THIRD REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

OF THE

**Leeds Association for the Prevention
and Cure of Tuberculosis.**

During the past year the Association has continued to extend its work. They have increased the accommodation for Patients at the Gateforth Sanatorium from 13 to 27 beds. Women Patients have been taken in since May last, and the arrangements for this purpose sketched out in the last Annual Report have worked satisfactorily.

During the year, 80 Patients (if one be counted who only stayed a week) have been treated in the Sanatorium. Excluding the 20 who were still in the Home on December 31st, 21 have been discharged as practically cured, 24 as very greatly improved and fit for work, and 14 as slightly or not at all improved. The last number includes bad cases mostly of an acute type or of the advanced disease. In the last Annual Report it was stated that some cases will not improve under this or any other method of treatment, but that it is sometimes necessary to make a trial before this can be ascertained. Occasionally such trial cases have improved so unexpectedly that it does not seem proper to exclude them altogether.

Subsequent experience has quite confirmed this view, but the Committee think that these cases should only remain in the Sanatorium for as short a time as possible if no improvement occurs. Thus three to six weeks should be a sufficiently long trial period. Some of the cases referred to above have been kept in longer than this, but it was largely due in some instances to

the very poor homes to which these Patients belonged. This fact, among others, has suggested to the Committee the desirability of possessing a Home in the outskirts of Leeds for cases unsuitable for Sanatorium treatment to which such Patients could be transferred.

Such a Home would also enable us to isolate other advanced cases of consumption who in poor houses are undoubtedly a very real source of danger to those about them. In this way the Association would be making further efforts to prevent the disease. Homes of this description exist in other large centres of population, and there should be no insuperable difficulties in establishing one in Leeds.

The Committee have decided to look about for a suitable house for the purpose, and if they succeed in finding one, they propose at once to commence with ten beds.

Seven of the bad cases alluded to above have, as was only to be expected, since succumbed to the disease. Two of the Patients classed as greatly improved have also died. One of these was never looked upon as a favourable case, but he put on weight. The disease began to progress again after his discharge, and he died suddenly (probably from a fatal complication of phthisis) when he was preparing to go away from Leeds. The other did well in the Sanatorium, and gained over a stone in weight. He could not get sufficient food after his discharge, and he relapsed and died.

Of the 20 remaining in the Home, 8 have only been in for two weeks. Of the remaining 12, 10 have greatly improved, and 2 shew very slight if any improvement.

These results, though not as good as when a smaller number of Patients was dealt with, should not be looked upon as in the least impairing the value of Sanatorium treatment. The Patients admitted into Gateforth, with the exception of a very small minority, shew great improvement in every way. Most of them do not look as if they had the disease. The Committee feel it

must be recognised that the best permanent results of Sanatorium treatment cannot be attained where the majority of their Patients must return to unhealthy and poor homes. The problem of finding work for discharged Patients has been occupying the attention of the Committee, but its solution is an exceptionally difficult one.

With the exception of three months during the past year, the Association have had the services of a Resident Medical Officer. In this way a more strict supervision of the treatment can be carried out. Valuable observations can be made upon the disease. A full meteorological Report is now sent to the local papers every month.

The water supply, for a long time a source of anxiety to the Committee, is now sufficient. The Corporation has put in a new pumping engine, which has been a great improvement.

To accommodate the increased number of Patients, some exceptional expense has had to be incurred. Three new shelters have been constructed, and seats have also been placed about the ground, so that the Patients may rest during their prescribed walks.

The Ladies' Samaritan Committee, appointed at the beginning of the year, with Mrs. F. W. Kitson as chairwoman, has met every month during the past twelve months. The members of this Committee have visited those whose names are on the Association's books, and efforts have been made to find employment for discharged Patients. A grant of £20 has been allotted to them from the funds of the Association for the relief of more immediate distress. The Ladies' Committee feel that they cannot do all the good which they otherwise would do, unless they have some funds to distribute, and it is hoped that the sum voted by the Association will form a nucleus of a fund to be raised by small subscriptions for this purpose.

It has been obvious for some months past that the Association would have to take new office accommodation, partly on

account of the greatly increased work now done. After carefully considering the matter, on account of the increased expense, the Committee have decided to take a house in Great George Street. In this way the difficulty, which has been much felt lately, of having Patients with phthisis lingering about ordinary office buildings will be obviated.

The cost of each Patient per day on the basis of ordinary expenditure has been $4/9$, as against $4/5$ last year, and $5/6$ in 1900. This slight increase is accounted for by the fact that the Committee, owing to unexpected difficulties with the water supply, were unable to take into the Sanatorium the number of Patients originally intended. They thus had on their hands in the first part of the year a relatively large establishment with comparatively few Patients.

The Association have great pleasure in acknowledging the generous support which they have received during the past year. They would particularly mention a donation of £200 from the Misses March.

The four Boards of Guardians have continued their subscriptions of £70 each, and in the case of the Leeds and Hunslet Boards this sum has been increased to £140.

During the past year the Leeds Workpeople's Hospital Fund has contributed a sum of £140.

Since September last the York Branch of the National Association has subsidised two Beds.

The Sanitary Committee have generously increased their grant of £400 to £1000, for which the Association is deeply grateful. This will partly enable the Association to carry out an extended programme of work, but they will still have to rely largely on the generous help which they have hitherto received from the Public. If the Association is enabled to establish the above mentioned Home for advanced and other consumptives unfit for Gateforth, the Committee calculate that their expenditure for the current year will not be far short of £3000.

The question of dealing with a disease so prevalent, and at present so fatal in its results as tuberculosis, including phthisis, is a very large one, and if this pressing problem is to be at all satisfactorily solved, the corresponding effort made in its prevention and treatment must of necessity be equally large.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

Adopted by First Annual Meeting of Subscribers,
11th January, 1901.

THE objects of the Society are (as implied by its name) the Prevention and Cure of Consumption. This includes the building and maintenance of a Sanatorium for the treatment of the consumptive poor.

The Society is wholly dependent upon voluntary contributions, which may be given either in the form of annual subscriptions, donations, bequests, or otherwise, and paid to the Society's Bankers, Treasurers, Collector, or other person duly authorised by the Committee.

The Association shall be managed by the following Officers and Committee, to be elected each year at the Annual Meeting of subscribers, *i.e.*, President, who shall be Chairman *ex officio* of the Committee, not less than three Vice-Presidents, one or more Hon. Secretaries, and one or more Treasurers, all of whom, along with the members of the Hon. Medical Staff, shall be members of the General Committee, and a Committee whose number without *ex officio* members shall not be less than 20.

The persons entitled to vote at this Meeting shall be:—

1st. All annual subscribers of not less than 10/6 whose subscriptions are not in arrear.

2nd. Persons who have at any time given a donation of not less than £20.

3rd. One Executor or Trustee of any person leaving a bequest of not less than £100 to the Association; during the lifetime of the Executor or Trustee chosen by his co-trustees to represent the trust.

4th. The Chairman or Secretary (or other person duly authorised by them) of any Society, Institution, or Public body subscribing not less than £2 2s. annually.

The Committee so elected shall have the general management of the affairs of the Association, and shall present an Annual Report and Balance Sheet to the Subscribers. The Subscribers shall also appoint one or more Auditors at each Yearly Meeting.

The property of the Association shall be vested in not less than three Trustees, to be from time to time elected by the Subscribers.

In the event of the Association being dissolved, the property may be used for the benefit of such other charity or charities as shall be decided upon by a majority of the Subscribers present at a meeting specially called for that purpose.

RULES FOR GUIDANCE OF THE GENERAL AND HOUSE COMMITTEES.

1. A meeting of the General Committee shall be held at least once in each month.

2. A House Committee, and such other Committees as are from time to time required, shall be appointed by the General Committee from amongst its members.

The duties of the House Committee shall include the management of the Sanatorium and all connected therewith. They shall also meet not less than once a month.

The House Committee may be assisted in its work by a Ladies' Committee appointed by the General Committee.

3. Five members shall form a quorum at a meeting of the General Committee, and three at meetings of the House or other Sub-Committees.

4. The majority shall decide all questions, and in the event of an equality of votes, the Chairman at any meeting shall have a second or casting vote.

5. It is desirable that members of the General Committee shall visit the Sanatorium from time to time. The Clerk shall therefore notify each member fortnightly, in rotation, that it is his turn to visit. If a member cannot take his turn, he should, without delay, advise the Clerk.

6. All reports regarding the Sanatorium shall be laid before the House Committee at its next meeting.

7. The Hon. Medical Officers shall be appointed by the General Committee. One of their number shall visit the Sanatorium at least once a week. They shall keep an accurate account of the condition of each patient.

NOMINATION OF PATIENTS, MODE OF ADMISSION, AND DISCHARGE.

1. Any person or persons, firms, society, or public body paying to the funds of the Association the full cost of a bed for six or twelve months (at present the cost of a bed is £35 for six months and £70 for twelve months), shall be entitled to nominate to that bed for a corresponding time. Subscribers of £1000 may name a bed and have the right during lifetime to nominate a patient to occupy such bed in the Sanatorium. Patients so nominated are subject to the same Rules and Regulations as other patients entering the Sanatorium. The same privilege shall in like manner be accorded to the Trustees or Executors of any person bequeathing a sum of £1000; the power to nominate shall in this case rest with one Trustee or Executor, chosen by his co-Trustees to represent the trust, and may be exercised during his life only.

2. Subscribers may recommend patients for treatment, and careful consideration will be given to their recommendation, but no guarantee of acceptance can be made.

3. Patients eligible for admission to the Sanatorium must be persons suffering from remediable, and not advanced phthisis.

4. Persons desirous of being admitted to the Sanatorium must first obtain a form of application from the Clerk, and a schedule to be filled in by the applicant's medical attendant; when these have been returned to the Clerk the candidate shall be examined by the Society's medical staff, who shall decide whether the proposed patient is medically suitable for admission. The name of the applicant when passed by the medical staff shall be placed before the House Committee, with whom rests the final decision.

5. Persons who are able to contribute towards their maintenance may be admitted by order of the House Committee, upon payment of such charge as the Committee direct.

6. All patients must before admission undertake to abide by the Rules of the Sanatorium; any infringement may be followed by immediate discharge.

7. No person shall be admitted to the Sanatorium who does not agree to stay two months, unless with the express consent of the medical staff.

8. The discharge of patients shall rest solely with the medical officers, who shall in all cases report to the House Committee.
