




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

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PREFACE.

IN a letter which I read, a few weeks ago, in one of the naval and military papers (evidently written by an English or Irish Naval Medical Officer), the writer complains loudly that Scotchmen monopolise all the high appointments in the medical department of the Navy; that they have done so for many years past; and that from the numbers of Scotchmen at the heads of the lists of the higher grades of the medical officers, he augurs they are likely to hold all the high appointments for many years to come.

There can be no doubt that the writer of this letter is perfectly correct in what he states as to the fact that Scotchmen have for many years held, and that they do at present hold, all, or nearly all, the higher appointments in the medical department of the Navy; and, he might have added, of the Army also. But whether they will (as this writer predicts) continue to do so for many years to come, is, I think, to say the least of it, exceedingly problematical.

No doubt the colleges that have produced such men as JOHN HUNTER, as BELL, CULLEN, GREGORY, LIZARS, and LISTON, that continue to produce such men as FERGUSON, SYME, SIMPSON, and the other eminent men, the PROFESSORS in the Scotch colleges—men who are an honour to the colleges that bred them, to the classes over which they preside, and to the

country that gave them birth—are not unlikely to continue to produce men every way worthy of filling the highest positions in the medical departments of both the Navy and Army. But English, and especially Irish students, are fast filling up the places, in the ranks of Assistant-Surgeons, formerly filled by Scotchmen.

I attribute this influx of Irish, and comparative falling off in the entry of Scotch, Assistant-Surgeons to the readier means of information the Irish medical students possess as to the changes and improvements, which more especially have recently been made in the position, pay, etc., of the whole body of medical officers in the Navy.

In Scotland, it may be said that there are but two *men-of-war* altogether—one at Queensferry and one at Greenock; both of these being situated at such distances, even from the universities nearest to them, that the students of these universities are not likely to come frequently in contact with the officers belonging to those ships, from whom alone they could obtain the information they require; whereas in Ireland there are constantly *men-of-war* cruising in and out of its harbours, besides those stationed close to both Dublin and Cork—the seats of its principal colleges. At the latter port there is also a Naval Hospital, with its complete staff of medical and other officers.

It is, therefore, with a view to inform the Scottish students of the medical profession, of the advantages the Navy holds out to them, to afford them a fair field and no favour, that I attempt to place before them, in a few brief pages, the actual condition of Medical Officers in the Royal Navy.

I shall state, as briefly as I can, how they obtain admission

into the Navy; how they rank with other officers of the Navy, and with medical and other officers of the Army; how they are paid; how they are lodged and messed; how they are promoted from one grade to another; what honorary, and what pecuniary, rewards they receive for meritorious and long services; the amounts of half-pay and retiring allowances they become entitled to; and though last, not least in importance, the amounts of pensions and gratuities which, on their death, are awarded to their widows and children.

In order to render the information as complete as possible, I shall also add lists of the names of every Medical Officer belonging to the Royal Navy, on the first of this month; and also the names of every Ship and Vessel forming the Royal Navy; and in the hope of again seeing my young countrymen presenting themselves in their wonted numbers, and with their wonted ability, as candidates for admission into it, this little *brochure* is respectfully submitted to them by the author.

ADMISSION OF MEDICAL OFFICERS INTO THE ROYAL NAVY.

Qualifications.

THE Candidate must not be under 20 nor over 26 years of age.

He must be in possession of a Diploma from one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of England, Edinburgh, or Dublin; or from other Corporate Body legally entitled to grant a Diploma in Surgery.

He must also produce—

1st. A Certificate, signed by the Minister of the Parish, or by a Magistrate of the district in which he has lately resided, that he is of good moral character.

2d. He will be required to produce proof that he has received a Classical Education; and that he has, in particular, a competent knowledge of Latin.

3d. That he has served an apprenticeship, or has been engaged for not less than six months in Practical Pharmacy.

4th. That he has actually attended a recognised Hospital for eighteen months, since he was 18 years of age, in which Hospital the average number of Patients is not less than 100.

5th. That he has been engaged in actual dissections of the human body twelve months; the Certificate of which, from the teacher, must state the number of subjects, or parts dissected by the Candidate.

6th. That he has attended Lectures, etc., on the following subjects at established schools of eminence by Physicians or Surgeons of the recognised Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for not less than the undermentioned periods; observing, however, that such lectures will not be admitted if the teacher shall lecture on more than one branch of science; or if the lectures on Anatomy, Surgery, and Medicine be not attended during winter sessions of six months each:—

In addition to the Tickets for the Lectures, the Candidate must produce Certificates, from the Professors by whom the lectures were given, stating the periods (in months) he has actually attended those lectures. The time he has actually attended an Hospital or Infirmary must also be certified; and the Tickets, as well as the Certificates of Attendance, Age, Moral Character, etc., must be produced before he can be examined by the examining Officers appointed by the Ad-

miralty. The examination is conducted by two of the senior Medical Officers in the Navy, at Somerset House. Due notice of the time when these examinations are to be held, is duly forwarded to Candidates for admission.

The foregoing are the only qualifications necessary for admission into the Royal Navy as an Assistant-Surgeon; but a favourable consideration is always given to those Candidates who have obtained the Degree of M.D. at any of the Universities qualified to confer the same; or who, by possessing a knowledge of diseases of the eye, or of any special branch of science connected with the profession, such as Medical Jurisprudence, Natural History, Natural Philosophy, etc., appear to be more peculiarly eligible for admission into the Naval Service. It is to be observed, however, that Lectures on these, or any other subjects, will not be admitted as compensating for any deficiency in the previously-mentioned subjects.

The examination at Somerset House will not be more severe or searching than that the Candidate has already passed at his college before receiving his Diploma; but he must not fall into the error of supposing that it will not be equally so. There are men in London who profess to *grind* Candidates for the Naval Examination, but if the Candidate has passed a good examination at his college, and has a proper confidence in himself, he may safely steer clear of the *grinders*.

In applying to be admitted as an Assistant-Surgeon in the Royal Navy, it is merely required to address a letter to the SECRETARY OF THE ADMIRALTY, stating that you are in possession of a Diploma from such a college—naming it; that you are of the required age, stating the same; and that you are desirous of being admitted as a Candidate, when, if there are any vacancies, you will be informed when you will be required to present yourself at Somerset House, London, for examination. If there should be no vacancies at the time of your making your application, you will be informed accordingly.

It is not unusual for gentlemen, when applying for admission into the Navy as Assistant-Surgeons, to solicit their appointments through a Member of Parliament or other influential party. And no doubt an application made through such a channel may be more certain of success, especially when vacancies are few, than the mere unaided application of the Candidate himself. But this sort of influence is by no means essential to success under ordinary circumstances. A simple application from the Candidate himself, addressed thus—

will generally do the business.*

Having passed your examination, you will, in the course of the following day, receive your appointment as Acting Assistant-Surgeon to one of Her Majesty's ships, either for service on board that ship, or for service on shore, at one of the Naval Hospitals—Haslar or Plymouth. You will at the same time be informed that you are granted two or three weeks, as you may require, leave of absence, to enable you to provide your uniform and appointments. These you can get at Gillott's in the Strand, or at any of the naval outfitters in Portsmouth or Plymouth. It is generally thought to be more convenient to have your outfitter in a naval port.

London outfitters are said to vary in their prices; but that, in general, they charge higher than their brethren in the naval ports. The following list of prices of an Assistant-Surgeon's Uniform is by one of the latter:—

These are *credit* prices, but would, I presume, be considerably less for *ready money*, a thing, by the by, to which Naval Tailors are not much accustomed.

You must also provide yourself with a set of Surgical Instruments, which will cost you from ten to fifteen guineas.

All kinds of underclothing, towels, handkerchiefs, etc., may be purchased much more advantageously from a regular dealer, in those things, in Scotland, than from any naval outfitter in England, or elsewhere.

Advance of Pay on Joining.

On joining your ship you will, if you wish it, be paid what is termed three months' advance, £30. Of course it is not *all* advance, as your pay will have been going on from the date of your appointment; nor is it the amount of three months' pay, being in fact only 60 days' pay; but it is the amount of three *monthly advances* you will receive in the first and second months of each quarter afterwards. The balance being paid to you on the last day of the quarter.

NOTE.—Assistant-Surgeons after six years' service, wear the same Uniform as Surgeons; when they incur an additional expense for EPAULETTES and GOLD-LACED TROUSERS.

Rank and Precedence of Naval Medical Officers.

Her Majesty was graciously pleased, by Her Order in Council of 6th July 1866, to direct that Medical Officers of the Royal Navy should in future take Rank and Precedence with the Officers of the other branches of the Navy; and with Officers of the Army according to the following Tables:—

Staff-Surgeons, when serving in Flag Ships on Foreign Stations, are allowed extra pay of 5/ per diem.

Staff-Surgeons, Surgeons, and Assistant-Surgeons, when serving in ships in which there is no accommodation for residing on board, as in Drill Ships for the Royal Naval Reserve, are allowed £50 per annum for lodgings, and 1/6 per diem, in addition, in lieu of ship's rations.

Whenever Medical Officers are employed on extra duty, they are allowed such extra pay, as it may appear to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the nature of the service merits.

Medical Officers of the Royal Navy, when employed in Military Operations on shore, receive the following field allowances in addition to their pay :—

NOTE.—In cases where Medical Officers draw provisions or fuel from public stores, they are charged for the same at cost price.

Formerly, and indeed until very lately, joining a ship, whether it might be your first or your twentieth, was no joke, as regarded the expense you were put to.

First came your *mess entrance*, varying from £10 to £20, or sometimes even more than that, according to the epicurean tastes of the majority, or, as it might happen, *minority* of your messmates. The whole of this amount (and probably, in the course of the ship's commission of three years, a good deal more) from each member of the mess used to be expended on mess traps, and which, at the end of the commission, would be sold to a Jew, for fewer pence than they had cost pounds.

In addition to this you had to furnish your cabin* with everything you required in it; and if you were furnishing a cabin for the first time, it would probably cost you from £10 to £15 to furnish it, even very plainly. *Mais tout cela est changé!* Every article of mess traps is now furnished by the Admiralty *gratis*. The same with your cabin furniture—every necessary article except bedding is supplied from the dockyards.

Admiral Lord Clarence Paget, late Secretary of the Admir-

* For many years after the author of this joined the service, Assistant-Surgeons had no cabins, but slept in hammocks, as do Sub-Lieutenants, Midshipmen, etc., They also messed in the gunroom with these and other junior officers; but since they have been made *Wardroom Officers*, which they have been for above a dozen years, they have been provided with cabins. By an Admiralty Circular dated the 13th of last month, Medical Officers are to have the choice of cabins according to their rank and precedence, irrespective of executive, or combatant, rank.

alty, said in his place in the House of Commons, a short time ago, that a naval officer on joining a ship, now, might take everything he requires in his portmanteau. And this is, in the main, perfectly true, so amply is everything necessary for his mess-place and cabin (except bedding, as already stated) provided by the Admiralty.

An officer on joining his ship has, therefore, nothing more to pay than his mess subscription monthly. This varies in ships, according to the station they are on, from £2, 10s. to £3, 10s. per month. This subscription does not include anything for wines or liquors of any kind. Whatever amount of these you may consume will be paid for by you, separately, at the end of each month or quarter. But as all wines are permitted, by sanction of the Admiralty, to be shipped free of duty, you drink them so much cheaper on board, than you could the same qualities of wines on shore. Whether you may have much, or nothing at all to pay for wines, etc., will, of course, depend entirely on yourself.

The monthly subscription, of say £3, with the Government allowance of £11, 3s. 8d. per annum to each member in lieu of provisions, is generally found sufficient to meet all ordinary expenses of messing.

It is the custom in all wardroom messes to have an extra dinner on two days of the week—generally Monday and Thursday. The days so selected are styled *field days*. It is on these days that guests are invited to dine *by the mess*. The guests thus invited are called *public guests*, and such invitations entail no extra subscription from any one, except for the extra wine consumed.

It is usual to invite the Captain, and any other superior officer that may be on board, once a week—the other public guests are so many of the junior officers of the ship; and, if in port, officers of the sister service, and other public functionaries.

The Captain, or Admiral, if there be one on board, usually

has two or three wardroom, and two or three gunroom, officers to dine with him on every other day of the week, than that on which he dines in the wardroom.

Any member of the wardroom mess inviting a private friend to dine with him on board, pays usually from 2s. 6d. to 3s. 6d. (according to the rule of the mess) for his friend's dinner, in addition to any extra expense for wine.

The foregoing are the whole of the ordinary, and extraordinary, expenses of messing in the wardrooms of Her Majesty's ships; and which should not, with drinking a reasonable quantity of wine, beer, etc., exceed fifty guineas per annum.

I know an assistant-surgeon, who is on the lowest scale of pay, who takes his glass of wine, occasionally, and who, after paying his tailor's bill for the year, and all other incidental expenses, as washing, servant, etc., remits, for the support of a widowed mother and two young sisters, £25 at the end of each quarter.

Officers in the Navy, wherever they may be serving, can remit to their relatives, or other persons, residing in any part of Great Britain or Ireland, through the Accountant-General of the Navy, by the Paymaster of the ship, without any other agency, and without any expense, any portion, or the whole, of their pay that may be due to them, on the last day of each quarter.

Servants.

Inspectors-General, and Deputy Inspectors-General (when embarked), Staff-Surgeons, and Commanders, are the only wardroom officers who are allowed a servant each. All the other officers, including, of course, Assistant-Surgeons, are allowed only half a servant each; or, in other words, a servant between two of them; and notwithstanding the Scripture maxim, that *no man can serve two masters*, they do so, in the

Navy, with tolerable success. These servants are entered on the ship's books with the rating of *officer's servant*. Their pay from the Admiralty is about £17 per annum and their provisions; and where they are well-conducted, attentive lads, it is usual for each of their masters to give them 10s. a month; which makes their pay up to about £29 per annum.

This sum of 10s. monthly from the masters is entirely gratuitous, and, of course, may be withheld at the pleasure, or rather the *displeasure*, of the master. The duties of the naval servant combine those of the valet and housemaid, as he not only brushes his master's clothes, but makes up his bed, attends table, and scrubs the deck, or floor, of his cabin.

I believe it was lately in contemplation by the Admiralty, to allow every wardroom officer a servant to himself, which would, no doubt, be an improvement.

Promotions.

An Assistant-Surgeon having served three years, from the date of his appointment in the service, may be examined as to his qualifications for promotion to the rank of Surgeon. If he be serving abroad, at the time of completing his three years' service, he may, if he wish it, be examined *provisionally*, under the direction of the Commander-in-Chief or senior officer, by an Inspector, or Deputy Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets (if there be either present), and three Surgeons, in the presence of a Captain or Commander; and as soon after his arrival in England as may be convenient for him, to present himself at Somerset House, for his regular and final examination.

At this final examination, the Assistant-Surgeon must produce a certificate from one of the before-mentioned Colleges, Faculty, or other corporate body (founded on an examination passed subsequent to his completion of the said three years' service)

together with satisfactory proof that he has performed, on the dead body, under the superintendence of a professor or teacher of known eminence, all the capital operations of surgery; that he is perfectly competent to perform any surgical operation with skill and dexterity; and that he is thoroughly acquainted with the anatomy of the parts involved in such operation.

To enable Assistant-Surgeons to pass this examination satisfactorily, they are granted, on application, two months' leave of absence to prepare themselves for it.

The use of passing the provisional examination abroad is, that the Assistant-Surgeon, having served five years from the date of his original appointment (which is the *service* qualification for promotion to the rank of Surgeon), he is then eligible for promotion by the Commander-in-Chief, or senior officer, into any vacancy that may occur, as *Acting-Surgeon*.

If the vacancy occurring shall have been caused by the death of a Surgeon, or officer of superior rank, this promotion as *Acting-Surgeon* will be confirmed as SURGEON on the officer so promoted passing the regular examination at Somerset House.

If the vacancy has occurred from any other cause than that of death, the Assistant-Surgeon appointed to fill it, whether he may have passed only provisionally or finally, will be appointed only as *Acting-Surgeon* until the pleasure of the Admiralty be known; who may either confirm him in it, or supersede him by the appointment of a Surgeon from Half-pay.

Surgeons are promoted to the rank of STAFF-SURGEONS on the completion of twenty years' service from the date of entry; provided that ten years of that service has been completed since passing for the rank of Surgeon.

By an Admiralty regulation dated the 12th of July last, promotion to the rank of Staff-Surgeon is to be open to

officers for distinguished or special services, although they may not have completed twenty years' service.

To be eligible for a commission as Deputy Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets, the officer must have served ten years in the Royal Navy, on Full-pay, of which three years at least must have been passed in one or more of Her Majesty's ships, on some one or more Foreign Stations, with the rank of Surgeon.

To be eligible for a commission as Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets, the officer must have served five years at home, or three years abroad, in the rank of Deputy Inspector-General.

It will thus be seen from the above, that an officer may be promoted to the rank of INSPECTOR-GENERAL, on the completion of thirteen years' service, from the date of his entry in the Royal Navy.

Honorary Rewards.

The first in importance is undoubtedly the title of HONORARY PHYSICIAN OR SURGEON TO THE QUEEN. This honorary reward for *distinguished or special services* is not conferred on any officer below the rank of INSPECTOR-GENERAL.

The next, perhaps, in importance, as being most eagerly sought after, is the *Blane Medal*. This medal is derived from the interest of a sum of money left by the late Sir Gilbert Blane, M.D., to found a Gold Medal, to be awarded, at stated periods, to those Surgeons who, in the opinion of the heads of the Medical Department (subject to the approval of the Admiralty), shall have produced the best journals of their practices during a specified period. The other honorary rewards are medals and orders conferred, by our own and by Foreign Governments, for services performed against an enemy.

* As a special reward to officers of long and good service, who, owing to the comparatively small numbers of the Inspectorial ranks, have not been promoted to any higher position than that of Staff-Surgeon, such officers of the rank of Staff-Surgeon, as have served for 25 years on Full-pay, are, by an Admiralty Order of the 12th of July last, to be allowed the Half-pay of £1 a day, on being compulsorily retired at 60 years of age, or on Medical Survey. Naval Medical Officers are now, by the same order, to be permitted to retire after 20 years' service on Full-pay, irrespective of age, but the rate of Half-pay, awarded to officers so retiring, is not to exceed one-half of the Full-pay to which they may be entitled, at the time, from length of service.

Pensions of Medical Officers.

Besides the foregoing Half-pay awarded to Medical Officers, there are three Good-service Pensions of 10s. each per diem awarded to the three Inspectors-General, who have completed the longest and most meritorious services.

There is also one Greenwich Hospital Pension of £80 per annum, awarded to that Deputy Inspector-General who has the strongest claim to the same.

There are fourteen other Greenwich Hospital Pensions of £50 each per annum, awarded to those fourteen Deputy Inspectors-General, Staff-Surgeons, and Surgeons, who are considered, by the Admiralty, to be most deserving of them.

Pensions for Wounds, etc.

Her Majesty is graciously pleased to reserve to herself the consideration of the claims of Officers for Pensions, on account of having been wounded or disabled in Her Service, as their cases shall be represented to Her Majesty by the Admiralty.

Such claim for Pension by an officer must be preferred within ten years after he shall have been wounded or disabled, otherwise his claim will not be taken into consideration.

Prize-Money.

Medical Officers share in the proceeds, of all PRIZES CAPTURED FROM THE ENEMY, of CAPTURES AND SEIZURES under the several Acts of Parliament passed, relating to the Revenues of Customs, and to Trade and Navigation, for the abolition of the SLAVE TRADE, for the capture and destruction of PIRATES AND PIRATICAL VESSELS; and of the rewards conferred for the same; as also in the awards of all salvage granted to the crews of Her Majesty's ships and vessels of war, with other officers of corresponding ranks.
