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



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INTRODUCTORY REMARKS

OF THE

AMERICAN HYGIEST,

WILLIAM SEARS.

THE American Hygiest, in introducing himself and his invaluable Medicine to the public, would observe, that his knowledge, of the nature of disease and of the properties and effects of medicine, has been the result of much laborious research, experience, and experiment, occasioned by unusual sufferings, from a most obstinate and unyielding


