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
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
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

## Physical and Mental State

A well nourished man in seemingly good health and a hurried examination does not show anything calling for special remarks; mentally he is labouring under acute mania; restless noisy and extremely loquacious and quite incoherent and evidently quite prepared to be troublesome if thwarted.

## Personal History

He is a Farmer residing at Dulnain, Druim, Alt 25. Five and this is said to be his first attack and the duration uncertain he seems to have been depressed and gloomy for some time wandering about the fields and then suddenly, blazed off into an acute maniacal attack.

May 3<sup>rd</sup>

Since admitting the patient has been fairly manageable and has had some little sleep he has taken food well and his tongue remains clean and moist. He is mostly excited shouting and noisy but has half hours of comparative quietness he never however rational but is then full of some confused notions of the sun and his horses & talks about marrying someone in Edinburgh and calls his illness the effects of love.

May 4<sup>th</sup>

Had a sleepless noisy night and his room was both wet and dirty: he was much excited this morning.

If paternal uncle is said to have been insane.

May 13

Continues very much excited foolish in conduct and sleepless and noisy: he is quite incoherent. According to the patient's mother the illness is of quite recent date within three or four weeks at most: he is sober and industrious and said to be of a religious cast of mind often being found by his mother on his knees at prayer and in tears but however spoke little on such subjects. He seems to have been restless at night for a little time before his illness began.

May 17

Was settled down a little still is still restless and foolish in his conduct and he remains

quite incoherent. He is sleeping well, and has a good appetite.

May 27

He is much excited and quite incoherent in his language he is very foolish in his conduct and is not sleeping well. This morning he attacked the night watch.

June 27

Still restless and much excited and very foolish in his conduct destroying his clothes and conducting himself in a silly fashion.

July 7

Is at present very dull, and is inclined to be troublesome; he is quite incoherent.

Aug 27

Still far from well, he is stupid, and incoherent, his horizon removed by his family on trial.

Sept 23

It is reported of patient that he is now very well indeed and works steadily and pleasantly on the farm and maintains a quite lively interest in all his former surroundings. He is consequently today discharged.

Personal History:

Patient is about 54, married, a master baker residing at Dennis Stirlingshire. - He has been on two former occasions a patient here, in January, and again in April 1887 and besides this he is said to have had several mental disturbances or a slighter kind; He is said to have been taken a little account of an evening but there has been no recurrence in that respect. - There is a H.S. his brother being a patient in the Asylum; the present attack is said to have lasted only three days and during that time he has been restless and constantly walking about his house at night.

Physical and Mental State:

An obese man seemingly in good condition and fair health. Mentally he is laboring under an attack of mania of the restless active type with or without any definite delusion and without violence he shows a good deal of exaltation of manner is giddily constantly talking and very well pleased with himself, indeed the bluntness is well marked; he mistakes the identity of those about him and accepts his new environment without question showing a desire of consciousness.

May 26

Since admission the patient has been restless talkative and excited incoherent in language but without voluntary definite delusion last night he was worn and restless and this morning he is very foolish.

May 27

This morning the patient is very excited shouting, striking and kicking and tearing his clothes during the night he was very noisy and restricted to his bed until and he was wet and dirty; he is taking gr-45 Potass. Brom. Three daily and is covered a cold pack.

June 2<sup>nd</sup>

After settling down a good deal he is sleeping fairly but not too well and remains excited and shows considerable exaltation. He is having gr-45 Pot. Bromide twice daily.

July 7<sup>th</sup>

Has become very restless and foolish in his conduct and quite incoherent in his language he is

Patrick Jackson Turner A.M. 40

Personal History:-

Patient is aged 40, married, a shopkeeper residing at Fairlie Bank Villa, Partick. This is said to be his first illness and the duration about 1 a year. There is no N.Y. and the cause is uncertain.

His wife says he has been nervous for about 2 years but has lately relapsed become much worse. That he does not sleep at night but keeps restlessly pacing up and down the room. That he charges her with misconduct and has threatened, struck her and has threatened to take her life and when the attendants went for him he had turned his sister and his nephews out of the house, and they dared not return.

Prior to admission he is said to have been very restless and excited: stated that he was engaged in a war with Hell: that he can hear what is said in his neighbour's houses and also that when in Brussels some months ago he could hear what was being spoken in his own house.

Physical and Mental State:-

A well nourished man of the bronzed type, seemingly in good health and condition despite his complaints of loss of appetite and a little nausea and his tongue is coated with a brown fur but moist. Bowels inactive, he does not complain of any cardiac trouble but on examining a T.S. murmur is heard at the apex but the area of cardiac dulness is unchanged and no history of Pneumonia is ascertained.

He is labouring under mania constantly talking and rather excited. He protests that he is not insane and says that he has had "hints" during the last three weeks that he ought to go out of town, as this was coming and he seems to suggest that his "removal" here is due to the machinations of his enemies who he says when asked who he considers to be his enemies "has a successful man" has plenty of enemies. He says when asked about the hints "that people begins to make odds and winds to me another and to ring of

May 27 Left home, and was rather  
restless during the night. This morning

does not give expression to any delusion  
and denies having said that he could  
hear what was being said in his house  
in Patrick when he was in Belgium.  
He does not admit having hallucinations  
of sight or hearing.

June 2<sup>nd</sup> Stays in the whole a little  
less restless and excited, and is better.  
He is clean, fair, and takes his food  
well. He is incoherent and delusive.

June 12 Today he is a little depressed  
and in a scarce word, he remains very  
delusive and believes his being here is due to  
the machinations of his enemies.

July 7<sup>th</sup> Very restless and excitable  
and extremely incoherent in language  
constantly talking and at times indignant  
at being unluckily detained & demanding  
his release. He calls constantly for paper  
but never succeeds in writing anything.  
On Saturday he refused to see his Clergyman.  
He is very delusional fearing his wife is  
unscrupulous with visitors, and that  
no older or younger is safe and that  
the attendants desire their persons to run  
at the windows. He is clinging tightly

Sept 20 At the moment he is a little  
more settled than he has been of late  
he is however very delusional imagining  
that the attendants of his house and  
charges his wife with unscrupulousness  
with them. At times he is very friendly  
visitors and declaring he has lost  
his mind and cannot open his mouth called  
at the moment he may be doing so and  
talking most volubly.

Nov 16<sup>th</sup> His appetite is fair and well  
nourished, but is unimproved. He is  
very incoherent and has numerous delusions  
today he says that when at Chapelone  
day both sides of the road come up to him.

1885 April 7<sup>th</sup> Remains unchanged. He is  
money and visitors meantime speaking little  
and is still most suspicious of all about

## Murdoch MacAffer A.B. 45

June 1<sup>st</sup>. Personal history.

Patient has been an inmate of his Asylum at his previous occasions the last being on 25 September 1881. He has had several attacks of insanity, and has been a patient in an English private asylum. His father was insane.

He is retired from business and present residence at Bromley, Lazarus Antonio. On the 20th inst. he suddenly left home, according to him self being then staying at St. Ives Asylum, and came to London and while his wife Mabel had been here come here. The patient himself came to London to consult Dr. our finding him in some difficulty in his room it was found that he had left in the morning and his clothes while here and that he had been out again and seen in the doctor who overtook him at Whitechapel during the journey, the patient suddenly became excited and refused to come in again quietly down and came without further trouble. During the night he was restless and sleepless and woke some hours.

Mentally.

He is laboring under mania, is restless excited talking ceaselessly about Vegetarianism and deriving quite indecent in his language and intense suspicion and uncertainty and doggery in his manner at times. He believes it is against the command of God to kill any living thing, fish, bird or beast and alike he does not exclude milk from his vegetarian diet, he is omnivorous because it is killing something.

June 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Slept fairly till 4.30 but was restless afterwards; this morning he is quiet and orderly but still full of his old ideas.

June 6<sup>th</sup>.

Yesterday, when out walking with an attendant he patient exposed himself before some females and was generally foolish in his conduct going into shops and the

like, he slept none without being in bed all night and when he woke up let his attendant come near him as he fancies his food is being interfered with.

June 26'

Patient has been very well for the last week or two and was today discharged.

Personal History

Patient is married as Clerk and Cashier in an iron Works at Whifflet and resides at Garthwaite he is said to be his first master and the duration one month the patient himself however says he has been with the works for the last six months but this is also known to be the case: When questioned about his visitors he says he went home in laundry money having been £25 short on one day and in the same laundry of the master! There is said to be no lets and the alludes course is evident -

Physical and Mental State

A man of average height anaemic, hair dark eyes brown blue. Lips rather contracted but equal and seeming inclined to be singular in response to stimuli however generally in those air his walk being slow but there is no sign of ataxia in it nor is any humor seen in the lips or tongue: the tongue is moist and clean his bowels regular and active and his appetite fair. The heart little wheezing in rate he is in average condition -

Mentally his state is such as to put him under suspicion of general dementia also the terms are wanting: He is facile utterly unconcerned and opens his mind freely to the writer a mere stranger seems to be, and says he is contentedly to believe and says he is quite contentedly to be ill: he says he knows he is ill and has no very urgent desire to get well, adds he can give no reason for his attitude of mind: he says he sleeps badly and no Sunday can he save the devil and break his thoughts about him and when told that he walks in good hand yet to know an old dame he says she can lift a ton but when he says this it can hardly be made out that he is in earnest about it -

Patient is very facile, quite uninterested and unconcerned and always returns. Here in understanding his position he left the grounds two days ago or the were said the gate keeper telling him for a visitor he went home but did not announce himself to

an one int who founds reading in a room quite attention being called by a cough being heard; he came back quite pleasantly.

July 5<sup>th</sup> Still shows considerable mental improvement but he is uninterested somewhat both in body and mind.

Sept 25 His mind is still enfeebled but he does not seem to have any delusions he is contented and mostly unconcerned. He is content today to stay at home.

Oct 14 Returned today; he is fat and looking well.

Nov 12 Has again been absent from Paris and in Ireland and returned to the Asylum today he is not interested he is dull and depressed and complains of headache his speech is hesitating and jumbled but has no difficulty with special words.

Nov 19 His condition however very remarkable and stupid and during the night he had three epileptic convulsions; today he is more bright but still very weak.

1885 April 7<sup>th</sup> Deteriorated and stupid as in the meantime; he is getting very fatigued.

Alexander Raleigh Findlay A.M.D

Physical and Mental State:

June 11 in an acute state of  
mania with a little memory  
and temporal catatony but without  
other maniacal disorders, reality like  
the tongue is find clear and words are  
less jumbled, maniacal also notes  
all words.

He is labouring under  
acute maniacal delirium and  
exists utterly incoherent in language  
frequently interspersed with a few  
words which can be easily  
understood. He speaks  
easily though he does so much  
voluntarily and pours forth a perfect  
torrent of words with little connection  
with one another. He seems fairly  
well satisfied with himself and  
quite happy. He does not realize  
in the least that he has been  
brought here as a patient and indeed  
says he does not know where he is.

Slept all night and was  
quiet in the early morning taking  
however he became more restless and  
excited and is again quite as foolish  
as on admission. He is taking his  
food well and the excitement is not  
of a violent kind but gives him tremor  
in shivering during and dancing about  
the room and talking.

June 12 Not well but this  
morning he is more foolish than before.  
The patient is Dulce. A. 22 a Clerk  
formerly an Auto Student and remains  
at 35 Cleveland terrace, Hillhead. This  
is said to be his illness and the  
duration a few days over no cause  
assigned but a brother who yesterday  
called on Dr. claimed very strange. No  
up is stated.

July 5 After remaining well for  
a couple of weeks he has again become  
excited, restless and foolish constantly,  
talking and gesturing and incoherent  
in his language.

July 7 Was very noisy and  
destructive during the night and tore  
his shirt and a pair of stockings.

July 27 Continues excited and  
foolish in his conduct with long flights  
in a rambling way and full of the  
wildest schemes and loft aspirations.

July 28 Very bad and this  
morning he is extremely noisy and  
turboent shouting, swearing and  
threatening.

Rev Alexander Fairlie Fraser M.D.

Personal History:-

Patient is Single, 20-20 as  
Superior in the Church of Scotland  
and General Minister of the Middle  
Parish, Paisley, lately residing at 11  
Glenburn Terrace Glasgow and according  
to his own account never recently  
returned from India from a visit to  
his son there: This is not his first  
illness having a patient in the same  
from March to June 1883 see Journal  
xxi last 307. He is very intemperate  
and has had several Epileptic attacks and  
has attempted suicide by poisoning.  
No H.s. is alleged.

Physical and Mental State:-

In addition to the patient  
was extremely shabby and utterly broken  
down in appearance looking much  
older than his stated age. teeth very  
bad, tongue coated and very tremulous  
and the speech slow and difficult and  
nervous tremor in eyes, limb his  
whole appearance being his open to  
the suspicion of having paralysis but  
still allowing the alternative of Chronic  
alcoholism. Mentally, his labouring  
under great excitement is noticeable and  
utterly incoherent in language and is  
constantly wanting beer and whisky or  
his Fulin Soda water: He is very  
prosperous and shows even no his evident  
some weakness of mind.

June 30

During the winter abstinence  
the patient passes thro' a period of  
extreme excitement and was incautious  
for some four days, he had two  
Epileptic convulsions in the morning  
of the 20<sup>th</sup> Inst and seemed to be in  
great danger of drowning. During this  
time he had hallucinations & seeing  
several numerous people in his room  
and was very sleepless and tremulous.

July 5<sup>th</sup>

Suffers from constipation and is  
anæmic, he is taking Pot. Bromide to  
which today big Arsenical has been  
added.

July 27

Has gained flesh and color  
and seems very well.

Sept 17

Left today on trials when  
in poor health he came home with  
whisky and evidently more than he  
could carry.

Oct 10

Patient was today discharged

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Adam Hunter Alldo.Personal History

Patient is single, 22 years old, residing at Sta. Barbara and has been a student there. Farming here briefly. He was a patient in the Asylum from January till September 1882 See Journal No. 1 page 3 b and was then laboring under acute Mania. He was then 18 years of age and had a horror to receive an uncle who was insane. This attack is of two months duration.

He is said to be overbearing at home and utterly without regards for his home relations. Does whatever he likes and cannot be prevented, has a mighty sense of his own importance and power and is said to be delusional imagining that his father has been watching him.

Physical and Mental State

Mentally he is laboring under adolescent insanity, he has a self assertive manner, resists constantly, the other patients and the attendants, is suspicious and foolish. He is utterly unconcerned and seems to have a mind of not very high order.

His bodily state does not seem to call for remark, he is a tall robust man in seemingly vigorous health.

July 7<sup>th</sup>

Still restless and vacillate and self assertive. He scared the other day by getting another patient to help him over the wall, tries to send letters by the attendants to his sweethearts.

July 27

He seems in excellent health and sleeps and takes his food well. Mentally, very little change still mischievous and troublesome. Vacations in his manner continue about the gallery, and when corrected striking the attendants.

Sept 26

This patient is about 20 years old, he seems not to be as well as he is likely to be however extremely fails to realize his responsibilities and that at his age he should have some serious purpose in life and cannot settle himself to anything.

Decem 5

He called today seems to be well and looks very well.

Personal History.

Patient was admitted into Sandhurst Hall Asylum two months ago and to-day transferred here: This is his first attack and the duration about three months. The alludes come in Mental Worry, and there is said to be no delir. The patient himself however says he has been a masturbator and has indulged freely in alcohol but in his depressed and gloomy state and being full of self accusations it is not known if there is much foundation for these statements. He is a Wedderburn aged 40 and was formerly the manager of an iron works at Workington.

Physical and Mental State.

A short man of broad nose hair getting pretty scarce and leaving a good part of head bald, hair of the Brunette type. His prominent trouble is anaemia and suffers from sluggish bowels tongue large and coated and the breath bad - the urine is non-albuminous and acidic.

Mentally, he is labouring under Melancholia, utter depression, and gloom, wretched feelings everyone is stern at him and he labours under the delusion that his suicide is going, and that he does not require food nor does he need to pass water. He is very apathetic unwilling to bestir himself in any way, would lie all day in bed or on a sofa with his eyes covered never speaking to anyone nor indicating any want he begs to be allowed to remain indoors and says he is too weak to walk.

Obstinately refused all medicine and he is only got to take food or go out with difficulty, he is very gloomy and perverse and full of gloom. Indulges about his great sins and also that all are working him.

July 5<sup>th</sup>

This morning he was very anxious, at last made to take his breakfast and swore roundly at the attendants.

July 7<sup>th</sup>

Continued most gloomy and depressed, obstinately refusing to go out or to take his food and finally complaining of the cruelty of being compelled to go out or take food; says he can never be well and wishes to sit all day with his hands to his face if he were allowed.

Admitted 30<sup>th</sup> June 1884.Sept 1<sup>st</sup>

Still the same miserable gloomy complaining man, complaining bitterly of the cruelty of having to take food, and would lie all day with his face buried. His sister states that her maternal uncle was insane, and as maternal aunt had a brief puerperal attack.

Decem<sup>r</sup> 5<sup>th</sup>

Unchanged he is full of complaints about the cruelty of being compelled to go out and about having to take food down his neck and declare rheumias inside.

He is still full of complaints of the same kind, declares that he is to wear his coat or do anything and yesterday said that he would not be alive today but when he is out he is always among the first of the walking party. He is looking better has more color and has made a little weight but still gloomy, and sits curled up in an arm chair with his face covered.

John Callum Grauch Aet 45

Personal History -

Patient is married at 45 residing at 5 Ardrosson Terrace Glasgow and engaged as Cashier with Messrs P & W. MacLellan Engineers. This is his first illness and the alleged cause is overwork but the duration is uncertain according to patient himself he has been clerks and fiddlers since Feb last and has been repeatedly absent on leave and living in the Country. He is a temperate man and there is no H.P. About eight years ago he seems to have had an attack of Acute Kidney disease and since he has repeatedly had bilious attacks with vomiting and headache and loss of appetite. The urine he says is always scanty and he is constipated and suffers from pain in the region of heart but his doctor says this is due to flatulence he has also attacks of irritation but has neither cough or breathlessness.

Physical and Mental State -

A tall spare man in evident indifferent general health but a hurried examination does not show any cardiac disease and the urine is only abominous to the most moderate degree indeed showing merely a trace the vessels are not tortuous and the heart's sounds are soft tongue clean and moist but intestinal tube torpid. Mentally he shows considerable nervousness and says he is sleepless and feels unfit for his duties his memory seems good and he maintains his quite sane but it takes no active steps to obtain his liberty he avers however that his wife and family are insane and that they should be held and he points his belief at their strange confused and absurd conversation he says he may disown this no Sunday cash and debts he admits that it is odd that a number of people in the same family should all become insane at the same time he still sticks to his belief and passionately declares that he himself is quite well. He does not say any other of his intimates has become insane.

July 5.

Patient is sleeping fairly well but is nervous and apprehensive delusional imagines that the whisky which he is often drinking poison or something which does him harm and

that a Pocophyllis pill which he got was for the purpose of poisoning him: he is very confused and creamy, and still holds to the belief that his family is insane one and all of them.

July 1<sup>st</sup> Very delusional says Jesus Christ and God are behind him in entirety and he asks what is going to be done with him and is in great fear and anxiety.

July 5<sup>th</sup> Has wasted flesh a little but otherwise improves: he remains depressed, dooms, and apathetic.

July 19<sup>th</sup> Continues very depressed, dooms and apathetic, always asking what is to be done with him and seems to be in fear of some approaching calamity and insists that he has been placed here for punishment; he has curious viscerai delusions declaring that his wife has all been changed and that he has not had what he calls a natural motion since he came here but only "chemical motions" and that all the food he has taken is in his bladder: Believes that he is not in Glasgow and cannot be persuaded to the contrary.

Recent<sup>ly</sup> Unchanged, altho perhaps he is a little more irritable and irascible at times: he declares he never sleeps.

1885 April 7<sup>th</sup> Still depressed and dooms and at times irritable declares that he sleeps little or none and that his brain rarely works and says it is a great cruelty to himself to take today: he says he is quite well but that his family is insane.

June 7<sup>th</sup> Has been absent for four weeks now and seems to be doing fairly: he is discharged.

Robert Kennedy, Aet 42.

Personal History

Patient is Uncle Aet 42.  
resides at 2 Lawrence Place  
Partick, formerly a Clerk and  
latterly, without occupation. He  
has been abroad, in India, and  
was a patient in his native  
country of Marago and since then  
he has never done anything and has  
not been well, still he was able  
to be at large but latterly his conduct  
has been such that his liberty had  
to be interfered with as he was  
inclined to be insolent to women  
and offered to assault them; he is  
said to indulge in Lancashire  
drinking. There is said to be no  
disease.

Physical and Mental State

A fairly nourished man  
of the middle type, pale a little but  
in evident fair health. He has a  
peculiar expression and a curious  
habit of movements of the mouth which  
at first suggests paralysis of one  
side of the face but such is not the  
case. Neither is there any fever,  
an old rheumatism, the urine is  
free of albumen and sugar the  
coralac area normal and the  
ounds of neck, back, no appetite  
is good and the bowels regular.

Mentally, he seems perfectly  
demented. Tackles his gait  
artlessly and ludicrously his hands  
go most deeply into his pockets his  
manner arbitrary and requires no  
clothes and his head turns forward  
and known or jolts about at times.  
He is incoherent in language and  
is delusional imagining he has taken  
"the Queen's shillings" and that he is about  
to join the service.

July 25<sup>th</sup>

Has been quiet and orderly  
since admission and has been sleeping  
well. He is quite incoherent in his  
conversations and expresses some notions  
about his family.

August 16

Quite incoherent in his  
language and seems to be demented  
quite demented.

Sept 24

Untidy in his dress and  
quite demented.

Alexander Wilson Sinclair - Aet 28

Personal History -

Patient is single, Aet 28 without occupation and residing at the Grand Hotel - This is said to be his first attack and the duration about eight years. He alleges cause is bodily weakness but his known to be a masturbator.

Physical condition is extremely poor and his health feeble.

Mental Condition -

Patient is obstinately silent and exceedingly timid and nervous. His eyes before the slightest touch and covering in his whole manner he has a minded look but is fairly tidy in his dress. He sleeps well and is cleanly in his habits but has to be fed. It is said of him that he is in constant dread of being taken and that there is a warrant out for his apprehension and had a friend who helped him jump over a railway train to escape being captured.

Sept 17

Continues to require to be carried to table and when here he requires to be fed. He is still very covering and nervous. He requires to have his dress put on for him.

October 9

Still the same obstinate timid man who will not do anything but what his compelled to do and resists every time that is done for him.

December 5

He seems to be demented and the haematoma has appeared on the right ear. He is much obstinate. He is losing flesh and has to be fed regularly.

Admitted 11<sup>th</sup> September 1984.

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Major Robert Rintoul A.B. 45.

The patient is aged 45 a major in the 7th Hussars serving at Lahore, Lahore Peshawar, and is married.

The history of his illness is not ascertained with any exactness yet but it seems that towards the end of last year before what was taken to be an epileptic seizure which was not repeated till it left him stupor and weak both bodily and mentally and before this he had severe neuralgic pains in the arms and legs and indeed wandering over with Dr. Noah St. Moore who saw him was under the impression that he might be suffering from some degenerative brain disease and this was strengthened by the fact that Dr. Lionel Leach noticed Paroxysmal palmaris and plantaris; he had come mounted at Arras la Chasse and improved to some extent and later had been seen by Dr. Lichfield Clarke who advised his sending the Major to Egypt, to India, and afterwards his way to India was chosen when he had an aggravation of his symptoms. He had an uncle in the Fatherland a patient here about forty years ago. The patient himself does not look a little or changeless at all but this is not so, he is in the contrary very temperate but before marriage he lived a fast life.

He is a man of the kindly type, below average height and weight and slender in his build he walks on a broad base and is a little uncertain in his movements and at times staggers a little, his pupils are unequal and his eyes appear less prominent and hazed in quality also the white muscle could hardly have paid this from his own observation, no difficulty or hurry was noticed in the manner of pronouncing or taking back the more or less words any tremor being and his handwriting was good and firm; no unusual sensations were made out in the feet and the knee jerk active on both sides. His respiration steady as critical examination in a D.S. murmur was heard at apex of heart and a minute pulse of abnormal

Afterwards before the neuralgia left he had an attack of complete apoplexy for 3 or 4 minutes. Patient was then 2 years ago as he did not gradually changed becoming irritable, sarcastic and ill-willed and disagreeable. Nevertheless his conversation about the time he had occasionally appeared in conversation - concentrated in telling a story and had sometimes to stop in the middle of a sentence for a word. His speech is much better now than it was then, his memory gradually gave way, had to make notes of things or refer to his wife. Often from 11 in the morning till occurrence of the evening before a paroxysm was followed with periodic pains in the abdomen, diminished by no effect.

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## William Fraser - Act 20.

This patient was taken himself from Peterhead, a two attendant: he is a Merchant Cashier and residing at 4 Victoria Terrace Mount Florida Glasgow. Has been residing lately at Peterhead. He is about 55 months old, has been insane for the last month certainly and probably so for two months before that certainly he has not been engaged in his office for that time and who is in the care of an attendant for a month. This is his first illness and he alleged going Peterhead on a visit and cutting his throat both accidentally and here is said to be no H.P. but an uncle Mr. Simms, Peterhead, says his mother is nervous and from some of her letters she seems to be a very emotional woman.

He had cut his throat a couple of weeks ago and he had also attempted suicide or Land amus trisobius and cutting his throat both attempts within the last two months or so and the last wound on the neck is not yet quite healed, the scar of the former one being very fresh both are loose, the threads tie back over it after washing the former over the body. He is emaciated and emaciated to the last degree, and has bed sores in the chest a voice is heard now & again and the urine which is turbid contains a trace of albumin. Sp. gr 1005.

He is labouring under mania, is obstinate and dubious and has numerous delusions and is inclined suspicious he imagines the medicines given him in Peterhead have damaged his system and that he has disease of the liver and kidney disease and that he cannot bear wine also he has come so freely that his friends have not acted for this day and that his body has been poisoned, he is very incoherent in language and when he is pressed for a reason for cutting his throat he says he was in difficulties and could not get any understanding with his mother but no other explanation can be got from him.

The patient was admitted this morning at 8 AM in a state of acute mania talking incessantly and in terms threatening in an boastful way. His history briefly being taken here by Dr. May and that he wrote County Wexford with the account of the injustice that had been done to him, Declaring that he held Her Majesty's Commission and had been grossly insulted and would not live with family members as he was neither mad nor drunk like, was quite incoherent in language and declared that he had been dogged by detectives for some time back and that this was all a plot of a former brother to ruin him; his wife manner shows great exultation and he has a large assortment of small pieces, knife and other things in his pockets but no tool impression does not suggest any:

He is aged 34 and unmarried, a Bleacher and resides at Cloberryd, County Meath and has been ill for two months no cause can be assigned but he had an attack at the age of 24. There is no h.p.

Previous admissions he had conducted himself in a foolish manner and not attend to business, sat up all night writing foolish letters and thus, talking much of his friends and last, threatening to burn both them and his doctor and had presented it at him.

He is a tall man of the dark type and is thin but can run for hours from continual talking but no evidence of delirium there is made out his wife is normal other than that it contains an abundance of rations; he has severe contusions of left hand from a fall and many small bruises of place.

Nov 5<sup>th</sup> His wife sees out to take talk him constantly in the same boastful and threatening manner he however can be got to keep his bed and is fairly pleasant to those about him when he does not imagine that they directly are concerned in retaining him.

He is a bronchite of large build and seems to have come down in condition; he has a cleared face, looks pale in even light and the Arteria Tenuis is most marked, also the vessels about the nose however is slightly dilated, abundant air the S. Cr. 1027. There is no oedema and he says his eye sight has been failing of late and that he suffers at times from headaches.

He is the son of the founder of Wollens and formerly resided at New Haven.

Seems to have a little more mind than one would have given him credit for he has been saying foolish words writing quite a good letter to his mother however he never speaks but in a muddled monotonous and his manner is very demented looking.


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
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
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
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












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
