


The City from the South.

HE City of St. Andrews is situated on a long and rocky eminence, rising to the height of fifty feet above the level of St. Andrews Bay. It is easy of access, and there is a good connection with railway trains from the South and all parts.

In order to improve the town and make it as attractive as possible for visitors much good work has been done by the Town Council. During the reign of the late Sir Hugh Lyon Playfair, as Provost of the city, from 1842 to 1861 the town was greatly improved, and through his patriotic and untiring perseverence he restored it from a state of decay into which it had been fast sinking into one of neatness and beauty, which has now made it the foremost watering place and health resort in North Britain. The noble work commenced by Provost Playfair has been continued by each of the Provosts who have succeeded him, and the present holder of the office

(Provost Murray) and his Council are most assiduous in their endeavours to carry out any improvement that portends to make the town and its surroundings attractive to visitors. St. Andrews is provided with an excellent and abundant supply of wholesome and exceptionally pure water, and its drainage and cleansing systems are perfect.

The climate is dry and bracing, and, in Summer, St. Andrews is agreeably cool and exceedingly healthy. The Medical Officer's yearly report as to the mortality in the town proves St. Andrews to be one of the healthiest towns in Scotland, and this happy condition is doubtless due to the excellent and healthy situation of the town, as well as to the great care and attention bestowed by the Civic Rulers on its sanitary arrangements.

With its enviable reputation of being the healthiest town in Scotland, its convenience for sea-bathing, the facilities afforded by its splendid Links for the game of golf and opportunities for recreation, its University and Schools, St. Andrews, besides being a much frequented fashionable Summer and Health Resort, forms a most desirable permanent residence.

Marine Drive.

One of the best natural Marine Drives in the kingdom is to be had on the West Sands. Starting by Clark's Wynd across the Links, the Sands are easily gained. Here one can enjoy a drive at once healthful and pleasant. The length of this Drive both ways is about five miles.





St. Andrews has justly been termed the "Mecca of Golf," and its Links may safely be said to be the best in the World, possessing as they do many natural bunkers and hazards which add life and interest to the game. The Links, which are the property of, and were acquired by, the Town at a cost of upwards of $\pounds 12,000$, are kept in excellent condition at considerable expense, defrayed principally by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club. The great care bestowed by this Club on the preservation of the Links has brought them to the highest state of excellence. Here golf may be enjoyed in its perfection. Indeed, it has been truly said that no one can know what the game of golf is really like until he or she has played on St. Andrews Links.

There are two splendid 18 hole Courses each of about two miles in length, as also a third long Course. The Old Course, which is acknowledged to be the premier Golf Course of the





world, is free to everyone. The order of starting is arranged according to rules made by the Green Committee. Intending players fill in a card with the time they wish to start play. These are placed in boxes provided for the purpose on the evening preceding the day of play. The whole cards are then put together and the places in the order of starting balloted for. Lists of the order of starting are hung up immediately thereafter at the Post Office, Club-house, and other places. The order of play is regulated by a Starter who calls out the names of the players according to the list, an interval of four minutes being allowed between each couple. The control of the Links is, in virtue of the St. Andrews Links Act, vested in a Green Committee consisting of representatives from the Town Council and the Royal and Ancient Golf Club.




The Prime Minister and Secretary for Scotland at the First Hole.

The New Course is also free, excepting during the months of July, August, and September, when a charge may under the Act be levied on non-ratepayers. The charges usually made are:—1s per day, 5s per week, and 15s per month. This Course, although perhaps not quite up to the Old one, affords a good sporting game, and many prefer to play on it rather than on the Old Course.

At the present time the reverse is the case, as our Sovereign is the Patron of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, and a great enthusiast in the game; and many Members of Parliament and others in high positions in the State are ardent devotees of the game and spend much of their time on St. Andrews' Classic Links.

The Spring Meeting of the Club is held in May, at which the Silver Cross of St. Andrew, presented by the late Colonel Belshes, of Invermay, in 1836, and the Silver Medal, presented by the Bombay Golf Club in 1846, are competed for. Besides these the Calcutta Cup (handicap) is played for in August, and the Victoria Jubilee Vase (handicap) in September. At the Autumn Meeting the Captain for the year is elected and it is his duty to preside at the Meetings, at which he has the honour to wear a handsome Gold Medal presented to the Club in 1838 by the Queen Dowager as Duchess of St. Andrews. There are two Silver Clubs which have been





At the close of the Autumn Meeting a Ball is given by the Club, which is attended in large numbers by the members as well as by the nobility of the surrounding neighbourhood.

The Entrance Fee on admission to the Royal and Ancient Golr Club is £20, and the Annual Subscription is £3.

The Charge for Visitors as temporary Members during the months of July, August, and September, as also during the Spring and Autumn Meetings is 20s per week; and during the remainder of the year the charge is 10s per week.


BOATING.—During the Summer months there are a large number of pleasure boats on hire. Sailing in the Bay can be had in pleasure steamers.

FISHING.—The River Eden affords excellent trout fishing, beginning either at Dairsie, (six miles distant from St. Andrews) Cupar (nine miles), Springfield (eleven miles), or Ladybank (seventeen miles), and fishing down the river to its mouth at Guardbridge village, which is four miles distant by rail from St. Andrews. Any of the above mentioned places are easily reached by rail from St. Andrews. The Eden is an ideal trout stream, having every characteristic o a first-class water—swift, shallow, and slow deeps alternating, splendid spawning beds, and a pretty constant flow of water. Good trout fishing can also be obtained on the Kenly Burn, or Kinness Burn, both within easy access. Besides the trout fishing, some fine sport can be had fishing off the rocks for codlings, etc.; while for a nominal charge, boats can be had with use of hand lines for fishing in the Bay.


The University

Clifton Bank School for Boys.

This School, which stands on the Scores-a favourite, and perhaps the healthiest residential part of the City--was established sixty years ago. The School Buildings, facing the sea, command a view over the Bay to the Sidlaws and Grampians in the back ground. The buildings are large and commodious, and comprise Dining Hall, Library, Masters' Room, Music Room, Bedrooms, etc., while in a separate building to the rear are the Class Rooms, Reading Room, Gymnasium, Workshop, and Baths. The Bedrooms are large and airy. The whole School has recently been thoroughly renovated and refurnished, and the sanitary arrangements are perfect. The School course is designed to give a thorough general education to boys, such as will fit them either for the professions or for business. Besides the Playground at the back of the School, there is an excellent field of nine acres, with pavilion, etc., for Football, Cricket, and Hockey. Golf may be played by the boys twice a week. Bathing and Swimming at the Step Rock is carried out under the observation of a capable attendant, and the boys are always accompanied by one of the Masters. The Gymnasium,






Besides the beautiful Links and West Sands stretching for fully two miles to the mouth of the River Eden, excellent walks may be taken to the east of the town by way of the harbour and adjacent sands to the East Cliffs or Kinkell Braes. On a good day a fine bracing walk may be had for some miles along these Cliffs. About two and a half miles along the coast from the town are two peculiar rocks, one of which is known as the

Rock and Spindle,


and derives its name from the distaff-like pinnacle, and from a basaltic crystallation on the one side resembling a common spinning wheel. The other rock, known as the




was rebuilt from the foundation at the close of the eighteenth century. It is very spacious, being capable of accommodating

St. Mary's College.

St. Mary's College is restricted to the teaching of Theology. On the West side of the buildings are the Lecture Rooms and Dining Hall, while the Principal's Official Residence is on the North. In the University Library adjoining are to be seen the Room in which the old Scottish Parliament met; and a carved TELEPHONE No. 23.


This fine old Fortalice and Palace was founded in 1200; in 1547 was sacked and dismantled; rebuilt by Archbishop Hamilton in 1558; and in 1654 it had fallen into such disrepair that the Town Council ordered a large portion of the building to be used in the repair of the Harbour. In the centre of the court is the Well which supplied the garrison with water. Here also is to be seen the famous Bottle Dungeon—so named from its resemblance in shape to that of an ordinary glass bottle—the neck being eight feet deep by seven feet across, when it widens to seventeen feet in diameter at the bottom; the total depth being twenty-four feet.

The Dungeon is cut out of the solid rock. An interesting account is given to visitors by the attendant in charge, in which he rehearses tales as to the many hapless inmates of this gloomy hole. The remains of the Castle Kitchen, the Bakery and Oven, as also a Subterranean Passage, are among the interesting sights shewn to visitors. The Castle Grounds are open daily from 10 a.m. till dusk, and in the afternoon on Sundays.

A very fine specimen of an old Scottish City Gate, where the Silver Keys of the City were delivered to Charles II. in 1650.

A fine Drive, on a clear day, is round the Coast by Boarhills and Kingsbarns to Crail, thence by Kilrenny to Anstruther, and returning by Dunino and Stravithie. The distance is 24 miles.

PLACES OF INTEREST .- Crail Church; Anstruther Church; Town Hall; Waid Academy; Maggie Lauder's House, etc.

Falkland.

A splendid Drive or Cycle Run from St. Andrews is to the ancient and historical town of Falkland, and although a long one it is most enjoyable. The best and prettiest route is by Pitscottie and Ceres, taking the road to the right through the village, and



turning into the road on the left past the Church and on by Tarvit Hill. Thence to Pitlessie, and passing the villages of Kettle and Freuchie, on to Falkland where there are two hotels and plenty of stabling. The return to St. Andrews might be made by way of Dunshalt, Auchtermuchty, through the Bow of Fife to Cupar, and thence home by Guardbridge. The distance of this pleasant outing is about 40 miles.

PLACES OF INTEREST.—Scotstarvit Tower; view of Lomond Hills; Pitlessie, the birthplace of Sir David Wilkie, the famous painter; the old Royal Palace of Falkland; Falkland House; and Mopsie Den. Permission to view Falkland House, etc., may be had from the Factor at the Palace, ard a charge of Sixpence is made for admission to see the Palace.

Anstruther and Elie.

A most delightful Drive (although a long one) or Cycle Run is from St. Andrews round the Coast by Anstruther and Elie to Largo, returning by Montrave and Ceres. The distance is about 40 miles.

PLACES OF INTEREST.—Largo, the birthplace of Alexander Selkirk ("Robinson Crusoe"); Ruins of Struthers Castle.

Cupar.

A beautiful Drive can be had by taking the Newport road until the road branching to the left is reached, a little beyond Pickletillum Inn, keeping along this road past Kilmany to Cupar, and home either by Pitscottie or Guardbridge. The distance is about 30 miles.

By Ceres on to the Kennoway Road until just beyond the ninth milestone, where a road is reached that leads through Craigrothie and over the hill. From this road a splendid view can be had of the magnificent landscape which embraces the Lomond Hills and whole Howe of Fife. Coming down by Garlie Bank a halt can be made at Cupar. The return home can be made by Pitscottie and Dura Den. Distance about 23 miles.

Pitscottie.

A favourite and most pleasant Drive is by Pitscottie, through Dura Den, on to Dairsie, and home by Guardbridge. Distance 16 miles.





Picnic Resorts.


For picnic parties there are several woods and dens within easy walking distance of the town. These include Claremont Den, Lumbo Den, Dunino Den, the Spinkie Den, Magus Wood, Kenly Green, and Kittock's Den, about half a mile to the east of the Rock and Spindle, is a favourite spot, and is in every way most suitable for the purpose. It is easy of access by way of the cliffs, or, if preferred, it can be reached by a path leading from the Crail road through the farm of Polduff. The Blaeberry Wood, on

Kemback estate, about five miles to the west of St. Andrews, is one of the finest for picnic purposes. Strangers have full permission to roam at will through its sylvan glades and pluck the luscious blaeberries, raspberries, and brambles, which grow there in the greatest profusion. There is a plentiful supply of water in the wood.



Guardbridge Paper Works.

Visitors should avail themselves of the opportunity of seeing the famous Paper Mills at Guardbridge, a few minutes' run by rail from St. Andrews. Parties are allowed to view the Works on permission previously arranged through the obliging Manager. These Mills are noted not only for their superior productions, but also for the fact that they are among the largest of their kind in Scotland, and among the most perfectly organized and equipped paper mills in Great Britain. Since the Works were opened in 1873 they have undergone very considerable alteration and enlargement in order to keep pace with the growing demand of the trade. The firm in the beginning of its existence had only one machine turning out 30 tons per week. In 1879 an additional machine was put down, in 1888 a third and larger one was added, and in 1897 still another machine was erected. These now give a total weekly output capacity of 180 tons of finished paper. In the manufacture of this enormous output at least 14,000 tons of Esparto grass are used. The productions include fine printing, drawing, music plate and chart papers, E.S. writings, envelope papers, tinted paper, and tinted pulp boards. The Mills, which cover four acres of ground,

have a quadruple organisation, separate mills or departments having been built as the two additional machines were laid down; while the finishing departments, etc., are common to all four mills. Inside of the main entrance are the central offices, a fine suite of chambers, with a large sample room in which visitors may see specimens of all the productions of the Mills. The esparto dusting houses, with their heavy equipment of improved willowing and dusting machinery, are placed alongside the boilers, into which the Esparto is fed by an ingenious patent travelling band worked by steam power. There are 14 esparto boilers, heated by steam, and each of a capacity of 50 cwt. After viewing the rag sorting and cutting rooms, rag washing plant, etc., we proceed to the three breaking and beating houses, where powerful steam machinery is in operation. No. 4 breaking and beating house, which is the latest structural addition to the Mills, is equipped with, probably, the most perfect machinery of its kind in the kingdom, and is lighted by electricity. The main engine house contains a new 900 h.p. compound Corliss condensing engine, and there are other two large engines, making in the aggregate 2,400 h.p. for the works. The Company employ about 430 hands; make their own gas and electric light; do a large amount of their own machine repairing; and have their own well drilled and equipped fire brigade. 130 girls are employed in the packing and forwarding department. There is a hydraulic press for pressing the packages destined for the export trade to China, Canada, Australia, Japan, etc. Excellent sanitation in the workrooms, etc., is provided, and there is also a large block of houses for the accommodation of the employees.


