As you love ir country,—as you value Religion, Morality, Justice, and edom from a hateful and un-English system of **Police Spies** plain clothes,—Vote only for the Candidate who will pledge iself to the **Total Repeal** of these Acts.

Many of you are ignorant of the immoral and wicked nature hese Acts, because they were hurried or "smuggled" through h Houses of Parliament, in a manner unprecedented. The of 1869 was passed by both Houses between the dates of y 23d and August 7th, without a single word of debate ! Why ? ause supporters of the system of the Act knew that it would er receive the support or approval of the great mass of the glish people. Mr Berkeley Hill, who is Secretary to a iety for Extending the Acts, warned a Parliamentary Comtee, that "it was very important that public attention should of be too much attracted" to the Acts; because it was "very "portant to get the whole country under control."

Petitions to Parliament, with more than a Million and

luarter of Signatures of Men and Women, have testified the rief and disgust of the people regarding the Acts; yet they and not only unrepealed, but the Government lately attempted to extend their worst and most immoral principles to the who country, and will, no doubt, try to do so again.

What are the CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACTS?

They are Laws passed for the alleged protection of Immor Soldiers and Sailors from Disease resulting from immoral praices; but they are applied to **Women only**. Wherever the ire in force, Women are at the mercy of **Police Spies in pla**clothes, and on the evidence of such men any poor defencele woman may be compelled, under the penalty of imprisonmen to undergo, whether well or ill, an indescribable outrage by Surgeon in the pay of the State. In the three years endin December 31st 1871, One Hundred and Thirty-two Thousan Six Hundred and Ninety-three of these outrages have been pe petrated, and in **One Hundred and Twenty Thousand Case** without even the excuse of disease. No less than 127 po women preferred prison life and hard labour to the atrocities the Acts! These outrages are carried on daily at the present tim

The Laws are based on the Unrighteous and Immoral priciple that *Prostitution is a Necessity*, and that it is the duty the State to protect Immoral Men, by placing in jeopardy the character and personal honour of all *poor* and *helpless* Women.

In the House of Commons, on the 23d of July 1872, M Mundella, M.P. for Sheffield, and a Member of the Royal Con mission of Inquiry into the working of the Acts, said : "I prot "against a law which visits upon Women the consequences of t "delinquencies of Men. The course which Parliament has tak "must be retraced; it is infamous and discreditable to a Christi "Legislature, and cannot be supported."

Demand of all Candidates—the Total and Uncondition Repeal of these Acts, and their opposition to all similar leglation in future !! If they will not comply, refuse to Vote 1 them, or you will perpetuate and share in the infamy and d credit of these Laws.
