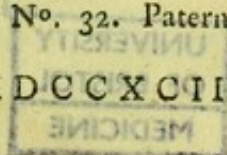

PREFACE

P R E F A C E.

SOME previous Account of the miscellaneous Pieces that are included under the foregoing Title will be necessary.—The first that offers itself is a Calendar of natural Occurrences, which are supposed to have taken place in Greece and most probably in the Latitude of Athens. This is taken nearly, but not altogether from Theophrastus's History of Plants. A similar Attempt was made some Years ago, and published by Mr. Stillingfleet in his Miscellaneous Tracts. That here inserted, though defective in point of Matter, is nevertheless more full and explicit than that given by the Gentleman mentioned above; and contains, in addition to what he has given, an account of the Weather and of the cosmical, achronical, and heliacal rising and setting of many of the Stars and Constellations, which have enabled the Author to fix with greater probability the time of the Year of many of the natural Events recorded by Theophrastus, and to adjust them to modern Computation. This part of the Calendar is taken from Geminus, an ancient Greek Writer whose date is not ascertained, some thinking him to be prior to ^aHipparchus, others bringing him later as to the time of ^bSylla, or even of ^cCicero. This Calendar is made to commence with the Summer Solstice, at which time the ^dGreeks began their Solar Year. It was first intended to have divided the Year according to the Greek Months, but several Reasons determined against such an attempt.

I. The Names and Order of the Greek Months are so much disputed, and so doubtful, that it would have required a long previous ^eDiscussion to settle their Places and Denominations, a thing inconsistent with a Work like the present. Moreover the Year to which these Months were adjusted was either of the Lunar kind, and consisting of 354 Days only, or else somewhat

between the Lunar and Solar Year, and containing 360 Days; and probably both of them were in use at ^a different periods of time. The Calendar however was so incorrectly managed, and the commencement of the Lunar Year so irregular (it beginning not at the time of the Summer Solstice but at the new ^b Moon succeeding it, or perhaps the nearest to it whether before or after) as to create great Error in calculating seasons, or dates of natural events.

Another reason of greater weight was, that the Lunar Year was not made use of in calculating such occurrences. Civil affairs ^c, such as the celebration of ^d Festivals, the election of Magistrates, the payment of Salaries, interest of Money, and all civil contracts were indeed reckoned by the Lunar Year, but what regarded natural events, as the rise or setting of ^e Stars or Constellations, the works of ^f Agriculture, the ^g flowering of Plants, and the ^h gestation of Animals, together with all Transactions that regarded the laws of Nations,

of a time of Year. The order of the Greek Months that seems most agreeable to the ancient Greek Writers is that which is given in Spon and Wheler's Travels, and taken from an antique Marble preserved at Oxford; and is as follows.

Nations, as the duration of ^a Treaties, Truces, &c. were reckoned by the Solar Year. A Solar Year, or the term of 365 days, is also understood to be meant whenever the space of an entire ^b Year is mentioned or a series of Years. It has been the opinion of some ^clearned Persons, that the Solar Year was divided, as well as the Lunar, into twelve Months, each of which commenced at the entrance of the Sun into the several signs of the Zodiac, and this is confirmed by some ^dexpressions of Geminus, and particularly by the Calendar of that Author above mentioned, which is actually divided in that manner, which division is preserved in the Calendar here exhibited.

The next piece that appears is a Calendar of the same kind adjusted to the Climate of Italy, and probably nearly to the Latitude of Rome; compiled from the ancient Roman Writers, those especially that treat on the Subject of Agriculture. This, as well as the other, has a Calendar of the Weather joined with it, which is mostly, but not altogether, taken from ^eColumella.

I have in this Calendar inserted such Passages from the ancient Roman Poets as appeared to be peculiarly descriptive either of the general appearance of Nature in several Seasons in that Country, or of any other natural events that occur at any particular time of the Year. To this Calendar are subjoined, an attempt towards a division of it into natural Months, according to the Plan proposed by Mr. Stillingfleet, and two small sketches of the Seasons at Aleppo in Syria, and at Nice in Italy, the former extract-

It is remarkable that Hippocrates, who in divers parts of his Work, the Epidemics particularly, has so much occasion to particularise Times and Seasons of the Year, never makes use of any of the terms by which the Greek Months were distinguished, but expresses his meaning either by the Seasons as Summer, Winter, &c. or by the Equinoxes or Solstices, or by the rise or setting of the Stars or Constellations.

ed from Dr. Ruffel's History of the first mentioned Place, the latter from Dr. Smollett's Travels into Italy. To these are added a Table of the time of Wheat-harvest in different Parts of Italy, taken from Dr. Symonds on the Climate of Italy, and published in the fourth Volume of Mr. Young's Annals of Agriculture, and a table of the foliation of Trees in this country for several Years, taken from the Gentleman's Magazine.—Next come some Remarks on the leafing, flowering, &c. of some Trees and Plants in Italy, made in the Years 1768, 1769, by Dr. Symonds, and taken, as well as the foregoing, from Mr. Young's Annals of Agriculture.—Next follow some Remains of Antiquity, taken from Gruter's Inscriptions, being two rustic Calendars yet remaining engraven on Stone at Rome. These are often referred to in the Calendar I have given, and tend towards its illustration.—The next article is a table of hours for every Month in the Year, taken from Palladius.

The ^ause of this is thought to have been to enable the labourer in the fields to guess at the time of the Day, by measuring with his foot the proportion which the length of that bears to the length of the shadow of his own Person. The rule on which this depends, will in a gross view, hold good in Men of different Stature, because, generally speaking, the length of a Man's foot bears nearly the same proportion to his height whether he be tall or middle sized.

As the proportion which the length of any upright Gnomon bears to that of its shadow at any certain hour, varies every Day, a table is here given exhibiting the proportion which the Gnomon and its shadow bear to one another, at a medium computation for each Month. The above tables, it is clear, were adjusted to show the unequal hours, or each 12th part of the time between ^bthe rise and setting of the Sun. Thus for example on the 21st of December, when the length of the foot was to that of the shadow of the body as 1 to 29, the peasant knew that $\frac{1}{29}$ part of

The upper Column is of the ancient, the lower of the modern hours. Whatever difference there might be between the length of the hours at one Season of the Year or another, the time of Noon was always at the same hour, namely the sixth.

of the space of time between the rise and setting of the Sun had elapsed, which they denominated an hour, and this proportion of measurement served to denote the first hour of the Day, at that season of the Year. On the 21st of the Month of June on the other hand, when the length of the foot bore a proportion to that of the shadow of the person as 1 to 22, the peasant knew that $\frac{1}{22}$ part of the space between Sunrise and Sunset was past, which was by him denominated the end of the first hour, notwithstanding the real space of time in each of the intervals which he called hours varied considerably, an hour in the Month of December being to an hour in the Month of June as nine to fifteen.—Next follows a table of the Days on which the Sun enters into the different signs of the Zodiac according to the computation of different ages.—Next come some tables of the Weather in different countries, according to both ancient and modern accounts, intended for the purpose of comparing them together. The last and the largest of these pieces is an alphabetical table of the Greek plants. The former of these exhibits 1st the Greek name of the plant and the author who mentions it, 2d the name assigned to the same by Caspar Bauhin in his Pinax and other Works, 3d the corresponding name given by Linnæus in his Spec. Plantarum, 4th the modern English name where that could be found. The second part of this table exhibits the Linnæan names of the Greek plants placed in alphabetical order with the Greek names subjoined. The use of this is to enable the Reader to discover if any particular plant, the Linnæan name of which is known, be one of those with which the Greeks were acquainted.—An attempt of this kind, though sufficiently laborious to the compiler, must be liable to much error and uncertainty; but some Indulgence may be hoped to be given to the first attempt of this kind, at least in our own Country.

* We must not suppose that when the Greek or Roman writers speak of heat, storms, or other changes of weather, being produced by the rise or setting of certain stars, that they seriously meant to ascribe such effects to their influence. Geminus (cap. 14) expressly says, that it is altogether absurd to think that they have any power over the weather, and that such expressions mean no more than, that the people, having by long observation found what weather most commonly took place at the seasons of the year that were distinguished by the rise and setting of particular stars, were thereby enabled to foretel what kind of weather might be expected in future years at the rise or setting of the same stars. To this he adds, that such predictions being founded on observation only were apt to be erroneous. It is the opinion of the learned Dr. Long, since the observations on which these prognostics were founded, must have been of a number of years,

P O S T S C R I P T

POSTSCRIPT TO THE ROMAN CALENDAR.

IT may appear extraordinary to the reader, that so much stormy weather should be set down in the foregoing calendar, which is professedly adjusted to an Italian climate, generally described to us as particularly mild and benign. What adds to our surprise is, that these disturbances occur scarcely less frequently in the summer^a, than in the other seasons of the year. The word used by Columella and Pliny to express these changes of the atmosphere, is *tempestas*, which is here rendered by the word *storm*, not that the ideas of each perhaps exactly correspond, but as the English word approaches nearer to the Latin than any other single word I could find in the language, a little enquiry into the meaning of the word, as here used, may not be unnecessary, as well as some confirmation of the fact from other authorities.

It appears from a passage in Cicero that showers of rain, rainy clouds agitated by the wind^b, storms at sea and whirlwinds, were all included under the word *tempestas*. Hail is likewise added by Pliny^c to the description. I am inclined notwithstanding to believe, that nothing but wind was understood by this word in the calendar of Columella, as he mentions hail, rain, and thunder particularly, and inserts them as frequently as we could suppose them to happen. Windy weather, it must be owned, is often specified in the calendar, but I apprehend it means only an inferior degree of what was understood by *tempestas*. That violent storms of this kind happen in hot climates in the summer months, we know generally from experience, and that such have taken place in the climate of Italy, and the parts

parts adjacent, is agreeable to the testimony both of ancient and modern writers. Polybius tells us, that in the first Punic war the Roman fleet was so far destroyed by a storm, that out of 364 ships only eighty escaped. This he attributes to the obstinacy of the Consuls in neglecting the advice of the pilots, who cautioned them against going along the southern coast of Sicily, as the shore was too deep for anchorage, and afforded no harbour; especially too as the season was then the most unfavourable for navigation, the constellation^a of Orion being not quite passed, and the Dog-star just ready to appear. If we compute this according to the calendar of Geminus, which is nearest to the date of the account, and also nearer to the latitude where this transaction happened, it must have taken place on some day between the fourth and seventeenth of July, the cosmical rise of Orion being mentioned on the 5th, and the rise of the Dog-star on the 16th. The calendar of Columella agrees nearly herewith; Orion being mentioned as rising cosmically as late as the 10th, and the Dog-star is put down as rising on the 17th. Geminus^b too in the calendar published in the present work remarks, that the 19th of July has been noted for tempestuous weather at sea. Virgil likewise mentions that he had often seen great storms or whirlwinds^c arise in the midst of corn harvest, which is just about this time, Varro placing it between the 26th of June and the 26th of July. These he represents as so violent as to tear up and lay waste every thing in their progress, even rooting up the corn itself, and attended with an immense deluge of rain. The storm likewise described by Virgil, which wrecked part of the fleet of Æneas, is related by him to have happened nearly in the same seas with that mentioned by Polybius, and much

much resembles the hurricanes of hot climates, as being^a sudden in its rise^b, violent in its effects^c, and soon over. Modern information, at least what I have seen, agrees herein with the ancient. Abbè Toaldo^d, in a journal of the weather at Venice for the year 1755, mentions two whirlwinds, and a violent storm resembling that described by Virgil, that happened that year in the months of June and July. This is the only modern Italian journal of the weather that I have seen. It is probable that in the more southerly parts of Italy, these aërial disturbances happen more frequently, as they are observed to be more common, as well as violent, in hot climates.

- May 8. The Mulberry-trees from Ancona to Senigallia, scarce in leaf; so that it was feared the worms would starve.
- Dec. 23. Laurustinus, Viburnum-tinus of Linnæus, near Terni, beginning to flower.

N. B. The Laurustinus grows in so great abundance upon the coast of Genoa, and upon the hills about the convents of Camaldoli and Cava in the kingdom of Naples, that it is with good reason considered as a native of Italy. It may, by the way, be observed, that a species of the Phytolacea is found wild in the kingdom of Naples, which heretofore was not thought to be so.

The circumstance of the poplars and willows not being in leaf upon the 21st of April, surpris'd me very much, and among other things convinced me, that our trees and plants are in general as forward as in Lombardy in the beginning of vegetation: the great difference lies in every thing ripening faster in that country than in ours.
