


THE TRIANGULAR (OR POCKET HANDKERCHIEF) BANDAGE. (a) Open, (b) folded broad, (c) folded narrow.




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
HOW TO APPLY THE BROAD ARM-SLING. (a).




THE BROAD ARM SLING. (b) Applied.






(a) Over the eye, (b) at base of the skull, (c) on the temple.











(b) Sling to relieve pain by placing weight of the arm on the opposite shoulder. FRACTURE OF COLLAR-BONE (Clavicle).







Bandages on knee and foot, fixing first dressings.




(1) First dressing on wound of shoulder.
(2) Digital pressure of main artery to left arm (Brachial).






FRACTURE OF UNDER JAW-BONE (Lower Maxilla). Fixed with two-tailed bandage.










(a) Apparatus. Two or three broad bandages applied round pelvic portion of body FRACTURE OF BASIN-BONES (Pelvis). and knotted in front.




(b) Two long splints are made secure under the body. Is then ready for transport. FRACTURE OF BASIN-BONES (Pelvis).















Patient's own coat is the improvised stretcher.




(a) Lifting patient from ground, and placing him on chair.




(b) Kneeling in front the bearer lifts patient on to back.









How to assist a Drunk or Sick Person to Walk.






TRANSPORT. (b) The fireman's lift (having risen).




(c) The fireman's lift, with one hand free, as for descent of ladder, &c. TRANSPORT.







FAINTING IN CHAIR (AS IN CROWDED HALL). Draw back chair, and lower the patient's head.




RECOVERY FROM DROWNING (Sylvester).

(a) Turn patient on face with pad under stomach.




(b) Clear mouth of any obstructions. Press stomach several times firmly over pad to empty it of water. Fix tongue forward with rubber band or ligature tied round chin. RECOVERY FROM DROWNING (Sylvester).




(c) Grasp both arms of patient above the elbows, and draw them up over the head to full extent.


This causes inspiration. RECOVERY FROM DROWNING (Sylvester).



(d) Reverse last movement and compress patient's elbows firmly into his ribs—expiration. Continue these two movements at rate of 18 to 20 times a minute.




RECOVERY FROM DROWNING (Schäfer).

(b) Place hands on small of back-thumbs parallel and nearly touching. RECOVERY FROM DROWNING (Schäfer).



AMBULANCE WHEELED LITTER.




FITTED with Stretcher and Awning, completely sheltering the patient, hung on Armstrong's Patent Springs, and running on wheels with India-rubber tyres.


