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





# TREASURY DEPARTMENT, BUREAU OF U. S. MARINE-HOSPITAL SERVICE, Washington, D. C., January, 1874.

The attention of Medical Officers is respectfully called to the following extract from the Regulations of the United States Marine-Hospital Service, approved October 1, 1873:

The "Provisional Nomenclature" of the Royal College of Physicians of London, (Eng.,) is adopted by the United States Marine-Hospital Bureau, as the nosological system to be observed by medical officers of the Service in their reports and communications.

As this is too bulky to insert in a volume of Regulations, intended also for the guidance and information of others not concerned with the professional details of the Service, the *Nomenclature* is issued separately, and will be supplied to medical officers, on requisition, by the BUREAU.

It is desired that the Report of Diseases and Injuries (Form 15) and the Report of Surgical Operations (Form 16) be made out in strict conformity with this system.

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#### NOTE.

WITH the approval of the Honorable the Secretary of the Treasury, the Supervising Surgeon has adopted, and herewith presents, as the official nomenclature for the use of medical officers of the United States Marine-Hospital Service, the English-Latin terminology and the classification of the Nomenclature of Diseases drawn up by a Joint Committee appointed by the Royal College of Physicians of London, Eng.

This action has been taken in the belief that the 'Provisional Nomenclature' forms the most promising basis, at least, for a standard and international nosonomy and classification—subject, as it is, to decennial revision, in which there is reason to expect the profession of this country will be represented, and being, in itself, the work of those 'who hold, or have held, the highest places as representative men in the Science of Medicine,' among whom, as will be seen by the subjoined preface to the English edition, were the chiefs of the medical departments of the public services, thus ensuring the official recognition of the system throughout the British Empire.

In this country—previous to this, its first official adoption—the classification of diseases in the Statistics of Mortality for the IXth Census of the United States was made, in all essential particulars, in accordance with it. It is, practically, adopted, through the medium of the American edition of 'the representative book' above quoted,\* by the Medical Department of the

United States Army. It has been endorsed, pro tanto, by the profession, through the action of the American Medical Association at its session May 6–9, 1873. And its provisional adoption in the United States was formally recommended by the American Public Health Association at its last annual meeting.

From the foregoing it will be seen that its promise to become the common nomenclature and classification for at least all English-speaking peoples is in a fair way to be realized; and in furtherance of this end the present edition—aside from the omission of the French, German, and Italian equivalents, the transposition of the English and Latin names, the verification of the Index, and the correction of a few clerical and typographical errors—has been made a literal transcript of the English original.

In this connection the Supervising Surgeon desires to acknowledge his obligation to Dr. Frank W. Reilly, U. S. M-H. S., for valuable assistance in the preparation of the work for the press.

#### PREFACE TO THE ORIGINAL ENGLISH EDITION.

FOR PERFECTING the statistical registration of diseases, with a view to the discovery of statistical truths concerning their history, nature, and phenomena, the want of a generally recognised Nomenclature of Diseases has long been felt as an indispensable condition.

The advantages accruing from accurate statistics of disease are likely to be the greater and the surer in proportion as the field of investigation is the wider.

The statistics of a single town may be instructive; but more instruction will be obtained from the compared statistics of various and many towns. This is alike true of different districts of the same country, and of different countries and climates: and the most instructive sanitary statistics would be those which related to the whole of the inhabited portions of the globe.

For the registration of such statistical facts it is clearly requisite that there should be a uniform Nomenclature of Diseases, co-extensive with the area of investigation; and taking the largest area, the universal globe, the Nomenclature would need to be one that can be understood and used by the educated people of all nations.

Among the great ends of such a uniform Nomenclature must be reckoned that of fixing definitely, for all places, the things about which medical observation is exercised, and of forming a steady basis upon which medical experience may be safely built.

Another main use of the statistical registration of diseases on a wide scale, is that it must tend to throw light upon the causes of disease, many of which causes, when duly recognised, may be capable of prevention, removal, or diminution.

When a general and uniform Nomenclature of Diseases has once been carefully framed, when we are sure that medical observation is occupying itself everywhere with the selfsame diseases, the value of statistical tables becomes very high, as representing the course of events in disease under various circumstances of time, place, season, climate, manners and customs, age, sex, race, and treatment.

This general, or common, or standard nomenclature need not be imposed upon every nation and people as its proper nomenclature.

It could not. It would be unintelligible by the people at large, and embarrassing to those by whom the necessary returns must be made. But the nomenclature proper or peculiar to each country, and which may be called its *national* nomenclature, should be readily convertible into the *standard* nomenclature.

The one, or the other, of these standard and national nomenclatures may first be framed by an English (or by any other) Committee, or the two may be framed simultaneously.

The Committee appointed by the Royal College of Physicians of London have prepared a Nomenclature suitable to England, and to all countries where the English language is in common use. For each name they have supplied the corresponding Latin term, which is the language of ancient science, and probably the fittest language for a nomenclature common to all the world; and also the equivalent term in the three modern languages which are the richest in medical learning and literature, the French, the German, and the Italian languages: and in this way they hope to have laid the foundation for a Nomenclature of Diseases in any language extant on the earth.

In the English list of names, it seemed desirable that as little deviation as possible should be made from those employed by the Registrar-General of England; otherwise his settled plans and his forms of returns, which have been followed for thirty years, would require to be remodelled; the comparison of future with past returns would be made difficult and perplexing, if not impossible; and a damaging break would be caused in evidence which becomes more and more trustworthy and valuable, in proportion as it is prolonged and continuous.

Again, it is desirable that all lists should consist, as much as may be possible, of short names—names comprised in one word, or in the fewest words; also, in the nomenclature proper, or national, that they should be names in common and popular use, especially when these are single, or short, and distinctive, and imply no erroneous or doubtful theories.

Names are not necessarily to be excluded, however, merely because they may seem to express only vague or imperfect knowledge; such names as Dropsy, Convulsions, Palsy—disorders which may severally depend upon various and different morbid changes within the body, not always easy of recognition. It has been well observed by Dr. Farr, whose aid has been of great value to the Committee, that the refusal to sanction such terms as these in the registration of diseases 'would have an obvious tendency to encourage reckless conjecture' in making returns.

Some names (as SMALL-POX) speak for themselves: many (as DIPH-THERIA) require to be defined, for the sole purpose, however, of identification: to others (as BRIGHT'S DISEASE) it is expedient, for the same purpose only, to append synonyms.

When fixed names have been given to diseases, their classification becomes a matter of some importance.

A good classification aids and simplifies the registration of diseases; helps towards a more easy comparison and knowledge of them, and towards the storing of experience respecting them; and facilitates the discovery of general principles from the collected, grouped, and compared phenomena.

But a good classification is a very difficult matter.

Diseases might be classified according to their symptoms; to their causes; to their intimate nature; to the tissues, or to the systems of the body, that are affected; or to the parts of the body as they lie anatomically.

After much consideration, the Committee have resolved 'that the proposed classification of diseases should be based upon anatomical considerations.'

In subservience to this anatomical distribution, diseases may also be grouped as being general or local.

General diseases are such as affect the whole frame rather than any special part of it. Local diseases are such as occupy special parts of the body.

General diseases may be conveniently subdivided into two sections, A and B.

Section A comprehends those disorders which appear to involve a morbid condition of the blood, and which present for the most part, but not all of them, the following characters: They run a definite course, are attended with fever, and frequently with eruptions on the skin, are more or less readily communicable from person to person, and possess the singular and important property of generally protecting those who suffer them from a second attack. They are apt to occur epidemically. Of these epidemic visitations, Dr. Farr observes, that they distinguish one country from another, one year from another, have formed epochs in chronology, have decimated armies and disabled fleets, have influenced the fate of cities—nay, of empires.

Section B comprises, for the most part, disorders which are apt to invade different parts of the same body simultaneously or in succession. These are sometimes spoken of as constitutional diseases, and they often manifest a tendency to transmission by inheritance.

THE construction of this Nomenclature has been so long in hand, that it may be proper and not uninteresting to record the circumstances of its origin and progress.

The idea which led to the formation of a general Nomenclature of Diseases originated in a correspondence between Dr. Dumbreck, of the Medical Department of the Army, and Dr. Sibson, respecting the need of such a Nomenclature for use in the Army Medical Service.

But at the *Comitia majora* of the Royal College of Physicians, held on the ninth day of July, 1857, it was resolved, on the motion of Dr. Nairne, in consequence of a letter addressed to the College by the Hospitals Committee of the Epidemiological Society, 'That a Committee be appointed to prepare a Nomenclature of Diseases, and that such Committee have full power to co-operate with other bodies.'

The following Fellows of the College were appointed members of the Committee by the President of the College:—

At the first meeting of the Committee Dr. Sibson was appointed Secretary.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

THOSE DISEASES only have been defined which seemed to require it; and the definitions have been framed for the purpose of *identification* only, not as explanations of the phenomena of disease.

The words 'tending to' have always been applied to an event which is natural and probable, but not inevitable: 'resulting in' to an event which is inevitable, if the disease runs its natural course.

With a view to facilitate the registration of disease in accordance with this Nomenclature, the following explanations are offered:

By turning to the Alphabetical Index, the name of any disease may be readily found.

In the body of the work the name of each disease is preceded by a distinguishing number, and as a rule is printed in Roman letters, but in exceptional cases in *Italics*. [In a few cases the 'distinguishing number' has been repeated. In this edition, to avoid possible confusion from the use of asterisks and obelisks for double purposes, the repeated number is followed by an Italic letter, as 73, 73a, on p. 19; 497, 497a, 497b, on p. 53, &c. The nonpareil letters and numbers affixed to the reference numbers of names printed in *Italics* indicate varieties, as (101b) on p. 5 refers to '101. Neuralgia,' on p. 21, and to Variety 'b. Brow Ague,' on p. 22.—W.]

Whenever such exception is observed, the disease thus printed in *Italics* should not be registered among the local or other affections with which it appears, but under the class to which its special number refers it, and, as regards the organ in which it may be seated, in the order particularised at p. 9.

In short, the local manifestations of general diseases are to be returned, not among local, but among general diseases.\*

Where varieties are observable in the forms of disease, such varieties are indicated by their being 'indented,' i. e., printed below and somewhat to the right of the principal heading, each being preceded by a

<sup>\*</sup>For example, in the list of diseases of the stomach given at p. 49, Cancer of that organ is included, but it is distinguished by *Italics*. And in making returns it should be placed among other cancerous affections, to which the prefixed number between brackets [24] refers it. If such return should include similar affections of other parts, the position assigned to the disorders of the stomach, in relation to other organs, is determined by consulting the list given at p. 9.

distinguishing letter. Such lists are given by way of example, and are not to be regarded as exhaustive.

Diseases should only be returned under such general names as 'Dropsy,' 'Convulsions,' 'Palsy,' when the morbid conditions upon which they depend are unknown; but when the cause has been ascertained, the case should be registered under the head of the primary disease, the secondary affections being also specified.

Non-malignant Tumours and Cysts have not been numbered for reasons stated at p. 11.

Surgical Operations, Parasites and Malformations are placed in an Appendix.

Notes in explanation of particular cases are given in various parts of the work.

Headache and analogous affections, being merely symptoms of constitutional or local diseases, are not included in this Nomenclature.

#### Arrangement of Local Diseases.

The attention of those making use of this Nomenclature is especially called to the 'Arrangement of Local Diseases' given at p. 16. That list, which occupies scarcely two pages, includes nearly all the important forms of disease which affect the various organs, and is therefore a key to the general arrangement of those diseases adopted throughout the work.

#### Latin Version.

In the Latin Version the translators have kept the following purposes steadily in view. They have endeavoured to avoid as far as possible, all barbarous, ill-formed, and unnecessarily coined words; and they have taken for their standard the best writers of the Roman period, especially Celsus. To this must be ascribed the occasional deviations from the usages of modern Latin, and the discrepancies which here and there occur between the Latin version and the corresponding terms in the English Nomenclature.

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# NOMENCLATURE OF DISEASES.

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#### GENERAL DISEASES.

(MORBI CORPORIS UNIVERSI.)

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1. Small-pox. (Variola.)

Group A [unmodified]. (Species A.—Simplex.)

Group B [modified]. (Species B.—Modificata.) Definition: Pustules cut short in their development by vaccination or previous attack of Small-pox.

Varieties, applicable to both groups:

- a. Confluent. (V.—Confluens.) Definition: Pustules running together over the greater part of the body.
- b. Semi-confluent. (V.—Semiconfluens.)
- c. Distinct. Synonym, Discrete. (V.—Discreta.) Definition: All the pustules separate.
- d. Abortive. Synonym, Varicelloid. (V.—Curta. Idem valet Varicelliformis.) Definition: Comparatively few pustules, the general eruption scarcely passing beyond the stage of vesicle.

- Subordinate Varieties:

- e. Petechial. (V.—Petechialis.)
- f. Hæmorrhagic. (V.—Hæmorrhagica.) Definition: Blood effused into the vesicles or pustules, with a tendency to hæmorrhage from the mucous surfaces.
- g. Corymbose. (V.—Corymbosa.) Definition: Some of the pustules assume the form of clusters, like a bunch of grapes (corymbus). This is a rare variety of the disease.
- 2. Cow-pox. (Vaccinia.)
- 3. Chicken-pox. (Varicella.)
- 4. Measles. (Morbilli.)
- 5. Scarlet fever. Synonym, Scarlatina. (Febris rubra.)

Varieties:

- a. Simple. (V.—Simplex.) Definition: A scarlet rash, with redness of the throat, but without ulceration.
- b. Anginose. (V.—Anginosa.) Definition: A more severe form of the disease with redness and ulceration of the throat, and a tendency to the formation of abscess in the neck.

c. Malignant. (V.—Maligna.) Definition: The throat tends to slough; the scarlet rash is scarcely, if at all, visible; petechiæ are often seen on the surface, and the fever is of a low form.

Note.—Scarlet fever occurs occasionally without any rash or sore throat being observed.

- 6. Dengue. (Denguis.) Definition: An ephemeral continued fever or febricula, characterised by frontal headache, and by severe pains in the limbs and trunk, and sometimes by an eruption, resembling that of measles, over the body; occurring in the West Indies.
- 7. Typhus fever. (Typhus.) Definition: A continued fever, characterised by great prostration, and a general, dusky, mottled rash, without specific lesion of the bowels.
- 8. Cerebro-spinal fever. Synonyms, Malignant purpuric fever; Epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis. (Febris cerebrospinalis. Idem valent Febris purpurea pestifera. Meningitis epidemica cerebrospinalis.) Definition: A malignant epidemic fever attended by painful contraction of the muscles of the neck, and retraction of the head. In certain epidemics it is frequently accompanied by a profuse purpuric eruption, and, occasionally, by secondary effusions into certain joints. Lesions of the brain and spinal cord and their membranes are found on dissection.
- 9. Enteric fever. Synonym, Typhoid fever. (Febris enterica. Idem valet Febris typhodes.) Definition: A continued fever, characterised by the presence of rose-coloured spots, chiefly on the abdomen, and a tendency to diarrhæa, with specific lesion of the bowels.
  - Enteric fever occurring in the child is often named Infantile remittent fever. (Febris infantium remittens.)

Note.—Fevers symptomatic of worms, teething, or other sources of irritation should not be included under this head.

- 10. Relapsing fever. (Febris recidiva.) Definition: A continued fever of short duration, characterised by absence of eruption, and an abrupt relapse, occurring after an interval of about a week.
- 11. Simple continued fever. (Fébris continua simplex.) Definition:
  Continued fever having no specific character.
- 12. Febricula. (Febricula.) Definition: Simple fever of not more than three or four days' duration.

- 13. Yellow fever. (Febris flava.) Definition: A malignant epidemic fever, usually continued, but sometimes assuming a paroxysmal type, characterised by yellowness of the skin, and accompanied, in the severest cases, by hæmorrhage from the stomach [black vomit], nares, and mouth.
- 14. Plague. (Pestilentia.) Definition: A specific fever, attended with bubo of the inguinal or other glands, and occasionally with carbuncles.
- 15. Ague. Synonym, Intermittent fever. (Febris intermittens.)

Varieties:

- a. Quotidian. (V.—Quotidiana.)
- b. Tertian. (V.—Tertiana.)

Sub-variety:

Double tertian. (Tertiana duplex.)

c. Quartan. (V.—Quartana.)

Sub-variety:

Double quartan. (Quartana duplex.)

d. Irregular. (V.—Inordinata.)

(101b.) Brow ague. (Neuralgia frontis.)

16. Remittent fever. (Febris remittens.) Definition: A malarious fever, characterised by irregular repeated exacerbations, the remissions being less distinct in proportion to the intensity of the fever. It is accompanied by functional disturbance of the liver, and frequently by yellowness of skin.

Note.—The Malignant local fevers of warm climates (Febres pestiferæ singularum regionum) are usually of this class.

- 17. Simple cholera. (Cholera simplex.)
- 18. Malignant cholera. Synonyms, Serous cholera; Spasmodic cholera; Asiatic cholera. (Cholera pestifera. Idem valent Cholera serosa, Cholera spastica, Cholera Asiatica.)

  Definition: An epidemic disease, characterised by vomiting and purging, with evacuations like rice-water, accompanied by cramps, and resulting in suppression of urine and collapse.
  - a. Cheleraic diarrhœa. (Diarrhœa cholerica.)

- 19. Diphtheria. (Diphtheria.) Definition: A specific disease, with membranous exudation on a mucous surface, generally of the mouth, fauces, and air passages, or occasionally on a wound.
  - a. Diphtheritic paralysis. (Paralysis diphtherica.)
- 20. Hooping-cough. (Pertussis.)
- 21. Mumps. (Parotides.) Definition: An epidemic and contagious affection of the salivary glands.
- 22. Influenza. (Catarrhus epidemicus.)
- 23. Glanders. (Equinia.) Definition: An inflammatory affection of the nasal mucous membrane, produced by the contagion of matter from a glandered horse.
- 24. Farcy. (Farciminum.) Definition: An inflammatory affection of the skin and of the absorbent system, produced by the contagion of matter from a horse having glanders or farcy.
- 25. Equinia mitis. Synonym, Grease. (Equinia mitis.) Definition: A pustular eruption, produced by the contagion of matter from a horse affected with the grease.
- 26. Malignant pustule. (Pustula maligna.) Definition: A spreading gangrenous inflammation, commencing as a vesicle on exposed skin, attended with peculiar hardness and fœtor, and derived from cattle similarly diseased.
- 27. Phagedæna. (Phagedæna.) Definition: A condition of wounds or ulcers in which they spread with a sloughy surface.
- 28. Sloughing phagedæna. (Phagedæna putris.) Definition: A severe form of phagedæna, in which the slough extends deeper than the surface.
- 29. Hospital gangrene. (Gangræna nosocomiorum.) Definition: Sloughing phagedæna, occurring endemically in hospitals.
- 30. Erysipelas. (Erysipelas.) Definition: Inflammation of the integument, tending to spread indefinitely.

#### Varieties:

- a. Simple. Synonym, Cutaneous. (V.—Simplex. Idem valet In summo.)
- b. Phlegmonous. Synonym, Cellulo-cutaneous. (V.—Phlegmonodes. Idem valet In summo et infra cutem.)
- c. Diffuse inflammation [of cellular tissue.] (V.—Inflammatio diffusa membranæ cellulosæ.) Definition: Inflammation of the cellular tissue, tending to spread indefinitely.

Note I.—In slighter cases, occurring on the surface of the body, diffuse inflammation is identical with phlegmonous erysipelas.

Note II.—In registering cases of phlegmonous erysipelas and of difuse inflammation arising from injury, surgical operation, or local disease, the cause should be specified.

31. Pyæmia. (Pyæmia.) Definition: A febrile affection, resulting in the formation of abscesses in the viscera and other parts.

Note.—In returning cases of pyæmia, specify the affected organs.

32. Puerperal fever. (Febris puerperarum.) Definition: A continued fever, communicable by contagion, occurring in connection with childbirth, and often associated with extensive local lesions, especially of the uterine system.

Note.—In returning cases of puerperal fever, the more important local lesions, such as peritonitis, effusions into serous and synovial cavities, phlebitis, and diffuse suppuration, should be specified.

33. Puerperal ephemera. Synonym, Weed. (Ephemera puerperarum.)

Definition: A fever consisting of one or more paroxysms,
occurring a few days after delivery, generally attended by
diminution of the milk and lochia, and unaccompanied by
local lesions.

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34. Acute rheumatism. Synonym, Rheumatic fever. (Rheumatismus acutus. Idem valet Febris rheumatica.) Definition: A specific febrile disorder, characterised by non-suppurative inflammation of the fibrous tissues surrounding the joints, of which many are affected at the same time, or in succession.

Sub-acute rheumatism. (Rheumatismus subacutus.)

35. Gonorrheal rheumatism. (Rheumatismus gonorrhoïcus.) Definition: An analogous affection, associated with gonorrhea.

- 36. Synovial rheumatism. (Rheumatismus synovialis.) Definition: A rheumatic affection, in which an accumulation of non-purulent fluid occurs in the synovial sacs, and especially in those of the knee-joints.
- 37. Muscular rheumatism. (Rheumatismus musculorum.) Definition: Pain in the muscular structures, increased by motion.

Local varieties:

- a. Lumbago. (V.—Lumbago.)
- b. Stiff neck. (V.—Cervix rigida.)
- 38. Chronic rheumatism. (Rheumatismus longus.) Definition: Chronic pain, stiffness and swelling of various joints.

Note.—Cases attended with deposit of urate of soda are to be returned as chronic gout, and those in which there is marked distortion as chronic osteo-arthritis.

- 39. Acute gout. (Podagra acuta.) Definition: A specific febrile disorder, characterised by non-suppurative inflammation, with considerable redness of certain joints—chiefly of the hands and feet, and, especially in the first attack, of the great toe—and attended with excess of uric acid in the blood.
- 40. Chronic gout. (Podagra longa.) Definition: A persistent constitutional affection, characterised by stiffness and swelling of various joints, with deposits of urate of soda.
- 41. Gouty synovitis. (Inflammatio synovialis podagrica.)

Note.—Retrocedent gout (Podagra retrocedens) is a term applied to cases of gout in which some internal organ becomes affected on the disappearance of the disease from the joints. It should be referred to acute or chronic gout.

- 42. Chronic osteo-arthritis. Synonym, Chronic rheumatic arthritis. (Ostoarthritis longa. Idem valet Arthritis rheumatica longa.) Definition: An affection characterised by pain, stiffness, and deformity of one or more of the joints, associated with deposition of new bone around them.
- 43. Syphilis. (Syphilis.)
  - A. Primary syphilis. (Syphilis primigenia.) Definition: Syphilis while limited to the part inoculated, and the lymphatic glands connected with it.

Varieties:

Hard chancre. (Ulcus venereum durum.)

Indurated bubo. (Inguen induratum.)

ethra.

Soft chancre. (Ulcus venereum molle.)

Suppurating bubo. (Inguen suppurans.)

Phagedænic sore. (Ulcus phagedænicum.)

Sloughing sore. (Ulcus putre.)

B. Secondary syphilis. (Syphilis secundaria.) Definition: Syphilis when it affects parts not directly inoculated.

Tertiary syphilis (Syphilis inveterata) is a term sometimes applied to the later symptoms, when separated by an interval of apparent health from the ordinary secondary syphilis.

- c. Hereditary syphilis. (Syphilis ingenita.) Definition: Constitutional syphilis of the child, derived during fætal life from one of the parents.
- 1. \*Local syphilitic affections. (Mala syphilitica partium singularum.)
- 44. Cancer. Synonym, Malignant disease. (Carcinoma. Idem valet Morbus malignus.) Definition: A deposit or growth that tends to spread indefinitely into the surrounding structures, and in the course of the lymphatics of the part affected, and to reproduce itself in remote parts of the body.

\*In returning local syphilitic affections, specify whether the case be one of primary syphilis, secondary syphilis, syphilitic deposit, or syphilitic inflammation.

Note I.—In returning cases of cancer in more than one organ, specify in which the disease is primary and in which secondary.

Note II.—State also the kind and duration of the disease in each case, and the nature of all operations, with their dates and results.

## Varieties:

- a. Scirrhus. Synonym, Hard cancer. (V.—Scirrhus. Idem valet Carcinoma durum.) Definition: Cancer characterised by hardness of the primary tumour, and by a tendency to draw to itself the neighbouring soft structures. When ulcerated, the sore is commonly deep, uneven, and bounded by a thick, everted hard edge.
- b. Medullary cancer. Synonym, Soft cancer. (V.—Carcinoma medullosum. Idem valet Carcinoma molle.) Definition: Cancer characterised by a smoothly-lobed surface, soft irregular consistence, great vascularity, and usually rapid growth and reproduction. When ulcerated, it protrudes in large masses, which bleed copiously.

Fungus hæmatodes (Fungus hæmatodes) is a term applied to some cases of medullary cancer, which are more than usually vascular.

Hard encephaloid (Carcinoma encephaloides durum) is a designation sometimes applied to medullary cancers of unusually firm consistence. These two forms of the disease should be returned under the title of medullary cancer.

- c. Epithelial cancer. Synonyms, Cancroid; Epithelioma. (V.— Carcinoma epitheliosum. Idem valent Morbus cancriformis, Epithelioma.) Definition: Cancer characterised by its occurrence chiefly in parts naturally supplied with epithelium, and by the resemblance of its cells to those of the epithelium.
- d. Melanotic cancer. Synonym, Melanosis. (V.—Carcinoma nigrum. Idem valet Melanosis.) Definition: A cancer characterised by the presence of pigment.
- c. Osteoid cancer. (V.—Carcinoma ostoides.) Definition: A tumour usually commencing in the bones, consisting almost entirely of bone, and followed by similar growths in the glands and viscera.

Note.—Cancer in mucous membranes, when covered by a villous growth, has received the name of Villous cancer. (Carcinoma villosum.)

- 1. Local cancer.\* (Carcinoma partium singularum.)
- 45. Colloid. Synonyms, Colloid cancer; Alveolar cancer. (Morbus collodes. Idem valet Carcinoma alveolare.) Definition: A new growth, a great part of which is formed of transparent or gelatinous substance.
  - 1. Local colloid.† (Morbus collodes partium singularum.)

ARRANGEMENT OF NON-MALIGNANT TUMOURS AND CYSTS.

(TUMORES NON MALIGNI. CYSTES NON MALIGNÆ.)

In order that the malignant and non-malignant growths may appear together, the non-malignant tumours and cysts are inserted here. They should, however, be returned among the local diseases, under 'Non-malignant tumours,' and they are not, therefore, numbered at this place.

Fibrous tumour. (Tumor fibrosus.) Definition: A growth, consisting of fibrous tissue, circumscribed, or not invading surrounding structures.

When the tumour contains cysts, it has received the name

of Fibrocystic. (Tumor fibrocysticus.)

When it contains earthy matter, it has been named Fibro-

calcareous. (Tumor fibrocalcareus.)

When it grows from bone and is partly ossified, it constitutes the non-malignant form of the disease known as Osteo-sarcoma. (Ostosarcoma.)

When it contains involuntary muscle, as when growing in the uterus, it has received the name of Fibro-muscular. (Tumor fibromusculosus.)

When it contains fat, it has been named Fibro-fatty.

(Tumor fibroadiposus.)

Other fibrous tumours have been named according to their seat, e. g. Neuroma. Painful subcutaneous tumour. (Neuroma. Tumor subcutaneus dolens.)

Fibro-cellular tumour. (Tumor fibrocellulosis.) Definition: A growth consisting of loose fibrous or areolar tissue.

> Note.—When occurring as a pendulous outgrowth from a mucous surface, it constitutes the chief varieties of Polypus. (Polypus.)

Fibro-nucleated tumour. (Tumor fibronucleosus.) Definition: A tumour composed of fibrous tissue, mixed with elongated nuclei.

t Cases of local colloid are to be returned in the order specified in the foot-note at

page 9.

<sup>\*</sup> In returning cases of local cancer, specify the variety of cancer, by adding, after '44,' the letter a, b, c, d, or e, according to the nature of the case (see p. 10). They are to be returned in the order specified in the foot-note at page 9.

Fibro-plastic tumour. (Tumor fibroplasticus.) Definition: A rapidly growing tumour, composed in great part of fusiform nucleated cells.

Note.—When the fibro-cellular or fibro-plastic tumour, but more especially the latter, slowly involves the adjacent soft structures, and returns after removal, it has received the name of Recurrent fibroid (Tumor fibrosus repetens.)

Myeloid tumour. (Tumor myelodes.) Definition: A tumor growing generally in the ends of the bones, having a red colour, and containing a large proportion of many-nucleated cells.

Fatty tumour. Synonym, Lipoma. (Tumor adiposus.)

Osseous tumour. (Tumor osseus)

a. Of bone. Synonym, Exostosis. (Ossis. Idem valet Exostosis.)

- 2. Cancellated. (Cancellatus.)
- 3. Diffused. (Diffusus.)
- b. Of the soft parts. (Partium molliorum.)

Cartilaginous tumour. Synonym, Enchondroma. (Tumor cartilaginosus. Idem valet Enchondroma.)

Fibro-cartilaginous tumour. (Tumor fibrocartilaginosus.)

Glandular tumour. Synonym, Adenocele. (Tumor glandulosus. Idem valet Adenocele.) Definition: A tumour growing in or near a gland, and more or less perfectly resembling it in structure.

Vascular tumour. (Tumor vasculosus.)

Nævus. (Nævus.)

Sebaceous tumour. (Tumor sebaceus.)

Cholesteatoma. (Cholesteatoma.)

Molluscum. (Molluscum.)

Warty tumour and warts. (Tumor verrucosus et verrucæ.)

Condyloma. (Condyloma.)

Cheloid. (Tumor cheloides.)

Villous tumour. (Tumor villosus.)

Simple or barren cysts. (Cystes simplices sive infœcundæ.)

- a. Serous. (Cystis serosa.)
- b. Synovial. Synonym, Bursal. (Cystis synovialis. Idem valet Byrsalis.)
- c. Mucous. (Cystis mucosa.)

- 46. Lupus. (Lupus.) Definition: A spreading tuberculous inflammation of the skin usually of the face, tending to destructive ulceration.

Varieties:

- a. Chronic lupus. (V.—Lupus longus.)
- b. Lupus exedens. (V.—Lupus exedens.) Definition: This variety is characterised by the rapidity, depth, and extent of the ulceration, and by appearing in rare cases on other parts than the face.
- 47. Rodent ulcer. (Ulcus erodens.) Definition: A destructive ulcer, characterised by the extent and depth to which it spreads in the adjoining structures, and by the absence of preceding hardness, and of constitutional affection.
- 48. True Leprosy. Synonym, Elephantiasis Græcorum. (Lepræ veræ. Syn. Elephantiasis Græcorum.)

49. Scrofula. (Struma.) Definition: A constitutional disease, resulting either in the deposit of tubercle, or in specific forms of inflammation or ulceration.

Varieties:

- a. Scrofula with tubercle. (Struma cum tuberculis.)
- b. Scrofula without tubercle. (Struma sine tuberculis.)

Note.—The constitutional tendency which has received the name of the Scrofulous Diathesis, (Habitus strumosus,) when unattended by local lesions, is not to be returned as a disease.

1. Local scrofulous affections. (Mala strumosa partium singularum.)

Tubercular meningitis. (Meningitis tuberculosa.)

- 50. Rickets. (Rachitis.) Definition: A constitutional disease of early childhood, manifested by curvature of the shafts of the long bones, and enlargement of their cancellous extremities.
- 51. Cretinism. (Cretismus.) Definition: A condition of imperfect development and deformity of the whole body, especially of the head, occurring in the valleys of certain mountainous districts, and attended by feebleness or absence of the mental faculties and special senses, and often associated with goître.

Varieties:

a. Complete cretinism. Synonym, Incurable cretinism. (Cretismus perfectus. Idem valet Cretismus insanabilis.) Definition: Cretinism, characterised by idiotcy, deaf-dumbness, deficiency of general sensibility, and absence of the reproductive power.

<sup>\*</sup> When the cause of this affection has been ascertained, the case should be returned under the head of the primary disease, the secondary affection being also specified.

- b. Incomplete cretinism. Synonym, Curable cretinism. (Cretismus imperfectus. Idem valet Cretismus sanabilis.)

  Definition: A degree of cretinism in which the mental faculties, though limited, are capable of development, the head is moderately well formed and erect, the special senses, the faculty of speech, and the reproductive powers are present.
- 52. Diabetes. Synonym, Diabetes Mellitus. (Diabetes. Idem valet Diabetes mellitus.)

(935a.) Ergotism. (Ergotismus.)

53. Purpura. (Purpura.) Definition: A disease not usually attended by fever, characterised by purple spots of effused blood, which are not effaced by pressure, and are of small size, except where they run together in patches.

Varieties:

- a. Simple. (V.—Simplex.)
- b. Hæmorrhagic. (V.—Hæmorrhagica.) Definition: The disease when accompanied by hæmorrhage from a mucous surface.
- 54. Scurvy. (Scorbutus.) Definition: A chronic disease, characterised by sponginess of the gums, and the occurrence of livid patches under the skin of considerable extent, which are usually harder to the touch than the surrounding tissue.
- 55. \*Anæmia. (Anæmia.) Definition: Deficiency of red corpuscles in the blood.
- 56. Chlorosis. Synonym, Green Sickness. (Chlorosis. Idem valet Pallor luteus fæminarum.)
- 57. \*General dropsy. (Anasarca.) Definition: An accumulation of serum in the areolar tissue, with or without effusion into the serous cavities.

Note.—Local dropsies, such as ovarian, and effusions into the serous cavities, as hydrothorax or ascites, when not connected with anasarca, should be returned as local diseases.

58. Beri-Beri. (Beriberia.)

59. Encephalitis. (Encephalitis.) Definition: Inflammation of the brain or of its membranes.

Note.—This term is to be used only when the precise seat of the inflammation has not been ascertained by post-mortem examination.

- 60. Meningitis. (Meningitis.) Definition: Inflammation of the membranes of the brain.
  - 1. Inflammation of the dura mater. (Inflammatio duræ matris.)

    Note.—This form of inflammation is almost invariably the result of injury or disease of the bones of the skull; in such cases, the injury or disease by which it is caused ought to be specified.

- (491.) 3. Tubercular meningitis. Synonym, Acute hydrocephalus. (Meningitis tuberculosa. Idem valet Hydrocephalus acutus.)

  - 61. Inflammation of the brain. (Inflammatio cerebri.) Definition: Inflammation of the brain substance, with or without implication of the membranes, usually partial, and in many cases dependent on local injury, or foreign deposit.


