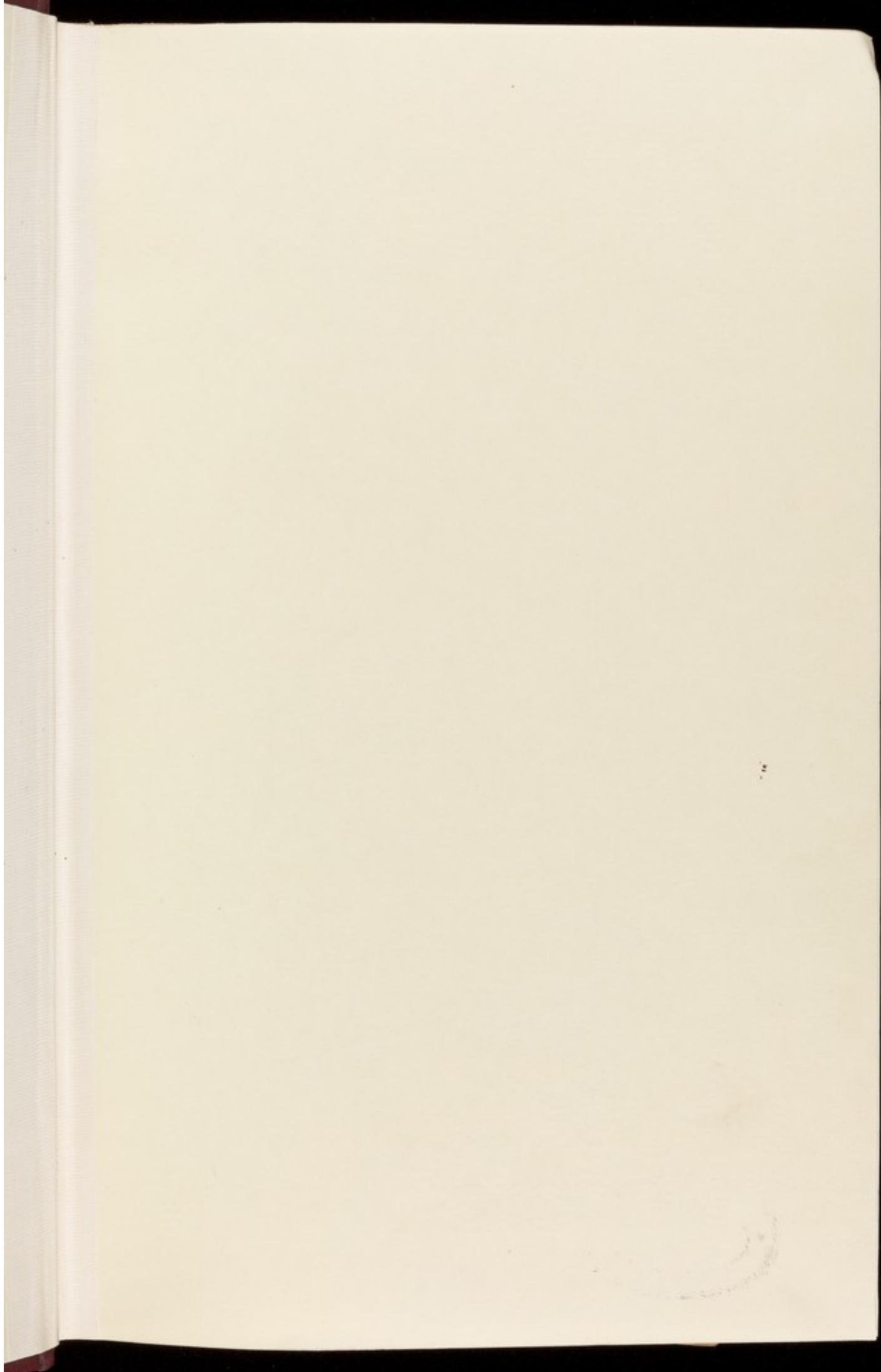

Proposals for providing a retired Habitation, with neces-
sary advice attendance &c for the Members of our Society, and others
in profusion with us; who may be in a state of Lunacy or so
deranged in Mind, ^(not Idiots) as to require such a provision.

Persons of this description (who are truly objects of great
Sympathy & Compassion) are often from the peculiar treatment
which they require, necessarily committed wholly to the Govern-
ment of People of other Societies, by which means the state of their
own Minds, and the feelings of their near Connections, are
rendered more dissatisfied and uncomfortable than would
probably be the case, if they were under the Notice & Care of
those with whom they are connected in Religious Society.
It appears therefore very desirable that an Institution should
be formed, wholly under the Government of Friends, for the
Relief and accommodation of such Persons, of all Ranks with
respect to property. This would doubtless in some degree alle-
viate the anxiety of the Relations; render the Minds of the
Patients more easy in their lucid Intervals; and consequently
tend to facilitate and promote their recovery.

It is therefore proposed

1. That, in case proper encouragement be given, Ground be pur-
chased & a Building be erected, sufficient to accommodate 30
Patients, in ^{an airy} situation at as short a Distance from York as
may

May be, so as to have the Privilege of Retirement, and that there
be a few Acres for keeping Cows & Garden ground for the Family,
which will also afford scope for the Patients to take Exercise, with
that may be prudent & suitable.

2. That the Institution be established & supported by Annual
Donations, and Annual Subscriptions, and that the same,
(which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted among
Friends within the Compass of this, and any other Quarterly

That eight shillings ^{per week} and upwards, according to Circumstances, be the Terms for Patients, who come from the compass of any other Quarterly Meeting than Yorkshire, unless privileged agreeably to the ^{10th} Proposal. These Terms for Patients to be subject to alteration in future according to circumstances.
11. That there be advanced on the admission of each Patient, or Quarters Payment according to the Weekly Rate; that the Quarters Payments afterwards be made regularly to the Treasurer at the Expiration of each Quarter; and that when the Patient leaves the House the S. advance Quarter shall be accounted for; or such part of it as shall appear to be due from the Institution.
12. That in order to set forward this undertaking as soon as conveniently may be, some Friends unite, and advance one Hundred pounds, for the purchase of suitable Ground and the Expence of Building; on condition of receiving ^{at least} ~~at least~~ ^{the} Money to be reimbursed, which is to be done as soon as the same can be made up, from the proposed Annuities and Donations.

14. That a suitable Man ^{Friend} be placed in the House as Superintendent who will be more extensively useful if possessed of some medical Knowledge, by occasionally supplying the absence of the Physician and making up Medicines.

That in order to provide for a perpetual succession of Managers, (without troubling the Quarterly Meeting) the General Meeting shall in the Year 1800, nominate and appoint Forty Friends Members of York Quarterly Meeting, who with their successors, shall from thence forth (together with any ^{other} donors or subscribers ~~through the agency~~ ^{to be} appointed who may from time to time chuse to attend) be, & continue the Managers and superintendants of the said Establishment; in whom the whole Government of the Institution shall thereafter vest and remain: The said 40 Managers, or any 8 of them ^{exclusive of the committee} to meet Quarterly, for the purposes of the Quarterly Meeting aforesaid, and for the support & well ordering of the undertaking in all respects. Two at least, of those ^{so appointed} are to be members of each Monthly Meeting, belonging to the said Quarterly Meeting of Yorkshire.

On the first appointment of the said 40 Managers, their Names are to be carefully and suitably arranged and recorded, and at the Expiration of one Year, after the said appointment (viz in the 6th month 1801) the first named Ten on said List are to cease to be Managers, and Ten others appointed in their ^{by the year} place; and so on at the End of the 2nd 3rd & 4th Years, and in Rotation from Year to Year, Ten other of the Managers next on the List are to give place, and be renewed in perpetuity; always preserving at least two Members of each Monthly Meeting as aforesaid in the management. And on the Decease or Dismembership of any Manager, the Name of the Friend chosen ^{by the year} in his stead, shall be substituted and arranged on the list, in the place of the Name of the Deceased or disengag'd Person. In all these appointments the Managers may, or may not be chosen from the Number of Donors or subscribers, as may in prospect of time be judged most convenient and best. 0

IT IS THEREFORE PROPOSED,

1st. THAT, in case proper encouragement be given, ground be purchased and a Building be erected,
sufficient to accommodate Thirty Patients, in an airy situation and at as short a distance from
York as may be, so as to have the privilege of retirement, and that there be a few acres for keeping
Cows, and Garden Ground for the Family, which will afford scope for the patients to take exercise, when
that may be prudent and suitable.

2^d. That the Institution be established and supported by annuities, donations, and annual subscriptions;
and that the same (which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted amongst Friends within the compass
of this, and any other Quarterly Meeting.

3^d. That each Subscriber, by way of annuity, contributing a sum not less than Twenty Pounds, shall
receive an interest of five per cent. per ann. during life; and as the undertaking may not be able to pay
this interest, and otherwise maintain itself for the first three years, those entered as Subscribers for annual
payments be engaged for three years certain, in case the Subscriber should so long live.

4th. That

That a contribution of One Hundred Pounds, from any Quarterly Meeting in its collective capacity, paid to the Treasurer of this Institution before the year 1794; or a donation at any time of Twenty-five Pounds from any Friend; or a subscription of Fifty Pounds for an annuity, shall entitle such Quarterly Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one Poor Patient at a time on the lowest terms of admission.

5th. That the name of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose; and that every Annuitant, Donor of not less than Two Guineas, and Subscriber of Sums in any manner equal to Two Guineas, in the first three years, (being and continuing a Member of our Society) shall be a Member of the Meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

6th. That there be paid for board, washing, medical advice, and medicines, and all other things necessary except cloathing, according to the circumstances of the Patients or their friends, from four shillings to fifteen shillings per week, or higher in particular cases; and six shillings per week for the board of the Servant of a Patient, in case the friends of any Patient should incline to send one; which Servant must be approved by the Committee.

7th. That eight shillings per week and upwards, according to circumstances, be the terms for Patients who come from the compass of any other Quarterly Meeting than Yorkshire, unless privileged agreeable to the 4th Proposal.—These Terms for Patients to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary.

It appears, therefore, very desirable that an Institution should be formed, wholly under the government of Friends, for the relief and accomodation of such Persons, of all ranks with respect to property: This would doubtless, in some degree, alleviate the anxiety of the relatives, render the minds of the Patients more easy in their lucid intervals, and consequently tend to facilitate and promote their recovery.—

IT IS THEREFORE PROPOSED,

1st.

THAT, in case proper encouragement be given, ground be purchased and a Building erected, sufficient to accomodate Thirty Patients, in an airy situation, and at as short a distance from York as may be, so as to have the privilege of retirement; and that there be a few acres for keeping Cows, and Garden Ground for the Family, which will afford scope for the patients to take exercise, when that may be prudent and suitable.

2d. That the Institution be established and supported by annuities, donations, and annual subscriptions; and that the same (which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted amongst Friends within the compass of this, and any other Quarterly Meeting.

3d. That each Subscriber, by way of annuity, contributing a sum not less than Twenty Pounds, shall receive an interest of five per cent. per ann. during life; and as the undertaking may not be able to pay this interest, and otherwise maintain itself for the first three years, those entered as Subscribers for annual payments be engaged for three years certain, in case the Subscriber should so long live.

4th. That a contribution of One Hundred Pounds, from any Quarterly Meeting in its collective capacity, paid to the Treasurer of this Institution before the year 1794; or a donation at any time of Twenty-five Pounds from any Friend; or a subscription of Fifty Pounds for an annuity, shall entitle such Quarterly Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one Poor Patient at a time on the lowest terms of admission.

5th. That the name of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose; and that every Annuitant, Donor of not less than Two Guineas, and Subscriber of Sums in any manner equal to Two Guineas, in the first three years, (being and continuing a Member of our Society) shall be a Member of the Meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

6th. That there be paid for board, washing, medical advice and medicines, and all other things necessary except cloathing, according to the circumstances of the Patients or their friends, from four shillings to fifteen shillings per week, or higher in particular cases; and six shillings per week for the board of the Servant of a Patient, in case the friends of any Patient should incline to send one; which Servant must be approved by the Committee.

7th. That eight shillings per week and upwards, according to circumstances, be the terms for Patients who come from the compass of any other Quarterly Meeting than Yorkshire, unless privileged agreeable to the 4th Proposal—These Terms for Patients to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary.

As the benefit of the proposed Institution is intended to be extended to those who are not strictly Members of our Society, it is the judgment of this Meeting, that Subscriptions may also be received from such Persons.

5th of 4th Month, 1793.

It having been objected that, according to the expression of the 7th Proposal, there appears to be an extraordinary privilege intended to Friends in Yorkshire, this Meeting thinks proper to disclaim having had such an intention. The prospect in forming the same was, that as the Subscriptions were set on foot in this County, they would amount to, at least, as many hundred Pounds as there would be poor Patients belonging to this Quarterly Meeting, at any one time in the House. But, in order to remove all doubts on that head, it is agreed, that the Quarterly Meeting of York shall not enjoy any privilege superior to other subscribing Counties; it being intended, that all Subscribers, whether they consist of Quarterly, or other Meetings, or of Individuals, shall enjoy the privilege of recommending poor Patients, in proportion to their Subscriptions, notwithstanding any expressions in the 4th or 7th Proposals, that may bear a different Construction.

In case any Quarterly Meeting be so small, or its Members not in an eligible situation to raise One Hundred Pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have a power, on application, to extend the privilege of the 4th Proposal to such Meetings, on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of the said General Meeting.

It is agreed, that when the Annuities and Donations amount to One Thousand Pounds, the application thereof be taken under consideration by a General Meeting of Subscribers.

As several objections have been made, especially by Friends at a distance, to some parts of the foregoing Plan, the following Remarks and Explanations are added, in order to remove them.

Some have thought that accommodations for so many Patients should not be aimed at: But it is obvious, that the quantity of ground for exercise, ought not to be much, if any, less for fifteen, than for thirty; that Kitchens, Parlours, and almost all parts of the Building, except the number of Patients' Rooms, ought to be nearly the same; and that it would make little difference with respect to Physician and domestic Managers: So that to accommodate the proposed number would not only lessen the expense of each Patient, but extend the benefits of the Institution to Friends at a greater distance.

The

The situation at York, and its distance from some parts, both in the North and South, have been stated as principal objections. With respect to the place, it was thought best to fix it at the beginning, as the consideration of so material a point afterwards, might have afforded a subject of much altercation; and the different views of Subscribers might then produce diversity of sentiments, to the great embarrassment of the Undertaking. It should be attended to, that the Proposal originated in Yorkshire; and that, though the views of Friends there were not confined to that County, they did not consider the Institution as likely to accommodate the whole Nation; and therefore, whilst they judged York to be an eligible situation for a limited Undertaking of this nature, they have been desirous that its privileges should be extended to Friends in general, upon reasonable conditions; as Patients, even in low circumstances, are often sent very far; one in particular having been lately conveyed about 120 miles to Manchester, and divers have been sent from Yorkshire to London.

It appears necessary, that General Meetings of the Subscribers should be held once a Year, to receive Reports of the preceding Year's Accounts, make Rules, and appoint Committees, &c. To collect Subscribers for these purposes might be difficult, unless they were drawn together on some other occasion: The Quarterly Meeting of York affords such an occasion better than any other, because it is larger, and Friends come to it from more distant parts. Besides, if a Committee should meet quarterly, it may then be conveniently appointed of Friends residing in various and distant parts of the County. This Committee may appoint Visitors, and a Sub-committee of Friends conveniently situated to take the immediate oversight of the Institution, and to make report to them once a Quarter.

The price of land suitable for the purpose is much lower near York, than it is equally near most other populous places; and at such only a good choice of medical assistance can be expected. The air is also healthy, and much more free from smoke, than situations near manufacturing towns; and the country being generally fruitful, and not populous, provisions are considerably cheaper than at such places. It may be further observed, that at a General Conference since the Proposals were circulated, it was reconsidered whether York was the most proper place? when there appeared a general acquiescence, and not a dissenting voice.

With respect to the objections to the 4th Proposal, it may be proper to remark, that a Quarterly Meeting being a standing body, its privilege is perpetual; but the right of a single Friend dies with him; and therefore, a Donation of 100l. is required from the former, in its collective capacity, when only 25l. Donation, or 50l. Subscription for an Annuity, is required to entitle a Friend to a similar privilege with a Quarterly Meeting. It should be attended to, that Patients whose connections are of ability to pay eight shillings per week or upwards, according to circumstances, cannot be privileged under the 4th Proposal. As to the other part of the objection to that Proposal, it is apprehended, that the minute now made will entirely remove it.

It hath been said, that there are already many public Institutions of this kind, which render this unnecessary. But it is evident, besides what has been remarked on this head in the former publication, that several peculiar and important advantages will accrue from an Institution confined to ourselves. For as the disorder is a mental one, and people of regular conduct, and even religiously disposed minds, are not exempt therefrom, their confinement amongst persons in all respects strangers, and their promiscuous exposure to such company as is mostly found in public Institutions of this kind, must be peculiarly disgusting, and consequently augment the disorder. Nor is this idea merely chimerical; for it is well known, that the situation of divers Members of our Society, hath, from this cause, been unspeakably distressing. A circumstance which it needs no arguments to prove, must greatly retard, if not totally prevent, their cure.

It has hitherto been judged best not to trouble any Meeting of Discipline with the establishment, or future management, of such an Institution, because matters of this sort are often worse than unedifying to these Meetings. So large a number of Subscribers as there is likely to be in the compass of York Quarterly Meeting, with others from distant parts who may attend, are likely to be fully competent to direct the management for many years to come; and before they are materially reduced in number, it will undoubtedly become their concern to provide for a regular succession. But though it would not be proper to introduce the whole management of the business in any Meeting for Discipline, yet the simple consideration of aiding the Establishment by Subscriptions, may not be an improper subject for such a Meeting. If one or more hundred pounds should be raised and paid in its name (the sums given by each Friend being specified or not, as they may chuse), such Meeting will not be subject to any future trouble, except keeping up an appointment of a Friend or two, as Agents, to correspond with the Committee, and recommend Patients, &c; similar to what has been done by divers Meetings, towards the support of Hospitals in different parts of the Nation.

To conclude—an Institution of this nature must be fixed somewhere, and, unless it be on a very small scale, many Patients must be sent from a considerable distance. Friends who think the object worthy their attention, may be encouraged to promote it, not only on a principle of Charity to the Poor, but even of Compassion to those in easy and affluent circumstances, who will doubtless think themselves benefited, though they may pay amply for it. Those who have embarked in this Undertaking, have not been influenced by interested views, nor are they requesting or desiring any favours for themselves. A Malady, in many instances, the most deplorable that Human Nature is subject to, hath excited their sympathy and attention; and they invite such Friends as approve of their design, to co-operate with them in an Establishment, which hath for its object, the mitigation of misery, and the restoration of those, who are lost to Civil and Religious Society: In the prosecution whereof, they humbly rely on the favour of Him, whose tender Mercies are over all his works.

THIS Meeting being apprehensive that, notwithstanding the endeavours which have been used to circulate information relative to this Institution, Friends in many Counties are but little acquainted with the design: It is therefore agreed that 1500 copies of the Rules, with some small variations and explanations, and a list of Subscriptions, be printed and circulated as much as may be into the compass of every quarterly and monthly Meeting; and the attention of Friends is particularly requested to the recommendation of a solid religious Friend, with some medical knowledge, who may be capable of superintending the Institution under the direction of a Physician. Application to be made to William Tuke of YORK.

A Meeting of Friends was held here the 28th of 6th Month, 1792, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of providing a retired habitation, with necessary advice, attendance, &c. for the Members of our Society, and others professing with us, who may be in a state of Lunacy, or so deranged in mind (not Idiots) as to require such a provision.

Persons of this description (who are truly objects of great sympathy and compassion) are often, from the peculiar treatment which they require, necessarily committed wholly to the government of people of other Societies, by which means the state of their own minds, and the feelings of their near connections, are rendered more dissatisfied and uncomfortable, than would probably be the case were they under the notice and care of those with whom they are connected in religious Society. It appeared, therefore, very desirable that an Institution should be formed, wholly under the government of Friends, for the relief and accomodation of such persons, of all ranks with respect to property: This would doubtless, in some degree, alleviate the anxiety of their Relations, render the Minds of the Patients more easy in their lucid intervals, and consequently tend to facilitate and promote their recovery. Friends in divers parts of the Nation uniting in the same sentiments, have contributed towards this Establishment. About 11 acres of Ground, in a very eligible situation near York, are purchased, and the building is in such forwardness, that it may probably be ready for the accomodation of Patients in the course of the Summer 1795. Divers Meetings of the Subscribers have been held, and the following Rules were agreed to, and are now confirmed.

1st. THAT the Institution be established and supported by Annuities, Donations, and annual Subscriptions; and that the same (which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted amongst Friends within the compass of any quarterly Meeting.

2d. That each Subscriber, by way of annuity, contributing a sum not less than twenty pounds, shall receive an Interest of 5 per cent. per annum, during life; and as the undertaker may not be able to pay this Interest, and otherwise maintain itself, for the first three years, that those entered as Subscribers for annual payments be engaged for three years certain, in case the Subscriber should so long live.

3d. That a contribution of one hundred Pounds, from any quarterly or other Meeting in its collective capacity, or a donation of twenty-five Pounds from any Friend, or a subscription of fifty Pounds for an annuity, shall entitle such Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one poor Patient at a time on the lowest terms of admission.

4th. That the name of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose; and that every Annuitant, Donor of not less than two Guineas, and Subscriber of sums in any manner equal to two Guineas (being and continuing a Member of our Society), shall be a Member of the Meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

5th. That there be paid for Board, Washing, medical Advice and Medicines, and all other things necessary except cloathing, according to the circumstances of the Patients or their Friends, from four shillings to fifteen shilling per week, or higher in particular cases; and six shillings per week for the board of the Servant of a Patient, in case the Friends of any Patient should incline to send one; which Servant must be approved by the Committee.

6th. That eight shillings per week and upwards, according to circumstances, be the terms for Patients who may not be privileged agreeably to the 3d Rule. These terms for Patients to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary.

7th. As the benefit of the proposed Institution is intended to extend to those who are not strictly Members of our Society, it is agreed that subscriptions may also be received from such persons.

8th. In case any quarterly Meeting be so small, or its Members not in an eligible situation to raise one hundred Pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have a power, on application, to extend the privilege of the 3d Rule to such Meetings, on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of the said General Meeting.

As several objections have been made, especially by Friends at a distance, to some parts of the foregoing Plan, the following Remarks and Explanations are added, in order to remove them.

Some have thought that accomodations for so many as thirty Patients should not have been aimed at: But it is obvious, that the quantity of ground for exercise, ought not to be much, if any, less for fifteen, than for thirty; that Kitchens, Parlours, and almost all parts of the Building, except the number of Patients' Rooms, ought to be nearly the same; and that it would make little difference with respect to Physician and domestic Managers: So that to accomodate the proposed number would not only lessen the expence of each Patient, but extend the benefits of the Institution to Friends at a greater distance.

It appears necessary, that General Meetings of the Subscribers should be held once a Year, to receive Reports of the preceding Year's accounts, make Rules, and appoint Committees, &c. To collect Subscribers for these purposes might be difficult, unless they were drawn together on some particular occasion: The Quarterly Meeting of York affords such an occasion better than any other, because it is larger, and Friends more frequently come to it from distant parts. Besides, if a Committee should meet quarterly, it may then be conveniently appointed of Friends residing in various and distant parts of the County. This Committee may appoint Visitors, and a Sub-committee of Friends conveniently situated to take the immediate oversight of the Institution, and to make report to them once a Quarter.

With regard to the objections to the 3d Rule, it may be proper to remark, that a Quarterly Meeting being a standing body, its privilege is perpetual; but the right of a single Friend dies with him; and therefore, a Donation of 100l. is required from the former, in its collective capacity, when only 25l. Donation, or 50l. Subscription for an Annuity, is required to entitle a Friend to a similar privilege with a Quarterly Meeting. It should be attended to, that Patients whose connections are of ability to pay eight shillings per week or upwards, according to circumstances, cannot be privileged under that Rule.

It hath been said, that there are already many public Institutions of the kind, which render this unnecessary. But it is evident, besides what has been remarked on this head in the former publications, that several peculiar and important advantages will accrue from an Institution confined to ourselves. For as the disorder is a mental one, and people of regular conduct, and even religiously disposed minds, are not exempt from it, their confinement amongst persons in all respects strangers, and their promiscuous exposure to such company as is mostly found in public Institutions of this kind, must be peculiarly disgusting, and consequently augment their disorder. Nor is this idea merely chimerical; for it is well known, that the situation of divers Members of our Society, hath, from this cause, been unspeakably distressing. A circumstance which it needs no arguments to prove, must greatly retard, if not totally prevent, their cure. On the other hand, when returning reason indicates a restoration of the mental powers, it may greatly tend to advance and establish this desirable event, to be under the direction of persons who, whilst they are careful to promote cheerful and salutary amusements, will, at the same time, be concerned, at suitable seasons, to cherish in them the strengthening and consolatory principles of Religion and Virtue, instead of dissipating these impressions, by such diversions as enfeeble the mind, and disqualify it for that solid reflection which leads to substantial peace and comfort.

It has hitherto been judged best not to trouble any Meeting of Discipline with the establishment, or future management, of such an Institution, because matters of this sort are often worse than unedifying to these Meetings. So large a number of Subscribers as there is likely to be in the compass of York Quarterly Meeting, with others from distant parts who may attend, are likely to be fully competent to direct the management for many years to come; and before they are materially reduced in number, it will undoubtedly become their concern to provide for a regular succession. But though it would not be proper to introduce the whole management of the business in any Meeting for Discipline, yet the simple consideration of aiding the Establishment by Subscriptions, may not be an improper subject for such a Meeting. If one or more hundred pounds should be raised and paid in its name (the sums given by each Friend being specified or not, as they may chuse), such Meeting will not be subject to any future trouble, except that of keeping up an appointment of a Friend or two, as Agents, to correspond with the Committee, and recommend Patients, &c; similar to what has been done by divers Meetings,

To conclude—an Institution of this nature must be fixed somewhere, and, unless it be on a very small scale, many Patients must be sent from a considerable distance. Friends who think the object worthy their attention, may be encouraged to promote it, not only on a principle of Charity to the Poor, but even of Compassion to those in easy and affluent circumstances, who will doubtless think themselves benefitted, though they may pay amply for it. Those who have embarked in this Undertaking, have not been influenced by interested views, nor are they requesting or desiring any favours for themselves. A Malady, in many instances, the most deplorable that Human Nature is subject to, hath excited their sympathy and attention; and they invite such Friends as approve of their design, to co-operate with them in an Establishment, which hath for its object, the mitigation of misery, and the restoration of those, who are lost to Civil and religious Society: In the prosecution whereof, they humbly rely on the favour of Him, whose tender Mercies are over all his works.

It being judged necessary that some fundamental Rules should be established the following were under Consideration, it was agreed that a sufficient number of Copies should be printed for each Subscriber to have one previous to their being confirmed and it is desired that as full an attendance of Subscribers as possible may be at our next Meeting during the time of or at the Conclusion of the Quarterly Meeting for this County in the next 9th Month in order that the proposed Rules may be fully considered

Security to Annuitants and Lenders of Money,

For the satisfaction of Subscribers on life annuities, and those who have lent, or may hereafter lend any money to this Institution, this Meeting declares, that the whole real and personal property thereunto belonging, acquired, and to be acquired, shall stand and continue a security to the said life Annuitants, for the annual payment of their Interest, and to the lenders aforesaid, for the regular payment of Principal and Interest.

Privilege of recommending poor Patients focused.

That the privilege of Meetings or Persons to recommend poor Patients on the lowest terms of admission, according to the 3rd and 8th Rules of 9th Month, 1794, shall not be taken away or diminished, notwithstanding any general powers which are or may be invested in the future Managers.

Establishment of a General Meeting.

That a Meeting of the Subscribers qualified according to the 4th Rule of the same date, be held in the latter end of the 6th Month, or beginning of the 7th Month of every year, unless some other time should hereafter be found more convenient, which Meeting shall be denominated the *General Meeting*; and the Friends who may compose it shall, from time to time, have a general state of the Family, and accounts of the Institution, laid before them, and (except the two preceding Minutes which relate to Securities to Annuitants, to Lenders of Money, and to privileged Meetings and Subscribers) shall have the power to alter, make Rules, and give such directions, as they may think best adapted to promote the designs of the Institution; and to appoint a Treasurer, who shall keep and dispose of the Money entrusted to him as the said Meeting shall direct; they shall also confirm, alter, or abrogate the orders and regulations of any other Meetings of the Subscribers, and shall choose annually a Committee for the immediate care and management of the Undertaking. This Committee are to meet once a month at furthest, to fix the terms of admission for the different Patients, make out clear and distinct accounts of the state of the Institution, and carry into execution the Rules and Orders made for promoting its Welfare.

It's Powers defined.

To appoint a Treasurer,

And a Monthly Committee.

Quarterly Meetings to inspect the Committee's Transactions.

That, during or after the conclusion of each Quarterly Meeting for Yorkshire, the qualified Subscribers are to meet and examine the said Committee's Accounts, read over all their Minutes, advance or reduce the weekly Payment of any of the Patients, and give the Committee such advice and direction as they may think proper, consistently with the general Rules and Orders that may have been established.

Provision for a perpetual Succession.

First Appointment limited to Subscribers, and the right of other Subscribers preserved.

That in order to provide for a perpetual succession of Managers, the General Meeting shall, in the year 1800, nominate and appoint forty Subscribers, members of our Society, who, with their Successors hereafter directed to be appointed, shall from thenceforth (together with any other Donors or Subscribers, and Agents that may be appointed by any qualified Meeting, that may from time to time choose to attend) be the General Meeting, and continue the Managers and Superintendants of the Institution, in whom the Government of it shall thereafter perpetually vest and remain: any ten of whom shall be sufficient to do Business. The said forty Managers, or any eight of them, with any other qualified Donors or Subscribers, to meet quarterly for the aforesaid purposes of the Quarterly Meeting of Subscribers.

As Donors and Subscribers may be reduced, others may in future be appointed.

That on the first appointment of the said forty Managers, their names are to be carefully and suitably arranged and recorded, and at the expiration of each year after the said appointment (viz. in the 6th or 7th Month, 1801), the first named eight on said list are to cease to be Managers, and eight others appointed by the Meeting in their place (with an addition for such as may be deceased or dismembered), any of whom may be chosen from the number of Donors and Subscribers, or others, as shall, in process of time, be judged most convenient and best.

Application of the Estate, in case the original purpose cannot be pursued.

Retreat for Persons afflicted with Disorders of the Mind.

A MEETING of Friends was held here the 28th of 6th Month, 1792, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of providing a retired habitation, with necessary advice, attendance, &c, for the Members of our Society, and others professing with us, who may be in a state of Lunacy, or so deranged in mind (not Idiots) as to require such a provision.

PERSONS of this description (who are truly objects of tender sympathy and compassion) are often, from the peculiar treatment which they require, necessarily committed wholly to the government of people of other Societies; by which means their own minds, and the feelings of their near connexions, are rendered more dissatisfied and uncomfortable, than would probably be the case, were they under the notice and care of those with whom they are connected in religious society. It appeared, therefore, very desirable, that an Institution should be formed, wholly under the government of Friends, for the relief and accomodation of such persons, of all ranks with respect to property. This would, doubtless, in some degree, alleviate the anxiety of their Relations, render the minds of the Patients more easy in their lucid intervals, and consequently tend to facilitate and promote their recovery.

THOUGH it may be said, that there are already many public Institutions of the kind, which render this unnecessary, yet it is evident, besides what has been remarked on this head in the former publications, that several peculiar and important advantages will accrue from an Institution confined to ourselves. As people of regular conduct, and even religiously disposed minds, are not exempt from this disorder, their confinement amongst persons in all respects strangers, and their promiscuous exposure to such company as is mostly found in public Institutions of this kind, must be peculiarly disgusting, and consequently augment their malady. This idea is not imaginary: for it is well known, that the situation of divers Members of our Society, hath, from this cause, been unspeakably distressing: a circumstance which must doubtless greatly retard, if not totally prevent their cure. On the other hand, when returning reason indicates a restoration of the mental powers, it may greatly tend to advance and establish the patient's recovery, to perceive himself under the direction of persons who, whilst they are careful to promote cheerful and salutary amusements, will be concerned, at suitable seasons, to cherish in them the strengthening and consolatory principles of Religion and Virtue, instead of dissipating these impressions, by such diversions as enfeeble the mind, and disqualify it for that solid reflection which leads to substantial peace and comfort.

IN conformity to these views and sentiments, Friends in divers parts of the Nation have contributed towards this Establishment. About eleven acres of ground, in a very eligible situation near York, have been purchased, and a House erected, with apartments suitable for the accomodation of Friends in any circumstances of life. The following are the Regulations which have been adopted.

1st. THAT the Institution be established and supported by Annuities, Donations, and annual Subscriptions; and that the same (which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted amongst Friends within the compass of any quarterly Meeting.

2d. THAT each Subscriber, by way of Annuity, contributing a sum not less than twenty pounds, shall receive an interest of five per cent. per annum, during life: and as the undertaking may not be able to pay this interest, and otherwise maintain itself, for the first three years, that those entered as Subscribers for annual payments, be engaged for three years certain, in case the Subscriber should so long live.

3d. THAT a contribution of one hundred pounds, from any quarterly or other Meeting in its collective capacity, or a donation of twenty-five pounds from any Friend, or a subscription of fifty pounds for an annuity, shall entitle such Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one poor Patient at a time, on the lowest terms of admission.

4th. THAT the name of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose; and that every Annuitant, Donor of not less than two guineas, and Subscriber of sums in any manner equal to two guineas (being and continuing a Member of our Society), shall be a Member of the Meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

5th. THAT there be paid for Board, Washing, medical Advice and Medicines, and all other things necessary, except clothing, for every poor Patient privileged agreeably to the third Rule, a sum not less than four shillings per week.

6th. THAT not less than eight shillings per week be paid for other Patients, and more according to circumstances; and six shillings per week for the board of the servant of a Patient, in case their friends should incline to send one: which servant must be approved by the Committee. The terms of admission to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary.

7th. As the benefit of the proposed Institution is intended to extend to those who are not strictly Members of our Society, it is agreed that Subscriptions may also be received from such persons.

8th. In case any quarterly Meeting be so small, or its Members not in an eligible situation to raise one hundred pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have power, on application, to extend the privilege of the third Rule to such Meetings, on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of the said General Meeting.

On the admission of Patients, the Committee should, in general, require a certificate, signed by a medical person, to the following import: "I do hereby certify, that A B of C, aged — years, is in a state of Insanity, and proper to be received into a house provided for the relief of persons of that description." — It is also desirable, that some account should be sent, how long the Patient has been disordered; whether any, or what sort of medical means have been used; and whether any disposition has appeared in the Patient to injure him or herself, or any other person; with any other circumstances likely to throw light on the case relative to his or her treatment.

18th. As the Committee is not to admit any Patient, on lower terms than eight shillings per week, unless recommended by the Agent of a privileged Meeting, or a Subscriber qualified according to the third Rule, it is hoped that individual Subscribers will be cautious of recommending Patients, whose maintenance, or any part thereof, is paid by a monthly or other Meeting, to the saving of the expence of the Members of such Meetings collectively, thereby rendering it unnecessary for them to subscribe to the Institution: but no discouragement is hereby intended to the assistance of Friends whose circumstances, or those of their near connexions are too strait to pay eight shillings per week.

19th. As it is necessary to ascertain the Subscriptions of each Meeting that may have a right to recommend Poor Patients, Donors of twenty-five pounds and upwards, are desired to explain, whether they wish to enjoy the privilege, during life, of recommending Poor Patients, or that their Donations shall be considered as the Subscription of their quarterly or other Meetings: and it is agreed, that all Donations of individuals (not claiming such right of recommendation) shall be considered as the Subscriptions of the quarterly Meeting to which they respectively belong, whether reported to such Meetings, or not; and every quarterly Meeting shall enjoy the privilege of recommending Poor Patients, in proportion to the Subscriptions of their respective Members.

THE Committee reports, "that the additional wing of the Building, as directed by the last quarterly Meeting of Subscribers, is in great forwardness; that the Donations to this Institution amount to £1789. 2s. 6d, to which may be added fifty pounds fallen in by the decease of an Annuitant; that the annual Subscriptions amount to £51. 9s: that the Institution remains subject to the payment of five per cent, per annum to life Annuitants, on the sum of £875; and that the several sums borrowed on interest, towards completing the Building, amount to £1245."

THOUGH the annual Subscriptions were engaged only for three years certain, yet we hope they will be continued for some time longer, according to the freedom of the Subscribers.

As this Institution is now beginning to operate, and affords an encouraging hope, that, if properly supported, it will be productive of considerable utility, the General Meeting again recommends it to the serious attention of Friends. They who think the object worthy their attention, may be encouraged to promote it, not only on a principle of Charity to the Poor, but even from compassion to those in easy and affluent circumstances, who will doubtless think themselves benefitted, though they may pay amply for it. The Friends who have embarked in this Undertaking, have not been influenced by interested views, nor are they requesting or desiring any favours for themselves. A malady, in many instances, the most deplorable that human nature is subject to, hath excited their sympathy and attention; and they invite such Friends as approve of their design, to co-operate with them in an Establishment, which hath for its object, the mitigation of human misery, and the restoration of those, who are lost to civil and religious Society: in the prosecution of which, they humbly rely on the favour of Him, whose tender Mercies are over all his works.

This Committee are to meet once a month at farthest; fix the terms of admission for the different Patients; make out clear and distinct accounts of the state of the Institution; and carry into execution the Rules and Orders made for promoting its welfare.

12th. THAT, during, or after the conclusion of each quarterly Meeting of Friends for Yorkshire, the qualified Subscribers are to meet and examine the said Committee's accounts, read over all their minutes, advance or reduce the weekly payment of any of the Patients, and give the Committee such advice and direction as they may think proper, consistently with the general Rules and Orders that may have been established.

13th. THAT, in order to provide for a perpetual succession of Directors, the General Meeting shall, in, or before, the year 1800, nominate and appoint forty Subscribers, Members of our Society, who, with their successors, as hereafter directed to be appointed, shall from thenceforth (together with any other qualified Donor or Subscribers, and Agents that may be appointed by any qualified Meeting, that may from time to time choose to attend) be the General Meeting, and continue the Directors of the Institution, in whom the government of it shall thereafter perpetually vest and remain; any ten of whom shall be sufficient to do business. The said forty Directors, or any eight of them, with any other qualified Donors or Subscribers, to meet quarterly for the aforesaid purposes of the quarterly Meeting of Subscribers.

14th. THAT on the first appointment of the said forty Directors, their names are to be carefully and suitably arranged and recorded; and, at the expiration of each year after the said appointment, the first named eight on said list are to cease to be Directors, and eight others, Members of our Society, appointed by the Meeting in their place (with an addition for such as may be deceased or disowned), any of whom may be chosen from the number of Donors and Subscribers, or others, as shall, in process of time, be judged most convenient and best.

15th. IF, at any future period, by means of some unforeseen or unexpected events, it should appear to the General Meeting, that the original purpose of the Undertaking cannot be accomplished or pursued, the said General Meeting shall give due notice in writing to all the Directors, and also to every quarterly or other Meeting of our Society which, according to the Rules, may be interested therein, that the disposal of the property of the Institution is to be taken under consideration at their next Meeting; at which Meeting two Agents or Representatives, appointed by any of the said Meetings, shall be admitted as Members of the General Meeting: and in case two-thirds of the Meeting so convened shall agree thereto, they may sell or dispose of the whole estate and property of the Institution, or of any part thereof, or appropriate the same, or the neat produce thereof, to such just, equitable, or charitable uses, as they, on serious and deliberate consideration, shall judge best.

16th. A Quarter of a year's maintenance for each Patient is to be regularly paid in advance; and in case the Patient should be cured, or die before the expiration of the first quarter, no part thereof is to be returned; but, after the first quarter, return is to be made for the number of whole weeks unexpired, at the time of removal, or decease of a Patient.

17th. ON the admission of Patients, the Committee should, in general, require a certificate, signed by a medical person, to the following import: "I do hereby certify, that A B of C, aged — years, is in a state of Insanity, and proper to be received into a house provided for the relief of persons of that description."—It is also desirable, that some account should be sent, how long the Patient has been disordered; whether any, or what sort of medical means have been used; and whether any disposition has appeared in the Patient to injure him or herself, or any other person; with any other circumstances likely to throw light on the case relative to his or her treatment.

18th. As the Committee is not to admit any Patient, on lower terms than eight shillings per week, unless recommended by the Agent of a privileged Meeting, or a Subscriber qualified according to the third Rule, it is hoped that individual Subscribers will be cautious of recommending Patients, whose maintenance, or any part thereof, is paid by a monthly or other Meeting, to the saving of the expence of the Members of such Meetings collectively, thereby rendering it unnecessary for them to subscribe to the Institution: but no discouragement is hereby intended to the assistance of Friends whose circumstances, or those of their near connexions are too strait to pay eight shillings per week.

19th. As it is necessary to ascertain the Subscriptions of each Meeting that may have a right to recommend Poor Patients, Donors of twenty-five pounds and upwards, are desired to explain, whether they wish to enjoy the privilege, during life, of recommending Poor Patients, or that their Donations shall be considered as the Subscription of their quarterly or other Meetings: and it is agreed, that all Donations of individuals (not claiming such right of recommendation) shall be considered as the Subscriptions of the quarterly Meeting to which they respectively belong, whether reported to such Meetings, or not; and every quarterly Meeting shall enjoy the privilege of recommending Poor Patients, in proportion to the Subscriptions of their respective Members.

The Committee reports, "that the additional wing of the Building, as directed by the last quarterly Meeting of Subscribers, is in great forwardness; that the Donations to this Institution amount to £1789. 2s. 6d, to which may be added fifty pounds fallen in by the decease of an Annuitant; that the annual Subscriptions amount to £51. 9s; that the Institution remains subject to the payment of five per cent, per annum to life Annuitants, on the sum of £875; and that the several sums borrowed on interest, towards completing the Building, amount to £1245."

THOUGH the annual Subscriptions were engaged only for three years certain, yet we hope they will be continued for some time longer, according to the freedom of the Subscribers.

As this Institution is now beginning to operate, and affords an encouraging hope, that, if properly supported, it will be productive of considerable utility, the General Meeting again recommends it to the serious attention of Friends. They who think the object worthy their attention, may be encouraged to promote it, not only on a principle of Charity to the Poor, but even from compassion to those in easy and affluent circumstances, who will doubtless think themselves benefitted, though they may pay amply for it. The Friends who have embarked in this Undertaking, have not been influenced by interested views, nor are they requesting or desiring any favours for themselves. A malady, in many instances, the most deplorable that human nature is subject to, hath excited their sympathy and attention; and they invite such Friends as approve of their design, to co-operate with them in an Establishment, which hath for its object, the mitigation of human misery, and the restoration of those, who are lost to civil and religious Society: in the prosecution of which, they humbly rely on the favour of Him, whose tender Mercies are over all his works.

In again laying before the Subscribers, the state of this Institution, we feel encouragement, from the liberal support which it has this year met with from Friends in different parts of the Nation, as well as from repeated proofs of the advantages derived to the Patients, by being under the care and government of persons who are Members of our Society. We think it, however, proper to observe, that out of twenty-three cases now in the House, all of them, except two or three, were, at their admission, of so long standing as to be considered incurable. Most of the Patients appear much improved, and some of them may be considered in a state of recovery; but from their liability to relapse, and their remote situation from home, their friends wait for further confirmation previous to their removal.

Since the last report, two Patients have returned home recovered; one of whom having relapsed has been readmitted, which has also been the case with one returned last year. Nine others have been admitted this year; one of them, a few days after his admission, died of a fever. The number of Patients now in the House, is nine men and fourteen women; eight of them are on the low terms of four shillings per week; the rest from eight shillings to one guinea. The income from the whole is £9. 15s. 0d. per week. We are now in expectation that the income from the Patients will be nearly sufficient for their support and attendance; but the payment of Annuities and Interest, as well as the gradual reduction of the debt, will still require the pecuniary aid of those who approve of the Institution.

Though it was the original design of this Institution, to accommodate such Insane Persons as are Members of our Society, yet it was also considered that cases might arise, wherein it might be desirable to extend such accommodation beyond the line of strict Membership; but as an indiscriminate admittance of persons not in Membership, would defeat the special design of the Institution, this Meeting finds it expedient more explicitly to declare, that the admitting or not admitting of them must always be left to the discretion of the Committee, and consequently time given for that purpose.

It also appears necessary, that the sending of Patients without previous application, should, in all cases, be avoided, lest suitable accommodations be not ready for their reception; and Friends are also requested to avoid bringing Patients at late hours of the night.

As some Patients have come with disorders unconnected with Insanity, and which require additional expense or attendance, it is judged necessary that, in such cases, an additional charge should be made, at the discretion of the Committee.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1st. THAT the Institution be established and supported by Annuities, Donations, and annual Subscriptions; and that the same (which should be altogether voluntary) be promoted amongst Friends within the compass of any Quarterly Meeting.

2d. That each Subscriber, by way of Annuity, contributing a sum not less than twenty pounds, shall receive an interest of five per cent per annum, during life.

3d. That a contribution of one hundred pounds, from any quarterly or other Meeting in its collective capacity, or a donation of twenty-five pounds from any Friend, or a subscription of fifty pounds for an annuity, shall entitle such Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one poor Patient at a time, on the lowest terms of admission.

4th. That the name of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, be recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose; and that every Annuitant, Donor of not less than two guineas, and Subscriber of sums in any manner equal to two guineas, (being and continuing a Member of our Society,) shall be a Member of the Meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

5th. That there be paid for Board, Washing, medical Advice and Medicines, and all other things necessary, except clothing, for every poor Patient privileged agreeably to the third Rule, a sum not less than four shillings per week.

6th. That not less than eight shillings per week be paid for other Patients, and more according to circumstances; and six shillings per week for the board of the servant of a Patient, in case their friends should incline to send one: which servant must be approved by the Committee. The terms of admission to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary.

7th. As the benefit of the proposed Institution is intended to extend to those who are not strictly Members of our Society, though not under eight shillings per week, it is agreed that Subscriptions may also be received from such persons.

8th. In case any quarterly Meeting be small, or its Members not in an eligible situation to raise one hundred pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have power, on application, to extend the privilege of the third Rule to such Meetings, on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of the said General Meeting.

9th. For the satisfaction of Subscribers on life annuities, and those who have lent, or may hereafter lend, any money to this Institution, this Meeting declares, that the whole real and personal property thereunto belonging, acquired, and to be acquired, shall stand and continue a security to the said life Annuitants, for the annual payment of their interest, and to the Lenders aforesaid, for the regular payment of principal and interest.

10th. That the privilege of Meetings or Persons to recommend poor Patients on the lowest terms of admission, according to the third and eighth Rules of 9th. month, 1794, shall not be taken away or diminished, notwithstanding any general powers which are or may be invested in the future directors.

11th. That a Meeting of the Subscribers qualified according to the fourth Rule of the same date, be held in the latter end of the 6th. month, or beginning of the 7th. month of every year, unless some other time should hereafter be found more convenient; which Meeting shall be denominated the General Meeting: and the Friends who may compose it shall, from time to time, have a general state

of the family, and accounts of the Institution, laid before them, and (except the two preceding minutes which relate to securities to Annuitants, to Lenders of money, and to privileged Meetings and Subscribers) shall have power to alter or make Rules, and give such directions, as they may think best adapted to promote the designs of the Institution; and to appoint a Treasurer, who shall keep and dispose of the money entrusted to him, as the said Meeting shall direct; they may also confirm, alter, or abrogate the Orders and Regulations of any other Meetings of the Subscribers; and shall choose annually a Committee for the immediate care and management of the Undertaking. This Committee are to meet once a month at farthest; fix the terms of admission for the different Patients; make out clear and distinct accounts of the state of the Institution; and carry into execution the Rules and Orders made for promoting its welfare.

12th. That, during, or after the conclusion of each quarterly Meeting of Friends for Yorkshire, the qualified Subscribers are to meet and examine the said Committee's accounts, read over all their minutes, advance or reduce the weekly payment of any of the Patients, and give the Committee such advice and direction as they may think proper, consistent with the general Rules and Orders that may have been established.

13th. That, in order to provide for a perpetual succession of Directors, the General Meeting shall, in, or before the year 1800, nominate and appoint forty Subscribers, Members of our Society, who, with their successors, as hereafter directed to be appointed, shall from thenceforth (together with any other qualified Donor or Subscribers, and Agents) that may be appointed by any qualified Meeting,

that may from time to time choose to attend) be the General Meeting, and continue the Directors of the Institution, in whom the government of it shall thereafter perpetually vest and remain; any ten of whom shall be sufficient to do business. The said forty Directors, or any eight of them, with any other qualified Donors or Subscribers, to meet quarterly for the aforesaid purposes of the quarterly Meeting of Subscribers.

14th. That on the first appointment of the said forty Directors, their names are to be carefully and suitably arranged and recorded; and, at the expiration of each year after the said appointment, the first named eight on said list are to cease to be Directors, and eight others, Members of our Society, appointed by the Meeting in their place (with an addition for such as may be deceased or disowned), any of whom may be chosen from the number of Donors and Subscribers, or others, as shall, in process of time, be judged most convenient and best.

15th. If, at any future period, by means of some unforeseen or unexpected events, it should appear to the General Meeting, that the original purpose of the Undertaking cannot be accomplished or pursued, the said General Meeting shall give due notice in writing to all the Directors, and also to every quarterly or other Meeting of our Society, which, according to the Rules, may be interested therein, that the disposal of the property of the Institution is to be taken under consideration at their next Meeting; at which Meeting two Agents or Representatives, appointed by any of the said Meetings, shall be admitted as Members of the General Meeting; and in case two-thirds of the Meeting so convened shall agree thereto, they may sell or dispose of the whole estate and property of the Institution, or of

any part thereof, or appropriate the same, or the next produce thereof, to such just, equitable, or charitable uses, as they, on serious and deliberate consideration, shall judge best.

16th. A quarter of a year's maintenance for each Patient is to be regularly paid in advance; and in case the Patient should be cured, or die before the expiration of the first quarter, no part thereof is to be returned; but, after the first quarter, return is to be made for the number of whole weeks unexpired, at the time of removal, or decease of a Patient.

17th. On the admission of Patients, the Committee should, in general, require a certificate, signed by a medical person, to the following import: "I do hereby certify, that A B of C, aged — years, is in a state of Insanity, and proper to be received into a house provided for the relief of persons of that description."* It is also desirable, that some account should be sent, how long the Patient has been disordered; whether any, or what sort of medical means have been used; and whether any disposition has appeared in the Patient to injure him or herself, or any other person; with any other circumstances likely to throw light on the case relative to his or her treatment.

18th. As the Committee is not to admit any Patient, on lower terms than eight shillings per week, unless recommended by the Agent of a privileged Meeting, or a Subscriber qualified according to the third Rule, it is hoped that individual Subscribers will be cautious of recommending Patients, whose maintenance, or any part thereof, is paid by a monthly or other Meeting, to the saving of the ex-

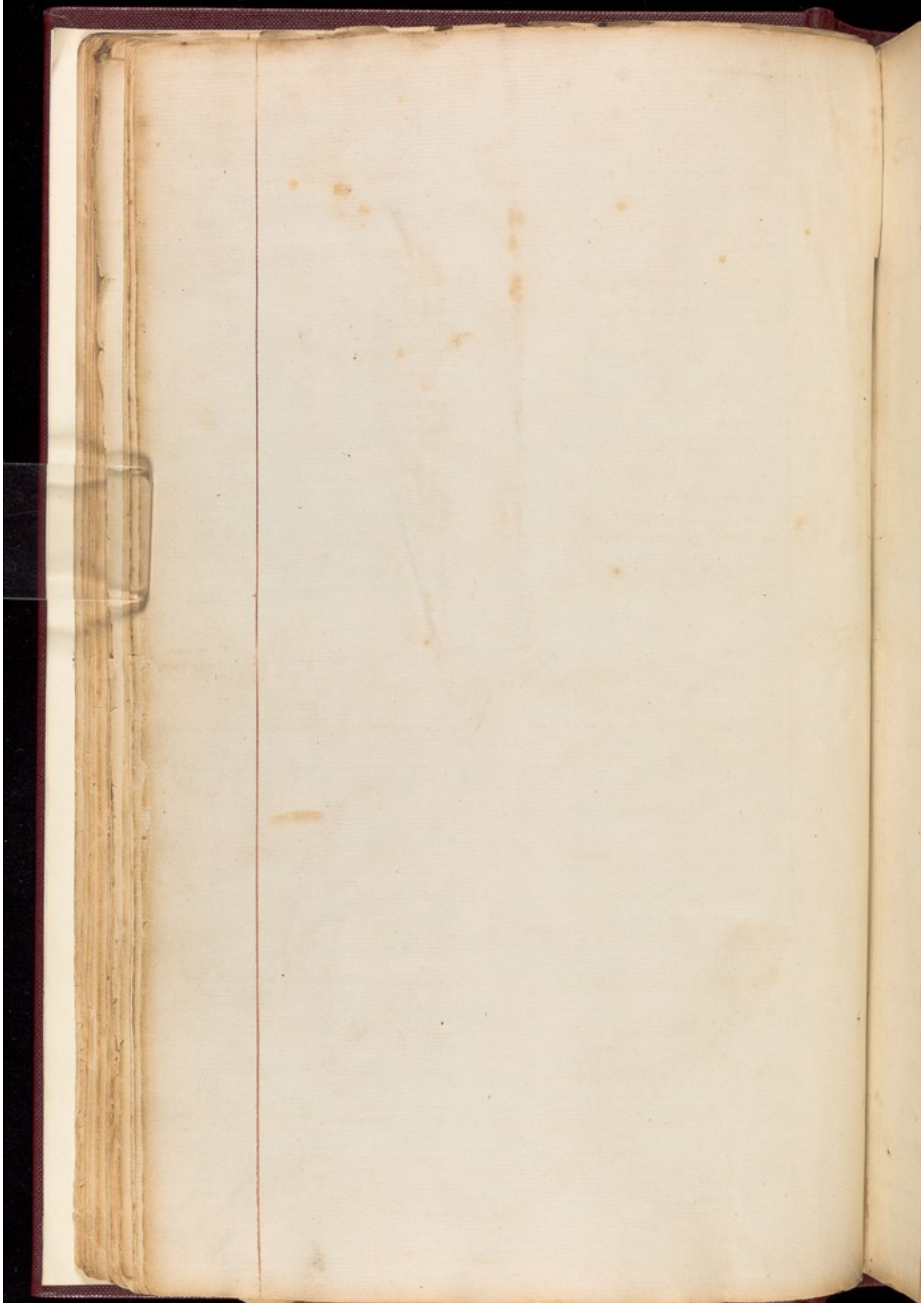
pense of the Members of such Meetings collectively, thereby rendering it unnecessary for them to subscribe to the Institution; but no discouragement is hereby intended to the assistance of Friends whose circumstances, or those of their near connexions, are too strait to pay eight shillings per week.

19th. As it is necessary to ascertain the Subscriptions of each Meeting that may have a right to recommend poor Patients, Donors of twenty-five pounds and upwards, are desired to explain, whether they wish to enjoy the privilege, during life, of recommending poor Patients, or that their Donations should be considered as the Subscription of their quarterly or other Meetings; and it is agreed, that all Donations of individuals (not claiming such right of recommendation) shall be considered as the Subscription of the quarterly Meeting to which they respectively belong, whether reported to such Meetings, or not; and every quarterly Meeting shall enjoy the privilege of recommending poor Patients, in proportion to the Subscriptions of their respective Members.

20th. As, in many cases, it may be difficult for the Friends of Patients to procure suitable persons to conduct them to the House, it is agreed, that on application, a proper person will be sent from the Retreat; the expenses only being paid by the Patients' Friends.

N. B. There are apartments in which Patients with a Servant may be accommodated, without mixing with the others.

In reporting the state of this Institution, we have again the satisfaction to inform its Friends & supporters, that the Funds have received some considerable addition since last Year; and that the improvement in many of the Patients, continues to be such, as to afford us encouragement in the undertaking. — Five Patients have left the Institution since last Year, so far recovered, as to render confinement unnecessary, though most of them were cases of long standing; several others are also much improved. Fifteen more Patients have been admitted in most of whom the Disorder had existed for a considerable time; several of them had been removed from other Institutions of this nature, and considered as incurable. On this ground the generality of them afford little or no prospect of a perfect recovery; yet divers of these appear more comfortable to themselves, and are improved in their mental faculties. There are now in the House 30 Patients viz, 16 Men & 14 Women; eight of them at the low rate of four Shillings p Week, the rest from eight Shillings to two Guineas.

The Number of Male Patients having proved greater than was expected, an additional building has been undertaken, and is nearly completed; and also a separate piece of ground walled in for their accommodation.

We find ourselves justified in the expectation we expressed last Year, that the income from the Patients would be nearly sufficient for their support and attendance, as there appears a defect of only 14. 8. 1. From the number now in the House, we hope that no deficiency on that account will, in future, take place; yet the payment of Life Annuities, and the

Interest of Money borrowed, as well as the reduction of the Principal, will render the continued liberality of Friends acceptable and necessary.

As experience demonstrates, that the recovery of insane Patients frequently depends on their being removed from their connections, and put under proper care & treatment, in the early stages of the disorder, it is earnestly recommended to their Friends, to remove them at an early period after the disorder appears to be fixed. From the preceding statement, it appears, that the liberal contributions of Friends have enabled the managers of the Institution, to discharge the expenses of the late additional Building and Furnitures, besides which there is a small reduction of the debt. The very high price of provisions has frustrated the expectations which they formed last Year, that the Income from the Patients would support the Establishment, exclusive of the payment of Life Annuities, and the Interest of Money borrowed. The deficiency, however, does not amount to thirty pounds.

Eleven Patients have been admitted since ^{the} last Year. Six have recovered, and been discharged; three have died, two of whom were considerably advanced in Year. There are at present in the House, 36 Patients viz 15 Men and 21 Women; 11 of whom are at the low price of four Shillings, and one at five Shillings Q Week . Two Patients, whose disorder was recent, and who formerly would have paid four Shillings Q Week , were admitted gratis, in consequence of the agreement entered into last Year. They are both recovered and discharged.

Experience has this year abundantly convinced us, of the advantage to be derived from an early attention to persons afflicted with disorders of the mind. Of the 11 above reported to have been admitted two were removed from another Institution, as incurables; 4 three others were confirmed cases. The remaining six were recent instances; four of whom recovered and were discharged within the first quarter after their admission; the two others are evidently recovering, and will probably be dismissed within the same period. This consideration will, we hope, encourage the Friends of those who are, or may be afflicted with this Malady, to remove them early, and place them under proper care & treatment.

We feel satisfaction in having it in our power

to demonstrate the advantages of this Institution; and we trust that nothing now remains necessary to convince Friends of its Utility, and to encourage them more generally to cooperate in its support.

24th - As experience demonstrates, that the recovery of insane Patients frequently depends on their being removed from their connexions, and put under proper care & treatment, in the early stages of the disorder, it is earnestly recommended to their Friends, to remove them at an early period after the disorder appears to be fixed. And as an additional inducement to persons in straitened circumstances, to adopt this salutary measure, it is concluded, that, in arrangements not exceeding six months from their first appearance, those members of our Society whose circumstances, in case of continuance, would not conveniently admit of their paying more than eight shillings a week, shall be entitled to an abatement of four shillings a week for one Year, if not sooner recovered. Those Patients who, by the former Rules, would have been rated at four shillings a week, will, under this regulation, be admitted gratis, for a Year if necessary.

It is unnecessary to add much to the preceding statement of accounts. We may however remark, that we are still unable to bring the yearly expenses of the Family within the Income arising from the Patients: but when the continued, and even increased high price of Provisions is considered, we apprehend that the Deficiency, amounting to nearly £65. will not be thought extraordinary. This however, has been more than compensated by the liberal Donations of Friends: so that there is an increase of £145 in the Property of the Institution.

There have been thirteen Patients admitted since the last Year. Seven have been discharged in a state of recovery; and two have died. The number now in the House is 40; (viz) 24 Women & 16 Men. Besides the Persons recovered, the condition of several others has been so much meliorated, as to afford additional encouragement to those who have interested themselves in this Institution. Friends are now so generally convinced of its utility as to render it unnecessary to say much in its favour: We indulge a hope that those who have not yet come forward in its support, will be induced to unite with their Friends in this undertaking, as the Debt with which it is still incumbered, continues to claim the assistance of those who feel for the afflictions of their fellow-creatures. —

We have now the satisfaction of laying before the subscribers to this Institution, a more favourable Statement of its funds than we have heretofore been able to do; there being an increase of income from the Patients above the Expenditure on their account, of £85.4.5; and of the whole property of the Institution above that of last Year of £258.16.3.

The Number of Patients admitted since last Year is 13, to have been discharged either recovered or improved, and one has died; there are now 48 in the House (viz) 17 men & 31 Women.

We think it proper at this time to state, for the information of Friends, that since the opening of the Institution seven years ago, there have been 89 Patients admitted; of these, 55 have been discharged recovered, & 6 have been taken away improved; 4 have died, and 39 remain. From this statement we presume that Friends who may have cases of Insanity to provide for, will see the propriety of placing them under such care as this Institution affords, in an early stage of the disorder; as the probability of recovery greatly depends on this circumstance.

The increase of the number of Patients, and the want of further accommodation in the House, have induced the Directors to agree to a proposal of the Committee, for building an additional Wing; on which account, as well as on account of the Debt of £2870 owing by the Institution at the end of 3 Months last, we still solicit the liberality of Friends; and from the favourable disposition which has already been manifested, we have no doubt of its being continued.

Report

In laying before the Subscribers the state of the funds of this Institution, we have again the satisfaction to observe, that the income from the Patients exceeds their Expenses. It is also a satisfaction to the Managers of the Institution to perceive the continued liberality of Friends towards it. The income of various kinds, this Year, has exceeded the current expenses in the sum of £459. 2. 10, but it is proper to observe, that above £400 of this excess has already been applied towards the charge of the additional Wing to the Building. This wing, now nearly ready for the admission of Patients, will accommodate ^{about} ten more than have heretofore been admitted into the House."

"The Number of Patients in the House at this time is 48 viz) 17 Men & 28 Women; but during the Year ending 31st of 3rd month, to which period the accounts apply, the number was generally 48, a greater average than in any preceding Year. For want of room, 14 Patients only have been admitted since last Year; two have died; and five have been discharged: of these, four had recovered, and one was much improved. It is with pleasure we have to observe, that in the state of several others, there is a considerable improve^{ment}.

In stating the accounts of the Institution for the
last Year ending 31st of 3rd Month, it appears that the
expenditure has exceeded the Income from the Patients
£48.7.9 $\frac{1}{2}$. The remaining Income by Donations &c
has not been sufficient to make up the deficiency,
after discharging the Interest of money borrow'd and
paying the Annuitants, so that there is a decrease of
property in the last Year of £39.12.3 $\frac{1}{2}$. We have however
to report, that since the period of making up the accounts
a very liberal donation of £500 has been received from
a Friend, besides several smaller donations. A consider-
able Debt still remains due from the Institution which
renders the continued liberality of Friends desirable;
and we hope in particular, that divers Friends who may
now be satisfied, of the necessity or utility of an Insti-
tution of this nature, will feel their Minds disposed
to contribute to its support, and to the reduction of the
debt, which has greatly ~~exceeded~~ increased, by a
necessary extension of the Premises beyond the original
Plan.

Rules and Regulations.

CHAPTER I.

CONTRIBUTIONS.

1. **T**HE Institution was established and is supported by Annuities, Donations, and annual Subscriptions; and the same may be further promoted amongst Friends within the compass of any Quarterly Meeting.

2d. Each Subscriber, by way of Annuity, contributing a sum not less than twenty pounds, shall receive an interest of five per cent. per annum, during life.

3d. A contribution of one hundred pounds, from any Quarterly or other Meeting in its collective capacity, or a donation of twenty-five pounds from any Friend, or a subscription of fifty pounds for an Annuity, shall entitle such Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one poor Patient at a time, on the lowest terms of admission.

4th. In consideration of the smallness of a quarterly Meeting, or of its members not being in an eligible situation to raise one hundred pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have power, on application, to extend the privilege of the third Rule to such Meetings on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of the said General Meeting.

5th. The privilege of Meetings, or persons, to recommend poor Patients on the lowest terms of admission, according to the third and fourth

Rules, shall not be taken away or diminished, notwithstanding any general powers which are or may be invested in the future Directors.

6th. As it is necessary to ascertain the Subscriptions of each meeting that may have a right to recommend poor Patients, Donors of twenty-five pounds and upwards, are desired to explain, whether they wish to enjoy the privilege, during life, of recommending poor Patients, or that their Donations should be considered as the Subscriptions of their Quarterly or other Meetings: and it is agreed, that all Donations of individuals (not claiming such right of recommendation,) shall be considered as the Subscription of their Quarterly Meeting, whether reported to such Meeting, or not; and every Quarterly Meeting shall enjoy the privilege of recommending poor Patients, in proportion to the Subscriptions of their respective members.

7th. The name when sent up, of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose; and every Annuitant, Donor of not less than two guineas, and Subscriber of sums in any manner equal to two guineas, (being and continuing a member of our Society) shall be a member of the meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendence of the Institution.

8th. For the satisfaction of Subscribers on life annuities, and those who have lent, or may hereafter lend any money to this Institution, this Meeting declares, that the whole real and personal property thereunto belonging, acquired, and to be acquired, shall stand and continue a security to the said life Annuitants, for the annual payment of their interest, and to the Lenders aforesaid, for the regular payment of principal and interest.

CHAPTER II.

GOVERNMENT.

1st. A General Meeting shall be held in the latter end of the 6th month, or the beginning of the 7th month of every year, unless some other time should hereafter be found more convenient; and the Friends who may compose it shall, from time to time, have a general state of the family, and accounts of the Institution, laid before them, and, except the two minutes which relate to securities to Annuitants, to Lenders of money, and to privileged Meetings and Subscribers, shall have power to alter or make Rules, and give such directions, as they may think best adapted to promote the designs of the Institution; and to appoint a Treasurer, who shall keep and dispose of the money entrusted to him, as the said Meeting shall direct; they may also confirm, alter or abrogate, the Orders and Regulations of the Quarterly Meetings; and shall choose annually a Committee for the immediate care and management of the Undertaking.—This Committee are to meet once a month, oftner if necessary: fix the terms of admission for the different Patients; make out clear and distinct accounts of the state of the Institution; and carry into execution the Rules and Orders made for promoting its welfare.

2d. During, or after the conclusion of, each Quarterly Meeting of Friends for Yorkshire, a Meeting is to be held to receive a report of the said Committee's accounts, read over all their minutes, advance or reduce the weekly payment of any of the Patients, and give the Committee

such advice and direction as they may think proper, consistently with the general Rules and Orders that may have been established.

3d. The General Meeting in the year 1800, according to the original plan of the Institution, made provision for a perpetual succession of Directors. Forty Subscribers, members of our Society, were nominated and appointed, who, with their successors, as hereafter directed to be appointed, together with any other Donors or Subscribers, qualified according to the fourth Rule, and Agents that may be appointed by any qualified Meeting, that may from time to time choose to attend, are to be the General Meeting, and continue the Directors of the Institution, in whom the government of it is perpetually to vest and remain; any ten of whom are to be sufficient to do business. The said forty Directors, or any eight of them, with any other qualified Donors or Subscribers, are to meet quarterly for the purposes of the preceding Rule.

4th. At the expiration of each year, the first named eight on the list are to cease to be Directors, and eight others members of our Society, are to be appointed by the General Meeting in their place; with an addition for such as may be deceased or disowned; any of whom may be chosen from the number of Donors and Subscribers, or others, as shall, in process of time, be judged most convenient and best.

5th. If, at any future period, by means of some unforeseen or unexpected events, it should appear to the General Meeting, that the original purpose of the Undertaking cannot be accomplished or pursued, the said General Meeting shall give due notice in writing to all the Directors, and also in every Quarterly or other Meeting of our Society,

which, according to the Rules, may be interested therein, that the disposal of the Property of the Institution is to be taken under consideration at their next Meeting; at which Meeting two Agents or Representatives, appointed by any of the said Meetings, shall be admitted as Members of the General Meeting; and in case two-thirds of the Meeting so convened shall agree thereto, they may sell or dispose of the whole estate and property of the Institution, or of any part thereof, or appropriate the same, or the neat produce thereof, to such just, equitable, or charitable uses, as they, on serious and deliberate consideration, shall judge best.

CHAPTER III.

PATIENTS.

1st. The Terms for Board, Washing, medical Advice and Medicines, and all other things necessary, except clothing, are for every poor Patient privileged agreeably to the third Rule, a sum not less than four shillings per week.

2d. Not less than eight shillings per week shall be paid for other Patients, and more according to circumstances; and a reasonable sum for the board of the servant of a Patient, in case their friends should incline to send one: which servant must be approved by the Committee. The terms of admission to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary; and as the wearing of washing gowns and skirts is at present so much increased, that the washing of them in so large a family is attended with considerable inconvenience, it is agreed, that those belonging to the Patients shall

be washed out of the House, and the expense charged to their respective accounts.

3d. A quarter of a year's maintenance for each Patient is to be paid in advance; and in case the Patient should be cured, or die before the expiration of the first quarter, no part thereof is to be returned; but, after the first quarter, return is to be made for the number of whole weeks unexpired, at the time of removal, or decease of a Patient.

4th. As experience demonstrates, that the recovery of insane Patients frequently depends on their being removed from their connexions, and put under proper care and treatment, in the early stages of the disorder, it is earnestly recommended to their friends, to remove them at an early period after the disorder appears to be fixed. And, as an additional inducement to persons in straitened circumstances, to adopt this salutary measure, it is concluded, that, in derangements not exceeding six months from their first appearance, those Members of our Society whose circumstances, in case of continuance, would not conveniently admit of their paying more than eight shillings per week, shall be entitled to an abatement of four shillings a week for one year, if not sooner recovered. Those Patients who, by the former rule, would have been rated at four shillings per week, will, under this regulation, be admitted gratis, for a year, if necessary; but as some Patients have come with disorders unconnected with insanity, and which require additional expense or attendance, it is judged necessary, that, in such cases, an additional charge shall be made at the discretion of the Committee.

5th. On the admission of Patients, the Committee should, in general, require a certificate,

signed by a medical person, to the following import: *I do hereby certify, that A B of C, aged — years, is in a state of Insanity, and proper to be received into a house provided for the relief of persons of that description.* It should also be stated whether the Patient is afflicted with any complaint independent of insanity. It is also desirable, that some account should be sent, how long the Patient has been disordered; whether any, or what sort of medical means have been used; and whether any disposition has appeared in the Patient to injure him or herself, or any other person; with any other circumstances likely to throw light on the case relative to his or her treatment.

6th. As the Committee is not to admit any Patient, on lower terms than eight shillings per week, unless recommended by the Agent of a privileged Meeting, or a Subscriber qualified according to the third Rule respecting Contributions, it is hoped that individual Subscribers will be cautious of recommending Patients whose maintenance, or any part thereof, is paid by a monthly or other Meeting, to the saving of the expense of the members of such Meetings collectively, thereby rendering it unnecessary for them to subscribe to the Institution: but no discouragement is hereby intended to the assistance of Friends whose circumstances, or those of their near connexions, are too strait, to pay eight shillings per week.

7th. As, in many cases, it may be difficult for the friends of Patients to procure suitable persons to conduct them to the House, it is agreed, that on application, a proper person shall be sent from the Retreat, when it is convenient; the expenses only being paid by the Patients' friends.

8th. Though it was the original design of this Institution, to accommodate such insane persons as are members of our Society, yet it was also considered that cases might arise, wherein it might be desirable to extend such accommodation beyond the line of strict membership; but as an indiscriminate admittance of persons not in membership, would defeat the special design of the Institution, by the exclusion of those who are members, the admitting, or not admitting of them, must always be left to the discretion of the Committee, and consequently time given for that purpose.

9th. It also appears necessary, that the sending of Patients without previous application, should, in all cases, be avoided, lest suitable accommodation be not ready for their reception; and Friends are also requested to avoid bringing Patients at late hours of the night.

10th. As circumstances may sometimes occur, wherein it is proper that the Committee should have a discretion to decline the admission of Patients, though members of our Society, especially when the House is nearly full; it is agreed to vest such discretion in the Committee, until the Quarterly or General Meeting can be consulted; which Meeting shall determine the propriety of admitting or refusing such applications.

N. B. There are apartments in which Patients with a Servant may be accommodated, without mixing with the others.

"In laying before the Subscribers to the Retreat, the State of ~~the~~ Funds, we have again the satisfaction of reporting, that the Income from the Patients has exceeded the expenditure of the House. A Surplus of £57.12.1. appears on this Part of the Statement, and when we take in the whole of the Income and expenditure of the Institution, there is a Balance of £431.13.7 in its favour. There still however remains a debt of £1686.12.8 for Principal & Interest, exclusive of what is due to Life Annuityants."

"There have been Ten Patients admitted since last Year, Seven have been taken away, five of whom were recovered, and the other two removed to other Situations on account of this House being too full. Three Patients have died, and there now remain 59 (viz) 24 Men & 35 Women. Several of those who now remain may be considered as in a State of Convalescence."

Report

At a general meeting of Directors & subscribers
held the 28th of 6th month 1810 the committee presented their
Report.

The Statement of accounts accompanying this
Report shows, that the property of the Institution has
decreased during the last year £4.15.10^{rs} and the expenses
of the Family have exceeded the Income from the Patients
£50.16.6^{rs}. When the present high prices of the necessa-
ries of life are considered, this excess of expensiture will
doubtless be readily accounted for.

The application for admission of Patients having
for some time past exceeded the accommodation afforded
by the House, it has been thought expedient to purchase
Premises, to relieve the present Family from some of those
Patients who may least stand in need of close confinement.
The Purchase Money is £1200 and a few hundreds more
will be necessary for making additions and alterations,
and for furnishing the House.

As it is desirable that the Debt already owing by
the Institution, should not be increased, a subscription
has been opened, and we annex a list of the Subscriptions
already made, amounting to £907.19.0 but as the sum
is considerably short of the occasion, it is hoped that other
Friends will come forward with contributions to supply
the deficiency.

There have been five Patients admitted since
last year; Six have taken away, recovered and Two
have died.

As it is twenty years since we presented a general statement of the number admitted, from the opening of the Institution in 1796, it is thought proper at this time to publish this general account.

Report

At a General Meeting of Directors & Subscribers held at York the 27th of 6th Month 1811 the Committee presented the following Report

In laying before the Benefactors to this Institution the state of the accounts to the end of 3rd Month last, we have the satisfaction to shew, that, chiefly in consequence of applications made ^{the} last Year on account of the Appurtenance Donations to the amount of £1399.4.0 have been received. Independently of this occasion £500 has been received as the bequest of Richard Chester, and £100 subscribed for an Annuity. It also appears that the income from the Patients has fallen short only £3.12.2¹/₂ of the expense of the Establishment, exclusive of ^{of interest} Money borrowed, or subscribed for Annuities. From these circumstances an increase of Property has this Year accrued to the Institution amounting to £1779.4.3.

The Appurtenance is now nearly ready for the admission of Patients, and it will probably be opened in the course of next Month. All the expenses attending it not being discharged the exact amount of them cannot as yet be ascertained; but so far as to the end of 3rd Month they will appear in ^{the} state of the accounts. It is now hoped that the Original Buildings with this Appurtenance will be sufficient to receive all applications for Patients at least if they are confined to those who are Members of our Society.

Since the 6th Month of the last Year, eight Patients have been admitted; seven have been removed; six of them recovered, and one much improved. Only one has died. There now remain in the House Fifty Seven Patients (viz) Twenty four Men and Thirteen Women.

It will appear from the annexed Accounts, that the Institution is in debt £1854.16.0 for Principal & Interest. The continuance of Donations &c will therefore, be acceptable for the discharge of this Debt and the Payments to Annuitants. But the liberality which has hitherto been manifested by Friends towards this Institution leaves no doubt of its receiving that pecuniary support which circumstances require.

Report

At a General Meeting of Directors and Subscribers to the Retreat, held at York the 25th of 6th Month, 1812 the Committee brought in the following Report.

From the state of the accounts which is now laid before the Subscribers to this Institution, it will appear that the Expenditure on account of the Patients has exceeded the Income from them, to the amount of £53.9.1 but this sum, considering all circumstances, and particularly the additional Expenses of the Appurtenance, is no more than might be expected. We have however, the satisfaction to state, that by means of Donations and Legacies, this Deficiency has not only been supplied, but a surplus of £260. 5. 7. has accrued in the property of the Institution above the Total Balance of the last Year. It will be observed that a considerable sum on Interest is still owing by the Institution.

There have been only six Patients removed during the last Year; two of whom were recovered and the others improved. Fifteen have been admitted, several of whom were confirmed cases, and who had been waiting some time till the Appurtenance was ready. None have died this Year. There are now under the care of the Institution, sixty six Patients (viz) 26 Men and 40

Women; of whom 4 Men and 8 Women are in the Appendage. This addition to the Establishment is found to be a great advantage to the Society, by admitting many Patients for whom accommodation ^{was} much wanted. It is however, likely to occasion more expense than the Surgeon from the increase of numbers will defray. But for the and for all other exigencies, we doubt not the liberality of Friends will sufficiently provide.

At a general meeting of Directors and Subscribers to the Retreat, held at York the 24th of 6th Month 1813.

The Friends appointed to examine the accounts have brought in a statement by which it appears that the expenditure, on account of the Patients, has this year exceeded the Income from them £326.17.6

This large increase of expenditure is, in a great measure, imputable to the additional Establishment of the Appendage, which affords a considerable relief to the original House, and enables the former to admit all suitable applications that are now made for Patients. In addition to this reason for the excess of expenditure, the advanced price of Provisions must also be taken into consideration; and we doubt not that they will together account satisfactorily for this excess. But though the above deficiency is so large, it will be seen, that owing to Legacies, Donations, Annual Subscriptions, and a Subscription for an Annuity, the whole Balance against the Institution is reduced to £122.4.10.

During the last Year, Eight Patients have been admitted, one has died, and eight have been discharged; six of them recovered, one improved, and the other as not being considered a suitable object. There are now 64 Patients (viz) 24 Men and 40 Women; of whom 12 Men and 7 Women are in the Appendage.

We have good reason to continue satisfied with the management of the Institution; and we trust, that when this Statement of its Finances is considered, and that 35 of the Patients pay only from four to eight Shillings per week, we shall be excused in drawing the attention of our Friends to this highly useful, and, to many, charitable Institution. We therefore hope for a more extended exercise of that liberality, which it has heretofore experienced and which is not only desirable on account of the increased Annual Expenditure, but also for the gradual reduction of a Debt of about Two Thousand Pounds with which it is encumbered.

ing the Appurage, as stated in the report of ^{the} last Year; but
as this part of the establishment continues materially to
promote to ~~promote~~ the original designs of Friends, and
is the means of accommodating a number of Patients, who
must otherwise have been excluded from the Retreat, we
trust that the increased expenditure will be so far from being
viewed with dissatisfaction, that it will be considered as
an indispensable support of a useful and important
auxiliary to the Institution.

It is with pleasure we have to state, that the liber-
ality of Friends, by Donations and Annual Subscriptions,
with the aid of Legacies and Subscriptions for Annuities,
has amounted to £1097. 0.4 and that there is, therefore,
after paying £216. 19. 2. to Annuityants & for Interest,
an addition to the Stock of the Institution of £436. 9. 11.

Report

The Friends appointed to examine the accounts of this
Institution, have produced a Statement, by which it appears
that the Expenditure on account of the Patients, for the Year ending
31st of 3rd Month exceeded the Income arising from them, by the sum
of £319.1.1¹/₂, but this deficiency is considerably less than that of
last Year, and we have again the satisfaction to state an improve-
ment in the Funds of the Institution.

The Donations, Annual Subscriptions, and Legacies,
after paying Annuity payments, and Interest of the Debt amounting
together to £226.3.5 and also defraying the aforesaid deficiency
have increased the Property to £188.9.11¹/₂. The Institution, however,
still remains subject to a Debt of £1289.19.6 and also to the pay-
ment of 5th Cent. to Annuity payments on the sum of £3380^x -

Fourteen Patients have been admitted since last Year. In the same
period ten have been discharged recovered, and three in an improved

State. Two Patients have died, one aged about 80 and the other 73 years.

There are now 63 Patients under care; (viz) 25 Men and 38 Women: of whom 4 Men and 7 Women are at the Appendage.

In concluding the 10th Report of the State of the Retreat, the Directors can hardly refrain from expressing the feelings of gratitude and satisfaction, with which they contemplate the prosperous state of this Institution, the benefits which have resulted from it to the immediate objects of its care; and the stimulus which its example has given to the improvement of Establishments for similar purposes.

From the opening of the Retreat to the end of the Year 1811, 177 Patients were admitted; of whom 100 had been disordered more than 12 Months. Of these latter cases, which are generally denominated incurable, 26 have been happily restored to society: and of the 77 recent cases, 59 have been so restored.

It is also worthy of remark, as affording satisfactory evidence of the good management of the Institution, and of the importance of early attention to cases of Insanity, that, of the 60 recent cases admitted in the last 3 years, 15 have already been discharged recovered.

The Directors cannot but attribute, under the Divine Blessing, much of the prosperity and success of the Institution, to the openness with which its affairs have been conducted; the uniform interest for its welfare evinced by its Patrons and Managers; and in an eminent degree, to the conscientious and judicious discharge of their arduous duties, by the Persons who have, for so many years, had the immediate superintendance and management of the Establishment. A steady attention to these causes of success, they trust will long support the character and usefulness of the Retreat, and ensure a continuance of that liberality by which it has hitherto been supported.

RULES, &C. FOR THE GOVERNMENT

CHAPTER II.

GOVERNMENT.

1st. A General Meeting shall be held in the latter end of the 6th month, or the beginning of the 7th month of every year, unless some other time should hereafter be found more convenient; and the Friends who may compose it shall, from time to time, have a general state of the family, and accounts of the Institution, laid before them; and, except the two minutes which relate to societies to Annuitants, to Lenders of money, and privileged Meetings and Subscribers, shall have power to alter or make Rules, and give such directions, as they may think best adapted to promote the designs of the Institution; and to appoint a Treasurer, who shall keep and dispose of the money entrusted to him, as the said Meeting shall direct. They may also confirm, alter or revoke, the Orders and Regulations of the Quarterly Meetings; and shall choose annually a committee of Seven Subscribers, any three of whom may act, for the immediate care and management of the Undertaking.—This Committee are to meet once a month; oftener if necessary; fix the terms of admission for the different Patients; make out clear and distinct

Rules and Regulations, &c.

CHAPTER I.

CONTRIBUTIONS.

1. **T**HE Institution was established and is supported by Annuities, Donations and annual Subscriptions; and the same may be further promoted amongst Friends, within the compass of any Quarterly Meeting.

2d. Each Subscriber, by way of Annuity, contributing a sum not less than twenty pounds, shall receive an interest of five per cent. per annum, during life.

3d. A contribution of one hundred pounds, from any Quarterly or other Meeting in its collective capacity, or a donation of twenty-five pounds from any Friend, or a subscription of fifty pounds for an Annuity, shall entitle such Meeting, Donor, or Annuitant, respectively, to the privilege of nominating one poor Patient at a time, on the lowest terms of admission.

RULES, &c. FOR THE GOVERNMENT

4th. In consideration of the smallness of a Quarterly Meeting, or of its members not being in eligible situation to raise one hundred pounds, the General Meeting of Subscribers shall have power, on application, to extend the privilege of the third Rule to such Meetings, on contributing a smaller sum, at the discretion of said General Meeting.

5th. The privilege of Meetings, or persons to recommend poor Patients on the lowest terms of admission, according to the third and fourth Rules, shall not be taken away or diminished, withstanding any general powers which are, or may be invested in the future Directors:

6th. As it is necessary to ascertain the Subscriptions of each meeting, that may have a right to recommend poor Patients, Donors of twenty-pounds and upwards, are desired to explain, whether they wish to enjoy the privilege, during their lives, of recommending poor Patients, or that their Donations should be considered as the Subscriptions of their Quarterly or other Meetings: if it is agreed, that all Donations of individuals, not claiming such right of recommendation, shall be considered as the Subscription of their Quarterly Meeting, whether reported to

such Meeting, or not; and every Quarterly Meeting shall enjoy the privilege of recommending poor Patients, in proportion to the Subscriptions of their respective members.

7th. The name when sent up, of every Annuitant, Donor, and Subscriber, shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose; and every Annuitant, Donor, of not less than two guineas, and Subscriber of sums in any manner equal to two guineas, (being and continuing a member of our Society,) shall be a member of the meetings which are to be held for the government and superintendance of the Institution.

8th. For the satisfaction of Subscribers on life annuities, and those who have lent, or may hereafter lend any money to this Institution, this Meeting declares, that the whole real and personal property thereunto belonging, acquired, and to be acquired, shall stand and continue a security to the said life Annuitants, for the annual payment of their interest, and to the Lenders aforesaid, for the regular payment of principal and interest.

CHAPTER II.

GOVERNMENT.

1st. A General Meeting shall be held in the latter end of the 6th month, or the beginning of the 7th month of every year, unless some other time should hereafter be found more convenient; and the Friends who may compose it shall, from time to time, have a general state of the family, and accounts of the Institution, laid before them; and, except the two minutes which relate to securities to Annuitants, to Lenders of money, and to privileged Meetings and Subscribers, shall have power to alter or make Rules, and give such directions, as they may think best adapted to promote the designs of the Institution; and to appoint a Treasurer, who shall keep and dispose of the money entrusted to him, as the said Meeting shall direct. They may also confirm, alter or abrogate, the Orders and Regulations of the Quarterly Meetings; and shall choose annually a Committee of Seven Subscribers, any three of whom may act, for the immediate care and management of the Undertaking.—This Committee are to meet once a month; oftener if necessary; fix the terms of admission for the different Patients; make out clear and distinct

accounts of the state of the Institution; and carry into execution the Rules and Orders made for promoting its welfare.

2d. During, or after the conclusion of, each Quarterly Meeting of Friends for Yorkshire, a Meeting is to be held to receive a report of the said Committee's accounts, read over all their minutes, advance or reduce the weekly payment of any of the Patients, and give the Committee such advice and direction as they may think proper, consistently with the general Rules and Orders that may have been established.

3d. At each Quarterly Meeting, two Subscribers shall be appointed as Visitors to the Institution, who are authorized to inspect every part of the House, at such times, and as often as they may think proper. They shall enter in a Book, to be kept for that purpose, the time of their attendance, and such remarks as may appear to them necessary or desirable. The minutes of the Visitors to be read at the meetings of the Committee, and at the Quarterly Meetings. The Committee are to appoint three Female Visitors, one of whom is to be changed every month.

4th. The General Meeting in the year 1800, according to the original plan of the Institution, made provision for a perpetual succession of Directors. Forty Subscribers, members of our Society, were nominated and appointed, who, with their successors, as hereafter directed to be appointed, together with any other Donors or Subscribers, qualified according to the seventh Rule of Chapter 1st, and Agents that may be appointed by any qualified Meeting, that may from time to time choose to attend, are to be the General Meeting, and continue the Directors of the Institution, in whom the government of it is perpetually to vest and remain; and ten of whom are to be sufficient to do business. The said forty Directors, or any eight of them, with any other qualified Donors or Subscribers, are to meet quarterly for the purposes of the preceding Rule.

5th. At the expiration of each year, the first named eight on the list are to cease to be Directors, and eight other members, of our Society, are to be appointed by the General Meeting in their place; with an addition for such as may be deceased or disowned; any of whom may be chosen from the number of Donors and Subscribers, or others, as shall, in process of time, be judged most convenient and best.

6th. If at any future period, by means of some unforeseen or unexpected events, it should appear to the General Meeting, that the original purpose of the Undertaking cannot be accomplished or pursued, the said General Meeting shall give due notice in writing to all the Directors, and also in every Quarterly or other Meeting of our Society, which, according to the Rules, may be interested therein, that the disposal of the Property of the Institution is to be taken under consideration at their next Meeting. At such Meeting two Agents or Representatives, appointed by any of the said Meetings, shall be admitted as Members of the General Meeting; and in case two-thirds of the Meeting so convened shall agree thereto, they may sell or dispose of the whole Estate and Property of the Institution, or of any part thereof, or appropriate the same, or the neat produce thereof, to such just, equitable, or charitable uses, as they, on serious and deliberate consideration, shall judge best.

CHAPTER III.

PATIENTS.

1st. The Terms for Board, Washing, Medical Advice, and Medicines, and all other things necessary, except clothing, are, for every poor Patient privileged agreeably to the third Rule, a sum not less than four shillings per week.

2d. Not less than eight shillings per week shall be paid for other Patients, and more according to circumstances; and a reasonable sum for the board of the servant of a Patient, in case their friends should incline to send one; which servant must be approved by the Committee. The terms of admission to be subject to future alteration, if found necessary; and as the wearing of washing gowns and skirts is at present so much increased, that the washing of them, in so large a family, is attended with considerable inconvenience, it is agreed, that those belonging to the Patients shall be washed out of the House, and the expense charged to their respective accounts.

3d. A quarter of a year's maintenance for each Patient is to be paid in advance; and in

case the Patient should be cured, or die before the expiration of the first quarter, no part thereof is to be returned: but, after the first quarter, return is to be made for the number of whole weeks unexpired, at the time of removal, or decease of a Patient.

4th. As experience demonstrates, that the recovery of insane Patients frequently depends on their being removed from their connexions, and put under proper care and treatment, in the early stages of the disorder, it is earnestly recommended to their friends, to remove them at an early period, after the disorder appears to be fixed. And as an additional inducement to persons in straitened circumstances, to adopt this salutary measure, it is concluded, that in derangements not exceeding six months from their first appearance, those Members of our Society whose circumstances, in case of continuance, would not conveniently admit of their paying more than eight shillings per week, shall be entitled to an abatement of four shillings a week for one year, if not sooner recovered. Those Patients who, by the former rule, would have been rated at four shillings per week, will, under this regulation, be admitted gratis, for a year, if necessary; but as some Patients have

RULES, &c. FOR THE GOVERNMENT

some with disorders unconnected with insanity, and which require additional expense or attendance, it is judged necessary, that, in such cases, an additional charge shall be made at the discretion of the Committee.

5th. On the admission of Patients, the Committee should, in general, require a certificate signed by a medical person, to the following import: *I do hereby certify, that A. B. of C, aged — years, is in a state of Insanity, and proper to be received into a House provided for the relief of persons of that description.* It should also be stated, whether the Patient is afflicted with any complaint independent of insanity. It is also desirable, that some account should be sent, how long the Patient has been disordered; whether any, or what sort of medical means have been used; and whether any disposition has appeared in the Patient to injure him or herself, or any other person: with any other circumstances likely to throw light on the case relative to his or her treatment.

6th. As the Committee is not to admit any Patient, on lower terms than eight shillings per week, unless recommended by the Agent of a privileged Meeting, or a Subscriber qualified

according to the third Rule respecting Contributions, it is hoped that individual Subscribers will be cautious of recommending Patients whose maintenance, or any part thereof, is paid by a monthly or other Meeting, to the saving of the expense of the members of such Meetings collectively, thereby rendering it unnecessary for them to subscribe to the Institution: but no discouragement is hereby intended to the assistance of Friends whose circumstances, or those of their near connexions, are too strait to pay eight shillings per week.

7th. As in many cases, it may be difficult for the friends of Patients to procure suitable persons to conduct them to the House, it is agreed, that on application, a proper person shall be sent from the Retreat, when it is convenient: the expenses only being paid by the Patient's friends.

8th. Though it was the original design of this Institution, to accommodate such insane persons as are members of our Society, yet it was also considered that cases may arise, wherein it may be desirable to extend such accommodation beyond the line of strict membership; but as an indiscriminate admittance of persons not

1A. RULES, &c. FOR THE GOVERNMENT

in membership, would defeat the special design of the Institution, by the exclusion of those who are members, the admitting, or not admitting of them, must always be left to the discretion of the Committee, and consequently time given for that purpose.

9th. It also appears necessary, that the sending of Patients without previous application, should, in all cases, be avoided, lest suitable accommodation be not ready for their reception; and Friends are also requested to avoid bringing Patients at late hours of the night.

10th. As circumstances may sometimes occur, wherein it is proper that the Committee should have a discretion to decline the admission of Patients, though members of our Society, especially when the House is nearly full; it is agreed to vest such discretion in the Committee, until the Quarterly or General Meeting can be consulted; which Meeting shall determine the propriety of admitting or refusing such applications.

"In presenting the annexed Statement of the
Funds of this Institution, for the Year ending 3rd month
31st 1817. it is with great regret, that the Committee
has to notice an Excess in the Expenditure of the
House above the Income derived from Patients
of £427. 13. 6. The Legacies, Donations & Subscriptions
amount to £480. 9. 0 but as the sum of £214. 19. 6
for Annuity & for Interest, must be added to
the Expenditure of supporting the Institution, there is
this Year a diminution in its property in the sum
of £154. 4. 0"

"The Institution also remains subject to
a Debt of about £2500 and to the payment of
5% Cent to Annuity on the sum of £3000"

"The Deficiency of this Year may, in part be
attributed to the high price of Grain, and an increas-
ed proportion of Patients on the lowest Terms; nearly
half now in the Institution being at only 4 Shillings
per Week. Some Patients also, during the last Year, have
had the benefit of gratuitous maintenance, agreeably
to the 4th Rule under the Head 'Patients'."

"The Committee think it necessary to recommend
to the General Meeting, the consideration of means
for increasing the Income of the Establishment;
and they are of Opinion that some more effectual
mode might be adopted, of calling the attention of
Friends, in the remote Quarterly Meetings, to the
liberal support of an Institution, in which all are
alike interested."

To the Friends of the Retreat.

The utility and importance to the Society of Friends, of such an Establishment as the Retreat, has been fully evinced by the experience of 21 Years. The manner in which it has hitherto been conducted, and the eminent success which has attended its efforts, for the mitigation and cure of Mental Disease, have so firmly established its reputation, that the Directors believe the bare statement of its necessities, would be sufficient to obtain for it, the increased Benefactions of that Society, of which it is allowed to be so conspicuous an Ornament, and which has derived from it such essential benefits.—

The Directors are encouraged in the present appeal to their Friends, by the frequent experience of liberality on former

former occasions, when they have been peculiarly called upon. It is however conceived, that many of them are not aware of the necessity which exists, for the continued exercise of their bounty, nor of the very large proportion of this Institution's voluntary Funds, which are derived from the Quarterly Meeting in which it is placed; the Members of which have no advantages superior to others, except the satisfaction of endeavouring to contribute to its welfare, by personal attentions.

"It is believed, that the want of more frequent contributions, and especially of Annual Subscriptions, from the distant Friends, for the Retreat, is in great measure to be attributed, to there not being an active Agent in each District to collect regularly the Annual as well as other Contributions, from those who are able by this means, to evince their goodwill to this Establishment. And it is not doubted, that some of those, whose distance precludes their taking an active share in its management, will readily avail themselves of an opportunity of serving it, by exerting themselves to collect the Offerings of their Friends."

"The Directors believe that many advantages would arise, from the appointment of one or more Agents by each Quarterly Meeting, for this purpose, and to whom the Annual Reports might be regularly sent for distribution amongst the Subscribers. They therefore hope, they shall not be thought improperly desirous of enlisting their distant Friends, in the service of this Institution by earnestly recommending the adoption of this plan, and by suggesting the propriety of calling the attention of Friends collectively to the subject once in the Year after the close of the Autumn Quarterly Meetings, before which time the Annual Reports will in all probability have arrived; and when Annual & other Subscriptions might be received."

The Committee have not proceeded in the erection of the Wall
 round the Field, which formed a part of the original Plan -

The following report was brought in, and it is agreed that a suitable number be printed for circulation; and that the following Extracts from the last Year's Report be added. (viz) Page 8. It is believed the ending Page 9 "might be received."

"The Committee appointed to examine the accounts have to present the annex'd statements, by which it will be seen, that the appeal made last Year to the liberality of the Society, on behalf of this Institution, has not been made in vain. In many districts Friends have been appointed as Agents, agreeably to the suggestions in the last Year's Report, and their exertions in obtaining Annual and other Subscriptions, entitle them to the grateful acknowledgments of the subscribers at large. The Committee trust that, before the expiration of another Year, Agents will have been appointed in the several Meetings, throughout the Kingdom; and that as every part of the Society is equally interested in this establishment, there will be a still greater approximation than at present to equality, in the Contributions to its support."

"It appears that the expenditure on account of the Patients, has exceeded the Income derived from them by the sum of £625.11.2. though some part of the excess may be considered extraordinary from a general Pairing & Colouring, having this year ^{been} found necessary in the Old Buildings; yet the defalcation sufficiently shows, the necessity of the concurrence of the Society at large, in the support of this valuable Institution."

"It is however gratifying to observe, that, including Subscriptions for Annuities, one which 5% Cent Interest is payable during certain lives; there is this Year an increase of the Property of the Institution. Still it remains subject to a debt of £A016. and also to the payment of 5% Cent to Annuitants, on the sum of £3230" NB should be £3280—

"The new Building distinguished by the name of the Lodge" was opened in the 11th Month last; and we have satisfaction in stating, that the Income already derived from the Patients who occupy it

to more than sufficient to pay all the expences attending them, and the Interest of the Money expended in its erection"

Nine Patients have been admitted, during the last Year. Seven have been discharged, of whom Five were recovered, one was in an improved State, and one was considered not to require further confinement. Only One Patient has died in the course of the last Year

It appears that the sort of patients in the Appendage is very considerably more than that of patients in the main building and that no adequate advantage result from this separate establishment. At the time of its adoption and for some time after there was a prospect of the wants of the Society exceeding what has happily proved to be the case. For several years past the number of patients has not exceeded 64 for the average of a year and during the last year, the average number under care at one time has been under 60. It appears also that by an addition to the main building sufficient

to accommodate six or seven patients of the
lower class a provision amply sufficient for
the present and probable future wants of the
Society might be obtained should the General
Meeting think it right to direct the discon-
tinuance of the Appendage

The Committee before appointed in conjunction
with the general Committee is requested to
consider further the subject of an additional
building and the probable expence and report
to the next or succeeding Quarterly Meeting
for its consideration previous to deciding as
to the propriety of discontinuing the Appending
and the erection of the drying stove left to the
Committee. This Meeting adjourns to 3 o'clock
subject to any alteration of the Quarterly Meeting
Not pursuant to adjournment.

The following report and statement from the
General Committee has been read and with
some slight alterations is agreed to and the
General Committee are directed to print a suitable

The Friends appointed in conjunction with the Committee of the Retreat, to examine the accounts of the institution, for the year ending the 31st of 3^{mo} 1840 have presented the following statement

It appears that the House Expenses, though less than in the preceding year, exceed the income from patients by the sum of £ 508. 9. 4 The continued support of the friends of the Establishment, by Donations and annual Subscriptions, in almost every part of the Kingdom, has, however, nearly equalled this deficiency; and including the liberal Subscription of £1000 on which 5 per cent. is payable on certain Lives, the Institution will be seen to have considerably increased its property.

The apparent deficiency of the annual Subscriptions in the present Report, compared with that of the previous year, arises, we believe, entirely from several of the agents not having made up their collections in time for the present statement. It is earnestly hoped that the agents will not relax their kind exertions to promote this very desirable species of support.

The Institution still remains subject to a Debt of £2770. 15. 2 and to the payment of 25 per cent

to Accountants on the Sum of £4430

During the last year, twelve Patients were admitted eight were discharged, of whom six were recovered and two improved. Four Patients died, two of whom were eighty and upwards - one was seventy seven, and the other forty nine years of age. Two of these Patients had been 24 years, and another 17 years in the House.

There are now 61 Patients under care viz 28 men and 33 women, of whom four men and seven women are at the Aspendage.

The Committee have great satisfaction in believing that the judicious treatment of insanity in this Institution, has already diminished the extent of this calamity in our Society. In this grateful opinion they feel themselves fully supported, by the following statement of the results of the cases, which have been under care, from its commencement to the end of the year 1819

The great proportion of recoveries in the very recent cases, cannot but afford consolation to every reader, and points, out forcibly, to the immediate friends of Patients, the importance of their being early placed under judicious care. The total number of cases admitted into the Asylum from its opening in the year 1796, to the end of the year 1819, is Two Hundred and fifty three which

may be divided into five classes.

Class 1 47 in number, were cases of the first attack; and not exceeding 3 months duration of admission

Class 2 45 were cases not exceeding 12 months and the first attack

Class 3. 34 were cases of not exceeding 12 months, but not the first attack.

Class 5 79 were cases of more than two years duration, many of from 15 to 20 years standing.

There is also, we regret to say, notwithstanding the continued liberality of our Friends in the way of Annual Sub-

scriptions, a diminution of the property belonging to the Institution, of £261. 17s. 4d.

IT APPEARS that the House Expenses have been less during the last year than in the previous one, and that the average number of Patients has been very nearly the same. The income from them has, however, been materially less than in the preceding year, which circumstance, with the unusually small sum we have now to report under the heads of Donations and Legacies, will account for the unfavourable result of the present statement.

The Institution still remains subject to a debt of £2837. 11s. 2d. and to the payment of 5 per cent. on the sum of £4430.

Sixteen Patients have been admitted during the last year, most of them within the last three months; six have been discharged, of whom four were recovered, and the other two in rather an improved state; two have died, one of whom was 90 years of age, and had been 21 years in the Institution.

There are now 68 * Patients in the House, viz.:

The Committee, in conjunction with the Friends appointed to examine the accounts of the Institution, for the year ending the 31st. of 3rd. mo. 1822, have presented the following statement, from which it is satisfactory to find, that the income from the Patients, approaches much nearer to the expenditure on their account, than it has done for several past years. There is still however an excess of expenditure above the Income, of £234. 15s. 5½d., which, with the claims

of annuitants, £215. 5s. 6d. and the interest of money borrowed £136. 5s. 10d. makes a total surplus of expenditure above the Income from the Patients, of £586. 6s. 9½. We have however gratefully to acknowledge, that the sums received in the forms of Donations and Annual Subscriptions, amount to £484. 12s. 6d. and the sums subscribed for annuities and bequeathed to the Institution during the last year, amount to £395. 7s. leaving, with the rent of the farm, a balance in favor of the Retreat of £343. 12s. 8½d.

This statement, and the consideration of the debt with which the Institution is encumbered, will, we hope, induce the continued exertions of the Agents and other friends of the establishment, in obtaining Subscriptions towards its support.

During the past year sixteen Patients have been admitted—thirteen have been discharged, of whom nine were recovered, and most of the rest in an improved state—four have died—two of whom were about 80 years of age.

There are now 67 Patients under care, viz. 28 men and 39 women, of whom 3 men and 7 women are at the Appendage.

The state of the Institution continues to be such as affords satisfaction, and we believe fully authorizes us to recommend it to the confidence and liberal support of the Society.

The Committee, in conjunction with the Friends appointed to examine the accounts of the Institution, up to the 31st. of 3rd. mo. last, have presented the following statement, from which it is very satisfactory to find, that the income from the Patients has considerably exceeded the expenditure on their account.

This favourable circumstance may be attributed chiefly, to an extraordinary increase in the income from the Patients, owing to there having been, in the course of the past year, an unusual proportion of

those on the higher terms. There is also a considerable diminution in the House Expenses, owing to the low prices of provisions during the past year.

The continuance of these sources of advantage is, however, obviously uncertain. During the ten years preceding the last, the expenses of the Establishment have exceeded the income derived from patients by upwards of £4300. And when it is also considered that the Institution remains subject to a debt at interest of more than £3700, and to an annual payment of £210. 5s. 6d. to annuitants, we trust that our friends will perceive the necessity of continuing undiminished, their kind and liberal aid to the Establishment.

Agreeably to a decision of the General Meeting, the Premises occupied as an Appendage to the Institution have been let, and the patients removed to the main building. A considerable sum has been necessarily expended on the alterations and additions required by this change, but we feel no doubt that it will prove beneficial to the Establishment, as regards economical and other considerations.

A special General Meeting was held in the 3rd. month last, for the purpose of electing a Superintendent, in the room of our aged friend George Jepson, when Thomas Allis was chosen to fill the

office. He came to the Institution in the early part of the fifth month, and has had, since that time, the benefit of G. Jepson's advice and instruction. The office of Matron is to be filled by Hannah Ponsoyby, who has been for many years the assistant to Catherine Jepson; and though we trust the Institution will not suffer materially by the change of its officers, we do not think it right to allow our valued friends to retire from the posts which they have filled for upwards of 26 years, without thus publicly expressing our sense of their faithful and beneficial services to the Institution.

During the past year twelve Patients have been admitted—seven have been discharged, of whom six were recovered, and one improved—two Patients have died, one of whom was 55, and the other about 84 years of age.

We have again the satisfaction of presenting to our Subscribers and Friends, a favourable report of the state of the Institution.

The Friends who were appointed to assist the Committee in examining the Accounts for the past year, have presented a statement, by which it appears, that the income from the Patients has exceeded the expenditure on their account, by the sum of £ 564: 12: 4.

This is, however, exclusive of the Interest paid on the remaining debt of £2564, and the payment of £254:17:2 to Annuitants.

The increased amount of Annual Subscriptions in the present year, is particularly grateful to us, not only as holding out the prospect of a liquidation of the debt, but, as indicative of an increasing interest in the minds of Friends, respecting the Institution, and of their continued satisfaction with its management.*

The House particularly on the Men's side, has been quite full, and occasionally rather crowded, during the past year; and the applications for admission into the Lodge from persons not in connexion with the Society, have considerably exceeded the accommodation which it affords for that class, consistently with a due regard to the prior claims of the Society.

This branch of the Establishment, whilst it is valuable as a source of income, is a means of disseminating, practically, the advantages of the system of management pursued in the Retreat; and whilst the opportunity thus afforded to a few persons of other Societies, to partake of the benefits of the Institution, is esteemed by them as a privilege, it does not invade the original design, of providing a place where Friends labouring under Insanity, and particularly in a state of convalescence, might associate with each other.

* We have again to acknowledge the very kind attention of the Agents in the different Quarterly Meetings to the interests of the Institution; and, in consequence of some enquiries as to the propriety of receiving subscriptions from persons not in membership, it is proper to state, that Subscriptions have been from its origin, invited from all in profession with us, because all such may partake of the benefits of the Institution.

We mentioned in our last Report, the change of Officers ¹³⁸ which had then recently taken place; and we feel gratified in stating, that the hopes we then entertained, as to the qualifications of those who had been selected to fill the important stations of Superintendent and Chaplain, have not been disappointed by a year's experience of their services. Comfort combined with economy, appears to mark the domestic management of the Establishment; whilst the system of gentleness united with firmness, in the treatment of the Patients, is fully supported, and is found in the new hands, no less influential than it was under the administration of those, who so long proved its importance and efficiency.

At the Quarterly Meeting of the Directors and Subscribers in the 3rd month last, it was agreed to make some alterations and additions to the Buildings, which will afford some very desirable accommodation to the Institution on the Men's side of the House, as well as provide a suitable dwelling for the family of the Superintendent.

In the course of the year we are now reviewing, 17 patients have been admitted, eight have been discharged, of whom seven were reported to be recovered. Four patients have been removed by death in the same period.

Since the Summary of cases given in the year 1820, the proportion of recoveries has not been less satisfactory than it was in that statement, as will appear from the following tables:

The Report

The Committee, in conjunction with one of the friends appointed
to unite in examining the accounts of the Institution, have
brought in the following satisfactory statement of its Finances

It appears that the Income from the Patients, owing to the
number of the higher class continuing to be considerable,
has this year exceeded the Expenditure on their account
by the sum of £ 114. 12. 31. From this surplus, however may
properly be deducted the sum of £ 332. 10. 9 paid to Annuitants,
and for Interest on the remaining Debt of £ 1518. 19. After
making this deduction, the balance of Income from Patients above
the Expenditure on their account, added to the sums received
under the heads of Legacies, Donations, and Subscriptions, has
depayed the cost of the new Building mentioned in the
last Report, and increased the Property of the Institution
£ 429. 18. 3.

Notwithstanding the present state of the Funds, we venture to request the continued liberality of our friends, believing that it will enable the Directors to make further improvements in the Establishment, and to give that completeness to its arrangements, which the Subscribers at large would, we doubt not, unite in desiring.

* An opportunity has recently offered of purchasing a few acres of land, which extend the whole length of the premises, and are a very desirable acquisition.

It will be satisfactory to them to learn that, notwithstanding the large amount of Income received this Year from Patients, there are at present no fewer than twenty six at the low terms of 4/- and fourteen at 8/- per week. From this statement, it is evident, that the original design of making the payment of the opulent class contribute to the support of the poor, is carried extensively into effect.

During the past year, 24 Patients have been admitted; sixteen have been discharged, of whom eleven were recovered, one was improved, and four were removed by the desire of their friends.

Three Patients have died, the average of whose ages amounts to about 63 years.

We have again the satisfaction of reporting, that the state of the Institution continues to be such as we believe, fully deserves the approbation and confidence of the Society.

The Committee, and the friends appointed to examine the accounts of the Institution, have presented the following, favorable statement of its Finances.

The Income from the Patients has exceeded the expenditure on their behalf, by the sum of 806. 19. 3/2. This surplus has arisen from the continued attention to economy, and the number of patients of the higher classes. While this circumstance will doubtless be satisfactory to the friends of the Institution, it will, we trust, tend to relax their exertions in its favour; as they will observe there is still a considerable debt owing by the Institution.

The annexed accounts exhibit the state of the Funds at the close of the 3rd. month, the flourishing condition of which has enabled the Directors to pursue that course of improvements which has been so long contemplated, and which they have no doubt will tend to the benefit of the Establishment.

Considerable additions have been commenced at the west end of the building, for the purpose of affording additional convenience to the family in washing, baking, brewing, &c.; - the necessity of these must be obvious, when we state that the offices for these purposes were originally constructed for 30 Patients, and that at present there are nearly 90, besides a proportionate increase of attendants.

With regard to the moral treatment of the Patients, we have little that is new to offer; the system of which the long experience of the Establishment has justified the adoption is we believe faithfully adhered to.

In presenting the 31st annual report
the Committee and the friends appointed by the
Quarterly Meeting to assist in the examina-
tion of the accounts congratulate the Sub-
scribers and friends of the Institution, on
the flourishing condition of its finances, as
exhibited in the annexed statement;
from which it appears that the income

150

received from the Patients, during the past year has exceeded the expensiture on their account, by the sum of 875¹/₁₁. This continued prosperity is to them peculiarly gratifying, from the knowledge that it does not arise from curtailing the comforts of the poor, or pressing unreasonably on any class of Society.

The Institution still remains subject to a debt of 17117⁷/₁₀ exclusive of the balance due to the Treasurer, and of the claims of the annuitants.

The Buildings which were mentioned in the last report, as erecting at the west end of the Retreat to supply additional accommodations, (requisite from the Increase of the family) have been completed and appear to answer the intended design. The first floor is chiefly occupied for domestic purposes; while the upper Story, which communicates with the main building, furnishes a complete suit of apartments, appropriated to the use of female patients who are convalescent. This class have the privilege of walking the ground fronting the building, which have recently been laid out for their accommodation.

In the Year now under review 23 patients have been admitted, and in the same period 15 have been discharged and 7 removed by death. The number now in the house is 87, of whom 36 are men, and 51 women. The committee would give a more particular account of the

cases which have been under their care,
were it not that a detailed account of
the Establishment is at present preparing
by order of the last General Meeting,

Report.

In presenting the usual annual reports of the State of the Institution, the Committee have again to acknowledge the liberality of its Friends, and to report favourably of its general State.

It will be found by a comparison of the present report with that of the former year, that notwithstanding an increase in the number of patients, there is a diminution in the amount of income derived from them. This is of course owing to there having been on an average a smaller ^{number} of the highest class of patients. An increase of expensiture, will be observed also to have taken place during the past year, particularly under the head of paint and extra expenses, one of the principal items in which is a payment for the general repainting of the House.

Altho' the Income from the Patients is not equal to the total expenses of the Establishment, including Interest and annuities, yet the amount of Subscriptions, Donations, and Legacies, has exceeded the deficiency,

This excess, however, has not covered the deficiency, expenditure, during the year, on account of additional building, so that the debt to the Treasurer and other persons on Interest is increased and amounts to 2824.31. This being the case, we venture to solicit the continued kind assistance of the Friends of the Institution.

The alterations and additions, however, which have been made of late years, have given that degree of completeness to the buildings, which, we apprehend, renders it probable that the outlay, under this head, will not in future be very considerable.

During the past year, 27 patients have been admitted, and in the same period 17 have been discharged, and 3 have died whose average ages amount to 64 years. The number now under care exceeds that of any former meeting period, being 94, of whom 41 are men, and 53 are women.

The Sketch of the Origin, Progress and present state of the Institution, alluded to, in the last report, and preparing for the use of subscribers being now ready will be circulated with this report. It will we trust afford a satisfactory review of the proceedings of the Institution; and which establishing the melancholy facts, of the necessity, for

being much greater than was at first anticipated, the Sketch, will also afford consolating evidence, to the supporters and friends of the Institution, of the benefits which it has conferred, not only on the limited class of sufferers for whom it was specially designed, but also, thro' the extensive influence of its example, on society at large.

Report.

In presenting to the General Meeting of Di-
rectors and Subscribers to the Retreat the 34th
Annual Report. the committee would first
direct the attention of the Meeting to the state
of the Finances. From the documents append-
ed to this statement it will be seen, that
the Income received from the patients within
the year, has exceeded the whole cost of the Es-
tablishment by £129.19.11d. To this surplus
of Income must be added the sum of £724.
10s. received from legacies, Annual Subscrip-
tions &c. making a total increase of property
of £854.9.11d.

The debt now owing by the Institut^{io}n is little
more than £1300. Under these circumstances
the committee feel warranted in submitting to
the General Meeting the propriety of discon-
tinuing the annual call hitherto made on
the liberality of Friends; they do this under
the firm conviction, that should the funds
of the Retreat again require assistance that
aid which has been so long and so liberally
afforded, would again be promptly rendered

They doubt not also that from Donations and legacies the Income will continue to be assisted. In connexion with the state of the funds it will doubtless afford satisfaction to the Subscribers to know that at no period have the benefits of the Institution been afforded to a greater number of the lowest class of patients, than with in the present year. There are now in the House twenty four patients who pay only eight shillings per week, thirty one who pay only four shillings per week, and two gratuitously admitted, under the provisions of Rule 3rd Chapter 5th.

Within the year now under review 9 patients have been discharged and 11 have been removed by Death. In the same year 18 have been admitted, there are at present 100 in the Institution; of whom 113 are men and 57 are women. This number is unhappily greater than at any former period and the Institution may now be considered as nearly full.

Report

By the Statement of the accounts appended to this Report, it will be seen that the Income received from the Patients during the year ending with the third month 1832, has exceeded the expenditure on their account by the Sum of £1.12.4.

From the somewhat uncertain sources of Income - donations & Legacies rather a large sum has this year been received and the total increase of property appears to be £716.11.10.

Under the Head of repairs, extra expenses & taxes, a considerable increase of expenditures will be observed when compared with the preceding year. This is in part occasioned by a general painting, & partly by the increased amount paid in assessed taxes. From payment of the additional demand made by the Assessor the Committee endeavoured to obtain exemption, but were unsuccessful in the attempt.

It is satisfactory to state that

The benefits of the Institutions are afforded to 36 patients who pay but 4 shillings a week, & to 22 others who pay 8 shillings a week.

Within the past year 14 patients have been admitted, 8 have been discharged, and 2 have been removed by death. The number remaining is 100, being 39 men & 61 women. The proportion of cures appears fully equal to that of former years. The Committee believe that the State of the Institutions is such as justly entitled it to the continued confidence of the Society.

Report.

This Committee in conjunction with one of the Friends appointed by the last Quarterly Meeting of Directors, have made the usual examination of the accounts & have to present a satisfactory statement of the Funds of the Institution.

By the accompanying statement it will be seen that the income derived from the Patients has exceeded the whole expenditure of the Establishment by the sum of £8.12.5. & the amount of Legacies received during the year, having been considerable, the addition to the Stock of the Institution is upwards of £900.

The surplus of income from Patients above the expenditure must be attributed to the payments of a few patients of the highest class, as there never was so large a number of persons under care who did not pay the cost price. The patients may be arranged in regard to their weekly payments as follows, viz 1 paying nothing, under the 3^d rule Chap. 5th.
39 at 4^d 25 at 8^d per week; 11 from 10 to 16^d

Of the last class as to pay-
ment, 11 are wholly unconnected with
the Society, and dispersed amongst the
other classes there are 25 patients who
have been admitted as in possession
with the Society, but not in strict mem-
bership.

The number of Patients now un-
der care is 108 viz - 64 Men & 44 Women.
This is a greater number by 8 than we
have reported on any previous occa-
sion, and the house may now be said
to be full.

It does not appear that any extra-
ordinary exciting cause of Insanity has
been in operation during the past year,
nor is there any thing peculiar in the cases
which have been brought under care within
that period. The number admitted, 17 is
not larger than has taken place in
some former years. Eight patients have
been discharged recovered, which is
about the average proportion & one
has been removed not improved.

Only one patient has been removed
by death, and the health of the family
during the past year, calls for peculiarly
grateful acknowledgments, when we

remember that since our last report the Spasmodic Cholera & the Influenza have extensively & fatally prevailed in the neighbourhood.

We apprehend that to the unusually small number of deaths within past & preceding years, only 3 in both, may be in part, attributed the present increase of our numbers. The average proportion of deaths is about $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, which is very much below the general average of similar establishments and to this prolongation of life, often to extreme old age, in cases of fixed insanity, may be found, one at least of the causes of the gradual but steady increase of the number of patients under our care.

The following statement of the cases admitted since the year 1828, when a similar account was published, will probably be interesting to those who are desirous to ascertain the results of Treatments in various Establishments.

Since the close of the year 1828, 83 patients have been admitted, of whom 16 were cases of the first attack, & not exceeding 3 months' duration at the time of admission — of these 1 has been removed as admitted.
