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
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

THE advantage accruing to the public, from hospitals in general, is sufficiently proved by their great and increasing number, and the propriety and necessity of a separate establishment for the care of lunatics, must be obvious from the nature of the accommodation and attendance which they require. In the year 1751, a few benevolent persons, having observed that the hospitals then established were not capable of receiving all the patients of this description who applied for relief, and that by the unavoidable exclusion or delay in their admission, many useful members bad thich has since appoyed so large a portion of the patronage had been lost to society, either by the disorder gaining strength beyond the reach of medicine, or by the patients falling into the hands of persons utterly unskilled in the treatment of the disorder, or who had found their advantage in neglecting the means of cure.-That many families (in no mean circumstances) through the heavy expense attending the support of one member thus afflicted, had themselves become objects of charitable relief, and thereby doubled the load and loss to the public. -That the most fatal acts of violence on themselves, attendants, and relations, had been often consequent on the unavoidable delay of placing those afflicted with this disorder under the care of persons experienced in guarding against and preventing them. That no particular provision had at that time been made by law for the care of lunatics.-That the common parish work-houses were nowise proper for their reception, either in point of accommodation, attendance, or medical assistance, and that the joining this to any other hospital, would have deprived it of two of its principal advantages, the being under the immediate inspection and government of its own patrons and supporters, and of introducing more gentlemen of the faculty to the study and practice of this most important branch of it, they determined therefore to open a subscription for a new hospital, under the mame of ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL for Lunatics, which has since enjoyed so large a portion of the patronage and and support of the public, that the President and Governors consider it as a proof that the Institution has answered the end proposed.

Item. I give and bequeath unto the treasurer for the time being, of an hospital, called by the name of St. Luke's Hospital for Lunatics, the sum of to be raised and paid by and out of such part of my personal estate and effects, which by law I may or can charge with the payment of the same, to be applied towards carrying on the charitable designs of the governors of the said hospital.

N.B. Devises of land, or bequests of money charged on land, or to be laid out in land, are void by the statute of Mortmain.

RULES AND ORDERS.

I.

THAT every person, except as hereinafter Qualification of excepted, paying (in his own right) to the treasurer for the time being, for the use of this hospital, the entire sum of thirty guineas, or upwards, or being nominated and appointed by the Committee in pursuance of the powers hereinafter given to them, or paying seven guineas at least, and signing an agreement (in a book to be kept for that purpose) to pay seven guineas yearly for the four next succeeding years, or any body corporate paying annually twenty guineas or upwards, shall be admitted a governor of this hospital, and receive from the secretary a staff, and a printed copy of the rules and orders; save and except all persons acting as physician, Exception to physician, &c. surgeon,

surgeon, apothecary, secretary, or any officer of this hospital receiving salary, during the time they shall respectively act in those capacities.

II.

General court when to be held

To consist of

THAT a general court of the Governors shall be held once in every year, viz. on the third Wednesday in the month of February, and at such other times as are hereinafter mentioned; nine governors, and that every general court shall consist of nine Governors at the least.

III.

What notice to be given of general courts.

THAT three days' notice at least of every general court shall be given in the London Gazette, or other public newspapers, and also be sent by the two-penny post, to all Governors residing within its limits, which notice shall contain the business intended to be there brought forward, and no other business shall then be proceeded on, in case the same shall be objected to by twelve Governors then present.

IV.

Who to preside at courts and committees.

THAT in all general courts and committees the president, or (in his absence) one of the vicepresidents, presidents, or in case no vice-president shall be present, the treasurer shall preside. But in case of the absence of the president, vice-presidents, and treasurer, or of their quitting the chair before the business of such court or committee shall be finished, a president or chairman shall be elected for that time, out of the governors then present.

V

That the person presiding at such respective what questions meetings, shall put to the vote all such questions, as shall be moved and seconded, and no other.

VI.

That all questions shall be determined by the How to be demajority of governors present, on holding up hands, or by a division, or by a ballot, in case the same shall be required by seven or more governors before a division is begun, and such ballot shall be proceeded on immediately.

VII.

THAT in case of an equality of votes, the President to person presiding for the time being shall have a vote. double or casting vote.

VIII.

Persons speaking to stand up. That in all debates the person speaking shall stand up and address himself to the chair; and no person shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the chairman.

IX.

When two speak, president to direct. That when two or more offer to speak at the same time, the president or chairman shall direct which of them is to proceed.

X.

President, &c. when to be elected.

That at the general court which shall be held annually in the month of February, one president, six vice-presidents, a treasurer, a general committee, a committee of audit, two physicians, a surgeon, apothecary, and secretary, shall be elected for the year ensuing.

XI.

Special general court how to be called.

That the president have power to order special general courts to be summoned as often as he shall think necessary; and in case of his death, or absence, or omission to order a general court within the time hereafter limited, one of the vice-presidents, or the treasurer, at the request of the general committee

committee, (signified by letter from the secretary, containing the reasons for the same) or of any twelve governors, (signified by writing under their hands, containing their reasons for the same) shall order a special general court to be summoned and held within 14 days next after such request; at which court the said letter or writing shall be publicly read.

XII.

THAT the treasurer shall have power to re- The Treasurer, his power and ceive all benefactions, annual subscriptions, business. debts, legacies, and other revenues of this Hospital, and give discharges for the same. he shall cause books to be kept with such bankers as shall be approved by the general committee for taking in the contributions of well-disposed persons to this charity. That he shall have power to pay such sums as may be ordered by the general committee, and none other, except they shall be under 40s. That he shall lay before the committee of audit in the month of January a general state of his accounts with their vouchers. That he shall report at every monthly meeting of the general committee all sums received or paid during the B 2 preceding

preceding month, that the same may be entered in the several books kept for that purpose. That all securities upon the admission of patients, or for the fidelity and good behaviour of any officer or servant, and all contracts with tradesmen or others, shall be taken and made in the name of the treasurer for the time being, and that he shall have power to summon the general committee to meet as often as he shall see cause.

XIII.

In case of vacancy in the office of treasurer, &c.

That upon every vacancy in the office of treasurer, physician, surgeon, apothecary, or secretary, the committee shall signify the same by writing to the president, or, in case of his death or absence, to one of the vice-presidents, or to the treasurer, who shall order a general court to be summoned, to meet within fourteen days next after such notice, to declare such vacancy, and appoint a time for an election to fill up the same, which shall be within thirty days next after such declaration. And that any person be entitled to vote at any such election at a general court, if he shall have paid £31. 10s. on or before the day of election.

What persons entitled to vote.

XIV.

THAT the general committee shall consist of the General committee who to president, vice-presidents, and treasurer for the consist of. time being, and of all persons who shall have paid, in their own right, for the use of the hospital, the sum of £100. or upwards, and of such thirty other governors as shall be annually elected for that purpose, at the general court to be held in the month of February; of which committee five at least shall be necessary to transact Five to do bubusiness.

XV.

THAT the general committee shall meet on one General committee when to stated day in every month, and at such other times meet. as they, the treasurer, or their sub-committee, for the time being shall appoint. And that they shall have power to hire, govern, and discharge the Their power and business. domestic servants of this hospital, keep the buildings properly repaired, and purchase provisions, furniture, and other necessaries for the same; and also to nominate and appoint as governors the executor or executors of the will of any person who shall have bequeathed to this hospital any · legacy which may appear to them of sufficient magnitude to require such compliment; and

also

also to admit and discharge patients according to the rules hereafter mentioned; and also to see that the several books relating to the hospital be regularly kept, and that all debts, legacies, annual subscriptions, and other revenues of this hospital, be received and recovered as the same shall respectively become due; and that all just demands upon this hospital be regularly discharged, at least, once in six months; and in general, the said committee are to make such rules for the management and economy of the hospital as they shall find necessary, and cause them to be inserted in books to be kept for that purpose; and to propose, for the consideration of the general court, all such matters as shall appear to them conducive to the good of this charity. And further, that when and so often as there shall be more money belonging to the hospital uninvested than in the judgment and opinion of the said committee it shall be necessary to keep in hand for defraying the current expences of the hospital, the said committee shall cause so much of the said money as it shall not be necessary so to keep in hand, to be laid out and invested either in the name of the president, vice-presidents, treasurer, and governors of St. Luke's

Luke's Hospital; or in the names or name of trustees or a trustee for the said institution; and either in some of the parliamentary stocks or public funds of Great Britain, except determinable annuities; or at interest upon real securities, to be made by mortgage of hereditaments situate in England or Wales, and not elsewhere, of a clear and indefeasible estate in fee simple, free from all incumbrances, except quit-rents and other small annual payments: and also that the said committee shall, at discretion, call in and compel payment of any money so lent on mortgage as aforesaid, and sell out and convert into money any stocks or funds so to be purchased as aforesaid, and lay out and invest in manner aforesaid, or otherwise apply for the purposes of the said hospital the monies to arise by such calling in, selling out, and conversion; and shall take all proceedings which may be necessary for compelling payment of the monies so lent on mortgage, and the interest thereof, and foreclosing the right or equity of redemption of the mortgaged hereditaments.

XVI.

That the said committee do keep minutes of To keep minutes. their proceedings.

XVII. THAT

To appoint sub-committees.

THAT for the more easy dispatch of business, the said committee have power to appoint subcommittees, one of which shall be called the house-committee, who shall meet weekly at the hospital, and that one or more of such housecommittee for the time being, shall at least once in every month of their attendance, inspect every part of the Hospital; and that such sub-committees have power, from time to time, to summon the general committee if they shall think proper.

XVIII.

Purchases to be by contract.

INSTRUCTIONS

For Persons applying for the Admission of Patients into St. Luke's Hospital for Lunatics.

RULES RENDERING PATIENTS INADMISSIBLE.

- I. The possession of sufficient means for decent support in a private asylum.
- II. Having been insane more than twelve calendar months.
- III. Having been discharged uncured from any other Hospital for the reception of Lunatics.
- IV. Being troubled with epileptic fits, paralysis, or in a state of idiotcy.
 - V. Females with child.
 - VI. Requiring (from disease or debility) the separate attendance of a nurse, or the assistance of a crutch.
 - VII. Being under the age of 12, or above 70 years.
 - VIII. Being brought not clean, not properly clothed, and not free from infectious disease.

A Committee of Governors assemble at the Hospital, every Friday morning, at Eleven o'Clock precisely, for the purpose of receiving petitions, and for the admission of patients, &c.

Directions.—When the petition, certificates, and Governor's recommendation are properly filled up, according to the marginal directions, they must be left with the Secretary, Mr. Thomas Webster, No. 25, Queen-street, Cheapside; or at the Hospital; and the petitioner must attend the Committee,

Committee, to state particulars relative to the patient's case, which particulars proving satisfactory, the Committee will forthwith proceed to examine and admit the patient, or if not brought, will order such patient to attend for examination on the succeeding Friday.

Securities.—One day or more previous to the proposed admission of the patient, the names, business, and places of abode of two substantial housekeepers, residing within ten miles of London, must be left, in writing, for the secretary, at the hospital, both of whom must attend at ten o'clock in the morning of the day of admission, to enter into an agreement in writing, binding themselves in a penalty of one hundred pounds, to take the patient away from the hospital when required so to do, by the committee or their secretary. If the patient lives more than ten miles from London, the sureties may be house-keepers of the parish in which the lunatic dwells, provided the officiating minister of the parish certifies, in writing, to their respectability. The form of the agreement to be signed in the country, will be transmitted with the order for bringing the patient to the Hospital.

N. B. No governor of the hospital can be security for any patient.

Payment.—A payment of four pounds must be made with each patient receiving parochial relief, which sum is not returnable unless the patient dies or is discharged within one month after admission.

N. B. Every person who, through mistake, or misinformation, shall have been received into the Hospital, shall be discharged immediately, on a discovery of any of the above disqualifications.

The committee will not sit either on Good Friday or Christmas

Day, but on the Thursday previous to those days.


