First & I have been surprised at the total sleep of men in Germany for many months in the company of natives. I ~~have~~ ^{have} ~~passed the night~~ ^{passed the night} ~~in the~~ ^{in the} ~~middle of winter~~ ^{middle of winter} & am their breathing ~~uninterrupted~~ ^{uninterrupted} of some 30 or 40 men mostly savages of whom I had many months experience in Brazil was insupportable. Conversely hot bedrooms stimulate snoring. Again a deep sleep is more accompanied by snoring than a light one. Obstructive drooping more. It is analogous to the fallen jaw of death. Arrangement of trees in an orchard

Having noticed that trees are usually planted in orchards in parallel rows, separated by the same distances that trees in the same row are separated from ^{one} another, I have asked whether the economy of space was recognised if planting them hexagonally. It appears to be so imperfectly appreciated, that it may be proper even for myself who am no agriculturist, to call attention to the geometry of the case.

The solution I send is based on the supposition that each tree requires a free circular area of some appropriate diameter, to avoid crowding and being crowded by its neighbours with roots and branches, and that unused corners around this space are wasted land. The problem then comes to the same thing as the economy of space in arranging flower-pots of the same size, in parallel rows as above described, or in the compactest manner possible. In the former case each pot occupies the middle of an imaginary square and touches four neighbours, in the latter case it occupies the middle of an imaginary hexagon and touches six neighbours. It may be easily proved that between 115 & 116 flower pots can be arranged by the hexagonal system for the same area that will only contain 100 pots on the square system. Simple mathematics show that the area of a square circumscribed round a circle whose radius is 1, is equal to 4 square units, & that the area of a hexagon round the same circle is $6 \times \tan 30^\circ$, or 3.46 square units. The number of ^{spec} hexagons required to fill a given field of given area, is that of the squares, is the inverse ratio of this, namely as 400 to 346, which is that of between 115 and 116 to 100. It follows that if the preliminary supposition be strictly correct, a profit of between 15 and 16 per cent would be made by planting orchard trees on the hexagonal, instead of on the square system.

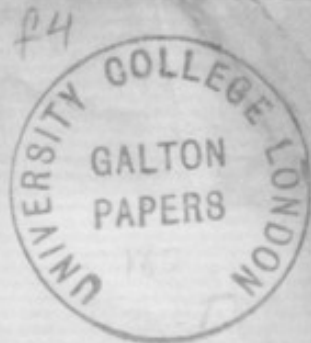
