proceeds of lands sold in 1885, £425,726. Net proceeds of lands of rebels confiscated and assigned for the service of the liquidation by a decree of the 14th of December, 1882, £22,997. The total thus obtained (£3,534,814) was employed in 1885 in the following manner:—Deficit of 1884 and previous years, estimated at £2,725,128 by the London Convention, amount paid as ascertained to the 31st of December, 1885, £2,634,377. Deficit of 1885 estimated at £1,230,769. Amounts paid to December 31:—Contribution in aid of the deficit of 1885, £102,564; contribution in aid of construction of new custom-house and law courts, £32,930; contribution in aid of expenses in the Sudan, £402,066; total £337,560. £362,876 out of the £512,821 assigned for the service of the Treasury have been debited to the account for payments made by the Commissioners for the Government to December 31, 1885, other than the above-mentioned deficits. The charges outstanding on December 31 were:—Deficit of 1885, £693,208; irrigation works, £1,025,641; commutation of pensions, £564,108; service of the Treasury, £149,944. Total £2,432,895. The assets available for the discharge of these liabilities were:—Balance available out of the loan, £1,682,572 (subject to increase by interest, and decrease by expenses); free lands, property of rebels confiscated, and recovery of arrears, 1879, unascertained. No payments were made in 1885 in respect of irrigation works and commutation of pensions.

such indented coast. It stretches from the headlands which mark the entrance, and appears to be a favoured resort of the Royal Fleet, a portion of which is at present in the bay. I need not dilate on the scenery, which is absolutely unrivalled, especially at Glen Head, but I was specially struck by the extraordinary luxuriance of all species of vegetation, the mass varieties of ferns, and the hedgerows of hawthorn now coming into full bloom. At this time the tourists are tolerably plentiful in the South, but this season they are limited in number and are almost exclusively American, the English being entirely absent. Many are the questions which have been addressed to me to explain this unusual phenomenon, and I have been compelled, with some hesitation and timidity, to suggest that the impression is general in England that Ireland is in a somewhat unsettled condition, and that outrages of the most serious kind are of somewhat frequent occurrence. This objection is met by the time-honoured accusation that the English newspapers are notorious for their untruthfulness and exaggeration in respect to everything reflecting on the law-abiding and peaceable character of the Irish people; and secondly, that whatever may be the differences which arise between the Irish and the English, they in no way affect the security or the comfort of strangers. The latter is strictly true, and I have no hesitation in saying that if the presence of English visitors from Ireland this season is due to personal apprehensions they are entirely unfounded, for I am perfectly certain that a stranger would be infinitely safer in the loneliest glen in Kerry than on the Thames Embankment after nightfall. But there are other causes also at work to check the usual immigration of tourists from the other side of St. George's Channel. The late General Election, the reassembling of Parliament in the present month, and the almost universal depression, have had a great deal to do with upsetting many holiday arrangements. Still, however, if there be any individuals who are still hesitating about the direction in which they will bend their steps, I do not think they could do
