SIR,

Understanding that Professor LISTER has intimated his intention to resign the Chair of Clinical Surgery in the University of Edinburgh, I beg to offer myself as a Candidate.

Having graduated with honours at the University of Edinburgh in 1865, and acted for twelve months as the late Professor SYME's House Surgeon, I thereafter visited the principal Continental Schools of Medicine.

In 1866 I was appointed Demonstrator of Anatomy in the University of Edinburgh, and held that appointment for four years.

Having then obtained the Licence of the Royal College of Surgeons and the University Court as a Teacher of Surgery, I lectured on Practical Surgery in 1870 and 1871, and since 1871 I have lectured on Systematic Surgery. Commencing with 18 Pupils, this Class has steadily increased, and during the past Session numbered upwards of 100 Students.

In October 1871 I was elected Assistant Surgeon to the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary, and in January 1875 Examiner in Anatomy to the University of Edinburgh. These appointments I still hold.

Professor LISTER having obtained leave of absence for the Summer Session of 1875, to enable him to visit the Continental Medical Schools, I was appointed by the University Court to discharge his duties. During that Session I took charge of his Wards, taught the Students at the bedside, and delivered the Clinical Lectures to his class. In May 1876 and in May of this year, when Mr. LISTER was in London attending the Meetings of the General Medical Council, and on all occasions when he was temporarily absent from Edinburgh since my appointment as Assistant-Surgeon to the Infirmary, I have, at his request, taken charge of his Hospital work, and lectured to the Clinical Class. I have studiously availed myself of these opportunities of teaching Clinical Surgery. My clinique has always been numerously attended by the Students.

I am in my thirty-fifth year.

Since 1865 I have devoted myself to the study and teaching of Anatomy and Surgery, and for several years I have confined my practice to Surgery alone. On these grounds I venture to base my application for the present appointment, in support of which I have the honour to submit Testimonials regarding my qualifications.

To THE RIGHT HONOURABLE RICHARD ASSHETON CROSS, M.P., Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, London.

Sir—We, the undersigned Students of Medicine in Edinburgh, understanding that Mr. CHIENE intends to become a candidate for the Chair of Clinical Surgery, about to be vacated by Mr. LISTER, are anxious to come forward and show our appreciation of his great abilities, both as a Surgeon and as a Teacher of Surgery.

We know how from the very outset of his surgical career Mr. CHIENE has devoted himself to the art of teaching. A great natural aptitude; a successful University career; the excellent opportunities he enjoyed-as House Surgeon to Mr. SYME, as Junior Demonstrator of Anatomy under Professor GOODSIR, and Senior Demonstrator under Professor TURNER; and the useful experience he gathered at some of the chief Continental Schools, have enabled him to carry out successfully his purpose. In his lectures the subject-matter has always been carefully thought out, and often enriched with original observations. His ideas have been expressed in clear and telling language, frequently aided by graphic description and pointed illustration. Frankly and fearlessly avowing what he considered to be true, he has yet been ever anxious rather to stimulate the hearer to think for himself than to be guided by his authority. 
