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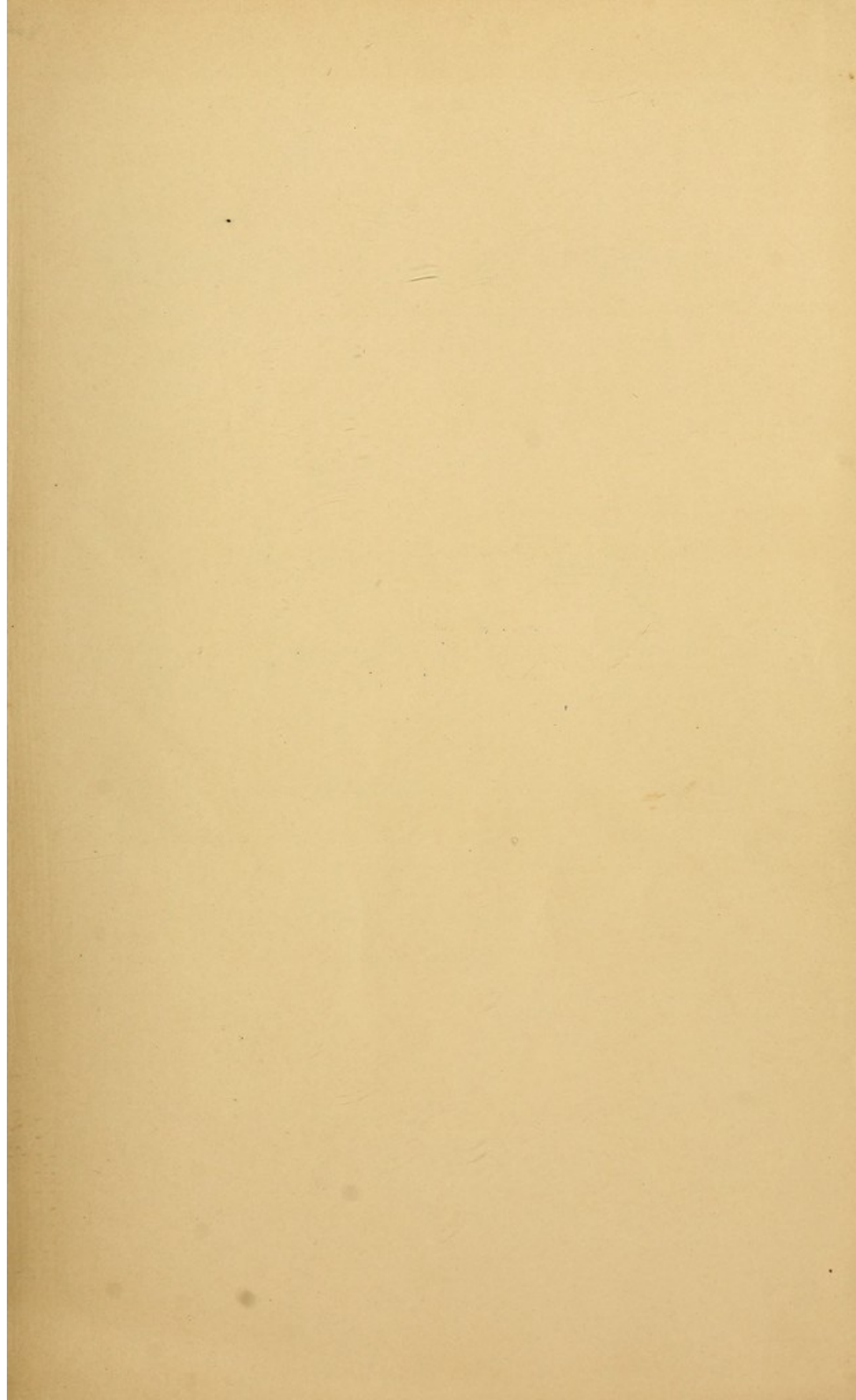
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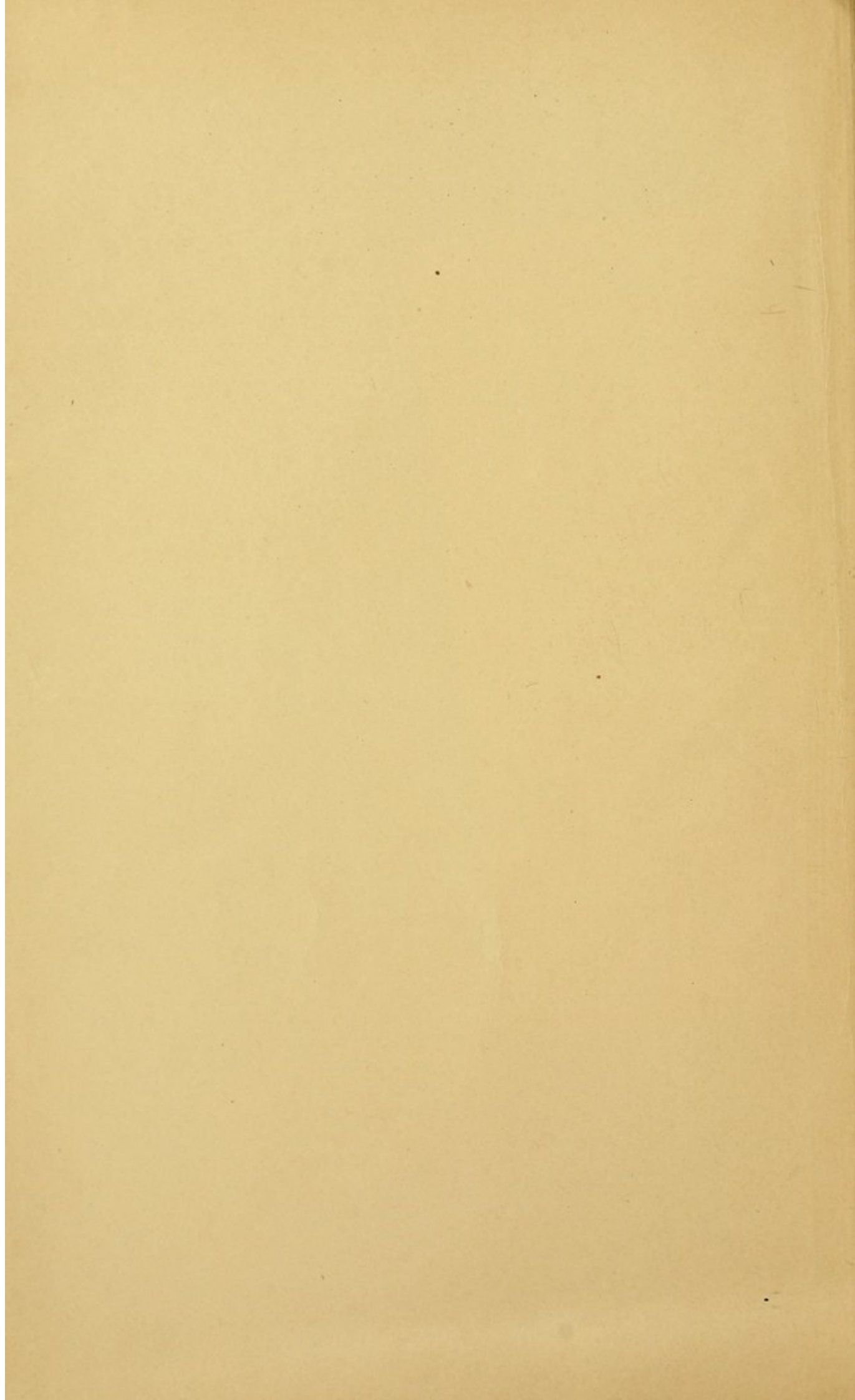

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# ACT OF INCORPORATION.

## Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

IN THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND FIFTY-SIX.

### AN ACT

TO INCORPORATE THE MASSACHUSETTS HOMŒOPATHIC MEDICAL SOCIETY.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by authority of the same, as follows:—*

SECTION 1. Samuel Gregg, William Wesselhoeft, Luther Clark, George Russell, Milton Fuller, John A. Tarbell, David Thayer, their associates and successors, physicians, be, and they hereby are, made a corporation by the name of the MASSACHUSETTS HOMŒOPATHIC MEDICAL SOCIETY, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties, liabilities, and restrictions, set forth in the forty-fourth chapter of the Revised Statutes.

SECT. 2. Said Corporation may hold real and personal estate to the amount of fifty thousand dollars.

SECT. 3. The members of said Society shall not be liable to be mustered or enrolled in the militia of this Commonwealth.

SECT. 4. The members of said Society, or such of their officers or members as they shall appoint, shall have full power and authority to examine all candidates for membership, concerning the practice of specific medicine and surgery, provided said candidates shall sustain a good moral character, and shall present letters testimonial of their qualifications from some legally authorized medical institution; and if, upon such examination, the said candidates shall be found qualified for membership, they shall receive the approbation of the Society.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

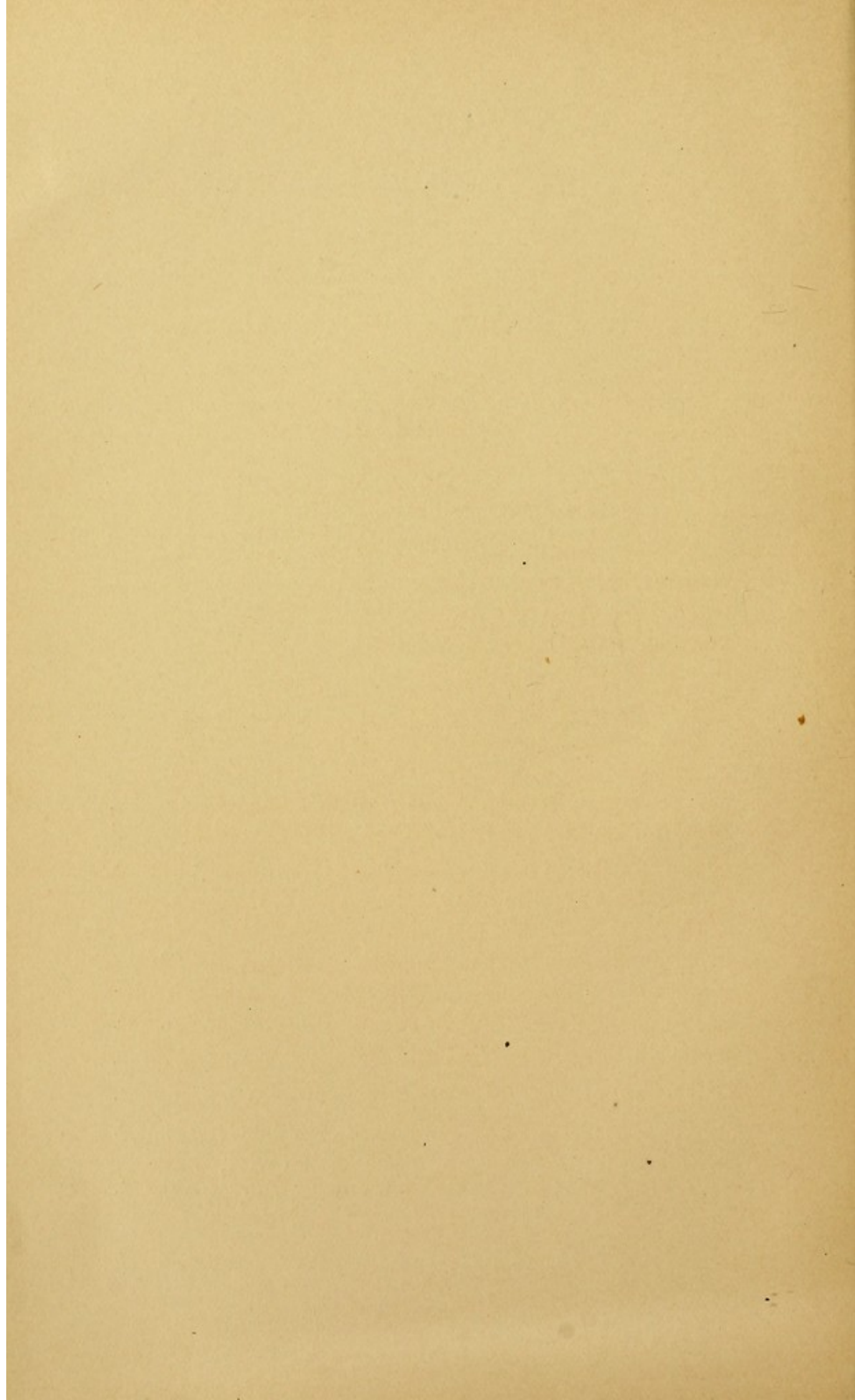

## BY-LAWS,

AS IN FORCE, APRIL, 1890.

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### OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

I. Since homœopathy aims at the improvement and reformation of the art of healing by aid of medicines, proved by every means that promises to enlarge the knowledge of the laws governing the action of drugs, this Society hereby declares its objects to be,—

The development of the materia medica by proving drugs upon the systems of men and animals; the administering of medicines thus proved, to the sick, in accordance with the formula *similia similibus curantur*; the encouragement of special studies and reports calculated to improve its members in the collateral branches of medicine.

II. This Society demands for itself absolute liberty in science, and hence requires of its applicants for membership no creed or confession of medical belief, but only the expression of a willingness to act for the furtherance of its declared objects.

### SOCIETY.

III. This Society shall consist of the persons named in the Act of Incorporation, and such other persons as



may have been elected members in accordance with its By-Laws.

#### OFFICERS OF THE SOCIETY.

IV. The Society, at its Annual Meeting, shall elect by ballot a president, two vice-presidents, corresponding secretary, recording secretary, treasurer, librarian, and five censors, who shall together constitute an executive committee, to whom shall be intrusted the general business of the Society when it is not in session; the appointment of all standing committees, and such other committees as they may deem expedient; and the selection of some suitable person to deliver an address, at the Annual Meeting of the Society, on some subject connected with medical science. At every Annual Meeting, they shall present a report of their proceedings during the past year, and shall also furnish a list of two candidates for each office of the Society for the ensuing year. They shall have power to remit the dues of worthy members who may produce satisfactory evidence that they are unable to pay. The officers shall continue in office till the adjournment of the Annual Meeting next after their election, at which time the duties of the newly elected officers shall commence.

#### DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS.

V. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee, and shall deliver an address before the Society at the commencement of the Annual Meeting.

In case of the absence or other disability of the President, his duties shall devolve on the Vice-Presi-



dent by seniority, if present; otherwise, on such person as the meeting may appoint.

Members shall not be eligible to the office of President more than once in five years.

VI. The Corresponding Secretary shall have the charge and custody of all letters and communications transmitted to the Society; and to him they should be addressed. He shall prepare and transmit whatever communications the Society or Executive Committee may direct, and he shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him.

VII. The Recording Secretary shall give notice and keep a record of all the meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee. He shall append to the notices of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings the names of those candidates for membership that have been reported to the Executive Committee. He shall have charge of all papers and communications belonging to the Society, and shall read at the meetings of the Society all such communications as the Executive Committee may direct. He shall notify the chairman of every committee appointed by the Society or Executive Committee, of his appointment, in each case stating the commission and the names of the committee. On or before the 1st of April, annually, he shall transmit to the Treasurer a list of all who have become members of the Society during the year.

The Recording Secretary shall receive fifty dollars annually as a compensation for the labors and duties incumbent upon the office.

VIII. The Treasurer shall solicit and receive all money due to the Society, together with all bequests and donations, and shall pay all bills after they shall



have been approved by the Executive Committee, which approval shall be certified to by the Recording Secretary. He shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and expenditures, and shall give such bonds for the faithful performance of his duties as the Society may require. He shall submit his accounts to such examination as the Executive Committee may direct, and shall annually make a statement of his doings, and of the state of the funds in his hands, to the Society.

The Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars annually as a compensation for his services.

IX. The Librarian shall have in his custody and charge all the books and apparatus of the Society. He shall keep an accurate register of the same, and arrange them in a proper manner, and shall make such disposition of them, from time to time, as the Executive Committee may direct, for the benefit of the members. He shall receive and record all donations made in his department to the Society, and shall make a report at the Annual Meeting.

X. The Censors shall examine the qualifications of all persons presenting themselves for membership, and for that purpose shall hold meetings on the days of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, and at such other times as they may deem necessary. They shall report the names of all approved candidates for membership to the Executive Committee at least three months before their election as members of the Society.

XI. There shall be a Committee on the Materia Medica, who shall select medicines for proving, and shall, at the expense of the Society, obtain and dis-



tribute the same to its members, or such other persons as they may deem suitable. They shall receive and examine communications upon the *materia medica* from the members of the Society, and report thereon at any regular meeting.

XII. There shall be a Committee on Clinical Medicine, who shall receive and examine communications proper to this department, and report thereon at any regular meeting. They shall also report upon the epidemics which may have occurred in the State or country during the year,—their characteristics, mode of treatment, and results,—and such other facts relating to the practice of medicine as they may deem important.

XIII. There shall be a Committee of Publication, consisting of the President, Recording Secretary, and at least three other members, to whom all matter for publication shall be referred, and under whose direction it shall be issued; the expense of which shall not exceed in any year a sum designated by the Executive Committee.

XIV. There shall be a Committee of Arrangements, whose duty it shall be to make such arrangements as will add to the interest and importance of the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, such as selecting a suitable place for the meetings, soliciting communications, appointing subjects for discussion, providing refreshments for members, etc., subject to the direction of the Executive Committee.

XV. There shall be a Committee on the Library, who shall select and obtain such books and publications as they may be able by donation, subscription, or purchase with funds set apart for that purpose by the Executive Committee or the Society.



XVI. The Executive and all other committees shall have power to fill their own vacancies.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

XVII. Any person who has received the degree of doctor of medicine from a legally authorized medical institution, and who sustains a good moral character, may become eligible to membership after having been examined and approved by the Board of Censors. He shall be elected by ballot at the Annual or Semi-Annual Meeting, and his having signed the application for membership shall be considered equivalent to an agreement to abide by the By-Laws. In case that ten negative ballots shall be cast, the name of the candidate shall be referred back to the Board of Censors, who shall make a thorough investigation, and report to the Executive Committee.

The same conditions of membership shall also apply to women having like qualifications.

All members in good standing who shall have paid their annual dues for twenty-five years, consecutive or otherwise, shall attain the rank or title of life-membership, and shall be entitled to all the privileges of the Society, but shall be exempt from the payment of the annual assessment.

#### HONORARY AND CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

XVIII. Persons who have excelled, or made any great advancement, in medical or other science, may be elected honorary members; and physicians of eminence residing out of the State may be elected corresponding members of the Society by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any stated meeting, pro-



vided the said person shall have been approved by the Executive Committee. Honorary and corresponding members shall be entitled to the diploma of the Society, and to participate in its proceedings in meetings devoted to scientific subjects.

XIX. Every applicant for membership shall deposit with his application, in the hands of the Recording Secretary, the sum of five dollars, and shall, upon his election, receive therefor the diploma of the Society, signed by the President and Secretary. Should an applicant fail of election, the money shall be returned to him.

XX. Any member in good standing shall have the privilege of withdrawing from the Society by giving notice, in writing, of such intention, and paying all arrearages due to the Society.

#### RETIRED MEMBERS.

XXI. Members, on removing from the State, or on retiring from practice, may, provided all their dues to the Society are paid, by a vote of the Executive Committee, be placed on the list of retired members, and, as such, shall be exempt from any assessments, and shall not receive, except by courtesy, any of the publications of the Society, nor be entitled to speak or vote at any of its meetings.

XXII. Any person who has resigned his membership, or been placed on the list of retired members, may, on application in writing, be reinstated by a vote of the Society at any regular meeting.

Any member removing out of the State shall have liberty to retain his membership on paying his annual assessment.



XXIII. Any member may be expelled from the Society, or, having resigned his membership, may be deprived of his privileges, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any regular meeting, upon charges of the following description ; provided the charge or charges against him have first been considered by the Executive Committee, and provided he has been notified of the same by the Secretary, and an opportunity has thereby been given him to make his defence before the Society:—

1. For any gross and notorious immorality or infamous crime under the laws of the land.

2. For any attempt to subvert the objects, or injure the reputation, of the Society.

3. For advertising, publicly vending, or pretending to the knowledge and use of, any secret nostrum.

4. For furnishing to any person, or presenting in his own behalf, a false certificate of character and studies as a student of medicine, tending to deceive the public, or the Censors of the Society.

5. For habitually furnishing advice to, or holding professional consultations with, persons who practise medicine without the necessary acquirements to entitle them to the respect, confidence, or courtesy of the members of the Society.

XXIV. As the object of the Society is to improve the science of medicine, to increase the influence and usefulness of its members, and to secure greater harmony and friendship among them, therefore it is of the highest importance that each member should so conduct himself, both in his private and professional life, as to command the entire respect of his colleagues.

Every person who becomes a member is understood



to take upon himself an obligation to communicate to the Society any discoveries he shall have made relating to the science of medicine or surgery, and to co-operate in such measures as may be adopted by the Society for the advancement of these sciences; and, on his refusal to do so, he shall be subject to such censure as the Society, by a two-thirds vote, shall inflict.

XXV. Every member of the Society, the Recording Secretary and Treasurer excepted, shall be assessed annually five dollars, and such other assessments as a majority of the members, at any legal meeting, may determine. Newly elected members shall not be liable to assessment during the year of their election.

#### DELEGATES.

XXVI. The Executive Committee may appoint delegates to other societies and associations whenever they deem it advisable to do so; and such delegates shall receive certificates of appointment from the Recording Secretary.

Accredited delegates from other societies and associations shall be allowed to participate in the scientific deliberations of this Society.

#### MEETINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

XXVII. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday of April, and the Semi-Annual Meeting on the second Wednesday of October, at ten o'clock A.M., in such one of the cities or towns of the Commonwealth as the Executive Committee may determine. A special meeting of the



Society shall be called by the President, on the written request of ten members, stating the object of said meeting.

MEETINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

XXVIII. The Executive Committee shall meet on the third Wednesday of April, July, October, and January. At the first, or Annual Meeting, the committees and the Orator shall be appointed for the ensuing year.

At the meetings of the Executive Committee, five persons shall constitute a quorum. A special meeting of the Executive Committee shall be called by the President, on the written application of three of its members.

XXIX. All proposals for alteration of the By-Laws shall be presented to the Society in writing, and shall be referred, without debate, to a special committee, who shall consider and report on the same at the next Annual Meeting of the Society.

# Massachusetts Homœopathic Medical Society.

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## *SECRETARY'S REPORT OF SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING, HELD OCTOBER 9, 1889.*

The Semi-Annual Meeting of the Massachusetts Homœopathic Medical Society, was held at Steinert Hall, Boston, Wednesday, Oct. 9th, 1889.

The meeting was called to order by the President, H. A. Houghton, M.D., of Charlestown, at 10.30 A.M.

After the reading and approval of the records of the Annual Meeting, the following candidates were elected to membership :

### DISCUSSION.

Dr. D. B. Whittier, speaking of Dr. Phillips' paper, wished to endorse what had been said in regard to the necessity of physicians cautioning patients against communicating gonorrhœa, and instructing them as to its extremely infectious character.

Dr. L. D. Packard has not found cases of gonorrhœa in women to be productive of such disastrous results as claimed by Dr. Phillips. Has seen very many cases, but no disastrous after-effects.

Dr. H. L. Chase agrees with Dr. Packard. Has not met the extremely disastrous effects spoken of, yet considers it a very serious disease, requiring utmost care. Has never been able to find the gonococcus in females.



Dr. J. W. Whidden, of Portland, Maine, is convinced from his experience that latent gonorrhœa is responsible for many distressing pelvic conditions, as stated by Dr. Phillips. Wished to ask if women suffering with these conditions are capable of communicating gonorrhœa to the male.

Dr. Phillips considers infection rare from the latent form existing chiefly in cervical canal and above.

Dr. W. H. Tobey thinks the dangers from gonorrhœal infection in women greatly overestimated by Dr. Phillips; does not believe in latent gonorrhœa, and does not consider gonorrhœal inflammation worse than any other inflammation; therefore just as capable of permanent cure.

Dr. J. H. Sherman is surprised to find that gonorrhœa is so formidable a disease; has had considerable experience extending over many years, and has never so considered it. Has met with but one instance of disastrous after-effect.

Dr. Alonzo Boothby is aware that it is often difficult to prove a connection between gonorrhœa and the many pelvic disorders supposed to result from it, yet the absence of other causes, and the fact that in a large number of cases the husband has at some time had gonorrhœa, creates the suspicion that this disease may have been the origin.

Dr. Phillips, in reply to a question if it is true that gonorrhœal discharge in women gives acid reaction, and leucorrhœal discharge, alkaline, said that investigators have decided this test entirely unreliable. In regard to the dangers from gonorrhœal infection in women, the opinion of such men as Comstock, Runnels, and Ludlam, outweighs that of those of less experience, and they concur in the opinion of its severity and disastrous results in women.

At one P. M. the meeting adjourned for lunch, which was served at the Hotel Thorndike and gave general satisfaction.



Before returning to the hall, N. W. Emerson, M.D., delivered an eloquent oration, replete with lofty sentiments, appealing to the finer feelings, and pointing the profession to a higher plane of thought and action.

Dr. Wesselhœft explained fully the process and utility of "chart making," and offered the summaries of Mr. Pick and Dr. Pritchard as examples of the result to be obtained.

Dr. T. M. Hunter considered the plan proposed an excellent one theoretically, but impracticable on account of the discrepancies existing in the works of our different compilers.

Dr. Wesselhœft considers this objection by no means insurmountable. The writings of our earlier compilers might certainly give rise to grave perplexity, and he regretted that these works, which had so long outlived their usefulness, should still be worshipped as authorities. But a short cut has been afforded us by a few clear-headed scientific men.

T. F. Allen and Richard Hughes have given us classic works which are sufficient for our purpose, and will be standard works, not only for homœopathists, but for the entire medical profession.

The annual meeting of the Massachusetts Homœopathic Medical Society, was held at Steinert Hall, Boston, Wednesday, April 9, 1890.

The meeting was called to order at 10.30 A. M., by the President, H. A. Houghton, M.D.

After the reading and approval of the records of the semi-annual meeting, the Treasurer's report, showing a satisfactory balance on hand, was read and approved.

Auditor's report was then read and accepted.

Discussion. Dr. H. C. Clapp said that he regarded this report as one of the most valuable and interesting the Society had received for some time. Is especially glad that the idea of the contagious character of tuberculosis is gaining ground. The decrease in mortality as shown by the report, is also very gratifying. Thinks the views of some of Dr. Rand's correspondents in regard to the curability of consumption, are rather pessimistic. Believes it possible not only to ameliorate, but to occasionally positively cure the disease. As to prevention, Dr. Clapp would agree with the ideas expressed by Dr. Gibbs, but would have borne still harder upon the importance of maintaining a high standard of health in those predisposed to consumption rather than the effort at destruction of bacilli. Believes that agents not destructive to human life are incapable of destroying bacilli if they have once gained entrance into the system.

As to killing them outside that is practically impossible; he therefore urges the necessity of using every possible means to improve the constitution.

The Committee on Change of By-Laws presented a majority report in favor of the proposed amendment and a minority report adverse to it. After considerable discussion it was voted to accept the report and discharge the committee.

A motion was then made to adopt the majority report, but it was lost.

Dr. I. T. Talbot then proposed a modification of the "Australian Ballot System" to govern the nomination and election of officers for the ensuing year, which was duly adopted.



Lunch was served at Hotel Thorndike, of which over one hundred members partook.

At half-past two the meeting was again called to order, and the Society listened to a most interesting address by the President, H. A. Houghton, M.D.

Dr. H. E. Spalding opened the discussion on Antisepsis in the Lying-in Chamber. He spoke of the vast number of lives which have undoubtedly been lost, both in hospitals and in private practice by septicæmia. The improved results of habitual practice are undoubtedly due to antiseptic precautions taken. In the German hospitals a two-and-one-half per cent solution of carbolic acid was used for cleansing the hands. Before confinement the patient is cleansed carefully, and during labor a pad saturated with some antiseptic solution is placed over the vulva. As a result of these precautions they are able to report less than one per cent of deaths.

The sources of contagion are various. The contagiousness of puerperal fever is to-day unquestioned; whether it can be developed from other infectious diseases as scarlatina, diphtheria or erysipelas is still an open question; is of the opinion that it can not. The same is true of the disease being transmitted by the physician; believes that precautions can be taken so that the physician need not carry the disease. In regard to the value of douches, does not use them so frequently as formerly, and now principally for cleanliness. Unless I have had to introduce my hand within the uterus, or there has been retained fragments of foetus, placenta, or membranes, I do not use the intra-uterine douche at all.

Dr. Southwick.—In St. Petersburg a solution of chloride of lime is used two or three hours after delivery and repeated several times in



the first forty-eight hours. In Halle, a solution of sulphite of soda, permanent irrigation up to the fundus for a week. Fritch to-day is very much opposed to the vaginal douche before delivery and, indeed, many prominent obstetricians abroad oppose all forms of internal antisepsis. In the New York maternity the mortality is now only 1.06 per cent. A vaginal douche is given before delivery, and intra-uterine after delivery if the uterus has been invaded. Curetting the uterus is in vogue if any symptoms of septicæmia. A large blunt curette is used. Prof. Lusk calls intra-uterine douches harmful, and this is the sentiment of the American Gynecological Society. Another point insisted upon by Lusk is that the use of antiseptics does not warrant a man in attending labor cases if attending infectious diseases.

Dr. Hastings has never used antiseptic precautions and has met with success equal to that of most practitioners. Has been intimately acquainted for sixteen years with a private lying-in hospital, and in all that time, with a record of five hundred or six hundred cases, there has never been a case of septicæmia. Perfect cleanliness has been observed. Honestly believes the whole secret of the results from antiseptic precautions lies in the one word, cleanliness.

Dr. Tower, of Watertown, while treating a case of malignant erysipelas attended five cases of confinement, and with the precaution of washing the hands had not a case of septicæmia.

Dr. Barnard, of Providence, endorses Dr. Hastings' opinion, and goes still further. Has attended cases where the surroundings were positively filthy and yet had no trouble. Has attended over five hundred cases and lost but one, and that from traumatism. Believes in cleanliness and antiseptic measures, but does not regard the latter as necessary for safety.

Dr. West does not believe in riding a hobby. In a large hospital much needs to be done which can be safely left undone in private practice. The person born at his first confinement case will be fifty-four years old next September. Has had the average number of cases since that time amongst all classes of people and cases, and has never had a death from puerperal fever, and has never used an antiseptic during the whole time.

## THE MASSACHUSETTS HOMŒOPATHIC HOSPITAL.

This institution was incorporated in 1855, but was first opened for the reception of patients on Jan. 23, 1871, at 14 Burroughs Place. In May, 1872, under the stimulus of the expulsion of eight members from the Massachusetts Medical Society on account of their practice of homœopathy, a public fair was held in both Music and Horticultural Halls, which netted upwards of \$76,000. Land was purchased on East Concord Street, adjoining the college lot, and a building to hold forty patients was erected thereon. This was occupied in May, 1876, and the building and land together cost upwards of \$80,000. The building soon proved too small for the demands of the community, and in 1883-4 large additions were made consisting of a surgical wing on the southerly side of the original hospital, a boiler house and laundry in the centre of the lot and a small cottage or isolating ward. These additions more than doubled the capacity of the hospital, which can accommodate about eighty patients. The cost of these additions, with furnishing, was about one hundred thousand dollars, of which sixty-five thousand was contributed by a single individual, Mr. G. F. T. Reed, whose generosity has enabled the hospital to do so much more and better work.

The number of cases treated in 1889 was 512, of which 152 were medical and 360 surgical. Since the opening of the hospital in 1871 4,304 cases have been treated, 2,021 medical and 2,283 surgical. Of these, 189 have died, or less than *four and one half* per cent. During the past year the hospital has applied to the Legislature for State aid to afford increased facilities. This has been granted to the amount of \$120,000, which it is estimated will be sufficient to build an additional wing on the north side similar to the one erected in 1884, and an extension of the present surgical wing towards Albany Street. This will give additional capacity of one hundred beds to the hospital. The running expenses, which are now more than \$25,000 annually,



will be largely increased by these additions, and means must be secured for meeting these expenses.

## WESTBOROUGH INSANE HOSPITAL.

In June, 1884, a charter was granted to the hospital. The land and buildings belonging to the State Reform School at Westborough were transferred to the Hospital, together with \$150,000, for making necessary changes. Accommodations were then provided for 325 patients. At a later time other appropriations were made, increasing the accommodations to 405 patients. The hospital was declared open for the reception of patients on the 1st of December, 1886, by the Governor, George D. Robinson. About 200 patients were transferred from other hospitals during the first year, and the numbers gradually increased until August, 1887, when the average number of patients was 415. Since that time the number of patients has remained above the normal capacity of the hospital.

Efforts are constantly made for the individual treatment of patients, not only by a selection of remedies, but by special nursing, special diet, by rest treatment, and also by amusement, such as ball games, dances, concerts, readings, etc. The results of treatment have been very satisfactory in the percentage of cures and the low rate of deaths, even without considering the incurable character of such a large proportion of those admitted.

All patients in the hospital are paid for in some way. There are no free patients. Payments are received from three sources. In the



case of private patients their board is paid by their friends, the lowest rate being \$5.00 a week, and increasing from that sum in proportion to what is furnished; town patients who are supported by towns in which they have settlements; and State patients who are residents of the State, not having settlements in any town.

Admissions to the hospital are made in two ways: as voluntary patients and as committed patients. Those who come to the hospital voluntarily are required to sign an application to the Superintendent, asking that they be received as patients in the hospital. They must necessarily be private patients, as the towns or state would not recognize them as chargeable to them unless committed. They must also not be insane, according to the following extract from the Public Statutes: "Whose mental condition is not such as to render it legal to grant a certificate of insanity in his case."

Committed patients are brought to the hospital by a constable or their friends, with a commitment. That is made by a judge or a police justice, upon the sworn statements of two physicians who have practiced three years in this State, and who not only declare the person insane, but give the facts for that opinion.

The law also provides for the commitment of inebriates as "Dipsomaniacs" or "Habitual Drunkards," in the same manner as the insane.

The hospital is situated on a farm of nearly 300 acres, about two miles from the village of Westborough and a half mile from Hospital Station. It may be reached from Boston by taking a train at the Boston and Albany Station either by way of Westborough on the Boston and Albany Railroad, or by Hospital Station on the Northern Division of the Old Colony Railroad. It is 32 miles from Boston and 12 miles from Worcester.

## THE NEWTON COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

[INCORPORATED IN JANUARY, 1881.]

The building being erected by private contributions, was dedicated and opened in June, 1886.

The medical and surgical staff, consists of an equal number of physicians appointed from the allopathic and homœopathic schools of medicine.

On admission to the hospital, patients elect by which system of medicine they desire to be treated, and if no preference is expressed, are assigned pro rata to either the homœopathic or allopathic side, the hospital reports showing that about forty per cent of the medical and a still larger per cent of the surgical cases, are treated in the homœopathic department.

The utmost harmony has ever existed in the hospital between the two schools of medicine, assistance when desired always having been courteously rendered by either school to the other, both in medicine and surgery.

There is connected with the hospital, a training school for nurses, who are instructed by the whole medical and surgical staff.

The yearly expenses of the hospital are about eight thousand dollars, which is raised by voluntary contributions, the city appropriating fifteen hundred dollars toward that amount.

When accommodations can be afforded, out of town patients are received at the minimum price of ten dollars per week, while none from Newton are ever refused, even if they can pay nothing toward the support of the hospital.

The present Homœopathic Medical Staff consists of Drs. F. E. Crockett, James Utley, E. P. Scales, F. L. McIntosh, G. H. Talbot and S. A. Sylvester, the term of service being two months for each physician, and the consulting surgeons are, Drs. Jas. Utley and M. H. Clarke.

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MORTON HOSPITAL, TAUNTON.

This hospital was established mainly by the gift of Mrs. Susan T. Kimball, in June, 1888, of the homestead estate of her father, the late Gov. Marcus Morton, of Taunton. The building was suitably



repaired and altered, and opened for patients on January 8, 1889. The patients can have without discrimination, either homœopathic or allopathic treatment, there being a full representation of homœopathic physicians upon the medical staff

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#### MALDEN HOSPITAL.

This hospital was established largely by the gifts of Hon. E. S. Converse of Malden, and in its charter, following the purpose of the Institution, occurs the clause :—"in which physicians, who are fellows of the Massachusetts Medical Society, or who are members of the Massachusetts Homœopathic Medical Society, shall always have equal rights and privileges." Thus the institution, like the hospitals at Newton, Taunton, and other places, are forever to have the benefit of homœopathic treatment to those who desire it.

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#### HOMŒOPATHIC MEDICAL DISPENSARY, BOSTON.

This dispensary was incorporated in 1856. It was opened to the public in 1857, and for thirteen years occupied rooms in Tremont Temple. For the first two years it was sustained by the voluntary subscriptions of its friends ; but in March, 1859, a public fair was held in Music Hall, which realized upwards of \$13,000. This has been held as a permanent fund, the income of which has been used to pay the expenses. In 1870, the dispensary purchased the estate No. 14 Burroughs Place, and has since had rooms there. In 1873, on the opening of Boston University School of Medicine on East Concord Street, a branch dispensary was established in the college-building. Two years later, another branch was opened in Leverett Street, but was afterwards removed to Charity Building in Chardon Street. During the past year the dispensary has accomplished the following work : Central Dispensary, 1,376 patients, 3,946 prescriptions ; West End Branch, 3,610 patients, 7,527 prescriptions ; College Branch, 10,634 patients, 26,381 prescriptions ; making the total number treated 15,620, with 37,854 prescriptions.



Of the patients, 3,198 have been treated at their homes, and to them 7,721 visits have been made.

Since its opening, the dispensary has treated 197,986 patients, and has made 512,112 prescriptions.

Its medical staff consists of forty-eight, assisted by medical students in the third and fourth years of their studies.

Something more than a year ago the attention of the public was called to the unsuitable and inadequate quarters occupied by the dispensary. An effort was made to secure funds sufficient to erect a new building.

Application was made to the city government for land and a favorable site at the corner of Harrison Avenue and Stoughton Street, between East Concord and East Newton Streets, containing 10,600 square feet was given by the city on condition that a building costing not less than twenty-five thousand dollars should be erected upon it within two years. Already nearly forty thousand dollars have been subscribed and the building is now in process of erection. It will be one hundred and twenty feet in length by fifty-two in width with an L thirty by thirty-two. It will be four stories high with a basement and roof-story. In connection with this will be a maternity, or lying-in hospital, occupying the two upper stories.

Some sixty thousand dollars additional will be required to complete the building for occupancy, and when done it will be one of the most capacious and conveniently arranged dispensaries in this country. It will add largely to the facilities for the clinical instruction of the medical school.

## BOSTON UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.

This forms the medical department of Boston University, and was opened for the instruction of students in October, 1873.

An enabling act was passed by the Legislature of 1874, by which the New England Female Medical College was united to this school, and its property transferred thereto.

This school has from the first occupied advanced ground, and was the first in America to present in combination the following essential elements of a thorough reform in medical education :—

*First*, The requirement that the candidate for admission either present a college diploma, or pass a prescribed entrance examination.

*Second*, The provision of a carefully graded minimum course of instruction covering three full scholastic years.

*Third*, The provision of a four-years' course for those who wish to pursue their studies with special thoroughness, and with suitable leisure for collateral reading, and to obtain professional experience under direction of the faculty.

*Fourth*, The requirement that every student pass a successful examination upon the work of each year, before promotion to the next.

*Fifth*, The requirement, as a condition of graduation, not merely that the candidate shall have studied medicine at least three full years, but also that he shall have attended a reputable medical school not less than three years.

*Sixth*, The restoration of the degrees of Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery, to be attained at the end of the third year by those who take a four-years' course.

*Seventh*, A provision for visiting and examining boards, independent of the teaching faculty.



*Eighth*, The repudiation of all sex disabilities either in teaching or learning.

It has graduated five hundred and five students, most of whom are in active practice.

During the past year the students in the various classes numbered one hundred and two.

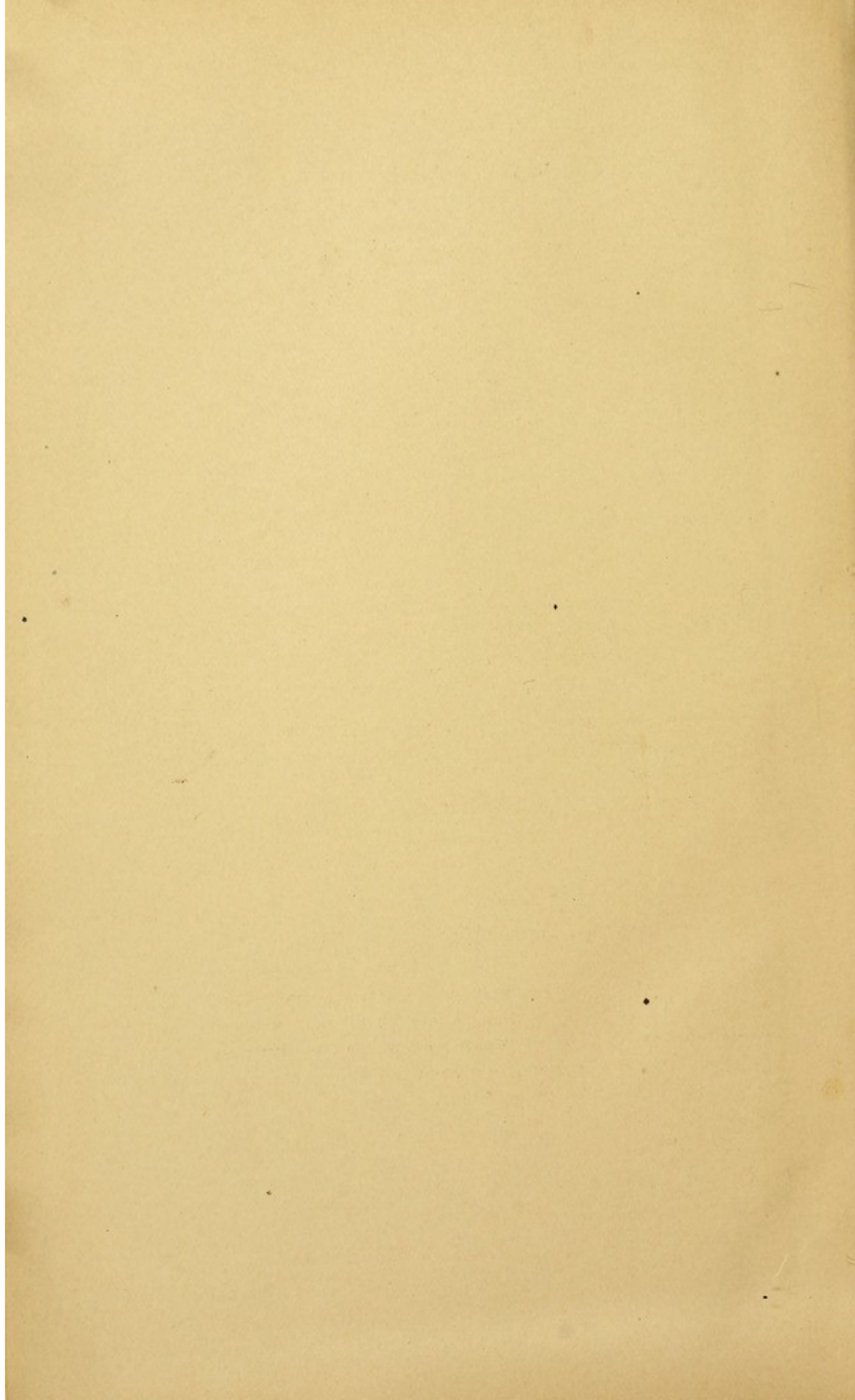

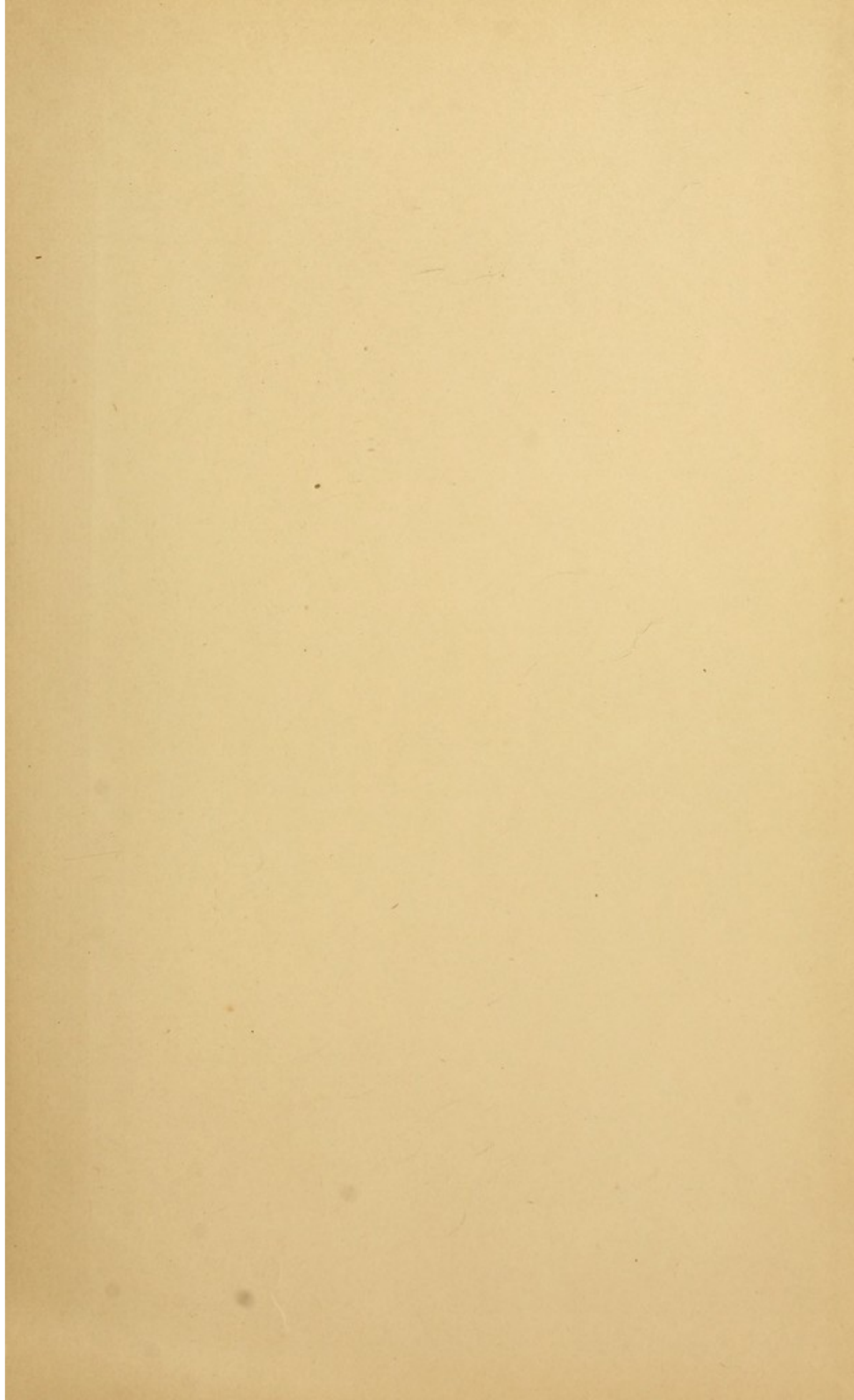
# THE QUINCY HOSPITAL.

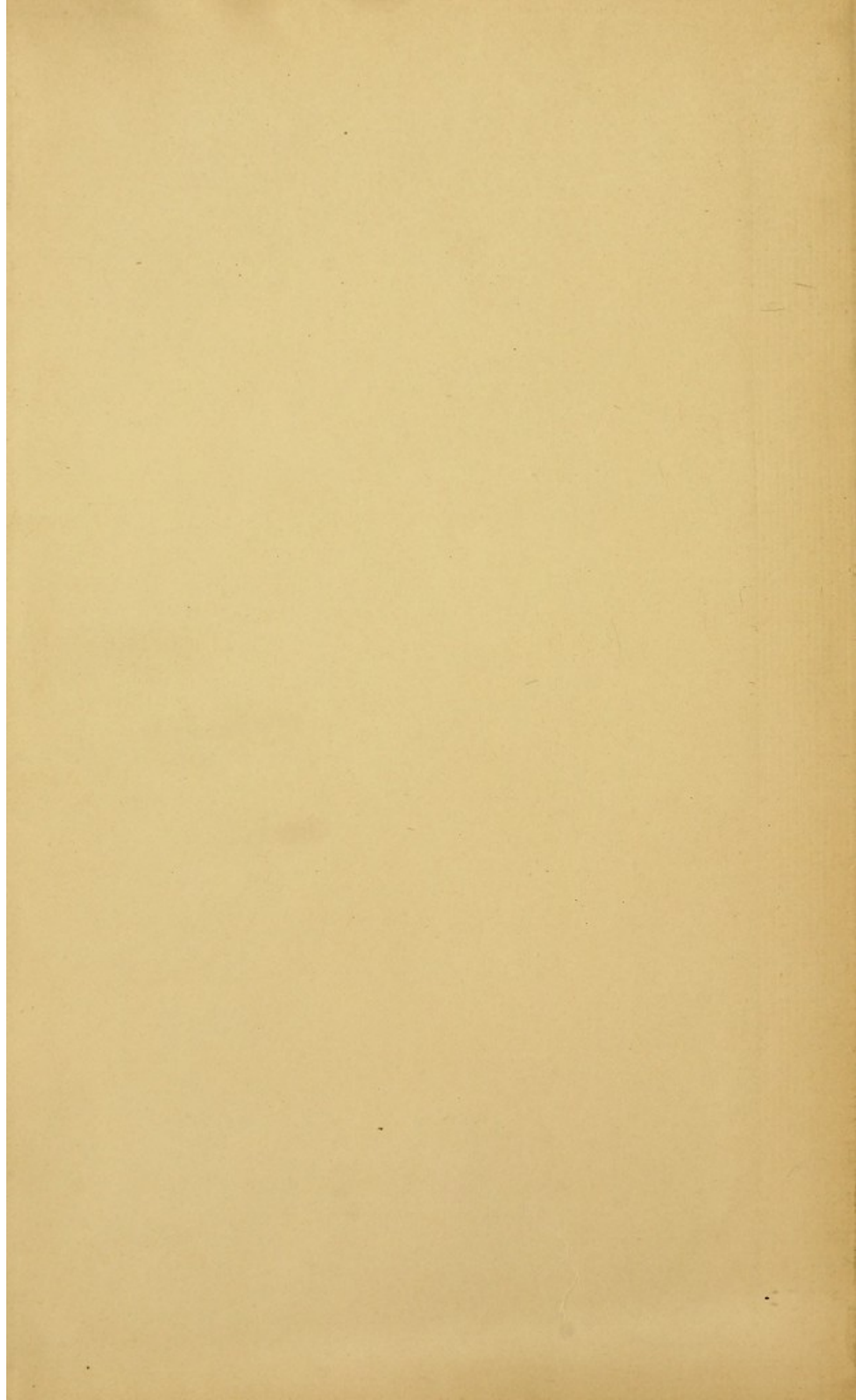












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
