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
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State of Rhode Stand Jan 25, 1798.

OUR being a Member of the Hon, the Gen. Affembly of this State, and our taking into our ferious confideration, the great and important object of prometing the increase of medical Knowledge in this Country, must be our Apology for troubling you with this Letter.

We beg leave to mention, that the medical

Art has been rifing to higher and higher degrees of Perfection, in proportion as the new medical Discoveries and Improvements have from time to time been ushered into the world, ever since the Days of Melampus, the first noted Physician, mentioned in prophane History; and, who lived a-bont an hundred Years fince the Death of Moses.

That this Art appears at prefent, to be raifed to a much higher degree of Perfection in Europe, than it is in America, on Account of a great number of new medicalDifcoveries and Improvements, made known to the European Physicians, Surgeons, and Apothecaries; but chiefly unknown to the greatest part of our Country Praditioners,

for the want of proper Publications.

That although the old medical Books, now in use in this Country, contain some judicious Obfervations; yet, by reason of the new Discoveries in the different branches of Medicine, they are found to be replete with Error; giving an erroneous Account of the Virtues of Medicines, and the genuine Methods of curing Difeases.—And from hence the fludy of those Books ought to be suppressed, because it has not only a direct tendency to lead Students into Error; but to expose the lives of the People, by milguiding Practitioners in their attempts to alleviate the Diltref-fes of their fellow Mortals; for where the theory of any Art or Science is wrong, the Practice of it will be so in general.

If proper Encouragement was given by the Public, it appears to us that the medical Art may be raifed to as high a degree of Perfection in America, as it is in Europe,; nay, perhaps high-er, for fome things have been discovered here, which have not as yet been published. Now if our own Discoveries, with those made in the o-ther parts of the world, were published, and spread

amongst all our Praditioners, it would make the healing Art more perfect and useful, than it has ever been since the world began.

That although 190 Years have revolved since this Country was first settled by the Europeans, yet we cannot learn that any man ever attempted to compile a regular Syftem of Pharmacy, Physic, and Surgery, in America, till the Year 1772; at which time, Dr. Stearns, an American Physician and Astronomer, on discovering that both the Theory and Practice of Physic stood in great need of Reformation and Amendment, undertook the laborious task; and has fince travelled in Nine of the American Governments; and in England, Scotland, Ireland, and France, for the Purpose of collecting an Account of the new medical Discoveries and Improvements that have been made in the different parts of the world, has expended more than 4000 Dollars, and the greatest part of his time for ten years past, in the Profecution of the work, which is to be printed in two large Volumes in Folio, under the Names of an American Diffensatory, and the Columbian Practice of Physic, and System of Surgery; be-ing intended for a complete medical Library,

Anatomy excepted.

That these Productions have been examined by fundry learned Phyficians, who have found that the work is well executed, and that it contains Systems of medical Information of an immense value, sounded on those things that have stood the test of Ages in the cure of Diseases, and on the late Discoveries and Improvements in the no-

ble Art of Medicine.

That it was the Author's Intention to have published his Productions by Subscription; but has found, that that method will by no means answer the great and good purpose of giving the new medical Discoveries and Improvements, a speedy and general spread amongst the Gentlemen of the

Faculty, because many of them, and especially in the Surely every rational Person will say, Tes.

That it is the Opinion of those who have duly pay for, after they began to practife; Medicines and Horses to purchase; Lands to buy; Houses to build; Families to maintain; Taxes to pay; and a large number of poor People to vilit, who are unable to make payment; and that for these Reasons, many of those Praditioners are unable to pay for his Productions.

That as the new medical Discoveries and Improvements ought to be immediately published and fpread amongst all the Prastitioners in Phyfic, that their minds may be enlightened, and their Practice regulated, it has been proposed by a number of Poppicians and other respectable Gen-tlemen, that the sum of 30,000 Dollars be raised by a Lottery, to be drawn in feveral Classes, for by a Lottery, to be drawn in teveral Claims, for the purpose of defraying the expense of compi-ling and publishing the faid medical Productions, and that Copies of them be given gratis, to the Physicians, Surgeons, Apothecaries and Others, who may be inclined to become acquainted with the medical Art.

That for the following Reasons this is esteemed the best method that can be contrived for the purpose of spreading medical knowledge in

America, for, 1. It will make medical Information free, for all the Praditioners and Students in Phylic.

2. It will prevent Students from wasting their time in the study of erroneous Books; and

help them to attain those qualifications which are necessary for regular bred Physicians.

3. As the money will come principally out of the rich Adventurers in the Lettery, who will stand the same chance of drawing Prizes as in other Letteries, it will be a great help to those unable to procure medical Libraries.

4. It will furnish the Physicians, the Surgeons, and the Apothecaries with an excellent Guide, in all the difficult and dangerous Cafes, Operations, and Processes they may have to encounter.

5. It will exhibit the Virtues of a great number of our American Productions: bring them more and more into use : leffen the importa-

tion of Drugs; and, thus prove very advantageous to the Citizens of the United States.

6. It will raife the medical Art to a higher degree of Perfection; make our Physicians (instead of being called Quacks and Impasters by foreigners) appear more respectable in the Eyes of the Learned; the cure of Diseases more easy; and the practice of Phylic lefs expensive; for a regular bred Phylician stands a better chance to do a patient more good by 7 visits, than one groping in the dark can

 It will prevent millions of Dollars, from being fent out of the United States, for Medical Books published in foreign Kingdoms; and thus be a great faving to the Country.

It is therefore evident, that a Medical Lottery, is a matter of fuch importance, that it ought to be promoted, and encouraged by all Perfons; and we think it would be a dishonor to any State, if requested, not to grant one; and it is also our opinion, that the Dollor, ought to be affilled by the Public, in the great and important Work he has undertaken, as well as the Phylicians, Surgeons, Apothecaries, and Students in Phylic, who re unable to purchase those Books, which are abfolutely necessary for every PraBitioner.

That when People efteem themselves unable to build a Meeting House, a Hotel, or a Bridge; or to carry on some necessary Branch of Learning: they often Petition for Latteries, and their requests are granted.—Why then may not the Physicians have similar Advantages?—Are they not a very useful part of the Community?—Do they not frequently relieve us in times of great Diffress and Danger ?- And instead of suffering them to remain groping in the Dark, is it not ne-ceffary to furnish them with that Medical Light and Information, which exhibits how to Cure Difeases in the most easy and expeditious manconfidered of the matter, that a Medical Lottery will be of such Public Utility, that it will be greatly encouraged by the Citizens of the United States in general: that it will bring money into this State, and immortalize the Name of the General Affembly.

That a Petition upon the Subject, will be prefented to the Affembly; and as you are a Mem-ber of the fame; we trust you will not be backward in encouraging a Scheme, which tends to promote your own Felicity, as well as the Health

and Happiness of Mankind in general. We wish your Health and Profperity; and have the Honor to be, Sir, your most Obedient humble Servants,
