How powerful an irritant is aspirin? A recent annotation in the "Lancet" (1:950, 1958) sums up our present knowledge as follows: "occasionally it causes gastro-intestinal hæmorrhage, probably owing to gastric erosions, and less rarely it gives rise to symptoms of gastric irritation."
