OFTHE

PUCKA, JUNGLE, HILL, OR FEN FEVER OF BENGAL,

EXHIBITING THE MERITS AND DEMERITS OF PARTICULAR MODES OF TREATMENT:

INTRODUCTORY OBSERVATION.

THE difeafes which are denominated in Bengal, Pucka, Jungle, and Hill Fevers, and which appear to be the fame diforder, with fome variation of local circumstances, are esteemed the most fatal forms of fever in that climate.

It may be fufficient to notice further, that the following cafes were taken down at one of the most healthy stations of the upper provinces, where the relapses took place, under the observation and treatment of the compiler, towards the termination of the hot and commencement of the wet seasons; about twenty months after the first attacks at Chitterpoor.

CASE I.

A. B.'s account of his former Jungle Fever, communicated by himself.

· HE first symptoms of my illness at · Chitterpore (about 20 months ago) · were exactly fimilar to what I lately ex-· perienced at this place, viz. violent pains ' in my bones and loins, attended with a head-' ach-They began in the morning and con-' tinued till the day following, when I was ' feized with a fevere fit of the ague, which · lasted two hours; after this a fever followed, which did not abate for feveral hours, · and then went off but flowly, by means of ' a gentle perspiration; for though endeavours were used to bring on a free and profuse one, they failed of their effect. The first · medicine I took was an emetic, which ope-' rated with violence, but brought nothing off ' my ftomach that had the appearance of · bile, nor did any of the medicines, either of B 2 • the

the emetic or purgative kind, ever affect me ' in the manner I have heard others defcribe, ' that is, by difcharging either upwards or ' downwards great quantities of bile. I am ' commonly in all cafes difficult to move by ' medicine; but, notwithstanding this remark ' is applicable to myfelf, yet I think it is im-' poffible to fay that phyfic, which apparent-' ly operates fo little to the purpose at the " moment, does not ultimately obtain its end, ' though by a flower and lefs perceptible pro-' grefs. At leaft, this, if one may judge by ' the event of my recovery, must have been " the cafe with me. I got over the first ' ague and fever towards the evening of the ' day on which I was attacked, and I re-' marked it came on again the next day " nearly about the fame hour, and the follow-' ing in like manner, after which it began to ' lofe ground. The fits were by no means fo ' ftrong, and they began later, every day di-' minishing in their force at each period, till · at laft they returned every two days only, ' and then fo flight as to have no other effect . than that of keeping me in a flate of lan-' guor and weaknefs. The pains in my bones · had ceafed altogether, but the head-ach had " not, intirely left me. I recollect that the ' furgeon who attended me was averfe to an early -

· early use of the bark, being first defirous of ' removing the fever and its caufe. To this ' end he gave me powders in papers to be ' taken every four hours; but I do not know ' their quality; and their effect in operating " was fo flight that I do not remember the " nature of it. When I had got rid of the fever, I took the bark daily in pretty large ' quantities. I was frequently obliged to mix ' rhubarb with it to prevent its making me too coffive. If I may be allowed to fpeak ' from what I felt and experienced myfelf in ' taking the bark, I must confess I never · could perceive that I ever once derived the ' fmalleft benefit from it; it never prevented ' the return of the fever with me, that I can recollect. Having never had an ague and ' fever in my life before the above, and that ' being a pretty fevere one, it gave my whole ' frame a confiderable fhock, and reduced me ' to fo low a state in point of strength, that ' two months afterwards, when almost every ' fymptom of the diforder had left me, and · my appetite returned with an unufual de-' gree of force, I was fcarcely able to walk ' a quarter of a mile at once without refting ; ' however, this I got over too, and for about fix weeks previous to leaving Chitter-' pore, was what might be called com-B 3 · pletely

' pletely reftored. The only inconvenience · I felt, and which I thought would wear off · by degrees, was a flight feverish sensation · about the full and change of the moon, ' and which generally went off as the in-' fluence of that planet ceafed. In this re-' covered state I quitted Chitterpore, and as ' I had held out fo long without a relapfe, I entertained not the least idea of being again ' regularly attacked; you may eafily there-' fore judge of my furprize, when I found ' myfelf again feized with the ague, and ' that too on the very first day of quitting ⁴ Chitterpore, after having marched eleven or f twelve miles in high fpirits, and (as I ' thought) good health. I breakfasted that ' morning as ufual, and kept well till about ' eleven o'clock, when I began to feel that ' kind of uncomfortable coldness which al-' ways precedes an ague. I took fome warm · Madeira and water, went to bed, and about · twelve the shaking fit came on with con-· fiderable violence. I took an emetic in fmall quantities for feven or eight hours · fucceffively before it operated; and then, · as usual, only water came off my ftomach; · however it threw me into a perspiration, " which gave me eafe. The next day I was feized with lefs violence, and a little later, f and 6

and the day following still flighter and · later; after which it ceafed, and in three · days more I was fo far recovered as to do ' my duty with the battalion. The first · day's attack was nearly about the time of " the moon's changing, and I recollect that ' after I had recovered, I remained in the ' most perfect health till the period of the enfuing full moon, when I was again taken ' ill, but the fits were all flight, and it foon degenerated into a kind of continued feverifh ⁴ habit rather than flated returns; however, ' at the change, I experienced fmall regular ' attacks of both ague and fever. From " that time I began to mend, and to re-^e cover both my ftrength and appetite.-I ' efcaped the next full of the moon, but was ' annoyed at the change, and the fits were ' rather ftrong. I recovered again, and, · having miffed the periods of the moon ' three or four times fucceffively, got fo far ' the better of it as to be able to do my ' duty. This career of good health lasted * but a fortnight. The moon began once ' more to exert her unfavourable influence, * and I had three or four very fmart attacks ' of both fever and ague. This was about · last April twelvemonth, fince which I have experienced no return of what could be B4 · deemed

· deemed a regular fit of either ague or fever. · It dwindled into a fettled feverish habit. · which continued for feveral months con-· ftantly upon me, and the fenfations were ' generally stronger at the different periods · of the moon, as above defcribed. For " these last fix or eight months it has been ' gradually leffening, and fometimes leaves " me altogether for a few days. I think I · have felt lefs of it fince my arrival here " than at any former period of the fame du-· ration, and I am in hopes, by thefe pro-' greffive diminutions, that it will foon be entirely eradicated .- Thus I have endea-" voured, as far as my memory enabled me, ' to give you fome idea of the progrefs of • my illness from its commencement. I am · afraid you will find it very inaccurate and · unfatisfactory, more especially under the · head of medicine, on which point I confess " I have been very deficient; you must not, · however, impute this to any neglect of * mine, but to the fact as it really happened, viz. my actually not having taken me-" dicines either in fuch quantities, or in fo · regular a manner as people commonly do · in fimilar fituations.

• The furgeon who attended me was fre-• quently fo ill himfelf as to be incapable of • affording

affording much affiftance. This, together
with the movements of the battalion from
place to place, prevented my being put under fuch a regular and uniform courfe of
treatment as might have been neceffary,
and was the caufe alfo of my taking very
little medicine, fometimes only what was
barely requifite to keep my body open.

· July 16th, 1790.'

June 30th, 1790. A. B. a commiffioned officer, about forty years of age, was feized this morning with very violent pains in his head, loins, knee-joints and legs, attended with great reftlefsnefs. About two o'clock, P. M. he began to take a folution of an ounce of falts and five grains of emetic tartar in a bottle full of water, a Madeira glafs full every quarter of an hour. His pulfe was fomewhat accelerated, and rather full; his fkin moift and cool. He has been in a profufe perfpiration.

July 1ft. He was not moved by the medicine till one o'clock this morning, when he had taken nearly two bottles full of the folution. The pains, anxiety and reftleffnefs did not leave him until the medicine began to operate downwards. He vomited

ed feveral times on first taking the medicine; but discharged nothing except watery matters. He had no particular degree of thirst yesterday; but complains much of it today. He has frequent thin and yellow ftools: it is observable that the former quantity of emetic tartar, as well as what he takes today, viz. three grains to a bottle full of the folution, a glass full every forty-five minutes, has had very little tendency to operate by vomit. He is free from all pain to-day; but feels a weight over his eye-brows and is very languid. He was afflicted, as nearly all the officers and native foldiers were, with the jungle fever at Ramghur; and has had frequent returns of it fince.

zd. He flept well laft night, and had a copious difcharge of yellow bile this morning early. His pulfe and fkin are perfectly natural; his tongue however is ftill rather foul; it became rather more foul after the operation of the firft folution. All his pains have vanifhed.—He is directed to continue the folution every hour.—*Evening*. He has been fubject to the piles fince his fever at Ramghur, and now feels great inconvenience from them. His fpirits are much depreffed, notwithftanding all his fymptoms have left him except a little foulnefs of tongue. His ftools

ftools have been thin and yellow, mixed with brown to-day; and are more offenfive than they were.

3d. He continues to difcharge much liquid yellow matters by ftool. His eyes are ftill much fuffufed, and a yellow fur covers part of his tongue, which has continued moift. I have never obferved this yellow colour on the tongue before, even in fevers of a character the moft decidedly bilious.—— He is directed to take two grains of calomel this evening, and an ounce of caftor-oil in the morning.

Last Quarter. Yesterday his stools 4th. were liquid and of a light yellow colour; but this morning they have been thick, brown and offenfive, a mixture of glare, mucus, bile and other fordes, much vitiated. His piles have bled much this morning. He was much griped before the operation of the medicines. -----He is directed to take the folution of emetic tartar with a little lime-juice in it, fo as to promote the inteftinal difcharges during the day. ---- Notwithstanding the quantity of physic he has taken daily, and the confequent large and frequent evacuations, particularly by ftool, he acknowledges that he acquires ftrength every day.

5th. Note from him, forenoon.— ' I cannot fay

· fay much in favour of myfelf fince you left · me yesterday. I was annoyed the whole day with heats and flight perspirations. · The mixture worked me but once, which ' was last night about nine, and then but ' gently. I had a very uneafy night, which ' was owing a good deal to the piles. They · have become fo troublefome, that I have · determined to apply leeches, and have fent ' for them accordingly. At prefent I am · eafy enough in every refpect except the " piles.' ---- He is to take the folution of emetic tartar as before; and a dofe of caftoroil early to-morrow morning, if the former fhall not have operated well by ftool before that period.

6th. He applied nine leeches yefterday to his piles, and allowed the bleeding to continue for three hours after the leeches had fallen off. He then endeavoured in vain to ftop it: fo much blood was loft before the bleeding could be ftopped, that he felt frequent tendencies to faint. He is much weakened by this accident. His pulfe was quick and finall when I firft faw him this evening; but an hour after it appeared to be much more full and ftrong. The yellow fur has left his tongue, but it is more generally foul than before; his fkin is cool and fomewhat dry; his

his eyes appear much fuffufed with yellow. The caftor-oil procured only one ftool, rather natural. He is to take the Peruvian bark.

7th. Note from him this morning. — ' If you think one hundred per cent of better health to-day than yefterday a fufficient reafon for not touching the bark, you will of courfe approve my refolution not to take it. I have been walking all this morning, and could wifh for a little more chicken broth. I think my tongue is getting into a good ftate very faft.'

8th. There is no material alteration in any refpect fince yefterday. He is to take a dofe of caftor in the morning. Goulard's extract and laudanum are ordered for the piles.

9th. Note from him.— ' I took the caftoroil this morning, which, after paining my bowels pretty much, gave me a very copious evacuation. I have alfo had another, which, tho' tho' not fo free, was, I think, of a worfe
quality. I am now tolerably eafy, but extremely weak and languid. The Goulard
has not been fent; however it does not
fignify, as they are getting better.'

New Moon, 12th.—13th. He has continued entirely free from all complaint, and feels his ftrength and appetite encreafing daily.

15th. He continues perfectly well.

CASE II.

C.D's account of the first attacks of the Jungle Fever.

• The following is the eighth attack of • fever while in the Ramghur diffrict; the 1ft • was about the 24th of May.'

• On the 28th of September, 1788, dined • out; not well; eat but little, of broth and • fheep's head boiled in it.

Soon after dinner, the ufual fymptoms, pain
in the hip, joints, arms, hands and legs;
fometimes a pain over the eyes and back of
the head, a heat and numbrefs in the fingers.
About 7 o'clock took an emetic; difcharged a great quantity of very acid liquid,
and the meat I had eaten not in the leaft
changed.

changed. During the operation the cold fit
came on; the heat, which followed in about
two hours, lafted the whole night,

^c 2d. day. An interval.—Violent pain
^c in the head, which continued throughout
^c the fever.

· 3d. Cold and hot fit. Sent to ---- for " faline mixture (this always relieved me by · producing a great perfpiration) with one ' grain of tartar emetic in about two thirds of a · quart bottle-took this at eight or ten times, ' about half an hour elapfed between each · time-In the afternoon it operated down-' wards eight times, all bile; upwards four ' times; the bile brought up green as cop-· peras. ---- Some of the gentlemen who · came to fee me, in the evening, expressed ' their furprize at the colour, the fervants ' having neglected to take the last discharge * away. Urine deep red. So much reduced by · thefe evacuations, the fervants were obliged • to move me off the couch, when neceffary. Could not fpeak louder than a whifper— ' drank fome hot Madeira and water-a little ' pleuritic-from this period very reftlefs-' could not eat any thing.

4th day. Eat three or four bits of toaft
dipped in water—this day the fever very
violent—in the evening the pain in my head
fo

fo much increased and confused, apprehended a delirium—defired my fervants
might be ordered to fleep in the room, and
inftructed how to act—passed a very diftreffing night—fhort flumbers, during which
the most horrid objects feemed to pass before
me.

' 5th day. Fever continued; by degrees · came on my tongue, roof of mouth, and · throat, a drynefs which deprived me of the ' use of speech until I had gargled-it lasted ' from this time during the whole fever; at " times I could fcrape dry powder from off ' my tongue, and before I was enabled to fwal-' low any liquid, was obliged to gargle with · lime juice: the quantity of phelgm, &c. ' which every time came off, (though at the · interval of only an hour) would fill a table · fpoon - and even then it was with difficulty ' that I could fwallow. The furgeon having a · little recovered this day, fent me fome pow-· ders to take every four hours; I attempted · to take four, but could not keep them on my · ftomach .--- About three in the morning ' another furgeon arrived, when I was fleep-' ing in a chair, my head on a table; having · been very reftless, I had left the cott. He call-· ed at four, when I was awake; and, having · related to him the particulars of my cafe, and

' and fome red bark being on the table, he · gave me fome. Continued the ufe of bark ' with red wine, and faline mixture while in the · state of effervescence .- What other medi-' cines he may have made use of I cannot ' fay, he having mixed the whole I took the ' next day himfelf, and generally gave them · to me; he was unwearied in his attendance. Purgatives must have been used, as ' the posterior part was never shut for a long ' fpace. A clyfter brought off bile fcalding ' hot, and which greatly pained me for ' a confiderable time after .- The 6th day. ' In the evening was removed to Captain ' ----'s, for the convenience of being near ' the furgeon. This day could fwallow but ' a very little panada .- The 7th. Eat fome ' broth, as also the 8th day; in the evening · of which the fever abated, and next morn-' ing left me, without power to ftir, a mere ' skeleton .- The 10th day. In the morning, · having fo far recovered as to be able to ' move about the room with affiftance, fet. off by dauk for Chittera. My ftrength ' and appetite now increafed .- Took fmall ' quantities of bark .- During the fever I ' one night found the light of the candle ' fo very difagreeable as to fet me much be-' fide myfelf; and could not get eafe until · the

the light was taken away.—Juft as the
fever left me, a great palpitation of heart
made me very uneafy.

· Every full moon after, I was attacked " with an ague and fever, generally the day " after full, until the latter end of February · -- tartar emetic, purgatives, and bark were " the remedies made use of. I conceived I ' should not again be molested, but on the ' 15th May, being on a vifit here, the moon · brought my old enemy : the ufual remedies, ' applied by myfelf. The next moon was ' more civil, and only prefented me with " a remembrance. On the 15th July, the day ' after the arrival of the battalion here laft · year I received a most violent shock; the ' cold fit lasted almost the whole day. The · furgeon directed me to take four grains of * tartar emetic, at as many times, an hour be-* tween : each operated. The last discharged ' bile in shape, fize, and confistence of a · pullet's egg yolk, which fpread foon after ' it touched the bason. The next day ' an interval; the day after ague and fever. · Tartar emetic and purgatives having dif-· lodged the bile, on the 21ft took bark-" on the 22d went on the river-an ounce " of bark per day, gradually decreafed to two · tea-spoonfuls .- Every full and change 6 took

took purgatives, fmall dofes of bark, and
elixir of vitriol, till the march of the battalion from this for the upper country, in November. I have not fince had an open affault; however, every full moon reminds me
of my former fituation by the pains in my
fingers and heat of hands.

• N.B. I was not free from the pain in my • head, or had the perfect use of my memory, • for a long time after the last Ramgur • Fever. The beginning of 1784, first had a • pain in my right fide and shoulder, took me-• dicines for four months.

I have endeavoured, as well as my recollection will allow, to defcribe the laft Hill Fever.
Many fymptoms may have occurred of which
I could not be fenfible, and remedies applied
which I do not recollect.—You have I believe
at leaft the outlines, from which your judgment may be able to draw the reft.

Upon the whole, I now feel myfelf more
fprightly, though not equal to running a race.
I conceived, the day before yefterday, that
I felt a hardnefs in the liver, but have not
fince; the pain now is at times only in the
fhoulder.'

The cafe of G. D. continued.

July 1st, 1790.—C. D. a commissioned C 2 officer,

officer, applied for medical affistance, about the 20th of April. He had been afflicted, like the others, with the Jungle Fever at Chitterpoor, about twenty months previous to that period; and had never experienced a perfect enjoyment of health fince. In the interval he feems to have fuffered a gradual and constant decay of embonpoint and strength, with a confiderable alteration in the colour of his countenance, frequent returns of fever, particularly at the lunar periods, an obvious deficiency of bile, imperfect repose, flying pains, especially in the shoulder, heat and dryness in the palms of the hands, and great irregularity in the intestinal evacuations .---- For these fymptoms, about the 20th of April he was put under a course of calomel. Gentle but frequent exercife, early rifing, a spare diet, a total abstinence from spirits, wine and malt liquors, and occafional laxatives were recommended. The reftrictions with refpect to diet were not fcrupuloufly obferved.

July 1ft. Note from C. D.—' Agreeable to ' your note I took a little more falts. Four-' and-twenty were the leaft number of times ' that I was put in motion. On the whole, ' the quantity, at a moderate calculation, was ' at leaft two quarts of thick ftir-about bile. ' Except

Except the first discharge, it carried the fame appearance throughout the day. I am furprised from whence it all could proceed.
Last night two purging pills, and this morning five movements, the same as yesterday. In confequence of the above, I
have reported myself fick this morning.

• At times fhoots in the liver fide; no fixed • pain; ftill the heat in the hands, and the pain • in the fingers at times.'

Note from C. D. of yesterday's date .- ' The ' pain in my right fide will not quit me; it flies about from the shoulder towards the ' kidneys, under the upper ribs, between them ' and the hip-bone, and fometimes in a line with the right of the breaft-bone downwards. A feverifh feel in both hands. When lying on the right fide, always feel ' the pain; but principally at other times in the fhoulder. I do not breathe fo freely as 'ufual. Appetite not of the best, from fix to ' eight mouthfuls of kid and greens my ut-' most. The latter do not digest better than 'ufual. Mouth not yet affected.---- I take ' the (calomel and cathartic extract) pill every ' night; evacuation in proportion to the quan-" tity confumed; little bile."

2d. From the period of the full moon, on the 26th of last month, he appears to have

had

had very large fecretions of bile, with occafional feverifhnefs. He has taken falts frequently; ftill however his evacuations feem to be highly bilious. He had been more than a month under a courfe of calomel before thefe large fecretions of bile commenced. Formerly there appeared to be a deficiency of this fecretion.—Laft night three pills, each containing two grains of calomel and two of extract of jalap, were prefcribed; with a dofe of caftor oil to be taken early this morning.

Note from C. D. noon.— ' In lieu of the ' caftor oil, I took a dofe of falts. The ope-' ration has been very gentle, only four times; ' thus far all bile of a deep yellow, of courfe ' more behind. I have eat nothing these three ' days but bread and butter, with a very small ' bit of kid.'

Note at two o'clock, P. M. --- 'A very difa-' greeable companion has buffeted me all ' day; and I have only waited for his depar-' ture to write you. The Hill Fever has fo ' terribly handled my bones and flefh, that I ' can neither fit, walk, nor lay. I am pretty ' warm now. Eight large ftools of the ufual ' colour before the fever came on.'

A folution of falts, with two grains of emetic tartar; a Madeira glafs full every half hour,

hour, was prefcribed; with directions to avoid vomiting, if poffible.

Note fome hours later.—' Another time ' upwards, but not quite fo green, though ' more in quantity. Three times downwards, ' ftill yellow; a probability of more. The ' pains will not quit.'

This evening he continues to feel very fevere pains in his loins and lower extremities. His skin is much fuffused with yellow; but not his eyes in the fame proportion. His fkin is dry, but not very hot; his pulfe is quick, but not fmall; his tongue is rather foul and whitish, with a tinge of brown on the tip. Before fun-fet the medicine had operated feveral times by vomit. Yellow and dark-coloured green bile was evacuated to the amount of about two pints. He fays this attack is more fevere than that which he experienced in the Ramghur diffrict. His pains admit of a temporary alleviation from fomentations, as well as from keeping himfelf warm with cloths. He has been fubject to the piles, fince the first attack of the Hill Fever.

3d. Note, Forenoon.—' The medicine ope-' rated yesterday three times upwards; the ' fecond not fo green as the first, but the ' quantity greater; the third, partly bile, the C 4 ' latter

· latter part nothing but the falts. It now · began to operate downwards abundantly; · the three first movements yellow bile, with fome of the oil I took in the morning ' mixed; the four next rather of a darker ' appearance, and the fame fimell as the bile 'discharged upwards. The five last altered ' in appearance, from the greenish to a light ' yellow; in all twelve. This morning they ' are of a bright yellow. About ten o'clock ' the pains went away gradually, and I flept, ' waking only twice for a fhort fpace. The ' magazine must now be empty. I took a ' fmall dry toaft and a difh of tea this morn-' ing, the first fince the day before yesterday. " I do not conceive I have the twentieth part ' of a grain within. This morning my tongue ' was yellow, but my eyes clear. I am ftout ' this morning, compared to one who has no ' ftrength. I am determined to go to fea for ' my health.'

During the courfe of the evening he has had more ftools of the fame kind. His pulfe is ftill very quick, and his fkin rather dry and hot. His tongue is lefs foul; it has been always moift. He mentions the very fevere pains in his back and limbs among the fymptoms of his fever in the Ramghur diftrict, which came on every day with the cold fit. He He has not felt any pain in the head as yet. ——He is directed to take two grains of calomel to night, and two table-fpoons full of caftor oil in the morning.

4th. Last Quarter .- The calomel and castor oil, inftead of liquid brown ftools, have this morning difcharged a large quantity of thick, brown, offenfive matters, apparently a mixture of glare, mucus, bile and other fordes much vitiated, as in A. B's. cafe. His eyes do not appear to have been at all fuffufed as yet. His fkin appears lefs tinged. His pulse is not fo quick this morning. His fkin is more cool, and rather foft and moift this morning. As he had fo many returns of this kind of fever at Chitterpoor, he has expected it's recurrence to day; but there is not any appearance of it's approach. In every other refpect he feels well, with the exception of fome languor from the operation of the medicines. His tongue is cleaner.----He is to take a folution of two grains of emetic tartar in a bottle of water with the juice of one lime, in fuch quantities during the day, as may ferve to promote only the difcharges by ftool.

5th. Note, Forenoon.— 'I took the bottle full of medicine yesterday, only one very finall matter followed. I have fince the fame weighty sensation at stomach I complained

plained of yefterday morning. When I rofe
this morning, a little muddled in the head;
mouth very clammy, difagreeable and yellow. I am altogether languid; otherwife
feel the fame as yefterday, with a great
moifture. I took a little fago yefterday,
and fome tea this morning.'

He is to continue the folution of emetic tartar during the day, fo as to operate freely by vomit and ftool, if the weight at ftomach fhould not vanish. At night he is to take three grains of calomel, and the folution of falts with emetic tartar to-morrow in the usual manner.

6th.—He vomited a good deal yefterday, and paffed green matters by ftool. This morning he had very copious evacuations of a thick confiftence, a variety of colours, and a bad fmell. His ftools fince have been liquid, and rather brown and bilious. His fkin is very cool and moift; his tongue clean; but his pulfe is fomewhat quicker than natural. He is in every other refpect free from complaint. He is of courfe rather weak. He rode out in a carriage this evening.—He is to take the folution of emetic tartar with lime juice during the day tomorrow, in fuch dofes as may keep his body very open.

Sth.

8th. Note.— 'Yefterday took the emetic 'tartar and lime-juice; eight or ten times backwards, thin, colour rhubarb mixt. This morning flight pains in the bones, and pain in the fide. No fever. Damp difagreeable air here this morning.'

9th. Note, 11 o'clock .- " The pains in my · legs and thighs continued all day yesterday ' in a flight degree. I took a few spoons full of chicken broth, and a very little bread ' pudding, I have caught cold, and have a fmall cough. Laft night, when I went to ' bed, much inclined to an ague; my flefh all · fore, with a creeping fenfation, as ufually felt on fuch occasions, of which I have had ' abundant experience. Feeling alfo feverifh, 'I took two purging pills to affift the oil. ' In a flow fever half the night; pains en-' creafed, none in the loins. Tongue this ' morning, and still, white and foul. Took the ' caftor oil this morning; difcharged a pretty 'good quantity, thick but yellow; none of ' the fame green appearance as before. Took ' one dish of tea. Pains gone, but still a flow ' fever; though at times this morning a little ' perspiration. Eyes clear; pulse quick and ftrange.'---- Ten drams of glauber falts, and two grains of emetic tartar, to be diffolved in a bottle full of water, and the juice of one lime 2

lime to be added; of this he is to take a wine glafs full every hour, fo as to operate only by ftool.

10th. Note.—' The falts cleared me of half 'a gallon, thick and thin yellow bile. No fever this morning. Tongue yellow; eyes clear; no pains; weak of courfe. Two mouthfuls of bread and two difhes of tea; 'nothing yefterday.'

12th. New Moon. Note.—' Yefterday and to day continue as well as can be expected, that is, I do not feel myfelf any way annoyed but by weaknefs; except a palpitation occafionally by walking a little too quick yefterday evening. Pulfe regular; eyes clear; tongue yellow. The day before yefterday was at work backwards the whole day; nothing yefterday. Ate fome bread and tea, and fome chicken broth and toaft yefterday. At times feel a pain in the fhoulder; I thought this point was fettled.'

13th. Note.—' No ftool yesterday. This 'morning I have taken fome of the falts, &c. 'Much the fame as yesterday. Pulse rather quicker; tongue yellow. No pains or fe-'ver. Very fick just now with the medi-'cine.'

14th. Note.— ' The phyfic I took yefter-' day brought off a great quantity of yellow ' bile,

bile, and continued to difcharge until it loft
its colour in water. What I had eaten
for three days came off in the fhape of pellets, and pretty hard. Without the phyfic,
I could not poffibly have moved them.
This bread food agrees but ill. No fever.
Tongue yellow and foul; pulfe regular;
hands cooler to-day than fince the fever.
flying pains in the fide, fhoulder and back.'

15th.—Yefterday evening he had fcarcely any acceleration of pulfe. His tongue, though in the morning yellow, was pretty free from foulnefs of any kind. He had fome little red in his cheeks, which feemed to be natural, and not the effect of feverifhnefs. On the whole he appeared perfectly well.

First Quarter, 19th. 20th.—His health improves daily.

CASE III.

The cafe of E. F.

• On the 23d of April, 1788, at Chitter-• pore, I was taken ill:—fymptoms, head-• ache; ficknefs at the ftomach; my fkin • dry and hot; much languor, and flight • pains in my bones. The furgeon to • whom I applied gave me an emetic, which • occafioned much vomitting of bile, very • yellow,

syellow and bitter. The next morning I felt myself somewhat easier, though still · opprefied with much languor; in hopes of · removing it I walked out a little way, but was under the neceffity of immediately " returning, being feized with greater pains · than before, which, in a very fhort fpace of time, encreafed in the most violent degree it is poffible to conceive; the pain • was in my legs and thighs. I inftantly " fent for Mr.----, he ordered my legs to · be put into hot water, and my thighs to be fomented with hot blankets; I did fo, but · notwithstanding, the pains continued fo exquifite that I really thought I could not " furvive them. (I do not believe he gave me ' any purgative after the operation of the emetic). He gave me a fmall draught, · which was chiefly laudanum, and ordered · me into bed, and to be well covered. · I got almost instant relief; fell into a · profound fleep, and most profuse perspira-· ration. When I awoke, I was tolerably eafy, the pains being greatly decreafed. ' The pains were fucceeded by a flow fever, · which continued without intermiffion until · about the 4th of May; during which time · (for I was fo very dangeroufly ill that no · perfon had the least hopes of my recovery) · I do

" I do neither recollect what were all the · fymptoms of my diforder, or what medicines · Mr. ---- administered to me; I only know " this, that almost both day and night my · legs and thighs were formented with blan-· kets steeped in boiling water; that I had ' much pain in my head; no fleep or reft; · little or no evacuation; an hiccup, which · continued two or three days and nights, at " which period, I have been fince informed, the ' gentlemen expected I would have given them ' the flip, but a copious bleeding at the nofe ' came, very a-propos, to my affistance, and ' from that critical time I date my recovery .---' The medicines which I took, which I have ' any recollection of, were a pill at night of, · I believe, opium, and liquids of a cordial ' nature. Mr. ---- would not fuffer any ' gentleman to approach near me, on account · of the offentiveness of my room and myfelf ' together. I was removed, on or about * the 4th of May, to another house (unable at ' that time to walk) and I daily improved. · Mr. ---- gave me no laxative medicines; ' but three papers of bark every day, to be ' taken in wine and water, at morning, noon, ' and night. He allowed me to eat a little · kid, fowl, or pudding, and to drink two or three glaffes of Madeira in the course of the · day.

· day. As I recovered my ftrength but very · flowly, and dreading a relapfe, I fuggefted · a change of air, to which Mr .---- affented, ' and indeed deemed it abfolutely neceffary. · On the 10th I took my departure by dauk · for Chittra, where I arrived on the 12th. . The change of air I thought had a good effect, for although I was on the verge of · diffolution when I arrived at Chittra, from " the fatigue of the journey, and delay on " the road, bearers not having been properly ' placed, yet I recovered (taking a little bark " daily) my ftrength apace, and eat with a good appetite, and I must confess with a · most voracious one too, and drank four or · five glaffes of claret befides. I kept free · from fever for many days; but always · after eating had a most infufferable fulnefs. ' My fervant neglecting to fhut my fleeping · room door one night, and a ftrong wind ' having arofe when I was afleep, I was · feized with violent pains in all my bones and ' loins, and a ftiff neck : the fever followed ' in the evening. Mr. ---- gave me a draught, ' which was chiefly antimonial wine, to take ' going to bed. The following day I felt ' a great coldnefs, which I had never done · before; I took more antimonial wine, which · made me perspire freely, and both purged ' and

and vomited me. Much bile. In the evening
he gave me a little bark, which returned.
The next day I took an ounce, and the fever
kept off. Mr. — recommended my proceeding immediately to Gya; which I did
by dauk.

· After my arrival at Gya I recovered ' rapidly, and my appetite kept pace with ' my recovery, to which I gave unlimited fcope. I took bark fix or feven times a day, and being under the influence of the ' moon, at her full and change I took it · more plentifully. In fhort, my ftools per-· fectly refembled wet faw-duft. During • my refidence at this place, I had no very · fevere return of the fever, except once. * Mr. — gave me an emetic of (I believe) " tartar emetic and falts, to be taken by wine ' glaffes full, until it freely operated; which I " did, and vomited much yellow bile : after · that, the remains of the bottle of mixture ' was filled with water, and I took a wine ' glafs full of it until it purged me very ' violently : in the night, from the activity ' of the medicine, I had fuch an exceffive pain ' in my fide and stomach that I was unable to lie down. The next morning I was ' better. I told Mr. -----, that I was ap-* prehenfive the pain might proceed from an D · affection

· affection of my liver; he examined me, · but was not of opinion that it was affected, ' but that it might be some obstruction; to ' remove which, he gave me fome laxative " pills to take occafionally, in cafe it did not ' go away; but I only took three or four of · them, in consequence of its disappearing. " After remaining two months at Gya, I · returned to Chitterpore, to all appearance, · perfectly reinstated both in health, strength, ' and vigour. I continued pretty well, and ' free from fever (my bowels fometimes out · of order, and a difcharge of mucus) until * the month of September, 1789, at this place, " when I was again afflicted with a fever, " and, as if one evil was not sufficient at once, ' it was accompanied by its all-powerful ^e companion the ague (the first time in my · life I ever had one). Mr. ---- prefcribed emetics and purgatives; and after their · operation, and the fever well reduced, bark. " I evacuated much bile, got a little better ' of the diforder, but at intervals fubject to · feverish fymptoms. I proceeded by water · to Cawnpore, in hopes of its doing me " great fervice; on my way thither, had a " very fevere ague and fever ; took bark re-" gularly ; drank no wine, or tea ; ate every ' thing that I judged eafy of digeftion, and · breakfasted

· breakfasted on bread and milk. At the · full and change of the moon, was fenfible ' of the fever all the while I was at Cawn-· pore; difcontinued the bark, but took once " a day twenty drops of elixir of vitriol, and · columbo root two or three times. On ' my march down was feized, after walk-' ing a fhort diftance, with the pain in my ' fide; it never was very acute, but fomething like a flight flitch. I applied to ' Mr. -----, who faid it proceeded from ob-· ftructions; he gave me mercurial pills to ' take, they brought on the complaint in my · bowels, first a purging, then the difcharge · of mucus, and ftraining, of which you are ' already acquainted. I have now traced my · diforders from their beginning until I · committed them to your good care, where, · having already the pleafure of feeling my-' felf greatly better, I shall leave their re-· mains.

In addition to the foregoing narrative, it may not be unneceffary to obferve, that a few months previous to my
going to Chitterpore, (when in Calcutta,
December, 1787) I had a violent purging,
for which Mr. — gave me rhubarb;
I received little benefit from it while
there, but on my journey, from atten-D 2 tion

tion to my diet (for I took no medicines) it quitted me; but I had frequent
inclination to go to the neceffary, and all
to no purpofe, only a flight difcharge of
mucus, much ftraining, and a very great
fulnefs.—On my arrival at Gelda, the
fulnefs only remained; Mr. — told me
it proceeded from flatulency and weak
bowels. He gave me columbo root, to be
taken twice a day in cold water, which I
did; and, added to the great care I took of
myfelf, was in the courfe of a fhort period
pretty well.

· July 13th, 1790.'

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July 1ft. E. F. a commiffioned officer, about thirty years of age, applied for medical affiftance, on the 16th of April, on account of a flux. He had frequent calls to ftool; which were chiefly of mucus, tinged with blood, and accompanied by fevere gripings; his complexion, naturally dark, appeared very fallow; his countenance meagre; he alfo had been afflicted with the Jungle Fever, in the diftrict of Ramghur, about twenty months before; for which he had taken large quantities of bark. During that courfe he frequently remained eight or ten days without any any confiderable evacuation by ftool. Since that period he had been fubject to frequent returns of feverifhnefs, particularly about the feveral periods of the moon. In general, he experienced heat and thirst every day, at one period or other of the twenty-four hours. On his application for affiftance, on account of the dyfenteric fymptoms, his diet was recommended to be chiefly if not entirely vegetable. This, however, was foon changed for a finall quantity of kid or fowl, and the farinacea, as he imagined the vegetables occafioned the fulnefs at ftomach, which he generally experienced after dinner.---Several dofes of calomel and caftor oil were exhibited, which foon carried off the fymptoms of dyfentery, except occafionally a little difcharge of mucus. He was then put under a course of calomel. He has now taken about fifty grains, in fmall dofes. His ftools have been lately more natural, and confiderably tinged with bile, in which they appeared very deficient formerly. He fcarcely ever feels the fulnefs now; nor has he for a long time experienced any feverifhness at the lunar periods, or the daily heat and thirst of which he formerly complained. During this courfe he has taken purges frequently, particularly before the lunar periods. He feems to have D 3 efcaped

escaped the influence of the last full moon, which affected almost every other patient afflicted with obstructions, or what may be justly termed chronic fevers. He has had, for nearly twelve days, a numerous eruption of biles on his thigh and leg; which deprived him of fleep, and gave great pain for feveral days. In most of them much matter was formed and discharged. This affection differed very little, if at all, from that with which Mr. ---- was afflicted three or four years ago, at nearly the fame feafon of the year. I could not perceive that leeches, applied on their first appearance, purging, low diet, or topical applications of any kind, were of very evident fervice, at leaft in Mr. ----'s cafe. He too was under a course of mercury at the time, on account of a very fufpicious fore, in a fuspicious part. The biles also, after they had discharged their contents, generally left a fmall discoloured fore, of a doubtful character.

2d. Note from him. — ' I have had four ' movements to-day, thick, and of a deep ' yellow. The first was accompanied with fome mucus and slight straining, but no fulness. I have felt all day as if I had no intestines.'

4th. Last Quarter. He took castor oil this

this morning, which has given him feveral large bilious ftools. No new biles have arifen within these few days. He continues remarkably free from every feverish fymptom.

6th. He discharges much saliva now; he has felt the fulness at stomach several times these three days, and a pain at the pit of the stomach twice. He has not felt either to-day. His stools are bilious and very offensive, with an occasional discharge of a substance like jelly. His dinner is no more than the leg or wing of a small fowl, or a small quantity of kid. He has not had lately the least severish or dysenteric symptom of any kind. He has now taken nearly fixty grains of calomel solve 15th of March.

8th. Note. ' The draught yesterday produced fix flight movements; the first of which was attended with much mucus; the two last were of a very dark hue and a jelly confistence; the rest were fat and yellow. I felt no pain, but had a little fulness after dinner. This morning I have had a good motion, yellow and bilious; no mucus, but greater fulness than yesterday; no pain; much spitting.'

9th. Note. ' I had three flight motions ' yesterday, all rather bilious and yellowish-' not fo much fulness in the afternoon as D 4 ' in

in the morning; no mucus; a flight heartburn, and my eyes rather yellow—the fmall
of my back almost broke with, I suppose,
weakness.—Took the last pill of calomel
and extract of jalap.—This morning have
had a couple of stools, the last of which
dark and bilious—no mucus; no fulness
—much spitting, and my gums rather tender. My eyes are not discoloured today.'

10th. Note. 'Since I wrote you, have had two very flight evacuations, one laft night and another this morning; both of which were chiefly mucus; and I am forry to add, I have had the fulnefs alfo. I think fomething or other is in my inteftines which wants to come out, yet won't—it will perhaps require a little forcible compulfion.'

12th. New moon. Note. ' No evacuation the day before yefterday, except at night, two drops of mucus.—Yefterday two flight natural flools, which did not look bilious, one at night the other in the morning—a little mucus preceded the one in the morning. Little or no fulnefs throughout the day—in the evening, pain in the loins; perfectly cool and not in the leaft feverifh. To-day a natural flool without mucus; a little fulnefs, which I have obferved I am ' more

more fenfible of after breakfaft than at any
other time. Now and then feel a kind of
a pain a little below my ftomach, in my
right fide, which does not remain long—
do not feel myfelf fo much refreshed as a
person usually is from a good night's fleep,
which I had tolerably well last night. I
continue to have much spitting, and the
ends of my gums are rather fore. Cool,
and no feverish symptoms, except that my
loins this morning are not so ftout as I
could wish.'

13th. Note. ' I feel myfelf better this ' morning than ufual. I think my bowels · begin to get into their natural and proper " ftate. I have had an excellent evacuation, ' of a good thick nature, and though it was ' rather stiffish, yet not of that viscid con-' fiftence as formerly. I still have a little ful-" nefs, and laft night I had a difcharge of one ' drop of mucus .--- I have a flight pain, or ' rather a weaknefs in my loins, otherwife ' pretty well-the forenefs of my gums gone ' away, and the spitting much decreased .- It ' is now feven or eight days fince I took " any purgative. - With respect to eating, I ' will tell you how I have managed for ' fome days past-at noon I have a leg or a wing of a fowl; the fame at dinner, with a little

a little pudding. By this mode my ftomach
does not remain fo long empty, and eating
fmall quantities at a time more eafily digefts
— Do you approve of it? I have not tafted
wine in any fhape whatever. I rode out
this morning, and did not feel any pain in
my fide.'

15th. He complains still of the pain in his back, but is in other respects well.

16th. Note. 'I have had a flight difcharge of mucus this morning; had none yefterday; but this pain in my loins continues, though lefs than formerly, yet more to-day than for fome days paft—a trifling fulnefs, and rather inclined to coftivenefs; only one ftool a day, and that is at firft hard, thick mucus, and lumpy, afterwards foft — fpitting diminifhed. The greens, I think, gripe me a little. Two evenings a heartburn.'

First Quarter 19th.—20th. Note. 'Al'ways ailing—The evening of the 17th I
'felt myself by no means well, and rather
'inclined to costiveness—I therefore, that
'night, took two grains of calomel, and the
'following morning castor oil, which pro'cured fix motions, all of which both bili'ous and a good deal of mucus; fince which,
'J am forry to fay, though this is the third
'day,

day, I have not had a call, except on each · day a drop or two of thick white mucus. · I had indeed this morning a very flight na-" tural stool, but which was larded with mu-· cus. Until to-day have had the pains in my ' loins; and likewife to a greater degree the · pain in my fide, though rather lower down " than formerly. I felt the pain in the loins ' and fide greater when I rode out on horfe-· back this morning ; yet it is very inconfider-' able on the whole. I feel more of fulnefs ' than ufual-I have neither any head-ach * or drynefs of fkin, but on the contrary am ' perfectly cool and a fine moifture .-- I am ' rather apprehenfive, from the coffiveness, ' fulnefs, and pain in my fide, that fome-' thing or other is yet unfubdued; and in · cafe you should deem it necessary for me + to take more calomel, I intend commencing ' to-night with one grain, in order that no time * may be loft.'

22d. Note.—' The night on which I ' wrote you, I took a grain of calomel, which ' produced a couple of motions yefterday; but ' by fome means or other, which I cannot ' account for, I have caught a cold. I had ' yefterday all day a very difagreeable tickling, ' and a little forenefs in my throat, and my ' head quite ftuffed up.—I had a very bad ' night

" night indeed-a great pain in my head, gums and teeth, fome confiderable fever, and not • a wink of fleep. This morning much • worfe, more fever, pain in my eyes and ' head, and extreme weaknefs .---- I took a ' pill laft night, and this morning had a ftool; " which was bullets and mucus.---- I com--" menced about feven o'clock to take falts and " emetic tartar, an ounce of the former and two grains of the latter diffolved in a bottle of " water, with the juice of a lime fqueezed into ' it. I took a wine glass full every thirty mi-' nutes; I only vomited three times, and " what came away was chiefly the medicine, * tinctured with a little yellow bile; but it · was active enough in its operation down-' wards, though not until I had taken the " whole.----I have now a pretty free perfpi-' ration, but have a little fever alfo; my eyes ' not yellow, or my tongue foul; but upon ' the whole I am much annoyed-rather in-· clined to have flight pains in my thighs--" extreme thirst upon me, and at a loss what ' to take. I have taken nothing but two ba-' fons of tea, and those after the operation of ' the medicine commenced. I am induced to believe the fever is the effect of the cold -however a fever I have .---- I shall take no ' calomel to-night; but in cafe the fever does ' not

* not leave me, I shall take to-morrow another * bottle of the falts, &c.'

As no further account was received during the few days I remained in the neighbourhood, it is prefumed that these complaints must have vanished.

CASE IV.

June 9th, 1790 .- G. H. a commissioned officer, about forty years of age, was also attacked with the Jungle Fever, at the fame place and period as the others, and with pretty nearly the fame fymptoms. Since that period he has never been in the enjoyment of perfect health. When he applied for affiftance, about the middle of last month, he complained principally of a very fevere gleet from the urethra, which he had had near a twelvemonth, and could not attribute to a venereal fource. His embonpoint had decreafed; his complexion was extremely fallow, with a peculiar muddiness of his eyes. When speaking, he appeared to have a degree of affected breathing, which is not eafily defcribed. He feemed to feel a conftant languor; and had been for fome time of a most indolent habit. The fecretion of bile had long been deficient. 3. . . .

deficient. He had formerly been intemperate in drink; and was occafionally fo at this period. On his application for affiftance, he had feveral other appearances of an affection of the liver, which were not noted down, and have efcaped recollection.—A' courfe of calomel with occafional laxatives was prefcribed for him; great reftrictions in diet were recommended; and an injection of a folution of opium, fugar of lead, and white vitriol was ordered for the gleet. The reftrictions in diet were not fcrupuloufly obeyed, nor was gentle yet frequent exercife ufed, as had been recommended.

10th. Note.—' I was very ill laft night with a violent pain in my bowels, and confrant inclination to go to the neceffary; made at leaft thirty trips there during the night, and never voiding any thing but a few drops of blood—I have been in much the fame frate all the morning, and do not feel myfelf getting any better.'

The folution of falts with emetic tartar was ordered to be taken, fo as to operate copioufly downwards; and his aliment to be entirely liquid.

Note, afternoon. — 'Since morning, till ' about half an hour ago, when the physic be-' gan to operate, just as I had finished the ' last

laft glafs in the bottle, I was nearly as bad
as I was during the night. I now feel
myfelf a good deal eafier. I have had three
motions from the medicine, and have paffed
an amazing quantity of bile and indigefted
food, fome of which I muft have eat about
a month ago.'

The folution is to be continued, at longer intervals.

11th. Note, afternoon. — ' I have been pretty well fince morning; no griping, or the leaft pain in my bowels all day; but I found myfelf uncommonly hot, without the leaft perfpiration, from ten o'clock till the medicine commenced its operation, two hours afterwards, when a moifture broke out and the heat went off. — The phyfic performed again to-day very well, and I paffed a quantity of bile; not fo extremely hot as it was yefterday. I hope I fhall be well enough to go out to-morrow.'

New Moon 12th.

14th. Note.—' I have taken, fince the 11th, two bottles more of the folution, and am happy to inform you that I am now free from complaint. The medicine operated very well both yefterday and today, but no appearance of putrid bile, or any thing improper. The gleet has not yet ' returned, returned, and, I am in great hopes, never
will. I live remarkably abstemious, and
walk out every morning.'

The gleet had ftopped for a fhort time during the use of the injection; but had returned after an excess in wine, and after the injection had been laid aside for some days. It has now disappeared again, without the aid of the injection. His diet is to be entirely farinaceous. His water has passed sometimes in a divided stream, and he has perceived a degree of obstruction in one part of the urethra.

15th. Note.- ' I have the pleafure to · acquaint you that I am much better to-· day than I was yesterday, and proba-· bly would have been with you this morn-· ing; but the folution you directed me to · continue will not admit of my moving · abroad. Two long glaffes full, which I took · in the night, have kept me a going all the · morning. It has carried off more fcalding · bile, with fome bloody and extremely flink-' ing ftuff; I am in hopes what remains in · the bottle will clear me of the whole, and · that I shall not have occasion for a further · fupply. My mouth is now pretty fore, ' and I fpit a good deal; though I have ' omitted the pills for fome days paft. My · other + water

other complaint has not made its appearance fince yefterday morning. I adhere to
the diet recommended by you, and will
begin to take exercife to-morrow; fo you
fee I am in a fair way of doing very well.' Firft Quarter 19th.—20th, Note. 'I
have not taken any medicine fince the 15th,
and nothing ails me now but the gleet,
which has returned; it is of a light yellowifh colour; and I ftill feel, after making
water, a pain in the paffage.'

July 2d. During the laft three days he has again ufed the former injection for the gleet. Should he be perfuaded to ufe bougies, the continuance of the injection may poffibly leffen their irritation, and tend to accelerate the cure. His diet has not been very ftrict lately.

3d. Evening. He has complained fince noon of much reftleffnefs, great heat and thirft; and has had ' for two days a fever in his ' inteftines,' which is now much encreafed. His pulfe is full, and not very quick; his tongue clean; his fkin hot and dry; his eyes fuffufed and dull.—He is directed to take every half hour a wine glafs full of a folution of four grains of emetic tartar in a bottle of water, into which a lime is to be fqueezed.

4th. Last Quarter. 10 o'clock, A. M. He has discharged by vomit much liquid mat-

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ter tinged with green. He fays this discharge immediately alleviated the heat and pain, or ' the fever in his intestines.' He has not as yet had a stool. He had a cold fit about nine o'clock laft night, which lafted an hour; he did not fweat much after it. His pulse is full, but quicker; his tongue not fo clean; his fkin rather too warm, but not very dry; his head very little affected with weight or pain .- The folution of emetic tartar is directed to be taken in fuch a manner as to promote the inteftinal difcharges during the day; two grains of calomel at night; and a large dose of castor-oil to-morrow morning. He had eat much more freely than ufual the day before this attack.

5th. Note, forenoon.—' The medicine has been operating upwards and downwards ever fince twelve o'clock yefterday. My fools are of a nafty blackifh colour, and came on, till this morning, with a violent griping pain juft about the kidneys—what I vomited was dark green bile—I had a very reftlefs night—no fever, but a troublefome head-ach. I find myfelf much better this morning, and the griping is almoft gone. I have taken the caftor-oil and pills, which have operated very well. ' I hope

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• I hope you will not order me any thing • more to day.'——He is directed to take the folution of emetic tartar in fuch quantities, till to-morrow morning, as may tend to operate freely by ftool and perfpiration.

6th. He took four grains of emetic tartar in the way prefcribed. He has had three bilious ftools to day, not very large. He fays at every ftool he has felt, fince the firft attack, fevere griping pains about the region of the kidneys, or the fmall of the back. His pulfe is extremely foft, flow and full; his tongue pretty clean; his fkin cool and moift, but greatly fuffufed with yellow. His eyes are alfo fuffufed.

7th. Note, fix o'clock A. M. — ' The carriage is not yet come, and I may not be able to go out to you to day—a very reftlefs night—now and then a doze, difturbed by a frightful dream. I had two ftools during the night, and one this morning, all attended with griping and ftraining, and went off very hot. My tongue appears dirty, but I have a far better colour than I had yefterday morning.'

Evening. He has had feveral hot, thin, and rather yellow ftools to day from fome folution of falts and emetic tartar, which he took this morning. The laft ftools have not E 2 griped

griped him. His skin is much clearer, his pulse, skin, tongue natural. His eyes are a little suffused. He took chicken broth for dinner.

8th. Morning. He flept without interruption from ten o'clock laft night to daybreak this morning. He has had feveral fmall, thin, yellow, hot ftools. His pulfe and fkin are natural. The fuffufion of the eyes is not quite gone. His appetite returns in a fmall degree. He has rode in his palkee (a litter) fix miles this morning; he fays he already feels himfelf better for the change of air. He has not ufed the injection fince the firft day of the fever; the difcharge however is fcarcely perceptible.

Evening. He has continued well the whole day; but this evening he feels a confiderable heat in the inteftines. He has had feveral flight, thin, yellow ftools during the day. He dined on chicken broth.

9th. Noon. He took caftor-oil this morning, and has had a copious evacuation of hot and yellowifh matters; thicker at firft, the laft thin, mixed with the caftor-oil and the milk which he took with it. He continues well. His tongue was a little whitifh when he rofe, but not at prefent. He had no reft laft night; but this is attributed to 4 the

the fand flies and muskitoes. His last stool was attended with griping.

10th. He is much better to day, perfectly free from all complaint, except when he rofe this morning a very trifling appearance of the difcharge from the urethra. His habitual pulfe is full, flow, and rather ftrong; it is the fame now.

11th. Note .- ' I had an undifturbed fleep from ten o'clock till break of day, when ' I awoke, and found myfelf quite light and · free from complaint-no difagreeable tafte f in my mouth-my tongue clean, and eyes ' perfectly clear. I have a ftrong pulfe, and f it beats much faster than I ever observed ' before; except in a fever, it never ex-· ceeded eighty; it now goes ninety. I · have no difagreeable heat in my bowels. I s had a ftool about fix o'clock, hard, bilious, · rather difficult in paffing, and not much ' of it-not the smallest speck of gleet dif-' coverable, I walked the hall of my houfe ' till I was tired, and then breakfasted with ' a good appetite-in fhort I feel myfelf in every refpect better than I have done for ' a length of time paft.'

12th. New Moon. 13th. He continues free from all complaint. There is E 3 not

not the least appearance of any discharge from the urethra.

15th. He took caftor-oil yefterday morning, which produced a large evacuation of bilious fordes; but he was free from all complaint; nor has the running appeared as yet in the fmalleft degree: this will not probably be the cafe long, as he has not refolution to refrain from an improper quantity of food.

During my further refidence of twelve days in the neighbourhood, no more complaints of indifpofition were received.

CASE. V.

I. K. a commiffioned officer, aged thirtyfive, at the beginning of June, 1788, was feized with a fever about fifteen days after his arrival at Chitterpoor. It commenced with a regular cold fit, which terminated in a warm profuse fweat. The fymptoms were, great heat, thirst, heavines over the eyes, pain in the head, and inclination to vomit. These fymptoms continued in a finaller degree, after the fweat, for about five days during the intervals; and he had a regular paroxism every fecond day. During this time, as well as through

through the whole course of the fever, he was frequently feized with fpontaneous vomiting, and threw up much bile. During the first attacks he took a vomit, and the bark occasionally afterwards in the course of the fever. He was extremely languid; fcarcely able to ftir; the head-ach continued. At the end of about fix days he was a little better, and relapfed again about five days afterwards. During this fecond attack he thinks he must have been delirious; he proceeded in his palkee (a litter) from Chitterpoor to Chittra, about eighty miles. During this journey by dauk(post) he frequently dipped his head in any water he happened to meet on the road. He thought he experienced fome temporary eafe from this. He drank very large quantities of water. At Chittra he was worfe, and became decidedly delirious. His ftomach now rejected every thing. He was once more a little better, and again became worfe. He thinks these relapses may have been about the lunar periods. He was generally more inclined to vomit when he lay on one fide than on the other; he thinks the right fide. He had frequent effervescent draughts, which he thinks must have contained fome purgative, as he had generally three or four calls to ftool; thefe E 4 were

were not copious. Before the laft relapfe at Chittra, he had been fo well as to ride out on horfe-back. Whenever the fever feemed to abate a little, and even when it was nearly in its vigour, the bark was given to him in confiderable quantities.

He left Chittra pretty well, but relapfed again at Sheerghauttee, about forty miles from Chittra. Chrittra is at the top of the hills, and Sheerghauttee at the foot of them. He was now again delirious, and extremely weakened; the pains in his back continued, though flight. He returned to Chittra tolerably well, and again relapfed. During this time he had continued to take the abovementioned draughts, and the bark. Dr. was with him at Sheerghauttee. During his firft attack, he had taken by the advice of a brother officer, a glafs-full of fulphur and rum; which he thinks did him much differvice.

He again got pretty well at Chittra, and proceeded to Gyah about the end of August. During the two ensuing months he continued subject to frequent but slight returns of fever about the lunar periods. He took a little bark occasionally, one vomit, and elixir of vitriol often, as well as some columba root. Gyah is at a greater distance from the former hills;

hills; though there are fome in the neighbourhood, which is well cultivated. There are however many rice-fields. He fays, he was not coffive during this period. In the days of the intervals of the paroxifms he used to mount his horse, and follow the hounds. About the end of November and December, he had recovered a confiderable share of health and strength. Shortly after his arrival at Patna, about the beginning of January, he was feized with most violent pains in his bones, particularly in his legs and thighs. In the day time he was pretty free from them; but they were excruciating during the night, particularly as he grew warm in bed. With thefe he had fome feverish fymptoms.

The caftor-oil was rubbed warm on his limbs, which were then covered with the leaves of that plant, and fecured by warm cloths. From thefe applications he fays he experienced great eafe, generally during the whole courfe of the night; during this time he took about twenty, he fuppofes, mercurial pills. His mouth was not affected, nor does he think he experienced any benefit from the pills. He was much reduced; and without appetite. From the very beginning his diet, when he could take any thing, was was chiefly broth ; and once he fancied and ate boiled duck and onions.

He continued in this condition until he had proceeded about three days on his march to Chunarghur; before his arrival at this place he was perfectly reftored to health. He had all this time continued to take the bark in confiderable quantities. He arrived at Chunar about the middle of February, 1789. At the commencement of the preceding hot weather he was much afflicted with biles; and was once confiderably feverifh. Since that period he has acquired much embonpoint, and has enjoyed excellent health to this day.

July 5th, 1790.

CASE VI.

L. M. A commiffioned officer, about thirty years of age, of a robuft habit of body, but naturally of a fallow complexion, was alfo afflicted with the jungle fever in the Ramghur diftrict, about the fame time as the other officers, and with nearly the fame fymptoms. The fever continued very obftinate for a length of time; and although he recovered fome fhare of health afterwards, yet he remained

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mained subject to frequent relapses, particularly about the lunar periods. About a twelvemonth ago he experienced a very violent relapfe into the fever, complicated with the most severe symptoms of an affected liver. He took great quantities of the ufual medicines for the fever without fuccefs. Occafionally, indeed, he got confiderably better, but at those times he used fo little caution with refpect to diet, that he always relapfed very foon. He was at last reduced to fuch extremity of difeafe, emaciation, and debility, that his recovery was deemed utterly impoffible. During this period, dyfenteric fymptoms were, I believe, the most prevalent. Nature however again reftored him to fome degree of strength. He immediately underwent a course of mercury; and is now in the enjoyment of health, and a confiderable share of embonpoint. He is still however fubject to confiderable irregularity in the fecretions of the bowels, especially at the periods of the moon. This indeed may be attributed chiefly to his diet, which is at no time under any restraint. He sometimes feels an agueish tendency, fometimes a flight difpofition to dyfentery, and often experiences a yellow fuffufion over his skin and eyes. On these occafions he takes fome purgative medicines, and remains

remains free from complaint. He has been fubject to the piles fince the attack of the fever in the Ramghur diffrict.

July 15th, 1790.

CASE VII.

July 15th. N. O. a non-commissioned officer, about thirty years of age, of a full robust habit of body, and a florid complexion, was alfo feized with a very fevere attack of the fever at Chitterpoor, characterized by nearly fimilar fymptoms as the others. He has had frequent returns of it fince he left Chitterpoor; which, he is very fure, have been at the lunar periods. In reality all the gentlemen who have been aflicted with fimilar returns of the fever contracted at Chitterpoor, are perfectly convinced that its recurrence has always been at one or other of the lunar periods. In the intervals, however, he appears to enjoy health, ftrength, and embonpoint. He has been for fome days afflicted with a fevere return of the fever. He is directed to take two grains of calomel at night, and two ounces of caftor-oil in the morning, and to obferve the ftricteft low diet.

16th, Note. Noon.—' I find myself 'much


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much better to day than I was laft night
when you faw me. The ague has not
troubled me to day, and the fever feems to
have left me fince about twelve o'clock
laft night. I have had feven ftools fince I
took the caftor-oil.'

First Quarter, 19th. - 20th, Note. ' I am free from the fever at prefent, and from every other complaint, except weaknefs. I had another return of the fever on the 16th, and I took the medicines preferibed by you (folution of falt, and emetic tartar) and found benefit from them; I repeated them three days, but I shall take no more unlefs you should order me to continue them.'

As no further account was received during the remainder of my refidence (about feven days) in the neighbourhood, it is prefumed the fever did not return.



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INTRODUCTION.

N board the Houghton, which lay off the Broken Ground in the river Ganges, on the 24th of August, about forty men were ill of fevers of various types; but all the cafes were more or lefs accompanied by the debility, which is fuppofed characteristic of the Ship Fever. A great foulnefs of the tongue was also pretty general. The fick were very dirty in their clothes and perfons. We had fuppofed, that these diforders would disappear rapidly on our departure from the Broken Ground; but in this expectation we were much difappointed, although the deck was frequently washed, and the beams and planks alfo washed with warm vinegar. The weather was extremely favourable, and the ventilation between decks better than could have been expected. There was, however, a fenfible alteration for the better, both in the number and violence of the fevers; but it was more gradual than we had hoped. The ship's complement was at this time too fmall to allow of many attend-F ants

ants on the fick. The furgeon's fervant was a perfon who had never acted in that capacity before. The furgeon's mate had been long ill of a fever, and could not of courfe yield his affiftance. The furgeon was then, and had been long before, haraffed with a fever, and the liver complaint. He could not, of courfe, give the fick all the minute attention during the day, that was abfolutely requifite; the account of the fymptoms therefore is very defective at this period. The fick had no other fixed diet than rice, except their falt beef; but this and their drams, at the furgeon's infligation, were ordered to be ftopped. To those, who seemed most reduced, an allowance of fugar, wine, and fago was ferved out for fome days before our arrival at Madras; but few of them, it is believed, had the means of getting this mefs properly cooked, as they had no other attendants than their mefs-mates, who did not afford them much affiftance. Pains of any kind were not a frequent fymptom of these fevers. The head indeed was much affected, but most frequently with weight and giddinefs; the latter feemed most general. Sicknefs and fpontaneous vomiting were not uncommon. Bilious discharges both ways were very ufual, although few had their eyes OF

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a fense of dryness and stiffness down the

or fkin at all fuffufed with bile. Cold clammy fweats were frequent. The tongue was generally moift, though very foul; in fome inftances however very black, dry and ftiff, with

throat and œfophagus. Great giddinefs, tremors, and fenfe of weaknefs, were the most common fymptoms. As these appeared to fucceed the operation of fome purgatives, which were exhibited at first, recourse was afterwards had to the common practice of giving the bark in large quantities, generally with opium. We had no powder of bark, and were obliged to use the decoction only, which was not probably always of the first strength. Whether it was owing to the weak preparation of the bark, or to the bark itfelf, may be doutful; but the bark and opium did not appear on the whole to have been of much fervice. If ever the bark proved ferviceable in fevers, this was the occafion that feemed to demand its use in the most powerful form. Could the effect of the medicines have been properly watched, could the diet and every other circumstance respecting the patient have been exactly regulated, a further reliance would certainly have been placed on the purgative system, which had been found F2 invariably

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invariably fuccessful during former practice in India; but in a fituation, which wasentirely new, the refponfibility of a peculiar mode of treatment was too great. The bark had certainly not the fairest possible trial; but the opium, which has by fome people been extolled fo much, was exhibited in vain in very confiderable quantities. It is a queftion, indeed, whether any mode of treatment could have proved fuccefsful when there was room to fuspect, that on the flighteft exemption from the worft fymptoms of the fever, the fick indulged in falt provisions and drams, notwithstanding every prohibition. What has been faid above relates to the fick before our arrival at Madras, where we left them all, except two or three fevers. Thefe, and all the other fevers which occurred during the reft of the passage, yielded to the purgative fystem.

However deficient the following columns may juftly be deemed in the article of fymptoms, yet it is hoped they will exhibit an outline of the effects of certain medicines in Ship Fever, not altogether ufelefs to the practitioner in warm climates. The laft column exhibits the fymptoms of each cafe on the day on which the patients were fent to the hofpital at Madras; but it may ferve equally

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to give a pretty diffinct idea of the whole courfe of the fever in each inftance; for the fymptoms were, with little variation, except in their degree of violence, the fame during the greater part of the voyage from Bengal to Madras. It was deemed fully fufficient for every ufeful purpofe to annex a table of the latitudes and longitudes, and of one month only of the thermometer. The lunar periods are added as in the SE-LECT EVIDENCES.

In all the cafes, which occurred after our departure from Madras, the patients muft be underftood to have been confined to low diet, unlefs where any other is fpecified; to have done fome duty by day during the whole courfe of indifpofition, except under the immediate preffure of a paroxifm, at which period only confinement to a hammock was allowed; and to have in general remained on deck in the open air at other times, if the weather did not interfere to prevent them.

The cafes ftand in the exact form in which they were daily taken down, during the vifitation of the fick.

On the departure of the Houghton from Madras one or two only of those who had been fent to the hospital were deemed capa-

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ble of returning on board, and profecuting the voyage.

On a new fupply of medicines at Madras, new forms of medicines were deemed proper, and are accordingly annexed, as well as a diet for the fick, in lieu of their drams and falt beef.



DIET for the SICK, or LOW DIET.

For breakfast and supper.

One pint of thick gruel, with two ounces of wine and one ounce of fugar.

For Dinner.

One pint of panada, made of pounded bifcuit, with two ounces of wine and one of fugar.

In particular inftances, fago was fubftituted in lieu of panada.

Befides this diet, they received every article of the fhip's allowance, except liquor and falt provifion; by which means they were always enabled to provide themfelves with rice-water, and fome fmall variety of diet. Wine was allowed feparately, whenever it was deemed neceffary, in any quantity. The moft ufual was port wine; but Madeira was alfo frequently prefcribed, and even hock occafionally.

FORMS OF MEDICINES.

Nº I. An emetic:

Three grains of tartar emetic to be diffolved in half a pint of water. One fpoonful to be taken every ten minutes, until it operate well by vomit.

Nº 2. Solution of tartar emetic.

Two grains of tartar emetic in one pint of water. Two fpoonfuls to be taken every hour; or lefs if it vomit.

Nº 3. Mixture of tartar emetic and opium.

Two grains of tartar emetic and two of opium, in one pint of water. Two fpoonfuls to be taken every hour.

Nº 4. Draught of tartar emetic and opium.

One grain of tartar emetic, and one and a half of opium, in four ounces of water. To be taken at once.

N° 5. Purging mixture.

One ounce and a half of falts, and two grains of tartar emetic, in two pints of water. Two ounces to be taken every hour, until it operate well downwards.

N° 6. A purging draught. One ounce of falts in eight ounces of water. To be taken at once.

Nº 7. A purging pill.

Two grains of calomel and three of refin of jalap, or three of fcammony: to be made into a pill with foap, honey, or fyrup.

One ounce of Peruvian bark in powder, to be mixed with eighteen ounces of clear water, boiled in an open veffel for ten minutes; and ftrained while hot. One glafsfull to be taken every hour.

Nº 9. Caftor-oil.

One ounce and a half of caftor-oil beat up with two or three ounces of fome mucilage or water.

N° 10. Mercurial pill.

Nº 11. Powder of bark.

One ounce of red bark to be mixed in a pint of water, and taken during an intermiffion, or otherwife.

CASE I. P. 2.

Full Moon 23d. 1790. October 27th. 9 A. M.

H is fifteen years of age. He complains of pain over the eyes and in the back part of his head. He was hot this morning, without any fenfe of previous cold. He complains of thirst, and seems to tremble more than usual from the cold. His pulse is 148; tongue rather discoloured; skin dry, and urine clear.—N° I to be taken immediately.

28th. 9 A. M. He vomited fome green and bitter matters. He has not had a ftool. The head-ach has left him; but he was giddy when he rofe this morning. His pulfe is about 120; tongue quite clean; his fkin rather too warm.——One pint of N° 5 to be taken during the courfe of the day.

29th. Noon. N° 5 did not operate yefterday; but he had one large ftool this morning. His head-ach has entirely vanished, and he thinks he is almost well. His pulse is about 98, and more full; his tongue and skin nearly natural. His wrine to-day is ' clear like water'; it was rather yellow yesterday.

-----Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and N° 6 in two dofes to-morrow.

31st. 9 A. M. Last quarter. The medicines he took last operated copiously. He fays he has been perfectly well these two days; yet his pulse is 102.

November 16th. He remained free from complaint till this morning, when he fell with his left fide on the edge of a hencoop. His breathing begins to be affected; and he has a confiderable degree of feyer.— Let him lofe eight ounces of blood. N° 6 to be taken immediately.

17th. 9 A. M. He had two ftools from N° 6. The feverifhnefs still continues in the fame degree. He complained much of pain over the abdomen yesterday. His fide and pains, are better to-day. About fix ounces of blood were taken from him yesterday.——N° 5 to be taken to-day.

18th. 9 A. M. He is much better, and has had four thin purging ftools. He ftill feels fome degree of griping pain fhooting acrofs the abdomen, from the part bruifed in the left fide to the right; particularly on eating or drinking: he did not feel this before the fall. He alfo perceives fome pain in that part when he coughs or fneezes. There is no difcoloration in the part. His pulfe is 104, and pretty full; his tongue and fkin quite

quite natural.——A third part of N° 5, which remains, to be taken to-day.

19th. 10 A.M. The medicine has operated copioufly. He ftill feels the pain on drawing breath. His pulfe is 120, full, and has a fmart ftroke; his fkin and tongue pretty natural. He has his natural appetite. — A fmall blifter to be applied over the part most pained. N° 5 to be repeated.

20th. He has had copious ftools. He fcarcely perceives any degree of pain. The blifter rofe well. His pulfe is 116, and rather fmart; his tongue pretty natural; his fkin quite cool; his urine watery. The difcharge from the blifter was yellow.

21ft. Noon. Full Moon. His pulfe is 136, and he has conftant thirft; but he is not fenfible of any other fymptom of fever. The pain has decreafed. — N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

From this period he remained free from complaint to the end of the voyage.

CASE II. R.S.

1790. October 23d. Full Moon. His pulfe is 102; his fkin rather hot, and conftantly of a yellow tinge; though his eyes are not much fuffufed. The heat is probably K 4 pretty pretty habitual. His urine is fometimes of a very high colour, and fometime pale and clear; his tongue is natural. He has complained of catarrhal fymptoms thefe two days.—_N° 5 to be taken till it begins to operate; and one pill of N° 7 every night.

24th. 9 A. M. He took three glaffes of N° 5, which procured large yellow ftools this morning. His pulfe is fmall, and 136; his fkin dry. He has fome pain in the head. His tongue is not quite clear. N° 5 to be continued.

25th. 9 A. M. He was very cool yesterday afternoon; and his pulse was not very quick, though fmall; it is now 114, and rather more full; his fkin cool and foft; his tongue discoloured in the middle, and red round the edges. The catarrhal fymptoms have decreafed. He has had five yellow and brown ftools; the one this morning rather thicker and browner. He flept well laft night, which he had not been able to do for fome time paft. He is not fenfible at any time, that he has any perfpiration, except on his hands and face, and on those only when he is warm in bed. He took four glaffes of Nº 5 yesterday, about eight ounces. --- Nº 5 to be continued, fo as to procure three or four ftools daily, and the pill at night.

26th,

26th. He was very hot yesterday evening. He had a pain over the eyes in the morning, but in the evening it fixed in the back part of his head; and has now left him. A most profuse warm sweat took place last night. He had not perfpired for a week before, in any perceptible degree. He coughed much this morning. He took four glaffes of N° 5 yesterday, and had two stools, one yellow, one green; and three to-day, yellow and of a moderate confiftence. His skin is perfectly cool and foft this morning; his pulfe 108, with fome fmartnefs in the ftroke; his tongue difcoloured in the middle, and red round the edges. His mouth and fauces are fometimes dry. He has much bitter tafte in his mouth every morning, which vanishes fome hours after; and a peculiar tafte alfo on coughing, the nature of which he cannot defcribe, but fays 'it is like bad breath.' His urine is clear. ----- His medicines to be continued.

27th. 9 A. M. He fays, 'a chillinefs' and pain in his head ufed to come on every fecond morning; but that he has efcaped them this morning; as well as the bad tafte in his mouth. He had a gentle perfpiration all night, and a very profufe general fweat fince four o'clock, at which hour he had a ftool. He fweats most in the back part of the neck, neck. He fleeps better every fecond night, and on waking on the bad night, he feels a particular heavinefs of his eyes. He has had about nine ftools, at first brown, afterwards a light yellow, and of a proper confistence. His tongue is the fame; his skin not quite cool; his pulse to4, full and rather smart.— His medicines to be continued.

28th. 9 A. M. His pulfe is 80, and of a pretty natural ftrength, but rather fmart; his fkin quite cool and foft; his tongue much lefs foul. He has had five ftools, the laft this morning 'almost the colour of coffee.' He did not fweat as much as ufual laft night, and was griped.——His medicines to be continued.

29th. His pulfe is 72, and pretty full; it was quicker this morning early; but he had been walking pretty faft on deck, as he is directed to do every morning and evening. His tongue has not yet recovered the florid red in the middle; but it is much clearer; his fkin natural at prefent, though rather hot in the morning; his complexion clearer; his urine yellow, but not muddy. He has had fix very dark brown and pretty thick ftools. He has ftill gentle perfpiration at night, but not profufe as before.——His medicines to be continued.

30th.

30th. His pulfe is 92, and his fkin warmer; but he has juft eat his breakfaft, and had been near a large fire in the galley for fome time. His tongue is the fame. He has had five ftools of the fame kind as the former. He flept very well.——His medicines to be continued.

31ft. 9 A. M. Laft Quarter. His pulfe is 88, and a little fmart, as it frequently is; the middle of his tongue not yet of its natural colour. His fkin is warm and dry. He has had four dark brown ftools; this morning a very copious one. He took four glaffes of N° 5. He had natural perfpiration at night. He is not fenfible that he has more heat at one period of the day than at another. He had a confiderable degree of pain in his foot and ankle laft night, which afterwards left him. For fome days paft he feems to have been completely free from every feverifh fymptom.——His medicines to be continued.

November 1st. 9 A. M. His pulfe is 108. He has walked much on deck this morning, and pulled at the ropes; in other refpects he is well. His urine 'is clear like water.' His mouth is not in the least affected by the mercurial. — His medicines to be continued.

On my first arrival on board the Houghton, Mr.

Mr. R. S. was much reduced by a fever, which never left him entirely, at any period of the twenty-four hours; but decreafed for long intervals, and returned with irregular exacerbations. His cafe at this time, about the end of August, was rather alarming. Since our departure from Madras, he appears to have been afflicted with various degrees of fever at various times; perhaps he was very feldom entirely free from it. During this period however, it is probable, he indulged in the common diet of the mess with freedom.

3d. 9 A. M. He has had fix ftools, two of them yellow pure bile, the reft glareous and rather white. He vomited his breakfaft yefterday, but nothing elfe. He took a dofe of caftor-oil this morning. His pulfe was much accelerated in the morning; it is now 104, and rather hard; his fkin cool. His tongue has fomewhat more of the brown tinge. — His medicines to be continued. —Afternoon. His pulfe is 140; his fkin dry and too warm.

4th. 9 A. M. His pulfe was very quick early this morning, and is now 120, and fmart. He has had a bitter tafte in his mouth all the morning. He has had fome naufea for two or three days. His fkin is pretty

pretty cool. He has had two yellow thin ftools. He took fix glaffes of N° 5.——N° I to be taken in three dofes, and the other medicines continued after its operation.

6th. New Moon. The day before yefterday he had a regularly formed, though flight paroxyfm of ague. His pulfe is pretty natural this morning, as well as his fkin. He took eight glaffes of N° 5 yefterday, which has given him only one ftool this morning. ——His medicines to be continued.

7th. 4 P. M. His pulfe did not appear much accelerated in the forenoon; it is now 92. The brown difcoloration in the middle of his tongue ftill continues. His fkin is cool. He has had three ' deep brown ftools' to-day. He is not fenfible that he has had any feverifh fymptoms fince the day on which he took the emetic; he fays he feels himfelf ' much better and brifker' to-day. His gums are very tender at the back part of the mouth.—. The pill to be difcontinued, and N° 5 taken as ufual.

8th. 9 A. M. He has had about three ftools of the confistence of 'bergoo.' His pulse is about 92, and smarter than yesterday; his skin

fkin natural; his tongue, in the middle, of a brownifh red, and, as ufual, more florid round the edges; his urine rather yellow; his fkin moift at night. He is not fenfible of any fymptom whatever of indifpofition. ----N° 5 to be aft, tinued.

9th. 9 A. rture file has had three thicker ftools, His fkin and pulfe are perfectly natural; but the difcoloration of his tongue remains, and is the only fymptom he has of any indifposition whatever. His gums are not fore now.——N° 5 to be continued.

13th. 11 A. M. First Quarter. He had a regular paroxyfm of ague yesterday, terminating in long and profuse fweat. He had indulged his appetite to its fullest extent, but not with animal food. His pulse is 96, and a little smart. A pale discoloration still remains in the middle of the tongue. His skin is natural. His body open. He has no thirst or head-ach.—N° 5 to be taken fo as to procure three or four stools.

14th. He has had five dark-brown and yellow stools. He is not fensible of any symptoms of fever, but his skin is too warm; his pulse 120, and smart; his tongue as usual. He looked very pale and indisposed yesterday evening on deck; and after walking, he selt much heat in his hands and

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and face. He has a general fweat every night. N° 5 to be continued.

15th. He was threatened with a return of the paroxyfm yefterday, about the fame period as the former, but it did not come on. He went to bed and covered himfelf well with cloaths. He has had five brown, pretty thick, and a little yellow ftools. He fweated profufely this morning in bed. His pulfe is 104, pretty full, and fmart; his fkin very cool; his tongue much the fame as ufual; his urine ' like water.' N° 5 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 at night.

16th. He took the whole of N° 5 yefterday, and was much purged all night. He has not had, to his own perception, any fymptom whatever of fever. His pulfe is 96, rather full and fmart; his fkin perfectly cool; his tongue as ufual.— The pills and one pint of N° 5 to be repeated.

17th. 9 A. M. His hands are generally hot at meals. His pulfe is 88, more full and ftrong than has been perceived before; his fkin cool, and clearer than for fome days paft; his tongue pretty natural, but ftill the middle is not of fuch a florid red as the edges. He has had about fix ftools of the ufual

ufual kind.——His medicines to be difcontinued.

18th. 9 A. M. His pulfe is about 90, and pretty full; his fkin natural, and his tongue rather lefs difcolored. He has had four ftools, the fame as ufual. He has generally much wind in his .bowels; and, during the whole courfe of his complaints, he has felt the heat in his hands at meal-times.

19th. 10 A. M. He has had very large difcharges downwards. His fkin and tongue are as ufual; his pulfe 104, and foft. —— N° 5 to be taken to-morrow.

20th. His pulse is 104, pretty full and fmart. The first glass of N° 5 operated about forty-five minutes after it was taken. The discoloration of the tongue is less. He has not had the sense of heat in his hands these two days. He is not sensible of any feverishness, but his countenance would seem to indicate its existence. His urine is ε like water.

He went on fhore in the evening at St. Helena, where he continued without any return of fever. He returned on board about

about the 29th, free from fever, and continued to do his duty without complaint during the reft of the passage, except for two days, when he felt fymptoms of ague.

CASE III.

JOHN GATTY, Quartermaster.

November 18th. 9 A. M. He is a ftout man, of a full habit, and about forty years of age. Yefterday morning he was feized with a paroxifm of ague, which has recurred at the fame hour this morning. N° 5 to be taken immediately.

19th. 10 A. M. N° 5 excited much naufea, and evacuated during the whole day and night, as well as this morning, great quantities of very green, scalding, yellow fetid matters. He had not the least recurrence of the shivering this morning; and he is freer from feverish heat than at any period fince yesterday's paroxism. His urine is 'yellowish and of a reddish colour.' For feveral days before the regular paroxifm, he had occafional head-achs, dimnefs of fight ' like a scum over his eyes,' sickness at stomach, and inappetency. Once he vomited fpontaneoufly green and yellow L matters.

matters. He has fome head-ach now, but no other pain whatever. His fkin is dry, but not hot; his pulfe 128, and confined; his tongue pretty natural, with a flight ftreak of brown on one fide. There is not much appearance of yellow fuffufion in his fkin or eyes. He has no appetite. He refted pretty well towards morning, when the fever began to leave him. His head-ach was intolerable when the fever firft attacked him.—N° I to be taken at fun-fet, three pills of N° 7 at bed-time; and N° 6 in the morning before day-break.—4 P. M. His pulfe is 136, and confined.

20th. The fever recurred about 8 P. M. yesterday, without any sense of cold, or any perspiration. He seems, from his own and his meffmates account, to have been delirious, and to have raved all night. His head " is light and dizzy, but not fo fore" as yefterday morning. Not one of the medicines prefcribed yesterday feems to have operated as yet, though he has had one fmall ftool this morning. He fays they feem to be ' working him much now, while he is ftanding.' His pulse is 116, full, and pretty'strong; his skin quite cool; his tongue cineritious towards the root only. His eyes appear to have a degree of yellow fuffusion. He fays, he has no

no pains any where .--- N° 5 to be taken in larger doses to-day.

21st. Noon. Full Moon. He had a flight feverish heat yesterday, but no other recurrence of the paroxism. His skin and tongue natural; his pulse 100. He ' flept eafy and well' last night. The medicines have had copious effects, and still continue to operate. What he paffes now is ' pretty clear.'

22d. Discharged.

His name does not recur on the fick lift during the remainder of the voyage.

CASE IV.

PAYNE, Caulker.

November 20th, 1790. He is of a full florid, robuft appearance, and of thirty years of age. Yesterday he was feized with a most violent paroxism of fever. He fell out of his cot during the violence of the hot ftage, and was not fenfible that he had done fo. A profuse fweat followed, which relieved him. He encouraged this by very warm clothing, which he perceived promoted it much. He took double dofes of N° 5, and is quite well, at work, to-day. Intoxication had no share in his symp-L 2

toms.

toms. He is a very fober man. Full Moon 25th.

He continued free from complaint during the reft of the voyage.

CASE V.

JOHN OVEL.

January 9th, 1791. He has had a fevere paroxism of ague.——N° 1 to be taken immediately.

10th. He difcharged by vomit and ftool much bilious fordes.

He returned to his duty on the 10th; and continued free from complaint.

SHIP-

SHIP FEVER,

Complicated with CATARRHAL SYMPTOMS.

CASE I.

OLIVER WILSON, Seaman.

First Quarter 15th.

September 16th. Morning.

H E was feized with a fit of ague on the 14th. He had long been afflicted with an obftinate head-ach. The paroxifm returned laft night. He took the folution of falts with emetic tartar yefterday, and has difcharged upwards and downwards much green and yellow matters. He has had very fevere pains in his ankle and knees for eight days. This morning he has a cineritious fur on his tongue. His fkin is cool and foft and his pulfe rather full, but not very quick. He had had the fever before in Calcutta.— N° 5 to be continued ; and fago with a little wine in it to be allowed for diet.

Evening. He fays he is weaker, and has L 3 not

not had any fago as yet. The medicine has produced three yellow and hot ftools. His tongue, pulfe, and fkin are the fame.— N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning early.

17th. Morning, He is twenty three years of age, and of a florid complexion. His habit of body is robuft. He has not had any return of the fever. His pulfe and skin are perfectly natural, but his tongue is the same. He has had four stools fince yesterday evening. His head is better, and he slept pretty well last night. — N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening, He has not had any return of the fever. He fays he is very well now. He has had two ftools fince the morning. The pains have all vanished except in one ancle. His head is well; his tongue much cleaner; his pulse and skin natural. --3 pills of N° 7 to be taken to night, and N° 6 in the morning.

18th. He vomitted much green, and purged much yellow matters. He is free from complaint; yet his tongue is a little whitifh. He does his duty to-day. The fago is countermanded, and beef foup allowed. - N° 7 and N° 6 to be repeated as before. - Difcharged. Full

Full moon 23d. 24th. Evening. He now complains of pains in all his limbs, fingers, right fide of his cheft, &c. He is not fenfible that he has had any return of fever fince he was cured. His tongue is white, and his fkin and pulse natural.——Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 6 in the morning.

25th. Morning. Since last night he has had a pain in the head, and a very fevere cough. His tongue is not very pale; his skin is natural; his pulse a little quick. N° 2 to be taken in the usual manner. Let him lose twelve ounces of blood.

Evening. The bleeding has not taken place as yet. His breathing is more difficult, and he feels much pain on coughing; his fkin is rather dry and hot; his pulfe fomewhat accelerated; and his tongue has fome degree of white fur. The folution excited naufea; and he has had five or fix frothy, yellow, and hot ftools. -- N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 6 in the morning. Low diet to be continued.

26th, Morning, About fourteen ounces of blood were taken from his arm yesterday. He did not take the pills; yet he had a great number of yellow stools during the night, with griping. His breathing is much better, and L 4 his

his pains fomewhat abated; his pulfe is full and rather frequent; his tongue the fame; and his fkin warm and moift. He fays the head-ach left him after the bleeding. — N° 6 to be taken immediately, as prefcribed before, and, after an interval of two hours, N° 2 during the courfe of the day.

Evening. He has no pains whatever now, except in a flight degree 'juft over the heart.' He has been much purged all day. His ftools have been yellow and thin. His pulfe is rather full and quick; his fkin nearly natural; and his tongue clearer.—N° 2 to be continued.

27th. Evening. He fays all his pains are gone, except one which paffes over the ftomach from the right to the left fide, where it is most felt. He 'feels it heavy' when he breathes. He has had many yellow stools fince last visit. His pulse is full and strong; his tongue clearer; and his skin moss and warm. — Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 9 in the morning.

28th. Morning. He fays he feels well in every refpect, except the pain acrofs his breaft; which affects him 'terribly' when he moves or draws breath. His fkin is natural; his pulfe pretty full and fomewhat frequent; and his tongue the fame. He had two

two ftools laft night. — N° 2 with an additional grain of emetic tartar, to be taken during the day.

Evening. He has had five yellow thin ftools fince the morning. His urine is of a high colour, he fays, yellow. The pain in his breaft remains; but he is well in other refpects. His fkin is cool; his pulfe rather full, frequent, and fomewhat ftrong; and his tongue a little whiter than natural. — A bliftering plaifter to be applied over the part moft pained; and N° 7 to be taken at bed-time.

29th. Evening. He has experienced very little relief from the blifter. His tongue is rather white and foul; his fkin cool; his pulfe a little ftrong, and rather frequent. He ftill fays his urine is yellow. —— Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and an ounce of Glauber falt diffolved in a draught of falt water in the morning.

30th. Morning. The pain is better.

Evening. The pain is ftill better, He now feels it only under the lower edge of the laft falfe rib, on the left fide; it is most fensible when he bends forward. He has passed much brown matters by stool,—One pill of N° 7 to be taken at bed time.

October 1st. Morning. Last Quarter. The pain

pain has vanished; but he has coughed much all night. He complains of great foreness of the throat and trachea; and his cough forces up 'a little blood from his throat.' —Two grains of emetic tartar, and twenty of ipecacuan to be mixed in half a pint or less of water, and a spoonful taken every fifteen minutes, until it shall have operated well by vomit.

Afternoon. He has vomited fome green matters, and has lefs cough. His pulfe is quick and rather full; his fkin natural; his tongue rather foul and white.——N° 4 to be taken at bed-time.

2d. Morning. He is better to day. His cough was much lefs troublefome laft night.
— N° 2 to be taken during the day, and N° 4 at bed-time.

3d. Evening. He fweated much after the draught laft night, and fays he is quite well to-day.——Difcharged.

New Moon 8th. 14th. For fix days he has had violent pains in his back, and in 'all his bones,' without complaining. His pulfe is full, frequent, and pretty ftrong; his fkin rather dry, and his tongue whitifh. He has perfpired much every night, which has eafed his pains a little.——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

15th.

15th. Afternoon. First Quarter. He has had about feven blackish stools. His urine is 'yellow.' The pains are not better.—— Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 5 again in the morning. Low diet only to be allowed.

He recovered after he had taken these medicines, and was not entered on the fick list during the remainder of the voyage, but was, on the contrary, remarkable for affiduity in the discharge of his duty.

CASE II.

JOSEPH STRUT, Seaman,

1790. First Quarter 15th.

October 18th, Morning. He is thirtyfive years of age. He was feized four days ago with the following fymptoms, which ftill continue; ' light head,' giddinefs, great pain in the head, ' diffinefs' of fight, fometimes a little ficknefs at ftomach, pain in the cheft, coughing up of phlegm, impaired appetite, increase of thirft, and pains in his fhoulders and knees. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue appear natural. He is not coffive, His urine is very red,——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

Afternoon,

Afternoon. He vomited, first green and then yellow, and had five large thin stools. — Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and N° 5 in the morning,

19th. Morning. His head is much better, as well as all his other fymptoms. His cough, however, is ftill fevere, and brings up much phlegm. He has no pain in the cheft, or in breathing, at prefent. He did not fweat.

20th. He complains much this morning of violent pain in the breaft and head. He had four ftools yefterday. His pulfe is 90, -----N° I to be taken to-day.

21ft. Forenoon. He is better this morning in every refpect. He did not vomit, but had two loofe ftools. His pulfe is 96, of the natural ftrength; and his fkin and tongue natural.— N° I to be taken in two dofes, N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

22d. 9 A. M. He vomited phlegm, and much green, yellow, 'nafty ftuff' yefterday, and had two thin and yellow ftools. He has had two thin ftools this morning. His tongue appears a little brown about the root only. His pulfe is about 94, and rather fmall and weak. His urine is quite yellow. His cough is not better, and he attributes the affection of his head to its feverity. The pain

pain in the head, however, and other fymptoms are much better. —— Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. His pulfe is about 96, and pretty ftrong; his tongue clear, and his fkin natural. His head is much better as well as his appetite. The increase of thirst has entirely vanished. Some cough still remains. He has had two loose yellow ftools this morning. — What remains of N° 5 to be taken to-day, four pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

24th. He fays he is quite well, and requests to be dismissed.—Discharged.

His name does not appear on the fick lift after this period.

CASE III.

JACOB WILKINS, Seaman.

1790. First Quarter 15th.

October 18th. Morning. He is thirty years of age, large in stature, of a very fair complexion, and robust habit of body. He was feized last night with a violent pain in the head, and ' in all his bones.' He has also had a cough, and pain in his cheft for fome

fome days. His urine is red. He is not coffive; and his pulfe, fkin, and tongue are pretty natural. --- N° 5 to be taken immediately.

Afternoon. He vomited much " green " gall," and purged off much flimy fordes.—— Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 again in the morning.

20. The medicines procured five ftools yesterday. He fays he is much better. It appears he had a paroxifm with shivering last night.——N° I to be taken immediately.

21ft. Forenoon. He was much vomited and purged yesterday. — A blister to be applied between the shoulders.

22d. 9 A. M. The catarrhal fymptoms are much better. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue are perfectly natural. Some head-ach ftill remains. He had two large ftools yefterday. His perfpiration was profufe last night. He took fome honey during the day.—— An acidulated mucilage to be taken occafionally.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. He is quite well in every refpect, except a flight degree of cough. —— The mucilage to be continued.

24th. He fays he is perfectly well in every refpect, except a degree of cough, and re-4 quefts

quests to be difmissed. His pulse, however, is 90. Discharged.

His name does not appear on the fick lift during the remainder of the voyage.

CASE. IV.

JOHN SMITH, Seaman.

1790. First Quarter 15th.

October 18th. Afternoon. He is about thirty-five years of age, and of a pretty ftrong habit of body. He was feized with a paroxis of ague this morning, which has lasted the whole day. His pulse is rather smart, and a little accelerated; his skin hot and beginning to be moist; his tongue natural. —Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and N° 5 in the morning.

19th. Morning. He fweated much all night, but has not taken the medicines prefcribed. His pulfe is 64, and his fkin natural. He has pain in his breaft and cough. ----N° 5 to be taken during the day.

20th. He had three ftools yesterday and nausea the whole day. He had the ' chillinefs' last night; but fays he is quite well today. His pulse is 64 and natural.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N' 6 in the morning.

21ft.

21st. Forenoon. He has remained free from all complaint. Discharged.

Full Moon 23d. 27th. 9 A. M. He now complains that he had a flight paroxifm of ague yesterday. He has been costive lately. His pulse, skin, and tongue are natural.——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

29th. Noon. About three o'clock P. M. He is daily attacked with cold fhivering, fucceeded by cold fweat, but no fenfe of heat. His pulfe is 78, full and foft; his fkin and tongue natural. Pain in the head accompanies the attack.——Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

30th. He fays he has had no return of his complaints, and is quite well. Difcharged.

His name does not appear on the fick lift after this period.

CASE V.

DANIEL DOOBY, Seaman.

November 3d. He came paffenger as a foldier from Bengal, and now acts in the capacity of feaman. He is twenty three years of age. He was yesterday feized with very violent head ach, cold stage of fever, inceffant

inceffant retching and vomiting of large quantities of green matters, and of every thing he attempts to eat or drink. The cold fit, without heat or fweat, recurred laft night. He is very coftive; has much thirft; a cough which continues fo violent and fo long as to induce a degree of fuffocation, and pain about the bottom of the fternum when he coughs. His urine is of a very high colour. He difcharges much white phlegm during the cough.——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

4th. 9 A. M. Nº 5 operated abundantly by vomit, but once only by stool. The discharges upwards were green and bitter, with a white thick phlegm; downwards they confifted of a large quantity of yellow thin liquid. He is much better in every respect. He has no pain in his head, and very little in his breaft. His pulse is 96, but in other respects natural, as well as his tongue and fkin. He had the venereal difeafe when he left Bengal, had just been through a course of mercury, and had taken in a former courfe about thirty-four, and during the last about twenty-fix mercurial pills. He has now a fmall fore, nearly clofed, in his groin, which has been open fince last April, and remained after a bubo, which he had at that time .---- N° 5 to be continued.

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5th.

5th. 9 A. M. He had ten thin yellow flimy ftools yesterday. He is quite well. —Discharged.

New Moon 6th. His name does not appear on the fick lift during the remainder of the voyage.

CASE VI.

FREDERICK RIDALL, Seaman.

1790. November 12th. Heisthirty-eight years of age, and appears to be a very robuft man, though fhort. He was feized yesterday evening with fhivering, fucceeded by heat and fweat. He complains of violent pain crofs the forehead; pains in the back, belly, and limbs, and cough, with expectoration of 'greenifh' matter. He has great giddinefs. His pulfe is about 86, and fmall; it feems to be deep in the wrift; tongue natural, or rather more florid than in health; his fkin dry, and rather too warm. He is a little coftive. His urine is of a deep red, and muddy. He has much nausea, and inappetency. ---- N° 5 to be taken immediately, and Nº I at bed-time, if the former should not have operated by vomit.

13th. 11 A. M. First Quarter. He difcharged

charged yellow and green fordes by ftool and vomit. He had about four ftools, fcalding and large. He is much better. His pulse is 80, and his tongue and skin pretty natural. -N° 5 to be taken during the day, four pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

14th. 9 A. M. He has had innumerable green, yellow, and hot ftools. He fays his urine is green and yellow. He is perfectly free from every fymptom of diforder now, except a confiderable pain in the belly, as he fays, from the fevere operation of the phyfic. His pulfe is 88 and natural; his fkin natural; his tongue nearly covered with a white fur, intermixed with florid fpots.

15th. He is perfectly free from every fymptom of indifpolition .- Difcharged.

His name does not recur on the fick lift during the remainder of the voyage.

SHIP FEVER,

Complicated with PAINS in various PARTS.

CASE I.

CHARLES MACDONALD.

First Quarter, 15th.

September 17th. Morning.

CHARLES MACDONALD, about twenty-three years of age, was feized laft night with a fit of ague, which did not terminate in fweat. He now complains of a fevere head-ach, giddinefs, and pains in his back and joints.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and low diet to be obferved as ufual.

Afternoon. He difcharged much yellow matters by vomit, and has had about fix or eight ftools. His ' head is ftill light,' but in other refpects he fays he feels quite well.—— Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 6 in the morning.

18th. He is free from all complaint. — Difcharged.

CASE

CASE II.

JOHN FREEMAN, Boatswain's Mate.

1790. September 21ft. Noon. John Freeman is about twenty-five years of age, of a compact, but not a large perfon, and at prefent rather of a fallow complexion. His name appears on the medical journal of the fhip at two periods of the voyage previous to the prefent. The following is a copy of the paffages which relate to him :

" 1790. February 5th. John Freeman, Boatfwain's Mate, has got a purging.—H. aper. 3iii. ftat.—6th. Purging fomewhat better.—R. P. rh. gr. x. Ipec. gr. iii. Tinct. theb. gtt. m. fi. pill. N° ii. I ftat. alt. vefpere." Again, fome months after, "July 6th. John Freeman, Fever.—Mift. feb. 3viii.c.t. emet. gr. ii.fs.—7th. Mixture of yefterday, he fays, vomited him a little. Still complains of fevere head-ach with general pains.—Rep. mift. feb. 3viii.—8th. Fever left him; gone to duty."

He now complains that he has had thefe three days a great giddinefs, and frequent irregular attacks of fhivering and heat, with pains acrofs the lower belly. He is habitually fubject ' to the cramp in his breaft and M 3 fhin-

fhinbones.' His pulfe is not to be felt diftinctly, as the artery feems to lay too deep. His fkin is cool and moift, and his tongue a very little white.——N° 6 to be taken immediately.

22d. He took N°7, three pills laft night, and N°6, this morning. He fays 'he has had a cold in his head' fince our departure from Calcutta. He had four or five ftools yefterday, and felt occafionally 'very cold and very hot.' His giddinefs is confiderably worfe to day; his tongue much whiter, but his fkin perfectly natural.

Evening. He has had many calls 'rather white and hot;' has remained free from all heat and cold the whole day, and without giddinefs for fome hours paft. His pulfe is nearly natural; his tongue much lefs pale, and his fkin natural.——Three pills of 'N° 7 to be taken to-night, and N° 9 in the morning.

23d. Seven o'clock A. M. Full Moon. His fkin is cool and moift; his pulfe a little quicker than natural; and his tongue ftill pale.—N° 2 to be taken during the day.

24th. He is free from all complaint. -Difcharged.

He did not apply for affiftance during the remainder of the voyage, but, on the contrary, was remarkable for his conftant affiduity

duity and alacrity in the discharge of his duty, until within a few days of our arrival at Gravesend, when he was seized with headach, nausea, and some irregular symptoms of fever; but these were immediately removed by an emetic and a purge.

CASE III.

THOMAS ROBERTS.

1790. First Quarter, 15th. October 16th. Evening. He is twenty-feven years of age. He complains of great giddinefs and dimnefs of fight occafionally, with a fevere pain in the head. He was feifed with thefe fymptoms, attended by a warm fweat, four days ago. He has a large phlegmon on his posterior. His pulfe is more frequent than appears natural; his fkin rather hot; but his tongue is quite clear. He had fome pain and difficulty of breathing two days ago, but that has now left him. He has been rather costive. His urine is of a very high colour. ——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

17th. He has not had N° 5 as yet. Let him take it immediately.

18th. Afternoon. He is better; but his head achs violently ftill.—Four pills of N°7 M 4 to

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to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

20th. He had feveral large ftools yefterday. His pulfe is 67, and natural. He fays he is much better, and particularly in his head. ——Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and N° 6 in the morning.

21ft. He is quite well .- Discharged.

He continued well during the remainder of the voyage,

CASE IV.

GEORGE LOCK.

1790. First Quarter 15th. October 17th. Morning. He came paffenger as a foldier from Bengal, and now does the duty of a feaman. He is about forty years of age. He was feifed laft night with very fevere pains in his bowels, in his head, and in all his limbs, with rigors and occafional heats, which did not terminate in fweat. He has fome naufea, and is very thirsty. His skin is rather hot, though not dry; his pulse pretty natural; and his tongue rather white. He has been rather coffive, and had not the least appetite all yesterday .- N° 5 to be taken during the day. Low diet to be ftrictly observed. 18th. Morning. He has only had three ftools

ftools from N° 5, 'yellow, green, and various colours.' The pains in his bowels and head are rather worfe. His pulfe and fkin are natural; his tongue white in the middle, and red round the edges. He took about three parts of N° 5.——N° 1 to be taken immediately.

Afternoon. The emetic did not operate. He is not better. He fays, he has generally a cold fhivering on him. His fkin is dry and rather hot, and his pulfe quick and fmall, ——Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and N° 5 in the morning.

19th. Morning. He did not receive the medicines, but was much relieved by two ftools last night.——N° 5 to be taken to-day.

20th. He now fays, he is fenfible he had fever without remiffion for five days, till yefterday morning; when it left him, and recurred in the evening. His habitual dimnefs of fight is much increafed. He has giddinefs and pain in the head. His hearing is fomewhat impaired. He had fix ftools ' like clay' yefterday, and three laft night. The medicine kept up a naufea the whole day. He has fevere pains ' all over his body.' He paffed a very reftlefs night. His pulfe is 104; his fkin natural; his tongue rather white; his urine muddy, and of ' a clay colour.'

lour.' He has taken a dram this morning; and feems to be fomewhat affected by liquor, or in an unufual way by his complaints.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, four pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

21ft. Forenoon. The medicines gave him about feven or eight ftools yesterday, five or fix last night, and two this morning. He is much better in every respect. He has not taken N° 6 to-day.——The pills and N° 6 to be repeated.

22d. He had fome fhivering this morning, fucceeded by heat. He feems to be worfe every fecond day. His pulfe is about ninety-fix; his fkin natural; his tongue rather cineritious towards the root.—Let him take a mixture of tartar emetic and fpiritus mindereri.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. He had three thin yellow ftools yefterday; but did not perfpire in the leaft, though he took all the mixture. He is better than he was, but weaker. His pulfe is 104, feeble and fmall; his tongue pretty clear and moift; his fkin natural. He feels a pain in the infide, and a forenefs on the outfide of the back part of the head, which ' diftract' him. He has not the leaft appetite.——N° 2 to be taken 2

during the day, three pills of N° 7 at bedtime, and N° 6 in the morning.

24th. 9 A. M. He had fix yefterday, three laft night, and five thin ftools this morning. The pains in his head are nearly gone. He has fome pains in his bones ftill. He did not take N° 2 yefterday, ——N° 2 to be taken to-day, four pills of N° 7 at bedtime, and two ounces of caftor oil to-morrow early.

25th. 9 A. M. He had three ftools yefterday, five last night, and two this morning, all yellow. His pulse is 108.———N° 1 to be taken immediately.

26th. He difcharged much 'green and yellow gall' yefterday, both by vomit and ftool, which was of infinite fervice to him. He fays, he is now quite well, and defires to do his duty.—Difcharged.

He remained free from complaint after this period, except a tooth-ach and fwelled cheek during a few days,-

1790. First Quarter, 15th. October 17th. He feems about twenty-five years of age, fmall in stature, and of rather a spare habit of body.

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body. He is now in the cold stage of an ague. N° 1 to be taken immediately.

19th. The emetic did not operate, and he complains of ague this morning.——N° 1 to be continued till it operate.

21st. Forenoon. The medicine operated copioufly both ways.——N° 2 to be taken during the day.

22d. The affection of his ear has vanished; and the febrile symptoms have not returned. He discontinues attendance today. Full Moon 23d.

CASE VI.

WILLIAM FARQUARSON.

1790. October 7th. William Farquarfon, feaman, of about twenty-five years of age, and rather of a fpare habit, complains of ague.——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

8th. New Moon. The paroxifm recurred with equal feverity last night. The physic

phyfic operated well.——N° 11 to be taken before the approach of the next paroxifm

9th. The paroxism was less fevere last night.———N° 11 to be continued.

10th. The cold stage was less, but the hot stage more severe last night. He says, he has had a pain in the right shoulder, which is not better. N°11 to be repeated.

Evening. The paroxism has not returned as yet.

11th. Noon. The paroxism returned at the usual hour last night, though somewhat less severe. The pain in the shoulder remains the same. He had two stools yesterday, and two to-day.——N° 11 to be discontinued, and N° 5 taken immediately.

12th. He began to take N° 5 about four in the afternoon. It operated much by vomit and ftool before the ufual period of the paroxifm.——10 P. M. The paroxifm did not return. He vomited much green matters. His urine is of a high colour. The pain in his fhoulder is the fame. He has had feven copious thin ftools from the medicine.——N°2 to be taken during the day, three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

October 14th. Morning. He had no return of the paroxifm last night. He vomited yesterday much green, yellow, ' nasty, slimy

flimy ftuff,' and had two large rather hard ftools, three laft night, and one, large, foft, and yellow this morning. His urine is of a high colour; his pulfe and fkin natural; his tongue pale. The pains in his fhoulder and loins are not better.—N° 2 to be taken during the day.

15th. Morning. First Quarter. He had the paroxism as strong as usual last night; and three stools of some degree of confistence and yellow. His urine is of a very high colour; his tongue brown this morning; his skin natural; his pulse is difficult to be felt at prefent. The pains are not better.—Let him take N° 5 during the day, and then an ounce of bark before the accession of the next fit.

17th. Morning. The paroxifm returned an hour later last night, and with much less feverity.——Half the quantity of bark to be taken.

Afternoon. He was feifed about 10 A. M. with great giddinefs, ficknefs at ftomach, and cold fweat. Thefe fymptoms recurred at 2 P. M. He now complains of naufea. His pulfe is quick and fmall, his tongue rather foul, and his fkin at the wrift very cold.—— The bark to be omitted. N° 1 to be taken immediately.

18th.

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18th. Morning. He had the hot ftage of fever terminating in fweat laft night. He vomited much green ' nafty flimy ftuff' yefterday, when the giddinefs came on; but he did not get N° 1.——N° 1 to be taken immediately.

Afternoon.—Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

20th. He had a regular paroxifm laft night. He complains of giddinefs, and of pain acrofs his head, pain in his fhoulder, and forenefs about the precordia.——N° I to be taken immediately.

22nd. 9 A. M. His pulfe is rather fmall, and 108; his tongue darkly cineritious; his fkin cool. He had much lefs of the paroxifm laft night. He thinks he is at prefent rather dull of hearing. The vertigo, and dimnefs of fight, on looking ftedfaftly at any object, are much the fame, as well as the pain at the ftomach. He had four large ftools laft

last night.——The pills to be continued, and N° 6 to be taken early in the morning.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. The pain in his head is better, but not the other fymptoms. He has had fix 'greyifh' and very loofe ftools this morning. N°2 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 every night.

24th. 9 A. M. He had no fenfation of cold, and only a very flight degree of heat, terminating in fweat laft night. His pulfe is 120, and finall; his fkin rather hot. He had four yellow thick ftools yefterday, and difcharged much green matters by vomit.— N[•] 2 and the pills to be continued.

25th. 9 A. M. He complains much of giddinefs again. He has always confiderable thirft. He has ftill occafionally fits of faintnefs, ficknefs, giddinefs, and profuse cold fweats. His pulse is about 120.—N° 1 to be taken immediately.

26th. He vomited yefterday much green, yellow, bitter matters and phlegm; and had two yellow ftools. His urine is of a very high colour; his head much freer from pain; but the giddinefs remains. His pulfe is 116, very finall and creeping; his fkin quite cool; his tongue a little foul towards the root. He has felt much fhivering all the morning.

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----N° 1 to be repeated; four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 early in the morning.

27th. 9 A. M. He had a flight return of fever laft night, commencing with a little fhivering. He vomited much green, yellow, and very bitter matters yefterday; and has had ten thin, yellow, hot ftools. His head is much better. He complains, that his knees and fhoulders are 'as fore as a boil.' His tongue is clearer; his fkin and pulfe pretty much the fame. He complains of much anorexia and thirft.——N° 2 to be taken during the day.

28th. The pain in his fhoulders is better, but not that in his knees. His head is quite well. He had many yellow ftools of a thicker confiftence yefterday. His urine is of a very high colour. His pulfe is very difficult to be felt, but is upwards of 100; his fkin pretty warm and open; his tongue as ufual.---N° 5 to be taken during the day.

29th. Noon. He had many liquid, yellow stools yesterday. He had not the slightest return of the paroxism yesterday. His pulse is 85, and fuller; his skin quite cool; but his tongue still discoloured, and brown in the middle. His urine is not

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of fo high a colour.——Half an ounce of bark to be taken daily.

30th. He has had five thick ftools. He complains that the pains in his fhoulders and knees were very fevere laft night. His tongue is pale, but has loft the former brown tinge. His pulfe is 114; his fkin cool; his urine not of fuch a high colour as it was. A blifter to be applied to the right knee; and one pint of N° 5 to be taken to-day.

31ft. Laft Quarter. He has had fix yellowifh very hot and large ftools fince laft vifit. He thinks the pain in his knee better. His head is quite well. His pulfe is exceedingly quick, but it is very difficult to be felt at all times. His tongue is ftill, difcoloured, particularly at the root. He has no pain in his loins. He feels the cold ftage of ague coming on now.—An ounce of bark to be taken before the expiration of forty eight hours,

November 1ft. He had a regular paroxifm of ague yefterday. The pain in the bliftered knee is much better. His pulfe is 100, and more diftinct than ufual; his fkin, cold; his tongue more clear; his urine of a high colour. He has had three large yellow ftools.— The bark to be continued.

2d. 9 A. M. His pulse is 116; tongue still

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ftill cleaner; fkin natural. The paroxifm has not returned.——An ounce of bark to be taken as before.

3d. He has not had any return of the paroxifm. The pain in his knee is much the fame. His pulfe is 120; his fkin too warm and dry; his tongue pale. He has had three very large thick ftools. His urine is not fo high. He has not fweated in the leaft lately. He took two of the pills by miftake laft night.——The bark to be continued.

4th. He is 'very well' in every refpect except the pains in his knees. His pulfe however is 140, though it cannot be diftinctly felt; his tongue is still pale and rather foul; he has thirst always, and fometimes head-ach; his mouth is rather fore; his gums found. He has had three large 'ftiff' stools, darker than usual. His urine, is not of such a ' high colour. The pains in his shoulders are better.—N° 1 to be taken in three doses, a blifter to be applied to the left knee, and the bark discontinued.

5. 9 A. M. He vomited much bitter yellow matters yesterday. The thirst, which was habitual, is much diminisched. The pains are better. His pulse is very quick. -----N° I to be repeated at bed-time.

New Moon 6th. 7th. 4 P. M. He has N 2 not

not had any return whatever of fever; but he fays the pains in his knees are not better. His pulfe feems to be 100, and habitually quick; his tongue is not quite clean; his fkin perfectly cool. There is reafon to fufpect that his pains are at prefent fictutious. Difcharged.

For fome time after his difcharge his duty was merely fedentary. He did not apply for affiftance again during the voyage.

Complicated with SYMPTOMS of the LIVER,

CASE I.

JOHN SIM, Seaman.

First Quarter, 15th.

September 16th. Morning.

JOHN SIM, about thirty-five years of age, of a very robuft habit of body, but at prefent of a fallow complexion in fome degree, was feized with ague about eight days ago. It left him for feveral days; but returned yefterday at four o'clock, P. M. The paroxifm terminated in fweat. The fhivering has recurred this morning. He complains of pain in the head, and feels a degree of pain on preffure, fuddenly made, under the falfe ribs of the right fide. His tongue is rather clean, and his pulfe fmart but not quick.——N° 5 to be taken immediately.

Afternoon. He felt nothing but a little N 3 fhivering

fhivering this morning. He has had four green and yellow ftools. His pulfe is full, foft, and flow; his fkin cool and moift; and his tongue the fame. He had broth for dinner.—Low diet to be obferved. Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 to-morrow.

17th. Morning. He has had about twelve ftools fince the evening. The fever has not returned, and he flept well. His fkin, pulfe, and tongue are perfectly natural.——N° 2 to be taken in the ufual way.

Afternoon. He has had fome very flight fymptoms of fever; and difcharged by vomit much yellow and green matters. He had feven ftools fince the morning. He has ftill fome pain and giddinefs of head. His pulfe is full and flow, and his fkin cool and moift. He had broth for dinner.—— Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 6 in the morning.

18th. He had fince laft night about four green ftools. He has had for a very long time on each fide of the anus excrefcences, fome ulcerated, and all moift, which cover a confiderable furface. They have been called piles, and treated as fuch frequently. It is not afcertained that they extend inward; but they bleed at prefent

fent and are very fore. They do not however prevent him from doing his ufual work. He has not had any return of the fever. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue are natural; and he is free from all complaint, except those old excrefcences. He has had beef foup for dinner.—Difcharged; but directed to keep his body open with two table-fpoons full, or more, of flowers of fulphur every day.

October 23d. Forenoon. Full Moon. He now acts as butcher. The ' piles' are very troublefome, and bleed daily. The blood feems to proceed from within the anus. The two affected furfaces are in conftant contact with one another. He complains of much pain in the head, and much thirft. His urine is ' red.' His tongue, pulfe, and fkin are natural.——N° 5 to be taken immediately, and low diet only allowed.

25th. Forenoon. Not one of the pre-N 4 fcriptions

fcriptions has been obeyed as yet. He fays, his head is a little better. He now complains of pain in the right fhoulder. He had three or four ftools yefterday.——A large blifter to be applied over the right hypochondrium. N° 5 to be taken to day, four pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

26th. He was very much purged by the medicines yefterday, and laft night. His ftools were green, yellow, and hot. His head is a little better, but not the 'piles.' His urine is 'very red;' his pulfe very full, ftrong, and frequent; his fkin rather hot and dry; and his tongue fomewhat white.—— Let him lofe eight or ten ounces of blood today. N° 5 to be continued.

27th. 9 o'clock P. M. He has had five green, yellow, and hot ftools. His tongue and fkin are natural; his pulfe 84, and rather full and ftrong; and his urine red. The pains in his head and fide are better; but not the piles, which bleed a little. Venefection has been neglected.——Two table-fpoons full of flowers of fulphur to be taken daily, and two pills of N° 7 every night.

28th. 9 o'clock, P. M. His head is not quite well, and his other complaints are much the fame. He has had five yellow, green, and very hot ftools. His tongue is difcoloured towards the root.——Eight ounces of

of blood to be taken from his arm, and his medicines continued.

29th. Noon. His fide is better, but not the piles. He has had ten dark, yellow, liquid, and very hot ftools. His pulfe beats 78. His tongue is cineritious near the root. _____The fame medicines to be continued.

30th. On further examination, the excrefcences appear to be pale flefhy fubftances, in form fomething like mulberries, on each fide of the anus, extending about two inches in length and one in breadth. There feem to be alfo fimilar excrefcences within the anus. The external furfaces affected are exactly of the fame extent on each fide, and come into contact. The cough is bad. His head is free from pain, except when he coughs. His fide is better.——Lint fteeped in vegeto-mineral water to be applied over and between the affected furfaces. The fame medicines to be continued.

31ft. 9 o'clock P. M. Laft Quarter. He fays, his fundament is eafier fince he ufed the vegeto-mineral water. He has had about fix yellow ftools. His fide is better; but in other refpects he is much the fame.——Two grains of pure opium to be diffolved in one pint of the water. The former medicines to be continued.

November 1st. 9 o'clock A. M. The ' piles'

• piles' bleed daily, but they are much lefs fore. In other refpects he is well.——The fame wash and medicines to be continued.

2d. 9 o'clock A. M. He fays his fundament is not better, nor the cough at prefent; but his other complaints have vanished. His mouth is a little fore.——The pills to be difcontinued, but not the flowers of fulphur.

3d. 9 o'clock A. M. The colour of the excretcences are now of a deeper purple, more like mulberries. They do not feem to have decreafed. In other refpects he is well.—— The fulphur to be continued. In lieu of the vegeto-mineral water, let a folution of blue vitriol be ufed, of a ftrength to make the affected parts fmart a little.

4th. 9 o'clock A. M. As there is no blue vitriol, he has ufed a ftrong folution of alum, which has been attended with confiderable fmarting, and, he thinks, with fome benefit.——The folution of alum and the fulphur to be continued. Difcharged. He is directed to report the ftate of the excretionces occafionally.

12th. 9 o'clock A. M. The excretcences have become more painful, and they appear redder. He fays, he has fometimes pain in both fhoulders.—Let him ufe the former application of vegeto-mineral water and opi-8 um.

um. N° 6 to be taken to-morrow morning.

13th. 11 o'clock A. M. First Quarter. The medicine discharged much yellow and green matters. The parts affected are a very little easier.——N° 6 to be repeated in the morning, and the wash continued.

14th. 9 o'clock A. M. He has had three yellow green ftools this morning. The parts are a little better.—Let fixteen grains of corrofive fublimate be diffolved in a pint of the former wafh, and ufed in the fame manner daily.

Evening. The lotion smarted him to-day.

17th. 9 o'clock A. M. The excretcences are better. He was feifed with cough laft night, attended with expectoration of 'black and white ftuff.' He complains of much head-ach. His pulfe beats 84, and is in all refpects natural. His fkin and tongue are alfo natural.----N° 5 to be taken during the day.

18th. 9 o'clock A. M. He had three or four hot and not very thin ftools laft night. His cough is a little better, but not his head-ach. His pulse, skin, and tongue are natural; towards

wards the root, however, his tongue feems to be of the colour of ipecacuan powder._____ N° 1 to be taken immediately.

19th. 10 o'clock A. M. He fays his cough is better; but the pain in the head very little abated. He vomited yefterday 'all green like grafs.' There is reafon to doubt the reality of the head-ach and cough. —Let a ftrong red precipitate ointment be fubftituted in lieu of the wafh of corrofive fublimate, which does not appear to have had much effect hitherto.

20th. He fays the head-ach and cough are better. The ointment gives pain.—— The ointment to be continued daily.

21st. Full Moon. The excresses appear a little better. His other complaints have left him, he fays.

The local complaint did not appear to experience much benefit from any of the applications or medicines; but he continued well in other refpects during the remainder of the voyage.

CASE II.

EDWARD COOPER.

1790. September 23d. Full Moon. He was fent to the hofpital for the cure of an intermittent fever on our arrival at Madras, and

and returned on the 18th, free from complaint. He is thirty-four years of age. He was feized with a paroxism of ague this morning, and is afflicted with severe pain between the shoulders, and in the region of the liver. He complains also of some giddines. His pulse and skin are natural; and his tongue a little pale, except at the extremity, which is red. He took two grains of emetic tartar yesterday, and vomited a little bile.—N° 2 to be taken immediately, three pills of N° 7 at bed - time, and N° 6 in the morning.

25th. 7 A. M. He had three pills laft night. The paroxifin was equally violent yefterday. His ftools were inconfiderable, but yellow. He complains of great giddinefs, and of great ficknefs at ftomach fince he took the falts this morning. His tongue is ftill pale with the extremity red; pulfe foft but rather quick; fkin cool, and extremely moift or wet $---N^{\circ}$ 2 to be taken as ufual.

Evening. The paroxism has been much less fevere to-day. He has discharged much green

green and yellow matters by vomit, and has had large hot and yellow ftools. The pain between the fhoulders is better. His pulfe and fkin are natural, and his tongue nearly fo.——Six pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

Evening. He took a handful of common falt in a quart of fea-water to-day, juft as the cold ftage came on. The hot ftage fucceeded immediately, and was very trifling. He vomited fome green matters, and paffed hot yellow and green fordes by ftool. His tongue is quite clear; his fkin and pulfe natural; but the latter feems rather full. ----N° 2 to be continued.

27th. Morning. He has taken this morning about a table-fpoon full of falt in a pint and a half of fea-water, fince which he has had feveral copious yellow ftools. He has much head-ach at prefent. His pulfe is quick; his tongue flightly cineritious; but his fkin quite cool and foft.——N° 2 to be continued.

Evening. He fays he felt 'a little chillinefs linefs for fix minutes to-day, but no other fymptom of fever.' He had a profuse fweat yesterday, after taking the falt water. He has vomited much green and yellow matters, and has had eleven yellow and hot stools fince morning. His pulse is full and strong; his tongue clear; and his skin cool.— To be allowed fago diet, in lieu of the common low diet. Three pills, N° 7, to be taken at night, and a draught of salt water in the morning.

28th. Morning. He had one ftool laft night, and three fince he took the fea water; they were all very yellow. His head was much affected yefterday, but is better to-day than it has been as yet. His pulfe is full and frequent; his tongue a little pale, and his fkin warm and foft. $\longrightarrow N^{\circ}$ 2 to be taken during the day.

29th. He fays he felt for 'fix minutes yefterday a chillinefs without any fhivering or heat.' He was very fick, and vomited about 'a gallon' of green and latterly yellow matters.—N° 2 to be continued.

30th. Evening. He felt fome approaches of the fever this morning with very little fenfation of cold, and not much heat. Mr. — gave him opium, and he afterwards took emetic tartar of his own accord. He

He vomited a large quantity of yellow bitter matters; and had five ftools. His tongue is rather foul; his pulfe very full; and his fkin warm and moift.——N° 5 to be taken during the day.

October 1st. Morning. Last Quarter. He had only one stool from the medicine. The head-ach is better, but not entirely removed. His pulse is quick; his skin cool; and his tongue somewhat cineritious. N° I to be taken immediately, and N° 5 continued after the complete operation of the former.

Afternoon. He had a regular paroxifm in the forenoon. The emetic evacuated much bile.——He has been taking N° 11 fince the termination of the paroxifm.

2d. Morning. His pulse is a little accelerated.

Evening. He complains to-day of pain a little below the navel. To this pain he attributes the obftinate recurrence of the paroxifms; it fhoots through that part when he coughs. The paroxifm was more fevere to-day. He has had five yellow and thin ftools. His tongue is a little lefs foul; his pulfe and fkin natural.—N° 11 to be continued.

3d. Morning. His pulse is a little quick ; 2 but

but he thinks he is better. He had two ftools laft night.—___No. 11 to be continued.

Evening. The hot ftage was pretty confiderable to day, though lefs than ufual. He had a diaphoretic draught during the paroxyfm. His pulfe is full, and fomewhat accelerated; his tongue has a degree of white fur mixed with red.—No. II to be continued.

4th. Morning. He had two large thick ftools laft night; and fays he is free from complaint this morning. His tongue is clear, but his pulfe is a little accelerated. No. 11 to be continued.

Evening. He has not had any return whatever of fever to-day. His tongue is a little pale; but his pulfe and fkin are natural. —No. 11 to be continued, in half the ufual proportion.

5th. Morning. He had two ftools laft night. His pulfe, fkin and tongue are natural.— Four drams of bark to be taken during the twenty-four hours.

Afternoon. He continues well. Difcharged.

New Moon 8th. 15th. Afternoon. First Quarter. He has not had any return of the ague; but he now complains of pains all over the abdomen, at night only. His belly

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is confiderably fwelled, and rather tenfe, though not painful on preffure. Before dinner he was attacked with a fpontaneous vomiting of much 'corruption,' green, yellow and bitter matters. He has a bitter tafte. His body has been regular. His appetite is good; but he does not fleep well at night. His urine is pale and clear; his tongue alfo rather pale; but his fkin and pulfe pretty natural.—No. 5 to be taken immediately.

22d. 9 A. M. The operation of No. 5 completely removed the bowel complaint. He had a return of the paroxyfm of ague yesterday morning, and it has recurred to-day. —No. 1 to be taken immediately.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. He vomited much yesterday, and 'better than half a gallon of four nasty green stuff' this morning. He complains of great distress and pain in the abdomen, and 'about the heart'. He had three large stools yesterday, and one last night. His pulse is at 160, very feeble and small. He moans a great deal.—No. 5 to be taken immediately.

24th. 9 A. M. He is now in a violent paroxyfm. He had only two ftools yefterday. His pulfe is not eafily counted.——No. 5, with three grains of emetic tartar, to be taken toto-day; four pills of No. 7 at bed-time; and No. 6 in the morning.

25th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm returned at fix o'clock this morning, but much lefs feverely than yefterday. He has had about five ftools of a deep yellow. The fever did not leave him till 4 P. M. yefterday; when, he fays, he was free from all head-ach and every other complaint.——No. 5, with three grains of emetic tartar, and four pills, to be repeated; and an ounce and a half of falts to be taken very early in the morning.

26th. The medicine yefterday operated well; but, he fays, he never experienced fuch a violent operation both ways as from the falts this morning; and he has felt fo much relief from it, that he requefts the dofe of falts may be repeated. The paroxyfm has recurred this morning, but with lefs violence, and with very little of the cold ftage.—No. 5, No. 7, and No. 6 to be repeated in the fame proportions.

27th. 9 A. M. He has purged and vomited much, of the fame kind as yefterday. The paroxyfm has returned.——No. 5 to be continued.

28th. 9 A. M. He has purged off a great deal of the fame kind of fordes. The paroxyfm has returned to day.——No. 5 to be con-O 2 tinued

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tinued during the fit, till the fweat fupervene, at which period let him begin to take the bark, an ounce before 6 A. M. to-morrow.

29th. Noon. The paroxyfm to-day was much the fame as yesterday, and both very flight. He had about ten dark, yellow, liquid stools yesterday, and three to-day. He took a dofe of falts each day before the fit came on. He had taken about half the bark before its acceffion. He has every day during the paroxyfm a pain fhooting from the lower belly, from a fpot between the umbilicus and falfe ribs, to the fpine ; which leaves him with the paroxyfm. The fwelling of the abdomen, of which he complained formerly, fubfided immediately on the first attack of the paroxyfms, and was fucceeded by this pain. His pulse is 112 and full; his tongue a little white; his skin too warm, and moift; and his urine 'is quite green' .----The bark to be continued.

30th. The paroxyfm was much more flight to-day; and he fays the bark did him much good. He has taken about an ounce and a half fince yefterday's fit. He has had about fixteen ftools, green and yellow. His pulfe is 116; his tongue very white; and his head is very light.—The bark to be continued.

31ft.

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31ft. 9 A. M. Laft Quarter. He has had fix yellow and thin ftools. The paroxyfm has been more fevere to-day, confiderably in the cold ftage, but not equally fo in the hot. Anxiety and thirft are very great. He has had fome head-ach to-day, but lefs than yefterday; and no pain in the loins, except during the cold ftage. He has taken an ounce of the bark fince laft fit. His pulfe is 144, full and ftrong, yet not free; his tongue confiderably cineritious, and his fkin hot.——An ounce of bark to be taken during the interval.

November 1st, 4 P. M. The paroxysm recurred this morning at the usual hour, with greater violence of the cold ftage, and lefs of the hot. He had taken another ounce of the red bark before the acceffion of the fit. A most fevere pain in the region of the ftomach, shooting across to the left fide fometimes, and at others perpendicularly up and down the right fide to the right fhoulder, accompanied the attack of the paroxyfm. These fymptoms continued until he took an emetic, which evacuated much green and yellow matters, with the last dose of the bark, and then vanished completely. He had had fix or feven stools. He fweated much after the fit. He does not enjoy 03 fleep

fleep at night. His urine is ' greenifh;' his pulfe full and ftrong, though not free; his fkin too warm, and his tongue only a little pale.——The bark to be difcontinued. Three pills of No. 7 to be taken at bed-time; and No. 5 in the morning very early.

3d. 9 A. M. He had a pretty fevere return of the paroxyfm yesterday morning. To-day the cold stage has been slight, and the hot very fevere. He has vomited and purged much 'nafty ftuff.' He has also had fome stools extremely hard : he feels exceffive anxiety, and much pain flooting from the right to the left fide; and upon the right shoulder. His pulse is full and frequent; his tongue pale and foul; his fkin hot, and has a degree of yellow tinge. He has taken No. 5 last night and this morning. -A large blifter to be applied over the region of the liver and ftomach; and No. 5 to be continued .----- He fays the vomiting · almost killed him,' and he has great fenfe of debility.

4th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm returned without the cold stage. He has vomited and purged a very great quantity of green and yellow matters. The pain is better. He feels a load in his stomach, which he cannot throw up; and has much anxiety or

or reftleffnefs. He has taken largely of No. 5. -----No. 1 to be taken immediately.

5th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm was fhorter and lefs violent this morning. He difcharged by vomit laft night a lump of green and yellow glare of the fize of a hen's egg, from which he has experienced great relief. He fays this fubftance filled his mouth. He has alfo evacuated much green and yellow matters both ways. He fpeaks in extravagant terms of the excefs of thefe operations. — No. 5, with three grains of emetic tartar to be taken to-day, and three pills of No. 7, at bed-time.

6th. New moon. The paroxyfm recurred earlier this morning, with half an hour of the cold ftage, but on the whole with much lefs violence. He has continued to difcharge both ways an aftonifhing quantity of yellow, green, 'nafty ftuff.' The anxiety and opprefion about the precordia, which were exceffive, appear to have decreafed greatly. He ufed about one pint of N° 5 yefterday. He eats daily the gruel morning and evening; but diflikes the panada.——Let him have fago in lieu of panada daily. N° 5 to be continued as yefterday, and the pills to be repeated at bed-time.

7th. Noon. The paroxyfm recurred in a 04 flighter

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flighter degree this morning. He has had two ftools fince last night. He took an ounce and a half of caftor-oil this morning, part of which his stomach rejected, with some thick and yellow matters. He has lime-juice and water to fip, and is now taking Nº 5 with three grains of emetic tartar. He eats daily nearly the whole allowance of low diet. He has great fense of weakness, much thirst, a fallow skin, and seems somewhat emaciated. His tongue is cineritious and moift; his pulse at prefent of a natural fulnefs, frequency, ftrength and foftnefs; his urine still very green. He complains of great giddinefs, but of no pain whatever, unlefs fome trifling fenfations still in the region of the liver. The weather is fair ; and the wind ftrong, and pretty cold.----He is ordered to remain on deck, warmly clad, as much as poffible; and to have rice-water for his common drink .--- Four pills of Nº 7 to be repeated; and two ounces of caftor-oil in the morning after the paroxyfm.

8th. 9 A. M. His comrades fay that he has not taken half his medicines; and he now refufes to take N° 5.

4 P. M.

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4 P. M. He now promifes compliance. He had many ftools yefterday, and fix fcalding yellow ftools this morning. The paroxyfm was much weaker to-day. He has ftill pain and giddinefs of the head. He took three pills laft night, and a dofe of caftor-oil this morning, before the attendant, in lieu of N° 6. The paroxyfm recurred two hours fooner to-day. His tongue is not quite fo pale and foul; his pulfe and fkin natural, and his urine 'whitifh.' — The pills and caftor-oil to be repeated, under the infpection of the attendant; who is to fee that he take all the medicines prefcribed for him.

9th. 9 A. M. He had not the leaft degree of the cold and very little of the hot ftage to-day. He fays he is ' charmingly'. A fevere purging has taken place fince four o'clock this morning; his ftools were yellow, glareous, and mostly thin. He has no other complaint at prefent, except a little giddinefs and fome thirst: but his pulfe is 136, and not free; his fkin pretty natural; his tongue lefs clear than yesterday evening, of a dirty white, with two or three ftreaks of brown, His urine is green to-day. He has not taken the caftor-oil.——N^{*} 5 to be taken immediately, and the caftor-oil in the morning,

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10th.

10th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm has juft come on, with a fevere pain in the right fhoulder, but with no fenfe of cold or fhivering. The fit does not feem fevere. He vomited a little taftelefs water, and was violently purged all night; fome part of the dejections was pretty thick, the reft thin and yellow. He has paffed glare after the caftoroil this morning, which has griped, and ftill gripes him much. The giddinefs is very confiderable at prefent. His fkin is not very hot, nor very dry; his tongue is clearer; but his pulfe is very quick, and not very full.—— Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning early.

11th. The feverifh heat has returned, greatly diminifhed this morning. He has always fweated after the heat. The thirft is much lefs, and the giddinefs decreafed. His appetite is confiderable during the intervals. Six yellow, thick ftools have taken place fince yefterday. His urine is ftill green; his tongue the fame, and his pulfe exceflively quick and fmaller.——N° 5 to be taken during the day.

12th. 9 A. M. His pulfe is at least 164, and fimaller than is usual with him in the hot stage; his skin is dry, but not excessively hot; his tongue clearer. He has had three thick, and

and four thin yellow ftools. He fays N° 5 griped him much. The paroxyfm returned later to-day, at 8 A. M. but with fome fhivering.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 at bed-time.

13th. 11 A. M. First Quarter. He has had the flightest possible degree of cold ftage, fucceeded by a gentle heat this morning. He fays he is greatly better. He has had four 'pretty thick' yellow ftools. His tongue is clearer; his pulse is 116, full and foft; his skin not very hot. He has not felt more feverish heat at any time to-day than at present. His urine is still green. He generally sweats a little after each paroxysim. —N° 2 to be continued. Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

4 P. M. His pulfe is 80, and full.

14th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm was more fevere than ufual this morning; he attributes this to the caftor oil. Some of his urine has been preferved this morning, for the first time, after frequent injunctions; and it appears that what he has called green, during his indifposition, is a bright, clear, high urine, of the colour of Maderia. He has had two stools this morning. He is not in the hot stage; and his pulse is at least 160.

160.----N° 2, and the pills N° 7, to be repeated.

4. P. M. His pulfe is 92 and full, with a fmart ftroke; his tongue cleaner; his fkin rather too warm.

15th. 9 A. M. The paroxyfm has returned, but without any fymptom of the cold ftage. He has had five or fix ftools. The fymptoms appear lefs violent to-day than yefterday.— N° 5 to be taken during the day, and three pills of N° 7 at bed-time.

4 P. M. His pulfe is 90, full and ftrong; his fkin pretty cool, throughout entirely free from morbid heat; his tongue lefs difcoloured. The paroxyfm was much fhorter and weaker to-day.

16th. 9 A. M. He fubfituted plain water in lieu of N° 5, and probably of N° 2; and deceived the attendant, who had orders to fee him take every dofe of the medicines. His comrades fay, that by prolonging his indifpofition, he wifhes to keep his name on the fick lift until the arrival of the fhip at St. Helena; where he may be exempted from duty, and permitted to go on fhore. His name is of courfe erafed from the fick lift.

During my absence on shore, his name appears again on the journal as follows.

During the remainder of the voyage, his countenance and appearance in other refpects afforded fufpicions of a very imperfect reftoration to health, or of a confiderable degree of indifpofition : but he did not make any further application for affiftance.

During the voyage from Bengal to Madras he laboured under a tertian fever, and was fent to the hofpital on our arrival at the last-mentioned place, whence he returned cured of his complaints. He was feized with a paroxyfm of ague the day before yesterday, after being wet; which has returned this morning. He took emetic tartar, and discharged much yellow matters both ways. His pulse is rather full, strong and frequent; his tongue pretty clear, though a little pale; his skin very warm and dry .--- Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time; and N° 6 in the morning,

29th. Morning. He was much purged last night. He fays the fea-water makes him fick.—_N° 2 to be taken immediately.

Evening. He has had two yellow ftools fince morning, and vomited fome yellow matters. He is free from all complaint except weaknefs to-day. His pulfe, fkin and tongue are pretty natural. — Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

30th. Morning. He had three ftools laft night. His pulfe is at prefent a little accelerated. — N° 2 to be taken during the day, and fago allowed for diet.

Evening. He has not had the leaft fymptom of fever to-day, except the temporary acceleration of pulfe in the morning. He has had two yellow ftools to-day. His urine was of a very high colour yefterday.

October 1st. Morning. Last Quarter. He is now apparently free from all complaint, except a little weakness.—Discharged.

New Moon 8th. 9th. He fays he has had the ague feven or eight times within thefe four months. He was feized with a paroxyfm the day before yefterday, and with another this morning at the fame hour. He x complains

complains of pain, and fome degree of fwelling, about the edge of the ribs, five or fix inches below the enfiform cartilage, on the right fide, with a difficulty of breathing. He fays, 'it feems to be at the pit of the ftomach.' He has no pain in the fhoulder, but much 'fwimming of the head.' He has felt the pain in his fide thefe three days. He complains of much thirft. His pulfe is quick and very fmall; his fkin rather hot and dry; and his tongue rather white in the middle.—N° 5 to be taken immediately.

Evening. He has not had N° 5 as yet. $--N^{\circ}$ 5 to be taken immediately, and a blifter applied to his fide.

10th. He was much purged, but not vomited. He expects the paroxyfm prefently. His pulfe is frequent and full.——N° 2 to be taken during the day; three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

11th. Noon. He vomited much yellow matters yefterday; and has had four yellow, rather thin and hot ftools from the pills and oil. He thinks the pain in his fide worfe. He has felt fince laft night a pain in his right fhoulder. The giddinefs continues. The paroxyfm did not return yefterday. He is employed daily in the open air, in a way that does not require any labour. His

His diet daily has been a little falt beef, peaspudding, rice, &c. His pulfe and fkin are natural; but his tongue is pale. The whitenefs of the tongue is fometimes a fallacious fymptom, as patients are often fufpected of rubbing chalk on that part at the hour of attendance, that they may avoid duty, by continuing on the fick lift.—One drachm of mercurial ointment to be rubbed in near the part affected every night; two pills, N° 7, to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

12th. The pain and giddinefs have not abated. He had two large ftools laft night and one hard and brown this morning. He fweats rather more than in health. His urine is pale.——N° 5 to be taken during the day.

13th. 10 A. M. He had five or fix yellow, thin ftools yefterday, and two harder and paler this morning. His urine is the fame; his tongue not fo pale; his pulfe a little accelerated; and his fkin natural.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 at bed-time.

14th. Morning. He fays, the pains in his fide and fhoulder are worfe. His urine is pale, and his pulfe and fkin natural. He P had

had three large ftools yesterday.----All the medicines to be repeated.

Evening. His pulse is full and frequent; his pulse dry and rather hot; but his tongue pretty natural. He complains of his occupation on deck, though fedentary, and fays he is weaker daily.

15th. Morning. First Quarter. He discharged some yellow matter, not bitter, by vomit yesterday evening. His tongue, pulse, and skin, are pretty natural.——N° 2, pills, and ointment to be continued. Let him strictly observe the sago diet.

16th. Morning. The pills generally procure two or three ftools. He fays, he is 'much eafier in his body.' His pulfe is rather fmall and not quick.——The pills and ointment to be continued, as well as the fago diet.

Evening. He has felt more pain in his fide fince dinner. It feems very painful on preffure. His pulfe is full, but not frequent; his fkin dry and rather hot; and the middle of his tongue white.

17th. Morning. He is much the fame in

in other refpects, but he complains to-day of ftiffnefs and pain in the lower jaw. His fkin and pulfe are natural; and his tongue a little white.——The pills and ointment to be continued, with low diet.

Afternoon. His pulfe is full and frequent; his fkin dry and rather hot; and his tongue a little white. He fays, he has been cold all the afternoon.——N° 5 to be taken in the morning.

19th. Morning. His fide is better daily. The blifter was of much fervice. His mouth begins to be affected.—The pills only to be continued, with low diet.

20th. 10 A. M. He has had 'a cold in his head' fince last night. His fide is much better.——The pills and low diet to be continued.

22d. 9 A. M. The falts were omitted. Let them be taken to-morrow. He still feels pain and hardness in the region of the liver. His mouth is fore and swelled.

23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. The falts purged him very much this morning. His ftools were yellow and rather hot. His fide

December 16th. He has continued in good health fince his difcharge, and has acquired much embonpoint. He was yefterday attacked with fpontaneous difcharges of bile upwards. He now complains of ' fwimming of the head' and a purging. He is feverifh at prefent.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

17th. He has been much purged, and has much naufea at prefent.——Half a drachm of ipecacuan to be taken at bed-time.

1791. January 2d. Finding himfelf free from complaint, he difcontinued attendance. He was yefterday attacked with a paroxifm of ague. He complains alfo of pain in the right fide and fhoulder. He had much naufea previous to the paroxifin for fome days.—— Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

3d. He has been much purged this morning.

ing. The paroxifm recurred yesterday. A foruple of ipecacuan to be added to N° 2, and taken during the day.

4th. New Moon. The paroxifm did not return yesterday. He vomited much yellow, green, and bitter matters. His tongue is a little white, but his pulse and skin natural. Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time.

5th. The blifter, which was afterwards ordered, did not rife. The paroxifm has not recurred. His fide is very painful. He has had many thin, yellow, and very hot ftools. —An active blifter to be immediately applied to his fide. The pills to be repeated, and N° 9 taken in the morning.

6th. The blifter has rifen well.

7th. His fide is very painful. His body is open.— Three pills of N° 7 at bedtime.

8th. The pills to be repeated.

10th. His fide is still very fore and stiff. ——Two drachms of mercurial ointment to be used daily, and two pills N° 7 to be taken every night.

11th. He fays his fide is not better. There is fome reafon to fufpect that he wifnes to avoid doing any duty, as the weather is very fevere, and affects to be worfe

First Quarter 12th. 13th. His fide is still very fore; his mouth affected by the mercurials,——Another blifter to be applied. One drachm only of mercurial ointment to be used to-night. N° 9 to be taken immediately.

14th. His fide is confiderably better today. He difcharged much flime and bilious fordes by ftool yesterday.——The ointment N° 9 to be repeated.

15th. His fide is better.——The ointment to be repeated.

Full Moon 20th. 22d. His fide was fo much better, that he difcontinued attendance. He fell down the hatchway yefterday, and was bled plentifully. He does not feem to be quite free from all affection of the liver. He has not used mercurials fince the fifteenth. He is recommended to use laxatives, and a further course of mercury, when he leaves the ship,

Complicated with DYSENTERIC SYMPTOMS.

CASE I.

EDWARD MYER, Sailmaker.

September 17th. Morning.

E DWARD MYER, about thirty years of age, of a large and naturally robuft figure, and a pale complexion at prefent, complains of griping, ftraining, and purging, attended with a difcharge of blood. His feet are much fwelled from a former fever. — N' 2 to be taken in the ufual way.

Afternoon. He vomited much bile this forenoon. His stools are green and bloody. ——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 6 in the morning.

19th. He fays he is better, and has had many green flools, without any appearance

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of

of blood.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

20th. His complaints are gone; but his ftools are ftill green.——N° 3 to be taken till next vifit. The next day he returned to his duty.—_Difcharged.

28th. Evening. He fays he has been fubject to frequent returns of ague, fince his firft feizure at Diamond Harbour, about two months ago. He had a paroxifm laft night, accompanied by a fevere pain acrofs his cheft, which vanifhed after a fpontaneous purging had come on. He has not any pain or uneafinefs in the region of the liver. He has taken N° 5 fince morning, and has had about ten green ftools. He vomited once.—Sago diet to be allowed. Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and the draught of falt water with Glauber falt in the morning.

29th. He was much purged during the night.

30th. Morning. He had upwards of twenty ftools yefterday; at firft yellow, and afterwards brown; and feven or eight laft night and this morning. The paroxifm returned with great feverity yefterday evening, but much later, with a fevere pain acrofs the breaft. He fays, he feels much weaknefs. His

His tongue is rather pale; his pulfe a little more accelerated than natural; his fkin perfectly natural; and his urine extremely red. —_____N° 2, with an additional grain of emetic tartar, to be taken during the day, and another fpoonful of port wine to be added to the fago.

October 1st. Morning. Last Quarter. He has not had any fymptoms of fever fince last visit. He drank a quart of falt water this morning.

3d. Morning. He had the paroxifm again yefterday; but not fo ftrong as formerly. He has the character of being much addicted to the ufe of fpirits, and to other irregularities in diet.——A quart of falt water to be taken immediately. He prefers this to a folution of the chymical falts; and many of his comrades give it a fimilar preference.

Evening. He has had a great number of ftools to-day, 'flimy, and of various kinds.' He had fresh meat for dinner.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and the falt water again in the morning.

4th. Morning. He has had five calls; the first brown and blackish, the others yellow and thinner. He fays the falt water gives him much appetite. It appears in most instances

inftances to operate with very fuperior efficacy downwards, when taken in fufficient quantity. His pulse is fomewhat accelerated; but his fkin and tongue are natural. -----N° 2 to be taken through the day.

Evening. He has had a fevere return of fever to-day. His tongue is pretty clean. The paroxism is now leaving him.---An ounce and a-half of red bark to be taken during the course of the enfuing twenty-four hours. Let him begin immediately.

5th. Morning. He has not taken any bark as yet. He had four or five ftools laft night. His tongue is clear; his fkin cool; and his pulse flow and small.----Let the bark be taken as prefcribed.

7th. He had the fever yesterday .---- The bark to be continued.

The fever did not probably trouble him much after this, as he difcontinued his vifits till the 14th.----He continued, however, to take bark for fome days in fmaller quantities.

14th. Morning. He had a return of the paroxism of ague last night. He has been coftive two days. He indulges frequently to excels in the use of spirituous liquors .----Nº 5 to be taken immediately.

Evening. He had a paroxism again today, 6

day, from 1 to 4 o'clock, P. M. ---- N° 5 to be continued.

15th. Morning. First Quarter. He has had four large stools; the first very hard, with some blood, the others yellow and hot. He fays, he is much better since the operation of the medicines. His skin is rather dry, but not hot; his tongue a little pale, and his pulse quick and small. He thinks the paroxism is approaching, as he feels his fingers and toes cold, and he begins to yawn much. — N° 1 to be taken immediately. Sago diet to be strictly observed.

16th. Morning. The paroxism did not attack till the afternoon. He was much purged yesterday, and last night; and he vomited much green matters with phlegm. His discharges by stool were green, yellow, and slimy.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

18th. Morning. He has not had any return of the paroxism. This is the third day of exemption.—Discharged.

Full Moon 23d. 24th. 9 o'clock, A. M. He has had paroxifms of ague every day thefe three days. He attributes this relapfe to alternate exposure to the fun, and to the wind in the shade; but it is probably the confequence of his intemperance. His pulse, skin, and

and tongue are natural, at prefent.---N° 5 to be taken immediately.

26th. He had a fevere return of the ague yefterday. N° 5 difcharged much green and glareous matters by vomit, and a large quantity of dark, yellow, and green fordes by ftool. His fkin and pulfe are natural; but his tongue is a little pale in the middle. — N° 2 to be taken during the day, four pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

27th. 9 o'clock, A. M. More green matters were difcharged by vomit yefterday, and he has had about fourteen yellow, green, and hot ftools. During the laft three weeks, when ill of fever, he has been affected with prolapfus ani. He complains of much ' cold in the head,' and fome cough. His mouth is fore, and difcharges much faliva. He had not the leaft return of the paroxifm yefterday. His fkin and tongue are pretty natural; his pulfe fmall, but apparently of the natural frequency.—A gargle of alum and water to be ufed, and N° 2 taken as ufual.

28th. 9 o'clock A. M. His mouth is greatly better, he fays, from the ufe of the alum and water. He had the paroxifm at the ufual hour yesterday, but the cold stage was lefs

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lefs fevere. Four yellow thin ftools have taken place fince yesterday. His pulse beats 96; but his skin and tongue are natural. One ounce of red bark to be taken before 2 o'clock P. M. to-morrow.

From this period he neglected taking medicine, and difcontinued his attendance till the 18th of November.

November 18th. 9 o'clock A. M. He has had occafional relapfes into the ague fince his laft attendance, and was feized with a paroxifm the night before laft. He was attacked the day before yefterday with excruciating pains in both his hips, extending down to the knees. They have now abandoned the left fide, but remain fixed in the right. The excefs of pain throws him frequently into cold fweats. His pulfe beats 92, and is rather finall. His fkin and tongue are natural. The pains are worfe at night.——N° 5 to be taken immediately. The parts to be well fomented, and then covered with dry flannel.

19th. 10 o'clock A. M. He had a paroxifm of fever, without the cold ftage, laft night, and he has perfpired freely. The pains were very fevere during the night. He difcharged much yellow matters by ftool yefterday. His fkin is now foft and moift. N° 5

N° 5 to be continued, and N° 4 to be taken at bed-time.

Afternoon. His pains are much better. The fomentation was not ufed. His pulfe gives no diftinct ftroke, but is finall and creeping; as far as can be gueffed, it vibrates at leaft 130. — N° 4 is countermanded. Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

20th. He fays he is much better. He does not feel the pains at all, unlefs when he moves the joint of the thigh, and then only in a flight degree. The fever has not returned.

27th. On the 25th, it feems, he took a fudorific draught. He fays the pains continue very fevere; yet he appears to have acquired embonpoint fince the 21ft, when I laft faw him. There is the greateft reafon to fuppofe he affects the pains now, that he may be permitted to go a-fhore at St. Helena, where we anchored on the 21ft.——Three pills of N° 7 are directed to be taken at bedtime, and N° 6 in the morning.

28th. He fays the pains continue exceffive.——He is recommended to take the fhower bath on fhore.

29th. N° 2 to be taken during the day. December 1st. He is on shore.

2d. He

2d. He came on board very drunk yefterday. He fays the pains are excruciating now; his declarations, however, are not to be trufted.
To be confined ftrictly to a very fpare diet.

6th. New Moon. He fays fome degree of fever always attended the pains, but that he has not had any feverifh fymptom thefe two days, and that the pains return every night. All this is probably not true.——N° 6 to be taken in the morning. He did not complain during the reft of the voyage.

CASE II.

JOHN SMITH, Poulterer.

September 22d. 1790. John Smith is of a fmall, fpare, and apparently rather feeble habit of body, and of a fair complexion, but at prefent very pale. He is twenty-two years of age. He appears on the medical journal of the ship, under date of the 21st of July of this year, as follows:

'7th. Is confiderably better this morning; had two copious ftools, and those pretty
natural, from the glyster; much more fenfible than he was last night; skin cool; has

8th. Eat fome fowl yefterday, but threw
it up again. Quite fenfible fince yefterday
morning; pulfe more natural; two ftools
in the night; but little or no fleep.——
Cap. H. an. c. gtt. xxv. To have fome beef
tea, vin. rub. ad libitum.

9th. Had confiderable delirium yefterday afternoon. Sleep in the night very difturbed; had two blifters applied to his legs;
this morning more recollected; pulfe more
natural; and other febrile fymptoms abated; has drank a good deal of Madeira this
morning, alfo fome tea. — Hab. vin.
Madeir. ad libitum.

10th. Had an anodine draught laft night,
which procured him pretty good reft; much
better this morning; has a little appetite;
complains most of his back where the blis-Q

ter was applied; ikin cool; pulse more natural.

[•] 11th. Pretty good fleep in the night;
[•] continues better in every refpect.——Rep.
[•] infuf. p. cort. Per. c. vin. rub. 3xii.

12th. Took fome aperient folution laft
night, which gave him one ftool this morning; fkin cool; tongue and pulfe natural;
has an appetite; loathes the bark mixture.
Continue ——.'

The termination is not noticed, as the journal proceeds no farther until the period of my arrival on board. About this time many of the men were fent to the Calcutta hofpital, and it is poffible he may have been one of the number. He now complains that he has had nine calls daily, more or lefs, thefe five days, with griping and ftraining. He paffes nothing but glaire, and cannot lay on the right fide. Some pain and fulnefs is felt on pressure, in the region of the liver. He took N° 6 last night, and had eight or nine calls during the night. His tongue is foul at the root; his pulfe very quick, and rather fmart; and his fkin cool and moift .----N° 2 to be taken in fuch a manner as to operate first by vomit, and afterwards principally by the fkin. One pill of N° 7 to be taken every night.

22d.

23d. 7 o'clock A. M. Full Moon. He had five or fix ftill eafier calls laft night. His pulfe is quick and rather ftrong; his fkin cool and foft; and his tongue pale, rather foul, and at the extremity red.—N° 2 to be taken during the day.

5 o'clock P. M. N° 2 has not been taken. He has had fince morning nine yellow but not large ftools, with much lefs griping and ftraining than yefterday. The pain is rather lefs, but has removed higher up to the pit of the ftomach. His tongue is in the fame ftate; his pulfe quick, and rather fmart; and his fkin cool and moift. Three pills of N° 7 to be taken to-night, and N° 6 in the morning.

24th. 7 o'clock A. M. He had about twelve calls last night, with griping, but without straining. His tongue, pulse, and Q 2 skin

fkin are much the fame.---N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening. He has had fince morning about a dozen calls, with lefs griping, and very little ftraining. The difcharges were chiefly green. He paffes no blood. The pain at the ftomach is the fame, as well as his pulfe, fkin, and tongue.——N° I to be taken immediately.

25th. His difcharges by vomit were green. He had five or fix calls during the night. He fays, 'he finds himfelf much better.' The pain at the ftomach is particularly better. His tongue is clearer, his fkin cool and moift, and his pulfe as ufual. $---N^{\circ}$ 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening. He has had five or fix calls fince morning, with 'much lefs griping and ftraining.' The pain has returned. His ftools are yellow, and he vomited fome green matters to-day.——Six pills, N° 7, to be taken at bed-time.

26th. He had calls every half hour during the night. The ftraining is the fame as yefterday, but the griping is lefs. The pain is as bad as ufual. His pulfe is quick, and rather fmart; his fkin foft; and his tongue cineritious even to the tip.—N° 9 to be taken immediately.

Evening.

Evening. As he has accefs to animal food from his fituation on board, he has probably not confined himfelf ftrictly to the low diet. The paroxifms of ague have not recurred fince 22d. He feels great pain on preffure, and fome fwelling at the pit of the ftomach. He has had five or fix calls fince the morning with blood and ftraining; but not with griping. His fkin is too warm; his pulfe is very quick but lefs fmall; and his tongue the fame as before.—One pill, N° 7, to be continued every night.

27th. He had five or fix calls with griping and ftraining laft night. He fays he is better this morning. His fkin is cool; his pulfe rather full, though not very quick; and his tongue in the fame ftate, $--N^{\circ}$ 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening. He has had four or five calls, with much straining, but less griping. The pain in his fide has not returned, and that in the pit of the stomach is something better, He vomited some clear liquor in the forenoon. His pulse is rather full, with a sinart stroke; his skin cool; and his tongue clearer.——The pill to be continued every night

28th. He fays, 'he is much eafier all over' than he was. He felt an inclination to ftool feveral times last night, with great straining,

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but

but did not pass any thing whatever. He had no griping.——N° 9 to be taken immediately; and, after its operation, N° 2 during the day.

Evening. He has had four pretty eafy and yellow ftools fince morning, with much lefs griping and ftraining. He vomited fome 'clear water.' The pain is rather lefs, but he feels it particularly when he lays on the right fide. His tongue is clean; his fkin cool, but his pulfe quick, fmall, and fmart.

29th. Morning. He had three or four eafier calls last night, with some straining. N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening. He has only had two ftools fince morning, and those easier; but he vomited much green and bitter matters. He has still fome straining, but no griping. The pain at the pit of the stomach is something better to day. His tongue is not quite clear to day; his skin rather too warm; and his pulse very quick.——He continues to take the pill.

30th. Morning. He has had three ftools, with confiderable ftraining. The continued frequency of the ftools, as well as the ftraining, are probably only the effect of the medicines at prefent. He is very reftlefs at night; yet he does not feel an encreafe of heat at any

any period after the evening vifit. The pain is much eafier fince the last vifit.——N° 2 to be continued during the day.

Evening. He has had four or five yellow ftools, with much griping. His fkin is too warm; and his pulfe very frequent, and rather full.——Two pills of N°7 to be taken at night, and N° 9 in the morning. Sago, with fugar and wine, to be allowed for diet.

October 1ft. Morning. Laft Quarter. He had fix calls, with much griping and ftraining, laft night. He gets no reft at night; but the pain 'is quite or nearly gone.' His pulfe is only a little accelerated; his fkin cool; but his tongue pale. — The pill to be continued as ufual.

Afternoon, He is much the fame as in the morning. He has had five or fix yellow free ftools to day. He fays he has been very hot. His fkin is warm and moift; his pulfe very quick and fuller; but his tongue pretty clean.

2d. He vomited fome green matters, and has had four eafier calls. He feels nothing of the pain or fwelling at ftomach now. His tongue is a little pale; his fkin cool; and his pulfe very quick.—Three pills of N° 7 to be taken to-night

3d. Morning. He had fix calls, with a Q4 little

little straining, last night. He fays, he 'feels better.' His pulse is very quick; his tongue a little cineritious; and his skin cool.——An ounce of castor oil to be properly mixed with N° 6 and taken immediately.

Evening. He has had four eafy yellow ftools, without ftraining or griping. He fays, the medicine ' came all like water from him' in the firft ftool. It now appears, that in lieu of the fago or low diet, he has generally had broth, mutton, or fowl daily. His pulfe is very quick; his tongue lefs white; and his fkin pretty natural.—One drachm of mercurial ointment to be rubbed in over the ftomach and right fide daily. He is directed ftrictly to obferve low diet.

4th. Morning. He fays he has feldom any fleep. He had four pretty natural calls laft night, but with confiderable griping. His pulfe is now very little accelerated; his fkin cool; and his tongue white.——N° 3 to be taken to-day, and the ointment continued.

Evening. He has had three eafy, yellow, thin and pretty natural ftools. His urine is of a very high colour. His pulfe is ftill quick and a little full; his tongue rather pale, except at the edges; and his fkin pretty cool. ——The

-----The ointment and N° 3 to be continued.

5th. Morning. He had three eafy thin and yellow stools last night, and slept better than formerly. The pain has not returned, His pulse is quick; his skin cool; but his tongue less clear.——N° I to be taken immediately, and N° 3 to be continued two hours after the operation of the former.

Afternoon. He vomited 'green bitter ftuff.' The artery in his wrift is fuperficial. His pulfe is very quick. He is much better in every refpect.——The ointment and N° 3 to be continued.

7th. He is free from complaint. His mouth is not fore as yet.——The ointment to be continued.

8th. New Moon. He remains free from all complaint.——The ointment is recommended to be continued until his mouth be affected.

17th. Afternoon. He difcontinued attendance and the ointment from the 8th, as he thought himfelf perfectly well. He has now returned with the following complaint; a fevere pain in the right hypochondrium fince yesterday evening, which, for a short time at first, deprived him of the use of his limbs; no rest from the pain last a

night;

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night; much pain in his right fhoulder, and in his fide as well as his fhoulder, when he draws breath. He can only lay down on the right fide. His tongue is fomewhat cineritious; his pulfe exceedingly quick and fmall; yet his fkin is cool,—A large blifter to be applied to the fide, over the part which is most painful. N° 5 to be taken immediately. He is directed strictly to observe low diet.

18th. Afternoon. The pain in his fhoulder is better, His pulfe is exceedingly quick, above 120; and his fkin hot, though moift.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

20th. His fide is much eafier. He had about five calls yesterday. His urine is of a very high colour. His pulse beats 100. His skin and tongue are natural,——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 at bed-time.

21ft. Forenoon. He vomited much 'clear water' yesterday. His pulse beats 98.-----Two pills of N° 7 to be taken every night.

22d. 9 o'clock A. M. He had a dozen green, yellow, and thin ftools during the night. He thinks he may have paffed about two ounces each time. He fweated much last night and flept better than usual. He

He has taken N° 6 this morning. His pulfe beats about 96, and fmall; his tongue is not quite clear; but his fkin is very cool and foft.——The pills to be continued, 23d. Ten o'clock A. M. Full Moon. He had about eight or nine thin, yellow, and green ftools yefterday. He now fays he has had a dry cough in addition to his other complaints, and that remains much the fame. His fide however is much better. His fkin is warm and moift, but his pulfe quick, fmall, and fmart.——The pills to be continued.

24th. 9 o'clock A. M. He has had about ten yellow ftools, without griping or ftraining, but with fome drops of blood. His pulfe is 98, and pretty full; his tongue rather cinerious; and his fkin warm and foft. ——The pills to be continued.

25th. 9 o'clock A. M. All his fymptoms, except the cough, are better. He feels very little of the pain in his fide now. His urine is of a very high colour ftill. He had four ftools yefterday, and three laft night. He fays they were all 'coftive ftools, not like what he ufed to have.' He has not perfpired thefe three days. His pulfe beats 98; his tongue is a very little difcoloured; and his fkin cool and foft.——The pills to be continued,

26th.

26th. He gets better daily. However he ftill feels fome pain in the fide when he coughs. His cough has not abated. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue are in the fame ftate as at the laft vifit.——One pint of N° 5 to be taken to-day, and the pills to be continued.

27th. 9 o'clock A. M. He is greatly better in every refpect. He has fearcely any fenfation in the fide, and much lefs cough. He had feveral yellow, hot ftools yesterday with a little blood.——The pills to be con= tinued.

28th. He is much the fame in every refpect as yesterday——The pills to be continued.

29th. The cough and the pain in the fide are worfe to-day. He is very hoarfe, and expectorates much green and yellow defluxion. He meffes in the wet forecaftle, where it is impoffible he can keep his feet dry and warm. The mercury begins to affect his gums. He fweated much laft night. He has had five yellow ftools. His urine is ftill of a high colour. His pulfe is 82, and pretty full; his fkin cool and foft; but his tongue not quite of the natural colour. —The pills to be continued, and N° 3 taken to day.

30th.

30th. N° 3 operated by vomit. The difcharges were watery. He fweated much laft night. The hoarfenefs is better; but the cough very bad. He does not feel the pain in his fide to-day. He has had five yellowifh ftools with a little blood ftill. His urine is ftill of a high colour; his pulfe 108; his tongue a little pale; and his fkin cool and foft. He took two pills laft night.—— The pills to be difcontinued, and N° 5 taken daily fo as to procure four or five ftools.

31ft. Laft Quarter. The pain in his fide is much better, but the cough is very fevere. He had an hour's fit of fevere coughing laft night, with a copious expectoration of 'white lumps.' He has had four thin yellow ftools.——N° 5 to be continued. November 1ft. He fays he is free from

2d. His 'cold' gets better. His gums are still a little fore. His fide is entirely well. He has had three 'thinnish and yellowish stools.' His pulse is pretty full, smart and

and 96; his fkin natural; and his tongue pretty clear.---N° 5 to be continued as ufual.

3d. He is well in every refpect except the cough, which is fevere, and makes his head ach. His pulfe is very quick, and much interrupted either when he coughs or fuppreffes the cough.—A fudorific with fpiritus mindereri to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 as ufual in the morning.

4th. The cough was not fo bad laft night, and he flept pretty well. In other refpects he is perfectly well. He has had three yellowifh ftools, which were thicker than they ufed to be. He fays, when he draws his breath he feels ' a forenefs in his throat' at the upper extremity of the fternum. His urine is 'like water'; his pulfe 90, and natural, as well as his fkin; but his tongue is not quite clear.——N° 5 to be continued.

5th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulfe is quick ; the cold better than yesterday, and he had no cough last night. His stools are less yellow.—_N° 5 to be continued.

New Moon 6th. 7th. 4 o'clock P. M. He has ftill a little degree of cough, but fo trifling that he requests permission to do his duty. Let him clothe his breast well, and keep his feet dry.—Discharged.

He did not apply for affiftance during the remainder

remainder of the voyage, but feemed to acquire embonpoint before our arrival at Gravefend.

CASE III.

GEORGE MILLER.

1790. September 23d. Full Moon. In July he appears on the journal to have been under a course of mercury for a venereal complaint; and his name was on the lift for an ague during our voyage from Bengal to Madras, at which period he was fent to the hofpital at Madras. He returned on board a few days ago. His flature is rather low, but his perfon apparently ftrong; his complexion at prefent rather wan and fallow; his habit pretty full. He is thirty years of age. He took fome bark daily in the hofpital, and had no return of fever. He has had paroxifms of ague yesterday and to-day; a difficulty of breathing for a confiderable time; and a cough to-day. His tongue and fkin are natural, but his pulse rather quick. ----- N° 2 to be taken in the usual manner.

24th. 7 o'clock A. M. He vomited much green and yellow ftuff last night, and has had two stools. His urine is 'thick and 2 brown.'

brown'. His fkin, tongue, and pulfe are natural.——N° 2 to be repeated during the day.

Evening. The fever has not returned today. He has had fix yellow and hot ftools. His urine is rather clearer. The perfpiration has been much more confiderable than ufual. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue are natural.

25th. He fays, he 'feels himfelf well.'

Evening. He has had a very fevere attack of the cold, without any the leaft fenfible degree of the hot ftage to-day. He has had five yellow and lefs hot ftools fince morning. His fkin pulfe and tongue are ftill natural. ——Six pills of N° 7 to be taken at bedtime, and a large draught of fea-water in the morning.

26th. Evening. He took this morning about two pints of fea-water with a handful of common falt in it. This vomited him three times, and operated a great deal by ftool. The difcharges upwards were yellow latterly; downwards, hot and yellow at firft with ftraining, afterwards clear and eafy. He has had 'a great appetite' to-day, and no fymptom whatever of fever, or any other complaint.

27th. He drank a pint of fea-water this morning.

Evening

Evening. He has had the cold, but not the leaft hot ftage of ague to-day. The falt water has not purged him. He had head-ach during the attack. His pulfe is full and rather frequent; but his tongue and fkin pretty natural.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time; and the draught of feawater with common falt in the morning.

28th. Morning. He had one ftool laft night, and one this morning. His fkin, tongue and pulfe are perfectly natural.

Evening. He has had feven yellow and rather hot ftools during the day. His pulfe is pretty frequent and fmart; fkin perfectly cool; and tongue tolerably clean. A fcabby eruption has appeared about the mouth thefe two days.—N° 2 to be taken during the evening.

29th. Evening. The ague did not return to-day; but he has had a head-ach from the ufual period of the paroxifin, which has lafted all day. He took the fea-water and falt this morning, and has had three light yellow ftools. His fkin is quite cool; tongue nearly clear; and pulfe rather frequent. N° 2 to be continued.

30th. Morning. He has still a little head-ach.

Evening. The fea-water has continued R to

to give him copious yellow ftools. The head-ach vanished entirely about 10 A. M. but he coughs more, and complains of pain and stiffness down the right thigh and leg. ----N° 2 to be continued.

October 1ft, Morning. Laft Quarter. He took two fpoons full of falt in a quart of falt water this morning, has had four yellow ftools, and has vomited much phlegm. The cough is very troublefome, and feems the principal caufe of the head-ach at prefent. His urine is quite clear.

Afternoon. He had a regular paroxifm of ague in the forenoon; and above a dozen of ftools fince morning, hot, but not fo yellow. —Let him take an ounce and a half of red bark in the twenty four hours.

2d. Evening. He has had four brown and thicker ftools. His cough is loofer; and his pulfe, tongue and fkin natural.—— N° 11 to be continued.

3d. Morning. He has been free from fymptoms of fever. The cough is better. He had one large ftool laft night, and one this morning.——N° 11 to be continued.

Evening. He has had two ftools fince morning, but no fymptom whatever of fever. He fays he is quite well.——Half the proportion of N[•] 11 to be taken.

4th.

4th. Morning. He continues well. It feems be has had the cough fix weeks, but it does not give him much trouble in general. -----The fame quantity of bark to be continued.

Evening. He continues well.

5th. Morning. He fays he acquires ftrength daily. He eats chiefly pea-foup for dinner .---- Three drachms of bark to be taken daily.

New Moon 8th. 10th. He difcontinued attendance till to-day. He has had very fevere griping, purging, and straining all last night, but no return whatever of the fever. The cough grows better daily.----N° 6 to be taken immediately.

15th. Afternoon. First Quarter. He again difcontinued attendance, and has again returned with griping, purging, and fraining. The calls are very frequent, five or more in an hour. The anus is very fore. His appetite is good, his skin dry, and his countenance rather flushed; but his pulse is not quick, nor his tongue remarkably foul.----N° 5 to be taken immediately.

16th. Morning. He was wet yesterday morning; to which he attributes the increase of his complaints, for he has had them fix days. He continued taking three or four R 2 drachms

drachms of bark daily for a week after the aguifh fymptoms left him. The old cough feems to be much the fame. The ftraining is better, but not the griping.——N° 5 to be taken during the day, three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and an ounce and a half of caftor oil in the morning. To be confined ftrictly to fago diet.

Evening. His ftools have been lefs frequent to-day, and rather more copious each time. The ftraining is better, but not the griping. His pulfe is full and frequent; his fkin dry and rather hot; and his tongue pretty natural. He has fome degree of giddinefs, and the pain acrofs the belly conftantly; but it is worfe when he goes to ftool.

17th. Morning. He used to have between twenty and thirty calls during the night, but had only seven last night, which were much easier than usual. He had two calls this morning with very little straining, but with the usual griping.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

Evening. He has had eleven much eafier and larger calls during the day.

18th. Morning. He had only four eafy calls last night, without straining, but with the usual griping. The griping pain is permanent

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permanent crofs the abdomen. He is pretty eafy when he lays on his back; but on his left fide the pain is particularly troublefome. He had one large ftool this morning, ' quite white.'-Two pills of N° 7 to be taken every night.

19th. Morning. He had fix ftools laft night, with the ufual pain in the belly, but no ftraining.

20th. He had only two calls last night, which he attributes to the pills. He fays he is 'bravely' now.-Diet and pills to be continued.

21ft. He is directed to return to his duty, but to continue to take one pill of N° 7 every night for a week longer.

Full Moon 23d. 25th. 9 A. M. He was feized with great giddinefs and pain in his back this morning, fucceeded by fhivering, which has been followed by excetfive heat. His pulse is 112, full and ftrong; his face rather flushed. His body has been conftantly open .---- Nº 1 to be taken immediately, four pills Nº 7 at bed-time, and Nº 6 in the morning.

26th. N° 1 made him very fick yesterday, but operated only downwards. His stools were thin, yellow, and very hot. The pills and falts have also operated ftrongly, and R 3 his

his ftools this morning are the fame. His pulfe is 108 and full; his tongue clean, and his fkin rather dry. He has fome head-ach. He had general and profufe fweating all day yefterday, laft night, and this morning. His urine is rather 'yellow.' He continues to do his duty.——N° 5 to be taken during the day. N° 7 and N° 6 to be repeated.

27th. 9 A. M. The paroxifm recurred about midnight with great violence, pain in the back, and delirium. He got wet on duty at night. He fweated much after the fit. His pulfe is 116, fkin dry, tongue clean, and countenance rather flushed. He has had about twelve yellow, green, and very hot ftools. His urine is much the fame, but he can fcarcely retain it. He has alfo catarrhal fymptoms.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and two ounces of caftor oil to-morrow morning.

28th. 9 A. M. He did not vomit till he took the oil this morning, when he was much worked both ways. The difcharges upwards were copious, yellow, green, and bitter; downwards, chiefly yellow, thin, and not fo hot as before. His pulfe is 108; tongue rather pale in the middle; fkin warm, and a little moift; and urine much clearer than it was. He has not felt the former pain crofs

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crofs the abdomen.----N° 5 to be taken during the day.

29th. He has not had any return of the paroxifm; but he fays the fever is always on him. He is not fenfible of exacerbation at any particular period of the day. He has had about twenty ftools, not quite fo yellow as they were. He fweats very frequently, and all night. His urine is pretty clear; tongue cleaner; fkin too warm; pulfe 100, full and foft.——N° 1 to be taken before bed-time.

30th. He had a very flight return of the paroxifm about 3 o'clock A. M. preceded and followed by profuse fweats. His thirst, which has been severe and constant is greatly diminished. His pulse is 100, full and soft; skin warm and soft; tongue pretty florid, and natural. N° 1 operated downwards, and excited nausea without vomiting. He has had seven stools, less yellow, and much less hot. His urine ' is rather browner.' — Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

31ft. Laft Quarter. He had five thin and paler ftools yefterday afternoon, two pretty natural at night, and fix pale and liquid this morning. His pulfe, fkin, and tongue are natural. He fays he feels well in every refpect, except a flight degree of R 4 giddinefs;

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giddinefs; but he expects the paroxifm at noon.----N° I to be taken in two dofes.

November 1st. 9 A. M. He is quite well, and difcharged. He and all the other patients, nearly, have done their duty in the day-time, when the paroxism was not immediately on them.

He was not on the fick lift during the remainder of the voyage, about three months.

SHIP FEVER,

Complicated with SCORBUTIC and VENE-REAL SYMPTOMS.

CASE I.

ARCHIBALD CALL, Seaman.

1790. September 19th.

A RCHIBALD CALL has an emaciated and wrinkled appearance, from which his age might be conjectured to be about fifty; yet he declares it is not near fo much. He feems weakly. He appears, on the medical journal of the fhip, to have been treated by another practitioner, from the 25th of August 1789 to the 20th of September, when he was cured and difcharged, for an ulcer on his leg. He took a grain of calomel every night to the 13th, a laxative on that day, and bark from the 14th to the 20th, the period of his difcharge.

His name appears again on the journal under

under date of the 21st of April 1790. The following is copied literally from the journal.

He has had a fevere cough for three days. His pulfe is frequent and full; his tongue and fkin natural.——N° 2 to be taken during the day, and three pills of N° 7 in the morning.

20th. The fever returned yefterday with fome fhivering. He vomited and purged much yellow, green, and bitter matters. The pains are fomewhat better. His pulfe is very full and ftrong; his fkin cool and foft; and his tongue rather pale.——N° 6 to be taken immediately.

Evening. The fever is on him now, and was preceded by fhivering. He has had about eight greenifh flools and large. His fkin is dry and hot; his pulfe full, ftrong, and frequent; and his tongue the fame as before.

before. Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at night, and N° 9 in the morning.

21ft. 7 o'clock A. M. The fever left him laft night about 11 o'clock. He has had three ftools this morning. His pulfe is full and frequent, his fkin cool, and his tongue as ufual.——N° 2 to be taken during the day.

22d. The fever returned with much lefs feverity laft night; but the cough was very fevere, and he fays he fpat up blood.—— N° 2 to be continued, and ten ounces of blood to be taken from his arm.

Evening. He now fays he has had the cough three weeks; it is better fince he was bled. He is not fenfible that he has had any fymptom whatever of fever to-day.— Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

23d. 7 o'clock A. M. Full Moon. He has not experienced any return of the fever. The cough is ftill troublefome, though much lefs. He does not feem to expect a cure of it. His pulfe is flow and finall; his tongue nearly natural; and his fkin as in health. ——One grain of opium to be taken in a draught at night.—Difcharged.

October 3d. Archibald Call complains again of very fevere cough, ' fore cheft,' and pains

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pains in his fhoulders, hips and knees. He has had 'very fore lumps' on his fternum and ribs thefe four days. His pulfe is very quick; his tongue clear; and his fkin too warm. —Venefection to be performed immediately to the quantity of eight ounces, and N° 6 taken as foon as poffible.

4th. Morning. The bleeding and the medicine were neglected. His pulfe is full, and rather frequent and ftrong; his fkin very moift and cool; and his tongue a little pale. ——The venefection to be performed now, and the falts to be taken immediately after.

Evening. He is not better; the pains have not abated The phyfic operated well. His pulfe is fomewhat accelerated and fmall; his fkin a little too warm; and his tongue a little pale.——N° 3 to be taken according to the prefcription.

5th. Morning. His 'ftomach is not fo fore as it was.' The pains, particularly of the left fhoulder, are not better; but his cough is rather lefs. His fkin is cool and moift; his pulfe rather quick, fmall, and inconfiderably tenfe; and his tongue tending towards a cineritious fur near the root and middle.—-A vomit to be taken immediately, and, two hours after its operation, N° 3 as before.

Afternoon. He evacuated by vomit a watery

tery liquor and fome green matters. The pains are much the fame; the forenefs better; and the cough a little abated. He has had two ftools to-day.——N° 3 to be continued. The common mercurial pill is directed to be prepared for him.

7th. N° 3 to be continued.

8th. New Moon. Nº 3 to be continued.

9th. He fays the medicine has eafed the cough greatly, and the pains confiderably. He fweats much, and the pains are not more violent at night now than during the day. His pulfe is quick and fmall; his tongue a little white; and his fkin cool. N° 3 to be continued.

10th. Nº 3 to be continued.

Evening. He has alfo had pains in the fhins, which are not worfe at night now than in the day. He complains very little of thirft. His fkin is dry; his pulfe quick; and his tongue white. — Three pills of N° 7 to be taken to-night, and N° 9 in the morning.

11th. Noon. He has had feven ftools; the first glareous, in lumps, and yellow; the others thin and yellow. The pains are rather better. He has appetite, and gratifies it occasionally with falt beef, pea-foup, &c. He was

was directed from the first to observe low diet. His pulse is more full and flow; his skin cool and moist; and his tongue with a greater tendency to brown.——N° 2 to be taken to-day.

12th. His age is faid to be only thirtyfour. He fweats lefs than in health. His urine is of a high colour; his pulfe more full and ftrong than ufual, as well as quicker. -----N° 2 to be continued.

13th. Morning. The pains are better. He has had fince laft vifit fix yellow ftools of a middling confiftence. He now fays he fweats much at night. His tongue and fkin are natural, but his pulfe quick and rather finall.——N° 2 to be continued.

Evening. He has had a paroxifm of ague to-day. His pulfe is full and frequent, and his fkin too hot.——N°1 to be taken immediately, three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and a large draught of falt water early in the morning.

14th. Evening. He has had feven large glareous ftools this morning. The pains and cough are not better to-day. His urine is of a very high colour; his pulfe full and frequent; his fkin dry and rather hot; and his tongue clearer.—N° 5 to be taken immediately. 15th.

15th. Morning. First Quarter. He had four large thin stools during the night. The pains are a little better, but the cough seems worfe. His urine is not of a very high colour to-day. His skin, pulse, and tongue are pretty natural, but the latter a little pale. He is excessively dirty, and even squalid in his appearance. He is also deficient in clothing, particularly in the article of proper shoes.——N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Afternoon. He had two large glareous ftools to-day. His pulfe is full and frequent; his fkin rather hot and dry, but his tongue clear.—_N° 4 to be taken at bed-time.

Evening. His pains are very fevere; his pulse full, and very frequent, and his skin hot.

17th. Morning. He has in general three or four ftools daily. His fkin is hot, though not dry; his pulfe rather frequent, and not full, and his tongue a little white.——A pill of two grains of calomel to be taken every night, fince the common mercurial pills cannot be properly prepared. Particular care

to

to be taken that he be ftrictly confined to low diet.—He feems hitherto to have indulged in every latitude of fhip diet.

Afternoon. He fays his pains are always worfe in the afternoon. His pulfe is very quick, full and rather ftrong; his fkin hot, but not very dry, and his tongue very clean.

18th. Afternoon. His pains are very great at prefent. His pulfe is above 120, and his fkin very hot.——Four pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 5 in the morning.

19th. Morning. By miftake he took N° 4 in lieu of the pills, but he did not fleep better than ufual. His pulfe beats 120; his fkin is warm and moift, and his tongue white.——N° 2 to be taken during the day; three pills of N° 7 at night, and N° 5 in the morning.

20th. He is pretty free from feverifh fymptoms this morning. The paroxifm of ague has not returned fince the 13th. He had three ftools yesterday, one last night, and two this morning. N° 2 to be taken during the day, and two pills of N° 7 at bedtime, in lieu of the pill of calomel.

21st. Forenoon. Symptoms of fourvy appear, in addition to his other complaints.— Let him be allowed fpruce beer, and two ounces

ounces of lime juice daily, with half an ounce of red bark. Low diet is still deemed preferable to any other which the ship affords at prefent.

22d. 9 o'clock A. M. His tongue is rather pale, his pulfe full, pretty ftrong, and 100, and his fkin warm and moift. He did not take the bark yesterday. — The medicine and other articles to be continued as directed, and N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

23d. 10 o'clock A. M. Full Moon. He fays the lime juice ' cuts the phlegm on his ftomach, and brings it up eafily.' The pains are as ufual. He did not take the falts this morning.—___N° 6 to be taken to-morrow, and the other articles continued as before.

24th. 9 o'clock A. M. He took the falts yefterday rather late, as well as the bark. He had eight thin and yellow ftools yefterday, and two at night. His urine ' from a high colour like brandy' is now pale and clear; and his pulfe beats oftener than 120.— One pill of N° 7 to be taken every night, and the lime juice, bark and other articles continued.

25th. 9 o'clock A. M. The prefent treatment to be continued.

26th. 9 o'clock A. M. His fkin is hot, and his pulfe quick and full.——N° 5 to be taken S 2 fo

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fo as to procure feveral stools, and the other remedies continued.

27th. 9 o'clock A. M. In lieu of N° 5, he took N° 1 yesterday, which operated downwards only, and gave him several yellow stools. He is much the same in every respect. His urine is of a high colour; and his pulse, skin, and tongue as usual.——The same course to be continued.

28th. 9 o'clock A. M. The pains in his knees are very bad. His pulfe beats 116 and full.——A blifter to be applied to one knee. N° 5 to be taken to-day, and the bark difcontinued during its operation.

29th. Noon. The pains are rather better to-day, in other refpects there is no alteration. His fkin however is cooler. He vomited ' clear water' yefterday, and purged much yellow liquid. His teeth are loofe and his gums fore; but he has no encreafed difcharge of faliva.—The pill to be difcontinued; the bark taken as ufual, and a gargle of allum and water to be ufed.

30th. He is not fenfible of the former pain in the knee, though he feels fome from the blifter. It has not abated in the other knee. His pulfe beats 88, full and foft; his ikin, which is always moift now, is cooler than ufual, and his tongue is in the fame ftate.

ftate. The fcorbutic fymptoms have not encreafed, except the blotch about the ankle, which now looks blacker in one fpot.—— The fame courfe of remedies to be continued.

31ft. Laft Quarter. The pain in each knee is once more as fevere as it was previous to the application of the blifter. His pulfe is not fo full or fo quick as ufual. ——He is directed to perfevere in the fame courfe.

2d. 9 o'clock A. M. He fays the pains in the joints have much abated within thefe two-days; and he can now undrefs without affiftance. His appetite is always good, nor is he often thirfty. His teeth are ftill loofe. His pulfe beats 124, full, but not quite free; his fkin is warm and moift; his tongue natural and his urine red. He has had three yellow loofe ftools, latterly rather green.—— Let him perfevere in the fame courfe.

3d. 9 o'clock A. M. The pains continue a little better. His pulse beats 112, and full as well as free. He still continues ex-

4 o'clock P. M. His pulfe beats 82, and lefs full.

4th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulfe beats 140, and much fmaller than ufual. The pains are much eafier, as well as the cough. His fkin and tongue are natural. 5th. 9 o'clock A. M. He continues as well as yesterday.——The fame remedies to be continued.

New Moon 6th.—7th, 40'clock P. M. His pulfe beats 104, and full. The pains are very fevere to-day. He has been pretty free from pain for fome days.—N° 6 to be taken in the morning, and the other remedies continued.

8th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulfe is 128, and lefs free; yet he fays the pains are better. The cough feems much better. The fame remedies to be continued.

9th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulse beats 116, and

and full, and his fkin is too warm. He has had fix thin and yellow ftools. The pains are better to-day.——The fame courfe to be continued.

10th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pains are the fame; and his pulfe beats 112, free and full. ——The fame courfe to be continued.

11th. He is much the fame. The remedies to be continued.

12th. 9 o'clock A. M. The pains are fomewhat better to-day. Small, hard and fore fwellings begin to appear on his forehead. His pulfe beats at leaft 132, and fmaller than ufual.——Let him take one and a half grain of opium to-night, and an additional half grain every night afterwards, till countermanded. The other remedies to be continued.

13th. 9 o'clock A. M. First Quarter. His pulse beats 116, full and free. The pains are easier to-day, but did not abate in the least last night.—All the remedies to be continued.

4 o'clock P. M. His pulfe and fkin are much the fame as in the morning.

14th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulfe beats 112, full and pretty free. He fays the opium makes him perfpire much at night. The pains are eafieft during the fweats. He feems

more emaciated. The pains are very fevere to-day .---- The remedies to be continued.

4 o'clock P. M. His pulse beats 128, full, but not quite free.

4 o'clock P. M. His pulse beats 136. full, but not free; his skin is hotter than in the morning, and the pains arevery fevere just now.

16th. 9 o'clock A. M. His pulse is 108, and not fo full. He took four grains of opium about 5 o'clock P. M. but the pains did not abate earlier than ufual.---- The remedies to be continued.

4 o'clock P. M. His pulle beats 108, full and free. The pains are on him.

17th. 9 o'clock, A. M. The fcorbutic fymptoms are much the fame; but the cough is worfe than usual. His pulse beats 116, and not fo full. His tongue and fkin experience

perience no alteration.——The remedies to be continued.

18th. 9 o'clock A. M. He thinks the opium occafions watchfulnefs; nor does it feem to be of any fervice to his complaints. Seven grains were taken laft night. CASE II.

WILLIAM HARRISON, Joiner.

1790. October 21st. Forenoon. He is about twenty-three years of age, of a tolerably robust

He has neglected venereal buboes, pains in his bones, particularly fevere at night, with ftiffnefs of his joints, and other fcorbutic fymptoms—One grain of calomel and half a grain of opium to be taken every night; two ounces of lime juice, fpruce beer, and half an ounce of bark daily.

His pains are not in the leaft relieved, and very fevere.—His medicines to be continued.

3d. He took three grains of opium laft night. The pains were much lefs fevere; and he had a pretty found fleep. The fcorbutic fpots, and the fore in his groin, are as ufual. His gums are found.——His medicines to be continued.

4th. The pains were ftill lefs, and he flept almost the whole night. He fays 'he is getting quite well.' His legs are ftronger. He is not fo lame. The finus in the groin is as ufual.——His medicines to be continued.

5th. 9 A. M. He continues improving. He had fome naufea last night.——The fame medicines to be continued.

New Moon 6th.—7th. The pains in his limbs have entirely left him. The finus however in the groin is rather worfe. He took

took four grains of opium last night.— His medicines to be continued, and the finus to be opened.

8th. 9 A. M. He had naufea and giddinefs laft night from the opium; but no pain whatever.——His medicines to be continued.

9th. 9 A. M. He had giddinefs and heat laft night. He fays, 'it feems as if the bones of his joints moved against one another, and were out.' They are fore on preffure. —. To take the fame quantity of opium to night as last night.

10th. 9 A. M. The finus has been opened, and looks well. He enjoyed found reft last night, without pain of any kind, giddiness, or nausea. He still feels a general foreness of the bones on pressure.——The opium to be encreased half a grain as usual.

11th. He felt the pains in a flight degree till midnight. The opium did not affect him particularly. His body is regular. ——His medicines to be continued.

12th. The pains did not trouble him laft night; but he complains of a general forenefs on motion or preffure, and of weaknefs. He did not take the additional half grain of opium at night. His body continues quite open. His pulfe is 104, of the natural ftrength; his fkin and urine natural; his 2 tongue

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tongue rather white. He is generally thirsty at night, during which he makes water about seven or eight times.——His medicines to be continued.

13th. First Quarter. He fays his pains are worse than ever.——His medicines to be continued.

14th. 9 A. M. He has had the pains very fevere thefe two nights; commencing with fome fhivering, and exceffive heat, terminating in profuse fweat, which feemed to take away the pains: thefe continued during the hot stage. He was very restless all night; but had no thirst. He has lost all appetite within these few days. His urine is of a very high colour. His ankles were much fwelled last night. He has had these five days a node on the right shin. He had one 'purging' ftool with griping yefterday morning. His pulse is 116, and full; his tongue rather cineritious; his fkin too hot, though not dry .---- N° 5 to be taken during the day, and his other medicines difcontinued.

4 P. M. His pulse is 116; his skin too warm.

15th. 9 A. M. The paroxism with the pains returned last night. He has had four stools. The pains and foreness of the limbs, 4 are

are much better in the day-time. His pulfe is 100; his fkin cool; his tongue rather lefs foul. His urine is generally clear and pale in the morning, and of a very high colour in the evening.—N° I to be taken immediately; and N° 5 after its complete operation.

4 P. M. He difcharged fome flime by vomit with his food, but no green, yellow, bitter, or four matters. His pulfe is 84; his fkin pretty cool; his tongue much clearer. His mouth has not been fore at any period of his complaints.

16th. 9 A. M. He had the flighteft poffible fenfe of fhivering laft night, fucceeded by very little heat and no fweat. The pains were very trifling, and he flept pretty well all night. He fays he feels much better today. He has had five or fix thin yellow ftools. His pulfe is 82, full, and of a proper ftrength; his tongue is ftill foul towards the root; his fkin natural. The fore in his groin looks red, as well as the furrounding fkin, but it does not feem to heal.—N° 5 to be taken during the day.

17th. 9 A. M. He had no fymptom whatever of fever last night. He felt pains in his left knee for about fifteen minutes, and a very f evere pain in his left fide for an

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hour.

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hour. During the reft of the night he flept well. His pulfe is 88, of the natural ftrength; his fkin natural; his tongue as before; his urine clear. The lime juice is now expended. ----N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

18th. He enjoyed excellent reft laft night without pain of any kind. He has now no other complaint but the fore in his groin, which is rather better; and when he bends his left knee he finds fome difficulty in ftreightening it again, 'as if the joint was out.' He has had two ftools.——Four drachms of bark to be taken daily; a vitriolic wafh to be ufed for the fore.

19th. He had the pain very fevere in the left fide laft night; which went away when he walked on deck, and returned when he came below. He is well in other refpects.

20th. His left knee is rather ftiff after fitting down for fome time. The pain in the fide came on exactly at the fame hour, but lasted only half an hour, instead of two hours, its former duration.

21ft. Full Moon. The pain in his fide recurred with great violence laft night, and lafted two hours. He fays he is weaker. —A large blifter to be applied over the part at fun-fet.

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December

December 1st. He has had five or fix limes daily fince our arrival at St. Helena, on the 21st of last month. He has fwellings on his fingers and shins. He has not felt the pains for some time past; but the fore does not heal.

2d. 4 P. M. A pill of one grain of calomel and one of opium to be taken every night; and two drachms of bark daily.

4th. His diet has been of fresh meat and vegetables, fince the 21st of last month. He had a confiderable degree of fever last night. -----N° 1 to be taken at fun-fet.

6th. 9 A. M. New Moon. The fore is healing in one part. He had no other feverifh fymptoms but thirft laft night. The vomit operated. He has pain and forenefs in his jaws, fhoulders, &c.——The pill to be continued; and N° 6 taken in the morning.

7th. 9 A. M. His hand is very fliff. He fweated much all night; and was eafy, though he did not fleep.

8th. 9 A. M. He has no appetite. —— N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

10th. N° 9 to be taken in the morning.

13th. First Quarter. He has continued to take the pill every night. The fore heals. T 2 In

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In other refpects he is much the fame.— Two ounces of tamarinds to be allowed daily. The pill to be continued.

14th. He has had fome purging and griping these five days.——N° 9 to be taken in the morning.

16th. The purging continues. He complains of cough.——The pill to be continued.

19th. He is much better. The pill to be continued.

20th. The fore is nearly healed.——The pill and tamarinds to be continued.

Full Moon 21st.—22d. He gets better daily.——The medicines to be continued.

23d. The fore is almost healed; and he is nearly well in every respect.——The medicines to be continued.

27th. He has been improving daily: but a node with pain begins to appear now.—— Half a grain of calomel to be added to the pill.

28th. Last Quarter. He continues better.----His medicines to be continued.

29th. He had fome pain last night. The nodes are larger.—His medicines to be continued.

30th. He is better.——His medicines to be continued.

31ft.

31st. His ankles fwell. He had pain last night.———N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

1791, January 2d. His diet has lately been of falt provisions. The weakness of his knees has returned. His ankles continue to swell; but the pains have not recurred.——His medicines to be continued.

3d. He complains of pain and forenefs in the joints of his knee and shoulder.——His medicines to be continued.

New Moon 4th.—5th. The fore is not healed as yet. He is much the fame in other refpects.—His medicines to be continued.

20th. Full Moon. He has continued to take his medicines, yet the fore is not healed. Except ftiffnefs of his joints however he has no other complaint at prefent. ——His medicines to be difcontinued, and his diet to be principally of fresh vegetables.

CASE III.

TIMOTHY GUY, Quartermaster.

1790. October 23d. 10 A. M. Full Moon. On the 21st he applied for affistance on T 3 account account of fome fcorbutic blotches on his extremities; he was ordered two ounces of lime juice and four drachms of bark daily, with wine, fago, &c. He is about forty years of age. He now complains that he has had a purging nearly two months, which he attributes to the quantity of rice in his diet. He has about fix calls in the twenty-four hours, of a pretty natural confiftence and quantity, yellow, and without any griping and straining. He had a flight paroxism of ague on the 21ft, in the morning, which has recurred to-day .---- The bark to be difcontinued. N° 5 to be taken during the day; three pills of Nº 7 at bed-time, and Nº 6 in the morning.

24th. 9 A. M. He had a great number of yellow ftools yefterday, of various confiftence, two laft night, and four this morning, 'like horfe's urine,' mixed with green. He had a ftrong paroxifm yefterday, which did not terminate in fweat; but he had a gentle perfpiration on him all night. His pulfe is 88, and pretty natural. He fays he is greatly better in every refpect. He does not appear to have any complaint this morning.—N° 5 to be taken occafionally, fo as to keep the body perfectly lax.

25th.

25th. 9 A. M. He had about fourteen stools yesterday, chiefly yellow; and fix of the fame kind this morning. He feels the paroxism approaching. His pulse is 108; his skin and tongue natural. He has thrown up some food just now.—N° 1 to be taken immediately.

26th. He had the paroxism yesterday as strong as usual. He did not sweat after the fit, but enjoyed a gentle perspiration all night. He had five stools yesterday. His belly swelled, he thinks, at least two inches last night, and subsided with discharges of wind both ways. His skin is cool; his pulse 108; his tongue natural; his urine of a very high colour.—N° 1 to be taken immediately; four pills of N° 7 at 6 o'clock P. M. and N° 6 at two o'clock in the morning.

28th. He vomited with much effort on the 26th, but did not bring up any thing confiderable, except the aliment he had taken. He was a good deal purged. He had the paroxifm for five hours yefterday. His pulfe is 100, and pretty full; his fkin cool; his tongue rather pale.—One ounce of bark to be taken before eight o'clock in the morning,

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30th.

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30th. He had a very flight attack of the ague yefterday, which lafted altogether about an hour and a half. He has had many ftools fince his laft attendance; fome yellow, fome rather black, and of a natural confiftence. His urine is 'a little highcoloured.' He has perfpiration in bed. His pulfe is 108, full and ftrong; his tongue clear, and his fkin natural. The fcorbutic blotches are rather worfe. He has headach occafionally for a fhort time.—One pint of mutton broth daily to be fubfituted in lieu of the panada, gruel, fago. One ounce of bark to be taken before 9 A. M. tomorrow.

31ft. 9 A. M. Laft Quarter. His pulfe is 132, full, but not free. He fays, the paroxifin came on to-day very flightly, with a fenfation of ' inward cold,' and fevere pain in the loins. His fkin is rather hot. He fays, he is ' hot outfide, and cold within.' His tongue has a triffing degree of palenefs. His knees are weak. He had occafional cold fhiverings during the night; but he flept pretty well, and fweated a little when he could not fleep. He thinks the paroxifm will not prove fo ftrong as the laft. Since laft vifit he has had five or fix yellow ftools, ' like

* like a little child's.'——An ounce of bark to be continued after the fit.

November 1st. He had the paroxism today much the fame as yesterday. His pulse is 102, and full; his tongue white and foul. The fcorbutic blotches are better. He feels every three or four hours a fwelling in the abdomen, which he attributes to wind, and which he fays, rifes as high as his ftomach and throat, and occasions some difficulty of breathing. He has occafional head-achs, and, fince these complaints came on, some wheezing in his breathing. He does not appear perfectly fober just now; yet as he has the character of a very fober man, his incorrectnefs may be the effect of his complaints. -The bark to be difcontinued. Nº 5 to be taken in fuch quantities daily as to procure three or four ftools.

2d. He flept better than ufual. His throat is fore; and the velum pendulum fwelled and inflamed. He complains much of giddinefs fince he rofe, which continues for a minute at a time occafionally. His knees are fore. He thinks himfelf better to-day than yefterday, though the latter was his ' ill day.' His pulfe is 124, full, but not quite free; his fkin hot; his tongue pretty clear. He has had three very natural ftools fince laft

last visit. His urine is rather of a high colour yet, but not so much so as it was.—— The medicine to be continued. He did not get N° 5 last night.

3d. He has had three pretty natural ftools. N° 5, of which he has taken about twenty ounces, made him rather fick. His occafional giddinefs continues. He had 'tolerable reft' laft night. His urine is as in health. The forenefs of his knees continues, The giddinefs attacks him chiefly on looking up or ftooping down. He has not had any return of the paroxifm of fever. His pulfe is 108, and rather finall; his tongue ftill pale; his fkin natural. He has continued to take the lime juice.—One glafs full of N° 5 to be continued to be taken every two or three hours.

4th. His pulfe is 104, of the natural ftrength and fulnefs. He ftill complains of the giddinefs; and objects, which fuddenly catch his fight, have a yellow or greenifh tinge. His knees are rather ftronger; his tongue not quite clear; his urine rather of a high colour. He has had three natural brown ftools.——His medicines to be continued.

New Moon 6th.—7th, 4 P. M. He has continued to take his medicines, and has remained

mained free from feverifh fymptoms till today, when he was attacked with a flight degree of ague. He has had three or four natural ftools daily. The giddinefs has left him, except when he keeps his head down for any length of time. The fcorbutic blotches are better. His pulfe is 100. N° 5 to be continued.

8th. 9 A. M. His pulfe is 102, and full; his tongue and fkin natural. His medicine to be continued.

He remained free from all fymptoms of fever during the remainder of the voyage. The fcorbutic fymptoms encreafed before our arrival at St. Helena, where they were nearly removed.

CASE IV.

WILLIAM KNOX, Invalid Paffenger.

1790. Last Quarter. 28th.—December 29th He has a node on his skin, severe nocturnal pains, fores about the anus, and eruptions in other parts. He was invalided for these complaints, for which he took much mercury in vain at St. Helena. N° 6 to be taken tomorrow morning, and a grain of opium tomorrow night; to be encreased to an additional half grain every night after.

30th.

30th. His medicine to be continued.

1791. January 2d. He has fever at night, with much thirst, and pains shooting through his thighs and loins; 'his sless is as if dogs were gnawing it' at night. He has no appetite. His skin is rather hot and dry.—— The opium to be discontinued; three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

3d. He has had many green, and yellow flimy ftools.——The pills to be repeated at bed-time, and N° 6 in the morning.

4th. New Moon. The weather is a great deal colder. He had no fever laft night; and his pains are better.——Two pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time.

8th. He has not had any return of fever; but the pains continue the fame.——The opium to be taken as prefcribed before.

10th. The pains are much the fame. His skin is feverish at present.———N° I to be taken at bed-time.

11th. He vomited much bilious matter.

The feverish fymptoms did not return, but the pains continued as usual; although he

WARM CLIMATES. he took the opium as prefcribed to the 23d January.

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CASE V.

JAMES MITCHELL, Invalid Passenger.

1790. December 31st. His age is only twenty-one. He took much mercury, and was falivated at St. Helena, on account of pains in his bones, and other venereal fymptoms, of which he still complains .--- Let him take a grain of opium to-night, and increase the quantity half a grain every night.

1790. January 1st.---N° 6 to be taken in the morning.

2d. He has fever at night, and pains in the thighs, fmall of the back and loins. He was thirfty last night, and fweated much. His tongue is clean; but his fkin is dry and rather hot .--- The opium to be difcontinued; three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

3d. He was very feverish last night; and the pains were very fevere. ---- The pills to be repeated, and N° 6 taken in the morning.

4th. New Moon. The weather is much colder. He had no return of fever last night, 8

5th. His ftools have been green and yellow. The feverish fymptoms have not recurred, and the pains are much better. He has also venereal warts.——Three pills of N° 7 to be taken at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

6th. He had a fevere attack of fever laft night.

7th. The fever did not return last night. -----N° 1 to be taken at bed-time.

8th.----N° 9 to be taken in the morning.

9th. The fever has not returned, and the pains are flight.

10th. He appears to have a feverifh skin and pulse at prefent.----N° 1 to be taken.

11th. He discharged much bilious matter by vomit.

First Quarter 12th. 13th. The course of opium to be continued.

15th. He has not had any return of fever. His pains are better.



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INSTRUCTIVE FAILURES, with Dissections and REMARKS.

CASE I.

RALPH PICKERING, with the Diffection, Ec.

1790. October 14th.

ALPH PICKERING, late of the Bengal artillery, age 33, has been afflicted about fix days with fevere purging and griping, and fometimes with ftraining. He has calls every hour of a flimy and glareous matter. He complains alfo of pains in all his bones, much cough when he lays down, difficulty of breathing, hoarfenefs, and ' cold in his head.' His urine has been very red. He took N° 5 yesterday evening, which procured eight copious green and yellow stools. He also discharged by vomit much green and yellow matters. His stools last night were without griping or ftraining. He has fometimes a pain below the edge of the ribs To of

of the left fide when he coughs. The catarrhal fymptoms are not better. $--N^{\circ} 2$ to be taken immediately, three pills of N° 7 at night, and N° 6 in the morning.

Evening. He has been greatly worked both ways. His difcharges upwards were of phlegm; downwards yellow at firft, now ' quite clear like water.' He feels much weaknefs from the operation of the medicine. The cold and pains are as bad as before. — N° 7 and N° 6 to be omitted. N° 4 to be taken at bed-time.

First Quarter 15th. He had five thin stools last night, with a little griping but no straining. His discharges, this morning, are yellow. He slept worse last night. The draught did not excite sickness or sweat. His pulse is small, and quick; his skin dry, and his tongue a little pale.—N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Afternoon. He has had only three eafy thin yellow ftools fince morning. His fkin is cold; his pulfe fmall and rather quick; his tongue very pale; his pains are not better.—N° 4 to be taken at bed-time.

16th. The draught excited fome naufea. He was worfe laft night than before; his griping was much worfe. He paffed a little blood. He complains much of thirft, fainting,

ing and weaknefs. He vomited a little phlegm laft night.——N°·1 to be taken immediately; three pills of N° 7 at bed-time, and N° 9 in the morning.

17th. He strained much in vomiting yefterday; but discharged nothing except some phlegm, which was rather bitter. He had about five griping calls yesterday, four last night, and two this morning, of a 'brownifh yellow colour,' with lefs griping. He fays he 'feels very fore infide.' He paffed a much better night. He used to have about feven calls at night; he paffed a little blood occafionally yesterday, but not this morning. His fkin is natural; his pulse weak, but not quick; his tongue rather white. He has always much thirst, and no appetite whatever. N° 2 to be taken during the day; three pills of N° 7 at bed-time; and N° 6 in two dofes in the morning.

Afternoon. He has had about feven calls, with much lefs griping and ftraining. He is very giddy; and ' the leaft motion puts him out of breath.' He feels great proftration of ftrength. His pulfe and tongue are pretty natural; his fkin very cold. His pulfe indeed is fmall, and rather feeble, though of the natural frequency.

18th. His skin is cold, his tongue na-U tural;

tural; his pulfe very feeble, fmall, and 102. He complains of an uncafinefs and forenefs about the lower part of the fternum and the ftomach. He does not breathe freely; the giddinefs remains. He has no appetite, but great thirft. His urine is the fame as in health, not always of the fame colour. He paffed a very uneafy night; and had about feven or eight calls without much griping or ftraining. His ftools are thicker and without blood. He complains of general forenefs.—Six ounces of wine to be allowed daily.

Afternoon. His pulfe is exceffively quick, finall and feeble; his fkin dry, and much warmer, his tongue white. His urine is of a beer colour.' The giddiness is most troublesome when he rifes, after fitting for fome time. He fays when he draws his breath ' it feems as if it came through his ears.' He never has the leaft fweat. He has had five eafy, thin, yellow and white ftools to-day. He relishes the wine and water. He feels great proftration of ftrength. The catarrhal fymptoms are rather better. ----One grain of opium and five of camphor to be diffolved and mixed in an ounce of wine, and taken at bed-time. Six ounces more of wine to be allowed.

19th,

19th. He paffed the night a little eafier. The uneafy fenfations about the cheft and ftomach are better. He has fome degree of deafnefs this morning. He has had three loofe ftools fince midnight. His pulfe is about 96, and more full; but, if there be any alteration, he thinks himfelf weaker. He did not fweat, but flept pretty well till midnight. — One pint of a cold infufion of bark to be taken every day. Six ounces of wine to be allowed daily.

20th. He complains of very great proftration of ftrength. He had three ftools laft night, and one this morning. His giddinefs and affection of the ears continue. His pulfe is 104, tongue moift, though he fays it is clammy and dry; his pulfe is extremely feeble and fmall. He complains of difficulty of breathing, and weight acrofs the cheft; much thirft.——A large blifter to be applied over the region of the ftomach. Ten ounces of wine to be allowed.—He flept pretty well part of the night.

21ft. He had only three calls laft night. His pulfe continues remarkably feeble and fmall. His countenance fomewhat approaches to ghaftlinefs. He has not taken the bark as yet. The cold in his head is U 2 much

much the fame, as well as the difcharge from his nofe. His fkin is remarkably cold, his tongue clear. The giddiness, noife in the ears, and difficulty of breathing are the fame. The difficulty of breathing and giddinefs are worse when he rifes from a recumbent posture. Great weakness of his limbs, gums perfectly found, and no blotches whatever on any part of his skin. He has been confined to his hammock for fome days; he kept from it in the day time as long as poffible. . He drank about twenty ounces of wine yesterday, befides a ftrong fago, and the other diet. He has much thirst. He coughs up occafionally in the morning fome white thick fubftance .---- A large blifter to be applied between the fhoulders; N° 3 with only one grain of tartar emetic and three ounces of fpiritus mindereri in it. One bottle of wine to be allowed.

22d. His pulfe is 88, his tongue not quite fo clear. His fkin fomewhat warmer in his hammock. He was very reftlefs laft night, as well from the blifter, as from his difficulty of breathing. He had four frothy, ' brownifh yellow ftools' laft night. The folution yefterday prevented his ufual thirft; but he was very thirfty all night. Upon the whole there does not appear to be much alteration.

alteration. He has much laffitude and general forenefs. It is now fix months fince his recovery from an obftinate ague and jaundice, which afflicted him for about four months. _____Let him take a mixture of four grains of camphor and one of opium every three hours. A blifter to be applied to his head at night; and wine allowed at his pleafure.

Noon. He has been fitting up; but is now in his hammock. The other medicines have not been taken; nor has he fwallowed any wine fince laft night, as his ftomach rejected it. His pulfe is 100, but more full and ftrong. He has much thirft to day. He has received Madeira in lieu of Port; and is directed to take as much as poffible during the day.

Evening. He has had two flools to-day; the first, three ounces, of a brownish yellow, and frothy. Pulse 100, skin more hot.

23d. 9 A. M. Full Moon. He dofed a little, but did not fleep laft night. He had one thin ftool. His pulfe yefterday evening, after the effort of getting into his hammock again, was aftonifhingly quick; but fell to 100 on lying down for a few minutes. He can fcarcely raife his head without giddinefs and faintnefs. He had nearly taken the whole bottle of Madeira at 7 A. M. mixed

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with water, as he found the wine itfelf ' too hot' in his ftomach. His pulse is now about 92, of much the fame degree of fullness and ftrength, though perhaps a little lower. He mentions the oppreffion of breathing, and about the precordia, as infignificant at prefent. He was out of his hammock for a very fhort time yesterday, and his fense of weakness, giddinefs, and faintnefs, on raifing his head, appear to be encreased fince. He took a draught of feven grains of camphor and two of opium. His skin continues quite dry, but with lefs heat than laft night. The catarrhal fymptoms have almost vanished these two days; at least the difcharge from the Sneiderian membrane is stopped; and that from the bronchiæ is very trifling, and entirely like vifcid faliya. The affection of his ears however continues, as well as the cough in fome degree. He fays, he feels as if he had not ftrength to cough up fomething, which opprefles him. The cough feems to be what is commonly termed hollow. The blifter on his head gave him pain last night. He has taken another grain of opium this morning. His tongue has been always moift, and has very little if any foulnefs.----Half an ounce of bark, five fcruples of laudanum in a pint of water to be taken in dofes of two ounces every

every two hours. Warm pediluvium to be ufed three times a day; and as much wine as he choofes, to be allowed.

Noon. His urine was neither very red nor very pale when he last noticed it yesterday. His pulse is much flower and fuller.

Afternoon. His pulse is 100, and as full as before. The pulse feems to intermit occafionally; this most probably proceeds from the motion of the hammock, which prevents the pulse from being afcertained with accuracy. He fleeps with his eyes half open, which gives his countenance the appearance of approaching death. He has dofed much to-day. His ftomach has rejected the wine occafionally. He complains of great thirst. He diflikes the fugar which has been mixed with the bark. He has had one thin ftool fince noon, and feels greatly fatigued after the exertion neceffary to get to the bucket. His hammock fwings close to one of the hatchways, and is exposed of course to a ventilation of fresh air. He does not complain that it is too cold.

24th. He dofed much, and was eafy all night, but he did not enjoy any found fleep. He complains greatly of thirst. He had one thin stool last night. His pulse this morn-

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ing is confiderably fuller, and even ftrong. His feet were bathed twice or thrice yefterday evening. His fkin is ftill very dry; nor has he fweated as yet; his tongue rather lefs clean. He has taken all the bark, and another bottle of Madeira.——The mixture of bark and opium, the pediluvium, and the wine to be continued. Twenty drops more of laudanum to be added to the bark.

Afternoon. It appears now that he threw up both bark and wine yesterday occasionally. He has thrown up both to-day, and every thing elfe the moment he has taken it. He does not of courfe appear to have had much aliment lately. He fat up for a few minutes in his hammock, and was obliged to lie down again. His pulse is about 92, pretty ftrong, and even fmart. His hands cool, and his tongue pretty much the fame. He has no pain on preffure any where about the ftomach and bowels, except the general forenefs, of which he has complained during the greater part of his diforder. By miftake he took all the bark and opium to-day at one draught, but his ftomach rejected it immediately. He has had two stools to-day, thin, fmall and frothy. ---- Sago, panada or gruel with wine to be given frequently, but in very fmall quantities at a time. His feet to

to be bathed for an hour if practicable, or fomented. A blifter to be applied over his ftomach. If the vomiting continue, let the effervescent draughts be tried.

25th. He affured me yesterday evening, that the running from the nofe, and other catarrhal fymptoms, had not left him; as they appeared to have done during my vifits for fome days past. This discharge however has left him completely fince 4 o'clock this morning; from which period he has enjoyed a comfortable repose. During the pediluyium, as he was fitting up out of his hammock, his pulse became fo very feeble and fmall as not to be felt diffinctly: his hands were also cold. Three hours after he had returned to his hammock his pulfe became lefs feeble and fmall; and this morning it is full, pretty ftrong, and 104. He took N° 3 all night; at first his stomach rejected fome of it; but a confiderable quantity remained. He has taken a little wine and water this morning; but he rejected pure Port from his ftomach. 'Till 4 o'clock he was very reftlefs. He had two finall frothy and windy stools. His skin is warm.

The medicines chiefly in use in European routine having been used in vain; it being the decided opinion that the patient must die,

die, and ftrong fufpicions being entertained by me that his liver is affected, I fhall venture to try mercury. But as there is not any mercurial ointment, my fole dependance muft be on calomel. His attendants fay, he had fome delirium laft night.— All other medicines to be difcontinued, and eight grains of calomel to be taken immediately.

Noon. He has just had a stool of nearly a pint of deep yellow water, which was very foetid. He has not vomited fince morning. His pulse is full, and of very good strength. His skin is warm, and seems to have some tendency to become moist.—Let him take a simall spoonful of the mixture, N° 3, every hour.

4 P. M. He has retained every thing he has taken, viz. about nine fpoonfulls of N° 3, and four or five table fpoonfulls of thick gruel with wine and fugar. He took the remainder of the Madeira, about one pint, during the courfe of the forenoon. He complains greatly of thirst: and fays he should be well if the thirst left him. He thinks he shall be able to eat a little broth tomorrow. His pulse is about 106, fost and pretty full, but not fo strong as in the morning; his skin pretty natural. He does not

not feem to hear, or to attend to queftions as well as he ufed. He has had another ftool of the fame kind. His anfwer, when afked how he does, is generally, 'I don't know how I am;' and then he complains of exceffive thirft.——Let him continue to fuck gently but conftantly a piece of lint, foaked with equal parts of lime-juice and water. His tongue has continued always moift.

26th. 7 A. M. He took four fpoons full more of N° 3 during the evening, and feveral large spoons full of gruel, part of which his ftomach rejected. Every time he attempted to fwallow a fpoon-full of Madeira it was thrown up immediately. He kept a little of the gruel on his ftomach last night. The lime-juice and water do not allay his thirft, which feems to be the only troublefome fymptom he has; for he does not feel the giddinefs as he lies down; and the cough is confiderably diminished, as far as appears during attendance. The running from his nofe has not returned, nor does he complain now of cold in his head. He had three or four other stools of the fame kind before night, and two during the night, but not fo fœtid. He took a pill of ten grains of calomel last night. He thinks cold weak chicken broth would quench his thirst. Some

Some yellow flime appears on the bottom of the bucket.

9 A. M. He has paffed about half a pint more of the fame kind of bilious liquid, with fome thick mucus, tinged with a very little blood. His pulfe is pretty full, and of a good ftrength. He has retained two fpoons full of very weak chicken broth on his ftomach.

I P. M. He has taken in all about eight ounces of the weak chicken broth. He has had more difcharges of the fame kind by ftool. He has retained every thing on his ftomach to - day, but wine and medicine have not been given. His pulfe has encreafed in fullnefs and ftrength. He does not think himfelf weakened by the difcharges.

4 P. M. His pulfe is 112, and of the fame ftrength. He has taken about five or fix ounces of a mixture, of one dram of cream of tartar, half an ounce of fal rupellenfe with fugar, effence of peppermint, and fpirit of lavender, in twenty-two ounces of water. He continues to take about two ounces of this every hour; and it agrees well with his ftomach. What he paffes is of the fame kind as before, about four or fix ounces at each call. He thinks the giddinefs as well as the cough better.

27th.

27th. 7 A. M. He had ten grains of calomel last night; and took a couple of ounces of the laxative mixture four hours after. He had frequent calls during the night; and feems to have paffed in all not quite a pint of the fame kind of liquid as before, equally foetid, and perhaps with a little more blood in it. He fays he thinks he is rather weaker after fo many calls. He feemed to have an encreafe of general uneafinefs in the evening, with a greater frequency and fullnefs of pulfe. His pulfe this morning is 96, his fkin more cool, and ftill dry. Thirft as ufual.

Noon. He has taken five or fix spoons full of N° 3 this forenoon, and feveral of weak mutton broth. His back and head have been raifed all the forenoon without giddinefs. He has passed about two ounces of a dark brown fætid mucus; but little or none of the former deep yellow liquid. He has just taken an ounce of the laxative mixture. His urine is white and thick, as if pus were diffused through it.

His pulse was 92 about one o'clock, it is now 96, and much more feeble and small. He fays, he becomes very faint. His skin is very cool. He has passed fince last vifit about three or four ounces of the fame

fame kind of dark brown mucus; as if bile and blood were both diffufed through it. ——To take frequently, notwithftanding his apprehensions of throwing it up, a spoonful of equal parts of Madeira and water, warm. One grain of opium to be taken immediately. His feet to be fomented; or bottles of warm water to be applied to the foles. If his pulse should not rise before eight o'clock, let a blifter be applied on the infide of his thigh, and two grains of opium be taken.

28th. 7 A. M. His stomach rejected the wine and water immediately; but he retained fome fpoons full of the broth and gruel. He refused the blifter. He took a pill of five grains of calomel with two of opium. About 10 P. M. last night he complained more than ever of the oppreffion about the præcordia, or in breathing, and was extremely low. He had a mixture of musk, laudanum and spirit of fal ammoniac. Of this he took, during the night, feveral fpoons full. This morning he fays his breathing is better. His pulse is fcarcely more full. His hands, which were cold laft night, are rather warm this morning. On taking another spoonfull of the musk mixture this morning, his ftomach feems to have rejected all which he had taken during the night.

9 A. M.

9 A. M. He has paffed about a pint of dark bilious mucus; and has vomited nearly as much of green and yellow, bitter matters; fince which he is eafier. He threw up before a pill of one grain of opium and two of calomel. He has fince retained feveral fpoons full of gruel. His thirft is as bad as ever.

1 P. M. He has taken nine fpoons full of pretty ftrong chicken broth. He has paffed nearly a pint more of the fame kind of bilious matters, but not quite fo dark, and thinner. He fays his thirft is as bad as ever. His pulfe is 100, a little encreafed in ftrength; his tongue redder than ufual; his fkin of a natural warmth. His urine was pale and clear, but in fmall quantity, yefterday evening.

4 P. M. His pulfe is 104, and rather ftronger, as if from feverifh exacerbation. He has had a pill of two grains of calomel, which his ftomach has retained. He has tafted a weak infufion of chamomile flowers, but would not fwallow it.

29th. 7 A. M. Laft night he had a pill of three grains of calomel and one of opium; but as he vomited a little, fifteen minutes afterwards, it is uncertain whether he retained it or not. He had alfo a glyfter of three grains of opium, diffolved in four ounces of water.

water. He ate a fpoonfull or two of gruel, and the fame quantity of thick rice water; and drank about a pint of water with toafted bifcuit, during the night; which he thinks has in fome degree allayed the exceffive and obftinate thirft. He had frequent calls for the bed-pan during the night, and paffed altogether about a pint or lefs of the former dark yellow fœtid liquid, with very little of the mucus. His pulfe is 102, with fome flight degree of fmartnefs in the ftroke; his fkin warm; his tongue moift as ufual. He feels lefs of the general uneafinefs, oppreffion, &c. than he ufed.

Afternoon. His stomach rejected a pill of two grains of calomel half an hour after it was down. He has taken nothing, except one spoonful of gruel. He threw up mutton broth, and every thing else. His pulse is 114, his tongue clean.

30th. 7 A. M. Glyfters of broth with laudanum were ordered yefterday, but they could not be exhibited. During the evening however he retained a fpoonful or two of chicken broth. He faid fomething collected about his throat, which he could not difcharge. About 11 P. M. he had an evident moifture on his wrift and hand, which were fufficiently warm; no other part of his body

body was examined. He faid he had felt the fame moifture, preceded by a flushing heat, once before during the course of the evening. His cough is the fame as ever. He fays the forenefs is only on the outfide of the cheft. He was very reftlefs, and raved all night. He has conftant hiccup now. He has passed, during the night, about a pint of deep yellow bilious liquid, fætid as usual. He has retained madeira and water on his ftomach during the night.

11 A. M. He has drank more than a pint of equal parts of madeira and water, and has fwallowed one fpoonful of gruel. He fays he is much inclined to fleep. His pulfe is 104, and rather a little better in other refpects; his skin pretty natural. He has passed by ftool about half a pint of the usual kind of dejection, mixed with much mucus.

9 A. M. 31ft. Last Quarter. He has taken, befides madeira and water, about a pint of ftrong bodied claret fince last vifit, with an equal quantity of water. He ate a little gruel, perhaps two spoons full yesterday. His pulfe was increased in fulness yesterday evening; and his fkin was of a natural warmth. He has passed about two pints of dark coloured bile fince last visit. He ate about half a pint of chicken broth yesterday, and re-X tained

tained every thing on his ftomach. His attendant fays, he feemed to fleep pretty well all night, but he declares otherwife. His pulfe is about 94, but very fmall and feeble this morning; his hands very cool; his urine is white and muddy. His attendant fays, it was rather of a high colour yefterday. His thirft continues much the fame.

11 A. M. He ftill continues very low, but his fkin feems warmer.—A large blifter to be applied between the fhoulders immediately. His belly during the whole courfe of the diforder has been rather funk; nor has fulnefs or pain been difcoverable on preffure in the region of the liver, fpleen, or indeed in any other part. During the former part of the voyage, before his illnefs, he appeared to be of an indolent and fluggifh habit. No fymptoms of fcurvy have occurred in any part of his perfon.

November 1ft. The blifter rofe. His difcharges downwards were almost constant, and very foetid. He asked for a bit of chicken, which was given; but on tasting it, he spit it out. His pulse declined. He swallowed about a pint of claret and madeira during the night. He would not permit more blifters to be applied. The wine was warmed. At 7 A. M. his pulse was not to be felt in either

either wrift. He complained of a fevere pain under the ribs of the left fide. He was fenfible; but on anfwering queftions, he called the blifter a poultice, yet corrected himfelf when the blifter was mentioned. He alfo at that time referred the pain to the fhoulder; but again corrected himfelf, when the pain under the ribs was fuggefted. His breathing was more difficult. He died at half paft 8 A. M.

DISSECTION of RALPH PICKER-ING, &c. by Mr. RICHIE, under the Infpection of J. P. WADE.

The whole of this *bufinefs* is nothing more than the *felf-praife* and wished-for good opinion (it is to be supposed) of the very injenious writer.—Remark by Mr. Richie after my departure.

UPON opening the abdomen the omentum appeared found, in its natural fituation (but much deprived of fat); the arch of the colon quite collapsed; its coats fo much thickened, that upon division with the knife little or no cavity appeared. Tracing its course downwards, the cæcum and rectum X 2 appeared

appeared found, though empty (the inteffines were all much collapsed, and of a dirty cream colour); the ftomach fo much collapsed, as it was with some difficulty to be diffinguished at first (from the intestines) quite found and empty (of the fame colour as the inteftines). Tracing to the duodenum, nothing appeared but a little pure yellow bile at that part of the duct corresponding to the termination of the biliary ducts (the bile did not appear separate or collected, but the internal furface of the gut feemed to be fmeared with a deep coloured bile, as far as the finger was pushed, which, when retracted appeared covered with it all round). The kidneys lay found in their natural fituation (the right kidney only was examined). The bladder of urine collapsed and quite found. The fpleen found, and of a remarkable bright blue colour. The external appearance of the liver quite natural, and without any preternatural adhæfions whatever, but apparently very much enlarged, fo that the convex portion of the great lobe feemed fomewhat pushed into the thorax. Incisions made into its lobes discovered nothing præternatural. The gall bladder (turgid) very full of a matter of a very blackish appearance, and much refembling coal tar (in colour and confiftence);

fiftence); its cavity might have contained about fix ounces of gall (it appeared to contain that quantity of the black ropy fubftance). The liver with its gall bladder felt unufually ponderous. Nothing preternatural appeared in either lobe of the lungs (the lungs were of a dirty cream colour, with livid fpots in fome parts, particularly on the lower extremities of the lobes, as if from effufions of blood. On incifion, a little blood and air oozed out. There was about an ounce of water in the left cavity, and no adhefions). The heart natural, empty, collapfed, with the ufual quantity of water in the pericardium.

N. B. The diffection is in the words of Mr. RICHIE, except what is placed between parenthefes, which was added by J. P. WADE.

EXTRACT relative to PICKERING'S Cafe from the Article Jecur, Motherby's Dictionary.

MR. CRAWFORD mentions one (diforder of the liver) which he denominates an enlargement of the liver. The principal figns are a great and fudden fwelling and hardnefs of the belly, with difficulty of X 3 breathing,

breathing, a general weaknefs, a fense of tightness about the breast and a giddiness of the head on any little motion is perceived; then an œdematous fwelling appears in the legs. Pains in the back, thirft (great and inceffant thirst), and loss of appetite attend. The pulse is fmall and weak; but on bleeding it becomes more full and diftinct. The countenance is florid. As the belly enlarges the breathing is more difficult; and then the fenfe of oppreffion about the præcordia, and a stricture about the cartilago ensiformis, becomes almost insupportable, foon terminating in a complete fuffocation. A violent vertigo, and troublefome palpitation of the heart are occafional fymptoms. Some fymptoms of this diforder refemble those of fcurvy; but the fore fpungy gums, always attendant on fcurvy, are not obferved here.

DISSECTION, by Mr. CRAWFORD, of a Perfon, in whom those Symptoms had occurred.

The liver did indeed make a very extraordinary appearance. It was enlarged almost beyond imagination. It occupied the whole of both hypochondria, and defcended a confiderable

fiderable way into the hypogastrium. The fuperior part of it had thrust the diaphragm up into the thorax. The convex part of the liver appeared higher up in the thorax than the enfiform cartilage. It had compreffed the lungs, particularly the right lobe, which was much collapfed, and covered with white fpots, had a number of tubercles on it, and made a very morbid appearance. It was not the fize of a common tennis-ball. The left lobe was much lefs than in a natural state, and covered also with white spots. Part of the liver, which extended to the thorax, was of a particular form, refembling a cone, rather obtufely pointed, about four inches diameter at its bafe, and near three inches high. It arofe from the fuperior convex part. (This in a leffer degree appeared in Pickering's liver.) The liver in general was more florid than is commonly perceived. We now examined every part of this vifcus, and could not difcover the leaft vestige of disease, besides the singular enlargement. The gall bladder was in its natural fituation, but quite turgid with bile. The bile was very viscid, and of a dark green colour. The duct stuffed with indurated matter. The liver probably was not lefs ponderous than thirteen or fourteen pounds.

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REMARKS

REMARKS on PICKERING'S CASE.

The complication of fymptoms in this cafe was uncommon. The catarrhal fymptoms, I believe, would have been denominated nervous by the generality of the faculty. The great proftration of strength, as well as the affection of the ears, which attended from the commencement, and the giddinefs alfo, afforded sufficient grounds for such a conjecture; but the nature of the difcharges by ftool proved the diforder, at that early period at leaft, to be principally bilious. The dyfentery indeed appeared to be the only difeafe of any confequence at that time; for the catarrhal fymptoms, though they proved ultimately fo obstinate as almost to form the character of the diforder, were at first very trifling, and in no manner alarming. It would appear that those fymptoms have been generally pronounced nervous by practitioners, for which they could not account in any plaufible manner : I have therefore faid, that most of the appearances in the prefent inftance would probably have been effeemed fuch; but it was not poffible I could entertain a fimilar judgment of the cafe; as I had been accuftomed, during the whole courfe of my practice in India, to trace fuch fymptoms 25

as those in question to affections of th ebowels, to the liver, or intestinal accumulations, to derive the indications of cure from those fources, and to treat them with decided fuccefs, with a fingle exception, as far as my recollection ferves me at prefent. I never therefore should have thought of treating the cafe as nervous, had it fallen under my charge in India; but as the practice as well as the difeafes might be fupposed to differ widely on board a ship, and as I had not had any very extensive experience in this line, I did not dare to take upon myfelf the refponfibility of treating the cafe in a peculiar mode, which feemed fo repugnant to Euroropean routine, at least after the removal of the dyfenteric fymptoms, and when all those which remained might be deemed to conftitute a low nervous fever. Notwithstanding therefore the great fense of prostration of ftrength, which followed the first evacuations, I should not have hefitated to perfevere in the fame plan, to a certain degree at leaft, had I not been deterred by the decided opinion of others in favour of bark, wine, and other medicines generally prefcribed in low cafes. Whatever the caufe of the dyfenteric fymptoms may have been fupposed, it is evident that they yielded, in the usual way, to inteftinal

nal evacuations, in the usual time. Are we to prefume that thefe were only fymptoms of the general diforder, or a diftinct difease existing at the fame time with the other ? If the former, it might be reafonably fufpected, that, as the caufe of all the fymptoms was the fame, the fame treatment, which removed the worft, might, under certain modifications, prove ferviceable in the cure of the others, or, in other words, in the entire removal of the caufe and of the complaint. I shall not difcuss here the compatibility of two general difeafes in the fystem at one time, especially where the nature of the one has generally been deemed very adverse, if not directly contrary to the other. The most certain criterion of a bilious diforder is derived from the appearance of the evacuations from the bowels. In the prefent instance they were obviously bilious : even , at the time when he defcribed them as watery, it is most probable he trusted merely to the fense of their liquidity, and had not fubjected them to the examination of the eye. This is a very frequent error amongst that class of patients, who will never take the trouble to infpect their ftools, unlefs they are ordered very particularly to observe them. It is very certain neverthelefs, that in the most bilious

bilious cafes, the last discharges produced by a full dofe of falts are either entirely watery, or tinged with a very little bile; yet the very next day an active purgative will afford unquestionable proofs of the existence of a large accumulation in the bowels; and should a practitioner be deterred from the further exhibition of purgatives by the watery appearance of those evacuations, he must, I think, often be led into fatal errors. I have therefore to regret the omiffion of Nº 7 and Nº 6 at the commencement of the prefent cafe, as well as the exhibition of the opiate, Nº 4, from which certainly no benefit, but, poffibly much mifchief, accrued, in the fuppreffion of the fecretions and excretions, which afterwards proved to have much connection with the diforder, if they were not in reality the fole caufe of it. But it was deemed proper to attempt the excitement of a general fweat (a favourite practice amongst European phyficians) by the prefcription Nº 4. As this indication was fo ftrongly recommended, I profecuted it through the greater part of the difeafe, at first repeating occafionally evacuations by the bowels; afterwards with an entire reliance on it until it was acknowledged to be of little confequence what mode of practice should be purfued, as the 3

the patient could not poffibly furvive. Then, and then only, it was deemed warrantable to attempt a mode of treatment which would probably have fucceeded, had it been undertaken at an early period of the diforder. The diffection fufficiently proves this. During the whole courfe of the treatment by bark, wine, opium, &c. suspicions of an affection of the liver, or of a bilious accumulation in the bowels, had been entertained and declared. The opium, whole powers have been much praifed in low nervous fever, as well as the wine, which has enjoyed a reputation of a much older date, did not appear in the prefent inftance to poffefs the leaft activity in the removal of any one of the nervous fymptoms. Nor did the extraordinary giddinefs, tendency to faint, or great proftration of ftrength, receive any benefit from the bark, wine, and opium, during the copious exhibition of which those fymptoms encreafed, until all hope of recovery vanished. Other nervous medicines, as far as the medicine cheft could furnish, were exhibited equally in vain. The large putrid bilious discharges by stool, which occurred after the calomel was given, to the laft hour of the patients life, afford a fufficient proof of the bilious nature of the diforder; but the diffection

diffection has placed this beyond all poffibility of doubt. The fcurvy was at first fuspected, as in Mr. Crawford's cafes; but the perfect foundness of the gums, and the absence of the most decided scorbutic symptoms, removed every fufpicion. Perhaps it was unfortunate, that the reference was only made to Mr. Crawford's work after the death of the patient. Under the fanction of fuch an authority, another method of cure would certainly have been adopted fooner. There are practitioners, who would have fought, in the diffection, for the caufe or the effects of "a diminished energy of the brain" as the fource of all the nervous fymptoms. We ventured to neglect the head altogether. The accumulation of bile in the gall bladder, which must have been of an old date, if the internal furface have any fenfibility, may have been the immediate caufe of many of the fymptoms, and perhaps of the obstinate thirst. Vomits would have been particularly well adapted to the removal of this accumulation; and probably not inimical in the reftoration of the liver to its proper fize and office. The enlargement of the liver must be confidered as the chief caufe of the complaint, and would probably have yielded to the early use of mercurial inunction.

inunction. It is hoped there will be found fufficient refemblance between the cafes to, warrant the extracts which are annexed.

CASE II.

PIERCY KENNET, with the Diffection, &c.

Piercy Kennet, aged 22, a native Portuguefe, who had lately attended fome gentlemen from England to Madras, accompanied Mr. Hollond's children from that place on board the Houghton. On the 22d of September, two days after our departure from Madras, he applied to me for the complaints mentioned in the following cafe.!

22d. Has had a dyfentery about a week; much griping and ftraining; difcharges glareous with blood; pain on preffure at the pit of the ftomach; fays, he feels "as if his bowels were pulled down;" took a vomit, which difcharged very little bile; his mouth has a fweet tafte in the morning, and he fpits up "fomething thick" without cough. His fkin is too warm but moift; pulfe quick, and rather full and ftrong; tongue white; complains much of weaknefs.

nefs.——N° 7 and N° 9 to be taken in the ufual way.

Morning 23d. Full Moon. Five ftools laft night, rather freer than ufual; griping and ftraining a very little lefs; pulfe fmall, rather quick and a little tenfe; tongue more cineritious.—N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Afternoon. Shortnefs of breath; tongue lefs cineritious, whiter; pulfe quick, fmall, and a little fmart; fkin warmer than ufual; has much thirft; fymptoms of flux juft the fame; vomited "four and faltifh water," and much phlegm to-day; ftools glareous.— N° 7 at bed-time and N° 6 in the morning.

Afternoon. Pain and fullnefs at the pit of the ftomach; purged off yellow water with griping and ftraining, which are as bad as before; tongue more cineritious; pulfe the fame; fkin too dry and warm; urine not quite fo high in colour "as madeira;" great opprefiion when he lies down for fome time on the right fide, and fome when on the left; eafieft on his back.——The vomit

to

to be repeated.---N° 7 to be taken at bed-time.

25th. Vomited much bitter matters latterly; oppreffion of breathing lefs; tongue ftill fomewhat cineritious; pulfe quick; fkin cool; difficulty of making water fince yefterday; about ten calls laft night, fome eafier; prolapfus ani.——N° 2 to be continued.

Evening. Tongue not fo pale; fkin natural; pulfe quick and fmall; fourteen or fifteen calls of a little white matter with blood fince mornini; made at once about half a pint of high coloured urine.——Six pills, N°7, at bedtime; N°9 in the morning.

26th. Breathes eafieft on his back; when on either fide he feels pains between the fhoulders and down his back; much fever every evening about 5 o'clock; lefs thirfty; fix or feven calls during the night; griping and ftraining much the fame; tongue pale; pulfe quick and fmall; fkin warm and moift. —Two pills, N° 7, to be taken every night.

Afternoon. Skin rather hot and dry; pulfe very quick; tongue lefs pale; about nine calls fince yefterday, with a little lefs griping, ftraining, and blood.——N° 7 to be taken at bed-time.

27th. Pain in the fmall of the back, cheft, and pit of the stomach; could not lay down all

all night; about feven calls with ftraining laft night; fkin cool; pulfe very quick; tongue flightly cineritious; tongue and throat very dry at night.——N° 2 during the day.

28th. Rubbed in about a dram of mercurial ointment laft night over his right fide. Six ineffectual calls laft night, with much ftraining but little griping. He finds himfelf eafier in general; he can lay down with more eafe, and he flept better laft night than fince his arrival on board. The fever was not fo hot yefterday evening. He feems much weakened by the diforder, and rather emaciated.——The mercurial ointment to be continued, and N° 2 to be taken during the day.

Evening. He complains of great fenfe of weaknefs; vomited about half a pint of yellow bitter matters. He had only three calls to-day, and those of a better confistence than usual, brown and easter; very little straining, and no griping or blood; breathing more affected this evening, but he is less feverish; pulse very quick and tremulous; skin much cooler and softer than usual in the evening; tongue pretty clean; appetite a little better.——One ounce of wine in panada daily. One pill of N° 7 at night. The ointment to be used every night.

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29th.

29th. A little better to-day; refted better laft night; three eafier calls during the night. -----N° 2 to be continued during the day.

Evening. Straining at ftool gone; ftraining in paffing his urine, which is very hot; about three pretty eafy and more natural ftools to-day; tongue not quite clear; pulfe quick and feeble; fkin perfectly cool and foft; fome heat in the foles of his feet, and in the palm of his left hand, with a 'kind of numbnefs' in the latter.—One pill N° 7 to be taken every night.

30th. The pain at the pit of the ftomach, the difficulty of breathing, great drynefs of the tongue, and other fymptoms, were much worfe laft night; he fays he has not had fifteen minutes fleep fince he came on board at Madras; pulfe very quick and fmall; tongue not pale; fkin cool; five calls, with very little griping.—A blifter to be applied over the region of the liver. N° 2 to be continued during the day in fmaller dofes.

Evening. Breathing a little better; the ftraining and difficulty of paffing urine have encreafed; tongue clear; fkin cool; pulfe not fo fmall, quick.—Let him have immediately a tea fpoon-full of oximel fcilliticum in a draught of warm conjee, and plenty of conjee afterwards.

October

October 1ft, Laft Quarter. Tongue, pulfe, and fkin the fame; three calls without ftraining, but one with a little griping; he fays he had much fever laft night; partial fweats about the head at night; feems weaker and more emaciated. His urine flows better: The mercury does not feem to affect him as yet.—A table fpoon-full of a mixture of one grain of tartar emetic and twenty of ipecacuan in four ounces of water to be taken every fifteen minutes, until it operate by vomit.

Afternoon. Vomited fome phlegm. He feels himfelf in general better this afternoon; four ftools without ftraining to-day; pulfe quick; fkin cool; tongue clear; urine freer, but very hot, and of a high colour.—— The pill to be repeated as well as the ointment every night.

2d. A little griping laft night, and about four calls; fever lefs.——N° 2 in fmaller dofes during the day. And the oximel of fquills, as there is not any nitre.

Afternoon. Four calls; tongue clean; pulfe rather quick; fkin not very warm; much the fame in every refpect as yefterday; urine freer fince he took the diuretic. Two pills N° 7 at bed-time, and the diuretic to be repeated.

3d. Two calls last night, but passed Y 2 nothing;

nothing; has had appetite thefe two days, and much lefs thirft; he had lefs fever laft night, and fweated much; a fhooting pain occafionally through the regions of the fpleen and ftomach. Makes urine freely; got fome fweet fpirit of nitre; fkin cool; pulfe quick; tongue the fame.——Let him take a draught with half an ounce of falts and an ounce of caftor-oil in it.

Afternoon. Pulfe quick, and a little fuller; five calls to-day; he is 'all full of pain at night.' He has not ufed the ointment for fome days.—One dram of it to be ufed every night; the pill to be alfo repeated every night; and the diuretic to be continued.

4th. No reft whatever laft night on account of the pains, over the abdomen particularly; his mouth was rather dry laft night, but in other refpects he was very little feverifh; urine nearly as in health. Two eafy calls, pretty natural; fweated very little; pulfe extremely fmall.——N° 3 to be taken during the day.

Afternoon. Says he feels better than ufual this evening, yet he feems to have more fever on him; pulfe very quick; fkin dry and hot; tongue clear; he perceives much pain on preffure on the upper part of the region of the liver; he has not had any call to-day. ——Two

-----Two pills N° 7 to be taken to-night, and N° 9 in the morning.

5th. 11 A. M. No call laft night; two large thick brown ftools after the oil this morning; thinks he is better; tongue however not fo clean, and fkin more warm than ufual at this hour; thinks there was the flighteft poffible appearance of blood in the ftools this morning; complains of much pain in his back when he fits up.—. The mixture and ointment to be continued, and another blifter to be applied.

Afternoon. Pulfe extremely quick and fmall; one fmall glareous ftool; feels much weaknefs; looks more emaciated; had more fever this forenoon; pain in the back and both fhoulders.—The mixture difcontinued; one pint of cold infufion of bark daily.

7th. The ointment and bark to be continued, as well as the pills.

8th. New Moon. His medicines to be continued.

9th. He has been exempt from fever but at very fhort intervals only thefe three days paft; his tongue is difcoloured; he has taken about four drams of bark powder made into infufion altogether, in the intervals of the fever, and a bottle full of the folution of falts with tartar emetic, to keep his body open dur-

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in

ing the feverish attacks; stools to-day brown.--- The mercurial ointment and the pills to be repeated every night. To take as much of a folution of falts as will keep his body gently open; and a few glaffes of the cold infusion of bark in the intervals of fever. 10th, Evening. His fever feems to decreafe, but it does not leave him altogether; he appears to be rather freer from it early in the morning, than at other periods of the day. His tongue has been lately rather brown in the middle; his skin always dry, and his pulse always quick, though it is fometimes fuller than ufual. He has fix or feven stools daily from the folution of falts, of which he takes five or fix glaffes daily. When he is most free from fever he takes half a dram or more of the powder of bark in lieu of the infusion; his stools have been pretty large, brown, and very offenfive. He has a little mutton broth daily with rice in it, at his earnest entreaty, and in contradiction to my wifhes. He now tells me, that he has for fome days felt a pretty acute pain in his right cheft, shooting up to the clavicle; but no pain in the region of the liver. He has difcharged to-day much wind upwards.

11th, Afternoon. He had not much fever this morning; but it is fomewhat encreafed thefe

thefe few hours paft. He had taken about one dram and a half of the bark in the morning. He has fince taken three glaffes of the folution; he is very hoarfe to-day; his fkin is always dry; his tongue is rather clearer now; he feems once more to feel pain in the part of the liver formerly affected. Although the ointment and pills are continued, he does not feel his mouth affected.

12th. Took three glaffes of the mixture N° 5 yefterday evening; one large ftool at night, and one bright yellow ftool this morning. Has taken three glaffes of a cold infufion of bark this morning; feems much freer from fever at prefent; enjoys no fleep at night; liver very painful to the touch; pulfe 104; feels much better; hoarfenefs better; tongue clearer.—N° 5 to be continued as before; the ointment and pills to be repeated as ufual.

13th. Was eafier than ufual laft night; and thinks he had lefs fever; complains much of the 'flitches in his cheft,' and wind in his flomach; only two fmall flools fince laft vifit; pulfe this morning was more full and flrong than ufual, and is flill frequent; the hoarfenefs has left him. One glafs full of N° 5 to be taken every hour till three or four flools be procured, after which he

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may

may take a little of the infusion of bark.— The ointment and pills to be repeated as usual every night.

14th. About midnight he was feized with a most excruciating pain in his bowels, in the lower belly particularly, extending up to his right shoulder; his belly was tenfe, inflated, and particularly painful on preffure over the ftomach, and the region of the bladder. He took the quantity of four grains of opium before the pains abated; he difcharged wind upwards; two or three thick ftools yesterday; the falts and tartar emetic, of which he took a confiderable quantity, did not feem to work him. He has been directed to take a folution of falts to-day, until it shall have procured loofe stools; his pulfe was quick and fmall; his fkin much as ufual; he was greatly alarmed, and in general he feems to fear his diffolution much when he is in any way worfe.

II o'clock A. M. He had not paffed water fince 6 o'clock yefterday evening; the lower belly is fwelled, tenfe and painful; he fhrinks at the touch or approach of the hand; the catheter has been attempted to be paffed in vain; fomentation or warm bath are attended with great inconvenience; fome drops of blood came away after the catheter; he

he has had a glyfter with caftor-oil in it; his pulfe is fcarcely perceptible and fo quick as not to be counted; it flutters apparently; he complains of deafnefs; he vomited fome bitter matters after the catheter was withdrawn.

Evening. He vomited much about noon, and paffed near a pint of high-coloured urine, after having received another glyfter; he has fipped about half a bottle of port wine with a large proportion of water to it during the day. He could not take it unlefs much diluted; he had fago with wine and fugar, and a bowl of tea with milk in the afternoon; he has just had a glyster, and has passed a large thin stool, with a pint of urine; he feems confiderably better to-night; his deafnefs is decreafed; his belly is quite eafy; he took fome fpirit of nitre diluted in the forenoon; and had four glyfters during the day. He had eaten fome boiled fowl at noon on the 13th, contrary to positive orders; he acknowledged this to be of differvice to him. The ointment and pills have been difcontinued fince the pain and fwelling fupervened. His mouth has not been in the leaft affected by the large quantity of mercury he has taken.

15th,

15th, Forenoon First Quarter. He was eafy all night, and drank about three tea fpoons full of nitre diluted in a pint and a half of water; he had a glyster this morning, and passed about a pint of very deep red urine; he drank fome weak tea; his pulse is confiderably raifed to-day; he has not the least inclination to eat; his belly is confiderably swelled, but soft; he complains however of much pain on preffure at the navel, with a little hardness above it; the region of the liver seems pretty eass; his head sweated last night; skin dry and rather hot; tongue flightly brown; pulse quick.

16th. He had two glyfters yefterday afternoon; they did not produce any confiderable evacuation by ftool. He paffed altogether about two pints of very deep-coloured urine yefterday; and has paffed a confiderable quantity this morning; he fays, he had a pretty large evacuation by ftool yefterday evening; he vomited a little yellow bitter matter this morning; his belly has been fomented feveral times, but not in the moft effectual manner, from a deficiency of proper conveniences; his pulfe is 102, and not very weak; he was very uneafy laft night, and has much pain in the belly; his urine this morning 'is like muddy porter;'

porter;' his eyes confiderably fuffufed with yellow: he has juft had a glyfter; he has taken fome tea this morning; he is now taking two ounces every hour of a mixture of fix drams of fal rupellenfe, two drams of cream of tartar, half an ounce of fugar, two drams of fpirit of lavender, in eight ounces of water. He is directed now to take a pill of fix grains of calomel. He ate fago yefterday, which he thought encreafed the fullnefs of his ftomach much, and he felt as if it had become very four there.

Evening. He vomited the little he took of the mixture with fome bile. A grain of tartar emetic was added to fix ounces of the fame mixture; and a fpoonful taken frequently; he has difcharged by vomit nearly three pints of bile; he refufes the glyfters; his belly continues fwelled and painful; he has not had any more difcharges by ftool; he has taken fix additional grains of calomel, as it is thought the former was rejected by vomit.

17th. Laft night his pulfe feemed to have funk very low; and he had fome twitching of the tendons; the pain was fevere over his abdomen; particularly towards the ftomach; the whole abdomen was more fwelled and tenfe; he made high-coloured urine; he vomited inceffantly very dark green, nearly black

black matters ; fomething like muddy coffee, but not fo black; the attendants fay he raved, but I did not perceive it; he was fenfible throughout. He had no paffage by stool. He feems this morning to be fomewhat better; his pulse inconfiderably encreased in ftrength; he still continues to vomit the fame kind of dark-coloured liquid, with the adaddition of pieces of a 'blue' fubstance; which feem to be tenacious mucus, and of the fame colour as the other difcharge. The water he has vomited is not fo dark this morning; he has not had any paffage by stool, but he has discharged about a pint of the fame coloured urine; he cannot keep gruel with wine, tea, or any thing on his ftomach; but it is probable he has not thrown up a small pill of ten grains of calomel, which he took this morning; he has not had any paffage by ftool. He was fomented in the evening. During the night, of his own accord, he rubbed fpirit of turpentine over the abdomen; he has fome degree of ftoppage in his throat, as well as hiccup occafionally; his fkin is dry; pulfe not fo quick as usual, and not near fo weak as last night; tongue moift, with a brown fur in the middle; he looks more ghaftly than he did yesterday morning; he has been perfuaded

to

to take another glyfter; his belly has been fomented this morning.

18th. He had four large glysters of about twelve ounces each, with an ounce of glauber falts, and two ounces of caftor-oil in each; one or more of them ftayed in a confiderable time; they were thrown up with as much force as poffible; fome yellow water feemed to follow the laft. At noon he had a large blifter applied on the abdomen, which rofe well before night. He took ten more grains of calomel in the evening; he has not had the least passage by stool as yet; he had a confiderable interval yesterday without vomiting; but he still continues to throw up a dark-coloured water, though not fo dark as before. He fipped wine and water of different kinds yesterday, and endeavoured to eat some gruel; but his stomach seems to have rejected every thing except the pills. He has taken two grains of opium this morning. The effervescent draughts have not been tried as yet. He made high-coloured urine yefterday; the blifter gave him much pain; in the evening his fkin was cool, but his pulfe more feeble and quick; the middle of his tongue is more brown, and it is ftill moift; his fkin is still cool, and his pulfe feeble and quick; he fays, he was much troubled with hiccup T

hiccup last night; he has had no subfultus tendinum fince the night before last. He is directed to have glyster of chicken or mutton broth to-day; the effervescent draughts to be used, and two grains more of opium to be taken three hours after the first, if the former should not stop the vomiting.

Evening. He had one glyfter of chicken broth, which came away tinged with yellow, he paffed much urine rather muddy and paler. He took in all about five grains of opium. He took twice effervescent draughts, and afterwards ten grains of musch and five of camphor in an ounce of wine; these feem to have stayed on his stomach. His pulse is more full, and less quick. He has stept well for a few hours; his belly is free from pain; he has had no stool as yet.

19th. He ate a pint of pretty thick rice gruel yesterday evening, which stayed on his stomach. He had another dose of the musc and camphor, with about seven grains of calomel, and also another glyster of chicken broth; the heat of his skin was pretty natural, but dry. His tongue moist, as it has been during the whole course of his diforder; the brown colour in the middle had rather a purple tinge. He felt himself better in every respect, but had not had any stool. He passed

paffed the night in great eafe; but his hiccup is not diminished. He has made abundance of urine; he sipped toast and water all night. He thinks he seels fome degree of pain in the abdomenthis morning. Histongue, skin, and pulse are pretty much the same as last night.

10 A. M. On feeling his pulfe as he lay almost asleep, it feemed to be full, and even strong, and not very quick; but on lifting himfelf up in his hammock, it beat rather quicker and smaller. In the first situation it was 86, in the latter 92. He has passed abundance of urine, and the hiccup appears less troubless to relax a little, as if perspiration was at hand.

20th, 10 A. M. He threw up the mufk and camphor yefterday, as well as a pill of three grains of opium, which was given to him afterwards. He kept nothing on his ftomach all day. He feemed to have an interval free from fever during a part of the day, when his pulfe feemed to have decreafed in ftrength. He had three glyfters of chicken or mutton broth. Hock and water were rejected. He took a tea-fpoonful of æther, with about ninety drops of laudanum in an * ounce

ounce of wine at night; this has hitherto ftopped the hiccup and vomiting. He always difcharged a good deal of watery liquor when he vomited. He has paffed much urine this morning; was very eafy, and appeared to fleep well laft night. His pulfe is rather flower, and his tongue is certainly more clear, but the fwelling of his belly remains much the fame. He ate laft night and this morning fome fpoonsfull of thick gruel, which has remained on his ftomach.

Evening. He difcharged about an ounce of fæculent yellow matter after a glyfter this morning. He has had two glyfters of chicken broth to-day. This afternoon his pulfe has become very feeble, and quick, and his fkin cold, with a cold fweat at one time. He has fwallowed occafionally a fpoonfull of rice gruel and panada. His ftomach rejected Madeira and water. The vomiting feems to have fupervened as the pulfe funk. He got this evening a draught of one dram of æther, and one hundred drops of laudanum; part of which he feems to have thrown up. A blifter has been applied over the ftomach; and another on the infide of the thigh.

21st. The hiccup returned, his voice failed about ten P. M. when he was still sensible. He took two more drams of æther. The blister

blifter over his stomach rose; his pulse was still perceptible; his eyes very open and staring; his skin not very cold. He expired about two o'clock this morning.

Full Moon 23d.

DISSECTION OF KENNETT.

A transverse section being made from the left to the right lumbar region, a great quantity of purulent matter isfued from the cavity of the abdomen, (little veftige of the omentum appeared, but there were pieces apparently of a fatty fubstance, perhaps diffolved omentum, mixed with the purulent matter, which was also accompanied by a confiderable quantity of a watery liquor) which appeared partly in clots, as if from the diffolution of folid fubftance, and to have been discharged from the concave part of the right and great lobe of the liver; (but the existence of an opening there was not politively alcertained, from want of time and convenience for a more minute investigation). Upon detaching the viscus, from its natural fituation; greater force was neceffary than that required in removing it from its ligaments, and which arose from a very firm adhesion of the convex portion of the right lobe to the concave part of the diaphragm. A thick membranous incrustation (which Z

(which had the appearance of thick pus, or an unequal layer of a fatty substance) feemed to cover the greater part of the convex fide, (or at leaft the inferior extremity of it) which appeared larger than common. An incifion being made, discovered the feat of a large abfcefs, extending the whole courfe of the fcope of the knife; a little of the great deal of matter which iffued out appeared much better digested than that under; the last of which feemed to correspond most in colour and confistence with that which isfued on opening the abdomen, which shewed the abfcefs broke fpontaneoufly in the concave part of the liver. Upon opening the gall bladder, fome blood iffued out (the blood appeared much diluted with fome thin liquor, the duct had been cut transversely before, and a darker, but very thin liquid, iffued through the aperture). The ducts feemed perfectly found. The blood veffels on the ftomach feemed distended. The spleen was perfectly found. The lungs felt natural. (They were not inspected.) The lower part of the rectum indurated in feveral places. The bladder but little distended. The matter contained in the cavity of the abfcefs in the liver might be about twenty ounces. The two hands clasped might have been introduced.

REMARKS

REMARKS ON KENNET'S CASE.

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There was not a poffibility of miftaking the nature of the diforder in question, from the very commencement of his attendance. Every appearance afforded the most decided evidence that it was an affection of the liver; nor was it very difficult to form a judgment of the exact stage to which the diforder had arrived. Some circumstances however were not mentioned till after his death. when it was understood that he had laboured under the complaint for a confiderable time, and that he had taken medicines from fome medical gentlemen at Madras, who had provided him with mercurial ointment before his departure. These symptoms, though by no means to be mifconftrued by a practitioner of any experience in India, from the great number of fimilar cafes which occur in that climate, might eafily have been attributed to another fource by the generality of phyficians in Europe. It might have been pronounced a dyfentery only by fome, and by others probably a hectic, from a confumption of the lungs. His emaciated habit might have confirmed fuch fuspicions. It was evident then that the dyfentery was only a fymptom of the affection of the liver; Z 2 but

but whatever may be the caufe of a dyfentery, it will be generally found, that the method of treatment at the beginning should be pretty much the fame in all; and that all kinds of recent fluxes will for the most part yield to the fame means. At first, therefore, evacuations from the bowels were used with fome freedom; these did not appear to increase the prevailing debility in any confiderable degree, which fapervened only a length of time after the complete ceffation of the dysenteric symptoms. I have suppofed the flux in this inftance to have been merely fymptomatic of the affection of the liver; and if the fuppofition be just, it will follow that a morbid effect may be completely removed during the full predominance of its cause; for, notwithstanding the difappearance of the flux, there was no reafon to imagine that the ftate of the liver was, much improved. The use of intestinal evacuants by no means precluded that of mercury in a deobstruent form, as it is usually termed. It has generally been found, that mercury in the liver fucceeds beft, when managed fo as to evacuate the inteffines confiderably during the whole, or the greater part of the treatment; and experience feems to have the fanction of reason in this inftance.

stance. No medicine whatever possesses the power of mercury in the excitement, and extraordinary increase of all the fecretions, particularly those of the bowels. If those which certainly take place during the exhibition of mercury are allowed to accumulate, to stagnate, and to become acrid in the bowels, much mischief must unavoidably prove the refult. A fever, perhaps a dyfentery, but certainly an exacerbation of all the previous fymptoms must be the confequence. On these occasions, the intestines, &c. do not appear in general to poffefs activity fufficient to evacuate themfelves to a proper degree; and therefore require the affistance of art, It is perfectly understood, that in the exhibition of mercury for the venereal difeafe, the unanimous opinion of the faculty has decided, that every precaution should be taken to prevent the tendency of that medicine to the bowels, as a circumstance very unfavourable to its general effect on all the fecretions of the fystem, by which it may be fuppofed to operate in the cure of the venereal difease. This no doubt is extremely just; but it has not the leaft analogy with the use of mercury in the liver; as the fecretions of that vifcus and the other bowels are alone concerned in the

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treatment; nor does it appear that the excitement of an increased action in the other. organs of the bowels is at all inimical to that of the liver. Even in the foundest condition of the liver, from whatever fource the bile may immediately flow, very copious difcharges follow the exhibition of a purgative; and it may be prefumed that it does fometimes come immediately from the liver. on fuch occafions. It was deemed proper to make the foregoing observations, respecting the action of mercury on the intestines, left its failure in the prefent cafe should be attributed to its combination with a purgative medicine. It is certainly a most extraordinary circumstance, that the very large quantity of mercury, exhibited in the form of calomel and ointment, should not only have made no impression whatever on the feat of the diforder, but should have failed to affect even the falivary glands, or any other part, in the flightest degree. This apparent inertness of the medicine in venereal cafes has often been attributed to the infirm flate of the patient; but although in fuch habits it may fail in its general effect on the fyftem, its operation on the falivary glands has been favoured by fuch circumstances of debility. It is poffible, although very improbable, that

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the mercurial ointment may not have been of a proper quality. It was furnished from the apothecary's shop at Madras. Exclusively of the ointment, the mercury given internally, in the form of calomel, should alone have proved fufficient for the purpofe. An error certainly did exift in the practice, for the only chance of the patient's efcape was placed in the early effect of the mercury, which should have been exhibited in fuch large quantities as to have produced its usual effects in eight, or twelve days at the very lateft. In purfuance of this object no quantity of mercury should have been esteemed exceffive, until the falivary glands had become powerfully affected. It may be repeated, that the affection of the mouth in venereal difeafes is justly thought to be unneceffarily, if not pernicioufly, retarded by a combination of laxative medicines; although this effect is as certainly retarded by fimilar means in affections of the liver, yet it is not of equal prejudice in the cure, for the reafons which have been stated before. About fix ounces of mercurial ointment were used, and nearly two drachms of calomel. It is very probable, that if one third, or one fourth of that quantity had been exhibited at first in one fixth part of the time, the mercury would

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have made its usual impression on the feat of the diforder, as well as on the gums.

To those who have not been much converfant in affections of the liver, the ufe of mercury at all, after the fuppofed formation of matter, would appear an unwarrantable practice, and in direct contrariety to the teftimony of many writers. Were the validity of this opinion however granted, yet the difficulty is still as great as ever; for how is the existence of abscess to be ascertained ? Not beyond precarious conjecture. The hectic heats and partial fweats, not to mention the lefs important fymptoms which have been received as indicatory of abfcefs or abforption, afford no criterion whatever for the regulation of our practice; for these may, and generally do occur in every species of affected liver at one period or other of the diforder, and yield as readily to mercury as any other obvious form of liver. Hectic heats, partial fweats, a general decay of embonpoint, colour, and ftrength, are often the very firft fymptoms of a difeafe in that vifcus. But independent of the inutility of fuch a difference, as far as it relates to practice, it cannot in reality be allowed that mercury is ufelefs, much less prejudicial, in those cases where matter has certainly been formed. Affections of

of that viscus will never be found to be partial. While one part has advanced to the stage of abfcefs, another may only have arrived to within fome degrees of it, and a third may be in an incipient stage; both the latter however decidedly curable by mercury. The mischievous effects of this medicine in real cafes of abfcefs should, one might suppose, be afcertained beyond all poffibility of doubt, before a practitioner would venture to prefcribe its use, when the earlier stages of the diforder may still be deemed to exist in other parts of the liver. It may be declared with freedom, that experience combats fuch prejudices against the use of mercury; and that they have not even the fanction of any plaufible theory. It has been imagined, that the abforption of the matter creates all the general mischief in the habit, which refults from internal abfcefs; yet it is obvious that the matter must form a passage for itself through fome other channel, if it should not be abforbed. The confequence of this may prove of either a more or a lefs favourable termination than that by abforption; and it will be allowed that the evacuation of the matter through the means of abforption is not neceffarily fatal, but will often cure the patient. In what manner can mercury, under any

any of these circumstances, prove of differvice? If the matter should have a tendency to make its way through the biliary ducts into the intestines, which is probably the most favourable course, will the action of mercury direct its progress through the diaphragm and the lungs, or promote its difcharge still more deleteriously into the cavity of the abdomen? No theorist, I believe, will torture reasoning into such a conclusion.

Mercury indeed, from its powerful action on the abforbents, may be reafonably expected to favour the cure of abfcefs through their means, at the very time that it prevents the formation of more matter, or fresh abfceffes, by its general effect on other parts of the liver; fo that next to the efforts of mere nature it may be afferted, the only chance of the patient's falvation is to be fought for in the use of mercury.

It may be faid, that this drug will increafe the debility, and tend to render the falutary efforts of nature lefs powerful. But thofe, who have had much experience of its ufe, are well affured that its effects are on no occafion fo confiderable, in this refpect, as have been generally apprehended; that it has a contrary tendency, if fulnefs and ftrength of pulfe may be allowed to ftand as proofs

proofs of it; and that although there may be one period after the ceffation of the ftimulus, when a proportional *collapse* does in reality take place, yet that it is innocuous in its remote and ultimate confequence may be prefumed, from the rapid embonpoint and fenfe of health which take place fooner or later in most instances.

It will refult from these observations, that it was not eafy to afcertain the exact period of the formation of matter in Kennet's liver ; and that under the utmost certainty of the existence of abscess, the curative indications must have still continued nearly the fame. Some of the medicines used must have been deemed unneceffary, after the information acquired from the diffection. The last blifters may poffibly have had no other effect than to teafe the patient; and they might poffibly have been applied at a more early period of the complaint with propriety. No doubt, a bold incifion obliquely upwards might have reached the feat of the principal abfcefs, and have refcued the patient from inevitable death; but it was not fufficiently low down or protrusive to warrant the operation; yet it is to be regretted that it was not attempted on the principle of 'melius anceps remedium quam nullum.'

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A difficulty of breathing in most instances has been thought to proceed from an affection of the substance of the lungs. Pressure from an enlargement of the liver may poffibly be esteemed fuch; but there is not a doubt that the breathing has often been greatly affected, when the difease of the liver has exhibited itself on diffection under the form of an extraordinary diminution of its fubstance. In reality, there are very few instances of morbid liver, but what are principally characterifed by fome alteration in the offices of the refpiratory organs. To account for this, the aid of nervous fympathy may be called in; and each practitioner may exercise his ingenuity, according to his favourite fystem, on the fubject; but it is fufficient for either the writer or reader of these remarks to have stated the fact. In the fame manner they may account for what has been generally deemed the pathognomonic fymptom of the liver, a pain in the shoulder; but there is the most ample experience that it feldom occurs, in proportion to the frequency of cafes, without it. Neither in this cafe, nor indeed in any other, has the particular hardnefs of the gums, mentioned by Mr. ---- as a leading circumstance in the nofology and cure

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cure of the difeafe, been obferved. But the fymptoms of difeafed liver are fo numerous, fo various, and mimick fuch a variety of other diforders, that even this extraordinary fymptom may have occurred very frequently to that gentleman. The liver has indeed been miftaken by different practitioners on different occafions for almost every diforder to which the human body is obnoxious; not even to the exception of the lues venerea and the gout. The prefent cafe afforded fo many unaccountable fymptoms, that an inexperienced practitioner might have almost fuppofed the patient afflicted with half a dozen different diforders at once.

The fenfation which a patient denominates a pain in the flomach is a very frequent occurrence in a difeafed liver; nor will it be difficult to form a reafonable conjecture relative to its caufe, if the extension of the liver over the flomach, and in some circumstances of difeafe, over the left fide, be attended to. This pain at the pit of the flomach is sometimes the only obvious symptom of a difeafed liver; and on other occafions it is characterifed by dyspectic symptoms only. In such inftances it is not difficult to conceive the probable fatality, or at leaft the inutility, of the medicines generally prefcribed

prefcribed in those cafes; but no means whatever could fave the patient, it is apprehended, under the course of diet, not only allowed but strongly recommended by a profession of Edinburgh. Porter and beefstakes would inevitably increase every form of difease in that viscus; and no doubt there are physicians who would esteem such a diet very extraordinary even in dyspepsia. The former certainly requires the strictest confinement to a spare diet, chiefly of vegetables; nor can it be supposed, from some small share of experience, that there exists any just foundation for a material difference in the diet best adapted to both complaints.

The difficulty and pain of micturition, which occurred at the commencement of his attendance in a high degree, and latterly to a dangerous height, admit of various explanations. The moft obvious perhaps might be the abforption of the matter, at leaft in the latter inftance, and its difcharge through the urinary organs, where it might reafonably be fuppofed to occafion a confiderable degree of irritation; but the urine difcharged did not at any time afford evidence of the exiftence of pus; and although it was certainly loaded once or twice with foreign matters, it did not appear that the matter of the abfcefs

abfcefs formed any very confiderable part of them. It is immaterial to what fource the caufe of ftrangury be attributed on fuch occafions, as the means of cure will generally be found to differ very little. In the prefent inftance, undoubtedly, the catheter paffed into the bladder, yet the urine did not flow; perhaps from its muddinefs, poffibly from a temporary palfy, or, the laft refource of a pufsled theorift, from nervous fympathy. Glyfters appeared to have the greateft fhare in promoting the difcharge. The femicupium, from the want of proper convenience, could not be ufed with any effect.

In the production of many of the latter fymptoms, the accumulation of matter in the cavity of the abdomen may be fuppofed to have had the principal fhare. Although fenfible of the utility of a detailed difcuffion on every fymptom, yet circumftances do not allow of a further profecution of the fubject at prefent.

Few phyficians in Europe, during an attendance on thefe two cafes of difeafed liver, would have deemed them the fame diforder, the fame at leaft as far as regarded the method of treatment; yet there is no reafon to entertain a doubt, but that a courfe of mercury would have proved as fuccefsful in the inert enlargement of Pickering's liver, as in the

the apparently more acute flate of Kennet's, had it formed the chief dependance of the practitioner at the commencement of the complaint in one inftance, and had it been exhibited with fufficient vigour in the other.

Gentlemen therefore fhould be cautious how they conclude that every difeafe, which differs in appearance, is in reality a different diforder, and requires a different method of cure. However various, or even diametrically opposite diforders may feem in warm climates, the most fatal confequences may follow a difference of treatment. The caufe of all will generally be found pretty much the fame, the treatment also nearly the fame, while the fymptoms are as directly contrary as it is possible to imagine.

Practitioners should not think any time or trouble vainly bestowed in observing and noting down every the most minute circumstance, however infignificant it may feem, respecting a patient. From this source alone must he establish his principles of practice in India; for he will soon be convinced that he is not to expect success from a reliance on the opinions of the first phyficians and authors in Europe.

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
