LAWS, &c.

CHAP. I.

OF THE SOCIETY-ITS MEETINGS, &c.

RULB I.

THE PHYSICAL SOCIETY shall consist of Honorary, Ordinary, and Corresponding Members; together with the Officers hereafter specified.

II.

The Society shall be convened on the first Saturaday in October, and continue to meet on the same Day of each succeeding Week, 'till the first Saturday in May. The Meeting shall commence at Seven o'Clock, and close at Ten.

III.

The Names of the Ordinary Members shall be called over at the Beginning of the Private and at

A 2

the

the End of the Public Business; and every Member who is not Present at the Roll Calls of the Evening, shall be fined in the Penalty of Sixpence for each Time of Absence.

IV.

Five Members, legally affembled, shall be entitled to transact any Business of the Society, except repealing, suspending, or altering the Laws; for which purposes, at least Ten Members must be present.

V.

The Business of the Society shall be of two Kinds; public and private. The public Business shall confist in the communication of Cases and Opinions; and shall commence as soon as the private Business is concluded.—The private Business shall include all other matters in which the Society may be concerned, shall be transacted as soon as the Names of the Members are called over, and shall not be continued after Half past Seven o'Clock.

VI.

In every Question relative to the Business of the Society, and not previously settled by the Laws, any Member may demand a determination by Ballot.

VII.

To decide any Question where a Ballot shall not be demanded, the Mode shall be by Shew of Hands. Any Member refuting to hold up his Hand on one Side or the other, shall be fined Sixpence.

CHAP. II.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS.

RULE I.

No one shall be admitted a Member, unless he shall have been regularly proposed, seconded, and balloted for. Such proposal, specifying the Name and Residence of the Candidate, must be made in Writing, and remain for the Inspection of the Members, in some conspicuous Part of the Theatre till the ensuing Meeting, when it shall be determined by Ballot.

II.

A Candidate having three-fourths of the Votes of the Members present in his Favour, shall be admitted; if less than three-fourths, he shall be rejected.

III.

To obviate any miftake in Elections, each Member shall be allowed to propose his Friend twice in the same Session; and in case of Rejection, to have him a second Time ballotted for, either on the same or a future Evening, during the Session. If after this, the Person proposed should also be rejected, he shall, on no account, be again proposed during the same Session.

CHAP.

CHAP. III.

ORDINARY MEMBERS.

RULE I.

Each Ordinary Member shall, on his Admission, pay One Guinea, and the further Sum of Sixpence every Week during the Session. Having signed the Laws, he shall be introduced to the Society by the President in the following manner:

Sir,

Through the Power and Authority delegated to me by this Society, I introduce you as an Ordinary Member thereof.

This form shall also be adopted on the introduction of every other Description of Members.

II.

An Ordinary Member being indebted to the Society, and not discharging his Debts, shall be fined One Shilling every Month that the said Debts shall remain unpaid; and if he further neglects to discharge them till after the last Meeting of the Session, he shall be expelled.

III.

An Ordinary Member absenting himself for Five successive Meetings, without a sufficient Excuse, shall be (ipso facto) expelled.

IV. An

IV.

An Ordinary Member shall, in succession, deliver in a Dissertation on some Physical Subject, under the Penalty of Ten Shillings and Sixpence; recurring at the Commencement of every Session to the Senior Member.

V.

Ordinary Members removing from London, shall, on expressing their desire to the President in Writing, be considered as Corresponding Members.

VI.

Ordinary Members having attended the Meetings of the Society for two Sessions, and read two Dissertations, may Petition for Honorary Seats. Such Petition must be in Writing, and having been read from the Chair, shall, on the ensuing Meeting, be determined by Ballot. The Candidate having three-fourths of the Votes in his Favor, shall be elected; and the Society's Honorary Diploma presented to him by the President, at the commencement of public Business, within one Month from the said Election.

VII.

Every Ordinary Member not subscribing to the Laws within three Meetings after his Election, shall forfeit his Seat,

CHAP. IV.

CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

RULE I.

Men of Eminence in the Profession, not residing in London, may be proposed as Corresponding Members.

II.

Corresponding Members shall be exempted from paying Contributions; they shall enjoy the Privileges of Ordinary Members; but when in London, and attending the Society, they shall be considered as such.

CHAP. V.

HONORARY MEMBERS.

RULE I.

Physicians, Surgeons, Apothecaries, and Men of Eminence in any of the Sciences, may be proposed as Honorary Members. On their Election they shall pay the sum of Two Guineas.

II.

The following Clause shall be added to the Circular Letter sent to such Honorary Members as reside in or near Town, informing them of their Election.

"The Favour of your Attendance at the Society will be expected, when convenient, and that you will contribute to promote the Prosperity of the Institution, by the Communication of such Medical Cases and Observations as may occur in your Practice, and you may deem worthy of the Attention of the Society."

III.

Honorary Members shall not be obliged to attend the Meetings of the Society, nor to furnish Papers for Discussion: they shall be exempt from the Payment of Contributions and Fines, except in such Cases as shall be specified to the contrary; they shall enjoy all the Privileges of Ordinary Members, the Power of writing for Prizes alone excepted.

IV.

An Honorary Member having engaged in any Office, is rendered liable to fuch Penalties as may be incurred by neglect of Duty in that Office.

V.

Any Gentleman residing within the Bills of Mortality, and elected an Honorary Member, if he neglects to subscribe his name to the Laws within five Meetings after such Election, shall no longer be considered a Member, unless he shall have previously subscribed as an Ordinary One.

VI.

The Names of fuch Honorary Members, who shall most frequently have attended and promoted the Interests of this Society, shall be recorded with Honour in the Minutes of the Society, upon Vote of the Members prefent; at the last Meeting of each Session; and a Certificate of Thanks be made out by the Secretary and transmitted to them.

CHAP. VI.

PRESIDENTS.

RULE I.

Six Presidents shall be annually chosen by Ballot, who shall be considered as Trustees for the Library.

IT.

The fix Presidents shall officiate in regular Order, according to feniority, and alternately, with respect to the Differtations; and should the President whose turn it is to take the Chair, be absent at the appointed Time of Meeting, without having provided another to act for him, he shall be fined in the Penalty of Two Shillings and Sixpence; but if he be absent from the Chair during the whole Evening, he shall forfeit Two Shillings and Sixpence more. The only Apologies admissible, are, confinement by Illness, engagements in Business, engagements at Classes, and absence from Town.

III. In

III.

In the absence of the Presidents, the oldest Member present shall supply the Place.

IV.

The President in the Chair shall regulate and direct the Debates; he shall check any unprofitable Disputes, and be invested with Authority sufficient to conduct every part of the Society's Business, with becoming Decorum; he shall even be impowered to impose a Fine upon any Gentleman conducting himself with Irregularity during the Transaction of the Society's Business, which Fine, however, shall not exceed Five Shillings, nor be less than Sixpence.

V.

In any Question where the Votes of the Society shall be equally divided, the acting President shall, beside his Vote as a Member, have the Privilege of a casting Vote.

VI.

The Prefidents shall be upon all Committees.

CHAP. VII.

LIBRARY AND LIBRARIAN.

RULE I.

Such fums of Money as the Society from Time to Time may think proper, shall be employed for the purpose of establishing a Library.

II. Such

II.

Such Books only shall be purchased as shall have been proposed by the Committee, and afterwards approved by the Society at large, unless during the Summer Recess, when, if a request for the Purchase of any Book, be signed by three Honorary and three Ordinary Members, and approved of by the Librarian, the Purchase shall be made.

III.

Every Member shall be entitled to have in his Possession one set of Books; for which at the Time of receiving them, he shall deposit in the Hands of the Librarian their sull Value; and shall return them, if Octavos or under, within Ten Days; or within Twenty Days, if above that size. On Failure, he shall forfeit Sixpence for every Day he keeps them beyond the Time allowed. If any Book be injured, the Money deposited shall be forfeited. Reviews are here excepted, and shall be returned within Three Days.

IV.

The Librarian must be an Honorary Member, and shall appoint his own Deputy.

V.

His Business shall be to take care of the Books; to keep a correct Catalogue of them; to deliver them

to the Members, and to report at each Meeting, the Names of fuch Members as by retaining Books, may have incurred Fines.

VI.

The Books required, together with the Member's Name, shall be specified in Writing, and left with the Deputy Librarian, on Mondays, Wednesdays, or Fridays; and on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, such Books, (if at home) shall be ready for Delivery.

VII.

The Librarian shall be answerable for any Books which may be lost.

VIII.

In case of Neglect in Attendance, or in any other Business regarding the Library, the Librarian shall forfeit Two Shillings and Sixpence.

IX.

At the End of every Session, a Gratuity shall be given to the Deputy Librarian. The Gratuity shall not be less than Five Guineas, nor exceed Fisteen; the particular Sum to be determined by Ballot.

CHAP. VIII.

TREASURER.

RULE I.

The Librarian shall also be invested with the Office Treasurer.

II.

At the first Meeting in every Month, the Treasurer shall deliver in a State of the Society's Accounts; on Failure he shall incur the Penalty of One Shilling.

CHAP, IX.

SECRETARY,

RULE I.

A Secretary shall be annually chosen, from those who were Ordinary Members the preceding Session.

HI.

He shall be present in the Theatre before the time of Meeting to furnish Tickets, &c. His Business shall be to keep Minutes of the Society's Transactions; to call over the List of Members, and to read the Minutes; to collect and keep an Account of Fines and Subscription Money; to be accountable to the Treasurer for such Sums of Money as he shall receive;

receive; and likewise to collect Ballots and Votes. He shall likewise inform Members of their Election, and furnish them with a Copy of the Laws. He shall attend all Committees.

III.

He shall send a written Summons to the President whose turn it is to take the Chair, together with the Dissertation to be discussed at the ensuing Meeting, one Week previous to such Meeting; and upon Neglect shall be fined in the Sum of Two Shillings and Sixpence; and shall be under the same Penalty for Neglect each Evening, of declaring to the Society, during private business, the Name of the President whose duty it is to officiate on the succeeding Meeting.

IV.

Previous to the first Meeting in every Month, he shall require from the Treasurer an Account of the Society's Money, &c.

CHAP. X.

COMMON COMMITTEE.

RULE I.

At the Commencement of every Session, a Committee shall be appointed, consisting of Eight of the Members; to be chosen by the Society at large

This Committee shall transact such Business as cannot conveniently be done by the whole Society, and shall make regular Reports of their Proceedings to the Society.

II.

The Gentlemen of the Committee may themselves fix the Time of their Meeting: But after this is determined, any Member of it, who shall fail to attend at the Time appointed, shall forfeit One Shilling.

III.

The Officers of the Society shall be on all Committees.

CHAP. XI.

PRINTING COMMITTEE.

RULE I.

Beside the Committee above specified, a Committee shall be annually appointed, whose Office shall be to inspect the Cases delivered to the Society, and to select such of them as may be deemed worthy of Publication.

II.

This Committee shall confist of the six annual Prefidents, the Librarian and Secretary, four Honorary, and four Ordinary Members; to be chosen by Ballot on the first Meeting of each Session.

III. This

III.

This Committee shall meet occasionally, according to the Appointment of the Majority of its Members. Any Member who shall fail to attend at the Time appointed, shall forfeit the Sum of Five Shilling.

IV.

All Papers referred to the Decision of this Committee, must be legibly written by the Authors of them. They must be read at two separate Meetings of the Committee, and afterwards approved or rejected by Ballot.

V.

No Paper shall be published unless two-thirds of the Ballots be in its Favor.

VI.

No one shall be present while the Propriety of publishing his own paper is under Consideration.

V.I.

No Bufiness shall be transacted unless nine Members of the Committee be present.

CHAP. XII.

DISSERTATIONS.

RULE I.

At each Meeting of the Society, shall be read a Differtation on some Physical Subject; unless Two B 3 Differtations

Differtations shall be previously on the Table. No subject to be brought before the Society twice during the same Session, nor continued in Debate more than two Evenings.

II.

The Member whose turn it may be to write, shall deliver in his Dissertation at least one Week previous to the Meeting at which it is to be first read. If he neglects to do this, he shall forfeit Two Shillings and Sixpence, and the further sum of Ten Shillings and Sixpence, if not delivered before the Meeting next ensuing.

III.


Each Differtation shall remain at least one Week in the Library, for the Inspection of the Members; at the Expiration of which Time, it shall be read in the Society by the Author, and afterwards be kept by the President, till the ensuing Meeting, when it shall be discussed.


IV.

The President shall at that Meeting again read over the Dissertation, and point out such Parts as may appear proper Subjects for Debate; when any Remarks which may be offered shall be received.

V.

An Ordinary Member negle ling to give Notice of his Intention to subject himself to the Penalty of Chap.





Chap. III. Rule IV. till within one Month from the Meeting at which his Differtation should be received, shall, exclusive of the Penalty there specified, forfeit Two Shillings and Sixpence.

VI.

Honorary Members having engaged to furnish Differtations, are subject to the above Regulations.

VII.

Any Member communicating the Subject he means to write upon, to the Secretary officially, shall have such Subject secured to him, unless previously engaged by a senior Member.

CHAP. XIII.

PRIZE DISSERTATIONS.

RULE I.

Two Sets of Books, value Five Guineas each Set, shall be annually given to the Authors of the Two best Dissertations on some Physical Subjects.

II.

The Differtations shall be read in the Society, at the Commencement of public Business, on the first Meeting in December; and no Differtation intended for the Prize, shall be received after that Time.—— They shall then be delivered to the Presidents, whose Opinion of their Merits shall be laid before the Society on the first Meeting in February, the successful Papers shall then be again read to the Society by the Authors, or by the President.

III.

At the same Meeting the Prize Questions for the ensuing year shall be declared, and no Dissertation upon these Subjects shall be received for public Discussion during that Session.

IV.

The Differtations after having been read the fecond Time shall be deposited in the Society's Library.

V.

A Motto shall be prefixed to each Dissertation, and with it shall be delivered a sealed Packet, with the same Motto on the Outside, and with the Author's Name on the Inside.

VI.

All the Differtations, the fuccefsful Ones excepted, shall be returned, with the Packets containing the Names of the Authors, un-opened.

VII.

Ordinary, Corresponding, and such Honorary as have been Ordinary Members, and who were not settled in Business at the Time the Questions were proposed, shall alone be Candidates for the Prizes.

CHAP. XIV.

VISITORS.

RULE I.

Each Member may, at every Meeting of the Society, introduce one Visitor, but not more than one, under the Penalty of One Shilling. The Presidents shall not be limited in this Respect.

II.

The Name of each Visitor shall be inserted by the Member introducing him, in a Book to be kept for that Purpose, under the Penalty of One Shilling upon neglect.

III.

Any Member introducing a Visitor after the Commencement of public Business, shall forfeit Sixpence.

IV.

The same Gentleman shall not be introduced as a Visitor to the Discussion of more than One Disertation in a Session, under the Penalty of One Shilling, to be paid by the Member introducing him.

V.

The Visitors shall be entitled equally with the Members, to join the Debates of the Society.

VI.

No Visitor shall be present during the Transaction of private Business.

N. B. The above Regulations respect Honorary as well as Ordinary Members.

CHAP. XV.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.

RULE I.

Any Member distatisfied with the Conduct of another, may accuse him. The Accusation must be delivered to the President, in Writing, and by him read to the Society, on the Meeting previous to that on which it shall be determined.

II.

The accused Member shall be informed by the Secretary, of the Charge made against him, and of the Day appointed for its Determination.

III.

The Determination shall be by Ballot; two-thirds of the Society present approving the Accusation, the accused Person shall be expelled.—If less than two-thirds appear in its Favor, the Accuser shall forfeit One Guinea.

IV.

Members improperly disclosing any of the Society's private Concerns, shall be liable to the Penalty of Ten Shillings and Sixpence; to be determined by the Majority of the Society,

CHAP. XVI.

ALTERING OF LAWS.

RULE I.

No Proposal for Alteration in the Laws shall be made, except in a Meeting consisting of at least Ten Members.

II.

Such Proposal must be delivered in Writing to the President, and by him be read to the Society. It must then be entered on the Minutes, and remain a Fortnight before it can be ballotted for.

III.

If a Majority of the Society appear in Favor of the Proposal, it shall be received as a Law; if it shall be rejected, the Proposer shall be allowed to have it ballotted for, either on the same, or a future Evening, during the same Session. If it be a second time rejected, the Proposer shall be fined I wo shillings and Sixpence—and shall on no account propose the same Motion within One Month from such rejection.
